**MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.  
DORSET'S GOOD WIN OVER DEVON.**

Despite a gallant effort by Devon in their second innings, Dorset gained a splendid victory in their match at Blandford on Friday and Saturday, in the Minor Counties Championship. Conditions were ideal when Dorset took first knock on Friday, and they compiled a total of 205, of which R. G. Tindall made 62 and F. C. Jarchow 40 (not out) in good style. J. Poynder bowled well for the visitors, keeping a good length with his medium-fast deliveries. Devon were then dismissed for 109, Capt. R. D. Busk, A. M. Harrison, and R. G. Tindall each bowling excellently. Brockway and G. L. Jones opened Dorset's second innings splendidly, and, despite many bowling changes, the score crept up at a good pace. Brockway was at the wickets two and a-quarter hours to compile 124 with some delightful strokes, which included nineteen 4's. Jones was rather steadier in his methods, but he showed great form, and was unfortunate in missing his century by five runs. Thanks to this brilliant opening, Dorset were able to declare at lunch time on Saturday with their total at 209 for seven wickets. Poynder again bowled well. Left to get 396 runs to win in five hours, Devon began badly, losing Captain Wyndham and A. M. Wynns at 14 to Tindall. After that, however, they made a great fight, J. L. Watts compiling a century exactly before he was run out. C. Poynder (60 not out) also made a great effort; but when the last wicket fell Dorset had brought off a capital victory in their opening match by 91 runs. Scores:—

DORSET'S VICTORY.

DEVON LOSE AT BLANDFORD.

**RECORD OPENING PARTNERSHIP.**  
A weakened Devonshire side were defeated by 100 runs at Blandford on Friday and Saturday in a Minor Counties match with Dorset.

The Dorset innings was opened on Friday morning by the Blandford pair, Jones and Brockway. Jones appeared to be very comfortable and played the bowling with some confidence, and it was unfortunate that he should have been out to a rather questionable catch. Emmett was the bowler, and Jones played the ball back down the pitch, and it was generally thought that the catch came up off the ground. Jones, however, ran out and there was no appeal. Bush did not stay long until he was clean bowled by Emmett for seven.

Tindall, the Oxford Blue, saved the situation for Dorset as wickets were falling far too cheaply considering the state of the wicket. He made a very attractive innings of 62, which included a variety of strokes and shots all round the wicket. He and Jarchow made a good stand when runs were needed, and the latter remained undefeated at the end of the innings with 40 not out to his credit. Between them these two players carried the score from 26 for five wickets to 148 before Tindall was caught off J. Poynder. Poynder was the most successful of the Devon bowlers with five wickets for 73 runs. The Dorset innings closed for 205 runs.

**A DISASTROUS OPENING.**

The Devon innings opened disastrously, for after only 14 runs were on the board Captain J. B. R. Windham was clean bowled by Tindall, the Oxford fast bowler, who got his Blue this summer. For the addition of only one run Wynne was given out lbw to the same bowler. W. W. Hoare was clean bowled by Busk at 19, and with the addition of another seven runs Harrison got Emmett caught behind the wickets by Elderton. F. W. Carroll, the Devon captain, then came in and only survived about three balls from Busk when he was caught in the slips by Brockway. With five wickets down for 28 runs it looked as if Dorset might even force a follow on, but the Poynder brothers made a stand of 19 runs, thus advancing the score to 47 for six wickets, and then C. E. H. Poynder and Hollingworth carried the score from 55 to 104 for the seventh wicket. The whole side were out for 109, and left Dorset about an hour to bat before the drawing of stumps.

Jones and Brockway, who opened up again for Dorset, withstood the bowling until the drawing of stumps, when the score was 109 for no wickets.

