Gibbon the Hero of the Side.

Durham County at the end of the first day's play in their match at Ashbrooke, Sunderland, against a powerful side brought by Mr H. D. G. Leveson Gower, found themselves in a most unenviable position, their opponents, with nine wickets in hand, having a lead of 72.

Durham's troubles started early. A bad misunderstanding between E. Randle and T. D. Olver, their opening pair, ended in T. D. Olver, their opening pair, ended in Randle being run out with only seven on the board. With H. Gibbon and Olver in partnership the game assumed a brighter aspect for Durham, but at 36 Olver, who had produced some clever strokes, was beaten by a full toss from Thomas (Northants), and thereafter it was Gibbon alone who prevented Durham from being dismissed for a far less total than even the 150 which they obtained.

Gibbon has the happy knack of rising to the occasion, and he did so this time. He showed fine defence against good length bowling, and he was not slow to punish a loose ball. He drove powerfully, and his \$1, which took him 2\frac{1}{2} hours to compile included nine 4's and a 6, which was made up of two run by the butsmen and an overthrow by Gregory (Surrey) to the boundary in an attempt to throw down Gibbon's wicket.

Smith, Coulson and Ellis failed to trouble the scorer at all.

Admitting the strength of the attack, which was shared by Peach, Thomas, Shepherd, Matthews and Gregory, Durham should have done better on a wicket which was not difficult, as Hobbs, Sandham and Ducat revealed later. Thomas bowled most effectively and showed skill in varying the pace and length of his deliveries. None of the Durham bowlers were able to get the pace off the pitch which he did. He bowled 24 successive overs which included the lunch hour break and eight of them were maidens.

Hobbs and Sandham, the famous Surrey pair, scored quickly from the start. They completed sixty before the tea interval, but in the first over on resuming Hobbs, with his score at 29, was clean bowled by Carr, who repeated his performance of the last time Hobbs was at Ashbrooke. With Sandham and Ducat together runs came at a quick rate. Repeated bowling changes were made without effect, and the plain truth has to be admitted that not one Durham bowler really troubled them.

Ducat was particularly aggressive, and quickly began to overhaul his partner. He drove powerfully on both sides of the wicket. One ball from Ellis he drove straight past the bowler to the boundary and the next ball he lifted clean out of the ring for a six. Though slightly more subdued, Sandham was also responsible for some forceful hitting, and they were both unbeaten at the close. Seven bowfers, Gibhon, Dobson, Howell, Brooks, Carr. Coulson, and Ellis, were utilized by the Durham captain in the efforts to break up the Sandham-Ducat partnership.

Bowlers in Command. GIBBON AGAIN TOP SCORER.

Ellis Has a "Go."

Though conditions favoured batemen at Chester-le-Street yesterday, howlers held the command for most of the play on a natural wicket in the opening day of the Durham and Lancashire II. match, as is in licated by the fact that 21 wickets fell in the course of five hours and a haif for an aggregate of 306 runs.

beld the stronger position at the close of play, being 21 runs to the good and having captured Booth's wicket a second time. Laneaslire led off by backing 121 in two bours and a helf, and Darham took three minutes more to respond with 165, a keen fight for first innings lead vesting the

a bed start, and to the uinth and tenta wicket pairs, who were responsible for 51 of the runs, and put them on in 35 minutes. Lancashire likewise owed much to Latchford, Preston, and Rushton for what was, in the circumstances, a good tecocry after the first six wickets had fallen for 48 in 73 minutes.

Bowling honours on figures went to Howell and Preston, both of whom did splendidly in spells, but Ellis was as good as anyone, and with a little luck would have had more than a couple of wickets. Coulson puzzled the batsmen, and Latchford had such a useful spell that he might with advantage have been brought back again when runs were coming too quickly for the visitors' comfort.

DURHAM LOSE BY 113 RUNS.

First Home Defeat for Over Three Seasons.

LANCASHIRE'S GREAT RECOVERY.

Laucashire, Minor County Champion-ship runners-up last season, gained their second successive win over Durham when they triumphed at Chester-le-Street last night by the substantial margin of 113 runs. It was a great blow to Durham, who had gained a lead of 44 on the first innings, and certainly did not seem likely to lose the unbeaten boine Minor Counties' record that they had held since August, 1925.

