## MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

### CORNWALL V. KENT H.

Cornwall opened their Minor Counties championship matches, on Wednesday morning, when they met Kent II., on the Truro School ground.

Rain had fallen heavily throughout the night, consequently the wicket was on the soft side.

Cory (W.) was unable to turn out for Cornwall, and his place was taken by C. Casley, whilst E. Humphreys deputised for T. F. Mitchell in the Kent side.

Victor Barnes and S. Stephens (Liskeard) were Cornwall's opening pair.

Barnes' first over yielded no runs against the bowling of Blunden, but Stephens opened the scoring early when he made a pretty stroke for 2 off Ashwell.

Runs came slowly, Stephens adding to his score a single and a nice 4 before being caught by Christopherson in the slips off Blunden, after scoring 7.

E. Chatten (Redruth) was next in, and survived only a few deliveries, when he was bowled by Blunden without breaking his duck.

Rogers (G.), Camborne, joined Barnes, and in his endeavour to hit his first ball hit up a nice piece of the turf. The Camborne batsman's stay was also short. He was bowled by a full toss from Ashwell when he had scored only 2.

The Penzance professional, Ollerearnshaw, was next to take his stand at the wicket, and his first ball from Ashwell he sent spinning over the green grass for a single.

Barnes continued to bat consistently, adding slowly to his score.

Kent now made a change in the bowling, Lewis, the slow bowler, going on in the place of Ashwell.

Ollerearnshaw was batting well, taking every opportunity he could to score. He drove with great deliberation, and hit a couple of boundaries in one over. Lewis' deliveries were being played very carefully, but Barnes succeeded in hitting him to the leg for a boundary.

When Cornwall's score had reached 38, Ollerearnshaw was caught behind the wicket by Levett off Blunden.

H. Dorning (Falmouth) now partnered Barnes. Dorning, after hitting Lewis for 4, was stumped by Levett.

Casley was another victim of Lewis' bowling, being caught in the slips by Blunden off his first ball.

Play had not been going in Cornwall's favour, and with 6 wickets down for 45 runs, unless the remaining batsmen made a stand, Cornwall's first innings would be disastrous.

Cornwall's veteran skipper, H. Tresawna, was the next man in, and both he and Barnes batted steadily, bringing the score to the half century, 49 of which had been contributed by Barnes, and a boundary hit by Tresawna brought Cornwall's score to 60.

Blunden, who had been bowling all the morning, was taken off and Ashwell put on in his place. The partnership of Barnes and Tresawna was the most productive of the innings so far. Both men were batting skilfully, and their stand put on 41 when the lunch interval arrived with the total: Cornwall, 88 for six.

The stand of Barnes and Tresawna had certainly helped to pull the fat out of the fire, but within a few minutes of resuming, two of Cornwall's remaining wickets had fallen. Barnes—practically a novice to county cricket, and who had batted so well throughout the morning—was out lbw. to Lewis, and J. E. Mill was in only a few minutes when he was bowled by Lewis for 6. G. H. I. Bickford and C. Kendall were clean bowled without scoring.

H. V. Levett and Sunnocks opened for Kent, to the bowling of Kendall and Ollerearnshaw. Both batsmen started well and runs came quickly.

Kent's opening wickets fell rather quickly, and three men were out for 22 runs.

Then H. P. Dinwiddy and Lewis got together and runs came very quickly, especially from Dinwiddy, who made shots all round the wicket. The partnership was very profitable, and the home skipper tried several changes in bowling in an endeavour to effect a separation. Lewis eventually fell to one of Stephens' deliveries. The score had then reached 70, of which Dinwiddy had made 38.

Dinwiddy, who was partnered by G. A. Simpson, the Kent skipper, continued his run-making way, but Simpson, after hitting a boundary, was run out following a smart pick-up and throw-in.

Ashwell, who was next man in, brought the Kent score up to 80 with a boundary hit.

After the tea interval the Kent wickets fell very cheaply. Dinwiddy added seven when he was caught and bowled by Stephens, whilst Ashwell, after contributing a useful 22, was caught by Dorning, off Mill.

Kent scored a total of 116, leaving Cornwall 23 runs behind.

### CORNWALL BAT AGAIN.

With about an hour to play, Cornwall opened their second innings with V. Barnes and C. Casley. Barnes was missed by Simpson when he had scored two, and he was also given "life" when his score stood at one. Immediately after being missed the second time, he was cleaned bowled by Blunden.

E. Chatten and Casley got together, and both of them played very cautiously. Both were missed in the slips. When Casley was dismissed with 6 to his credit, Chatten was joined by Rogers (G.).

After a half-an-hour's play, and the loss of two wickets, Cornwall passed the Kent score, play all the while being slow.

Chatten, who had been dismissed quickly earlier in the day, played a consistent innings, before he was caught by Humphreys off Ashwell, after scoring 15.

CORNWALL OPPOSE KENT

UNIMPRESSIVE BATTING BY BOTH SIDES AT TRURO

Cornwall's opening engagement in the Minor Counties' Championship, was played on Truro School ground yesterday, when Kent 2nd XI. were their opponents. Cory was absent from the Cornish side, his place being filled by C. Casley, of Mullion. After heavy rain overnight, the wicket was plumb when Cornwall went in to bat, and they made a disastrous start, three wickets falling for 14 runs in half an hour. To V. Barnes, the young Truro batsman, and S. Stephens, Liskeard, was entrusted the responsibility of opening for Cornwall, and with 11 runs on the board, Stephens was caught by Christopherson, of Blunden. E. Chatten, of Redruth, making his first appearance for Cornwall, was out first ball being clean bowled by Blunden. The Camborne professional, G. Rogers, whose strength as a batsman has been so consistently good, was looked upon to help to retrieve the home county's position, but after getting a couple of runs, he was out to a full toss by Ashwell. With three wickets down for 14 runs, there was depression amongst the Cornwall supporters, but Ollerearnshaw, in company with Barnes, improved the outlook, and the rate of scoring improved. Just as the Penzance professional was setting down to business, he was caught behind the wicket by Levett, deputy to Ames, the Kent and England keeper, the score having been raised to 38, to which Ollerearnshaw contributed 13. H. Dorning, of Falmouth, who was making his debut, was stumped by Levett after making four, and half the side was out for 43 runs in 50 minutes. Casley, of Mullion, another newcomer, fell a victim to Lewis, the slow left-hand break bowler, without any addition to the score. Meanwhile Barnes had been batting confidently, although his rate of scoring was slow, but he had done good service in preventing a complete collapse. He was then joined by the popular Cornish skipper, H. Tresawna, who batted impressively, and the pair remained together to the lunch interval, when the score was 86.

