

COLT'S BOWLING MASTERED.

Opening Day in Field Against Yorkshire Council.

CASTLEFORD, Monday.
Yorkshire's Second Eleven started their season with a hard day's work in the field on the Welfare ground here against a strong Yorkshire Council team, and as the Council side has scored 395, and the Colts have yet to open their innings, the chances are that the game will end in a draw as most of the Colts' v. Council fixtures have done since the war.

The Second Eleven bowlers had a rare task set them to-day when their captain lost the toss, for the wicket was all in favour of the batsmen, as Hobson, the Council captain, and W. Broadhead, who plays with Mexborough, soon began to show. But it was a poor day for cricket, and it was not surprising that the attendance was only moderate.

The Welfare ground, on which a large sum of money has been spent, is a cold spot on a windy day—and it is situated at Hightown, which tells its own tale—and it has been bitterly cold this evening. Still those hardy enthusiasts who gathered in the shelter of the pavilion were rewarded with a display of bright batting by Bastow, the Wakefield fast bowler, who out-lived the closing half hour in grand style. Bastow, who played with the Colts a few seasons ago, took full toll of the tired attack, and four times he hit balls from Bedford, the Hainthorpe slow bowler, over the rails. One he sent over the pavilion, and two of the others he put high over the right screen.

But the damage had been done long before Bastow went in at the fall of the eighth wicket. Hobson and Broadhead gave the Council a sound start, scoring 83 before Broadhead was caught by Hall off Fisher. Broadhead's innings was as good as anything seen all the afternoon, and the only flaw was the stroke which cost him his wicket. He got his runs in workmanlike style.

Meanwhile Hobson, who had escaped rather luckily in his opening over, went on scoring steadily. He reached his 100 in two hours and 25 minutes, but was badly misaid by Mallelien at 93. In his total of 126 he had 18 fours. His partnership with Tordoff, of Whitwood, took the Council score from 83 to 211.

Tordoff carried on the good work, though he did not score with the same freedom. He showed a complete mastery of the attack, and this despite the fact that the Colts' captain rung the changes on seven bowlers.

Allen and Nuttall, who have played with the Colts, helped the total along in satisfactory style, and then, to close with, came the partnership between Haguen and Bastow, which took the total from 339 to 394. Bastow once played for Castleford, and his prowess is well known in the district, where they still talk of an innings he played in an evening match, when he scored 70 runs in half an hour.

Haguen, who played a very promising innings for 23 runs, is a young man, who may be seen in the Colts' side before long. He is one of Castleford's opening pair, and he batted coolly and confidently to-day. As he has yet to attain his seventeenth birthday it will be readily seen that he is a youngster of whom more may be heard.

The Colts' side consists entirely of men who have played with the side in previous seasons. Hall, the York fast bowler, did a lot of hard work to-day without luck. Cyril Turner, of Sheffield, had a good return, and Douglas, of Bradford, bowled better than his figures suggest. He had eleven maidens in 35 overs. Shackleton, who is at Headingley this season, got Hobson's wicket—he held a very hard return—and his two wickets cost 12 runs each.

COLTS FOLLOW-ON AGAINST COUNCIL.

Better Display in Second Innings.

CASTLEFORD, Tuesday.

Yorkshire's Second Eleven had to play second fiddle to the Council side here to-day, and though the match has ended in the usual draw, the honours have gone to the Colts' opponents.

Indeed, the Second Eleven's work has been undistinguished except for a plucky display by Shackleton, of the Leeds club, in the first innings, and a match-saving stand by A. E. Mallelien, the Huddersfield League amateur, and Turner, of Sheffield, who has occasionally played with the County, in the second innings.

The Colts scored only 154 in reply to the Council first innings total of 395, and their second innings looked none too well until Turner and Mallelien got together.

The attendance again has been a small one; but the match has served its purpose, as may be seen when Second Eleven sides are selected later in the season.

The Colts' first innings started badly, for Whitehead, the young Huddersfield League player, was well bowled by Bastow in his first over. The total was one when this wicket fell, and the Colts never got over the bad start. It has to be said that the wicket was not a particularly difficult one, but the Colts never got a hold on the game, and for this much credit must be given to Bastow, who followed up the capture of Whitehead's wicket by bowling Mallelien and Bedford.

In the circumstances Bedford's 29 was a useful score, and, after he went, only the young Headingley professional, Shackleton, was able to do anything with the bowling.

When half the Colts' wickets were down, the Council were 208 in front, and when the Colts' innings closed for 154, they had an overwhelming advantage, leading on the first innings by 241.

Shackleton's 56 was a valuable contribution, and the runs were got in a manner which justified many of the encouraging comments which have been made on this Keighley all-rounder's work. He hit five fours, and after having scored a third of his side's total, had the satisfaction of carrying out his bat. It was a sound start for Shackleton, whose progress is being watched with interest.

There was a sharp fall of rain between the Colts' innings, and when they started their second venture, there was an hour and three-quarters left for play. Bedford lost his wicket early, and when 18 runs were on the board, Whitehead was caught by Elliott off Harrington, which, in some ways, was one of the features of the day's cricket.

Harrington, a son of Harry Harrington, who was once the fast bowler at Dewsbury and then at Featherstone, is 20 years of age. He has played for the Featherstone Council team for several seasons, and with their last summer had something like 60 wickets at a cost of about 13 runs each. He bowled left arm, sending down a medium-paced ball, which can be fairly fast off the wicket. The afternoon, on a wicket which was not too responsive, he made the ball turn, and his work altogether attracted attention. His three wickets in the first innings cost just over 10 runs each.

Bastow, who took the first three wickets and then wound the innings up by taking the last three, had a trial with the Colts several seasons ago. He fared best to-day when bowling into the wind, which cut across the ground all the day, and his first innings figures of 6 for 56 were most satisfactory.

The Colts were in danger of defeat until Mallelien and Turner got together about 75 minutes from the time for drawing stumps, and they soon altered the outlook. Turner, of course, has been a regular member of the Second XI for six years or so, and Mallelien has made frequent appearances this last three seasons without, however, really fulfilling the promise of his style. This evening Mallelien was quickly off the mark, and with Turner batting steadily the Council bowling was mastered for the first time. Mallelien reached his 50—he hit three successive fours off Nuttall to get there—in under the hour, and his partnership with Turner took the score from 18 to 115. Mallelien's innings of 67 included eleven 4's, and it was one of his happiest efforts for the Second XI.

CRICKET.

GOOD BATTING, BUT FEW LOCAL VICTORIES.

WHITWOOD TROUCE HEMSWORTH.

DRAWN GAME FOR PONTEFRACT: DEFEAT FOR CASTLEFORD.

Not a great deal of satisfaction was forthcoming again for local cricket enthusiasts on Saturday. Fairly high scores were compiled in a number of matches in the Yorkshire Council, but the points were not always secured by the local teams.

Pontefract and Castleford were both away from home. Pontefract played Lofthouse to a draw, scoring 123 for eight wickets in reply to the Lofthouse total of 172. Castleford suffered a heavy defeat at King Cross, Halifax. The home team reached 179, but Castleford could muster only 45. Featherstone entertained Allerton Bywater, but were not able to pursue their ground advantage, and lost by 186 to 115. Whitwood Colliery met Hemsworth, also at home, and won a decisive victory by nine wickets. The scores in the match barely topped 50. Ackworth reached 154 before being dismissed by Rawmarsh at Rawmarsh, but lost by three wickets.

In the West Riding League, Knottingley were at home to Crofton, in a First Division match, but lost by three wickets.

YORKSHIRE COUNCIL MATCHES.

PONTEFRACT DIVIDE THE HONOURS AT LOFTHOUSE.

