

HERTS COLLAPSE AND RECOVER.

RAIN SPOILS MATCH WITH BERKSHIRE.

Hertfordshire opened their Minor Counties Championship programme, at Porter's Park, Radlett, on Friday, when they entertained Berkshire. On the first day, Herts did badly, but on Saturday, when they had improved their position very materially and appeared to have a good sporting chance, rain fell so heavily that there was no more play after the luncheon interval, and the game was left drawn, Berkshire taking three points for their first-innings lead.

Radlett folk, with Mr. Miles Brunton ever busy, had done their utmost to make the occasion of the first County match at Radlett successful and, on Friday, there was a good attendance. After the heavy rains of Thursday, the wicket was, at the outset, very difficult and the outfield decidedly slow.

Herts, who won the toss, lost D. Bowie with only 13 on the board, but C. B. Fordham scored freely, and the second-wicket partnership, in which C. H. Titchmarsh was associated, carried the score to 46, when Fordham was bowled. His 31, which proved to be the best of the innings, was gathered in attractive, forceful style, and included six four's.

Then a collapse set in, L. J. Reid left at 48, Capt. Longton at 52 and C. H. Titchmarsh, who had shaped very well for his 19, was taken behind the wicket a run later. Thus half the side was out for 53, four wickets having gone down very quickly for seven runs. The rot could not be stopped. Batsmen made the mistake of playing forward, and the remaining five wickets fell for an additional ten runs, the side being all out for 63.

The collapse which saw eight Herts batsmen dismissed for 17 runs, was brought about by some splendid bowling by the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant (6 for 30) and Caryer (4 for 15), who got much assistance from the pitch and were supported by brilliant fielding. Herts' batting was, perhaps, not so poor as the total indicates, but Berks, by their smartness in the field, kept the runs down exceptionally well.

BURTON'S BRILLIANT SPELL

The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and G. Sayles, Berkshire's opening pair, had put on 48 before Sayles, who had made 14, was taken very smartly behind the wicket by G. M. Crossman off Roberts. W. R. McLean left eleven runs later, and his wicket, taken by Burton, was the start of a series of disasters which saw five wickets down for 67. Burton, who was bowling at his best, had, at that juncture, taken three wickets, all clean bowled, for eight runs in the course of ten overs.

After S. Capel, a fast-medium bowler from Hemel Hempstead, who was making his initial appearance in the County eleven, met with his first success, taking the wicket of Dr. W. V. Woodburn, the Berks captain, with the score at 67, Berkshire, for a period, got on top. Human and the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant batted very confidently until the latter was run out, the return which sent him to the pavilion being one of the few bright spots in Herts' fielding which compared unfavourably with that of Berks. Remnant's innings of 43 was a particularly good one and chanceless.

When R. H. R. Palmer joined Human, that pair added 20 for the seventh wicket, Human, who was bowled by Roberts, having batted very confidently for his 27. Palmer hit out lustily, but neither Browning, Smith or Caryer stayed long, and the innings closed for 130, Palmer having made 28 not out. Burton had the best figures of the Herts bowlers. His four wickets cost less than nine runs apiece, and nearly half the overs he bowled were maiden. Roberts, who could not maintain a good length, took 3 wickets for 45 and Capel, who did quite well on his initial appearance, captured 2 for 28.

FORDHAM'S FINE INNINGS.

Facing a deficit of 76, Herts, on Friday, lost three wickets for 73 and were still three runs behind at the close of play. Bowie again did not get going and the first wicket fell at 10. L. J. Reid and C. B. Fordham, although the Berks bowlers kept an immaculate length and the fielding was very keen, scored at the rate of a run a minute until Reid was bowled with the total at 58. The Radlett man made 23 in capital style. Burton was sent in to play out time with Fordham, but Fordham, from the last ball of the day, made a straight return, which Human held. Fordham, as in the first innings, had played excellent, forceful cricket.

On Saturday morning, following the heavy rains of the previous night, the pitch was wet, and the outfield dead. Herts quickly lost two more wickets and half the side was out, with the Berks total only passed by two. Then G. M. Crossman made a characteristic knock which yielded 19 in a very few minutes and carried the total to 104 for the sixth wicket. Crossman's nineteen comprised four 4's and a three. M. H. de Zoete, who was batting in excellent style, strained his back when he had made 23, but he continued, although in pain. With Capt. Longton he had carried the score to 116 for the seventh wicket, and W. Hodgson to 130 for the eighth wicket. Then Roberts joined M. H. de Zoete, and they, in a ninth-wicket partnership, which was unbroken when rain ended the game, added 41. de Zoete, batting splendidly and scoring with good strokes all round the wicket, made 43 not out. Roberts' defence was good, and he picked out the right ball to hit, his 15 not out including three boundaries.

