

YORKSHIRE COLTS ON TOP

Fine Bowling and a Century Partnership

HALIFAX, Wednesday

The first match in the Minor County Championship was begun here to-day, when Yorkshire Second XI met Cheshire. At the end of an interesting day's play, the home county led by 71 runs with four wickets in hand, after dismissing Cheshire for 95.

On a difficult wicket, two remarkable bowling performances were accomplished, and a fine first wicket partnership of 100 lent distinction to the innings of the Yorkshire Colts. The bowling feats were to the credit of Temple, a leg-break bowler from Scarborough, who claimed six Cheshire wickets for 19 runs, and Wilson, who has done such great service for Cheshire for many seasons. Maintaining an almost mechanical accuracy, the latter tied down the Colts, who only scored 25 runs off his medium-paced deliveries in 25 overs, thirteen of which were maidens. He richly deserved his two wickets.

The partners in the century stand for Yorkshire were Halstead and Kippax, who was making his debut with the Colts, and their painstaking display put their county in a strong position. Yorkshire Colts beat Cheshire by seven wickets on both occasions last year, and if they can score fast to-morrow morning, they stand an excellent chance of victory.

Tricky Wicket

Cheshire won the toss, and made first use of a wicket which played queer tricks throughout the day. One of their opening pair was Bates, who thus adds another chapter to an interesting cricket history, which started with the Yorkshire Colts over 20 years ago. After a spell with Yorkshire he qualified for Glamorgan, and now has made yet another change—to Cheshire. In his first innings for his new county he showed all his old assurance and mastery over an excellent attack, but when he had scored 23 he was well taken at slip by Hall off Smalles.

Cheshire had 50 up after 65 minutes, but at 58 Temple came on for Smalles, and he proceeded to take such toll of the opposing batsmen that it seemed likely that the side would be out before lunch. His success started when Buller took a splendid catch at the wicket to get rid of Dutton. The last ball of the same over was hit very hard to square leg by Wilson, and Halstead took another fine catch. C. A. Bickmore had the misfortune to get the best ball of the day as soon as he reached the wicket. Hall was the bowler, and he produced an unbeatable delivery which pitched at a good length and shot straight under the bat to take the off stump.

T. B. Woodcock and L. N. Jones were also sent back, both by Temple, before lunch, which was taken at 74 for 8. After lunch the ninth wicket put on 21, but Temple "bagged" two more victims and the innings closed for 95. Temple came out with the following splendid figures:—

Steady Batting

Yorkshire opened with Halstead and Kippax, and despite numerous bowling changes the pair soon settled down to play a steady game. Both have some excellent strokes, but Kippax is an exponent of the "two-eyed stance" and this retards his rate of scoring. When tea was taken, 83 runs were up, and the pair continued to make steady progress afterwards. When the partnership had lasted just over two hours, first Halstead completed his 50, then the century was reached. With the last ball of this eventful over, Bickmore broke the stand, getting Halstead caught at slip for an invaluable 58.

W. E. Harbord, undeterred by a series of narrow escapes, hit out strongly, but when he had collected 16 he was palpably "leg-before" to Wilson, and the next three wickets fell for 15. Spicer was taken at the wicket. Hutton hung his bat at a rising ball wicket, and was deservedly caught at from Burgess and was run out as the result of a misunderstanding with Kippax.

After batting two hours and 45 minutes, Kippax completed a painstaking half century, and, partnered by Fisher, he took the score to 166 before falling to Lewis. His innings of 57 lasted three and a quarter hours. His was a most promising first appearance.

BRILLIANT DISPLAY BY BATES

Yorkshire Colts Have to Be Content with a Draw

HALIFAX, Thursday

The match between Yorkshire 2nd XI, and Cheshire ended in a draw here to-day, Yorkshire being 68 runs behind with eight wickets in hand when stumps were drawn. The home county carried their overnight etotal to 201 for 7, at which point the innings was declared. Cheshire began their second innings 106 runs behind, but a magnificent 82 by Bates put them in a strong position, and they eventually totalled 230. Yorkshire, faced with the prospect of scoring 125 runs in an hour and a half for victory, found this beyond their powers, and the extra half hour was not claimed. Cheshire had secured two of their wickets for 57 runs when play ended.

Only one run had been added to the overnight score when Fisher was caught by Bates, and then Buller, the wicket-keeper, and Col. Chichester-Constable put on 34 in half an hour. Wilson had sent down 31 overs for 31 runs when Col. Chichester-Constable came in, but the Colts' captain soon brought off a prodigious hit for 6. Wilson sent down a ball just off the leg stump, and the batsman, swinging round, hit it out of the ground over the square leg boundary, and on the far side of an adjacent bowling green.

Bates in Great Form

Cheshire had ninety minutes' batting before lunch, and they scored 80 for the loss of one wicket. Bates started in great style. He monopolised the scoring to such an extent that when the 50 went up, he had scored 40 to his partner's 3. He was particularly strong on the leg side, and he took such toll of Temple's leg-breaks, that the Scarborough player conceded 35 runs in five overs. Twice the players left the field for sharp gusts of rain, and then a particularly heavy downpour drove them in for the luncheon interval.

After lunch, Smalles and Fisher took up the attack. Smalles bowled to a curious field; for his off-spinners, he had no slips, and a leg trap consisting of Fisher (fine leg), Hall (backward square leg), and Temple (short leg). The 100 went up after 1 hour 40 minutes, and eight runs later Smalles broke up the partnership by bowling Pearson.

Shortly afterwards, a ball played straight back to the bowler ended Bates's innings. He had batted just over two hours for his 82, hitting 16 boundaries.

The rest of the innings was divided into contrasting periods. After some very uneventful cricket for three-quarters of an hour, L. N. Jones, in one over from Smalles, started by slamming a well pitched up ball over the pavilion roof into the football ground, and ended by hitting another 6 on to the track near the pavilion. Altogether he hit two sixes and six fours in his 54.

