Save Glamorgan II. From Bad Collapse

A hailstorm, followed by torrential rain, brought an early closure to the Minor Counties' match between Glamorgan II. and Middlesex II., which began at Yrysaugharad Park, Pontypridd, on Wednesday.

J. T. Morgan, the Glamorgan captain, won the toss and elected to bat on a wicket that was rather lifeless.

Pitchford and Aubrey Davies opened the innings, but the latter survived only a few overs. Allan, the Newport professional, then joined Pitchford, and the pair added 60 runs before they were separated.

Pitchford left at 69, and three wickets fell at the same total. Davies (W. D.), Neath, saved the side from a complete rout, however, by scoring 31, but the innings closed soon after he left.

Young, a left-arm medium-pace bowler, claimed the chief bowling honours with six wickets for 36 runs.

QUICK SUCCESSES

Middlesex made a bright start, but the Glamorgan attack met with quick successes, through Dickinson, who took the wickets of Muncer and Wignall in three balls, and J. T. Morgan, who claimed the other two victims.

Glamorgan have found two young players who may easily develop into first-class players—D. Morgan, the 17-year-old left-hander, and H. Davies.

They rescued Glamorgan's second team against Middlesex II. at Osterley Park yesterday when Jack Durston had counteracted a good start by taking five wickets for 8 runs in an unplayable spell of bowling.

Morgan and Davies put on 45 when runs were badly needed, and played Durston's off-spinners with real confidence for players with so little experience.

Davies, last out, made 78, and he and Dickinson put on 21 for the last wicket—the best stand of the innings.

The pair were together for nearly an hour with only 29 runs on the board, but when Pitchford displaced J. T. Morgan, the Ebbw professional brought about two quick dismissals.

Fine Bowling

Lewis, who then joined Moule, enlivened the proceedings with hits for a 6 and two 4's off consecutive balls from J. T. Morgan, but was eventually caught on the boundary by C. V. G. Haines, the Barry amateur.

CENTURY AT ARMS PARK

Glamorgan II.'s Bid for Innings Victory

TASK FOR BERKS

CONTINUING their minor counties championship game against Berkshire at Cardiff Arms Park, Cardiff, today, Glamorgan II., who finished up in a strong position overnight, batted in enterprising fashion, and in two hours added 229 runs to their overnight score of 226 for three.

Pitchford, who was not out with 136, went on to reach a double century, and when the score had reached 445 for the loss of eight wickets the innings was declared closed and Glamorgan were definitely in a winning position.

Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, and Aubrey Davies, the young pro. on the Glamorgan ground staff, with their individual over night totals at 136 and 16 respectively, got runs at a brisk rate. In half an hour they added 63 runs. Davies, who hit Woodburn, the Berkshire slow bowler for a 6 and two 4's off three consecutive balls, completed his half century in just over two hours.

Attack Punished

Pitchford continued to deal with the attack severely, and after the innings had lasted exactly four hours the 300 mark was reached for the loss of three wickets, Pitchford claiming 169 of the total.

With the total at 338 Davies was clean bowled. The pair had added 175 for the fourth wicket in two and a half hours.

Pitchford went on to complete his double century in four and a half hours. Douglas Morgan, who joined Pitchford after Aubrey Davies had left, did not stay long, however, for he was well beaten with a yorker from Woodburn. Pitchford eventually left after scoring 226 with the total at 390. First in, he was sixth out, and when bowled by Woodburn he had hit two 6's and twenty-nine 4's.

H. Davies, who followed Douglas Morgan, hit up a quick half-century, which included nine boundaries, and soon after J. T. Morgan had left the Glamorgan captain declared the innings closed.

Glamorgan had over four hours in which to dismiss their opponents a second time. Berks were 231 behind on the first innings.

Berkshire made an exceedingly poor start in their second innings, losing the wickets of H. A. Lewis and L. D. Sears with only 3 runs on the board. Both batsmen were bowled by J. T. Morgan in his first over.

