

SUFFOLK OUT FOR 231

Missed Catch Proves Expensive

CAMBS. FIRST HOME MATCH

Cambs. opened their home Minor Counties programme to-day with a match against Suffolk at Fenner's.

Suffolk won the toss and naturally took advantage of an excellent wicket. Against the bowling of Smith and Morton, Porter and Burgess scored at a run a minute, and the former was playing particularly well. At 48 Whewell displaced Morton, and on his third ball Porter was l.b.w. with 30 to his credit. Lockitt, next man in, was tangled up by his first ball and was almost l.b.w.

At 52 Eagle replaced Smith, and Coots dropped a slip catch from Lockitt off the last ball of the over. Next over Whewell clean bowled Burgess. At 89 Eagle bowled Catchpole after a third wicket partnership of 33. Wilkinson had previously taken over at the other end from Whewell.

With Lockitt and Waugh together Morton had his second spell at the far end. Next over Lockitt sent up the 100 after an hour and 25 minutes, and a little later completed his 50 with a four through the covers off Morton. He had batted 55 minutes. Further changes had no effect on the partnership, and the rate of scoring increased. In the last over before lunch, however, Eagle bowled Waugh for 24. Lunch was taken with the total at 156 for 4.

A quarter of an hour after the resumption Smith gained a valuable wicket by bowling Lockitt with the total 174. He had made a nice 77. Ormsby made some attractive shots in the course of the next partnership before being caught behind the wicket by Cockell at 195. Two runs later Kent played a ball from Wilkinson on to the off stump.

After the innings had lasted 2½ hours Goundry sent up the 200 with a fine six to square leg off Whewell. Smith, in bowling to Howard, the next man in, had five slips. At 205 Eagle registered another success by bowling Goundry. These quick after-lunch wickets had considerably altered the aspect of the game. An excellent leg-side catch by Cockell caused the ninth wicket to fall at 227 and four runs later Eagle finished off the innings by bowling Hall.

CAMBS. TIE ON FIRST INNINGS

Bad Collapse at Fenner's

SUFFOLK DECLARE

Cambs. were in a good position to-day when they started, but collapsed disastrously against Suffolk on Fenner's.

With the first ball of the day Catchpole captured Warren's wicket. The batsman put his leg across to play with his pad and the ball came in and hit the inside of his leg, going on to the stumps.

Wilkinson joined Smith, and the pair faced Catchpole and Waugh, who were using the new ball, as it had not been called for last evening at 200. Only one run had been made when Kent stumped Wilkinson very smartly off Waugh.

Three leg-byes had been added before Smith skied the ball to Hall and "took a

walk." He had failed to add to his overnight score.

At 227, Taylor was beaten by Waugh, and Cockell, last man in, came in with the knowledge that four runs were required to lead. Cockell took a single from the first ball and came in for the bowling at the other end. He survived an lbw appeal first ball, and took a single to third man off the second. Off the last ball of Catchpole's over Morton secured a leg-bye and faced Waugh. The second ball completely beat him, but missed the stumps, while he drove a single, for the tie, with the fourth ball. Next ball Cockell was bowled.

QUICK SUFFOLK WICKET.

Cambs. opened the bowling at 12 o'clock with Eagle and Smith against Porter and Burgess. At 13 Porter was sent back by Eagle. Whewell, fielding at short leg, took a full-blooded drive with one hand and fell to the ground to hold it. It was certainly a most remarkable effort.

Lockitt joined Burgess, and three times in succession Smith beat him with balls only a fraction outside the off stump. Even the umpire took his hat off and scratched his head! At 33, Wilkinson replaced Smith, and a little later Morton came on at the other end. The 50 went up after 37 minutes. The rapid scoring continued even when Whewell was brought on at 65. After 85 had been put on in an hour, Covill was called on for the first time in the match. Off his fifth ball Burgess reached his 50 with a cut six that Parfitt jumped up to and just handled with one hand. It could not be considered a chance. Warren, however, definitely gave Burgess a "life" by missing a catch at first slip off Wilkinson's bowling.

Smith and Eagle each had a second spell before lunch, but failed to separate the partnership. Lockitt reached his 50 after an hour and ten minutes. At the interval the total was 130.

When Cambs. took the field after lunch, P. G. Wolf was fielding substitute for Warren. Burgess and Lockitt continued to bat steadily although runs were not coming so quickly.

CENTURY BY BURGESS.

After batting two hours and ten minutes, Burgess reached his 100 out of 188. Runs came quicker now and the 200 went up after the innings had lasted an hour and 45 minutes. Next over, however, Coots took an excellent catch at short leg to dismiss Burgess, who had made exactly 100. As is often the case with big partnerships, Lockitt was out in the next few minutes to a catch by Eagle in the gully. The total was 213, of which he had contributed 91. Catchpole and Waugh scored rapidly for the fourth wicket.

After batting for just over 35 minutes Catchpole reached his 50 and sent up 280. The Cambridge bowlers were pretty well "tucked up" and Coots was brought on for the first time in the match. With 300 on the board, however, the Suffolk captain showed no signs of declaring, and he did not do so until four o'clock, when the score was 340. Catchpole had hit 92 in a little under an hour.

Caution naturally predominated when Cambs. opened their second innings with Coots and Covill.

CAMBS. WIN OPENING MATCH

Smith's Fine Bowling Against Beds.

Cambs. beat Bedfordshire by 171 runs in their opening Minor Counties' championship match of the season, which concluded at Luton on Tuesday.

Cambs. won the toss and batted. The first ball sent down by Lamont was a wide. The next hit Wilkinson's middle stump.

Covill was nearly caught in the slips off the third and the fourth removed his off stumps—1 for 1, two for four.

Thirty minutes were required for ten runs, at which Ward bowled Whewell. An hour produced 37 runs, and then Haywood relieved Lamont, but runs came more quickly, and despite bowling changes Coots reached fifty in an hour and 40 minutes. He was bowled by the slow left-hander after an invaluable innings and partnership of 83 with Parfitt—93 for four. Coots hit five fours and gave no chance. At lunch the score was one short of the hundred.

Parfitt sent up the hundred in the first over after lunch, and Ridgson got going well, but at 121 was clean bowled. Parfitt reached his 50 after two hours' batting, and then scored quickly, hitting Haywood for two consecutive fours.