Playing at Lofthouse on Saturday, Pontefract managed to make a draw, but as they were 50 runs behind when play ceased, and had only two wickets in hand, they had not the best of the "argument." There would have been a different story to tell, however, if the Pontefract fielders had accepted the chances given. Lofthouse had eight wickets down for 99 runs, and should have been dismissed for about 120. Two catches were dropped from the bowling of Crofts, at least one other chance was missed, and the Lofthouse score mounted. E. W. Arnott made 28 not out, E. Parkin 24, and H. Beech not out 21; and with the score at 172, and a wicket in hand, the home side declared. Earlier in the innings Stubbs had done very good work in dismissing Hazel for none, and having Littlewood caught when he had scored 10. W. Parkin and Kellott gave some trouble to the Pontefract bowlers, and W. Lunn also batted well. With their dismissal came Pontefract's opportunity, and Newell, Stead and Walker were dismissed very cheaply, but the mistakes mentioned made possible the subsequent big total.

Pontefract had nothing but a draw to play for. Twigger and Carr scored 30 for the first wicket, but both left at that total. Husband showed good form, and he and Crofts took the score to 46 for the third wicket. Then Husband was bowled, having made 10. Crofts is playing delightful cricket this season, and gave a very sound display. Robinson remained with him while 37 were added for the fourth wicket, of which Robinson's share was 16. At 99 for six wickets the excellent innings of Crofts was ended, four runs short of the half-century. He was out to a poor ball, and should have made sure of his 50 before. He had five boundaries, and his batting certainly saved his side from defeat. Wilson and Lovett failed, but Burgoyne—who with a little care should make a very good batsman—kept the Lofthouse bowling at bay. At drawing-time he was highest score on the 18 was the second highest score on the Pontefract side, and included four boundaries. Stubbs had four Lofthouse wickets for 51 runs. Crofts took two for 28 runs, and of his 17 overs five were maidens. Two wickets were taken by Burgoyne for 33 runs, and Robinson had one for 22 runs.

ALLERTON FORCE A VICTORY AT FEATHERSTONE.

In their first home match of the season Featherstone did not reproduce the form they showed at Hemsworth, and were beaten by Allerton Bywater by 71 runs. The match had an exciting finish, for there were only four minutes to drawing-time when the last Featherstone wicket fell. Featherstone have not yet got their strongest side together. On Saturday, neither Sidney nor James Denton played. Allerton owed their success very largely to a brilliant batting performance by a fine cricketer, C. Ambler. He opened the innings with Milner, who made four, and was then caught from H. Mann's bowling. Ambler monopolised the scoring while Marsh was his partner, and when

Mann left at 21 he had made four only. Miller was run out when he had made four—it was a coincidence that the first three to be dismissed should score exactly the same number of runs—and when Learmont was bowled by Hartington, before he had scored, Allerton had four wickets down for 27 runs. Featherstone had visions of success. Tinker remained with Ambler until the score was taken to 50, and Thorpe helped Ambler to add 12 for the sixth wicket. Meanwhile Ambler had played very sound, attractive cricket, and now found someone who really did stay. H. Barker went into bat when the total was 62 for six wickets, and when he left it had been almost doubled. With the score at 123 the partnership was broken. Barker being adjudged lbw to Hartington. The eighth wicket fell five runs later, and then Balance went to help Ambler on his way to the century. For the first time Ambler was outdone in the scoring, for of the 25 runs of the partnership, Balance's share was 17. The last wicket gave the Featherstone bowlers much trouble, and 33 runs were added before H. Mann penetrated Haigh's defence. The dismissal, late enough from the Featherstone's point of view, was a little too early for Ambler, for he was seven runs short of his century. His 33 not out will rank as one of his best performances, and indicates that the winner of the Yorkshire Council junior batting prize last season will be a great factor in Allerton matches again. Peace, who performed well with the ball at Hemsworth, was not a success on Saturday. Hartington and H. Mann took three wickets each, and Peace and Joe Denton one each.

Featherstone made an excellent start on their big task. G. Johnson (18) and L. Mason (13) compiled 35 for the first wicket. Then there was a slump, and Learmont had a good time. There were three wickets down for only 38 runs, but C. Hartington (19) and J. Bednall (12) stopped the rot, and took the score to 65. Another bad patch for Featherstone followed. The fourth wicket had fallen at 65, the fifth fell two runs later, and the sixth and the seventh with only four runs added. The game had turned very definitely in Allerton's favour, but stubborn resistance was offered by W. Pullen (13). When the last men came together, however, the score was only 90. F. Mann was batting well, and Jarvis joined him. They defied all the wiles of the Allerton bowling, sent up the century, added ten more, and looked like saving the game. With the score at 116, however, and four minutes to go, Jarvis gave a chance to Ambler, which was snapped up, and Allerton gained a welcome victory. Learmont had taken the wickets of Johnson, Mason, H. Mann, and Hartington cheaply, but afterwards he did not meet with success, and his final figures were four for 59 runs. Haigh had the wickets of the brothers Denton (Edgar and Joe) for seven runs.

WHITWOOD'S EASY TASK.

Whitwood Colliery gained their third successive victory when they entertained Hemsworth. The visitors took first knock, Tiffany and S. Robinson being opposed by Walsh and Tordoff, and for a time there was little to suggest that the side would collapse. Runs came steadily, but with 20 on the board Robinson was bowled by Tordoff. Without any addition to the score Clayton was caught behind the wicket off the same bowler, and then Ainley was also a victim to smart work by Bellwood, Walsh being the bowler in this case. With the addition of only two more runs Smith and Tiffany were sent back, half the side thus being out for 28 runs. Midgley and Wincer improved matters somewhat by adding 17 runs, and Studd also made a praiseworthy effort to help his side along. The bowling was too much for the Hemsworth batsmen generally, however, and the last three men were dismissed with the score at 54. The innings lasted only an hour, and it was one of the weakest displays of batting seen on the ground for a long time. Walsh and Tordoff bowled unchanged, the latter having by far the better figures. He sent down nine overs, two of which were maidens, and his five wickets cost 16 runs. The other five fell to Walsh for 37 runs. Whitwood made anything but a promising start, Tonks, who went out with Walsh, being dismissed when he had scored three, but Crozier and Walsh made light of the attack. They did not force the game, but in just under the hour they had knocked off 50 runs, and were 100 for two wickets.

CASTLEFORD'S SENSATIONAL COLLAPSE.

Castleford have not gone far this season without sustaining defeat. They visited King Cross, and were in trouble from the start. King Cross took first innings, and Jowitt and Radcliffe gave them a good send-off by scoring 91 runs for the first wicket. Radcliffe hit out in fine style, his partner being responsible for only 27 of the runs. Jowitt was eventually caught by Newton off Morton's bowling, and two overs later the same bowler successfully appealed for obstruction against Radcliffe. The latter, in his contribution of 75, hit eleven boundaries. The third wicket fell at 130, and thenceforward the bowlers had more success. Morton did the most damage, and in the later stages of the innings Jarvis got two wickets in successive overs, but he was scored off rather freely. The King Cross venture realised 179 runs, a much smaller total than seemed likely at one period. Morton carried off the bowling honours, and had his best analysis so far in Council cricket. He sent down 20.5 overs, five of which were maidens, and took six wickets at a cost of nine runs each. Jarvis had two for 48, and Simpson one for 29. Castleford opened their innings with Allen and Hagre, to the bowling of Haigh and Briggs, and with 19 runs on the board the former was caught out off Haigh's bowling. Extras played a big part in Ackworth's defeat, for there were 28 in a total of 158. Hepworth had exceptionally good figures in such a total—six wickets for eight runs each. Wintersgill took the other wicket at a cost of 34 runs.

FULL MEASURE OF GOOD CRICKET AT KNOTTINGLEY.

Lancashire II. Fighting For Runs.

ROTHERHAM, Monday.

In recent seasons Yorkshire has had to play second fiddle to Lancashire in the Second Eleven matches in the Minor Counties Championship, but there has been a different tale to tell here on the Town club's ground to-day. The young Yorkshiremen had to field first, and, with the wicket in splendid condition and the Lancashire Second Eleven a thoroughly representative one (which means, of course, that it consisted mainly of men who are on the ground staff at Old Trafford), it was thought that the home side had a hard day's work in front of them.

