**OXFORDSHIRE v. OXFORD UNIVERSITY "A" TEAM.**

**TWO CENTURIES BY J. A. EVETTS.**

The annual match between Oxfordshire and the University "A" team was played in the Parks on Wednesday and yesterday. On a perfect pitch there was little likelihood of the game being finished in the allotted period, and the result was a draw, the County, with nine wickets in hand, leading by one run.

Batting first, Oxfordshire made a capital start, but after having 133 for one wicket were all out for 232. Evetts had the satisfaction of making his first century for the County and batted really well, as did the young City School player, Halliday, who has developed into a very sound batsman. The remainder of the batting was disappointing. The University replied with 428 for seven, Moss, the golf Blue, and Jenkins, the Rugger Blue, each passing the century.

Most of the bowling devolved on Reece and Walters, and each took two wickets. Going in a second time 196 in arrears, the County again gave a good display, and at the close had scored 197 for one wicket.

Evetts achieved the distinction of scoring a second century, and it is probable that this is a record for Oxfordshire. At least it is many years since the feat was performed by an Oxfordshire cricketer. Evetts, who is a grandson of the oldest living Oxford Blue, scored in the match 221 runs for once out. In the two days 857 runs were scored. Score:—

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

OXFORDSHIRE v. MONMOUTHSHIRE

The match between Oxfordshire and Monmouthshire, in the Minor Counties Competition, on the Merton College ground, on Wednesday and Thursday, was drawn, Oxfordshire taking points for first innings lead.

Monmouth had the good fortune to win the toss and scored 294, Allen, Pitchford, Cope and H. T. H. Foley all playing well for their runs. Foley is a son of the Foley who did so much for Worcestershire cricket in the 'nineties. The brunt of the Oxfordshire bowling fell on Ferriman and Walters, with Reece and Bowtell backing them up. Walters' figures of five for 81 in 41 overs on a perfect pitch represent the hall-mark of good bowling. He kept an ideal length, and did not always enjoy the best of luck. Ferriman, in his first match for the County, also did well, while Bowtell, who comes very quickly off the pitch, bowled 13 overs for 13 runs. Oxfordshire lost two wickets on Wednesday for 115 runs. Coming together at 74, Evetts and Barmby were not parted till they had put on 103 runs. Both batted well in their different styles. They put on 85 in the first hour on Thursday. There followed another good stand by Walker and Walters, and just after lunch Oxon gained the lead, with two wickets in hand. Henry promptly declared, but showers put any idea of a definite result out of the question. It was an excellent performance to get nearly 300 runs to secure first innings' points, and it looks as if the County batting will be their strong suit this season. The bowling, too, was satisfactory, when it is borne in mind that Reece had an injured leg, and that Bowtell and Ferriman have had little experience in Minor County cricket. Shaw kept wicket well and the fielding generally was above criticism.

During the luncheon interval on the first day Capt. Henry made a presentation of an illuminated address to Mr. J. A. Evetts for his feat of scoring two separate hundreds for Oxfordshire against the University "A" team in the Parks last May.

MINOR COUNTIES COMPETITION

OXFORDSHIRE BEAT  
BEDFORDSHIRE.

Oxfordshire beat Bedfordshire in the Minor Counties cricket competition on the St. John's College ground on Tuesday and Wednesday by ten wickets. This was their second match and they had previously won on the first innings against Monmouth. The game may be said to have been won and lost in the first few hours of the game, when, on a perfect wicket, Bedfordshire were dismissed for the poor total of 100. Walters and Bowtell certainly bowled very well, but it was bad batting rather than the skill of the bowlers that was mainly responsible for the poor total. Oxfordshire replied with 317 for eight at the close of play on the first day, and virtually had the game in their pockets. Evetts passed 50 for the fourth time in succession for the County. Walker helped him to put on 79 for the second wicket and Inmiss 65 for the fourth. Evetts now combines more freedom of stroke with correct style and he has the patience so essential in a No. 1 batsman. Inmiss was making his debut for the team and he played a very fine innings of 85, one of the best in the match. He is largely an off-side player, with a lovely stroke between the covers, for which the bat has a very full swing. He seems always to have plenty of time for his strokes and puts much power into them. It is unfortunate for Oxfordshire that he cannot play for them again this season.