Warren was badly missed in the slips, and was far from comfortable, but Parfitt, who likes this ground, kept the score going and 150 went up after two and a quarter hours. Both Parfitt and Warren nearly played on.

PARFITT'S GOOD INNINGS.

At 179 Browning took the ball from Haywood and his first delivery took Parfitt's off stump. Parfitt's innings occupied 2½ hours. He hit 12 fours, and his partnership with Warren realised 58. Taylor did not stay long, being bowled by a shooter at 188. The 200 went up in three hours 10 minutes. Smith had a lively knock, being caught at 220. Morton was caught at cover seven runs later, and Cockell bowled at 230.

Lamont took four wickets for 79 runs, and Haywood three for 57.

Bedfordshire opened after tea with Poole and Short, Morton and Smith taking the attack. Poole took a single off Morton, but was clean bowled by Smith's first ball. Short shaped well, but at 11 Milman was deceived by Smith's slower ball and was clean bowled.

A great one-handed catch in the slips sent Southgate back at 17. Morton met with success at 30, when he clean bowled Drowning. Colling opened with a single over the slips, and then runs came steadily, but at 42 Short gave an easy catch to Wilkinson at silly mid-off—42—5—20.

Colling and Rawlins sat on the splice, and right; and there were many maiden overs, for the bowling was good and the fielding keen. Whewell displaced Morton, and 50 went up after 90 minutes. Wilkinson took over from Smith and Ridgson from Whewell, but the latter was expensive and Warren superseded him.

Slowly the score rose, and Morton and Smith were brought back. The hundred went up just under two hours. At 110 Rawlins was bowled with a ball which never rose. The stand had yielded 68 runs. Colling's innings ended with the last ball of the day—a beautiful catch in the slips. Beds. wanted 19 to save the follow-on.

FOLLOW ON AVOIDED.

On the resumption of play on Tuesday, Smith clean bowled Ward with the fourth delivery, and after two singles, Waller suffered a similar fate. Haywood and Lamont saved the follow on, but Smith bowled Haywood to conclude the innings at 138. Smith bowled brilliantly, his three wickets this morning costing over seven runs. In all he took eight wickets for 28 runs in 26.1 overs, three maidens.

Cambs. began their second venture at 11.50 with Wilkinson and Coots. They were on the defensive and 45 minutes were occupied in making 30. At 42 Wilkinson was caught in the slips, and at 74 Covill was caught in attempting a big hit, and Coots was grandly caught at mid on six runs later, and Whewell on the leg boundary.

Parfitt was snapped in the slips off the first ball of the opening over after lunch. The hundred went up after two hours' batting. Ridgson scored quickly till his middle stump was sent back at 119.

Smith took a couple off his first two balls, but was caught off the third—123 for 7. Ten runs later Warren was bowled, an attempt being made to force the pace.

The tail continued to wag and at 3.15 Wilkinson declared, leaving Beds. three hours to get 247 to win.

BEDS. COLLAPSE.

Smith clean bowled Short with his fourth ball, and from Morton's first ball Poole was caught in the slips before a run was scored. Smith dismissed Milman with six scored by singles. The score was taken to 23 when Southgate was caught at silly mid-on. Browning was out unluckily, a run later, playing the ball on to his foot, whence it rebounded to the stumps. Colling fell to a ball that never rose before there was any addition—24 for 6 wickets.

Ward had a merry knock and Haywood and Waller showed some resistance for the ninth wicket, but the innings closed at 75.

Smith again bowled well, and it was only the attacking methods of Ward that spoilt his figures somewhat, for at one stage he had taken four wickets for six runs. His final analysis was four for 53. Wilkinson had three for 21, Whewell two for three and Morton one for 15.

SPORTING NOTES

HISTON SAVE THE GAME.

In an exciting finish on Downing College ground on Saturday, Histon Institute managed to save the Senior League game with Camden, the Institute's last wicket pair holding out in the vital last ten minutes. Camden made a poor start, two wickets being down for five runs and three for 18, but another splendid innings by Warren put a different complexion on the game. He was unbeaten for 140, which is a record for the ground, and hit 20 fours. Daisley, who hit eight boundaries, helped him to add 77 for the seventh wicket.

Histon were set to get 218 to win when Camden declared, and although one wicket fell cheaply, Rogers and Pullen added 60 for the second wicket partnership. With Bagot playing a sound innings, Histon had 120 on the board for the loss of only 109 wickets, but then came an amazing collapse. It was left to Talbot and A. Winders, the last wicket pair, to prevent Camden from snatching a victory. Of Camden's six bowlers, Ayres, with five wickets for 33, met with most success. Histon's most successful bowler was Taylor, with four for 77.

Y.M.C.A. DRAW AT LETCHWORTH.

Y.M.C.A. drew the return game with T.S.C. Letchworth, on Saturday. T.S.C. won the toss and elected to bat. The feature of the innings was a forceful not out century by A. Tasker. He got his runs from strokes all round the wicket and hit 14 fours and five threes. The remainder of the batsmen mustered only 52 runs between them, so the value of Tasker's innings can thus be judged. Abbs was the best of the bowlers and came out with the analysis of five wickets for 54 runs (all bowled).

Y.M. made a steady start, but after the fall of the first wicket, Webb, a slow left arm bowler, had most of the batsmen in difficulties, and it looked as though T.S.C. would win when 6 wickets had fallen for 59. However, by patient cricket, Brans and Thoday saved the day, and in spite of an extra quarter of an hour being played, the game finished in a draw with Y.M. 114 for seven.

COMBERTON AGAIN WIN CUP.

Tame Draw at Fenner's — Suffolk's Belated Declaration After First Innings Tie — Remarkable Victory For County Police — P. C. Garner's Great Innings — A Camden Century

CAMBS. FORTUNATE.

Cambs. were fortunate to secure a draw and first innings tie in their concluding day's play with Suffolk at Fenner's yesterday.

Cambs. continued batting in the morning only 18 runs behind with five wickets in hand but collapsed disastrously, and were lucky to scrape up 211 to tie.

Waugh with the use of the new ball, was responsible for raking four wickets at a cost of nine runs in the morning, after Warren had pad-played the first ball of the day on to his wicket. His best hits were six fours.

Waugh's final analysis was four wickets for 35 runs in 16.5 overs, five maidens. Goundry took two for 29 in eight overs, one maiden. Porter took one for nine, Howard one for 28, and Catchpole one for 35.