The Yorkshire Colts' attack, however, was full of life, the work in the field was brilliant, and Lancashire, instead of making the running, were soon fighting with their backs to the wall. Three really remarkable catches by Mallalieu, Whitehead and Bedford assisted Dennis and Douglas to account for the first three Lancashire batsmen and from that point the Colts had the game well in hand. In little more than 90 minutes they had tumbled out this strong Lancashire Second XI. for 105 runs. A sound batting display gave them a lead of 102 on the first innings, and, as the visitors lost three wickets for 33 runs in their second innings, it will be seen that Yorkshire's Colts are well on their way to an opening victory which should give them the right sort of confidence with which to tackle the remainder of their Minor Counties Championship programme.

Dennis got a wicket with the second ball of the match—he had Beattie caught by Whitehead—and in the second innings with his second ball he bowled Beattie, who failed to score in both innings. In the first innings two Lancashire wickets were down for two runs, and, but for a stand by Paynter and Horridge, the total would have been a very moderate one indeed. Paynter and Horridge carried the total from 2 to 48, when Mallalieu, with an exceptionally fine one-handed catch, held the ball driven hard by Paynter, and then Fisher, the East Leeds left-arm bowler, came into the attack to take four wickets for seven runs. There were more fine catches by Bedford and Shackleton.

Broadhead, the Mexborough captain, playing his first game with the Yorkshire Second Eleven, and Whitehead, the young Huddersfield League player, gave the home side a steady start, and when Broadhead was bowled by Preston, who shared the Lancashire attack with Hodgson, the South African, and Huddersfield League amateur, Mallalieu, assisted Whitehead to take the total to within measurable distance of the Lancashire score. Whitehead and Mallalieu played confidently and well, their work was soundly backed up by Bedford and Shackleton, and the Lancashire total was passed in 85 minutes.

Then Davidson, who plays with Bingley in the Bradford League, scored a useful 24, and it was not until Holroyd and Preston bowled after the tea interval that the Lancashire attack got the upper hand. Then the last four wickets fell cheaply, but Lancashire did not profit much, for in the 45 minutes left for play, Dennis and Douglas bowled so well that three wickets fell for nine runs before Horridge and Farrimond made a stand to check the successful work of the young Yorkshire bowlers.

COLTS' CONFIDENCE RESTORED.

Six Wickets' Win over Lancashire XI.

SEASON'S GOOD START.

ROTHERHAM, Tuesday.

It is some years since Yorkshire's Second Eleven made such a good start in the Minor Counties Championship campaign as they have done this season, with a six wickets' victory over a strong Lancashire Second Eleven; but, on the ground of the Town club here, they have shown themselves superior all the way round to their rivals from across the border, and their triumph does something to remove the sting of the defeats they have sustained in recent seasons at the hands of the young Lancashiremen.

What is more, it should encourage them to go confidently forward, and it may be that the inspiration of this opening victory will be seen in the team work, and in the play of the individual members of the side in the matches with Northumberland, Notts, Durham, and Leicestershire which are to come.

In some recent seasons the side has never seemed to get over a bad start (usually against Lancashire's second string), and, as match after match has gone against the Colts, there has been a marked absence of confidence, both in the bowling and the batting, and the result naturally has been that many promising young players have failed to do themselves justice. But after this sound victory at Rotherham, there should be a vastly different tale to tell this season.

Lancashire, who lost three of their second innings wickets last night and were 69 runs behind Yorkshire's first innings total, made a brave fight, but they never recovered the ground lost against the brilliance of the Yorkshire attack yesterday morning. Horridge, who scored 41 in the first innings, made another stubborn stand for 46, and his lead encouraged Latchford and Rushton. Latchford's careful innings produced a valuable 56, and Rushton hit Fisher out of the field twice for sixes in his bright innings of 23. The first six was a straight drive over the sightboard, and it put the ball in an allottment 40 yards away from the boundary wall, and was reckoned one of the biggest hits ever seen on the ground.

Shackleton, the young Keighley professional, who is with Leeds this season, put an end to the Lancashire innings. He made the ball turn and got four wickets for 43 runs. Dennis, the fast bowler, did some more good work early on, and when the Colts started their second innings they wanted 113 for victory.

There was never any doubt about their getting the runs. They had the confidence they have lacked in so many games in the past. Whitehead played another good innings for 35, and was a little unfortunate in the manner of his dismissal, for he broke his bat, and with the second stroke with the new bat sent the ball straight back to Hodgson, the South African fast bowler.

Mallalieu stayed until the total was 90, and gave further evidence of his ability in an innings of 42 which included one 6 and four 4's. He has batted better this season than at any time previously with the Colts. Shackleton was bowled for 3, but Bedford and Davidson made the victory safe with half a dozen wickets to spare.

CRICKET NOTES.

ROTHERHAM REVIEW.

Owing to the Lancashire 2nd v Yorkshire 2nd fixture at Clifton Lane, on Monday and Tuesday, local people had not the pleasure of seeing the Rotherham Town Cricket Club at home during the holidays. The disappointment was allayed by witnessing an interesting match in perfect weather between the Colts. In spite of perfect batting wickets, Rotherham could only put up some poor totals in their away matches. Visiting York on Saturday they compiled the low total of 114 in reply to the York score of 199; York winning by 85 runs. York have beaten Rotherham in the last three fixtures at York, and although this was a better attempt the batting must be strengthened before they can beat the strong York side. Visiting King Cross on Whit-Monday, Rotherham were dismissed for one of the smallest totals for years. They obtained 43 runs, King Cross winning by six wickets. In the two matches Rotherham totalled 153 runs against their opponents' 242 for 15 wickets. Mellor was the only batsman with a good score knocking up a stubborn 58 against York.

AT YORK.

J. H. Dickinson, the popular captain, led the side, after two weeks' absence, when the team visited the Bootham Crescent ground, on Saturday at York. Batting on a good wicket, York, who had won the toss, compiled a creditable total of 199, mainly owing to a well played 96 by Hobson, who was eventually caught by Keyworth, off Mellor. York had made a bad start, Stevenson being l.b.w. to Pell when 4. G. Curry was bowled before scoring, and Mumford was run out when 4. A good stand was made by Hobson and T. A. Jacques, the amateur, who scored 37 at a quick pace. The later batsmen played well, R. Hilds obtaining 11, H. Ball 13 and W. Hague 14 not out. Pell once again proved the most successful bowler, taking 4 wickets and Ludlam took 3. Bowling against Rotherham, T. A. Jacques had the distinction of taking all ten wickets. Only Mellor and Williams, of the Rotherham batsmen, could stand up against him, but both eventually fell to his express deliveries. After the dismissal of Williams, the Rotherham batting broke down and the team were all out for 114. There were ten extras. Jacques bowled eight wickets, and two batsmen were caught out off his bowling. His figures were: 14 overs, 2 maidens, 40 runs, 10 wickets.

AT KING CROSS.

A startling game was seen at King Cross on Whit-Monday, when Rotherham were opposed to King Cross in a Yorkshire Council and West Yorkshire League match. Rotherham, batting first, obtained only 43 runs. At one time the score board showed 8 for 28. The hearts of the Rotherham team were gladdened when Rotherham, owing to some good bowling by Pell, obtained four wickets for fewer than 20 runs. King Cross won by six wickets. The game was over by 5 o'clock, but the teams continued playing for some time. Owing to travelling difficulties the Rotherham team did not arrive back at Rotherham until 3 a.m. on Tuesday. Of the Rotherham batsmen only Ludlam, who went in last wicket, obtained double figures; J. H. Dickinson, the captain, being next top scorer with 7, having eventually "broken his duck" for the season. Four of the Rotherham batsmen failed to score. Tunccliffe was the most successful King Cross bowler, taking 6 wickets, and Clarkson took two. When the King Cross team opened the innings Ludlam and Pell obtained early wickets but a good stand was made by Pearson and Simpson who both obtained 18 not out, and so the Rotherham total was passed.

ROTHERHAM'S POOR RECORD.