A heavy storm broke over the ground just after 1 p.m. and the pitch was soon saturated. There was no further play, but it was not until 5 p.m. that the final inspection of the wicket was made. Scores:—

A BATSMAN'S PARADISE.

HERTS AND BEDS SCORE HEAVILY AT CLARENCE PARK.

The Minor Counties Championship match in which Herts entertained Bedfordshire at Clarence Park, St. Albans, on Wednesday and yesterday, was left drawn. The wicket was in splendid condition, and conditions were all in favour of the batsmen. The game was left drawn, Herts taking three points for their first-innings lead of 101 runs. Bedfordshire kept Bedfordshire in the field all day, on Wednesday, and at the close of play had made 462 for 9. The wicket was well-nigh perfect, and proved a batsman's paradise. Although Beds made frequent changes in their attack, employing no fewer than eight bowlers, G. R. Walker and D. Bowie, Herts' opening pair, obtained runs at the rate of one per minute, and that despite some splendid work in the field by Bedfordshire, whose fielding throughout was very good.

Walker and Bowie were together when luncheon was taken with the Herts total at 129 without loss. With the score at 141, Bowie, playing forward to Dynes, mistimed the ball and was smartly stumped by Page, who kept wicket splendidly throughout. Bowie, who had taken just over two hours to make 71, hit seven four's and two three's. C. B. Fordham, who joined Walker, scored quickly, and less than three hours had elapsed when 200 was hoisted. Of that number, Walker had then made 83. The Bushey man completed his century in three hours and five minutes, but was bowled by Williams soon afterwards, when he had 103 to his credit. In an attractive and chanceless innings, Walker sent the ball to the boundary sixteen times.

FORCEFUL FORDHAM.

Fordham made 50 in less than an hour, and in company with C. H. Titchmarsh, saw the total reach 300 in just under four hours. Fordham, who was very forceful at periods, was bowled by Holdstock when one short of his century. His 99 was made in about 100 minutes, and included nine 4's. At the tea interval, when the presentation was made (reported elsewhere), to Burton, Herts, had made 317 for 3 wickets.

Bedfordshire bowlers, who had sent down very few loose balls, had a more heartening period after tea for three wickets fell quickly, R. J. O. Meyer, G. D. Hodgson, and Capt. L. P. Longton all having but brief partnerships with Titchmarsh, who pleased the small crowd with some delightful strokes. With Brown, the youth who is on the ground staff at Lords, Titchmarsh had carried the total to 417 for the seventh wicket when the Harpenden man was stumped. His stylish innings, which was without blemish, yielded 61, which included six 4's and four 3's. Brown was very aggressive and, picking out the right ball to hit, he got 52 in less than three-quarters of an hour. Roberts, who again batted well, and Burton were not out when stumps were drawn.

Crossman, the Herts captain, yesterday declared at the overnight total of 462 for 9 wickets, and Bedfordshire opened their innings with E. D. Dynes and F. Rawlins, on a wicket that showed no signs of deteriorating. Runs came quickly, and 91 had been recorded before the partnership was broken, Dynes being bowled by Roberts when he had made 25. Sime was dismissed at 123, Fryer at 155, and Rawlins at 156. Rawlins, who was fourth to leave, had played a forceful and faultless innings of 96, hitting eleven four's. His first four scoring strokes were boundaries. Herts had a further success before the luncheon interval, Meyer dismissing A. R. Alston, the Bedfordshire captain.

FINE NINTH-WICKET STAND.

With half the Beds side out for 164, Herts appeared to have a chance to force matters, but Holdstock dispelled that. With Poole, he carried the score to 189 for the sixth wicket, with Williams to 219 for the seventh wicket, and with Hulatt to 263 for the eighth wicket. Then C. W. Rawlins became associated with Holdstock in a ninth-wicket partnership which yielded 92, and constitutes a record for Bedfordshire. The 300 was sent up in four hours, and just afterwards Holdstock completed his century, which had occupied two hours.