This collapse, which had not been justified by the state of the wicket, had entirely altered the aspect of the game, which had swung round in Suffolk's favour.

A remarkable one-handed catch by Whewell at short-leg dismissed Porter at 13 in Suffolk's second innings and gave rise to a flickering hope of a fairly low total, but this hope was quickly dispelled when Burgess and Lockitt were associated.

At no time did the ball master the bat, and the rate of scoring was well over a run a minute, and often approaching two. Neither man was faultless, and Lockitt, particularly, was lucky with three successive balls from Smith, but the pair cracked the ball hard and often, and were not separated until 202 was on the board.

Burgess was the one to go with exactly 100 to his credit. He had been strong on the off and hit 12 fours, a six and a five.

Twelve runs later Lockitt was out, having made a useful 91, of which the best shots were nine fours. By now the bowling had become ragged.

Catchpole and Waugh came together and scored at a fast pace, but one felt that Waugh, the captain, should have thought of declaring long before 4 o'clock, by which time the score was 340. In my opinion he would have had little to fear in declaring between 3.15 and 3.30 with the total under 200.

Catchpole made the best exhibition of the day as far as swift and powerful hitting was concerned and was undefeated for 92 after his sojourn at the wicket. He hit 16 fours.

As may be imagined from the score, the Cambs. bowlers had an exceptionally expensive afternoon, and Eagle took one for 96, Wilkinson one for 53, and Whewell one for 36. Smith, who had had luck against Lockitt, was unsuccessful at a cost of 65 runs.

Covill and Cooté batted very cautiously for Cambs. when the second innings followed, and it was not until the closing stages of the game, when all fear of defeat was past, that some more attractive cricket was seen.

Only one wicket fell, and that was at 61, when Covill was run out, Cooté refusing a single. Cooté and Parfitt were unbeaten at time.

Incidentally, it struck me that Wilkinson would do well to drop Whewell back to seven in the batting order instead of four. Whewell can never claim to be a top class batsman, but can often get valuable runs when the bowling is getting rather tired.

P. C. GARNER'S GREAT INNINGS.

If ever a man was the "hero of the match" it was P. C. Leslie Garner, of the Cambs. County Police, yesterday. His magnificent fighting innings swung an apparent defeat into a great victory, and once more demonstrated the glorious uncertainty of cricket.

It was a thrilling finish, and the old Cambridge Town footballer received a tremendous ovation when his side snatched the victory and qualified for the semi-final of the Home Counties Cup.

With eight wickets down for 100 in reply to the total of 235 put up by C Division Metropolitan Police, the County appeared to be in a hopeless position.

Garner realised that the only hope was to attack the bowling, and he did with gusto. It was not blind slogging, but when he did hit he hit hard.

Childerley gave admirable support for the ninth wicket, which added 101 runs. Childerley's share of this partnership was only nine, but it was a valuable innings for his side, for he kept his end up well while Garner was doling out punishment.

On Childerley's dismissal 35 runs were still required for victory, and a great responsibility developed upon Charter, the last man in. He was not over-awed by the occasion, and as the runs steadily mounted the excitement grew, a great yell indicating that victory had been secured.

Garner, who was unbeaten for 178, hit two sixes and 27 fours. He straight drove well and was strong on the leg side. It was not a faultless innings, for he was missed in the deep shortly before reaching his hundred and again shortly after completing it. Incidentally he ran to three figures with a straight drive for six.

The feature of the C Division innings was a second partnership of 93 by Pettigrew and Curtis, after the first wicket had fallen at 11. Pettigrew had five fours in his 47, and Curtis had seven boundaries in his 48.

Remens and Cowan were concerned in a stand of 65 for the fifth wicket, Remens hitting a six and five fours, and Waters made 32 of the 55 scored while he was at the wicket, being last out at 235.

Of the five County bowlers employed, Hart met with most success, taking five wickets for 50 runs. Miller had three for 45.

Cambs. lost their first wicket pair, Unwin and Cowley with only 18 scored, but Garner and Ellwood added 34 for the third wicket. Curtis and Remens had an effective spell of bowling, and eight wickets were down for 100.

Then came Garner's magnificent innings, scored in less than two hours. His 178 were made out of 228 scored while he was at the wicket, and of the 116 added for the last two wickets he made 121! What a contrast with the collapse of the tail against the Borough earlier in the week!

CAMDEN WIN AT WALDEN.

A fine not out century by R. C. Jackson, the Camden wicket-keeper, was a feature of the match at Saffron Walden on Thursday, when the Cambridge side won easily by six wickets.

Walden lost four wickets fairly cheaply, but Searle, who opened the innings, batted soundly, and when he was joined by Swan a useful stand resulted.

How much Walden owed to these two is seen by the fact that they scored 82 of the total of 128, Searle making 55 before returning a catch to McMillan.

Clement bowled exceptionally well, hitting the stumps six times in taking seven wickets for 25 runs in 13.5 overs, three maidens. McMillan had three for 51.

Camden lost Woolston for a single, but Jackson, who had opened with him, scored freely. Shearer backed up well for the second wicket, and Woodward helped to add over a hundred for the third.

Jackson reached 101 out of 165 in 80 minutes, and hit 17 fours. Of Walden's six bowlers, only Bacon, with two for 30, and Gilbey, with two for 14, met with success.

After their recent depressing experiences in being dismissed for paltry totals, Camden "seconds" showed a return to batting form on Thursday, when they beat St. Giles' II. by eight wickets in a 12-a-side match.

FIRST INNINGS POINTS FOR CAMBS.

A Lincs. Century at Fenner's COVILL'S BRIGHT BATTING

Cambs. took points for first innings lead in the return Minor Counties' championship match with Lincs., which concluded at Fenner's yesterday.

Lincolnshire won the toss, and batted first on Wednesday.

Lincs. opened with Dods and Bennett, and the former took a four to leg off Pask's second ball. Ridgeon was the other opening bowler, and his second ball went to the boundary for four wides. Nine more runs were scored off the over, and Ayres runs brought on next time.

Bennett sent up 40 after 24 minutes with a four to leg, and then was out lbw. to Pask's next ball.

With Ehrenfried in, Wilkinson replaced Ayres and tried his luck against a pair of left-handers. The 50 went up after 35 minutes, but nine runs later Ehrenfried was smartly caught in the slips by Coote

off Pask. In the same over Brown had his stumps scattered, and the situation had improved from Cambs. point of view. Dods and Brown, however, showed confidence, and at 85 Pask was replaced by Covill after bowling ten overs at a cost of 49 runs for three wickets. A double change was effected, McMillan replacing Wilkinson.