The innings closed for 230, and Yorkshire were faced with the necessity of scoring a very high pace if they were to get the 125 runs in the comparatively short time left for play. Their second innings served to confirm the excellent impressions served Kippax created by his batting yesterday, and to show that Spicer is well worth severing with.

Roy Kilner's Son Turns Out for Chickenley

SOUTH KIRKBY "DERBY"

Some fine individual performances were made in the Yorkshire Council yesterday; when, although wickets were almost entirely in favour of the batsmen, there were a few bowling feats of real merit.

A feature of Thornhill's five wickets victory over Elsecar was the achievement of Clifford Morrell (Thornhill), who took seven of the visitors' wickets for 41 runs, and then pulled the game round in his side's favour by scoring 63 in quick time. His score included fifteen boundary strokes. H. Walker also batted confidently for an undefeated 41.

A ten wickets victory was gained by Denaby and Cadeby over Hemsworth, at Denaby, thanks largely to the fine bowling of E. Robinson, who captured 7 wickets for 15 runs. Robinson's strong point is actually his batting, but he was not called on in that direction.

Hemsworth lost their opening batsman, C. Smith, the first ball of the match, and from that disastrous start they never recovered.

The local "Derby" between South Kirkby Colliery and Frickley, at South Kirkby, ended in a drawn game. T. Smith (Frickley) hit eight 4's in his total of 60 not out, G. C. Hobson (S. Kirkby) made 56 not out, and William Capstick (S. Kirkby) had four 4's and two 6's in his 54 not out.

Roy Kilner, elder son of the late Roy Kilner, the famous Yorkshire player, turned out with Chickenley, for the first time against Hartshead Moor. With the bat he obtained 10 runs, and he took two wickets for 37.

G. Hutchinson, after making his 50 for Bullcroft against Doncaster Town, bowled remarkably well to take six wickets for 12 runs in 10 overs.

"Fireworks" at Castleford

Playing under compulsory declaration rules, Castleford gave a fine display of batting against their Whitwood neighbours. S. C. Ambler and Barker put on 131 runs for the first wicket, and the former went on to compile the first century for the club this season. He made 136, which included 25 boundaries, and he was associated with another three-figure partnership for the second wicket with Allen. They added 103 runs, the old Yorkshire stumper having reached the half-century when the innings was declared at 243 for 3.

Whitwood recovered after a shaky start, thanks to Skilbeck, who made 61, and had scored 156 for 6 when time was reached.

Mitchell Main met with their initial reverse of the season at Rawdon. So far as Rawdon was concerned, the match was a personal triumph for R. Denison, the Rawdon batsman and wicket-keeper. He scored a sparkling 87, which included 12 fours. One of his boundary hits carried the ball right out of the ground and over the roofs of some nearby houses. Subsequently, Denison was directly responsible for the dismissal of four of the Mitchell Main batsmen with smart catches behind the stumps.

Rossall Defeated by an Innings

T. A. W. White to Rescue of Northumberland

Scudding storm clouds overhead, and a ground well soaked by rain during the week-end, promised a blank day for the start of the Yorkshire colts' Northern tour, when they arrived for the match against Northumberland here this morning.

Showers continued intermittently until lunch, but then the weather cleared, and a start was possible at 2.45. Northumberland won the toss, and in three and a half hours they were dismissed for 191. When stumps were drawn, Yorkshire had scored 28 for the loss of Kippax.

Colts Pegged Back

Yorkshire should never have allowed their opponents to score as many as they did, for, at one period, they had half the side out for 61. At this point, they were rudely roused from their complacency by a hurricane in human form. There had been two last minute changes in the home team, and one of these was T. A. W. White, who came in for his brother. White, a son of Sir Archibald White, who captained Yorkshire for several years, has himself played for the Yorkshire colts at Thornaby three years ago.

He was making his first appearance for Northumberland to-day, and his was generally voted the most remarkable debut made on the county ground. Combining light-hearted rusticity with quick footwork and a sure eye, he launched himself like a cyclone at the bowling of his former county. His innings of 82 lasted but 65 minutes, and he hit two sixes, thirteen fours and a three.

A Tremendous Hit

His second six was a tremendous hit over the leg boundary, the ball clearing the road, and sailing serenely on into a distant shrubbery. He came in with the score at 61, and when he was caught in the deep by W. E. Harbord the total had reached the respectable proportions of 167.

There was bright battling from J. D. Ord and Robson, but the remainder offered little resistance. Douglas came out with 6 for 59, and Turner, with 4 for 53, also bowled well, but Temple was very disappointing.

On his form to-day—his 8 overs cost 52 runs—he is not yet sufficiently experienced for this type of cricket. He bowled a succession of long hops on the leg side, and after his first four overs his deliveries thoroughly deserved the punishment they received.

Yorkshire had 45 minutes batting on a tricky wicket, and did well to lose but one wicket.

GREAT VICTORY FOR THE COLTS

Turner and Harbord Pull the Game Round

CENTURY STAND

After finishing up 75 runs behind on the first innings, Yorkshire Colts gained a brilliant victory over Northumberland by seven wickets here to-day.

The Yorkshire Colts were dismissed for 116 on a difficult wicket this morning, and Northumberland also fared badly, being all out for 98. A great innings of 82 not out by Turner, and an equally fine effort by W. E. Harbord, who scored 56 at a critical period, resulted in the Colts hitting off the 174 runs necessary for the loss of three wickets in their second innings.

Colts' "Tail"

Yorkshire Colts had made 28 for one overnight, and they made a mistake in not scoring faster in the first hour this morning before the good effects of the heavy roller had worn off. When the pitch began to wear again, the later batsmen threw their wickets away with no regard for the state of the game. Bedford scored a very good 38, K. R. Davidson also batted attractively for 22, but four wickets fell for 91, and the last six went down for a mere 25. No one made any attempt to play the bowling, and with Colonel R. C. Chichester-Constable absent during the morning on military manoeuvres, the innings closed for 116.

