**DORSET'S SUCCESS.**

**C. J. JOWETT'S FINE BOWLING.**

Dorset beat Monmouthshire by 17 runs in the match which concluded at Chesetow on Thursday. Jowett, with five second innings wickets for 50 runs, had the brilliant analysis for the match of 11 for 65. A. M. Harrison bowled better than his figures of 3 for 84 suggest.

From Monmouthshire's point of view, the only notable feature of the match was the bowling of Pickthall, who had 9 for 32 in the match.

At the end of the previous day's play, the game was in an interesting state.

Batting first, Dorset had made 145, and then dismissed their opponents for 61. In their second innings Dorset made 80, and when stumps were drawn Monmouth had scored ten without loss in the second innings. Thus they required 164 runs to win when the game was resumed, on Thursday.

The only distinguished batting of the day was that of Knight, one of Dorset's opening pair, whose 54 saved his county from a collapse when they opened the game on a good wicket. His enterprise was in distinct contrast to the poor batting of the remaining Dorset men, and in the over he scored 13 off K. O. Raikes. He reached 50 in as many minutes.

Monmouthshire did even worse, seven batsmen failing to score. C. J. P. C. Jowett bowled remarkably well, as his analysis of six wickets for 15 runs in only six overs shows. Four of his wickets were secured in two overs. He had good support from A. M. Harrison, 3 for 15, and a field which ate nothing away.

Dorset themselves collapsed in their second innings against the bowling of Pickthall and Harris. Pickthall, the former Newport professional, who is now on the ground staff at Lord's, took six wickets for 15 runs.

**DORSET C. AND G. V. M.C.C. TOURISTS.**

**HOME TEAM'S FIVE WICKETS' VICTORY AT POOLE.**

Dorset Club and Ground defeated the M.C.C. touring team by five wickets in a game played at Poole Park on Monday and Tuesday. The visitors batted first, their innings realising 142 runs, General R. M. Poore being top batsman with 30 not out. Wignell and Anderson took eight of the visitors' wickets, Wignell four for 57 and Anderson four for 27; Hake taking one for 22. Dorset opened weakly, and but for an eighth wicket stand by K. M. Manser and K. Cornwell, which produced 46 runs, they would have been in arrears. As it was they had a first innings lead of two runs.

The M.C.C. opened strongly in the second innings, Wilson and Adams knocking up 44 runs in 20 minutes. At lunch-time the M.C.C. were 58 runs on with nine wickets to fall. On the resumption the game underwent a change, five wickets falling for the addition of only 43 runs. The innings closed for 130, after lasting just under two hours.

The Club and Ground were left with 138 to get to win in two hours and a-quarter.

Victory for Dorset was practically assured in the second innings, when Knight and Morris, the opening batsmen, made 73 runs between them, 100 runs being on the board within an hour and a-half's play. The M.C.C. bowling and fielding then improved, and the next three Dorset batsmen were dismissed for 11 runs. Manser made the winning hit for Dorset, the final score being 139 for five wickets.

**DORSET DRAW.**

**POINTS DROPPED TO HERTFORD.**

At Watford on Thursday, Dorset were given the task of passing Hertfordshire's total of 316 in the first innings, which closed just before the luncheon interval with the fall of the ninth wicket. That they failed and had to concede first innings points in a drawn match was no fault of theirs.

Dorset fought hard for runs, and Knight opened well with a bright 34, his score including five 4's. Freeman, who opened with him, was dismissed when the score stood at 28, and Thompson then opened a delightful innings, Knight breaking the partnership with the score at 60. At the fall of the fourth wicket Busk joined Thompson, and they carried the score from 88 to 174 before Thompson was caught. He scored 73, but when only four runs to his credit he had a narrow escape. Hertfordshire later took two cheap wickets, when Boome and Jowett were run out in their efforts to force the pace, but Oldnall and Harrison made a praiseworthy last wicket stand, which added 23 to the score. **DEVON GAIN FIRST INNINGS POINTS.**

**MATCH WITH DORSET ABANDONED.**

Owing to rain, the match between Devon and Dorset, at Exeter, was abandoned, it being impossible to bowl a ball on Saturday. Devon take first innings points, having gained the advantage in the first day's play.

Devon were in a strong position at the close of play on Friday. They dismissed Dorset for a first-innings total of 138, and replied with 209 for five wickets. Outstanding features were the effective bowling of the Devon captain (J. H. Amory), who took five wickets for 38 runs, and the marked improvement in the ground fielding of the Devon team as a whole.