100 IN 80 MINUTES.

After 80 minutes Dods sent up the 100 with a four to the off. Whewell was brought on, but his "slows" failed to trouble the two batsmen. Dods edged a ball just short of Coote in the slips, but two consecutive fours off McMillan, gave him his 50 after 95 minutes.

Cambs.' eighth bowler, Rose, was tried before lunch, and Pask had a second spell. This proved effective, for Dods put his leg in front of a straight one from the fast bowler. The stand had proved very valuable to Lincs. Burness, next man in, was not too confident, and a rap on the thumb from a bumper did not improve matters for him. The pair were unbeaten at lunch, however.

A COLLAPSE.

Cambs. gained a quick success after lunch, when Pask gained his fifth wicket by getting Clark caught off his fourth ball. He had made an attractive 47. Wilkinson shared the bowling with Pask. At 156 Bell was run out by Cockell, who whipped off the balls from a smart throw-in by Parfitt. Burness had refused a single with Bell down the wicket. One run later Gillott guided a bumper from Pask into the safe hands of Coote. Appleyby made a good effort to drive the bowlers off their length, but was caught in the long field by Rose at 174. Four runs later Cawkwell was run out and the innings closed as R. F. Godby, who had had to be sent for, had not yet arrived.

Pask took six wickets for 78 runs. Cambs. had good reason to feel satisfied with themselves as a result of their after-lunch efforts. Coote and Covill opened the home side's innings against Bennett and Appleyby. "Billy" Cockell was fielding "sub."

BRILLIANT CATCH.

With 20 on the board Godby arrived, and Cockell received applause as he ran in from the field. Ten runs later Covill failed to deal adequately with a ball from Appleyby and was bowled. Rose joined Coote, but after lasting three balls was brilliantly caught in the slips by Dods. The catch was so low that the bowler's umpire consulted the square leg umpire before giving his decision.

Parfitt soon seemed to be settling down, and the first bowling change was made at 39, when Bell came on for Bennett, while ten runs later Gillott replaced Appleyby. Off his third ball Coote sent up 50 after just over 50 minutes' batting. This rate of scoring contrasted with Lincs. 40 in 24 minutes. At 54 Coote edged one from Bell which was well taken by Ehrenfried.

Wilkinson broke his duck off the first ball he received and the pair were unbeaten at tea.

After tea Parfitt and Wilkinson retrieved the situation, but the brake was on the scoring, although Parfitt sent the 100 up by means of three consecutive fours. The innings had lasted an hour and three-quarters. Wilkinson had a "life" from Appleyby soon afterwards, when Dods dropped a slip catch at 108. Next over Parfitt reached 50 after 75 minutes.

At 118 the partnership was separated, Parfitt playing a ball from Ehrenfried on to his wicket. His valuable innings of 54 had pulled the game round in Cambs.' favour after a shaky start.

Ridgeon played a sound innings and helped to add 43 for the fifth wicket before being bowled by a "duck," but Ayres and Whewell collected a "duck," but Ayres and Wilkinson added 39 for the seventh wicket. Wilkinson, who was out at 202, had batted in a painstaking fashion and although not a pretty watch, had made valuable runs at a critical period. The last three wickets failed to offer much resistance and added only 17 runs. No start was made on the Lincs. second innings as less than a couple of minutes remained for play.

YESTERDAY'S PLAY

Lincs. were 41 in arrears when they opened their second innings. Pask opened the bowling at the far end against Dods, and started off with a maiden, while Bennett faced Ridgeon, who also started off with a maiden. Bennett was now getting going, and made some excellent shots on both sides of the wicket. Dods opened out to send up 50 with a drive to the on-boundary after 45 minutes. Next over Bennett, who had looked set, was "yorked" by Covill.

Godby and Dods became associated for the second wicket, and looked fairly confident, although Whewell, who had been brought on at 71, tempted them to hit out. At 86, Ayres secured a wicket in his first over by bowling Godby. He was soon displaced by Pask, and Burness, the new batsman, seemed at first to have some difficulty in dealing with the faster bowler.

After an hour and a half Dods reached his 50 and sent the 100 up with the same stroke—a drive. When Burness had scored six, Ayres, who was having his second spell, appealed unsuccessfully for lbw. The pair continued on their way and bowling changes failed to disturb them. When Dods was in his eighties he put up a catch on the off, but it eluded Parfitt's grasp.

CENTURY WITH A SEVEN!

After two hours five minutes Dods reached his century with a seven! He hit a two and then followed five overthrows. First Whewell threw to Wilkinson, who was unable to stop it, and another sharp return had to be chased to the leg boundary by Cockell, who kicked it away from the edge and then had to chase it another 25 yards.

Both batsmen were scoring off practically every ball, and quick bowling changes had no effect.

On the resumption, Covill was again bowling from the pavilion end, opposed by Burness, who scored a single off his second delivery. Pask came on at the orchard end, and Burness pulled his first ball to the leg boundary for four. After a second delivery Pask secured the new ball, with the total at 216, and with it bowled a wide.

One run later Ridgeon displaced Covill. Dods was quite retained after luncheon, and did not add to his score for over ten minutes. After bringing his score to 132

he was caught at the wicket off Ridgeon with the total 226. He had batted for 3 hours and 50 minutes for his 132, hitting eighteen 4's and one 7 (all run). His partnership with Burness had realised 140 runs. Another wicket fell at 226, for Pask shattered Burness' wicket. His 41 was slowly scored, but he had kept one end going while Dods got the runs.

Clark and Ehrenfried now faced tired bowling, and proceeded to make merry. Just before the 250 went up Ayres had had luck in attempting a one-handed catch off Ehrenfried. The left-hander drove the ball very hard, and Ayres just got one hand to it, but the ball would not stick.

At 256 Pask made an excellent low catch with one hand off his own bowling to dismiss Ehrenfried.

Clark was scoring rapidly, and Brown was by no means uncomfortable. Wilkinson tried bowling round the wicket with a modified leg-theory field, while Covill had 12 taken off him in one over. After 55 minutes at the wicket, Clark reached his 50, including nine fours. In the same over the 300 went up after the innings had lasted 34 hours. At 3.30 p.m. the Lincs. captain declared with a lead of 277.