Batsmen in Trouble

If Yorkshire had been puzzled by the wicket, however, their opponents were doubly so. They started quite confidently, and Mackay and Shields put on 29 before lunch. After the interval, Hall bowled splendidly, and although the player substituting for Chichester-Constable dropped Mackay in the slips, the fast bowler broke the partnership at 34 by bowling the Northumberland skipper.

After that the home county were only saved from an ignominious dismissal by a determined stand by two left handers, Hutchinson and Robson, who put on 30 for the sixth wicket. Both players left to consecutive deliveries, Turner getting them caught at extra cover by Harbord. The innings soon closed following their dismissal.

Hall accounted for four of the best men for 44, on a wicket unsuited to his pace, and Turner bowled intelligently, his four costing five runs apiece.

A Fine Stand

Yorkshire were thus set 174 to win. They lost Bedford at 2, and K. R. Davidson at 12, but a magnificent partnership for the third wicket between Harbord and Turner completely changed the aspect of the game. They opened slowly, and at tea victory seemed impossible, but after the interval the lost minutes were caught up by splendid forcing cricket.

When they had put on 105, Harbord was bowled. He showed great patience at a critical time, and then opened out when runs were vitally needed, scoring with freedom all round the wicket.

When the last half hour was begun 34 runs were needed, but Turner, going from strength to strength, received such able support from Spicer that the runs were obtained with a quarter of an hour to spare. When the winning hit was made, Turner had scored 82, with eleven fours and a six to his credit.

DURHAM GAIN THE UPPER HAND

Unbroken Opening Stand of 171 Against Colts

AFTER DEADLY BOWLING

SOUTH SHIELDS, Wednesday
Yorkshire Colts, fresh from their fine victory over Northumberland, experienced a decided reversal of fortune when they met Durham here to-day. Batting first, they were dismissed ignominiously in two hours for 80, and then had the mortification of seeing Durham's opening batsmen, C. L. Adamson and Gibbon, pile up a score of 171 without being separated. Rain stopped play 25 minutes before the time for drawing stumps.

Colonel Chichester-Constable had no grounds for supposing that the choice of batting first was not a reasonable one, but, as it turned out, the wicket proved quite tricky as soon as the effect of the heavy roller had worn off. Ellis got the most out of the pitch when it began to wear. Keeping an immaculate length, and bringing the ball back sharply at times, he came out with splendid figures—six wickets for just over 3 runs apiece in 13 overs. He was unplayable after lunch, taking his last five wickets in five overs for 4 runs.

Batsmen Struggling

The Yorkshire batsmen were always struggling for runs. The fifth wicket partnership between K. R. Davidson and Spicer produced the best batting of the innings, for although only 21 runs were added, they were the only two to play the bowling with any confidence. Spicer's 22 was a most valuable effort, and Davidson again batted well for 15.

Durham opened very steadily, and the very orthodoxy of their methods gave one the impression that they were scoring slowly. This was not the case, however, for they passed the Yorkshire total after 75 minutes. Both Adamson and Gibbon use their wrists well to crack the short ball between point and cover, and they also excel at the late cut. Never for a moment were they troubled by the variety of bowlers tried against them.

The 100 went up in 90 minutes, shortly after the tea interval, and at the same time Adamson reached his half-century. Gibbon soon followed his example, and the rate of scoring mounted. When Bedford went on, they received further encouragement in the shape of an over of long hops, which were duly despatched to various points of the ground. When the rain came they were batting as confidently as ever, with a double century partnership in sight.

YORKSHIRE COLTS BEATEN

Another Dismal Batting Display

TURNER'S LONE EFFORT

SOUTH SHIELDS, Thursday
Although they managed to evade the humiliation of defeat by an innings, Yorkshire Colts were soundly beaten by ten wickets by Durham here to-day. In reply to Yorkshire's total of 80, the Durham opening pair, C. L. Adamson and Gibbon, who had put on 171 overnight, took the score to 190 before Gibbon was dismissed, and the innings was declared closed at 216 for one.

Despite a grand fighting innings of 72 by Turner, Yorkshire only scored 148 at their second attempt, and Durham hit off the 13 runs necessary without loss.

Adamson and Gibbon, who last night beat the Durham County record for a first-wicket partnership by one run—C. Ferens and Wright held the previous record with 170, also made against Yorkshire at Redcar in 1926—found runs difficult to get this morning.

Adamson's Century

At 190, Gibbon was taken in the slips by Hall when four short of his century. Temple, who claimed his wicket, bowled his leg spinners really well to-day, keeping a much better length than of late. T. K. Dobson, the Durham captain, who made a fine century against the West Indies last week, hit up a dozen quick runs, and as soon as Adamson completed a splendid century out of 216, the innings was declared.

Yorkshire were thus 136 runs behind, and the most encouraging features of a dismal second innings were the magnificent batting of Turner, who is to play for Yorkshire to-morrow, and another extremely promising performance by Spicer, whose worth could not by any means be gauged in terms of runs.

Durham are a fine bowling side, and on both days they have been well on top of the batsmen, aided considerably by the vagaries of the wicket. Ellis, Dobson, a very good left hand slow bowler, and Carr were all seen at their best, and four wickets fell for 43 before lunch. The interval came an over too late from a Yorkshire viewpoint, for the lost Davidson, who had been batting really well.

After lunch, Spicer and Turner made a short stand before the former also fell a victim to Carr. Turner found another ally in Temple who kept his end up for nearly half an hour, leaving his partner to do the scoring.

Hall Stands Firm

When the ninth wicket fell at 115, there seemed little chance of averting the innings defeat, but Hall played his part nobly, and with Turner still hitting when the bowling permitted, 33 runs were put on.