On resuming after lunch, Cornwall had a bad spell, Barnes succumbing to Lewis for obstruction, after having been at the wickets for two hours for a well-played innings of 28. In five minutes the three remaining wickets fell for an addition of only seven runs, the innings closing for 93. Tresawna was undefeated for 31, his effort being highly commendable. Blunden claimed five wickets for 30 runs, and Lewis four for 33.

Kent opened with Levett and Sunnocks against the bowling of Kendall and Ollerearnshaw, but the batsmen found run-getting difficult, 16 being reached in 35 minutes. Then there was a double change in the attack, Stephens and Mill going on, and a separation was quickly effected. On Mill's fourth delivery he captured Sunnocks' wicket, Ollerearnshaw accepting a catch. Christopherson, the incoming batsman, fell to the next ball, Barnes bringing off a catch. With two Kent wickets down for 16, the prospects of Cornwall were brightened, and at 27, Levett gave a sharp return to Stephens, who held it. Dinwiddy came to the rescue of the Kent side, and with Lewis as his partner, the score was taken to 70, before Lewis was clean bowled by the Liskeard man. Eight runs later, Simpson, the Kent captain, was run out through a smart bit of fielding by Casley. Soon after the tea interval Dinwiddy's bright knock was brought to a conclusion by Stephens, for 31, the score being 108 for six wickets. The collapse of the Kent side was unexpected, the last four wickets producing only six runs, and the innings closed for 114. Stephens bowled well, taking six wickets for 61 runs, and Mill also did well, claiming three for eight in eight overs, four of which were maiden.

Cornwall were 23 runs in arrears when they went in to bat a second time with Barnes and Casley as the opening pair, but the former was quickly disposed of for two runs, with the score at seven. Casley was joined by Chatten, and before the arrears were wiped off, Casley was sent back for six, after having stayed for about half an hour. Rogers again failed to produce a substantial contribution, falling a victim to Ashwell for seven, and five runs later Chatten was caught by Humphreys, or Ashwell, for 15. In the last over for the day Stephens was out l.b.w. to Lewis, and half the side was out for 52 runs, Cornwall being 70 runs on, with five wickets in hand. Scores:—

# CRICKET.

## MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP CORNWALL V. KENT II.

(By our own Reporter).

Cornwall opened their Minor Counties championship matches, on Wednesday morning, when they met Kent II, on the Truro School ground.

TRURO, Thursday. With 29 in hand and five wickets to fall, Cornwall resumed their second innings against Kent II on the Truro School ground this morning.

Stephens was the last man in yesterday, and when play was resumed this morning, Oldernashaw was joined by H. Dorning.

The weather was oppressive, and there were threatening clouds in the sky. There was a most disappointingly small gate.

During the partnership of Oldernashaw and Dorning, who were playing extraordinarily well, the 60 went up. This was an improvement on the previous day's play, when Cornwall's fifth and sixth wickets were down for 45 runs.

The visiting side varied their bowlers. When the home batsmen went in, they faced Blunden, who was sending down fast deliveries, and, on the other hand, Lewis, the tricky bowler, often had the batsmen guessing.

When he had scored 4, Dorning was missed in the slips by Blunden off Lewis.

Oldernashaw scored three nice boundaries through the slips, improving his over-night score of 9 by singles as well. The Kent field was well placed, and although this pair made some pretty strokes all round the wicket, runs were only obtained after the ball had been cleverly placed past the fielders.

After 30 minutes' play, the century was hoisted by a single from Dorning, who a few minutes later had his stumps scattered by Blunden. He had scored 12, whilst Oldernashaw, who had been scoring very freely, had hit up 43 when the partnership was broken, and 48 runs had been put on during the morning.

When, within three runs of his half-century, Oldernashaw was clean bowled by Blunden.

The Pinstone professional had played a faultless innings in getting his 47, but on occasions some well-placed balls by Blunden beat him. It was to one of these deliveries that he eventually succumbed. His innings included eight 4's.

H. Trussawa was joined by J. E. Mill, who did not survive long.

### RAPID RUN-GETTING.

G. H. I. Bickford, the next man in, provided the best entertainment for the game. He went in to hit everything which came his way. One of Blunden's deliveries he sent streaking to the boundary, and an over or so later he hit a magnificent 6 off the same bowler. Lewis's bowling too, he punished, sending was caught by Casey off Mill.

At lunch time they had taken their score to 115 for one wicket.

### ANOTHER BRIGHT INNINGS BY DINWIDDY.

After lunch, a nasty drizzle began to fall, but not enough to stop play. There were three changes in the Cornwall bowler, but Dinwiddy was in one over.

Then Blunden was taken off and Ashwell went on in his place. This proved fatal to Bickford, who, off the first delivery he received from the new bowler, was caught in the slips by Blunden. He had scored 27. It was a very merry innings.

Kent needed 120 to win, when they opened their second innings at 12.45, with W. H. Levett and Sunnocks, who were facing the bowling of J. E. Mill and Oldernashaw. After scoring 6, Levett and Stephens, Kendall, and Dorning all having a turn. J. C. Christopherson was bowled by Kendall for 8. Sunnocks and Dinwiddy got together, and runs came more quickly. Dorning proved expensive, having 10 knocked off his first over. Sunnocks, however, was a victim to Dorning's bowling, being caught by Bickford behind the wicket, when he had scored 20. Dinwiddy played as well as he had done in the first innings, and Simpson was a capital partner.

### KENT WIN BY FIVE WICKETS.

They scored all round the wicket, and the total was soon brought to 100. The partnership was broken at 108, when Simpson was caught in the "country" by Barnes, off Kendall. Their stand produced 49 runs.

Ashwell joined Dinwiddy, and very soon passed Cornwall's total, and won by 5 wickets.

There were two causes why both sides were dismissed so cheaply on Wednesday. The first was that both teams had a bad day, and but for two useful knocks on both sides, the totals would have been considerably smaller. The collapse was also attributable to the soft state of the

wicket following Tuesday night's rain. The wicket began to dry during the day, and made it more difficult for the batsmen. The bats certainly did some funny things, and it was an ideal wicket for Lewis, the Kent slow-bowler, who obtained 4 wickets for 11.