**RECORD PARTNERSHIP.**

On Saturday morning the pair remained for another hour and half, and scored 232 before being separated, and thus created a record opening partnership for Dorset. Brockway, who reached his hundred in about 2½ hours, then began to hit out, and after scoring five four's with straight drives was caught on the leg side off Hollingworth for 124. Jones was then in the eighties, and played on steadily, while Bush, Tindall, and Tovey lost their wickets. At 95 Jones failed to get hold of a ball, which came up on the leg side, and placed a fairly easy catch into Hoare's hands, who was at square leg. With the total at 299 for seven wickets Dorset declared at the luncheon interval.

**DEVON'S HARD TASK.**

Devon were thus set 395 runs to win and about five hours in which to get them. They again started off badly, and after only four runs were on the board Captain J. B. R. Windham was caught by Bush at cover-point off Tindall's bowling after scoring three runs. At 14 Devon lost another wicket in the same way, when Wynne also fell to a catch by Bush off the same bowler. Hoare offered a little more resistance than his predecessors and batted cautiously for some while. He was then joined by Watts, who showed more confidence and appeared to be getting the ball well in the middle of the bat. Hoare was clean bowled by Jowett after making 26. He had stopped the rot at a very difficult period, and his score was of more value to Devon than its number implies. Watts was joined by Carroll, who after making 11 was given out lbw to Harrison's bowling.

J. S. Poynder and Watts added over 100 runs in a good stand which was full of bright cricket. Neither batsmen took any liberties with the bowling, but picked the right ball to hit and the score rose steadily until Watts was run out completing his hundred. He hit 17 four's. Both Hollingworth and C. E. H. Poynder were stumped by Elderton, who was keeping wicket exceedingly well. When just 100 runs behind French was caught with the score at 285. Scores:—

**DORSET BEATEN.**

**WILTSHIRE'S FIRST INNINGS VICTORY.**

**TWO-DAY MATCH AT SHERBORNE.**  
 Wiltshire defeated Dorset on the first innings in the two-day match at Sherborne on Wednesday and Thursday. The game opened in perfect summer-like weather on a wicket that called for stout-hearted bowlers. Dorset, losing the toss, had to find them, and the Dorset bowlers did remarkably well in getting the Wilts men out for 279, as anything under 300 was a poor score on such a wicket. But for a time Wilts looked like staying in all day and longer, for the third wicket fell only two runs short of 200. For the remainder to fall for a paltry 79 was true evidence of good bowling and fielding. Many runs were saved and few lost, and every stout hit was chased, often successfully, to save the boundary. Harrison was particularly good in the field, and Bastable showed well in the bowling analysis with five wickets for 48.

The Wilts batting opened very slowly, but the hitting was brisker after lunch. Butler had been joined by C. E. Awdry, after Nash had been dismissed, and both began to hit boundaries and 3's. The Dorset skipper had re-arranged his field. Butler fell into a very nice little trap when he lofted one, and was caught by Jarchow well away towards the boundary. Just previously Capt. Busk, from his own bowling, got the tips of his fingers to a hot return from Butler, but it was too high and went for three.

Neither Wheeler nor Lloyd stayed long, and the fifth wicket fell at 234. With only three added, Forrester was declared lbw after an appeal that seemed to come from the heart of a Dorset fielder. Bastable beat A. L. Awdry with a beautiful length ball. Smith (J.) hit a six into a garden of cabbages adjoining the ground.

Dorset went in at 5.20 and put 57 on the board without loss.

**DORSET OPEN SLOWLY.**

The conditions continued to be ideal when Dorset resumed their innings on Thursday morning. They opened slowly, and it took an hour to add 16 runs. Brockway's was the first wicket to fall after nearly two hours' play, with only 73 runs on the board. Capt. Busk then joined Freeman, and infused a little life by hitting two boundaries. Dorset was five runs short of the hundred when his wicket was speedily taken by Smith (W.). With his score at 48 Freeman snicked one into Butler's hands at 51, but it was dropped, and Freeman reached his 50 after batting two hours and 35 minutes.