Capt. Henry declared first thing on Wednesday morning, and Bedfordshire went in a second time to save the innings defeat. Up to a point they made a fine uphill fight. After Bircunshaw was dismissed at 21, E. Rawlins and Sime took the score to 100, the total at the fall of the second wicket. At this stage a draw seemed probable, but from the moment Sime left, the Oxfordshire bowler got on top and the last eight Bedford wickets actually fell for 50 runs. Oxfordshire had to go in again to get 30, and these were obtained without loss by Inmiss and Evetts. E. Rawlins played a staunch part in the recovery of Bedfordshire, but Sime was quite needlessly slow, and his lack of enterprise cost Bedfordshire several runs.

Ferriman, Walters, and Bowtell again bowled well for Oxfordshire, and so far have had a large share in the fine form of the side. At one period during Bedfordshire's second innings, Ferriman took three wickets in two overs with the new ball, and he seems to have won a permanent place in the team. It is certain that if the bowlers can keep it up, Oxfordshire will be a most difficult side to beat. Scores and analysis:—

BUCKS v. OXFORDSHIRE.

At High Wycombe last Friday and Saturday Oxfordshire took first innings points against Buckinghamshire. There was, however, some excitement towards the finish, Bucks made a splendid recovery in their second innings, which was declared, and Oxfordshire were set 172 to win in two and a quarter hours. Quite wisely, they made no attempt to risk getting the runs and losing the match. But in spite of this when stumps were drawn eight of the side had been dismissed and the total was only 112. After a slow start Henry put in O'Shea to give the game some life, not with the idea of forcing a win as by this time the clock was in front, and quite a few wickets fell as the batsmen at the London end had the sun full in their faces and could not follow the flight of Rutter's fast deliveries, and Rutter is really fast, with an ideal action.

Good Stand by Walker and Barmby.

Oxfordshire batted first and scored 260. The best stand of the match was between Walker and Barmby, who put on 113 for the third wicket, after Halliday and Lee had gone for 30. Walker looked quite at home from the outset, and his 59 was generally regarded as one of the best of the many good innings he has played for the County. He was unlucky in the manner of his dismissal—caught behind off the handle of the bat. Barmby had a life at the wicket early on, his one blenheim in an innings that was marked by a variety of strokes and in which clean hitting and hard driving predominated. There was also a lively 31 by Dr. J. P. O'Shea, who was making his debut. The doctor is a hitter with a good eye and strong forearms. His style is unorthodox, and it is not easy to set the field for him. One was also glad to see another breaking his spell of bad luck, and one hopes this will re-establish his confidence.

Oxon Bowlers in Form.

When Bucks went in showers stopped the play on one or twice, and the Oxfordshire bowlers, Ferriman and O'Shea, made the fullest use of the affected wicket. Bucks lost three for 31, and all were obtained by Ferriman. There would have been two others had Inge held a very difficult chance and had the ball been returned on another occasion to the end opposite to that at which the two batsmen were together.

On Saturday the Oxfordshire bowlers, on a pitch on which rain had still left its mark, carried on their good work, and before lunch had Bucks out for 102, a good performance by Ferriman, O'Shea, Walters (who clean bowled two batsmen in his first over) and Bowtell.

A Fine Bucks Recovery.

Bucks confidently asserted that there would be a different tale to tell in their second innings. They were right, but they had one shock. Powell and Baker had put on 106 for the first wicket, but at three o'clock, with nearly four hours to play, four were out and 18 were still required to save the innings defeat. It was then that Franklin came in to dispose of any chance of an Oxfordshire victory. He forced the game in great style, and after the tea interval scored off nearly every ball. The Oxfordshire fielding became rather slack, and not one of the bowlers seemed able to keep Franklin quiet.

Defeat Just Avoided.