CAMBS.' EARLY REVERSE.

Cambs. suffered a quick setback, for Coote, who opened with Covill, was out lbw to Bennett before he had scored. The board read 1-1-0. Rose missed the first two balls sent down, but then got going. CAMBS. STEADY START

Opening Stand of 70 Against Beds.

Hertfordshire, who have yet to record a victory in the Minor Counties' competition, lost the toss in their match against Cambs. on the St. John's College Ground to-day, and Coots and Covill (R. J.) opened the home team's innings on a wicket that looked full of runs.

Cambs. made three changes from the team that took first innings points from Lincs. last week, H. D. Senior, F. Morton and Smith (C. J.) coming in for J. A. McMillan, R. J. Ayres and F. A. Ridgeon.

The start was a quiet one, Watts and Ward bowling so steadily and keeping such an excellent length that both batsmen were forced to show them every respect. By mid-day only 17 runs were on the board, and then Ward, who had bowled five overs for seven runs, was displaced by Browning, whom Covill immediately turned to leg for a nice two. A snick through the slips (off Watts) gave the same player his second boundary hit, and he followed this up with another four, all run, off the same bowler.

A loose ball from Browning was cracked to the boundary by Coots, and then Covill had a lucky escape. He nicked Ward into the slips, where Short missed an easy catch. Covill celebrated his good fortune by straight driving Ward for four, and Coots treated Browning in similar fashion. With a four and a single off Browning, Covill sent the 50 up in 45 minutes, and shortly afterwards Rawlins displaced Browning, whose six overs (the last a maiden) had cost 20 runs.

COVILL LBW.

With the score at 71, Covill (who had previously survived four appeals for lbw), was out "leg before" to Rawlins. His 38 included five 4's and two 3's, and he gave only one chance—when in the twenties. His departure slowed down the rate of scoring appreciably, and when the drinks came out at 1 o'clock the total was only 81, after 85 minutes' play. Watts was bowling very well indeed, his 13 overs (in two spells) conceding only 30 runs. At the other end Rawlins' slow good length stuff kept both batsmen quiet, and Ward, freshened by his rest, reduced scoring almost to a standstill for a quarter of an hour. With the total at 99, Browning returned, and off his third ball, Rose, who had been batting confidently, sent the century up with a two through the slips. The hundred had taken nearly an hour and three-quarters to compile.

Seven minutes before lunch Rose played forward to Browning, missed contact completely, and was clean bowled at 105 for an aggressive 20.

COOTE'S 50.

Coots completed his 50 in the third over after lunch with one of his best shots, a straight drive past the bowler which did not rise an inch. He had batted two hours without giving the semblance of a chance. Parfitt showed an inclination to open out and with three fours off Watts in two overs the score mounted to such an extent that 150 went up half an hour after lunch. When Browning was taken off in favour of Rawlins, the left-hander bowled a maiden to Coots, who could not be tempted to do anything in the least unorthodox. Parfitt cracked Ward to the off boundary in great style and glanced Rawlins to leg for two, but then went up the pitch to the left-hander and was clean bowled with total at 162. The third wicket had added 57 and Parfitt's 33 included five fours.

Wilkinson survived an lbw appeal early on and then three-quarters of an hour after lunch Coots gave Rawlins an easy catch off his own bowling. The feature of his 67 was his powerful driving to all parts of the field, the ball reaching the boundary on seven occasions. A score of 172 for four was good going considering the keenness of the fielding and the bowling, which had been good apart from one or two bad periods. Although bowling his twentieth over, Ward maintained a good pace and length, and soon beat Wilkinson, who looked well set.

H. D. Senior, the local player, making his first appearance for the county, scored quickly from the start, sending the third ball to the boundary past point and getting four twos in a couple of overs. Whewell also drove in grand style, and with a shot past long-on sent the 200 up at 3.30.

BOLD REPLY BY BEDS'

Poole's Century Against Cambs.

Heavy rain overnight and this morning delayed the continuation of the Cambs. v. Beds. Minor Counties' match on St. John's College Ground to-day. The wicket was inspected at 11.30 (half an hour after a start should have been made), but a further wait was necessary, and it was 12.15 before the covers were removed. A start was eventually made at 12.30, when A. B. Poole (56 not out) and A. W. E. Winlaw (13 not out) continued their overnight stand with the score at 114 for two.

Wilkinson's first over to Winlaw was a maiden, and a bye was the only score off Pask in his initial effort to displace Poole. Wilkinson immediately put on Smith, off whose first over Poole scored six—a four to the leg boundary and a two past mid-on. Both batsmen did some pitch-patting and a little sawdust was used, but the rain did not appear to have affected the wicket to the bowlers' advantage. If the sun had come out a different tale might have to be told.

WINLAW CAUGHT.

Poole drove Pask confidently for four, but Winlaw was not so comfortable, cocking the ball up close to two home fielders in the fast bowler's third over. Two balls later he did the same thing, and off the next ball lofted a catch to leg, where Wilkinson was waiting, and held it. In the same over Poole and Rawlins, the new-comer, each had a boundary hit. Poole helped himself to another brace of fours off Pask, and after surviving a confident appeal for a catch behind the wicket, sent the 150 up, 36 having been added in half an hour. Poole continued to be very severe on Pask, but he should have been caught off Smith when his individual score was 99, Morton dropping him in the slips. Rose displaced Pask, and off his fifth ball Poole was again missed, this time by Cockell. An over later, with a single off Rose, he completed his century, which had included 16 fours, in two and a quarter hours. The score then stood at 179 for the loss of three wickets. Rawlins gave Senior a very difficult chance when he was 19, and sent the next ball to the boundary. Wilkinson came on shortly before lunch and bowled a maiden to Poole.

In his first over after lunch, Wilkinson clean bowled Rawlins, who had added only one to his lunch score. A four by Southgate, which Smith should have saved, put the 200 on the board. Smith was given a chance with the new ball and Pask took over from Wilkinson at the other end. In his first over Pask bowled a wide and a no-ball, and neither he nor Smith caused either batsmen much discomfort. Poole was very strong on the leg side and turned Pask beautifully for a couple of fours and several twos.

Whewell for Smith was the next change in the bowling, and Poole twice put the ball in the air. The first time Parfitt just got his hand to it and the second time the ball went a little too wide of Pask in the slips for it to be called a chance. Southgate got little of the bowling, Poole usually managing to sneak a run off the last ball.