At the tea interval, Beds had 328 on the board for 8 wickets, but soon afterwards Fordham bowled Holdstock, who had played an invaluable innings for his side. He was at the wicket just over three hours for his 130, which included twelve 4's and five 3's. Hodgson, who went behind the wicket after tea for Herts, as G. M. Crossman had injured his hand, very neatly stumped C. W. Rawlins, whose part in the ninth-wicket stand was a splendid one.

Bedfordshire's innings thus closed for 361, or two short of the number necessary to save the follow-on. An hour then remained for play, and it was agreed to draw stumps. Burton, Roberts, Fordham and Meyer all bowled well for Herts, for whom particularly good work was done in the field by Brown and Capt. Longton. The catch which Longton made in the slips to dismiss Poole was brilliant. Scores:—

OTHER CRICKET IN BRIEF.

C. J. Wright (4 for 35) and H. Morris (4 for 32) were the bowlers. E. Timms kept wicket well for Aldenham, making two good catches and allowing only one bye.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

HERTFORDSHIRE v. BEDFORDSHIRE.

PRESENTATION TO FRED BURTON.

At the Minor Counties Championship match with Beds at Clarence Park, St. Albans, on Wednesday and Thursday, Lord Hampden, president of the Herts County Club, during the tea interval on the first day, handed the popular and respected Fred Burton a cheque for £276, the proceeds of his benefit, which Mr. E. H. Wales, the indefatigable hon. secretary of the Herts County Cricket Club, had brought with him.

Lord Hampden, after a few prefaced remarks, said he had a very pleasant duty, and one he felt greatly honoured to be asked to perform to present a testimonial to our old friend and the friend of all of you, Fred Burton. He comes of a very well known cricketing family, and it is interesting to know that he started his cricketing career on this ground with St. Albans over twenty years ago, and it is also interesting to know that the amount of the cheque that has been subscribed in Herts on any other similar occasion, and he hoped it would make one realize how high his reputation stood in the county. I am quite sure that this money was not subscribed merely because the Herts people appreciated Fred Burton as a cricketer, but because all who have had anything to do with him hold him in the highest esteem, and it I might say so affection.

Fred Burton, who was given a very hearty reception, said he wished to thank all those who so generously subscribed to his benefit fund, and all those who had worked so hard in connection with it, and he knew they must have worked very hard to make it such a success.

Thanks to Lord Hampden for attending to make the presentation were accorded on the proposition of G. M. Crossman, the County captain.

In the match, as detailed below, Herts had to be content with first innings points. Beds were in the field the whole of the first day; Herts' score at the end of a very bright day's cricket being 462 for nine wickets, of which Walker (103) played in his usual correct style, amongst his hits being sixteen fours. Fordham's 99 was probably the best knock of the day. Bowle (71), Titchmarsh (61), and Brown (52) all played sound and attractive cricket. On the second day, at the overnight score of 462 for nine, the Herts County captain decided to declare the innings closed with a very small hope of getting a county side out twice in one day on the splendid wicket to make a complete victory. Shortly after 5.30 the Beds side, who had put up a very determined resistance, were dismissed for 361, and had failed to save the follow on. With only 70 minutes remaining for play, and the Herts side, who had had a most trying day in the field, having no hope of a complete victory, the Herts skipper decided not to put in force the follow on, and stumps were drawn leaving Herts in possession of the points for a first innings lead. CRICKET AT COKENACH.

HERTFORDSHIRE v. NORFOLK.

MONDAY'S PLAY.

CENTURY BY P. T. G. KINGSLEY.