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL ON TOUR

Although Cornwall, to some extent, were unfortunate that rain prevented cricket starting at Tunbridge Wells, on Thursday, compensation was forthcoming on Friday, when the Kent 2nd XI won an exciting match on the stroke of time by one wicket. The loss of the opening day's play, of course, meant that the game looked as a one-day match, but rarely has there been a more exciting, or a more fluctuating game in the Minor Counties' series. To begin with, the Kent captain, upon winning the toss, sent Cornwall in to bat. In view of the saturated state of the pitch, this policy was not surprising, and when, at the end of three-quarters of an hour's batting half the Cornwall side were out for a paltry 37 runs, there was every indication that the visitors would be dismissed for an exceptionally small total. This probably would have been the case had not Kent made a fielding error, going in first wicket down at nine. Dorning having scored three runs with three hits before being bowled, C. Rickard, a young left-handed batsman, of Troon, playing his first innings in a county match for Cornwall, had scored half-a-dozen runs, when he was fortunate enough to be missed by Fagg, a slip. Taking his courage in both hands, Rickard went on, not only to retrieve Cornwall's poor position, but to achieve the distinction of putting together a century—a rare feat in an initial county game. In the end the Cornwall total reached 178, and Kent replied with 179 for nine wickets.

Cornwall's early disasters were brought about by Blunden and Ashwell, two fast bowlers, who were able to make the ball lift in disconcerting fashion on the drying pitch. After the fall of an early wicket, however, Barnes as well as Rogers, contributed to their downfall by attempting to pull perfectly straight balls, to which they failed to connect. Ollerenshaw, too, paid the penalty of being over-ambitious. He hit one beautiful four past cover point, and was caught at slip simply because he attempted to cut a ball pitched outside the off stump. But another left-hander, of Mullion, who was also making his debut went to some pains to play himself in. Suddenly, however, Bax made a rash swipe at a wide ball, and was caught at fine leg.

While these wickets were falling so rapidly, Rickard had been content to confine his activities to defence. Subsequently Fagg stepped into the breach and stayed while an invaluable 45 runs were added for the sixth wicket. At 63, Tresawna played much too late to a splendid ball from E. S. Cole and a run later, Kendall was stumped, eight men being out for 84. Bickford came in to drive hard while scoring 23 out of 45 put on for the ninth partnership, and Mill helped to put on 49 for the last wicket. In taking out his bat for 116, Rickard made his runs out of 167 in two hours and twenty minutes. Equipped with practically every stroke, the drive, pull, cut, and clean hitting to leg, he got the ball to the boundary twenty times.

DRAW AT THE OVAL

BARNES AND ROGERS IN BRILLIANT PARTNERSHIP

After an exciting struggle, Cornwall's match with Surrey 2nd XI, at the Oval, on Monday in the Minor Counties' championship, ended in a draw. Rain, which prevented cricket on Saturday, restricted the game to a one-day match and with the start impossible at noon on Monday, the only hope of a finish was to make runs quickly. Cornwall started badly, losing Dorning and Rickard, who scored a century in the previous match against Kent, with only one run on the board; but thanks to a brilliant partnership between Barnes and Rogers, who put on 117 runs in two hours, Cornwall pulled the game around. Rogers contributed 59 of the runs, hitting three 4's and four 6's. Ollerearnshaw was out the next ball, being l.b.w. to a delivery that was almost a yorker. With the total standing at 133, Barnes was out to a good catch at slip, after having scored 46 runs in two and three-quarter hours. He got the ball to the boundary three times. With Casley and Bax, the two Million batsmen, together, an invaluable 48 runs were added for the sixth wicket. Of these, Casley, who hit hard in front of the wicket, claimed half. CORNWALL STARTLE

WONDERFUL SECOND INNINGS REPLY TO DEVON

Cornwall's astounding recovery against Devon in the second day's play of the Minor Counties' championship match, at Liskeard, will rank as one of the most memorable feats in the annals of the county club. After the poor showing by the Cornishmen on the first day, when they were 179 runs behind their opponents, being thus compelled to follow on, only a super-optimist would have predicted such a startling turn in the trend of the play. When the game resumed on Saturday, the Cornishmen fought back in glorious style, registering the huge score of 391 runs, and setting Devon to knock up 213 to win, which they failed to accomplish, and the game resulted in a draw.

The failure of the Cornishmen on Friday was a bitter disappointment, particularly after the fighting displays they put up against Kent 2nd XI, and Surrey 2nd XI, on tour. The Devonians had no difficulty in compiling 256 runs, the Cornish attack lacking sting, and it was early apparent that the absence of fast bowlers such as J. E. Mill (Camborne) and C. H. Kendall (Truro), on a wicket that would have suited them, was acutely felt. No fault could be found with the fielding by the Cornishmen, many smart pieces of work being applauded and scarcely any runs were given away through faulty handling. One could not fail to admire the heroic way in which the bowlers stuck to their task, but on the whole it was not up to county standard, and the last wicket pair gave as much trouble as some of the earlier batsmen, putting on 32 runs.

It is obvious that the attack will have to be stiffened if Cornwall are to put up a creditable show in their remaining engagements. Much comment was heard regarding the exclusion of Kendall, who is generally regarded as one of Cornwall's best products as a fast bowler. In club cricket Kendall has a splendid record, but in county engagements this season he has not so far met with the same degree of success in taking wickets. His ability cannot be disputed, and general surprise was expressed when it became known that he had been omitted from the Cornish side. One thing the game revealed was that Cornwall did not have a bowler with anything like the pace of the Devon fast bowlers, there being no chances of the dismissal of the Devon batsmen as are usual against fast bowling. Not a single appeal for a catch behind the wicket or for obstruction was made during the Devon innings. A different tale was told when Cornwall were batting, there being three successful appeals for catches behind the wicket, and two for obstruction. That the selectors have difficulty in building up a team to fill the gaps occasioned by the dropping out of seasoned players like Tresawna, Shaw, Bickard, and Whiting is generally recognised, but one of the best ways of doing it is by perseverance. All young players do not acquire the temperament for county cricket as soon as they find their way into the side, and perseverance must surely be a principle to be applied. Many of the stars in first-class cricket to-day were "rubbies" not long ago, and even when first-rate men fail to live up to their reputation in every match they are not dropped. One feels that some of the troubles being encountered by Cornwall to-day is due to the dropping of young players with promise who did not immediately jump into the forefront.