POOLE OUT.

Eventually, just before 3 o'clock, Poole gave Covill, fielding at silly mid-on an easy catch, Pask making the ball lift. Rain began to fall quite heavily and Milman was midway to the wicket when the umpires signalled the teams in again. Poole had played a fine innings, scoring well over half his side's runs and hitting freely and with great power all round the wicket. The break lasted only 12 minutes and play was resumed with Beds. requiring 126 with five wickets to fall—an interesting position.

Milman started to hit out straightaway, driving Whewell for four, but after only three overs rain again stopped play.

NORFOLK'S FINE START

Stand of 136 Against Cambs.

Cambs. commenced their last Minor Counties' match to-day, when Norfolk were the visitors to Fenner's. Winning the toss, Norfolk batted first on a good wicket. Cambs. made only one change from the team defeated at Lowestoft, S. Brans making a county debut in the place of F. Morton. Runs came freely from the start, 15 being scored in the first three overs and 20 in five. Smith and Pask were the bowlers, and the latter made the ball "pop" once or twice.

By mid-day there were 33 runs on the board, Thistleton-Smith being 23 and Gladden 8, both having survived lbw. appeals. With the score at 40, Wilkinson made the first bowling change, P. S. Morton going on for Pask, who had been trying, in vain, to tempt the batsmen with balls outside the off stump. In the new bowler's second over Gladden took a four and a single, but was more subdued when facing Smith. With a three through the slips off Morton, Thistleton-Smith sent the 50 up after 35 minutes. Gladden put the next ball to the leg boundary, and Thistleton-Smith the last of the over to leg for another three. Parfitt and Senior were applauded for smart fielding, the former making Gladden run very hard for the crease.

FAST SCORING.

Wilkinson then made a double bowling change, putting himself on for Morton and Covill for Smith. But runs continued to come at a fast pace, and Thistleton-Smith, with a four off Covill, completed his 50 in 75 minutes. Gladden, with a four and a two off Whewell (who had replaced Wilkinson), brought his total to 44, and with two fine fours off Covill reached his 50 and brought the total to the century after 80 minutes. Gladden celebrated his success with two grand sixes off Whewell, whose second over yielded 15 runs. When 130 had been scored in 85 minutes, Pask was brought back for his second spell, and Smith was restored to the end opposite the pavilion. In his second over Pask clean bowled Gladden, whose 68 (out of 136) included eight 4's and two 6's. This brought in Edrich (W. J.), whose century against the South Africans caused him to be watched with interest.

The rate of scoring slowed down, and it was 1.15 before Thistleton-Smith sent the 150 up with a four off Smith, who was bowling a good length. At this total Pask dropped Edrich off his own bowling, the first unaccepted chance of the morning. The pair remained undefeated at lunch, when the total was 165.

TWO QUICK WICKETS.

The score mounted quickly after lunch, Edrich driving Pask for two fours and each batsman had a boundary off Smith. A quarter of an hour after the resumption at a time when the fall of a wicket seemed unlikely, Thistleton-Smith was out-bowled playing forward to his namesake. His 69 contained nine fours and several threes, obtained chiefly in front of the wicket. E. Edrich joined his brother, who had knocked up 26 at this time and play quietened down considerably. Only five runs later, W. Edrich stepped in front of his wicket to hit Smith to leg, failed to connect and was given out lbw under the new rule. The 200 went up after two and a half hours' play, when E. Edrich turned Pask cleverly to the leg boundary, but two runs later Cockell cleverly stumped Self, who was very unconvincing when playing Smith.

The new ball kept both batsmen quiet.

Smith had six men in the slips, five close in, and making the ball turn, looked like adding to his bag at any minute. He added to the batsmen time and again, and beat the batsmen a couple of good Pask also gave Edrich a couple of good overs. Falcon seemed more at home, driving both Smith and Pask to the boundary. After bowling for an hour Pask was given a rest, Wilkinson taking his place in the attack. His first two overs yielded only two runs. The fifth wicket fell in Whewell's first over, after he had taken over from Smith, Pask holding a good catch from Smith, Pask holding a good catch from high up at square leg, with the score at 234. Three balls later Whewell cleaned bowled Purdy, the Haileybury boy, for a "duck."

CAMBS. FOLLOW ON

Continuing their overnight score of 117 for six wickets in reply to Norfolk's 314, Cambs. made a splendid start at Fenner's this morning, scoring freely off both Thompson and Rought-Rought, the opening bowlers. Morton had two fours on the first man's first over and Coote took four runs in one over from Rought-Rought, who was soon displaced by Ballance. After half an hour Edrich was brought on for Thompson, who had received scant attention, and conceded too many runs in his short spell. Coote gave E. Edrich a difficult chance at point when in the seventies, but otherwise batted in exemplary fashion, and Morton, after a shaky opening, settled down to give a sound display. The rate of scoring was over a run a minute, and by mid-day there were 181 runs on the board. Falcon for Edrich was the next change and Coote, soon hooked him to the leg boundary. With a four off Ballance, the left-hander brought his individual total to 96. COOTE'S CENTURY.

Another boundary off Thompson gave Morton his fifty and a little later Coote reached his hundred with a boundary hit off Rought-Rought. He had reached the boundary on 14 occasions, and the partnership had added 109 runs. At the same score Morton left, bowled with a full toss by Thompson, and Cambs. still required 33 to avoid the follow on with three wickets to fall. Morton hit six fours in his 53. Another full toss from Thompson took Smith's bail after he had scored a single bringing in Pask who had a lucky four off Rought-Rought, and was then beaten by the same bowler. Cockell came in with Cambs still needing 26 to avoid the follow on. He was missed in the slips by Self when he had scored three and then Coote, attempting to turn Thompson to leg was cleaned bowled and the innings closed at 231, Cambs. following on 114 runs behind, having failed to avoid the follow-on by 15 runs. Ballance was at the other end and off his third over Coote failed to get hold of the ball properly and was well caught by Rought-Rought fielding at cover. The score was only 28, Brans was again lucky when a snick went through the slips to the boundary.

Both batsmen adopted defensive tactics and runs came very slowly. Senior was not very comfortable and it came as no

Sports Gossip

Federation Cricket League Problems—Suggestion for Two-Night Matches — Business Houses Competition—County Darts Championship—Golf Items

By "THE LOOKER-ON."