C. E. Awdry, at fine leg, took a quick, low catch to dismiss Tindall. Three wickets were gone for 117, but Dorset partisans still hoped that on such a perfect wicket the Wilts total would be passed. Smith (J.) had been trying hard to beat Freeman, and, following a no-ball, he did eventually beat him after Freeman had been batting exactly three hours. Capt. Goff hit a no-ball from Smith (W.) to the boundary, and was caught next ball, and Jarchow was sent back by Smith (J.) without scoring.

Tovey briskly hit two boundaries and three threes before going lbw to Sydee. Morris hit into the cabbage patch, where Smith (J.) put out the previous day, and it was lost for a time. With the score at 176, the Dorset skipper snicked one to the boundary and saved the follow-on. Two balls later he was clean bowled, and the Dorset innings closed after four hours and five minutes' play.

**WILTSHIRE'S LEAD.**

With 98 runs lead Wilts began their second innings confidently, and Nash knocked up a bright and gacy 68 in 90 minutes before being caught by Goff with the score at 126. This was the third wicket to fall, Tindall having left at 31 and C. E. Awdry at 121. Only one run was added when Smith (J.) lashed out and was brilliantly caught by Brockway standing five yards inside the boundary.

The Wilts innings was declared closed, leaving Dorset to score 226 runs to win, and 2½ hours play remaining. Scores:—

DORSET V. CORNWALL.

After their magnificent victory over Monmouth, Dorset commenced their second match of the Weymouth Cricket Week on Monday, when they met Cornwall on the Weymouth College Ground in beautifully fine weather.

The wicket again proved fast when E. J. Freeman and Lieut. J. M. Carter, who both played a brilliant innings in the last match, opened Dorset's innings to the bowling of Ollerearnshaw and Mill. The first wicket fell with the score at 63, Freeman getting his leg in front of a straight ball from Mill.

Runs had been coming slowly, but Carter continued to bat well, and the score slowly improved. After one and a-half hour's play the score reached 82. The fielding by the Cornwall team was splendid, and little was given away. A lovely straight drive to the boundary by Brockway sent 100 up. Brockway reached his 50 with a boundary off Cory. The scoring improved considerably, Brockway with two 4's sending the 200 up. Shortly after this the partnership between Lieut. Carter and Brockway, which had yielded 170 runs, was broken, Brockway being cleverly caught low down by Mill.

Dorset's batsmen continued to do well, R. G. Tindall scoring 27, G. White 40, and M. B. S. Bower 34. Their magnificent innings came to a close shortly before six o'clock with the total at 424. During his stay of just over five hours at the wicket Lieut. Carter hit 19 fours and one six in his splendid total of 150. His was a fighting innings, and he fully deserved his second successive century in county cricket. Dorset, although they compiled almost as many runs, found Cornwall to be much more formidable opponents than Monmouthshire. The bowling and fielding, except for one or two rather bad misses, of the Cornish men were excellent, and for long periods in the morning Dorset's opening batsmen were kept on the defensive by some particularly fine bowling. Ollerearnshaw, Mill, Austin, and Harry all kept a splendid length, and the fielding was exceptionally clean.

Cornwall opened their innings with half-an-hour left for play, Tresawna, their veteran captain, and Bax facing the attack of Tindall and Busk. Tresawna took a couple of fours off Tindall, but with his score at 11 he was dismissed with a brilliant catch by Tovey in the slips off Tindall's bowling. Bax was then partnered by Fairweather. After bowling only one over Busk was relieved by Foot. Neither batsmen was comfortable against the fast deliveries of Tindall, and Fairweather was quickly back in the pavilion. He nicked a fast one and Brockway, fielding behind the wicket, made a fine low catch. Bax batted with the utmost caution and was content to score with an occasional single. Tindall was in great form with the ball, and with barely a minute left for play he completely beat Harry with a "yorker." Cornwall had thus lost three wickets for 25 runs, Tindall's analysis at the close of the day being 3 for 13.