Hubble's Effort

After the luncheon interval Hubble continued to bat soundly, but after contributing 41 out of a total of 62 he failed to survive an lbw appeal. E. H. Moule left 11 runs later, so that half the Berkshire side were out in their second venture for 71 runs.

Berks had their backs to the wall. Stokes and Lewis, however, played attractive cricket and went on to complete their individual 50's in just over an hour. The partnership came to an end, however, when Haydn Davies brought off a delightful piece of work behind the wicket to send back Stokes after he stand had realised 93 runs.

A few runs later tea was taken with Berks six wickets down for 174.

Pitchford's Century for Glamorgan II.

Gives Side Strong Position Against Berkshire

Glamorgan II. made a splendid start in their two-days' Minor Counties' Championship game against Berkshire at the Cardiff Arms Park on Wednesday.

After dismissing the visitors for 224 runs Glamorgan finished the day two runs ahead with seven wickets intact.

They owe their strong position chiefly to Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, who scored a fine century after having been at the wicket for three hours. So far he has hit a 6 and sixteen 4's.

On a wicket that gave the Glamorgan bowlers little or no assistance Berkshire batted with extreme caution. E. H. Moule, fifth in, was at the wicket for nearly two hours to carry his bat for 36 runs. The opening pair, H. L. Lewis and G. Sayles, had been together for nearly an hour in scoring 29, when Pitchford, coming on to bowl, secured their wickets without a run being scored off him.

H. J. Hubble, after having given an early chance, went on to claim chief batting honours for his side. He scored nine boundaries.

A CONTRAST

A contrast to the slow batting was provided when H. A. Lewis went in. He stayed for nearly half-an-hour for his 21, but his three on drives, a six and 2 fours off consecutive balls from J. T. Morgan, were fine hits.

Pitchford took four wickets for 36 and J. T. Morgan four for 74.

Pitchford and W. J. Evans, who opened the Glamorgan first innings, at once set about the bowlers and runs came at a brisk pace. With the total 77, Evans had his wicket broken when well outside his crease. C. V. G. Haines, the Barry amateur, did not stay long, but F. J. Roberts became associated with Pitchford in a good stand for the third wicket.

Joined by Aubrey Davies, the young professional of the ground staff, Pitchford continued to score runs quickly. The pair were unbeaten when stumps were drawn.

Pitchford's Double Century

Glamorgan II. won their two-days' Minor Counties' Championship game against Berkshire at Cardiff Arms Park by an innings and 19 runs.

It was Glamorgan's first victory in championship games this season. Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, carried his overnight score of 136 not out to 226 before being clean-bowled by Hubble.

With the total at 226 for three wickets Pitchford and Aubrey Davies, the young ground staff professional, resumed the Glamorgan innings and in an hour the 300 mark was reached. Five Monmouthshire players were included in Glamorgan Seconds' team for the Minor Counties match with Dorset at Ebbw Vale to-day.

They were J. Archer, Abercarn; Garry Thomas, Newport; J. Brittan, Newbridge; Gomer Evans, Brynmawr; and Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, who scored a double century for Monmouthshire against Dorset at Abercarn two years ago.

Gomer Evans, by the way, is on holiday from Sutton, where his performances have attracted the attention of Surrey to such an extent that he is to have a trial at the Oval in the near future. He is a native of Nantyglo. He learned his cricket with Nantyglo Wesleyans before he joined Brynmawr.

The sun was shining brilliantly when Pitchford and G. F. Roberts, the left-handed batsman, opened the Glamorgan innings after J. T. Morgan, the old Cambridge Blue, had won the toss.

They faced an attack shared by Dorset's two veteran bowlers, Captain R. D. Busk, the Army fast bowler, and A. N. Harrison, whose left hand is withered.

Both batsmen opened their scoring accounts with a four, and later scored at a rate of a run a minute to put on 30 runs in the first half-hour.