F. W. Midgley also bowled well, capturing three wickets for an average of 17 runs. Scoring on both sides was far from brisk, and there was some "barracking" during the opening Devon partnership. The Dorset innings occupied two hours 20 minutes, the comparatively low total being due to the excellence of the bowling and fielding rather than to lack of enterprise by the batsmen. Boome's partnership with Harrison was the most productive, yielding 32 before the latter was stumped by Hoare. Jowett had a merry five minutes at the wicket. He had a couple of big hits for singles, and then lifted Sherlock out of the ground for 6.

**DEVON'S CAUTIOUS OPENING.**

Fulcher and Seldon opened the Devon innings with what proved to be a very cautious partnership. During the first hour they defied the full strength of the Dorset attack, and compiled 50. Fielding forced the pace from the start, and the total was carried to 124 before he was out to a catch at mid-off, having scored 31.

When Hoare and Amory became associated, the rate of scoring improved. A single by Hoare sent the score past the Dorset total, and 162 runs were registered before Amory was out to a catch in the country. After J. S. Poynder had been dismissed for 6, C. E. H. Poynder joined Hoare, and the partnership was unbroken at the close of play.

**DEVON BEATEN ON FIRST INNINGS,  
SLOW SCORING AT SHERBORNE.**

**VISITORS COLLAPSE AFTER GOOD START.**

**DORSET'S BIG SCORE BEATEN.**

MORETON THE WINNERS.

**DORSET DEFEAT WILTS.**  
**EXCITING FINISH AT BRIDPORT.**

**HARRISON'S BOWLING PERFORMANCE**

Following rain overnight Dorset began their match with Wilts at Bridport on Wednesday morning under summer-like conditions. The ground which was showing signs of the drought took on a more picturesque appearance when play commenced, but the wicket proved a bowler's paradise, and the decision of the Dorset skipper to bat, after having won the toss, was, in the light of subsequent events, rather an unfortunate one.

Up to the luncheon interval the home county had lost seven wickets for 86 runs. The only batsmen to reach double figures were Knight, the hero of the Dorset-Monmouth match, and R. D. Busk, whose dismissal was brought about by a remarkable one-handed catch at mid-off. Knight, after a cautious opening, began to score freely all round the wicket and when he appeared certain to reach the half century was beaten by Newman, who bowled unchanged throughout the morning. Thompson, his partner, was quickly dismissed, and further misfortunes befel Dorset until Busk by means of free hitting, partially saved the innings from an utter collapse.

J. N. Carter, well-known in West Dorset cricket circles, helped to retrieve the situation in partnership with Elderton and the pair carried the score to 128 before the latter skied a ball off Fitzgerald into the hands of Awdrey. Carter, meanwhile, batted attractively, and in one over hit three 4's on the leg side at the expense of J. Smith, who unable to find a length, was replaced by Fitzgerald, the Trowbridge left-handed spin bowler. The partnership was responsible for an addition of 42 runs.

Oldnall signalled his appearance by driving Freeman to the boundary and some smart running between the wickets was a feature of the subsequent play. The new comer, however, did not remain long and after scoring a bright 13 offered an easy chance to Newman in his 37th over. Carter's valiant stand for his side was brought to a close in attempting a big hit which proved unsuccessful and he was smartly stumped by Master. Dorset's innings thus ended with the score at 162, a much better total than at one time seemed possible.

**DORSET BOWLERS EXCEL.**

Like their opponents, Wilts made a bad start, and so well did Harrison and Brockway bowl, that five wickets were lost for an aggregate of 34 runs. The attack proved irresistible and had the chances offered been accepted in the field, Dorset's position would have been all the more formidable.

Sawyer lent a touch of colour to a drab patch of batting, and his innings of nineteen included two 6's, both hefty drives off the bowling of Harrison. Awdrey, the Wilts captain, also batted in aggressive style at a time when his side was in a perilous position, but he was eventually caught through trying to force runs.

After a stubborn resistance had been offered by Fitzgerald and W. A. Smith, both of whom reached double figures, there was a further collapse, the last wicket falling for a total of 86. Harrison, sharing the attack with Brockway, bowled remarkably well and was responsible for seven of the Wilts wickets at a cost of less than 50 runs. Brockway's analysis was three for 33.