Devon's Sound Batting

Devon occupied the wickets for 44 hours, and the Cornishmen had a tiring time in the field, and it must have been a relief to them when the last Devon wicket dropped. The opening pair, Seldon and Thosoby, were in no hurry at the start being content to play themselves in, and after 30 minutes they appeared well set, but a sparkling one-hand catch taken well down by Rickard, disposed of Seldon, who had made 10 out of a total of 18. Two runs later Thosoby was sent back, Austin bringing off an easy catch off Stephens, in his first over. The hopes of the Cornishmen rose high, but they failed to keep up a sequence of quick separations, Hoare and Emmett became associated, and carried the score to 111 before the third wicket fell, after one hour and 45 minutes. The pair were playing with extreme ease and confidence, and just as it looked as if they were inseparable, Ollerearnshaw bowled

Hoare with a snorter. Hoare had contributed 36, the partnership yielding 91 runs. This was followed by another wicket falling after five runs had been added, Hollingworth being bowled by Stephens, and at the lunch interval four wickets were down for 116 runs.

On resuming after lunch, the Devonians continued their happy career with Emmett and Carroll, and the former quickly reached his half-century, and with the total at 174, his innings was brought to a conclusion after making 64, Rickard bringing off another nice catch. Smith was returned without scoring, but Carroll continued to score freely by some strong pulling to leg, and he reached his half-century, but when he had made 64, he was nearly caught by Austin, off Beecher Williams. Eight wickets were down for 212, and the ninth dropped at 224, but the last wicket pair caused trouble, putting on 32 runs more before the innings was brought to a close at 256.

Disaster early overtook Cornwall when they went out to reply to the Devon total, with Barnes and Cory as the opening pair. With only nine runs on the board, Cory was out l.b.w. to Hollingworth. Rickard, who joined Barnes, gave promise of good things, scoring freely, and 46 was reached before Barnes was brilliantly caught in the slips by Smith. There was despair when George Rogers was sent back after the second ball was delivered to him, the umpire upholding an appeal for a catch behind the wicket, but Rogers walked back to the pavilion evidently surprised and displeased and this was shared by the spectators. Rickard was bowled by Turl after a single had been added, his contribution being a valuable 33. Fairweather made a short stay, succumbing to a catch behind the wicket, and in fifty minutes five Cornish batsmen were back in the pavilion for 49 runs. Bax and Ollerearnshaw attempted to stop the rot, displaying extreme caution, and put on 13 runs before Bax was out l.b.w. to Churchill. The last three men were easy prey, and the innings closed for the paltry total of 77 runs in just under 14 hours.

Cornwall Retrieve Position

After their dismal failure on Friday, Cornwall made an astonishing recovery and acquitted themselves in admirable style, on Saturday, and succeeded in effecting a draw. This result came as a great surprise to the Cornish supporters, especially those who felt that it was not worth while to put in appearance on the Liskeard ground, on Saturday, anticipating that the game would be terminated before lunch, and that the most Cornwall could hope for was to avert an innings defeat. Forced to follow on, 179 runs in arrears, Cornwall had a stiff task, but they were easy prey, and demonstrated that their cheap dismissal on the previous day was not a true reflex of their batting ability. The Devon bowlers who ran through the Cornishmen in the first innings came in for a trouncing, and runs were put on at such a rate that Devon's vision of victory vanished. The Cornishmen reached their highest total for many years, wiping off the 179 arrears, and setting Devon to obtain 213 to win in about two hours. This the Devonians failed to accomplish, and when stumps were drawn after a full day's play, they had collected 106 for the loss of four wickets, the game resulting in a draw.

Cornwall started their second venture with George Rogers and Cory, who showed a determination to atone for their quick dismissal in the first innings by putting on 90 runs in the first hour. This pair defied the Devon bowlers, who were floored, and they looked capable of keeping up that rate of scoring, but with the total at 96, a separation was effected, Cory being stumped by Carroll, off Emmett, a slow bowler, after he had contributed 32. Being joined by the smart young Troon batsman, C. Rickard, who was top scorer on the previous day, Rogers continued to amuse at the bowling in amazing fashion, and topped his century before lunch, by which time the arrears had been wiped off and the home county were 57 runs on, with four wickets down. Rickard and Barnes were both out for 17 a-piece, and Rogers' glorious innings terminated when he had reached 108, French capturing his wicket. The power of the home county was by no means exhausted, for G. H. I. Bickford, who was capturing the side in the absence of Tresawna, and his club mate, R. Stephens, did extremely well, the former collecting 51 and the latter 40. Austin, the Falmouth pro., also pulled their weight, the professional being undefeated for 55, and Williams made 24. O. E. R. Bax, of Mullion, and formerly of Truro Cathedral School, batted nicely for 27, and Ollerearnshaw and Fairweather made 12 and 10 respectively. The innings closed for 391 runs, a truly meritorious feat.

Devon were thus confronted with a position they least expected, needing 213 runs to obtain a victory which had seemed within their easy grasp on the previous day, but they had only two hours in which to bat. They started off at a fair pace, but afterwards plus came slowly, the Cornish bowling being accurate, and the fielding was smart. It was obvious that the Devonians had

abandoned their hope of winning, and that they were content with a draw. Four wickets dropped for 106 runs when the game was terminated in a draw, and the Cornishmen were praised for their wonderful recovery. Scores.—

That they meant to try was shown by the first two batsmen, Seldon and Thoseby, who collected 20 in quick time, but against Williams they could not force the pace, and the Cornish fielding was very keen. Gradually all hope of a sporting half hour at the end to wind up a keen display passed and the game ended tamely with Devon 107 behind with four wickets down.

The day's cricket opened with Rogers, the Camborne pro., hunting for runs, which naturally entailed taking risks, but it came off, and he reached his century in 30 minutes, and was unlucky to play on shortly after. S. L. Stephens scored all round the wicket in collecting 40. Bickford showed some of his old hitting powers in adding 59 with Austin, and the final touch was provided with Beecher Williams, who first tried to keep his end up for Austin but when he got a sight of the ball hit two 8's and three 4's with five strokes.