Ideal weather, a large attendance, and excellent cricket—all the ingredients which make a game delightful to look upon—were in evidence when the match was continued on Tuesday. Having lost three wickets overnight for 25 runs and still requiring 300 runs to avoid the follow-on Cornwall were faced with an innings defeat. Bax and Cory resumed batting, but neither were very comfortable against the bowling of Tindall, who threatened to dismiss the side for a moderate total. He completely beat Cory with the fifth ball of the first over of the day. The fielding of the Dorset men reached a high standard, and runs came at a slow rate. Ollerearnshaw was batting soundly and was the only batsman to shape confidently. Other wickets fell cheaply, but he carried out his bat for a valuable 38, which included a mighty drive off Harrison's bowling for a six, the ball pitching in a garden. The innings closed at about 12.30 for 165.

Ten minutes later Cornwall were again batting, having to follow on 259 runs in arrears. Lunch was taken with the score at 23 for 0. Cornwall had changed the batting order to that of the first innings, Cory and Rogers having opened the second knock. When Rogers had score 31 he was bowled by Tindall, and Cory left soon after as the result of a brilliant catch by Tovey off the same bowler. A stand followed

between Rickard and Ollerearnshaw, and both batsmen looked to be well set, especially Rickard, a stylish left-hander. With his score at 19, however, he was out lbw to Harrison, who at this stage had sent down ten overs for only 20 runs. The 100 went up after one and a-quarter hours' play. Foot relieved Tindall, and at 120 Brockway came on for Harrison. After a few overs Tindall came back again after Austin had been beautifully caught by Tovey off Foot. Fairweather partnered Ollerearnshaw and these two put on 41 for the fifth wicket. After hitting up 35 Ollerearnshaw was caught by Foot, and without addition to the score Fairweather was brilliantly stumped by Elderton. Tindall also took the wickets of Bax and Harry. Cornwall made a great effort to avoid the innings defeat, and when Tresawna and Bickford became associated there was a possibility that they might do so. Tea was taken at 4.15 with the total at 200 for eight. Without any addition to the score Bickford was caught by Busk, with the second ball after tea off Harrison. There was an attendance of close on 400 people on the picturesque Dorchester Grammar School Ground on Thursday evening to see the final match for the Dorchester and District Evening League "Knock-out" Cup competition, in which the finalists were Dorchester Territorial Club and West Stafford. The pitch was in splendid condition, and reflected great credit on the School groundsman, Mr. B. Morris. The "Terriers" had already won the Evening League cup and miniatures, and they were, therefore, most anxious to bring off the double; but there was some doubt of their ability to do this through the fact that only the week previous West Stafford had beaten them in a League match. This, of course, added greatly to the interest of the final. **DORSET'S SMASHING WIN OVER MONMOUTH.**

**TINDALL'S DAZZLING CENTURY**

Real holiday cricket was seen in the Minor Counties Championship match between Dorset and Monmouth, which opened Weymouth Cricket Week on the Weymouth College ground on the eve of the Bank Holiday.

Dorset batsmen piled up 456 runs during Friday morning and afternoon, and then captured nine Monmouthshire wickets for 94.

Dorset gained an easy victory, by an innings and 201 runs, early on Saturday afternoon.

E. J. Freeman and J. M. Carter put on 60 runs in 35 minutes, 100 in 70 minutes, and 180 in two hours for the first wicket. Freeman hit two sixes and 12 fours, and Monmouth had much cause to regret while he was playing this brilliant cricket that he was missed at 25 when he nicked a full toss to first slip.

**TINDALL'S CENTURY IN 90 MINUTES.**

Carter, who once touched a fast ball that grazed the off stump without dislodging the ball, went on to complete a dazzling century in 145 minutes. R. G. Tindall, the Oxford University athlete, was in fine form at his first appearance for Dorset this season. He and Carter added 113 for the third wicket in 53 minutes by a variety of drives and pulls. Tindall reached his hundred in 90 minutes—as fine a piece of batting as has been seen in a county match for some time.