The Bucks captain declared at 329 for seven, and Oxfordshire went in at five o'clock to score, if they had to win, at the rate of over 80 an hour. Lee and Halliday collected 40 in 35 minutes and Barmby helped Lee in a 30-run stand for the third wicket, when he was given out lbw after playing the ball. The scoring was slow and there was some mild barracking by those whose knowledge of the game is elementary. With 35 minutes to play, Henry sent in O'Shea to have a go, and after his dismissal wickets began to tumble down, but it was evident before this happened that the clock would beat the Bucks bowlers, which is what happened. I do not think Franklin could have declared earlier, in spite of his knowledge of the ground and the assistance the sun would give his bowlers. Neither do I think that Henry could have asked his batsmen to adopt forcing tactics at the outset of the innings, as this would have been too great a risk. Too much credit cannot be given to S. C. B. **Y.M.C.A. v. HEADINGTON.**

## OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET.

### SEASON'S AVERAGES AND RESUME.

#### ENCOURAGING THE YOUNG PLAYER: WAS THE POLICY JUSTIFIED?

So far as results are concerned the Oxfordshire County Cricket Club has not experienced a very successful season. Their name appears low down in the list in the Minor Counties Competition, in which they won two matches, lost three, won on 1st innings two and lost on first innings one.

This is, of course, a big disappointment to the players and to the supporters, but not, I think, altogether surprising to the Club officials. When the season's prospects were under discussion it soon became evident that there would be difficult problems to solve, not the least of which was that of finding a successor to W. G. Kalaugher, the fast bowler. It is the irony of fate, perhaps, that just when Oxfordshire most required a fast bowler owing to the exceptionally fine weather and the constant succession of hard and fast pitches, they should have been deprived of the services of Kalaugher, whose pace and ability to keep going for long stretches would have been an invaluable asset to the side.

#### Youth or Experience?

Another problem was whether it was wise to proceed with two or three players who are past their best, but whose experience would have counted for something tangible, or whether, with a view to the future, it was a wiser policy to play younger men. The Club plumped for the latter course, and it remains to be seen whether the decision was correct. Obviously the absence of Kalaugher and the inclusion of inexperienced players meant, unless the unexpected happened, that Oxfordshire would not become serious challengers for the Minor Counties Championship. It takes two or three seasons for a young player to become acclimatised to Minor County cricket, and for a season or two, perhaps, if the present policy is continued, the results may not come up to expectations.

#### A Gamble that Came Off.

In the circumstances I think Oxfordshire have not fared at all badly. It is literally the truth to say that at the opening of the season the Club had only one bowler, the versatile and reliable Charlie Walters. They decided to experiment with local players, and to gamble with club talent. E. F. Bowtell, of North Oxford, B. Ferriman, of Morris Motors, and Dr. J. P. O'Shea, of Chipping Norton, were invited to play when it became evident that C. W. Reece, an old County Cap, home on furlough from the West Indies, had, unfortunately, lost his form.

To Bowtell and Ferriman, and in a lesser degree to Dr. O'Shea, who was not called upon till late in the season, the utmost credit is due. Each was new to Minor County cricket and Dr. O'Shea had very limited opportunities for practice. The County trial at Banbury brought Ferriman and O'Shea into the limelight and it is sincerely to be hoped there will be more of these games next season as, properly conducted, they do undoubtedly serve a purpose.

#### Ferriman and Bowtell.

Ferriman and Bowtell have had to bear a large share of the County bowling and, in the

their returns are most satisfactory. Ferriman has played the role of fast bowler and he must be given a lot of credit for the manner in which he has stuck to his task. On the most trying day he did not appear to lose his pace and was always willing for the captain to toss the ball to him. He has had invaluable experience, which has probably convinced him that the art of bowling is not merely the pace at which the ball is sent through the air. He has been rather unlucky, several catches having been dropped off him, but he has rightly taken these as being part of the game. Bowtell has always been regarded as a useful club bowler and he played for the County once or twice last season. As a first-change bowler he has thoroughly merited the confidence of his committee. At times he has bowled really well and his quickness from the pitch has earned him more than one wicket. He, like Ferriman, has been a most willing and eager bowler. As to Dr. O'Shea, he had two particularly good matches, in the second game against Bucks when, in the first innings, he took six wickets for 4s and in the return against Berkshire, when his analysis was even better. The doctor is not really fast, but he is of powerful physique and apparently is one of those bowlers who seem to thrive on hard work.