This County match, which always evokes much local interest, was played on Mr. Douglas Crossman's picturesque ground at Cokenach on Monday and Tuesday last. The attendance at 11.30 when the match commenced was small, but after the luncheon interval the private enclosure was filled, whilst a good number enjoyed the cricket from the ring. Punctually at 11.30 M. Falcon led out the Norfolk team, Crossman having beaten him in the toss for choice of innings. Fordham and Meyer were the batsmen and they were opposed by Falcon and Beadmore. The start was sensational, Fordham conceded Falcon a maiden, but after Meyer had got a couple to fine leg and a single, Fordham played late at a good ball from Beadmore and was bowled for a "duck." C. H. Titchmarsh followed in and runs began to come with regularity, until at 25, Meyer who had not shaped too well failed to stop a good one from Falcon. P. T. G. Kingsley was the new-comer, and after he had once got a sight of the ball runs came at a good pace. After a slight interruption through rain, Kingsley turned Falcon to leg, whilst Nichols who had completed a double bowling change, R. C. Rought-Rought having previously gone on at the Barkway end, was driven through the covers by Titchmarsh for a nice 4, to send up the 50 after as many minutes batting. At this point Kingsley was getting most of the bowling, Titchmarsh only having three balls in the same number of overs. At 78, Norfolk met with further success, Titchmarsh in trying to turn Rought-Rought was lbw, his 35 included six 4's although two of them appeared somewhat lucky snicks through slips. M. H. de Zoete then joined Kingsley who was then 25, and the company were treated to some really first-class batting, both batsmen playing all the bowling with ease, and at the adjournment for lunch they had carried the score to 125 for three wickets, Kingsley being 45 and de Zoete 22. On resuming, Beadmore and Rought-Rought were the bowlers, de Zoete off drove Beadmore for 4 and Kingsley with a nice pull off Rought-Rought completed 50 made out of 111. At 2.35 the 150 was signalled and immediately after Falcon tried Nichols at the Barkway end in an attempt to part the batsmen, but they were not to be denied, nine runs coming in his first over, whilst Beadmore, who can as a rule keep most batsmen quiet, was hit for 13 in the next over, indeed the batsmen were scoring very much as they liked. Beadmore's expensive over caused Cant to reappear, but the second ball of his first over de Zoete lifted over the on boundary for a glorious six. Kingsley, the while, was racing to his century, he sent up 200 with a pull for four to become 95, and the next ball gave a very hard chance to mid-off which brought him one run, and in Cant's next over, another pull for four, he reached three figures, this being his share of a total of 208. Immediately afterwards de Zoete completed 50. The Norfolk attack was in a proper tangle, but at 2.31 Kingsley who was hitting at almost everything was well caught on the boundary. He had played a brilliant innings, his shots being made with ease all round the wicket. He hit 15 4's, the partnership had put on 153 in about 100 minutes, de Zoete was then 60. Brown was the new arrival, but after batting well Beadmore got him in two minds 259-5-7. This made way for Lord Hyde, but only two runs had been added when de Zoete fell to a catch at second slip for a good innings of 81, including seven 4's and the six already referred to. The next man Grimsdell stayed with Lord Hyde to see the 300 up, when Lord Hyde was taken at cover. The score at the tea interval was 329 for 7, Grimsdell not out 30, Crossman not out 5. On resuming Crossman was out

without addition, and when with the addition of eight runs Grimsdell was bowled, the end soon came, Herts. being all out at ten minutes past five for 347. Rought-Rought claimed the last three wickets for eight runs, a deserved success for he had bowled well, his full analysis being 24.3 overs, 1 maiden, 61 runs, for 5 wickets. Norfolk left with an hour's batting started in an appalling fashion. With seven runs on the board Fordham at the Barkway end had Low taken at slip and with his next ball bowled Dann, 7-2-0. Worse was to follow for the score was only 11 when Meyer bowled Holmes, and with a single added B. W. Rought-Rought got in front of a straight one from Fordham. Meyer bowled a maiden, then Fordham continuing his success cleaned bowled R. C. Rought-Rought, 14-5-0. Nichols now partnered Falcon (who had gone in at the fall of the second wicket), and these two played out time, the score being 29 for 5 wickets, Fordham having bowled six overs for five runs for four wickets. Norfolk were thus 318 behind with five wickets to fall.

TUESDAY'S PLAY.

REMARKABLE BOWLING BY C. B. FORDHAM.

On the game being resumed the not out Falcon and Nichols were opposed by Burton and Meyer. The batsmen soon settled down and a big stand appeared probable, Nichols defending well whilst Falcon, who was showing his real class, hit hard. The score had been carried to 83 when Roberts, who had just previously relieved Meyer, drew Nichols out of his crease to be well stamped by Grimsdell. Falcon was then 42 and he continued to do most of the scoring but no one could stay with him, and Fordham coming on when the total was 101 bowled Beadmore, and in his next over removed Greenwell's leg stump, the innings closing for 114, Falcon carrying his bat for 63 out of this total. He was never in difficulty and gave no chance, his innings being the only redeeming feature in a poor batting display. Fordham's complete analysis was 10 overs, 2 maidens, 12 runs, and 6 wickets, a remarkable piece of work.