Tindall also distinguished himself with the ball. During the match he took six wickets.

CORNWALL DEFEATED BY INNINGS.

OLLEREARNSHAW'S MIGHTY HIT.

Weymouth Cricket Week concluded on Tuesday, when Dorset brought off their second successive victory by an innings. Cornwall were beaten by an innings and 31 runs, having lost 17 wickets for 368 runs.

While they did better in their second innings—they followed on 250 runs in arrears—their batting on an easy pitch did not come up to expectations. Ollerearnshaw was the most outstanding batsman; he followed up his 38 not out in the first innings with 35, and he was top scorer in both innings. He had a very good match, seeing that he took four Dorset wickets.

Ollerearnshaw made one of the biggest hits seen on the ground for years. He drove Harrison out of the field, the ball landing in an avenue, and narrowly missing a motor delivery van.

Tindall was the best Dorset bowler, his match figures being ten wickets for 123 runs.

CARTER'S SECOND CENTURY.

Lieut. J. N. Carter, of the Dorset Regiment, who knocked up 134 against Monmouth on Friday, made another century on Monday, and was associated in a big partnership with Brockway for the second wicket.

After Freeman had left when the half-century was reached, Carter and Brockway put on 170 runs. Carter was missed at 148, Cory failing to take a fast return from his own bowling.

Brockway survived several confident appeals for lbw before he was brilliantly caught low down with the left hand by Mill. Tindall, the Oxford Blue, is a free-scoring batsman, and Cornwall did well to get rid of him for 27.

The rate of scoring improved after tea.

Carter batted 5 hours for his 159, and scored one 6 and nineteen 4's.

DORSET BATSMEN FAIL.

A splendid 59 by R. G. Tindall, the Oxford University "Blue," saved the Dorset eleven's first innings from complete failure on Wednesday at Bemerton. After winning the toss they lost six wickets for 22, the batsmen appearing completely at sea against the fast and accurate bowling of Smith (J.) and C. E. Awdry. Tindall was missed before he had scored, but he batted very finely. M. B. Elderton held an end up whilst 32 were added for the seventh wicket, and C. J. C. P. Jowett made an attractive 20. The innings closed for 101, Smith (J.) taking five wickets for 46 and C. E. Awdry four wickets for 51. Wiltshire batted more consistently, but with nine wickets down they led by only 46 runs. Then Smith (J.) commenced to flog the bowlers, and in half an hour scored 82 runs, including six tremendous drives, which cleared the boundary, and nine fours. He was finally bowled, and Wiltshire led by 116 runs. Before play closed for the day Dorset had lost seven wickets for 193 runs in their second knock.

On Thursday Dorset, in half-an-hour, lost their three outstanding wickets for the addition of 14 runs, which left Wiltshire to get two runs for victory. Smith (W.) took four wickets for 34 runs, C. E. Awdry four for 46, A. L. Awdry one for 17, and Smith (J.) one for 17. Butler knocked a boundary for Wiltshire off Elderton's fourth ball, the home county gaining a victory by 10 wickets.

DORSET LOSE LAST MATCH,

MONMOUTH'S INNINGS' VICTORY.

Dorset, who are well placed in the minor counties championship competition, lost their last match of the season on Saturday, being beaten by Monmouth at Alverstoke, by an innings and 27 runs. Their second venture only produced 130. In reply to Dorset's first innings' total of 215, Monmouthshire, after an indifferent start, compiled 362.

In spite of heavy overnight rain, the wicket was in fairly good condition when play opened on Friday. Dorset began their innings with A. E. Warren and Brockway, who faced the bowling of E. C. Dolman and G. C. Williams, both medium paced. At first the batsmen showed great restraint, but eventually Brockway heaved himself to boundaries off Williams and Hughes. Pitchford was introduced, and in his second over he completely beat Warren. Dorset's total was then 47, and 10 runs later Tindall, facing the same bowler, made a half-hearted stroke, and was easily taken at square leg. White then joined Brockway, and this pair took the score to 70 by lunch-time. Shortly after lunch Brockway reached 50 after batting one and three-quarter hours, but a sharply rising ball dismissed him at 108.