Turner reached his 50 in 2½ hours, and took his score to 72 before he was bowled in lashing out at Howell, having made his runs out of 102 scored from the bat while he was at the wicket. His defence was very sound, and yet he never lost an opportunity for scoring off the occasional loose ball.

Yorkshire were greatly indebted to "Mr. Extras." Scoring steadily from the start, he had 38 to his credit at the close—a valuable 12th man.

Randall and Wilson hit off the 13 runs wanted for a Durham victory.

Weak Batting Display by Denbigh

HUTTON'S FINE INNINGS

BRIGHOUSE, Monday
For sheer ineptitude, it would be difficult to equal the batting of Denbighshire here to-day, when they began their first match of the season against Yorkshire Second Eleven. They lost nine wickets before lunch for 77, and the innings closed at the same total with the first ball after the interval. Yorkshire, too, began badly, but a great partnership for the last wicket between Hutton and Heaton, who put on 72 in 40 minutes, enabled them to lead by 103 on the first innings.

Denbighshire chose to bat first on a soft wicket. It must be said in justice to them that they are unaccustomed to play in the murky atmosphere of an industrial town, and the light was indifferent here all to-day, with the best part of thirty factory chimneys all making their contribution to the Welsh side's discomfiture.

Bad light, however, could not excuse their total inability to score runs against bowling which was not superlative. Only the captain, B. D. Sykes, remained at the wicket for any length of time, but although his was a brave effort, it was tedious in the extreme to watch. His 22 runs took him one hour and forty minutes to compile, and there was a burst of ironical applause when Heaton claimed his wicket.

Bad Batting

The remainder of the batting was extremely bad, and it is no exaggeration to say that their total flattered them. Fisher and Heaton, a leg-break bowler who flights his deliveries well up, always puzzled the batsmen, and they took 4 for 34 and 4 for 18 respectively.

It was a different tale to tell when Denbighshire took the field. They have two bowlers of real class in Ironmonger and MacAlpine the former a fastish left-hander, and the latter a fast right-hander. These two were backed up by some very fine fielding, and there were one or two good change bowlers to relieve them at intervals.

Yorkshire's first six wickets fell for 50, most of them to really fine bowling. Ironmonger was bringing the ball in sharply, and the ones which bowled Kippax and Bedford would have beaten anyone.

Nine wickets were down for 108 when Heaton joined Hutton, and the best cricket of the day was seen. Hutton reached his 50 in two hours and twenty minutes, and then opened out in splendid style. Heaton, who has improved his batting out of all recognition, lent valuable support, and occasionally produced a stylish late cut to augment his own score.

Hutton hit Wooller for three consecutive fours in one over, and scored his last 36 runs in 25 minutes. His innings of 86 not out was a really notable achievement, and as the result of the fine last wicket stand with Heaton, who made a very sound 24. Yorkshire have a good chance of winning with an innings to spare.

SPORT AT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Need for North v. South Match

At the beginning of the last month of the Summer Term, it is opportune to take stock of the coming Public School fixtures at Lord's, which culminate in the matches between Lord's Schools v. the Rest, and Public Schools v. the Army. Although the selection of the sides for the Lord's Schools match is generally made in a most conscientious manner, it is not unnatural that Southern cricketers, who are more in the public eye, and therefore find more advocates for their inclusion, predominate to a marked degree in the Rest side.

This year the North can command an array of batting and bowling talent such as it has rarely had at its disposal in recent years, and the writer would like to advance the suggestion that the M.C.C. should organise an additional trial match—North v. South—at the end of the current month, with a view to aiding the selection of a more representative Rest of England eleven.

It would be difficult to make Lord's the venue for such a match, much as one would like to see its birth there, for the annual fixtures between Rugby and Marlborough, Haileybury and Cheltenham, and Clifton and Tonbridge occupy the first week of August, and the Lord's Schools v. Rest match is fixed to take place on August 7 and 8. There are, however, plenty of London clubs who would be only too pleased to lend their grounds for a match of this type, and one is confident that such a fixture would be an extremely popular addition to the existing programme of matches arranged by the M.C.C. And its value to the selectors of the representative sides for the Lord's Schools and Army matches will not be denied.

A Northern Eleven

There are few pastimes more fascinating than team selecting, and whilst realising that one's ideas on such a subject rarely coincide with those of every reader, the writer would like to submit the names of eleven Northern Public School cricketers who could be relied upon to give a good account of themselves against any other Public School eleven in the country this year. These are in order of batting:—

N. S. Mitchell-Innes (Sedbergh) (capt.), N. W. D. Yardley (St. Peter's, York), A. G. Horton (Stonyhurst), I. C. Henry (Uppingham), C. F. Grieve (Ampleforth), M. Barnby (Sedbergh), R. H. Williamson (Uppingham), F. G. Turner (Worksop), C. W. S. Thomas (Durham), M. A. de Bertodano (Stonyhurst), and T. G. L. Ballance (Uppingham).

It is interesting to note that seven of these players are captains of their School elevens. The above side is extremely powerful in batting; Mitchell-Innes, Horton, Henry, Yardley, and Grieve have all scored their centuries this term, and have batted consistently well throughout; Barnby is also a batsman of real class, while Williamson and Turner are very useful all-rounders; Thomas is a fine wicket-keeper, and a good left hand bat, while De Bertodano, the Stonyhurst fast bowler, and Ballance, with his spin bowling, are assets to any attack.

The bowling is by no means limited to De Bertodano and Ballance, however, for Mitchell-Innes (fast medium), Horton (fast medium), Williamson, Turner (who took 6 for 34 v. St. Peter's, and 6 for 44 v. Trent), Grieve and Yardley, are all decidedly useful with the ball. One would venture to add that Mitchell-Innes, Horton, Henry and Ballance could hardly be omitted from a Rest of England side.