The hopes of the Rotherham cricket enthusiasts for a successful season of the Rotherham Town Cricket Club have been misfounded up to the present time. Of the five matches played Rotherham have gained one victory—Dewsbury, at Dewsbury, and have lost to Leeds, Halifax, York and King Cross. In addition to this, all the wins scored by opposing teams have been convincing. Unlike last season when Rotherham had three drawn matches in the first five, two being spoilt by weather, this season has been ideal for cricket, and some good scores should have been knocked up by Rotherham. Their only large score was 211 against Dewsbury. J. Pell has greatly strengthened the bowling, and has now taken 24 wickets in 5 games, an average of just less than 5 wickets per match. Mellor has been the most consistent batsman. The failure of J. H. Dickinson, the captain, and of E. Tyler, who returned to the club, has had a lot to do with the Rotherham defeats, but when these players reach their form the team should improve considerably.

CLEVER THURCROFT BATSMEN.

Hearty congratulations to E. Edwards of the Thurcroft Colliery Cricket Club, who on Saturday scored a fine 104 not out against Rotherham Town. It was a great innings and apart from one chance when he had scored 30 Edwards played a flawless innings. He started rather quietly, but having once got a sight of the ball he batted very skilfully. Besides his power as a batsman Edwards is a really clever bowler. He bowls left-handed and swings the ball into the batsman. This is Edwards' first season in the Thurcroft first eleven, but he has shown himself well fitted to become a permanent member of the team.

COLTS BEHIND ON FIRST INNINGS.

Broadhead's Promising Form with the Bat.

HARROGATE, Wednesday.

There has been a very even day's cricket here between Northumberland and the Yorkshire Second Eleven—the match was originally arranged for the York ground—and the result of it all is that the visitors lead on the first innings by 15 runs, and have lost one of their second innings wickets for 12 runs.

The feature of the play has been the batting of R. R. Rhind, for Northumberland, and Wilfred Broadhead, the Mexborough captain, for the Colts. Rhind has never played for the Northumberland first team before—he was called into the side at the last minute—but he has amply justified his selection. When the young Yorkshiremen's attack had proved good enough to dismiss the first seven Northumberland batsmen for 94, the outlook for the visitors was none too good.

Rhind, however, soon put a different complexion on the innings. He contented himself with singles at first, and then there came a time when he set about the bowling, and, with Galley, the last man in, he took the total from 129 to 197, when he was bowled by Douglas. Rhind was at the wicket less than 90 minutes for his 80 runs, and the fact that he hit 13 fours shows that he tackled the bowling with confidence and power. He was especially severe on Shackleton, the young Leeds professional, who in his first three overs took three wickets for seven runs, and Rhind's boundaries had much to do with Shackleton's final figures of three for 52 runs.

The only change in the Colts' side is the return of Turner in place of Davidson. Broadhead and Buller, who played their first Minor County matches for the Colts against Lancashire, have been retained, and they have justified themselves to-day. Buller is the Hunslet club's wicket-keeper. He is still in his teens, and after his experience against Lancashire's Second Eleven at Rotherham he has given a vastly improved display. He took the one chance he had of making a catch behind the wicket, and in the innings of close upon 200 he only gave one bye, while his work on the leg side was clean and good.

Broadhead, who has much sound work to his credit in the Yorkshire Council—ho played for the Council against the Colts at Castleford the other week—played an exceedingly good innings. He opened the Colts' batting with Whitehead, and he was ninth man out with the total at 156, of which he had scored 84. He hit only seven 4's, but his batting was always attractive, and it has to be remembered that he was the only one who was meeting the attack with success. Broadhead's style is a good one, and he has command of sound and pretty shots on both sides of the wicket. He knows how to make use of his height, and his polished display this afternoon led one well-known Yorkshireman, who has long taken an interest in the Second Eleven, to express the opinion that he is the most promising batsman seen in the Second Eleven since Mitchell moved to the first team. When Broadhead's fine innings ended, Douglas set about the attack and brought a first innings lead for his side into sight. He hit seven 4's in his quick 33, but the innings ended when Buller was run out in an effort to allow Douglas to keep the bowling.

COLTS DEFEATED ON TIME.

Northumberland Win by Nine Runs.

MINUTE TO SPARE.

(From Our Special Representative.)

HARROGATE, Thursday.

The Minor Counties Championship match between the Yorkshire Second Eleven and Northumberland, which has been most keenly contested throughout, came to an exciting finish this evening. One minute before the expiration of the extra half hour, Northumberland won by nine runs.

That the match should be so closely fought was quite in keeping with the post-war tradition established between these two counties. During the past few years, Yorkshire have beaten Northumberland by the narrow margins of one run and eight runs, and Northumberland have beaten Yorkshire by one wicket and 15 runs.

In this latest meeting, Yorkshire were set to get 232 runs to win, with three and a half hours available for play, counting the extra time. As the wicket was showing signs of helping the bowler, particularly at one end where Hetherington was able to make the ball get up disconcertingly, the task was obviously full of difficulties.

But the Colts began in good hearty. Whitehead and Broadhead put on 44 in the first 40 minutes. Broadhead, who on the first day had played a very stylish innings of 84, again batted attractively. He is over six feet in height, and, keeping a straight bat, he drove very powerfully, and it was a clever running catch in the long field which got rid of him.

Neither A. E. Mallalieu nor Shackleton could get going against the skilful bowling of Hetherington, who has done such fine work for his adopted county; but Whitehead made a number of splendid strokes past point, and Bodford appeared to be well set when he was unluckily run out; Turner called him for a run and then sent him back. At this point five wickets had fallen for 170, and the pace was well behind the clock, for 62 were wanted with 40 minutes left to play.

"A CERTAIN LIVELINESS."

Douglas was sent in to see what he could do, and he caused "a certain liveliness" by immediately hitting 2 fours and being badly missed from a skier off his third stroke. He helped Turner to add 20. Turner was seventh out with the total 200, having played a very confident and resourceful innings for 2 hours and 20 minutes. His 77, in which he gave one chance, included 9 fours, made chiefly on the off-side.

Dennis was run out in attempting a second run. Twenty runs were then required in a quarter of an hour, with two wickets to fall. Major Chichester-Constable was caught at the wicket off his first attempt to hit, and though young Buller looked like helping Fisher to win this great three-cornered fight, his wicket fell when there was barely time for another over. Still it was a splendid finish, and Yorkshire, with all the worse of the wicket, did not deserve to lose.

Earlier in the day the Colts were in a most commanding position, Northumberland, with a first innings lead of 15 runs, having lost four wickets for 47. Douglas was bowling once more in the form which aroused so much hope two or three years ago, and an early finish was in prospect. R. R. Rhind, who had saved his side in the first innings, again came to the rescue, and taking everything in the middle of the bat, hit up 52 in half-an-hour, including a drive over the bowler's head for six, and 7 fours. It was a remarkable performance for a player making his first appearance in county cricket. The later batsmen were aided by a good deal of luck, and the innings, which closed at three o'clock, realised 216.

Buller, the young Hunslet wicket-keeper, has shown such improved form as thoroughly to justify an extended trial. He is still very young and naturally nimble, but he also has a good style, and gets his body well across to the ball.

COLTS' CREDITABLE FINISH.

Whitehead Shows Promise in Fine Century.

HUCKNALL, Thursday.

All things considered, Yorkshire Second XI. have no reason to be dissatisfied with the way in which their Minor Counties' Championship match with Notts Second team has ended. Less than three hours' play was possible yesterday, and the rain which fell then prevented a resumption to-day until half-past one, and then it was thought that as the sun got to work on the wicket the batsmen would have a sorry time.

For only a short spell, however, did the wicket reveal the anticipated dangers. Fisher, the East Leeds bowler, made the ball turn, and got the wickets of Kirk, the Notts captain, and Reddish when they looked like being troublesome, and with Shackleton accounting for Hardstaffe and Bland, the Notts innings ended at 264. Ninety-four runs were added in 85 minutes to-day.