At 12.30 Norfolk followed on, 233 behind, and as was to be expected made a better show, 50 being on the board before the first wicket fell, Meyer then bowling B. W. Rought-Rought for eight, his share of the partnership. The score at lunch was 61 for 1. On resuming Holmes soon left, Grimsdell whipping off his balls as he dragged his foot over the crease. Falcon, the new-comer, started scoring right away, but at 79 he lost Low just after completing his 50. R. C. Rought-Rought joined Falcon and carried the score to 155 before Rought-Rought was caught at the wicket. Falcon in the meantime had completed 50 and appeared well set for his century, but at 160 he was nicely caught at cover off Burton, and Norfolk with five wickets to fall required 69 runs to save the innings defeat. Another wicket soon fell, Dann being yoked by Burton, and Bally joined Nichols and for a long time Herts. lost their grip of the game, these two in the best partnership of the innings putting on 87 runs before a separation. Tea was taken at 2.08, and immediately after resuming Bally with a single to fine leg saved the innings defeat. Nichols completed a good 50 with a lovely drive past cover, but Kingsley eventually got Bally lbw for a good fighting innings of 36. Only 17 runs were added before Nichols' fine knock ended, Meyer getting him caught at the wicket. The remaining batsmen offered little resistance, and at 2.35 the innings closed.

Herts. with 63 to score in 50 minutes set about their task in a light-hearted manner. Although de Zoete was run out at 11 and Kingsley caught at the wicket at 16, Meyer hitting at everything rattled up 30 in 15 minutes. Lord Hyde and Crossman were both out to brilliant catches at cover by Kingsley, fielding substitute for one of the Norfolk team. Crossman's drive would have been the winning hit, and indeed this would have been a fitting climax to a great game, but it was left to Mr. Extras with a couple of byes to give Herts. victory by five wickets.

Morris (4 for 46) bore the brunt of the attack for Aldenharn, and H. Hawkins made two good catches at the wicket. Aldenharn were left with ninety minutes in which to get the runs. They lost C. J. Wright for 9, but when H. Hawkins joined E. Wright they took the score to 115 before Hawkins was bowled for 43, which included eight 4's. Three wickets were then sacrificed in an effort to get the necessary runs before time, the batsmen in each case hitting out at every ball. When time was called, Aldenharn had made 135 for 5. E. Wright being not out with 53 to his credit. His innings included eight boundaries, and he was particularly forceful on the leg side.

An interesting game was witnessed at Clarence Park, on Saturday, when St. Albans II. were opposed by Luton II. in a match that was left drawn. Luton, batting first, declared with 124 for 8 wickets (H. R. Smith 14, Bird 11, Booth 28, F. Chapman 28 and J. Webdale 14 not out). L. Ryder (3 for 32) and E. J. C. Parker (4 for 30) were St. Albans' best bowlers. As Parker was the fifth bowler tried, it is safe to assume that Luton would not have achieved the same result had he been given the ball earlier. St. Albans opened their knock with Parker and Sausball, the first wicket falling at 19. The succeeding batsmen, until Paine arrived, were mainly occupied in holding an end while Eric Parker scored runs at a good pace. K. Paine helped to put on 63 for the fifth wicket, of which he scored 14 not out. When time was reached, St. Albans had made 106 for 5 and Parker,

by his brilliant knock, which included eleven 4's, contributed no fewer than 53. Had there been more time, St. Albans would, no doubt, have won easily.

Harpenden II. (183), playing at home, gave Radlett "A" (41) their biggest hiding of the season. Batting first, Radlett gave a deplorable exhibition against some quite moderate bowling by Bentley (5 for 11) and Freeman (4 for 24). Harpenden did not start too well, four wickets falling for 38 and 6 for 42, but, on passing Radlett's score, Kimber 34, Maffey 30 and W. Freeman 29 hit the bowling when they liked; Radlett's bowlers, with the exception of Hall (5 for 30), proving quite innocuous.