The M.C.C. have done more than any other body to foster and promote school cricket, and for many people the Schools fortnight at Lord's produces the most interesting games of the season. If an annual North v. South fixture could be arranged, it would further cement the existing ties between the Headquarters of Cricket and the nurseries which have supplied them, and the cricket world in general, with so many of their greatest cricketers.

UPPINGHAM were able to preserve their unbeaten record, after an exciting match against Rugby. Rugby batted first on a dead wicket, but some accurate bowling by R. H. Williamson and T. G. L. Ballance prevented them from making much headway. By lunch time four wickets had fallen, and only 80 runs were on the board, M. H. Walford having batted patiently for 38. After the interval R. S. Cranston showed fine form, but he got little assistance from his partners, and he was at last dismissed in hitting out. For Uppingham, Williamson took 4 for 44, and Ballance 4 for 53, the innings closing for 176. Two Uppingham wickets fell for 12, but a useful stand between I. C. Henry and M. H. Bell took the score to 58, when the former was caught at mid-on off a skier. With half the side out for 115, the odds appeared rather in favour of Rugby, but Bell, who had defended well, found a useful partner in A. M. Ormsby, and these two laid the foundations of victory. Seven wickets were down for 148, but Ballance stayed with Ormsby while 26 runs were added. When the end came, Ormsby was not out with 44 to his credit, and he was awarded his colours after the match.

ST. BEES were beaten by Giggleswick by 80 runs, at home. Giggleswick batted first on an easy wicket, and with unlimited patience they amassed 182. Akam taking 5 for 39. St. Bees started badly, losing six wickets for 68 before the close of play. On the following day, only four hours' play was available. Chiefly owing to J. H. P. Hall (31), St. Bees increased their total to 102. Abbs (3 for 36) and Gallagher (3 for 14) being Giggleswick's most successful bowlers. In the second innings, Giggleswick played for safety, taking over two hours to get 68. Shanks bowled very well, taking 6 for 11. Left with 60 minutes' play, and 144 runs to get, St. Bees were faced with an almost impossible task. They made a gallant attempt, G. H. P. Shanks and J. A. Boucher putting on 47 for the first wicket in 20 minutes. When stumps were drawn, however, they were 38 runs behind, and the match was decided on the first innings.

STONYHURST drew with a strong Liverpool team, which included Colonel L. Green, the late Lancashire captain. The visitors won the toss, and batted first, scoring 232 for 7 before declaring. Of these, Colonel Green made 112 not out. E. Weldner took four for 64. Stonyhurst, who were playing without A. G. Horton, their captain, had little over two hours in which to make the runs, and finding it impossible to score at over 100 runs an hour, they settled down quietly to play out time. The score when stumps were drawn was 138 for 1, of which P. de la H. Moran had made 60 and H. Green 50 not out. The first wicket produced 116 runs.

SEDBERGH beat Liverpool by eight wickets. The visitors were dismissed for 136, and the School replied with 200 for 4, of which Mitchell-Innes scored 81 and Reed 44. Warren, Reed, and Nichols divided the wickets for the School. The first defeat of the year was inflicted upon Sedbergh by the Durham County Pilgrims who, as usual, brought a very strong side. Sedbergh did well to get them out for 260, and they failed by 100 to get the runs. N. A. Daggart (8 for 31) was too good for everyone except Reed, who carried his bat for a determined 59.

ST. PETER'S, YORK, who won at Durham in 1931, repeated their success on the latter's ground, by a margin of 101 runs. The opening St. Peter's pair put on 75 before Yardley was out in trying to hook a low ball with his score at 61. The side eventually totalled 197, Newman making 43 and Ogley 30. Lishman took 3 for 20. The wicket was crumbling when Durham went in, and although Thomas hit up 31, and Brett (23) and Lishman (20) batted well, Yardley had all the rest in difficulties. The last four wickets fell to Yardley and Garbutt for 8 runs, and the former took 5 for 53 in all. Durham were all out for 96.

The Yorkshire colts monopolised the crease for the whole of the day on a sun-baked pitch at Crewe, yesterday, and concluded with the substantial total of 370 for seven wickets. Cheshire were made to pay dearly for their early mistakes in the field. Hutton, who contributed 118, should have been rut out on two occasions before he became established. Along with H. Halstead he laid a solid foundation for the opening partnership, which yielded 75 runs. Cheshire were not seen at their best all day, and tried no fewer than seven bowlers, who were unable to obtain much use from the pitch, which towards the end of the day became exceedingly dusty. When the Yorkshire captain, Col. Chichester-Constable went to the crease at the fall of the sixth wicket his bat struck the ground when he was making his first stroke and he was enveloped in a cloud of dust.

Hutton certainly took what sting there was out of the Cheshire bowlers. His contribution of 118 was obtained in a few minutes short of four hours, and included 14 boundaries. At one time he was partnered by R. K. Davidson, who, besides the captain, is the only amateur in the team.

After Hutton had been dismissed, Cheshire found another stumbling in Turner, who gave a good all-round exhibition to score 79. At the close Shackleton and Chichester-Constable were scoring at a fast pace, and when the Yorkshire captain returned to the pavilion he declined to state whether he would declare the innings at the present total.

Of the Cheshire bowlers, Dennis Wilson and Steventon, who performed the major part of the attacking, received little consolation. The Nantwich player commenced well by taking Davidson's wicket, and he kept the runs down to the minimum, but later in the day he was well knocked about, and his single wicket has cost him 103 runs.

At the end of an amazing day's cricket, Yorkshire colts had 429 runs on the board for six wickets in their return match with Lancashire colts here.

The meeting of these two sides at Bradford produced a double century for young Washbrook, and to-day, Cyril Turner, the Sheffield left-hander, returned the compliment with a glorious innings of 207 not out.