Yorkshire's Colts were faced with just over two and a half hours' batting, and the possibility of a first innings defeat, but thanks to the stout work of Albert Whitehead, of the Friarmore club, who was well backed up by Bedford, the young Barnsley yall-rounder, they not only saved the match, but finished up in a position which did them distinct credit.

Whitehead's innings, indeed, was the feature of the game. He did his work coolly and well, and was never troubled, not even when Reddish and Bland, the Notts spin bowlers, were employed against him at the time the wicket was in their favour. His first century for the Colts took just over two hours, and it has to be remembered that he got the runs out of a total of 150. In the hundred he hit 14 fours, and a feature of his work was the power he put into his drives and pulls.

Bedford got 43 out of the 105 his stand with Whitehead produced, and he has to be credited with a plucky performance, which was ended by a really good ball from Bland, a young amateur bowler, of whom Notts folk have a high opinion.

Turner suffered a similar fate 20 minutes later, half the side being out for 152, but Shackleton and Fisher added 53 for the next wicket before Shackleton was leg before. The ball struck him above the eye in the morning, and he had to retire. F. E. Greenwood took over the gloves, and did quite well. Buller was feeling better at tea time, but was still rather shaky.

Yorkshire were put well on the way to victory by Shackleton and Broadhead, both of whom are to play against Kent on Saturday, for the first wicket realised forty-one. The third added forty-two, and the next twenty-nine. Whitehead was unlucky not to reach fifty after batting brightly and hitting six fours. Broadhead again did well and hit seven fours in his thirty-eight.

YORKSHIRE COLTS AT THRUM HALL.

Two Local Players in the Team.

Notts Second at the Wickets

The weather was fine when the Minor Counties game between Yorkshire and Notts commenced at Thrum Hall, today. Additional local interest was lent to the match by the inclusion in the Yorkshire XI of L. Radcliffe, of King Cross, a player who has been exhibiting consistent form with his club, and Tiffany, of Rastrick.

The Notts captain, J. K. Lane, won the toss and had the advantage of a good wicket. The attendance was small when the visitors opened with Keeton and Shipston, against the bowling of Hall (York) and Goulder (Sheffield United). The first-named batsman commenced briskly and scored 11 of the first dozen runs, when a good ball from Goulder, a left-hander, bowled Keeton, who had never been comfortable. Hall, who was in charge of the attack from the Hanson-lane end, was getting the utmost speed from the pitch, but it was Goulder who gained the next wicket by getting through Shipston's defence with a delivery which whipped back from the off to take the middle stump. Shipston had scored 16 of the 17 obtained in 20 minutes.

BRIGHTER CRICKET.

The Yorkshire captain at this stage brought on Turner (Sheffield), vice Hall, whose three overs had cost 13 runs. Harris and Hardstaff were now in partnership. The latter is the son of the former Notts professional. For a time the rate of scoring was reduced, but, gradually settling down, both batsmen brightened up and punished the bowlers for a few fours, the 30 being hoisted in 40 minutes. With the score 34, Hardstaff placed a shot from Turner just out of the reach of mid-off and shortly afterwards Harris hooked Turner gracefully to the leg boundary. The rate of scoring was now increasing rapidly although no undue liberties could be taken.

The half century was hoisted after 55 minutes, at which stage Hall was brought back into the attack, this time at the pavilion end, Goulder taking Turner's place at the other end. Only 14 runs had been added when smart stumping by Tiffany (Rastrick) off Goulder disposed of Hardstaff, who had scored 27 out of 48 in a valuable third wicket stand.

HALL'S EXPRESSES

S. T. Rhodes, who followed, did not appear to relish Hall's expresses, whilst the same batsman was in difficulties with Goulder, who was keeping an immaculate length. Harris was enjoying himself at the expense of Hall. Bedford (Barnsley) was tried at 89 vice Goulder, and the 100 was reached in 1 hour 25 minutes. RADFORD STRUCK.

W. H. Radford and Copley continued the Notts venture after lunch, Hall and Goulder being entrusted with the bowling. One hundred and fifty was hoisted after play had been in progress two and a quarter hours. Hall was again proving rather expensive. The light was now bad, but 34 was added to the lunch score in 20 minutes.

Turner relieved Goulder at 165. Hall was making his deliveries rear badly at times, and he once struck W. H. Radford on the left arm, which seemed to give concern to the batsmen, as he was out two balls later caught by W. E. Harbord at mid-on o. the Yorkshire's express merchant, the sixth wicket adding 37, W. H. Radford, after a shaky opening scoring 28.

COLTS AT THRUM HALL.

Radcliffe's Successful Debut at the Wicket.

The Yorkshire Colts were in the happy position of being one run on with eight wickets to fall at the commencement of the second day's play, against Notts 2nd, at Thrum Hall, this morning. The "not out," F. E. Greenwood and Turner, who made an unbroken stand of 171 yesterday, resumed against the bowling of S. D. Rhodes and Harris. Both batsmen opened briskly, but, with only eight runs added, the partnership came to an end, Greenwood being caught at cover-point by Copley, off Harris. The third wicket pair had added 179 in two hours 13 minutes, Greenwood being responsible for 115, obtained in 2½ hours. Included in his total were 18 fours.

RADCLIFFE'S DEBUT.

The new-corner was L. Radcliffe, of King Cross, and the few spectators present gave the local man an encouraging cheer. Radcliffe quickly got off the mark by getting Harris through the slips. Indeed, Radcliffe shaped promisingly in his first display with the Colts. Turner was also scoring more freely than yesterday. The King Cross man was partial to the cut through the slips, and he quickly reached double figures. When 12, however, he nearly played on to Oates, who had relieved Rhodes at 28. He was also fortunate when getting Harris for four through the slips, the batsman playing back to take the ball practically off the off-stump. Radcliffe scored 20 in half-an-hour, not bad playing for a player making his debut in Minor Counties cricket.

With the score 270, Turner, whose total was 67, was missed behind the wicket. Eight runs later, however, the Sheffield player was caught by W. H. Radford off Harris. The retiring batsman had scored 72, including a six and six fours, in two hours 53 minutes. The Yorkshire Colts had been at the wicket four hours when 300 appeared, 73 being scored this morning, with Radcliffe responsible for 34 of that number. Sheffield relieved Oates at 310.

CLOSE OF THE INNINGS.

In Sheffield's third over Radcliffe, who promised to reach his 50 was clean bowled. The King Cross player had scored 47 in 75 minutes, and had hit four boundaries. He had done splendidly in his debut for the Colts. Two more wickets fell quickly, Fisher and Major Chichester-Constable being dismissed for the addition of only 13 runs. Tiffany (Rastrick) left after scoring nine, and Bedford soon afterwards reached his 50, scored in 80 minutes. The innings, which had lasted five hours 10 minutes, closed for 395.

NOTTS' SECOND VENTURE.

Notts 2nd, 168 runs behind, commenced none too well in their second venture, Keeton being bowled with Goulder's first delivery, after 10 had been hit off Hall's first over. It was a splendid delivery. At 28 Goulder changed over to the pavilion end and with his fifth ball Goulder knocked back Harris' off stick with a gem, thus taking two wickets for no runs in four overs. The first score off him came in his sixth over, a pull for four by Hardstaff.

PARTNERSHIP OF 171.

Yorkshire Second Eleven in Good Position.

(From a Special Correspondent.)

A partnership between Cyril Turner, of Sheffield United, who has on occasion distinguished himself with the county side, and F. E. Greenwood, an amateur who plays in the Huddersfield League, has been the feature of the Minor Counties Championship match between the Colts of Yorkshire and Notts here to-day.

In just over two hours 171 runs were added by Turner and Greenwood, and, mainly as a result of this fine effort, Yorkshire Second Eleven, who led by one run on the first innings and have eight wickets standing, are in an excellent position to make a bold bid for victory to-morrow. This is Greenwood's fourth match with the Colts, and so he has quickly added himself to the list of century makers, for his share of the 171 scored while he and Turner were at the wicket was 111.