Finally Devon were fighting with their backs to the wall, and although they claimed the points for their first innings lead, Cornwall's fine recovery entitled them to an equal share of the praise for the excellent sport provided. Scores:—

CORNWALL TRIUMPH

DEVON SOUNDLY BEATEN AT DEVONPORT

Devon and Cornwall staged their return fixture in the Minor Counties' Competition, at Devonport, on Friday and Saturday, in ideal conditions. The cricket was in perfect order, the game ending in the first five minutes of the extra half-hour allotted for a definite decision, Devon being set the formidable task of scoring 309 in the last innings, and failing by the margin of 109.

Winning the toss, and taking first knock, Cornwall were given a splendid start by the opening pair, Cory and G. Rogers, who early settled down with scoring shots all round the wicket. The Devon attack, despite various changes, failed to effect a separation until Cory was well taken in the slips when ten runs short of the century. The newcomer, Rickard, was run out as the result of a misunderstanding, the lunch interval arriving with Cornwall in the comfortable position of 153 for the loss of three wickets. Restarting, the position was dominated by George Rogers, who completed his century with a full-blooded shot for six, and went gallily on, until eventually dismissed for a sparkling 158, including four 6's and sixteen boundaries, completed in a trifle under three hours. Harry, the Redruth player, collected a useful 32 on his first appearance for the county, the innings closing for the hefty total of 327. Lieut. Myburgh, also a new comer to county cricket, secured four wickets for 39 runs, and J. Poynder rendered effective support with three for 57.

Devon were early in trouble, Ollerearnshaw being the chief factor in half the side being out for 45. Eight wickets were down for 79 when the arrival of Myburgh heralded a partnership with Seldon that carried the score along to 145, and close of play, without further loss. Resuming on Saturday, both players experienced the similar fate of being snappd behind the wicket of Ollerearnshaw, for a few additional runs, the venture ending shortly after for 161. Ollerearnshaw, evasive in flight and skilful variation of pace, was the chief factor of Devon's small score, with six wickets for 43 runs. Mill and Harry shared the remainder at a cost of 63 and 31 respectively.

Heading to bat again in place of forcing its follow on, Cornwall did none too well at their second attempt, Rogers early falling a victim for obstruction, Cory defended stubbornly and with a further two wickets lost with the score at 23, the situation improved with useful contributions by Austin and Fairweather. Repeating his first innings performance, Harry was again to the fore in carrying his bat for 32, sharing a short and merry stand with Mill for the last wicket, that carried the score to 142.

Entering the task of 309 for victory, with four hours' play remaining, Devon failed at any stage to be on top of the bowling, and any hopes definitely faded out with the return to the pavilion of the home skipper, Carroll, and half the side out for 110. As in the first innings, Seldon again proved the sweet anchor of his side with a valuable contribution of 73, the only other player to offer serious resistance to the well-varied attack being C. Poynder, with 47, who was last out, with the score board reading one short of two hundred. Of the five bowlers tried, Mill was the most successful with five for 61. Austin took three for 41, and Harry two for 38. Scores:—

DORSET ON TOP

CORNWALL BEATEN BY AN INNINGS AT WEYMOUTH

In their Minor Counties' championship match with Dorset, on the Weymouth College ground, on Monday and Tuesday, Cornwall were defeated by an innings and 11 runs. Dorset were infinitely the superior side, both in batting and bowling. In reply to Dorset's first innings total of 424, Cornwall replied with 165 and 228. Against very steady bowling and excellent fielding, Dorset had to fight hard for runs on Monday, and particularly during the morning, when the Cornish bowlers were definitely on top. Ollerearnshaw, Mill, Austin, and Harry all kept an accurate length, and runs came at a very slow rate. However, the foundations of a big score were laid by Lieut. J. N. **CORNWALL V. DORSET**

After a blank first day the Minor Counties Championship match between Cornwall and Dorset opened at Camborne on Saturday. The wicket was still rather soft and the weather was dull.

On Friday there was no play as the wicket was too wet.

Cornwall won the toss, and Bickford elected to give the home team first knock. Cory (W. D.) and Rogers (G.) opened the bowling of Tindall and Harrison. Cornwall made a bad start, and with the first ball of the match Tindall clean bowled Cory, who played too late to an in-swinging yorker.

Harrison bowled well to Rogers who was joined by S. Stephens. Rogers opened the scoring with a nice drive off Harrison and Stephens glided a good one past fine leg. A full-toss on the leg from Tindall went to the boundary. Then Rogers pulled Harrison to the leg boundary and sent up the first ten.

Rogers was missed in the slips when he scored 12 but made no mistake in hitting Harrison for a six.

Considering the soft wicket, Tindall was getting a good pace, but Stephens got him away past fine leg for four, and Rogers hit Harrison for the boundary past cover-point.

The spectators gasped when Rogers again tried to pull Harrison, but skied the ball. Two fielders raced for it, but neither could reach it.

Fifty runs were up in forty minutes—not bad going. Here the first bowling change was made through Harrison being taken off and Brockway taking his place. Rogers was doing most of the scoring, Stephens was doing very well and sent up the fifty by driving Brockway for four.

When he had scored 34, Rogers had a life. He nicked the ball from Tindall into slips, but Tovey missed an easy catch. Rogers drove Brockway for 4, and on the next delivery hit him to the off boundary. He lifted the next one, but Tovey running in from the boundary, just failed to get it.

After an hour's batting, Cornwall had scored between 70 and 80 runs. Paul and Fawcus took over from Tindall and Brockway. These two kept the batsmen quiet, but Stephens sent up the hundred after 75 minutes' play. One run later Rogers hit out at Fawcus, and was well caught by White, who was fielding in the deep. Rogers had played a good innings of 66, and had played a great part in bringing the game around. His total included nine fours and a six. His stand with Stephens produced 101 runs.

Shortly after K. Hosking came in, Stephens drove Pawle along the ground to the boundary, and Hosking opened his account with a boundary off Fawcus. Another delivery from Fawcus, Hosking hit for a four, and the next ball he hit clean out of the ground near the pavilion. Fawcus had his revenge when the score was at 142, for Hosking, after being missed in the country, was caught by Tindall off Fawcus.

Ollerearnshaw joined Stephens, who was still batting confidently, and 150 appeared after play had been in progress 105 minutes. Stephens reached his fifty with a nice cut through the slips. Pawle was replaced by Tindall. Ollerearnshaw edged a short one, but the ball was dropped in the slips. The Penzance professional got two boundaries off Tindall with powerful drives.

Fawcus eventually secured Stephens' wicket by getting him caught off his own bowling. The score-board then read 177-4-69. Rickard joined Ollerearnshaw, and with the score at 180, lunch was taken.