When play was resumed yesterday (Thursday) the game was in an interesting stage. Overnight Dorset had lost six wickets in a most surprising manner, and there was quite a procession to and from the pavilion. Only 37 runs were registered, and Dorset's hold on the game, due to the first innings lead, gradually began to wane. The morning saw a slight improvement in the batting but eventually the side was dismissed before the luncheon interval for 74 runs.

Requiring 151 runs to win Wilts made an inglorious start. In the third ball of the first over, sent down by Harrison, Butler offered a chance behind the wickets which Elderton accepted, and the first wicket fell

before a run had been scored. The same bowler clean bowled Waters, the new-comer, who had previously gathered a couple of crisp 4's. The total then stood at eight runs. Hewitt, in association with Awdrey, the Wilts captain, were batting with freedom when a downpour of rain sent the players hurrying to the pavilion.

**RAIN INTERFERES WITH PLAY.**

The luncheon interval proved disastrous for Wilts. Wickets fell in rapid succession until rain set in again to cause a further stoppage of play. The visitors were then 66 runs in arrears, and there were only three wickets to fall. Harrison, up to this period bowled unchanged and had the fine analysis of six wickets for 40 runs. Shortly after the resumption Smith was caught and the prospects of the side looked none too promising.

Newman, however, made a valuable stand and whilst he remained at the crease runs came at a quick pace. Loose balls were treated with scant respect and he gathered five 4's in succession. Col. Master also scored freely and a keen struggle for supremacy ensued. Bowling changes were made in the hope of breaking up the partnership but for a time all efforts in this direction failed.

With his score at forty Newman had the misfortune to play a ball from Harrison on to his wickets, and a few overs later a confident appeal for lbw. against Master was sustained. The game thus ended with Dorset winners by the narrow margin of 24 runs. Scores:—

**AFTER SCORING OVER 400 RUNS.**

Cornwall accomplished a noteworthy feat in the Minor Counties' Championship on Thursday by taking points from Dorset for the first innings lead, at Sherborne. They were faced with a Dorset total of 438, but passed this with two wickets in hand.

Dorset's fielding was not so good as usual, several chances being missed, and these proved very costly. Painstaking batting by Cory and Rogers, whose first-wicket partnership yielded 135, laid the foundation for Cornwall's partial success. When three short of his century, Rogers was smartly caught at the wicket. He had made his runs out of 202. A splendid innings by Shaw-Baker did much towards placing Cornwall in sight of Dorset's total. Sixth out at 391, he batted 34 hours for his 145. He gave several difficult chances, but placed most of his strokes accurately. After Shaw-Baker's dismissal Busk took the wickets of Bickford and Kendall with successive balls. ## Dorset Avoid Defeat.

### NARROW ESCAPE AGAINST HERTS.

Dorset narrowly escaped defeat in their Minor Counties Cricket Championship match with Hertfordshire in Poole Park on Saturday. With only one wicket to fall they needed 134 runs to win when stumps were drawn. Herts thus had to be content with five points for their first innings lead.

## Dorset v. Monmouth.

### MONDAY'S PLAY AT BRIDPORT.

Dorset were in a sound position at the end of the first day's play of their Minor Counties' Championship match against Monmouthshire thanks to a brilliant not-out century by Knight. Monmouthshire, who were out to avenge the defeat they suffered at the hands of Dorset at Chepstow by sixteen runs, were all out shortly after lunch for 132 and Dorset had scored 204 for nine when stumps were drawn for the day. Shortly after 11.30 E. E. Lawday, a new comer to Minor Counties' cricket, and Wilcox, who won his spurs as a wicket-keeper and a batsman for his county years since, came out to open Monmouthshire's innings. Busk bowled the first over from the West Bay end and Wilcox obtained a single. Harrison picked up the ball at the town end and with his third ball—the ninth of the match—got Wilcox caught behind the wicket by Elderton. H. R. Siddall helped Lawday to take the score to 30 when he was bowled for eleven by Harrison.

The accuracy of the Dorset attack was evidenced by the fact that only sixteen runs accrued from half an hour's play and five of these were extras. During this time fourteen overs were sent down, nine of them being "maidens." Harris walked to the crease and walked away with but one run added and then Hugh Jones, probably the best bat in Monmouthshire, joined Lawday. Jones commenced in promising style but a bowling change at Busk's end proved successful, Brockway breaking through Jones'

defence with his fifth ball. With four of their best bats dismissed for 41, Monmouthshire's plight was a sorry one, but still worse was to follow. Lawday, who had batted for an hour with commendable restraint, was fifth out at 47, Tovey accepting a chance off the bowling of Harrison, and Williams followed without the addition of a run.