There was only one chance in it, and if Shipstone had taken the ball in the slips it would have been a marvellous catch. Greenwood was always the master of the bowling. It is true that he scored slowly at first—he took over ninety minutes for his first 50, in which he had six 4's—but there came a time when his runs came quickly, for he hit the ball truly and hard, and there were few of his shots which were not well placed. In his century he had 15 fours, and when stumps were drawn and he was unbeaten with 111 to his account he had hit 17 fours.

Turner's innings was a patient one. He treated the bowling on its merits, and when the visitors began to tire towards the close he hit powerfully. In his 51 he had five 4's and one 6. The pair played so well together that the resumption of their partnership to-morrow morning will be awaited with interest.

TWO PROMISING BOWLERS.

There are more amateurs in the Colts' side than has been the case for many seasons, and two of them, L. Radcliffe, of King Cross, and J. Tiffany, the wicket keeper from Rastrick, are newcomers. W. K. Harbord, of Wetherby, who gave the Colts' innings such a promising start by scoring twenty runs in half an hour, and standing in partnership with Whitehead, of Friarmere, to score 59 for the first wicket, has played with the side before, and so has Goulder, the young Sheffield United professional, whose bowling was ever so good in the opening stages of the Notts innings.

Goulder is a left arm slow bowler who has length and the ability to spin the ball both ways. His work with the new ball is especially effective—he dismissed the first two Notts batsmen for four runs. He had three wickets for 31 runs before lunch, suffered a little afterwards, and came back with the total beyond 200 to show his undoubted power with the new ball. Hall, the York fast bowler, has also done good work. His return of 3 wickets for 69 runs is not so good as Goulder's 4 wickets for 52, but Hall was seen to good purpose just before lunch and afterwards, when he bowled with effect for an hour and took 3 wickets for 33 runs in eleven overs.

NOTTS II. ESCAPE.

Hall's Great Bowling Spell for the Colts.

HALIFAX, Tuesday.

Yorkshire's Second Eleven got very near victory against the Notts second team at the Thrum Hall ground here this evening, and if there had been an extra half hour available for play it is probable that they would have secured their third victory of the season. Stumps were drawn at ten minutes to six, when Notts, with only one of their second innings wickets standing, were 32 runs on on Yorkshire's first innings total of 395. The visitors owed everything to the fine innings of Shipstone, who was ably assisted by Hardstaffe, and they had reason to be thankful too that Wheat, their able wicket-keeper, stood so firmly with the bat in the closing stages.

Before lunch, Yorkshire's Colts carried their first innings score from 230 to 395. The Greenwood-Turner partnership for the third wicket was taken from 171 to 179, when Greenwood with his total at 115, was caught by Copley off Rhodes, the amateur bowler, of whom much is expected in Nottinghamshire. Greenwood hit 18 fours. Turner took his total to 72, which included one 6 and six 4's, and then Radcliffe, the King Cross amateur, making his first appearance with the Colts, got 47 runs in really promising style. Bedford, of Barnsley, was 51 unbeaten when the innings closed just on the lunch interval.

There were nearly three and a half hours left for play when the Notts second innings started, and once again Goulder, the Sheffield United left-arm bowler, demonstrated his capabilities with the new ball. He swung it well, and flighted it deceptively, and in his first four overs he got the wickets of Keeton and Harris without having a run scored off him. Indeed, it was not until the third ball of his sixth over that his record was upset, and then Hardstaffe hit him to the on boundary for 4. When Goulder got his second wicket Notts only had 26 runs on the board, but Shipstone and Hardstaffe mastered the attack, and took the total to 130 before the latter was caught by Greenwood in Whitehead's second over.

This stand seemed to have put a Yorkshire victory out of the question, but there were surprising developments when Hall, the York fast bowler, returned to the attack to bowl as well as ever he has done for the Colts. In his first spell Hall had 42 scored off him without securing a wicket, but this time he cleaned bowled Rhodes, Radford, and Sheffield, and had Copley and Shipstone caught, the five wickets falling with only 15 runs hit off his bowling. Shipstone left after scoring 83, in which he hit 11 fours. He was at the wicket for two hours and forty minutes, and his effort undoubtedly saved his side. Notts were then three runs behind, and had two wickets to fall. Lane and Wheat carried the total to 182 before Goulder claimed the wickets of the Notts captain, and then Wheat and Oates stubbornly resisted the keen attack until there was not time left for a Yorkshire victory.

LEICESTERSHIRE II. AT BRIDLINGTON.

Colts Make Good Recovery from Bad Start.

BRIDLINGTON, Monday.

The first of this season's Minor Counties Championship matches between the Colts of Yorkshire and Leicestershire on the Recreation Ground here to-day has produced a level day's cricket. In reply to Yorkshire's total of 223, Leicestershire have scored 149 for the loss of six wickets. There will be a short day's play to-morrow, for Leicestershire have to get to Hunstanton, and, to enable them to leave early, there has been an extra hour's cricket to-day.

There were two last minute changes in the Colts' side. W. E. Harbord and F. E. Greenwood were unable to play, and their places were filled by A. E. Malletieu and Bedford, both of whom justified their re-inclusion in the team in no uncertain fashion. The Colts had first use of the wicket, always reckoned a big advantage at Bridlington, but their early batsmen were troubled by Snary and Bowley, and things were going none too well when three wickets were down for 40 runs.

Broadhead, who scored over 80 for Mexborough on Saturday, got 22 of the first 26 before being well beaten by Snary, and then, with the total at 40, Bowley, who turned the ball quickly off the pitch, dismissed the two left-handers, Whitehead and Turner. Malletieu stood firm, and with Shackleton made the first step towards pulling the innings round. They carried the score to 84, and when Malletieu was brilliantly caught at the wicket by Corral off Moore, he had scored 35 and hit four fours and one six.

Shackleton took his score to 21 and then Bedford and Major Chichester-Constable got together in the brightest and biggest partnership of the innings. Major Chichester-Constable went out at the bowling while Bedford continued to score steadily, and the total jumped up towards 200. In his quickly scored 28, the Major had four fours and one six, a hit which lifted the ball out of the ground on to the railway.

Bedford, who scored 51 out in his last innings for the Colts against Notts at Halifax, took his total to 65, when he was well stumped by Corral, who kept a good wicket for the visitors. Bedford hit half a dozen fours, and his shots, particularly those through the covers, were good ones. The innings closed at 228, a total which never seemed likely before lunch.

The young Yorkshire attack made a good start, for Hall bowled Bradshaw with the first ball of his second over, and with only one run on the board. Gouldier, the slow left-arm bowler from Sheffield, was severely dealt with by Packe, who scored 20 before being stumped by Bamforth off Gouldier, and then Hall took the wickets of Broughton and King, and Leicestershire II. were as badly off as the Colts had been.

But they had the man to meet the situation, and Sharp, their captain, went in to turn the tables. He tackled the bowling very aggressively and scored 72 of the 89 added by the fifth wicket. It was an excellent innings in every way, as good a one as has been played against the Colts this season. Sharp hit hard and truly, and he treated all the Colts' bowlers alike. He hit 12 fours.

Smith contented himself with keeping his end up while his captain did the scoring, and when Sharp was caught at square leg by Malletieu off Gouldier he had the satisfaction of knowing that he had served his side well, and pleased the crowd with a delightful innings.

CRICKET.

The Colts' Match at Bridlington.

On what was described as a fairly good wicket, the annual match between the Second Yorkshire team and another representative second county team took place on Monday and Tuesday at Bridlington on the Recreation Ground. The Colts' opponents this year at Bridlington were the Colts of Leicestershire County, and the game proved a very interesting one, though it did not attract a very satisfactory "gate," though the weather was ideal, not too warm, and with a pleasant breeze blowing across the ground all the opening day. Yorkshire won the toss, and Major Chichester-Constable, the captain, who bears an honoured name in the East Riding, decided to bat. With the exception of an interval, in which the Major himself was one of the batsmen, and Malletien his partner, the game was mostly slow, and played with that caution which is sometimes spoken of in regard to first class county matches. Major Chichester-Constable put some vim into it, and one of his shots put the ball well over the trees at the side of the railway line, and registered a six of his 28. The team was all out in the first innings for 222, and the tail had by common consent wagged very well, for at lunch-time six wickets were down for 117. Leicestershire, opening badly, but gradually improving and holding the bowling, had scored 149 for 6 wickets when the game closed for the day.