Brockway, who completed his 500 runs for the season, and G. White both revealed excellent form, but the remaining batsmen, with the exception of Captain R. D. Busk, were inclined to treat Monmouthshire's bowling with too much respect. Consequently, run-getting was a slow process until Busk arrived. He was in merry mood, and runs then mounted quickly. He drove with force and vim all around the wicket, but when he was well set, he could find no one to stay with him. Pitchford, who bowled thirty overs in succession, was the thorn in Dorset's side, and he dismissed five men for 64 runs.

Monmouth, at the close of Friday's play, were only 23 behind the Dorset total with six wickets in hand. For this good position they were wholly indebted to Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, and Captain H. T. H. Foley, who put on 120 after three wickets had fallen for 75. Batting with skill and discretion, the professional knocked up 100 runs in as many minutes, and was still undefeated with 114 to his credit at the close.

PITCHFORD'S DOUBLE CENTURY.

On the resumption of the game on Saturday, Dorset obtained two wickets with only 14 runs added to Monmouthshire's overnight score. At that point, however, Pitchford and Powell became associated, and by stepping out to aid the bowlers, they passed the Dorset score and put on 135 for the sixth wicket before Powell was caught on the boundary by Tindall off Jarechow. Pitchford continued to bat with discretion and reached his double century after he had been at the wicket 3 1/2 hours.

The 300 runs went up shortly afterwards, but the remaining batsmen, apart from Pitchford, who carried his bat for 247, did not stay any length of time. The innings closed for 362, which gave Monmouth a first innings lead of 167. Pitchford, who batted 4 1/2 hours, hit 31 4's and four 6's. Brockway, the Dorset [left-handed] professional, was the most successful bowler with three wickets for 57. Evans claimed 2 for 69 Jarechow 2-82, and Harrison 3-119.

FIRST INNINGS POINTS FOR DEVON

GREAT EIGHTH-WICKET STAND BY SURREY II.

A partnership which produced 137 runs, a sensational phase when three wickets fell in ten minutes, and a dogged stand by two tail-end batsmen, which stemmed the tide of disaster—these were features of Surrey II.'s first innings when play was resumed in their Minor Counties Championship match with Devon at Instow on Saturday, when a draw resulted.

Maxwell and Bartlett were both dismissed fairly cheaply, but Devon's hopes of forcing the visitors to follow on were dashed by a sound eighth-wicket stand by Owen and Williams, who put on over 100 runs between them to take the score to 365.

Devon's tireless second innings batting disappointed the crowd. C. E. H. Poynder, who came in when Emmett was caught by Owen after a tedious 52, enlivened matters near the end. Hoare carried his bat for 63, so redeeming his lapse of the first innings, when he was out first ball.

It was a tame ending to an otherwise bright game. It was Devon's concluding Minor Counties championship match this season.

**MONMOUTH v. DORSET**

**DORSET'S SURPRISING DEFEAT.**

Dorset played their last match of the season in the Minor Counties' Championship on Friday and Saturday, when they met Monmouth at Abercarn. Having won the first match somewhat easily, Dorset were generally expected to "repeat the dose" on this occasion; but expectations did not materialise by a long way, for the Welshmen won a surprising victory by an innings and 37 runs.