Two of Monmouthshire's young batsmen, S. Watkins and H. R. Ralph, came together at a critical stage and increased the total by 38 for the seventh wicket. Watkins put up a dour defence and "stayed in" while Ralph collected the runs. He misjudged a good ball from Harrison at 85 and was stumped by Elderton, and Ralph followed him to the pavilion a run later for 23. Watkins's share in the partnership was 7. Monmouthshire had lost eight wickets for 86 at the lunch interval.

Thirty minutes sufficed Dorset to apply the closure to the Monmouthshire innings after lunch, but in that time two useful stands were made and the visitors' score increased to 132. A ninth wicket partnership by Lewis and K. C. Raikes added 28 runs, and a further 18 runs came as a result of a last wicket attack on the bowling by Lewis and Pickthall. Lewis was not out at the end with 27 to his credit, and his was the brightest innings so far played. He hit crisply and confidently and but for him Monmouthshire's position would have been practically a hopeless one.

#### DORSET PRO'S CENTURY.

The home county opened their first innings with Knight and R. S. Thompson to the bowling of K. C. Raikes and Harris. A prolific partnership seemed imminent for the bowling seemed to present little difficulty and runs came at a fair rate. At 16, however, Thompson cocked up a ball from Harris and was caught by Williams. C. L. Tabor after scoring four of the next five runs was bowled at 21 and G. C. Tovey followed at 25, the same bowler claiming his wicket. It seemed that Dorset were about to meet a similar fate to that of Monmouthshire, but Brockway assisted Knight in adding 54 for the fourth wicket. Brockway's 21 was the result of sound batting. Harris's varied deliveries were finding the Dorset batsmen in difficulty and Knight alone faced him with confidence. R. D. Busk was clean bowled by Harris at 89 and J. N. Carter's wicket was dislocated by the same trundler at 103. Pickthall, the Newport pro, got R. S. Blacker lbw. at 106 and M. B. Elderton hit up a catch at 110. Dorset had indeed struck a bad patch, eight wickets having fallen when 23 runs were still needed to pass the Monmouthshire first innings total.

The pitch after a couple of hours' strong sunshine was very fiery and Pickthall especially, made the ball rise disconcertingly.

Splendid hitting by Knight and Oldhall, whose stand for the ninth wicket realised 88 runs placed Dorset in a much better position, and A. M. Harrison, Dorset's one-handed batsman, kept his end up wonderfully well in the closing stages of the day's play, while Knight hit freely all round the wicket to pass his individual three figure mark. Spectators and players alike joined in the applause when the popular Dorset pro's century was signalled. When stumps were drawn for the day Knight was not out 115 and Harrison not out 9, Dorset's score being 204 for nine wickets.

DORSET'S SUCCESS.

DEFEAT OF WILTS BY 24 RUNS.

Dorset defeated Wilts by 24 runs in the Minor Counties' match, which concluded at Bridport on Friday.

The match opened on Wednesday morning under summer-like conditions. The wicket proved a bowler's paradise, and the decision of the Dorset skipper to bat, after having won the toss, was, in the light of subsequent events, rather an unfortunate one. Up to the luncheon interval the home county had lost seven wickets for 86 runs. The only batsmen to reach double figures were Knight, the hero of the Dorset-Monmouth match, and R. D. Busk, whose dismissal was brought about by a remarkable one-handed catch at mid-off. Knight, after a cautious opening, began to score freely all round the wicket, and when he appeared certain to reach the half century, was beaten by Newman, who bowled unchanged throughout the morning. Thompson, his partner, was quickly dismissed, and further misfortune befell Dorset until Busk, by means of free hitting, partially saved the innings from an utter collapse.

J. N. Carter, well known in West Dorset cricket circles, helped to retrieve the situation in partnership with Elderton, and the pair carried the score to 122 before the latter asked a ball off Fitzgerald into the hands of Awdry. Carter, meanwhile, batted attractively, and in one over hit three 4's on the leg side at the expense of J. Smith, who unable to find a length, was replaced by Fitzgerald, the Trowbridge left-handed spin-bowler. The partnership was responsible for an addition of 42 runs.