Amongst enthusiastic cricketers there will be regret at the statement made to a "Chronicle" correspondent by a member of the Yorkshire County Cricket Club that there is small probability of a Colts' match at Bridlington next year. This county second eleven matches were secured for Bridlington a number of years ago, largely by the efforts of the old cricket club, when Mr. Arthur Cranwick was the hon. secretary, and they have been a welcome feature of the season each year, though they have never been advertised as they might have been, and not often supported as one might have expected them to be. On the other hand, a member of the Bridlington club committee expressed surprise, rather, that the Colts' matches should have been so long regularly played at Bridlington each year, as, he said, the purpose of the County Committee was to change the venue in order, if possible, to widen the interest of the game, with a view to encouraging and securing the best talent, ultimately, for the service of the county team. This year, it may be noticed, there were no immediately local player in the eleven, not, we venture to say, because there is no rising talent worthy the honour of a trial.

There were present on the ground on Monday a number of real devotees of the game, men who many years ago were themselves enthusiastic and worthy exponents of cricket in their own local spheres. These included Mr. William Milner, ex-Chief Lord of the Manor of Bridlington; Mr. Alderman T. Grimshaw, ex-Mayor of Bridlington; Mr. J. J. Woodcock, Rudston; Canon Topham, accompanied by Mrs. Topham, and many others.

The licensed catering was done by Mr. Harry Lodge and Mrs. Cody, of the Black Lion Hotel, and the luncheon and teas were served by the caterers at the Recreation Ground, Messrs. Simpson and Wiseman, of the Oberon Cafe.

THE SECOND DAY.

The second day's play was at first more interesting than that of the opening day, but later it dwindled, and it became evident that the only result was likely to be a draw. The Leicestershire team had finished up the night before with a score of 149 for six wickets, and they were all out for 206, leaving the Yorkshire side 22 runs to the good on the first innings.

Yorkshire Second opened well in its second innings, and about four o'clock, after the game had twice been interrupted by slight rain showers, Major Chichester-Constable declared for Yorkshire Second, and Leicestershire Second went in to bat for an hour and a half, for it had been agreed that the game should conclude earlier, as Leicestershire were due to play at Hunstanton on Wednesday, and must leave Bridlington in order to get there at the earliest possible minute. If good weather came evident that Leicestershire were quite equal to their task, and at 5.30 stumps were drawn with the match in the position of a draw. Leicestershire having scored 77 for 4 wickets.

The top scorer of the match was Broadhead, the tallest player on the field, standing, probably, six feet two inches, and he was not out. When his score was 36, he expressed the hope that he might manage the half-century, so that he was successful even beyond his hopes. His batting was much enjoyed. The annual cricket match in which Yorkshire colts figure at Bridlington was played on the Dukes Park Recreation Ground this week when a strong Leicestershire side furnished the opposition. It is exactly 20 years ago since the first County game was played in the town and the attendance this year did not compare at all favourably with those in days gone by. Mr. Arthur Cramswick, who with the late Mr. J. Sheldon, of Leeds, was greatly instrumental in arranging the inaugural match still has in his possession the original statistics regarding the attendance on Yorkshire Colts meeting with Cheshire at Bridlington in 1909. The attendance on each day exceeded the thousand mark, where this week the patrons were at least fifty per cent less. This lack of support is most discouraging, especially to the ground staff who, under the direction of Mr. S. R. Crofts, had carefully prepared a first class wicket.

PRESENTATION OF CUP AND MEDALS.

NICHOLSON AND WILLEY IN ANOTHER MATCH-WINNING PARTNERSHIP.

The Yorkshire Council match at Harrogate on Saturday was Mr. John Redfern's benefit match, and though the weather was ideal there was only a small ring of spectators. Those who did go to the match saw a very good game, when Harrogate secured another fine victory. Last week T. Nicholson and A. Willey actually won the match with a splendid partnership that realised 153 runs. This week they repeated their performance and knocked up 140 before they were separated. This wonderful batting display was in itself worth seeing. Harrogate took by six wickets. Harrogate, who won the toss and, of course, batted first, had not quite the same team which drew with Harrogate at the first match of the season. There was only one change in the Harrogate side—Stanley Holbrook playing in H. Ambler's place. Shaw and Ainley opened the visitors' innings on a very soft wicket. Harbury and Laycock bowled. Shaw, who is a dangerous batsman, soon left, when exactly 11 runs had been scored. Robinson taking a smart catch behind the stumps off Laycock. Birch followed, and with Ainley, kept the Harrogate batsmen busy. Runs did not come freely, though when the score was 24 Ainley hit Harbury for a good six on the leg side. At 33 a double change of bowling was made, Shepherd and Thompson taking over, but to no effect. Fifty went up, but it took over an hour to get these. The second wicket partnership realised 86 runs, when Robinson took another good catch from Birch. Morphett was the bowler. Immediately after this wicket fell Harbury and Laycock came back to bowl. Laycock took the next two wickets in one over. He clean bowled both Yeaton and Moore. Ainley was still in and playing fine cricket all round the wicket. At 61 another six, this time off Brian Thompson, who had relieved Harbury. Three balls later he was caught out by Shepherd at sharp leg. His score of 81 included seven 4's in addition to the two sixes mentioned. Thompson was also the bowler when Goodall was caught by Nicholson. After the fall of this wicket things went very badly for the visitors, five wickets falling for six runs, leaving the home team with 149 to make in two hours and five minutes.

As against Menston last Saturday, Harrogate made a bad start, having two wickets down for six runs. As usual, Robinson and Willey opened the innings. Five only had been scored when Robinson failed to get hold of a delivery from Shaw. One run later, when G. A. Woods had come to the wicket, this Harrogate batsman made a hash of his innings before he had an easy catch at silly leg before he had scored. Then the record makers came together. Nicholson got off the mark in great style, and in addition to hitting the first boundary, knocked 14 off Shaw's bowling in one over. Not content with this, he hit a ball from Ainley into the grand stand for a six when that bowler took Shaw's place. In Ainley's second over Willey, not to be outdone by his partner, also hit a six. At 89 J. Yeaton, the Harrogate captain, had to retire after wrenching his leg badly. Bob Morphett fielded substitute. Nicholson reached his fifty first, and shortly afterwards his another six, this time clean into the next field. This drive sent up the 100. Of course Willey came up to the scratch gallantly and made it "two all" when he repeated his partner's performance and hit a six off Goodall. Four runs were required for a victory when Nicholson, in an endeavour to make the winning hit, only half got hold of a ball to give Crockerly an easy catch. PROMISING NEW PLAYER.

Backhouse Does Well for the Colts.

(From Our Representative.)

COALVILLE, Wednesday.

Yorkshire's Second XI. started disastrously against Leicestershire Seconds in the last of their Minor County Championship matches on the Fox and Goose ground here to-day, but they made a splendid recovery, and, if all goes well to-morrow, they will not be many more than 40 or 50 behind on the first innings.

The Leicestershire side has been reinforced by E. W. Dawson, who has brought several first team men with him, and the Colts are giving trials to two new men, neither of whom has played for a Yorkshire club. Wigglesworth, the wicket-keeper, comes from Lancashire with the best of recommendations. Backhouse, the left-arm slow bowler from the M.C.C. ground staff, has played cricket only for three years. He batted well and took six wickets for 57 runs.

The Colts had first innings, but the wicket did not help them as was expected. Very early Smith and Snary found they were able to make the ball get up awkwardly, and it was a ball from Smith which "popped" up that brought about the downfall of Broadhead. Whitehead was out with the total still at 14, and seven runs later Turner was back in the pavilion.