FEDERATION CRICKET.

The Federation Cricket League cups and medals will be presented to the winners at the Y.M.C.A. on Thursday, October 3rd. The Rev. G. L. O. Jessop has consented to make the presentations.

In connection with this gathering a general meeting of club delegates will be held with a view to considering alterations to rules. It is felt that if this meeting discusses questions and makes recommendations it will save a considerable amount of time at the annual meeting.

One question that will come up for consideration is a suggestion that matches should be completed in two evenings. In some cases last season three evenings were occupied, and it is felt that such affairs reduce interest in a match.

The suggestion will be put forward with the proviso that should rain interfere with one of the two nights' play, then continuation on a third night will be permissible. It is felt, however, that if 3½ hours' play is possible in the two evenings, and the match is still unfinished, then it should rank as a draw.

Another suggestion that has been put to me by one club official is that each team be allotted a week to finish a match. If the match is not completed in a particular week, then, again, a draw should count.

The vexed question of umpiring has been considered by the Council. The suggestion has been put forward that old cricketers might, for a nominal payment, be willing to act in this capacity, but the argument against this is that of additional expense to clubs.

Another suggestion was that each club should nominate one or two non-playing members, who should be allocated to various neutral matches, but here again, I understand, the experiment has been tried in another competition and not considered satisfactory.

However, all these points will probably be raised at the general meeting, when they can be thoroughly thrashed out.

"BUSINESS HOUSES LEAGUE?"

I have received the following letter from N.W.F.:

"Your notes under this heading in last night's issue are of interest to several teams playing evening games, and I suggest a move be made at once to call a meeting. I appeal to you, sir, to make this matter as public as possible, and appeal to secretaries of clubs interested to write to you, in the first place, when perhaps you would be good enough to forward their letters to the instigator of the idea."

Although the club with which I am associated are connected with another competition, I am quite willing to do as my correspondent suggests and forward any communication to the quarter from which I gained the hint of the proposed League.

CAMBS. BEATEN AT LOWESTOFT

Suffolk's Victory by Five Wickets

Suffolk beat Cambs. by five wickets in a Minor Counties' match at Lowestoft on Tuesday.

With a wet wicket drying under a hot sun, the Suffolk captain sent Cambridge-shire in to bat on Monday.

After Catchpole, the fast bowler, had captured two cheap wickets for Suffolk, Coote and Parfitt put on 75 runs in the same number of minutes before Coote was caught at the wicket with the total at 86.

One run later Whewell shared a similar fate, the successful bowler being Cussen, who followed this by bowling Parfitt and F. Morton for the addition of only eight more runs.

The hundred was reached after nearly two hours' batting. In the last over before lunch Cussen secured another wicket, Smith being taken at square leg with 101 runs on the board.

Wickets fell quickly on the resumption, and the innings closed at 111.

SUFFOLK BOWLERS' SIX WICKETS.

Cussen took six wickets for 28 runs in 18 overs (four of which were maidens). Catchpole, the fast bowler, had four for 45.

Suffolk started steadily, and, although Porter was run out for 18 out of 30, Darville and Hockey took the total to 90 for the second wicket.

When this partnership was broken Suffolk were only 21 behind and had eight wickets standing, so that a big first innings lead seemed probable.

Apart from Hockey, however, the remaining batsmen did little of note. Hockey, who reached his 50 in 65 minutes, was bowled at 133. But for his valuable innings Suffolk might have been in arrears.

Of the five Cambs. bowlers, Wilkinson took four wickets for 63 runs, Smith three for 46 (30 overs, 13 maidens), Whewell two for 32, Pask none for 24 and P. S. Morton none for 15.

Going in a second time, Cambs. lost Covill to a "yorker" with only a single scored, but Coote and Senior added 41 before the drawing of stumps.

QUICK CAMBS' WICKETS.

Tuesday's play was delayed for two hours while the wicket dried after overnight rain. There were early sensations when N. Catchpole opened the attack against Coote and Senior, Cambs. losing four wickets before the arrears were wiped out.

In the fast bowler's first over Senior was brilliantly caught in the slips by Cussen. Parfitt helped to send up 50, but at 58 had his middle stump knocked back by Catchpole. Cussen, sharing the bowling at the other end, also kept the batsmen quiet, runs coming slowly. At 61 Smith was caught by Waugh, and two runs later Whewell was taken behind the wicket after he had survived a confident appeal for lbw.

Coote continued batting steadily, but was missed at point by Waugh.

P. Morton helped Coote in a bright ninth wicket stand that added 61. Coote carried his bat for 71 out of 141, and Suffolk were left to get 78 to win.

H. Catchpole took six wickets for 50 runs and Goundry three for 25.

Cambs. made Suffolk fight for the runs. Darvill was caught with only three scored and Porter was dismissed at 20. As in the first innings, however, Hockey batted soundly and was responsible for nearly half the runs.

Smith met with three quick successes for Cambs. taking three wickets for 19 runs in 16 overs. Wilkinson took the other two at a cost of 30 runs.

NORFOLK IN STRONG POSITION Cambs. After Tea Collapse

Norfolk finished the first day's play of their Minor Counties' match with Cambs. at Fenner's in a strong position. At the close, Cambs. needed 129 to avoid the follow on with only four wickets in hand.

Cambs. made only one change from the team defeated at Lowestoft, S. Brans making a county debut in the place of F. Morton. Runs came freely from the start, 15 being scored in the first three overs and 20 in five. Smith and Pask were the bowlers, and the latter made the ball "pop" once or twice.

By mid-day there were 33 runs on the board, Thistleton-Smith being 23 and Gladden 8, both having survived lbw. appeals. With the score at 40, Wilkinson made the first bowling change, P. S. Morton going on for Pask, who had been trying, in vain, to tempt the batsmen with balls outside the off stump. In the new bowler's second over Gladden took a four and a single, but was more subdued when facing Smith. With a three through the slips off Morton, Thistleton-Smith sent the 50 up after 53 minutes. Gladden put the next ball to the leg boundary, and Thistleton-Smith the last of the over to leg for another three. Parfitt and Senior were applauded for smart fielding, the former making Gladden run very hard for the crease.

FAST SCORING.