After lunch wickets fell quickly. In the first over, Rickard was taken at cover by Harrison, of Fawcus, when he had scored 2, while H. Bond hit his wicket off his first ball, the bowler again being Fawcus. Ollerearnshaw was next out, nicking a ball from Fawcus into Elderton's hands behind the wickets. Thus three wickets had fallen for the addition of only 8 runs. Harry joined Bradley, who was driving well. Bradley hit Fawcus for a six, and the pair took the score to 200, and just after, Harry was out to a catch. Bradley had a useful innings of 25, when he played on, and off the next ball Bickford was caught behind the stumps off Tindall.

The last six Cornish wickets fell within a half-an-hour after lunch, the innings closing for 217.

Fawcus had the best analysis of the Dorset bowlers, taking 7 wickets for 68 runs, while Tindall took 3 for 30.

**DORSET'S INNINGS.**

Dorset opened their innings with E. J. Freeman and Brockway. Ollerearnshaw bowled the first over for Cornwall, and Freeman got one run. With the last ball of the over, Ollerearnshaw hit Brockway's middle stump with a beautiful ball. J. E. Mill bowled at the other end. R. G. Tindall, the Oxford Blue, opened well, and drove Ollerearnshaw to the off boundary, but he had a bit of luck a few balls later, when he skied one just over the slips' heads, while Freeman played back a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and despite a sprint by Rogers, the Camborne man just failed to get to the ball. Tindall pulled a short one from Mill to the boundary but in the next over he got his leg in front of a straight ball from Ollerearnshaw and was given out. The second wicket fell at 17, and then C. L. Fawcus came in.

With the score at 30, Freeman drove Ollerearnshaw, for a couple of boundaries in one over, and Mill also had two fours knocked off him in his next over. Stephens took the ball from Ollerearnshaw, and in his first over Fawcus hit him to square-leg and he was well caught by Hosking. Forty-three runs had been scored when G. White joined Freeman, and Harry took over from Mill. The Dorset pair were batting steadily, but a marvellous catch at square-leg by Mill got rid of Freeman, who had batted in excellent style for 38. The score-board read 64-4-38. Capt. Busk went to the wicket, and Harry gave way to Bradley. Busk and White raised the total to 100. The runs kept steadily creeping up, but at 107 Ollerearnshaw pitched one well up, and White hit it into the safe hands of Cory at cover point. The score at the fall of the fifth wicket was 107, and two balls later Busk was caught by Rogers off Ollerearnshaw, after making 19.

Ollerearnshaw with his first ball after the tea interval, caught and bowled Tovey, the score-board reading 102-7-1. Mill was bowling at the other end, and Elderton and Morris were batting steadily.

The score was creeping up, but at 107 knocking back Morris's off stump, the total then being 118. Pawle joined his captain, but in Ollerearnshaw's next over he was clean bowled, and the Penzance pro. also bowled Harrison, and finished the innings.

Ollerearnshaw was in fine form with the ball, taking 7 wickets for 44.

Cornwall gained five points for their win on the first innings, and altered their batting order for the second innings. Bond and Rickard opened, and at 19, after Bond had hit Tindall for a nice four, Tindall clean bowled him. Stephens was caught and bowled by Pawle with the score at 49, and Bradley hit a boundary and was then caught and bowled by Harrison—a stinging, one-handed catch. Rickard made some nice square cuts, and hit Harrison out of the field. When he had made 33, he was out to a fine catch low down, by Brockway off Pawle's bowling. K. Hosking and Harry got together and the score began to mount.

Harry made some nice shots behind the wicket, and Hosking hit Harrison for six from two successive balls.

Morris relieved Harrison, and Tovey went on in the place of Pawle, nine being knocked off the latter's first over, and Harry put Morris over the hedge.

A shower of rain stopped play at about 12.45, but the game was resumed just before one o'clock, when Wilson faced the bowling of Mill. The Cornborne bowler appealed for lbw., but it was disallowed.

Ollerearnshaw was bowling well, and had Wilson in difficulties. He missed the first two balls of the over, and the third ball shattered his stumps. Wilson had batted well for nearly an hour and a half, and scored 39 runs.

The second wicket fell for 68 runs. Cook, the Surrey skipper, was next man in, and off his first ball tried a short run. Ollerearnshaw raced for it, and threw in to Bickford, who whipped the balls off, but Cook just managed to get back in time. Cook did not stay very long, for after making 5 he missed a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and was well-stumped by Bickford.

Three wickets had fallen for 78 when Fishlock joined Whitfield. In Ollerearnshaw's next over, Whitfield got his leg in front of a straight one, and was given out, after making 25. Two balls later Crouch played a ball down, and the ball hit the wicket.

This was Ollerearnshaw's fourth wicket, for a cost of only 20 runs. His first 9 overs produced only 3 runs, and 7 of the 9 overs were maidens. When lunch was taken, the score was 79 for 5 wickets.

In the third over after lunch the sixth wicket fell. Mill was bowling to Bartlett, who made only 4 when Mill clean bowled him. Fishlock hit a ball from Mill to square leg, but it was too fast for Cory. Rogers was applauded for some good fielding, and then Owen hit a couple of fours to send up the 100 at 2.45 p.m.

Soon after, Stephens took over from Mill, but Fishlock and Owen scored steadily, if slowly.

Ollerearnshaw gave way to Bradley, and Fishlock hit a boundary off his second ball. Eight runs came from boundary byes, and Owen nicked a four through the slips off Bradley, and a couple of balls later was hit on the body when trying to hook Bradley to leg. Runs were coming quickly now, and Fishlock hit boundaries from two successive balls from Stephens.

Ollerearnshaw brought off a smart one-handed pick-up in the slips. Harry went on at Stephens' end, and Fishlock promptly hit him to leg for four, to send up 100, and a couple of balls later hit a six, the ball going into the grandstand. Both the batsmen were scoring on the leg side, and now that Ollerearnshaw and Mill were off, the Cornish bowling did not have much sting behind it. Boundaries were coming quickly, and Fishlock reached his 50 with a straight drive to the boundary off Harry. In the same over he hit a ball clean out of the field.

The partnership between Owen and Fishlock produced 100 runs in about an hour.

Two hundred runs appeared on the board when two successive balls from Harry were sent to the boundary.

last Bradley was taken off, and Ollerearnshaw was put on while Mill took over from Harry, and stopped a hot drive from Owen.