Lancastire owed their victory in the main to the fact that they could secure a lead of 288 after latting a second time, and so set Durham the big task of scoring 289 runs in 197 minutes, a most difficult accomplishment in a fourth innings on a wearing wicket and against a strong attack. As it happened Durham were all out for 175 by 6.13, baving made the runs in 150 minutes.

Captain Ferens made it his purpose to go out for the runs, changing his batting order to that end, but Lanceshire held their catches well and Durham were fighting against the collar from the time the first wicket fell at seven. Ferens again played an invaluable innings and Carr put in some "fireworks." but he visitors always had time on their side and could afford to wait for openings.

Durham still need to find a sound first wicket pair to give them a good start, as there is no Maurice Nichol to step into the breach, while their bowling success has still to be measured by the individual triumphs which come the way of Hovell, though Ellis tried nobly to keep up his pace and length.

FLUCTUATIONS.

There were some remarkable fluctuations in the day's cricket, particularly in the Lancashire second innings. In the morning Taylor and Rowland resumed with 20 scored for one wicket, and the amateur began forcing the game from the start, baving a partiality for Ellis on the leg side, and making 18 in a quarter of an hour before Olver caught him out cleverly at mid off off the Ep deton bowler. Rowland, who gave a very sharp chance before adding to his score, hit strongly in front of the wicket, but made several uppish strokes.

Taylor had been very quiet up to this stage—Rowland had captured the bowling as a matter of fact—but, with Horridge in, he began to score quickly, and had almost all of the 38 runs which came from the third partnership before losing Horridge, who was caught in two minds by Coulson. Then came one of the outstanding bather actually advancing the score by 104 in an hour. Webster lained 47 of the runs, and would undoubtedly have reached his first County half-century but for his obvious anxiety to do so, together with the sharp chance which Coulson took well at slip low down with one hand. Webster had four boundaries, three from leg shots and a fourth through the covers, and otherwise made 22 runs with neat timing on the leg side. He was not so correct in his hitting as Taylor, but kept the ball clear of fieldsmen.

With 184 on for four, Lancashire had gained a lead of 140 runs, and looked to be strongly placed; but a change came over the game immediately afterwards, and four more wickets fell for the addition of 11 runs before a ninth wicket partnership more or less decided the issue of the game.

Taylor did not stay more than four minutes after Webster, failing to get hold of a bad length ball and being very well caught by Olver off a skier, the fieldsman running back from mid-on to judge the fall of the ball cleverly. Taylor, who played an innings typical of a left-hunder, who has had quite a lot of first-class experience, dealt severely with any balls the least short of length, and made 88 out of 186 in two hours and nine minutes, with twelve 4's as his best shots. He only scored one in 22 minutes overnight, but was 50 in 82 minutes out of 100, and seemed quite likely to top the century.

Off-driving of a powerful nature gained him six of his boundaries, but almost half of his runs came from neat glances and an occasional pull. He did not give a chance, and rarely made an uppish stroke. When Rushton joined Peter Hijson for the ninth partnership. Lancashire were only 151 on, but this wicket produced 95 in 70 minutes, while 42 came from the last in under 20 minutes.

Higson, who went in later than usual opened with a four to leg, and then had a quiet period while Rushton was scoring well with forcing shots in from of the wicket. Then the Lancashire captain got going again, so that when the partnership was broken at 230 he had made 48 in 75 minutes, with a six—a great on-drive—and five 4's to his credit. His last five scoring strokes gave him 17 runs, and he hit some good leg shots. Carr appealed strongly for lbw against him at 25 off successive deliveries.

GOOD HITTING.

Rushton continued to score freely, and was unbeaten at the close, having made 67 of the 137 runs added by the last two wickets in 85 minutes. Rushton hit ten 4's and six 2's, and drove splendidly. He was nearly run out when 28 through being too impertuous, and all but played on when 42, but his innings was full of good bettier.

The 393 runs were scored in 237 minutes, the last \$2 coming in about forty minutes. The Durbam howling became slack, and there seemed a lack of variety on a wicket which, of course, suited the batsmen. Gibbon should have been given more than a couple of overs, if only to reat the fast bowk, a more. Some of the throwing in was erratic, and gave Ferom snore trouble than should have been his share.