O'dnall signalled his appearance by driving Freeman to the boundary, and some smart running between the wickets was a feature of the subsequent play. The newcomer, however, did not remain long, and after scoring a bright 13 offered an easy chance to Newman in his 37th over. Carter's valiant stand for his side was brought to a close in attempting a big hit, which proved unsuccessful, and he was smartly outplayed by Masters. Dorset's innings thus ended with the score at 162.

Like their opponents, Wilts made a bad start, and so well did Harrison and Brockway bowl, that five wickets were lost for an aggregate of 34 runs. The attack proved irresistible, and had the chances offered been accepted in the field Dorset's position would have been all the more formidable. Bankier lent a patch of colour to a drab patch of batting, and his innings of nine runs included two 6's, both hefty drives, off the bowling of Harrison. Awdry the Wilts captain, also batted in aggressive style at a time when his side was in a perilous position, but he was eventually caught through trying to force runs.

THURSDAY'S PLAY.  
DORSET COLLAPSE.

Dorset commenced their second innings when the game was resumed on Thursday. They failed badly against the bowling of Fitzgerald and J. Smith, and were all out for 74. When lunch was taken Wilts had 2 wickets down in the second innings for 30. Following the luncheon interval Wilts wickets fell in quick succession, and when play was temporarily stopped, owing to a heavy downpour, the side were 66 runs in arrears, with only three wickets to fall. A splendid effort was made by Newman, who, when playing well and promisingly for his side, had the misfortune, with his score at 40, to play a ball on to his wicket. An appeal for lbw against Masters was sustained, and this further added to the discomfiture of the visitors.

In concluding successfully two county matches this week Dorset well deserved congratulation. The arrangements made by the officials of the Bridport Club were excellent. Mr. R. B. Swaffield, the local Club's hon. secretary, is deserving of a special meed of praise, as are Mr. J. B. Caldwell (captain of the local Club) and his assistants in the catering department. The groundsmen did their work well.

## DORSET CRICKET CLUB.

### HARRISON'S FINE BOWLING FOR COUNTY.

#### FEATURES OF RECORD SEASON.

The Dorset County Cricket Club's record for the past season was one of the most successful in the history of the club. Of the ten matches played none were lost outright, this having never happened previously. The club finished seventh in the Minor Counties Championship.

#### SPLENDID FINISHES.

Some of the matches proved most exciting and resulted in splendid finishes. At Chepstow the county won by 16 runs after a gallant effort by Monmouth in the fourth innings to obtain the runs required to win. Against Cornwall at Camborne, after great excitement and enthusiasm, Dorset beat their old opponents on the first innings by one run. Again at Sherborne, Wilts were defeated by 24 runs.

This is the first time for many years that the county have beaten their neighbours. In this match, A. M. Harrison bowled splendidly and took 15 wickets for 98 runs. In the first innings he captured nine wickets. Devon were also beaten at Sherborne on the first innings by 33 runs, an extremely creditable performance.

Of the individual performances, Captain Busk and Knight carried off the batting honours. The latter scored two centuries and the former one. Knight was most consistent and had his best season for the county since he has played, as will be seen from the batting averages.

#### HARRISON'S RECORD SEASON.

Of the bowlers, Harrison again did remarkably well and bowled better than ever. In taking 64 wickets he surpassed his previous records for any season. To bowl 454 overs, of which 135 were maidens for 966 runs for 65 wickets, is a wonderful achievement considering the handicap from which he suffers—he has only one arm. Brockway showed good form and should prove very useful in the future. Jowett also bowled well, especially at Chepstow against Monmouth.

## DEVON CRICKET.

### FIRST-CLASS COUNTY SUGGESTION.

A suggestion that Devon might become a first-class cricket county by means of an annual subscription of 3d. from every person in the county and the forming of a good working artisans' Committee was made by Mr. W. R. Parry (county umpire) at the annual dinner at Exeter on Saturday of the Exeter and District Cricket League.

By the operation of this scheme there would be an assured income of £2,000 a year, and they could improve and become a first-class county, as well as provide cricket grounds.

Mr. R. T. Shears (Heavitree Cricket Club) proposing "Devon County Cricket Club" asked whether they considered 14th place for Devon in the championship was all they would wish for. Devon had produced internationals in all kinds of sport, but he could not remember a Test match player produced by Devon since the war.