Not long after this, Owen lifted a ball from Ollerearnshaw, who jumped for it. It was too high for the Penzance pro. to reach, but Cory was fielding deeper and brought off a fine catch. Owen had scored 50, and he and Fishlock had brought the total from 84 to 219—a fine effort.

Fishlock did not stay long after Owen's dismissal, for he fell to a fine catch at mid-on by Stephens, off the bowling of Mill. He had played a very fine innings for his 74, and Surrey owed a great deal to him and Owen. When Fishlock left the score was 231 for eight wickets. Mill was stopping some stinging returns. Williams made 11 and then cocked up a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and was caught by Stephens, who ran in. Surrey's tail was getting runs, and Maxwell and Gamble were together quite a while. Fairweather put in a nice bit of fielding.

The score at the tea interval was 287 for 9, and off the second ball on the re-summation, Maxwell was out to a fine running catch by Fairweather, off Mill's bowling. Maxwell had scored 23, and Gamble 11 no out.

### CORNWALL'S INNINGS.

Cornwall were faced with a score of 280 when Cory and Rogers opened the innings, to the bowling of Gamble and Maxwell. Gamble was "no-balled" twice, and soon twenty appeared on the board. At about 5.20 a heavy shower drove the players into the pavilion, and it was 5.55 before play could be re-started, and in the first over Gamble delivered a "no-ball." Both were getting runs through the slips, and thirty runs had been scored at 6 o'clock, when Cory survived an appeal for leg-before. Rogers got Maxwell away to the leg boundary, and only a smart piece of fielding prevented Cory from square-cutting Gamble to the boundary.

Crouch took over the ball from Maxwell, and his first ball, a very short one, Cory pulled to the boundary, and did the same by the third ball—another short one. This sent the 40 up.

In an over from Gamble, Cory sent up the 50 with a boundary on the leg side, and for the fifth time Gamble was "no-balled." With the score at 55, Rogers hit out at Crouch and was well caught by Cook, after making 16.

S. Stephens partnered Cory who got Gamble away to leg. Gamble was taken off in favour of Owen, a slow left-hand spin bowler, and Gamble went on at the other end, relieving Crouch. With his first ball he knocked back Stephens' off-stump. The second wicket fell for 66, Stephens making four. In the same over Gamble shattered Hosking's wicket, but it was a "no-ball."

### SECOND DAY

The sun was shining brightly when Cornwall resumed their first innings against Surrey second eleven at St. Clare, Penzance, on Tuesday morning. Surrey made 280 on Monday, and Cornwall's overnight total was 70 for 2 wickets.

Cory had 33 not out and Hosking 2 not out. Within ten minutes both of them were out, with only 8 added to the total. Hosking got a couple of nice shots through slips off Gamble, but was

caught by Maxwell at mid-on, off Owen's bowling. Two runs later, Cory returned one straight to Gamble, who brought off a grand catch. Thus four wickets had fallen for 78, of which Cory had contributed a valuable 36.

Rickard and Ollerearnshaw got together, and Rickard had a "life" in his first over, being missed by Maxwell in the slips. Owen was taken off, but after Maxwell had one over, he was put on again. By means of singles, Ollerearnshaw and Rickard brought the score to 80, and then Ollerearnshaw drove Owen to the boundary, and at 11.30 Ollerearnshaw sent up 100, with a four off Gamble.

Rickard pulled Owen to the leg boundary, and then twice drove Gamble for four. Maxwell again took over from Owen. Rickard was applauded for a fine square-cut off Gamble, and in the next over from Maxwell, a four by Ollerearnshaw sent up to 120. Just when it looked as if the partnership was going to produce a lot of runs, Gamble ought and bowled Rickard, who had made 21. His partnership with Ollerearnshaw brought the score from 78 to 121, when Fairweather came in. He got Maxwell to the off boundary, and survived an appeal for leg-before.

Ollerearnshaw was batting confidently, and Fairweather brought off a beautiful out through slips.

At 140, Maxwell gave way to Owen, the slow bowler, who, in his first over, had Fairweather caught in the slips by Crouch when he had made 13. Gamble appealed for leg-before against Ollerearnshaw, but it was disallowed.

Before he had opened his score, C. M. Bradley was beaten by a ball from Owen, and it took his balls off. With

his next ball, Owen had Harry caught in the slips by Williams. Owen did not get his "hat-trick" as Mill hit him to leg.

Gamble had been bowling ever since play began in the morning, and was keeping the batsmen very quiet. Ollerearnshaw was still batting well. Mill had a blow on the foot but "skied" Owen for three off the next ball. He was clean bowled by Gamble, however, when he had made 11, and Gamble shattered Bickford's wicket.

Ollerearnshaw batted splendidly for his 33 not out.

It was still raining at tea-time, when it was decided there would be no more play.

### CORNWALL FOLLOW ON.

Cornwall were 118 behind Surrey, and had to follow on. Bickford put Ollerearnshaw in first with Cory, and in Gamble's first over, Ollerearnshaw hit him for four, but had a "life" in the next over from Gamble. Just before 1 o'clock rain began to fall, and stopped play.

**RAIN-SPOILT MATCH.**

**SURREY'S FIRST INNINGS LEAD OVER CORNWALL**

Cornwall's concluding engagement in the Minor Counties' Championship, was played at Penzance, on Monday and Tuesday, when Surrey 2nd XI. provided the opposition. A large crowd witnessed some attractive play, while the match was made more interesting by the fluctuations of the game. Winning the toss, Surrey batted first on a slow wicket, there having been heavy rain during the night and prior to the start, but afterwards the sun shone brilliantly. Surrey lost their first wicket at 20, but Wilson and Whitfield settled down to steady play, and various changes were made in the Cornish attack without effect until 68 was reached. Then Ollerearnshaw got Wilson's wicket with a ball which rose over the bat and stripped off both balls. Cook, the visiting captain, was smartly stumped by Bickford, of Ollerearnshaw, after 10 runs had been added, and before the lunch interval two more wickets fell quickly for an addition of only a single run, and half the side were out for 79.