Ferens sent Frank Smith, the Darlington player, who had five innings for Lancashire II. last season, to open with Olver, and the pair seemed likely to nake a show until the Stockton man was out lbw. Obviously he was surprised at the decision which was made, os he had miss-timed a turn to leg. Smith, seemed to be finding his feet nicely, hitting four 4's, cleanly, until playing inside a swinger from Preston, which came in quickly, and then Dobson was yorked by Holroyd at 37. This dashed Durham's hopes considerably, and when Gibbon fell to a brithant catch at second slip at 67 the position looked very bad. Gibbon was only in 35 minutes, but made 24 in fine style, hitting four 4's.

Adamson was fifth to leave at 82, caught low down at the wicket, Randle beaten II runs later, and Howell bowled in trying to pull a Preston in-swinger at 110. Then came as fine effort by Carr, who bit up 40 out of 55 m 26 minutes in 14 scoring shots. He drove one ball out of the field, and also bit four 4's before he fell in curious fashion, Horridge taking a catch right on the boundary by stopping the ball with one hand, knocking it up with the other, and then making the catch with both hands. When Brooks was tried late on in the Cameron—Owen-Smith partnership, he certainly made a separation in his second over, and thus performed what he was asked to do on a wicket that did not suit him, but in those two overs two chances were missed, Coulson failing badly with one of them.

BEST BATTING.

From Durham's point of view, the best batting came from T. D. Olver, whose crisp driving was a feature. Charles Adamson certainly showed solid defence; indeed, he was in an hour and 50 minutes but his style was not attractive. Neither was that of his brother John, who opened well, and then closed up like a book when wickets began to fall. He was 35 minutes for his four runs, and Ferens was two minutes less, and only counted a couple of singles. The South Africans gave us a taste of The South Africans gave us a taste of their real power yesterday at Ashbrooke, Sunderland, when they thoroughly outplayed Durham, and won by an innings and 60 runs. Durham's batsmen, no doubt, were far from confident, but that does not detract from the value of the Tourista' success and the real merit of their attack. their attack.

Durham failed in their first innings, but their second display was even worse. At the same time it must be said that only two of the South Africans, Owen-Smith and Cameron, were outstanding in batting, for no one else on the visiting side made a score of runs, and the two players named actually made 70 per cent. of the Colonials total.

" HAT TRICK,"

The extraordinary state of affairs in the Durham second innings, was brought about by two remarkable bowling feats, Ochse taking three wickets in four halls and Owen-Smith the last four in five balls, including the "hat trick."

Durham went in facing a deficit of 131, and their first pair, Charles Adamson and Olver, while never comfortable against the fast bowlers, Ochse and Bell, seemed likely to keep their end up; but once Bell had broken the opening partnership, there was no one capable of staying the South Africans, until Howell joined Brooks after lunch.

Adamson quite misjudged a ball from Bell at nine, and Olver, after off driving Ochse for two, was beaten by that bowler in attempting another such shot. That success was all Ochse needed to "put him on his toes." He beat Dobson by sheer pace, and John Adamson fell to the very next ball, a fast break back which sent a bail flying 40 yards. Ochse just missed the "hat trick" in his next over, for the first ball swung across to Gibbon's legs, and the second broke his wicket. Ferens promoted himself in the batting order and looked like getting some runs, especially after off driving Bell for four, but with the last ball before lunch the same bowler got the Durham captain caught at the wicket.

Howell started to score at once when joining Brooks, but the advent of McMillan and Owen-Smith stopped him for a while. Then Brooks turned the latter for a four, and Howell followed with a couple of boundaries, cutting Owen-Smith very late twice. Brooks square cut McMillan with fine judgment for another four; but when the seventh wicket had taken the total from 20 to 69, Howell was neatly caught off Owen-Smith, Cameron taking the ball just wide of the wicket.

There were three more wickets to fall, and they went for the addition of two runs, Brooks being a spectator of the disaster which Owen-Smith wrought, and being unbeaten at the close with 17.

First of all Carr, reaching forward to smother the break, was bowled. Next ball Coulson was beaten by a delivery ball which he made no attempt to play, and then Ellis, pulling the following just wide of square-leg, was caught from the next one. It was a donkey drop, and Ellis pulled it hard, but McMillan made an effortless catch on the boundary to finish off the match by 2.35.