Dorset batted first on Friday, and put together 215 runs. Excellent batting by Brockway (who completed his 500 runs for the season) and G. White, and later by Capt. R. D. Busk, who was in merry mood, gave prospects of a much bigger total, but the other batsmen for the most part seemed to treat the rather moderate attack with far too much respect. However, when the home county went in they, too, found run-getting no easy matter for a time, three wickets going down for 75 runs. Pitchford, the professional, appeared to be well set, and when he was joined by Capt. Foley the score was taken to 180 for the fourth wicket. Pitchford continued to bat with great skill and freedom, and he was later well assisted by C. Powell. So fast did runs come that at the close of the Monmouth innings their total was the splendid one of 382. Of this total Pitchford made 247 not out, giving one of the finest displays ever seen on the ground. He knocked up his huge score in 4½ hours, and at the close of the innings he was roundly applauded—and by none more than the Dorset men. When Dorset went in a second time they required 187 runs to avoid an innings defeat, and they opened in confident fashion, A. E. Warren (29) and Brockway playing well to put on 50 runs in half-an-hour. Then Warren was caught at backward point by Dolman off Williams, and with only three more runs added Brockway came out. The Dorset professional looked right for another good score, but in attempting to hit Pitchford to the boundary he stepped back on his wicket—very bad luck indeed. This was the beginning of the end, for there followed a procession from wicket to pavilion, eight wickets going down for about 90 runs. There was some relief by the dour, defensive batting of F. C. Jarchow and E. M. Morris, who took the total to 130, Morris making 33; but the last two wickets fell without any addition to the score, and Dorset were well beaten. Pitchford was the hero of the match, for, in addition to his magnificent batting, he bowled well to take five wickets for 64 runs in the first innings and four for 25 in the second. Scores:—

DORSET COUNTY CRICKET CLUB  
REPORT FOR 1933.

Following the great improvement that took place in 1932, the season opened on a distinct note of optimism, particularly so as the club were able to call upon the services of most of the players who had done so well in the previous season. However, after a brilliant commencement, in which three of the first four matches were won most comfortably, the unexpected happened, and the side fell away from its high standard, only being able to gain first innings points in one game out of the remaining matches.

Various reasons account for the lack of success, and in two matches, Cornwall at Camborne and Monmouth at Abercarn, the explanation was bad fielding and poor catching, departments of the game in which hitherto we had done so very well. On the fast, true wickets experienced during the past season no side can afford to miss catches without paying a heavy price, and this price Dorset had to pay. Again against Devon A. M. Harrison unfortunately strained himself, and was unable to bowl in the second innings, after having bowled exceedingly well in the first. Against Monmouth R. G. Tindall felt the strain of a long season, and was played out. He had been playing almost every day since the beginning of May, and had reached a stage when he could view a day's rain with equanimity and perhaps relief. As well as he played last season, he was even more valuable this year. Playing for Oxford University for the first three months of the season gave him invaluable experience and confidence, added to which he had developed into a very good fast bowler.

A feature of the season was the re-appearance of three old players, J. N. Carter, owing to his military duties, cannot play as often as desired. This season he could only play in two matches, and in his two innings he had the unique satisfaction of scoring 134 and 159. E. J. Freeman came back into the team and, batting very well indeed, was a most reliable No. 1 batsman. With a highest score of 83, he only once failed to give the side a good start. Maintaining this form he will fill the long-felt want of an opening batsman. G. L. Jones could only play in the first match, but with scores of 13 and 95 made a very promising re-appearance.

Brockway again batted very well, heading the average, and he can now be said to have developed into a dependable run-getter. Freeman, Tindall, and G. White were the other most successful batsmen, all making runs consistently. Of those who did so well last year, Tovey and Busk had disappointing seasons, but they both have proved their worth, and were probably suffering from a run of bad luck, from which the best cricketers suffer. Morres also did not attain the high standard he set himself last year, but is a most dangerous batsman if allowed to get going.

The bowling on the whole did not come up to last year, but the wickets were truer and faster, and a few catches were missed that made a lot of difference. Tindall, with 35 wickets for 15.95 each, was most successful. A. M. Harrison was unable to bowl so much, and, whilst 33 wickets for 24 runs each is much below his previous form, he bowled well. Given a little more help from the pitches of an average English summer, he will without doubt carry on his good work with the results we have learnt to expect of him. F. C. Jarchow unfortunately could only play in the early matches. Next season we hope he can play regularly, and will by then have learnt to control his length better and avoid the occasional bad ball. D. Evans bowled well, and did a lot of work when Harrison was injured.

