

SURREY II. BEATEN BY 64 RUNS AT CORFTON ROAD

Durston's Deadly Bowling for Middlesex

EXCITING CRICKET

In a dramatic finish at Corfton-road yesterday, Middlesex II. beat Surrey II. by 64 runs in the Minor Counties Championship match. Surrey made a magnificent effort to force the pace for a win, but a deadly spell of bowling by Jack Durston, who at one time took 4 for 13 in four overs, completely turned the game in favour of Middlesex when Surrey seemed set for victory.

Middlesex included four local players in their team, R. Felton, the Ealing C.C. captain, and L. A. Smith and C. W. C. Poore, of Mill Hill Park, and W. R. Watkins, of Ealing Dean.

A good crowd turned up to watch the first day's play, and they were rewarded with cricket of a high standard, although uneventful. Middlesex batted first, and scored 189. Wilson, Mobey and McMurray began confidently enough for Surrey, but the batsmen who followed played over-cautiously, and wickets began to fall with monotonous regularity. Gray got the first six, and another later, his analysis for the innings eventually reading 7 for 53. The Surrey innings closed at 122, 67 short of the Middlesex total.

Before the close of play on Thursday, Middlesex were in again, and had lost Watkins.

When Middlesex continued their innings yesterday wickets soon began to tumble. Soon after lunch the Middlesex second innings closed at 181, leaving Surrey just three and a quarter hours to obtain the 249 runs required to win.

Wilson and Mobey opened out for Surrey, and put on 66 in 68 minutes before Wilson was bowled by Gray. At the tea interval the score was 80 for one.

The last wicket fell ten minutes before the end of the half-hour of extra time, with Surrey 64 runs short of victory.

WITH BAT AND BALL

Wood's fine innings of 163 (including three sixes and 28 fours) went a long way towards helping Hounslow Melrose to compile their record-breaking total of 302 on Sunday.

The best bowling feat was that of F. A. Dunningham, of Old Ashfordians, who in 9½ overs (five maidens) took nine Sinclairians wickets for 14 runs. His club-mate, Garland, took eight for 35 on Sunday, and Clark (Laleham Village) seven for 12 on Saturday.

Harris, of Beldams, followed up his fine all-round performance of the previous week with 68 runs and five wickets against Stanwell II. on Saturday and 58 and eight wickets for (including six for one in one spell) against Sandgate on Sunday.

Chillingworth and Squire gave a comfortable start, the former batting soundly for 38 before being brilliantly stumped. The later batting was characterised by solidity and safety, runs coming very slowly. Mabbott and Boothby made a good stand and towards the end hit a little more freely. The closure was applied with the score 226 for 8 wickets in 3 hours 20 minutes. Left with an hour and a quarter less to get the runs, the Hounslow batsmen did their best to catch up with the clock. A number of wickets fell in the process and Hounslow had to fight for a draw, in the end succeeding with only one wicket in hand. MINOR COUNTY CHAMPIONS AT FIRST ATTEMPT

Middlesex II Beat Herts in Challenge Match at Corfton Road

DE SARAM TWICE BEATEN BY THOMPSON AFTER SCORING ONLY SIX RUNS | **BENKA TAKES NINE WICKETS FOR 92 AND GRAY SEVEN FOR 54**

MIDDLESEX II. have won the Minor Counties Championship at their first attempt. Undefeated at the top of the table, they successfully withstood the challenge of Hertfordshire, who occupied second place, in the deciding match on the ground of the Ealing Cricket Club at Corfton-road on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday this week.

The bowling of Benka and Gray was largely responsible for their success. In the two innings Benka took 9 wickets for 92 runs, and Gray 7 for 54.

Ealing had two representatives in the Middlesex side, R. Felton and L. Thompson, and the prestige of Ealing Dean was, of course, upheld by Watkins.

Perhaps the greatest surprise of the match was the failure in each innings of the Herts master-batsman, F. C. de Saram, who this season has an average of over a hundred in Minor County cricket.

de Saram scored only six runs in each of his innings, and on both occasions he was out to a ball from Thompson, who, although he only took three wickets during the match, did his side as great a service with his few shock overs as did Benka and Gray with their consistency.

Middlesex, who batted first, scored 214 and 209, and Herts 111 and 171. After such a disastrous first innings, which ended just before the close of the first day, Herts' hopes practically vanished, and Middlesex, although smarting slightly from early shocks, played through the rest of the match with plenty of confidence, and won with little difficulty.

HERTS' DISASTROUS START

PLAY opened on Monday in raw, chilly weather, before a fair crowd. Middlesex were batting, and it was early evident that the wicket was playing none too easily.

R. Felton, the Ealing captain, and Watkins, of Ealing Dean, both of whom have played on many occasions for their county first string, opened out. Both played with caution, and seemed doubtful about how to deal with Ford. Ford had both of them. Felton left with the score at 17, and Watkins at 18.

A bad start, but F. E. Covington and H. F. Benka could retrieve it if they played the right game.

Covington provided perhaps the greatest disappointment of the Middlesex innings. He ran himself out in the most futile manner, calling a third when the ball was already half-way back from the deep on its dead accurate course to Grimsdell at the wicket.

LOOKED BAD.

Things looked bad for Middlesex, with the score at 23-3, but at this stage Hertfordshire lost their grip. Wignall joined Benka and hit a glorious 72, including seven fours, and A. W. Childs-Clarke, the Middlesex captain, carried his bat for a faultless 45.

He and Young featured in a sparkling last wicket stand, and the Middlesex innings closed just before tea for the total of 214.

The crowd swelled to large proportions after tea, in spite of the miserable weather, and saw Hertfordshire, a very strong batting side indeed on paper, put up a very poor show against a certainly lively Middlesex attack.

Benka and Gray did most of the damage, and at one time an all-Ealing attack was on view—Thompson at one end and Felton at the other, a familiar sight at Corton-road.

HIS FIRST BALL.

Thompson had Herts' biggest hope, F. C. de Saram, l.b.w. with his first ball when this batsman had scored six, but the fireworks did not really start until the score-board read 62-4.

Then Gray had three victims in one maiden over, his first after tea, one bowled, one leg-before and one caught. 65-6, and soon afterwards 76-7, 81-8, 88-9, another bright last-wicket stand, and just before 6.30 all out 111. Only three batsmen, Fordham, Kingsley and Crossman, had reached double figures. Gray had taken 4-13, and Benka 5-40.

Herts, batting after tea, were faced with the stiff task of getting 323 to win, and had de Saram and Fordham

There were two bright features of Wednesday's play—Watson's 51 in forty minutes, and the amusing occasion when Wilson, the Middlesex wicket-keeper, having watched Piper turn Thompson gracefully round to square leg, discovered quicker than anyone else that there were no fielders on the leg side at all, and with creditable speed raced off almost to the boundary, complete with pads and gloves.

A man from the slips might have made it more quickly, but Wilson is one of these men who believes in action, not words.