At 30 Jackson, a medium-pace bowler, replaced Busk, but, though his first three overs were maidens, the batsmen continued to keep pace with the clock—sixty-nine were scored in as many minutes. Dorset met with their first success at 65, when J. F. Roberts was enticed across the wicket by Jackson, and was out l.b.w. He hit four 4's in his 29. The newcomer, J. Dorset Make a Bold Reply

Glamorgan Seconds, in whose team five Monmouthshire players are included, resumed their Minor Counties match with Dorset at Ebbw Vale to-day in a commanding position, for towards the end of yesterday's play Glamorgan captured five Dorset wickets for only 88 runs. Glamorgan had made 283.

Glamorgan owed this advantage chiefly to Pitchford, the Ebbw Vale professional, who, during one spell, took three wickets for just under four runs apiece.

The first over of the day proved a disastrous one for Dorset, who faced the possibility of being made to follow on, for with his third ball J. T. Morgan, the Glamorgan captain, successfully appealed for an l.b.w. decision against Taylor. This was a big blow to the visitors, because last night Taylor gave the impression that he might be able to retrieve his side's fortune. His 23 contained four fours.

Captain Busk, an ideal man for a crisis, however, soon showed that the tail of the English county was by no means down. He hooked a ball from Dickenson to the leg boundary and then on-drove the same bowler for a glorious four. Three of his next seven scoring shots also reached the boundary.

Mortimer, up to this point, had been content to keep his end up; but when Dorset's score was 132 he failed to resist the temptation to have a go at Garry Thomas, and was caught by Dickinson at mid-off.

With M. B. Elderton as his partner, Captain Busk reached 40 in as many minutes.

Hopes Glamorgan entertained of a sudden Dorset collapse began to fade as Busk and Elderton continued to hit out merrily. In fact, after Dorset had averted the follow-on at 12.30, Glamorgan II. found themselves engaged in a struggle for first-innings lead. The 200 went up after three hours, and then Busk caused amusement by holding his bat with one hand, and sending the ball from Thomas to the leg boundary.

Busk later survived an appeal for lbw from Morgan when he had taken his score into the "nervous nineties," and Elderton should have been caught deep by Gomer Evans off Pitchford, but Evans showed poor anticipation.

Shortly afterwards the eighth wicket partnership realised 100 runs, to be followed by Busk's century. Busk had batted with carefree abandon, and up to that point had hit 15 fours.

Dorset's score at that point was 241, and two runs later Gomer Evans, a Nantyglo boy, was introduced. The change soon met with success, for after another ten runs had been scored he bowled Busk middle stump. Busk had batted for 2 hours 25 minutes.

At 268 Elderton was caught by Dickinson after scoring 65, which contained eight fours. Thus Dorset, at lunch, were only 16 runs behind Glamorgan's total.

GLAMORGAN LEAD

Dorset's innings ended abruptly after lunch, when, with no addition to the score, Jackson was run out, leaving Glamorgan with a lead of 16 runs.

Pitchford and Roberts again opened Glamorgan's innings against the bowling of Harrison and Brockway, and when the score was 13 Roberts knocked touched the ball but failed to grasp it, smartly stumped Pitchford at 24. Dorset's Archer similarly, but the Abercarn man was too quick.

Elderton was not to be denied, and it was not long before Archer shared the same fate as the Ebbw Vale professional before he had scored. After his departure the rate of scoring slowed down to a snail's pace, though Roberts, a neat batsman to watch, once drove Harrison for a splendid four. He reached forty after an hour and a quarter.

J. Archer, Abercarn, again proved that he is a natural cricketer, who should go far if taken in hand. Haydn Davies, the Swansea youngster, kept wicket exceptionally well, and batted with skill. Aubrey Davies, too, has a big future before him if he fulfils early promise—a promise that has led Glamorgan to sign him as a professional for next season.