Summarising the games played, the season commenced with a convincing win over Devon by 100 runs. After obtaining a lead of 96 on the first innings, Dorset had 232 on the board before the first wicket fell in the second innings, Brockway, with 124, and Jones, with 95, being responsible. Devon left with 396 to win, put up a good fight, but were dismissed for 205.

Against Wiltshire, at Sherborne, Dorset did well to dismiss their opponents for 279, when over 200 were up with only three wickets down. Bastable, with five for 48, bowled exceedingly well on a wicket that gave the bowler no help. Dorset, after a good

start, collapsed, and were out for 181, and Wilts, declaring at 127 for four in the second innings, were unable to get Dorset out again, but had the best of the draw.

The next two matches, at Weymouth, were won very easily by an innings to spare in each game. Against Monmouth, Freeman and Carter put on 180 for the first wicket, and the score was carried on quickly to 430 for six, enabling Dorset to declare. In addition to Carter, with 134, Tindall obtained 124 not out very quickly. Monmouth, dispirited no doubt by their outgoing in the field in a hot sun, only scored 97 in their first innings and 158 in the second. Tindall took three for 12 and three for 14.

Winning the toss against Cornwall, the first wicket fell at 50 and the second at 220, Carter (159) and Brockway (79) scoring well. The innings closed at 424, and Cornwall were dismissed for 165, at one stage being 42 for five. In the second innings they did better, making 226, leaving Dorset winners by an innings and 31 runs.

A pleasing feature of the Weymouth matches was the excellent support given by the public, far in advance of any other place in the county. The club owe a debt of gratitude to Mr. B. Brewin, who worked so hard and enthusiastically to make the festival a success. Apart from his work at Weymouth Mr. Brewin has for three seasons acted as scorer—a thankless task—and all the players bear testimony not only to his skill but to his kindly help and cheerfulness.

The match at Salisbury was disastrous, and Dorset were well beaten. The fast bowling of J. Smith, on a wicket that was "lifting," proved too much, and in the first innings Dorset could only manage to score 101, of which 71 were added for the seventh and eighth wickets. Wilts, with 147 for nine, were little better, but the last wicket put on another 70 invaluable runs, J. Smith making 82 with six 6's and nine 4's. This last wicket stand meant a lead of 110 instead of about 40, and in the second innings Dorset could only manage to save the innings defeat by one run.

Going on tour, Dorset lost first innings points to Cornwall, at Camborne, largely due to poor catching. Rain, interfered with the play, and in reply to 210 Dorset could only make 126. The next match at Exeter, against Devon, was also a disappointment. Dorset could only secure a lead of 18 on the first innings, but owing to Harrison's accident and the loss of his bowling Devon were able to declare, leaving Dorset barely time to make 170 to win. With the score at 97 for three, things were going well until a foolish run out, followed by another wicket, changed the situation, and the match was drawn.

In the last match at Abercarn Monmouth inflicted a heavy defeat on Dorset, who, however, were much to blame with poor batting and worse fielding. Pitchford, for Monmouth, carried his bat for 247 not out. A fine innings, but he was missed at about 40 and gave other chances later. Missing Pitchford was serious, for his 247 made the Monmouth score the respectable one of 384. Being dismissed for 215, of which Brockway made 62 and G. White 45, Dorset were 169 behind, and were all out in the second innings for 130, suffering defeat by an innings and 30 runs.

Despite the loss of form in the latter matches, there is nothing about which to be discouraged, and with most of the players again available the prospects for next season are encouraging. The policy of giving extended trials to young cricketers of promise has proved its worth in discovering talent that will soon find permanent places in the team.

The captain, M. B. Elderton, has again had an easy and pleasant task, and maintains his reputation behind the wickets.