Playing probably the finest innings of his life, Turner was at the wicket just under five hours, and he only gave one chance—a catch behind the wicket, which Farrimond dropped right at the start. Turner's display was naturally in a class by itself, but W. E. Harbord batted most attractively to score 65, and Fisher, although not quite at his best, made 63, and helped Turner to put on 163 for the sixth wicket.

Gruelling for Lancashire

Yorkshire were very lucky to have first use of a plumb wicket, and the fielding side had a gruelling time in the blazing sun. The bowlers, who were mostly of the medium-fast variety, stuck to their work well, while the fielding, especially that of Parkin, was consistently brilliant.

The visitors began none too well, losing Kippax and K. R. Davidson for 31 runs. Kippax batted attractively for his 21, but playing some nice shots on the off-side, but playing some nice shots on the off-side, but his opening partner, Hutton, was not at his best. Putting the efforts of any self-respecting tortoise in the shade, he took three-quarters of an hour to reach double figures.

W. E. Harbord started slowly, but with the approach of lunch, the batting brightened, and the 100 went up in an hour and three-quarters. After lunch, Harbord completed a fine 50, notable for powerful off driving and ability to force the ball away on the leg side. When the pair had put on 96 for the fourth wicket, Harbord played outside a ball from Pollard, a medium fast bowler, who kept a good length, and, at times, made the ball lift awkwardly.

Bowling Thrashed

Then Pearson and Turner put on 92 for the next wicket before the young Scarborough batsman was run out when attempting a short run to give Turner his 100, which he reached after two and a half hours. Pearson had shaped very well in making 27.

From this point we were treated to a grand exhibition of batting mastery. Turner had the tired bowling at his mercy, and he thrashed it soundly to every quarter of the field. Eight of the Lancashire side were field. Eight of the Lancashire side were put on to bowl, but Turner, ably backed up by Fisher, brooked no interference with his appointment with a double century. The majority of his runs were gained by two shots—the off drive and the hook to leg off the short rising ball—while he also played the individual stroke rather late past point.

Fisher saw the total past 400, and then Buller came in to partner Turner on the last lap of a great innings. He remained at 186 for a long time, and then, noting the march of time, took three fours in one over. Then, amid applause from a crowd of nearly 3,000, he made a slashing off drive to the rails to pass the 200, and Washbrook's milestone to fame.

WASHBROOK'S DECLINE

OLD TRAFFORD, Tuesday

The return match between the second elevens of Yorkshire and Lancashire ended in a draw here this evening, Yorkshire taking points for a lead of 191 on the first innings.

This result was almost a foregone conclusion at the end of yesterday's play, for Yorkshire, having batted all day for 429, were not equal to the task of dismissing such redoubtable opponents twice in the remaining day, on a perfect batsman's wicket.

Colonel Chichester-Constable declared at his side's overnight total of 429 for 6, and at the start it did not seem out of the question that Lancashire would go very near to equalling this score, provided that Washbrook revealed his real form. The display of this young batsman was, however, one of the most disappointing features of the match.

Not the Same

After watching him for 55 leaden minutes, one could hardly bring oneself to believe that this was the batsman who played such a peerless innings on his debut in Minor County cricket some two months ago. His subsequent initiation into the rites of traditional Lancastrian immobility has been carried out in most thorough fashion. He has been converted from a batsman of tremendous promise and great versatility into a stereotyped player with hardly any of his grand off strokes remaining.

He has now been taught to cover up religiously, and regard his pads with a new respect. One can only hope that he may yet escape the vigilance of his mentors with some of his attractive strokes still untamed.

The best batting of the innings came from F. D. Beattie and the Australian, Bennett, who put on 176 for the third wicket in just under three hours. Beattie revealed a nice variety of strokes behind the wicket, a late cut made with precision and power being most profitable. He hit 13 fours, and was unlucky enough to miss his century by three runs.

His partner, Bennett, was so stolid at times that the real virtue of his batting was not perhaps sufficiently realised. His chief asset is his quick footwork; facing a slow bowler he gets to the pitch of the ball well, and he can execute that present day rarity, the straight drive, very effectively.

Remarkable Collapse

Beattie and Bennett looked quite capable of staying together all day, but the advent of the new ball heralded a remarkable collapse. Beattie was leg-before to a shooter from Fisher at 203, and his exit was followed in almost indecent haste by that of the remaining seven batsmen.

Fisher, who took five for 54, and Turner, who sent down 34 overs, seventeen of which were maidens, for 43 runs and four wickets, shared the honour of this accomplishment. These two met with little support, for Hall, who played throughout with a heavily bandaged side, was only able to bowl at half his usual speed, and Heaton, for once, lost his customary accuracy, his 17 overs including too many full tosses.

With less than an hour and a half to go, and their bowlers tired, an attempt to dismiss Lancashire again would have been unjustified, so the Yorkshire Colts indulged in some useful batting practice, scoring 72 for two in their second innings. Hutton improved on his monumental effort of yesterday with a sound 32, while Kippax and K. R. Davidson also batted well.

Kippax, whose innings are too often marred by the desire to score at an inordinate rate in the opening overs of the match, would probably be better suited at No. 4 or 5. At present, he lacks the modicum of patience and restraint so essential for a first wicket batsman.

COLTS MAKE A FLYING START

Minor Counties Challenge Match

HEATON'S GREAT WORK

By Our Special Representative

NORWICH, Wednesday
 Yorkshire Colts accomplished one of their finest days' work for years—and one is not forgetting the second day of the Northumberland match at Redcar a fortnight ago—when they dismissed Norfolk for 147 runs, and repiled with 139 for the loss of two wickets, in the Minor Counties Championship Challenge match, which began here to-day.