#### Walters—As Usual.

It goes without saying that Walters has again met with considerable success. The records show that he has bowled over 300 overs, and when it is remembered that he has never had any assistance from the wicket, his steadiness is really remarkable. As one of his opponents aptly put it, the longer he bowls, the better he bowls.

#### The Batting Disappointing.

It is when one turns to the batting that the real disappointments are evident. When at the start of the season the composition of the side was discussed it was frequently said that the batting was all right. There did not seem room in the side for quite a few who appeared to warrant a place. Unfortunately two or three of the batsmen, of whom one had a right to expect great things, failed, but as they are young and gaining experience, it was not considered wise to drop them, but to persevere in the hope that they would find their form. After all, they are little more than boys, and to discard them would, perhaps, have done more harm than good, even if the interests of the side had to suffer. The committee did, however, have reluctantly to leave out one good player.

To J. A. Evetts, J. Barnby and H. Walker, the latter two of whom returned to the side after a season's absence, the brunt of the run-getting has fallen. Evetts commenced in great style by scoring two separate hundreds in the match against the University "A" team, an unparalleled feat for an Oxfordshire batsman. In his next two innings he exceeded the 50. He was a much better batsman than last season, having more power, and the diligent manner in which he dug himself in made him an invaluable No. 1. Walker, who would perhaps have made him a more suitable partner than the youthful Halliday, played several good innings, notably at High Wycombe, where he made Edwards' and Rutter appear quite ordinary bowlers, and also at Ebbw Vale and against Berks at Oxford.

Barnby came home for his usual leave to bat as well as ever, and his success cannot be measured by figures, as more than once his runs were made when they were badly wanted, and he was not always able, in the interests of the side, to show his wide repertoire

of strokes. Walters and Halliday also did well with the bat on several occasions. Lieut.-Cmdr. Shaw brought a breezy personality and Pavlova-like footwork into his batting. It is a great pity Inniss could only play in one match, in which he scored 108 for once out. Here was a batsman with a really model style and the fluency of strokes that mark the first-class batsman, and had he been available the Oxfordshire batting would have been much stronger.

Some of the others struck a bad patch, and had it been considered advisable, such players as D. Edwards, L. Rogers, R. P. Thomas and D. L. Fisher would probably have been of greater service to the side, especially Edwards, who, I believe, on his form at Banbury, would fully justify a trial. The others were not asked because the decision to try younger men was a considered policy in the interests of the future.

**S. C. B. Leo**

That splendid old servant of the club, S. C. B. Leo, voluntarily stood down to make way for younger blood, but when he came in he showed that he was one of the most reliable batsmen in the team, and his innings at Wycombe probably saved the side from defeat, while in the final game he showed that there are still fewer batsmen better at a pitch. I hope his absence from the team is still very far off.

**The Fielding.**

One had a right to expect that the fielding would at least be consistent. I am afraid it was never really good and occasionally actually bad. Banbury, anywhere in the field, Capt. Henry, close up to the wicket, Shaw and Inge, the wicket-keeper, were notable exceptions. Very few of the team can throw really well, and some of the young members require too much time to get down to the ball and return it quickly and accurately. They ought to give up some of the time they devote to batting to throwing. One does not like to see so much slinging and bootwork in a County side. Another point is the inconsideration shown to a bowler. How many times did Walter and Co. have to stoop to pick up the ball, which should have been returned to them full toss? This is perhaps a little matter, but it means much to a bowler and, moreover, looks and is untidy. No side can hope to become first-rate if it neglects the essential of good fielding. The slip fielding, too, was not sound. There was no Thomas in the side, no one, apparently, with the skill for this difficult position.

Capt. Henry captained the side with his usual tact and tried hard to set them a good example. He made them happy on the field and, what is no less a necessary achievement, off it as well. The team were a pleasant brotherhood of nice and willing fellows and it was a pleasure to be among them.