Cornwall had every reason to be proud of their progress at that stage, and further success came to them soon after the resumption Bartlett being clean bowled by Mill with the score increased by only five runs. The drying effect of the sun, coupled with the tiredness of the Cornish bowlers, had brought about an amazing transformation of Murrey's position. With Owen and Fishlock, a left-handed pair, in command at the wickets, the Cornish bowling was severely punished when Murrey and Bradley went on to relieve Mill and Ollerearnshaw who had borne the brunt of the attack. This pair collected runs with extraordinary ease, hitting strongly all around the wicket, and they looked inseparable. Fishlock twice hit the ball out of the ground, and boundaries on a recently, in about one hour the partnership produced 103 runs, and two successive hits to the boundary by Fishlock, off Harry, brought the score to the double century mark.

The relief bowlers were taken off, Mill and Ollerearnshaw again coming on, and the rate of scoring slackened. With the score at 117, a separation was effected, Cory smartly catching Owen, off Ollerearnshaw, who he had made 56 by enterprising cricket. Fishlock did not stay long, his dismissal being brought about by a nice catch by Stephens, off Mill's bowling, the outgoing batsman having completed 74, which included two 6's and four ones. The score then stood at 231 for eight, but Cornwall's troubles were not over, as the remaining batsmen made a dogged stand, and 250 was reached before the ninth wicket fell. Stephens bringing off another smart catch of Ollerearnshaw's bowling, to send back Williams, Maxwell and Gamble made a prolonged stand for the last wicket, and all attempts to bring the innings to a close before the tea interval were successfully defied, and when tea was taken the score stood at 280 for nine wickets. Off the second ball sent down after the tea interval, a glorious catch by Fairweather, whose fielding throughout the innings was most praiseworthy, disposed of Maxwell for 28. Gamble being not out for 11. The Surrey innings had lasted 4 1/2 hours, and the Cornishmen must have felt greatly relieved when their labours in the field terminated for the day.

Cornwall sent out Cory and Rogers to open their innings against the bowling of Maxwell and Gamble, and they settled down to the task of getting runs in a promising way, the half-century being quickly reached. There were hopes that this pair would remain together until the close of the day's play, but at 55 Rogers succumbed to a catch by Cook, off Crouch, who was brought on to relieve Maxwell. Stephens was next in, and after making four runs, he was clean bowled by Gamble. Rain caused a stoppage of play for about twenty minutes, and when the players again took the field, Hooking was completely beaten by Gamble, who shattered the stumps, but the umpire had called "no ball," this being the sixth time the Surrey speed merchant had been no-balled.

Resuming on Tuesday morning, Cornwall took their overnight score of 70 for two wickets, to 76 before Hooking fell a victim to the slow left-hand break bowler, Owen and two runs later Cory was out to a wonderful one-hand catch by Maxwell, off his own delivery. Cory had made a valuable contribution of 36. With four wickets down for 78, Cornwall were confronted with a stiff task of averting a follow on, but the outlook improved when Ollerearnshaw and Rickard became associated and batted confidently and the century was hoisted after half-an-hour. They proceeded to collect runs at a fair pace, but at 121 the Troon man was caught and bowled by Gamble, his score being 21. Three wickets had fallen in 45 minutes for an addition of 51 runs to the overnight score. Fairweather played prettily, some of his strokes being a treat to watch, and Ollerearnshaw was playing with extreme care, selecting his balls for hard hitting. Cornwall were within 35 runs of the number necessary to escape a follow on, when Fairweather was smartly caught by Crouch, off Owen who, with the two successive balls, captured the wickets of Bradley and Harry, and eight wickets were down for 145. Mill put up a commendable stand, scoring 51 before he was bowled by

Gamble, the score then standing at 158 for nine wickets. Bickford was a short stayer, losing his wicket after scoring two runs, and the innings closed for 162. Ollerearnshaw being not out for 33. The Penzance professional received an ovation for his valuable effort, which saved his side from a complete rout.

Following on 118 runs behind, Cornwall sent in Ollerearnshaw and Cory, but after putting on 10 runs, rain stopped play just before one o'clock. It was hoped that a resumption of play would be possible after the lunch interval but it continued to rain, and soon after 3.30 it was decided to abandon the match, the result being a draw, Surrey taking major points for the first innings lead. CRICKET.

CORNWALL v SURREY 2nd.

Cornwall's match with Surrey second eleven—always a popular fixture with Ponzance cricket lovers—opened at St. Clare ground on Monday morning.

The weather was showery, but the sun was hot when it shone through. Surrey made two changes in their side, Gamble and Fishlock (both of whom have played with the first team) taking the places of Bus and Pierpont.

Surrey won the toss and Cook elected to send Surrey in on an easy wicket.

Wilson and Mobey opened the Surrey innings, and got one each from Ollerearnshaw's first over, and five runs off Mill's first over. Wilson sent up the first ten by hooking Mill to the leg boundary. A ball from Stephens got up awkwardly, and Whitfield cocked it into the air, but Bickford, anticipating something of the kind, ran the wrong side of the wicket. Whitfield, a few balls later, played back a ball from Stephens, but it was just out of his reach. He hit the next ball for four.

Ollerearnshaw went on at Harry's end, and Wilson played him into the slips, but Bradley did not get to it. The half-century went up after an hour's play. Whitfield survived two appeals for leg-before, off Stephens' bowling. Wilson sent up the 60 by hitting a six on the leg side from a short length ball by Ollerearnshaw.

A shower of rain stopped play at about 12.45, but the game was resumed just before one o'clock when Wilson faced the bowling of Mill. The Camborne bowler appealed for lbw., but it was disallowed.

Ollerearnshaw was bowling well, and had Wilson in difficulties. He missed the first two balls of the over, and the third ball shattered his stumps. Wilson had batted well for nearly an hour and a half, and scored 39 runs.

The second wicket fell for 68 runs. Cook, the Surrey skipper, was next man in, and off his first ball tried a short run. Ollerearnshaw raced for it, and threw in to Bickford, who whipped the balls off, but Cook just managed to get back in time. Cook did not stay very long, for after making 6 he missed a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and was well-stumped by Bickford. Three wickets had fallen for 78 when Fishlock joined Whitfield. In Ollerearnshaw's next over, Whitfield got his leg in front of a straight one, and was given out, after making 25. Two balls later Crouch played a ball down, and the ball hit the wicket.

This was Ollerearnshaw's fourth wicket, for a cost of only 20 runs. His first 9 overs produced only 3 runs, and 7 of the 9 overs were maidens. When lunch was taken, the score was 79 for 5 wickets.

In the third over after lunch the sixth wicket fell. Mill was bowling to Bartlett, who made only 4 when Mill clean bowled him.