Norfolk, with a powerful batting side, had everything in their favour, for the wicket was a batsman's paradise, and Falcon was lucky enough to win the toss. The Colts were on top all day, however, and after splendid bowling and fielding had sent Norfolk back for their lowest score but one this season, Yorkshire's early batsmen played delightfully against a variety of bowling, mostly on the fast side, and K. R. Davidson and Hutton put on 94 for the first wicket.

D. F. Walker and Basil Rought-Rought opened the home innings. Hall and Turner were the bowlers, and Hall has never struck such a deadly blow at an opposing side as he did in his second over. He had Rought-Rought leg before when he had scored a single, and W. J. Edrich had his leg stump knocked flat two balls later.

Heaton's Galle

With two of Norfolk's best men out for a single, Falcon exercised justifiable caution, and Walker was never inclined to take risks. The latter, who opened the batting for Oxford this year, has hardly a single shot in front of the wicket, and his batting was most unimpressive to-day.

The decisive factor in Yorkshire's success was introduced into the attack at 23, and this factor in the guise of Heaton, the leg-break bowler, met with instantaneous reward. He clean bowled Walker in his first over, and from the moment he went on, he always looked like getting wickets. The degree of spin he imparted to the ball on a cast iron pitch was simply astounding, and with Hall and Douglas keeping an excellent length, and preventing runs at the opposite end, the remaining Norfolk batsmen had a sorry time.

Falcon found Heaton extremely difficult to cope with, but he made his 45 runs most confidently, his driving on both sides of the wicket being perfectly timed. When he left in Heaton's second over after lunch, Yorkshire were never long without a wicket, and only Desmond Rought-Rought offered any real resistance. Heaton took 5 for 45 in a long spell; Hall 3 for 58; and Douglas 2 for 16.

Splendid Start

The Colts were left with two and a half hours' batting, and K. R. Davidson and Hutton gave the side a splendid start. Norfolk opened with R. C. Rought-Rought and W. J. Edrich, two fast bowlers with contrasting styles. Neither batsman was unduly troubled, however, and the 50 went up in as many minutes. Davidson several times punished short bumping balls from Rought-Rought, and he made 35 of the first 50.

Hutton was, as usual, more restrained, but he brought off one magnificent hook to square leg for four off Rought-Rought, and when they resumed after tea at 59, they looked capable of staying together until the close. A magnificent slip catch by Walker got rid of Hutton, however, when a century partnership was in sight, and an equally fine catch at the wicket dismissed Davidson, who had batted with delightful freedom and variety of strokes for his 59.

Turner and Harbord were subjected to some fearsome "body-line" bowling by Thompson during the last half-hour, but they emerged scathless and unseparated.

COLTS CROWN A FINE SEASON

Champions of the Minor Counties

POWER OF HEATON

NORWICH, Thursday
 The Yorkshire Second Eleven won the Minor County Championship here this evening when they beat Norfolk by nine wickets in the Challenge Match. Their convincing victory was gained after a remarkable day's cricket, and the match will be remembered chiefly on account of Heaton's brilliant bowling. He followed up his first innings feat by claiming six more victims for under ten runs a piece, and not one of Norfolk's powerful batting side faced him with any confidence.

Heaton possesses the ability to turn the ball from leg very quickly on the hardest and most perfect of wickets, and it is this surprising pace of the break which beats most of his opponents. F. was splendidly supported by Buller, who stumped six men off his bowling in the two innings.

Dramatic Collapse

When play began this morning, W. E. Harbord and Turner soon put the side ahead, and the amateur went on to score 36 in an innings notable for fine forcing strokes on both sides of the wicket. N. W. D. Yardley was shaky at first, but soon began to score very fast. He hit two beautiful fours to long leg before he flicked at a rising ball, to be taken behind the wicket.

So far, Yorkshire had been making satisfactory progress, but Yardley's exit was the signal for a dramatic collapse. Yardley and Turner had put on 44, but the remaining six wickets went down for 18 runs. Turner completed a valuable half-century in 24 hours, hitting 6 fours. Yorkshire's innings closed at lunch with a lead of 83, a much smaller advantage than seemed probable at one time.

Norfolk were only saved from ignominy in their second innings by D. F. Walker, who played a painstaking innings of 53. For a first-class batsman, Walker has remarkably few shots, but his defence is very sound, and he occasionally brought off a fine hook to leg off Heaton.

Obstinate Walker

Basil Rought-Rought was again first to leave, with only one run scored, and although Falcon and Thistleton Smith proved obstinate, Walker could get no one to stay with him for long. Falcon played a huge leg break from Heaton into the hands of Douglas at slip, and Thistleton Smith, after remaining a monument of inactivity for an unconscionable period, had his leg stump removed by Hall immediately after tea.

Heaton had all the remainder proverbially "on toast." The innings closed for 123, and Yorkshire were thus left to get 40 runs for victory.

Davidson was caught at the wicket once again with only one run scored, but Harbord and Hutton refused to be hurried, despite ironical applause by the belt of spectators who remained to the finish, and at quarter to seven the Colts had crowned the finest season's work with a brilliant victory.

REVIEW OF COLTS' SEASON

Promising Outlook for Yorkshire

SUCCESSFUL NEWCOMERS

By Our Special Representative

The Yorkshire County Cricket Club have rarely had more reason to feel pleased at the progress of their young players than this season, and the winning of both first-class and Minor Counties Championships at one fell swoop is a unique distinction.

Probably the greater proportion of those interested in the performances of the Colts have failed to appreciate the full magnitude of their achievement this year, but this will be realised when it is remembered that the County Committee regard the winning of this competition as a consideration entirely secondary to the importance of training on fresh blood.

Their main object, and rightly so, is to give trials to any young players of genuine promise, irrespective of their experience of this higher class of cricket, and this is bound to militate against their sustained success in the Minor Counties Competition, where they have to face the keen rivalry of the Minor Counties proper, whose one goal is the championship.