St. Albans Post Office Engineers visited the Watford Post Office Engineers, at Hemel Hempstead, and won an interesting game by 35 runs. Watford won the toss and, putting St. Albans in, captured three wickets for 23 runs. But the rot was stopped and, thanks to Leonard, who, batting confidently, made 35 (including seven 4's), Fassnidge (16) and Longhurst (17) the St. Albans total reached 103. Bird (5 for 38), Green (4 for 32) were the successful bowlers for Watford, whose batsmen commenced well. Scoring steadily, they had 61 on the board for 5 wickets, but then a collapse set in and, with the remaining five wickets falling for an additional seven runs, Watford were all out for 68 (Bird 18, Green 11 and Garrett 12). Leonard again distinguished himself with the ball for St. Albans, taking five wickets for 17. Fassnidge 2 for 8 and Day 2 for 37, also bowled well.

Frogmore, playing at home, defeated Aldenham Park by 31 runs. Frogmore batted first and compiled 63, of which 56 were scored by four men (W. Bates and S. Gentle 17 each, Phipps 12, and Garner 10), and "extras" claimed four of the remaining seven. For Aldenham Park, Squires (11) alone reached double figures, the side being quickly dismissed for 32 by Bates (4 for 14) and S. Gentle (5 for 8).

Potter's Bar lost their home game with Hoddesdon by 22 runs. Hoddesdon declared with 167 for 7 (Knight 38, Haynes 30) and Potter's Bar replied with 145. Frost (47) and Timmis (22 not out) retrieving the situation after seven wickets had gone down for 72. Their eighth-wicket partnership added 57.

Hoddesdon II. defeated Potter's Bar II., their visitors, by 42 runs. Hoddesdon made 150, the outstanding feature being the batting of Bray (54) and Brazier (33). Their third-wicket partnership yielded 80. Potter's Bar replied with 105, Fraser following up a good bowling performance in which he took 7 for 45, by making 46 with a display of big hitting, which included three 6's and five 4's.

Kimpton easily defeated New Southgate Corinthians, who were all out for 51. Not once were the stumps hit, eight of the batsmen falling to good catches. Smith, the Kimpton captain, who usually keeps wicket, had a great day with his slow deliveries. At one period, he took three wickets with four balls, and his final analysis was 5 for 10. The other batsmen were the victims of Gatward (4 for 22) and Meadows (1 for 15). Kimpton won the match with seven wickets in hand, and at the close had made 97 for 7 (Salmon 45, Angel 13 not out). Salmon hit three 6's and three 4's.

The International Rubber Works, visiting Boxmoor St. John's, won a very exciting game by one run. The Works, batting first, totalled 72, of which J. Hall, batting well, made 57. Going in first, Hall was the eighth to leave. S. Fowler (4 for 14) was the most successful bowler for St. John's. Out of the Boxmoor total of 71, Phipps (19) and Shuff (20) made most, the eighth wicket adding 26. St. John's wanted six to win when the last man went in. A hit for four raised St. John's hopes, but W. Nield shattered them when he bowled Shuff with the next ball. W. Nield (5 for 24) was the most successful bowler for the Works.

COUNTY CRICKET AT BROXBORNE.

TEN WICKETS DEFEAT FOR HERTS.

Hertfordshire played their last home game in the Minor Counties Championship at Broxbourne on Monday and Tuesday. Unfortunately Herts were without several of their best batsmen, amongst the absentees being their captain, Mr. Crossman, Messrs. Kingsley, Fordham, Titchmarsh, Reld, de Zoete and others.

The pleasant ground of the Broxbourne Cricket Club appeared to be in excellent order when the match commenced on Monday morning, but the home side, who batted first, were soon in difficulties against the bowling of the Buckinghamshire professional, Edwards, and in an hour and forty minutes the whole side was out for 62 runs. Only two of the batsmen got into double figures, R. J. O. Meyer, of Watton, making 12, and J. G. Bland, of St. Albans, 11. Edwards came out with the excellent analysis of seven wickets for 22 runs. The innings closed just before luncheon.

Bucks started badly, W. B. Franklin being got rid of for a "duck's egg," the first wicket falling with only six runs on the board. R. H. J. Brooke and A. G. Skinner, however, put quite a different complexion on the game, and showed that there was nothing wrong with the wicket. After once getting set, they hit the bowling all over the ground, and were not separated until they had raised the total to 168 for the loss of two wickets. Of this number Brooke claimed 105. With a mighty hit to square leg off Brown, he completed his century, but five minutes later he fell to a smart catch at the wicket by S. P. Mole, off Roberts. He had made his runs in an hour and forty minutes and hit two 6's, ten 4's, five 3's, and four 2's. Skinner had then reached his half-century, but just afterwards, when he had carried his score to 67, he was very neatly caught in the slips by Brown, off Roberts. After the big partnership had been broken wickets began to fall like ninepins, and Roberts skittled the side out in a very short time. Going on a second time at 150, he bowled very cleverly, and took eight for 17, his wickets altogether costing 46 runs. At one period five wickets fell in half-an-hour for 25 runs. The innings closed for 204.