Wilkinson then made a double bowling change, putting himself on for Morton and Covill for Smith. But runs continued to come at a fast pace, and Thistleton-Smith, with a four off Covill, completed his 50 in 75 minutes. Gladden, with a four and a two off Whewell (who had replaced Wilkinson), brought his total to 43, and with two fine fours off Covill reached his 50 and brought the total to the century after 80 minutes. Gladden celebrated his success with two grand sixes off Whewell, whose second over yielded 15 runs. When 130 had been scored in 85 minutes, Pask was brought back for his second spell, and Smith was restored to the end opposite the pavilion. In his second over Pask clean bowled Gladden, whose 68 (out of 136) included eight 4's and two 6's. This brought in Edrich (W. J.), whose century against the South Africans caused him to be watched with interest.

The rate of scoring slowed down, and it was 115 before Thistleton-Smith sent the 150 up with a four off Smith, who was bowling a good length. At this total Pask dropped Edrich off his own bowling. The pair remained undefeated at lunch, when the total was 165.

TWO QUICK WICKETS.

The score mounted quickly after lunch, Edrich driving Pask for two fours and each batsman had a boundary off Smith. A quarter of an hour after the resumption at a time when the fall of a wicket seemed unlikely, Thistleton-Smith was out-bowled playing forward to his namesake. His 89 contained nine fours and several threes, obtained chiefly in front of the wicket. E. Edrich joined his brother, who had knocked up 26 at this time and play quietened down considerably. Only five runs later, W. Edrich stepped in front of his wicket to hit Smith to leg, failed to connect and was given out lbw under the new rule. The 200 went up after two and a half hours' play, when E. Edrich turned Pask cleverly to the leg boundary, but two runs later Cockell cleverly stumped Self, who was very unconvincing when playing Smith.

The new ball kept both batsmen quiet, Smith had six men in the slips, five close in, and making the ball turn, looked like adding to his bag at any minute. He beat the batsmen time and again, and Pask also gave Edrich a couple of good overs. Falcon seemed more at home, driving both Smith and Pask to the boundary. After bowling for an hour Pask was given a rest, Wilkinson taking his place in the attack. His first two overs yielded only two runs. The fifth wicket fell in Whewell's first over, after he had taken over from Smith, Pask holding a good catch high up at square leg, with the score at 234. Three balls later Whewell cleaned bowled Purdy, the Haileybury boy, for a "duck."

A straight drive off Covill's first ball in his second spell by Falcon sent the 250 up and with Rought-Rought hitting hard Cambs. began to lose the advantage of their quick wickets. Falcon should have been stumped off Whewell when his score stood at 32, but the mistake did not prove an expensive one, the Norfolk captain playing on to Covill only six runs later with the total 272.

MERRY HITTING.

Rought-Rought continued to hit out merrily, knocking a six and a couple of fours, but he soon lost Ballance at 291, "Billy" Cockell stumping him off Whewell. The 300 went up after three and three-quarter hours' play, and seven runs later Whewell bowled Thompson, who hit a couple of fours in his short stay and looked like getting a lot of runs. Rought-Rought was hitting at everything and reached his 50 with a fine six off Whewell which almost cleared the tennis courts. Smith came on for Whewell and Rought-Rought sent his first ball for a six. Three balls later Smith bowled Wood, and the innings closed at 345.

Smith took four wickets for 64 runs and Whewell four for 74.

CAMBS.' EARLY REVERSES.

Cooto and Brans opened the Cambs.' innings — a big responsibility for the Y.M.C.A. player, who, early on, gave a difficult chance in the slips to Edrich, who just failed to hold a fast travelling ball. Thompson and Rought-Rought were the bowlers, and in the former's third over Brans cocked up an easy catch to Rought-Rought at silly mid-on. Senior had an equally unlucky experience, pulling a ball on to his wicket before scoring. Two wickets for ten runs (including seven extras) was a very bad start, and Cambs. continued to have to fight for every run. In ten overs only 19 runs were on the board, Cooto being credited with the solitary four. The first bowling change was Falcon for Rought-Rought, who had bowled five overs for eight runs and one wicket. Cooto soon sent the new bowler to the boundary and treated Thompson in similar fashion. Then Covill gave Falcon an easy catch at second slip, bringing in Parfitt at a critical juncture. Runs began to come more freely, although Thompson was bowling at great speed to five slips and was most difficult to score off. After an hour 40 runs had been scored and Edrich (W. J.) came on for Thompson, off whom Parfitt had just taken a couple of fours. Falcon went off in favour of Ballance, who bowled two successive no balls, off which only singles were scored. Parfitt took a couple of nice fours off Edrich, but Cooto was more restrained, eleven successive scoring shots producing singles. He then took a three and a four off Edrich, and Parfitt also played some nice shots, but, with the total at 89, was bowled by Rought-Rought, who had just previously displaced Ballance. The stand had added 61 runs and improved Cambs. position considerably, but hardly enough to give them a fighting chance of a first innings' lead.

COOTE'S 50.

With two successive fours off Edrich, Cooto completed his individual 50, and the home county's 100; he had been batting just over two hours and hit no less than 23 singles. With three overs to go, Thompson bowled Whewell and Wilkinson with successive balls, and Morton came in to prevent the hat trick and indulge in some brisk hitting. Stumps were drawn with the score at 117 for six wickets.

CAMBS. CRICKET AVERAGES

Cooto Heads Batting With 56.25

NEED FOR FAST BOWLER

FAILING to maintain their early season promise, the Cambridgeshire County Cricket Club finished with a percentage of 50 in the Minor Counties' Championship table—their lowest figure for several seasons. Last year the percentage was 55.

Perhaps the most disappointing feature of the season was the inactivity of the bowling. True, that stalwart C. J. Smith had a better average than last year, but there was too much similarity about the rest of the bowling. Cambs. chief need seems to be a really fast bowler, and in this direction they are faced with a difficult task.

Another weakness often apparent during the season was in fielding. Dropped catches in one or two matches made all the difference between the major and minor points in drawn games.

Batting, too, was scarcely as reliable as last season, when six batsmen had an average of over 30. This year only two of the regular batsmen have exceeded this figure—C. E. Cooto and F. W. Parfitt.

Cooto has had a wonderful season, and his average of over 56 is the best recorded by a Cambs. batsman for many years. He played in two representative matches for the Minor Counties—against Cambridge University and the South Africans. Parfitt was also a consistent run-maker, and, in addition, was always prominent in the fielding department.

Of the eight matches played two were won, four drawn (one won on first innings, one tied on the first innings, and one lost on the first innings) and two lost.