The Leicestershire attack kept its grip on the game until Fisher and Backhouse got together for the eighth wicket. Before then Harbord made a brave effort to check the collapse. He stayed until the total was 70 and was one of the few Colts' batsmen to face the bowling with suzerainty. Leicestershire's left arm bowlers were spinning the ball and Dawson, the captain, kept the visitors worried by frequent changes.

The total was 97 when Backhouse, the bowler from Lord's, joined Fisher, and this partnership, which mastered the attack for the first and only time, put on 55. Fisher played one of his best innings for the Colts, and when he had settled he did not neglect many scoring chances. In his 55 he had half a dozen fours. Backhouse was 23 not out and had every reason to be satisfied with his first work for his county.

Leicestershire's second eleven started in vastly different style. Their opening batsmen were E. W. Dawson, the first team captain, who went to Australia with the English team, and Bradshaw, a youngsters of whom the Leicestershire people have big hopes. Dawson started to flog the bowling at once. He hit two sixes off Goulder before being missed in the long field by Whitehead, and then he scored 19 in one over from Goulder—three sixes off successive balls and a single.

This display of big hitting delighted the crowd, but in fairness to Goulder it should be pointed out that three times was Dawson missed off him—there was the difficult catch which Whitehead dropped, and twice Goulder drew Dawson out of his ground only to see the wicket keeper fail to hold the ball.

It was Backhouse who bowled Dawson when the first wicket partnership had produced 87. Dawson's share was 56 and in it were five sixes and three fours.

A remarkable change came over the game after the tea interval, when Hall and Backhouse bowled so well that five wickets fell in very quick time for 42 runs. Backhouse made the ball turn deceptively, and he claimed three of those wickets.

Rudd and Snary put an end to the collapse and before the former was finely caught by Turner off Backhouse, they had given the home side first innings points.

COLTS' BRILLIANT WIND-UP.

Strong Leicestershire Second Team Beaten.

NEW BOWLER'S GOOD WORK.

(From Our Representative.)

COALVILLE, Thursday.

Yorkshire's Colts have ended their Minor Counties Championship season with a brilliant victory over Leicestershire's Second Eleven, and their bowling and fielding this afternoon, when Leicestershire, wanting 74 runs for victory, were dismissed for 63, reached a high standard. Indeed, their attack has not been so good since their first match at Rotherham, when they defeated a strong Lancashire Second Eleven by a substantial margin.

It has been an exciting day's cricket on a wicket on which the batsmen have always been struggling for runs, and evidence of the hold the bowlers have had on the game is shown by the fact that 22 wickets have fallen in little more than four hours' play. The two outstanding Leicestershire first innings wickets were captured by Hall and Backhouse in four overs first thing, and then the Colts were out in just over two hours for 106 runs. They lost three good wickets—those of Broadhead, Turner and Harbord—in rubbing off their first innings arrears of 33, and, all things considered, did remarkably well to top the hundred mark.

In view of the strength of the Leicestershire Second Eleven—it included E. W. Dawson, the first team skipper, and several other regular members of the county side—it was not thought that they would have a great deal of difficulty in winning the match, but Hall and Fisher, the opening bowlers, set about their work well, and Leicestershire were struggling from the start. Hall bowled Bradshaw, A. C. Dawson, and Price in eight overs for 13 runs, and in the same period Fisher, the left arm bowler from the East Leeds Club, got the wickets of E. W. Dawson (clean bowled), Riley, and King for 14 runs, and with more than half their wickets down, Leicestershire had got less than half the runs required.

BACKHOUSE'S FINISHING TOUCH.

It was at this point that G. B. F. Rudd's experience and Snary's steadiness promised to produce the stand the home crowd hoped for. But Backhouse, the new Yorkshire bowler who has been on the ground staff at Lord's for three seasons, was called on, and he did his work so well that seven overs saw the end of the Leicestershire innings. Backhouse made better use of the wicket than any of the Leicestershire bowlers had done, and he put the finishing touch to the big effort of Hall and Fisher in very good style.

In the four overs he sent down—Fisher carried on at the other end—he got the last four wickets, and the only scores made off him were three boundary strokes. Backhouse broke the Rudd-Snary partnership by getting the former stumped (Wigglesworth, the new keeper from Didsbury, displayed pleasing form this afternoon), and he came out of the match with 11 wickets for 74 runs, figures which must attract the attention of the authorities.

Fisher has served the Colts well in this game. He has batted well in both innings. He was highest scorer in the first, and second with 23 to Whitehead's 29 in the second, and he has rarely bowled better than with the new ball at the start of Leicestershire's second innings.

THE SEASON REVIEWED.

Promising Form of Young Players.

While the smashing form shown by the Colts in their opening Minor Counties' Championship match against the Lancashire Second Eleven has not been maintained—if it had the young Yorkshiremen would have been in the running for honours—the season has been a most satisfactory one from many viewpoints. The Colts are not entered in the Minor Counties Competition as a championship-seeking side; the aim is to provide promising youngsters with a means of proving their worth and gaining experience. Still it is most satisfactory that more matches have been won than lost, and it is good to hear Major R. C. Chichester-Constable, the captain, talk of the good work the Colts' side is doing towards providing recruits for the first team. This season Wilfred Barber, the Birstall batsman, and Dennis, the fast bowler from South Yorkshire, have been placed with the first team, and, in addition, several of the regular members of the Colts' side have been drafted into the first team on occasions.

THE SEASON'S "FINDS."

When Major Chichester-Constable talks of the season's "finds" he points at once to two young batsmen whose work in the future is bound to be of interest. First, there is F. E. Greenwood, the Huddersfield amateur, who has played almost as many matches with the first team as the second, and whose average with the first team is round about the 60 mark, twenty more than his average with the Colts. Greenwood's first game with the Colts was on June 12, and since then he has scored two centuries in second-class cricket and one with the County team, which he has captained in the absence of Capt. Worsley. It has been said that Greenwood is purely an on-side batsman, but Major Chichester-Constable says this is not so—he is satisfied that Greenwood has strokes on both sides of the wicket, and that he is as competent with them as can be expected in a young cricketer.

Broadhead, the other newcomer, was seen to good advantage when he played with the Colts against the Colts at Castleford, and since then has made a place for himself in the Second Eleven. A forcing type of batsman, he may easily serve Yorkshire well. The Colts' captain points out that Broadhead had a match with the county in Kent on a wicket "made" for Freeman, and he says plainly that he does not think Broadhead's fitness for first-class cricket can be judged on what happened then.

Whitehead, of Friarcliffe, who opens the innings with Broadhead, is another forcing batsman whose worth is shown by the fact that he has scored over 500 runs for the Colts this season. Cyril Turner's abilities, of course, are well known; he was tested and found not wanting when he did so much to gain Yorkshire the first innings lead in the Lancashire match at Old Trafford at Whitsuntide. Among the other batsmen whose work has been good are two amateurs, A. E. Mallalieu and W. E. Hayford. Bedford, the young Barnsley professional,

has batted consistently well, but his bowling has been a sad disappointment to his friends, and, so far as figures go, there has been no bowler in the Colts' side to equal the record of Stanley Douglas, of Bradford, who has not played since the middle of the season. As things have turned out it is rather a pity that Backhouse, the left arm slow to medium bowler from Lord's, was not given an earlier trial. He made his first appearance at Coalville against Leicestershire, and on a favourable wicket made the ball turn with conspicuous success. His length was not always good, but he has great promise.

Of Goulder, the 22-year-old Sheffield United left arm slow bowler, there is much the same story to tell. At times with the Colts, when he has found a length, Goulder has shown himself to be a bowler of real merit. He can spin the ball and he can fight it, and in his work he shows good judgment.

Hall is the side's fast bowler—he has taken 50 wickets this season—and the Colts' captain has a big opinion of his pluck and ability. Fisher, the Colts' captain says, is a very useful all-round cricketer, and so is Shackleton, who bowls a good googly and who batted well against Freeman in the Kent match in which Broadhead played.

Five wicket keepers have been tried this season, and unquestionably the most promising is Buller, of the Hunstret club, though Wigglesworth, who was born in Halifax 19 years ago, has only had one trial, and then the conditions were none too favourable.