The most gratifying feature to note is the prominent part played by newcomers to the side in its Championship success. Hutton, the 18-year-old Pudsey youth, has made steady improvement throughout the season, and is now a first wicket batsman of outstanding promise. At present his chief fault is his inability to open out at all when the state of the game demands a faster rate of scoring, but occasional forcing shots which one has seen him play, particularly on the leg side, prove that he has the ability, if not the inclination, to do so.

His defence is remarkably sound, and with improved physique he should prove one of the most valuable "discoveries" the county have made in recent years. Any young batsman who can score, as Hutton has done, 700 odd runs in his first season in Minor Counties cricket is well worth persevering with.

Promise of Pearson

If Pearson, of Scarborough, could have grafted on to his batting a little of Hutton's stolidity, he would be equally promising, for he has a wide variety of shots, and he only fails to make big scores on more frequent occasions through his desire to hit out at inopportune moments. A quick scorer, he is a delightful young batsman to watch, the most attractive feature of his cricket being his powerful and well timed off-driving, his powerful and well timed into the side. He is only 17, and coming into the side half-way through the season to play a fine initial innings of 90 against Denbighshire, he has given ample proof in subsequent matches that his successful debut was no flash in the pan.

K. R. Davidson can hardly be termed a newcomer, but he has been out of the Colts' side for several seasons. His return greatly increased the solidity of the batting, and he played a number of fine innings, notably one of 170 at Stoke, and 151 against Durham at Headingley. In the latter match, W. E. Harbord made his maiden century in Minor Counties cricket and he, too, has had a good season with the second eleven, finishing with an average of well over 30. Harbord is a most valuable batsman in a crisis, for nothing perturbs him, and he has never played a more valuable innings than that against Northumberland, at Jesmond, when his century partnership with Turner led to a thrilling Yorkshire victory that at one time seemed out of the question.

Three other young batsmen who were tried during the season, Kippax, Spicer, and N. W. D. Yardley, all justified their selection, although on paper their performances are not impressive. Kippax opened the innings for the greater part of the season, first as partner to Halstead and then to Hutton, but although he started well, with a half century on his first appearance, he was not seen at his best on one occasion during the remainder of the programme. He possesses

fine physique and an excellent knowledge of the game, which one is confident he will translate from theory to practice once that he has conquered the rather restless temperament which prejudices his chances of success as a first wicket bat.

An Unaccountable Failure

The failure of Spicer was unaccountable, for during his surprisingly brief innings he batted with such encouraging ability and confidence that spectators were led to anticipate scores of 50 or more, instead of the disappointing contributions which were actually forthcoming. Spicer has the build of an athlete, as becomes one who plays professional football throughout the winter, and he watches the ball well, while his footwork is as good as the majority of first-class batsmen. One can only suppose that, in common with Kippax, he struck in 1933 one of those occasional "off-seasons" which come to most cricketers.

The St. Peter's School captain, N. W. D. Yardley, only played in two matches at the end of the season, having earned his place by a series of phenomenal feats in Public School cricket. He scored just under a thousand runs for St. Peter's, and followed this up with a dazzling 189 at Lord's, and several big scores for the Yorkshire Gentlemen. He is rather too impetuous for the more serious atmosphere of Minor Counties cricket at present, his batting being governed by the urge to score at a great pace without sufficient regard for the quality of the bowling against him.

He has fine wrists, and a wide range of strokes, and his innings in the Challenge match was full of promise; once again, however, he got himself out unnecessarily, flicking at a rising ball well on the off-side. He is a beautiful fieldsman, and with more experience he should be useful to the County.

Turning to the "old hands," Turner has enjoyed one of the finest seasons of his career, and it would hardly be an exaggeration to say that his consistently brilliant batting has been chiefly responsible for his side's leading position in the table. Time and again he came to the rescue of the side when runs were badly wanted, and although his wonderful double century against Lancashire ranks among his best performances, those who saw his great, fighting innings of 77 on a crumbling wicket at South Shields would be inclined to class this as his finest display of a remarkable season, in which he has made 754 runs in 14 innings, for the splendid average of 83.77.

His steady bowling has been extremely useful, while his influence in the side has been of inestimable value. Col. Chichester-Constable could have no more reliable and efficient lieutenant.

The "Find" of the Season

The greatest bowling "find" of the season has undoubtedly been Heaton, of Dewsbury, whose leg-breaks utterly bewildered Norfolk in the Challenge match. Heaton was another player to come in half way through the season, but he was an immediate success, and for a bowler of his type his 40 odd wickets were obtained at a low cost.

He has a much lower trajectory than the average leg break bowler, and he can turn the ball very fast on any sort of wicket. He is considerably more accurate than Temple, of Scarborough, who received an extended trial at the start of the season, and is not easily hit off his length—a tremendous asset. Heaton is also no mean batsman, and in general his showing this year leads one to think that his introduction to first-class cricket will not be long in coming.

M. Falcon, of Norfolk, a shrewd judge of cricket, who has been taking part in Minor Counties and occasional first-class matches for some 25 years, expressed the opinion to the writer during the Challenge match at Norwich that Heaton was one of the best bowlers he had ever played against, and this remark, coming from such a source, is worthy of more than passing notice.

Hall, the York fast bowler, rendered splendid service, maintaining pace and length throughout the most gruelling of days, and Douglas was once again a pillar of accuracy, his 111 overs costing less than one run a-piece.

No review of the Colts' season would be complete without reference to the inspiring captaincy of Col. R. C. Chichester-Constable, who led the eleven with rare judgment and ability throughout the season. As usual, he set a fine example by his brilliant fielding at cover-point, and he managed the limited bowling strength at his command with admirable judgment.

The nine-wickets victory over Norfolk—a fitting climax to a wonderful season—was the reward he would have most preferred for his enthusiastic work in the cause of Yorkshire's future cricket welfare.