Going in a second time, Herts did not fare much better than in their first innings, and at the end of the day's play they had lost six wickets for 93 runs, and were still 49 behind their opponents' score. Brown, with 21, batted confidently, but fell to the last ball of the day.

In the course of three-quarters of an hour on Tuesday morning, the remaining four Herts batsmen were disposed of, but they made a gallant attempt to avoid the single innings defeat, which they just succeeded in doing. Hodgson, Mole, and Evans batted well, and if the first-named had not been run out in attempting a short run, the innings might have been extended much longer. Short runs cannot be risked very often with a smart wicket-keeper like Franklin, who ranks amongst the best amateurs behind the stumps in the country, and has played in representative England sides for the M.C.C. against the Australians, the Players, and other equally strong elevens. The last four men added 52, and the innings closed for 145, leaving Bucks only four runs to get for victory. These they easily obtained without loss, and the visiting county won the match by ten wickets. Edwards, the Bucks "pro.", again bowled well, taking six wickets for 69, which gave him thirteen wickets in the match for 91 runs, one of his best performances of the season. Probably the wicket on the first day, when it was a bit sticky, after the recent rains followed by warm sunshine, was very much to his liking. It no doubt also suited Roberts, the Hertfordshire young professional, who put up a very fine performance, backed by some excellent fielding, which was well managed by young Meyer, who deputised as Captain of the side in place of young Crossman, the regular skipper of the county eleven.

The Broxbourne Cricket Club are to be congratulated on the excellent wicket and outfield they had prepared for the match.

As usual nowadays in county matches in Hertfordshire, admission to the ground was free, and there was a fair number of spectators on the first day. The weather was fine throughout, Tuesday particularly being a brilliantly bright day. Scores:—

MINOR CHAMPIONSHIP FIGURES.

IMPROVING YOUNG BOWLERS.

In their Minor Counties Cricket Championship campaign, which has just closed, Hertfordshire did not make as bold a bid for honours as was, at one time, anticipated they would, and, on the whole, their record shows little, if any, improvement upon that of last season.

This year, they gained 36 points out of a possible 70. Last year, they totalled 26 out of a possible fifty. This season, when they played fourteen matches as compared with ten twelve months ago, their average is 51.42 per cent. In 1928, it was 52 per cent.

Of the fourteen matches played this year, Herts won three outright and lost only two. They played twelve matches before they encountered defeat, but in their last two fixtures, when they fielded depleted sides, they lost their unbeaten record.

Nine of the fourteen matches were left drawn, but, in six of those, Herts took points for first innings lead. In five of the drawn matches, Herts were robbed of complete victory by time alone. The lack of a fast bowler, was, in certain games, very keenly felt. The inability of R. J. O. Meyer, the old Cambridge Blue, who has been on leave from India, to find his most deadly form, has been disappointing and robbed the attack of that additional sting which was so greatly needed, but Meyer, who has developed into a superb batsman, rendered Herts great service. He heads the averages with 53.57.

In the first year of his captaincy, Mr. G. M. Crossman has certainly inspired the side with greater keenness, particularly in the field; indeed, in some of the latter matches, Herts' fielding has reached a very high standard.

C. B. Fordham, who has made the most runs, P. G. T. Kingsley, the Oxford Blue, who has compiled three centuries, and C. H. Titchmarsh, of Harpenden, have been the most consistent batsmen. Much delight has been afforded to all associated with Herts cricket by the great return to form of Titchmarsh, who was, for so many years, Herts' outstanding batsman. This year, in twelve innings, Titchmarsh has made no fewer than 565 runs.

Fred Burton, has, once again, taken over fifty wickets, and E. Roberts has increased his bag at a greatly reduced average cost per wicket, but the most pleasing feature about the County bowling is the advance made by S. Brown, the young professional, who was, this season, awarded his County cap. He took 42 wickets at a cost of 19.52 runs each, and seems destined to prove a big asset to Herts in the future, for, in addition to his bowling abilities, he is a useful bat and a brilliant field.
