

SUFFOLK AT THE OVAL.

RAIN SPOILS PLAY IN MATCH WITH SURREY II.

The Oval, Monday.

There had been heavy rain in London this morning and owing to the saturated state of the Oval wicket very little play was possible before lunch in Suffolk's opening engagement in the Minor Counties Championship against Surrey II.

H. P. Waugh won the toss for Suffolk and elected to bat first and an attempt was made to commence the match at one o'clock, but no sooner had the players taken the field when another shower of rain sent them back to the pavilion again.

In the end play began in a dull light under threatening clouds at 1.30, H. P. Waugh and B. Darvill opening the innings to the bowling of Parker and Gamble. Four overs only were bowled before the luncheon interval arrived and these yielded as many runs.

SUFFOLK'S TROUBLES BEGIN.

On resuming after lunch the Suffolk batsmen survived a couple of maiden overs, and then their troubles began. Neither Waugh nor Darvill looked very comfortable, and when, with 6 runs scored, McCanlis took over from Gamble at the Vauxhall end, he dismissed Waugh with his first ball, a catch behind the stumps being well taken by Mobery low down on the leg side.

With Lockitt, the Bank of England player, joining Darvill, scoring proceeded along very tentative lines, except when Darvill cracked a no-ball from McCanlis for 4, but at 22 a further change of bowling immediately brought about another wicket. O'Sullivan, a powerfully-built cricketer, who bowls fast-medium, relieved Parker, and in his first over Lockitt, flicking at an off-ball, was caught behind the wicket. At this point rain again intervened, and this time it put an end to play for the day.

SUFFOLK'S GOOD PLAY AT THE OVAL.

HALF THE SURREY SIDE DISMISSED FOR 87.

"NO RESULT" MATCH WITH HONOURS DIVIDED.

Oval, Tuesday.

So much time had been lost through rain at the Oval on Monday that it was impossible to make it up to-day, and the Minor Counties championship match between Suffolk and Surrey II. ended in a "no-result" decision, and, as two innings were not completed, it will therefore not count in the championship table.

Honours were fairly equally divided when the game was given up, Surrey having scored 124 for five, in reply to Suffolk's total of 106. Up to a point, when they had captured half the Surrey wickets for 87 runs, Suffolk did remarkably well, but thereafter McMurray and Whittaker warded off any further reverse for their side. J. Catchpole, G. W. Hockey, and F. H. Lloyd all bowled well, and if Suffolk can continue to place such a well-equipped team in the field they should certainly occupy a higher place in the championship table than they did last year.

The pitch at the Oval had not recovered sufficiently from the saturation it received on Monday night to permit the punctual resumption of play, and no cricket was possible until noon.

There had been only forty minutes' play on Monday, during which time Suffolk had scored 22 for the loss of two wickets, but much better progress was made this morning, when the innings was continued with Powell as Darvill's partner.

Both batsmen shaped quite confidently against the bowling of McCanlis and O'Sullivan, and half an hour's play produced 40 runs, but Darvill hooked a short-pitched no ball from O'Sullivan for 4, and Powell cracked another no-ball from McCanlis to the boundary, but there were plenty of very good strokes from both batsmen of legitimate balls as well. Whitfield came on for McCanlis, and Parker for O'Sullivan, but the changes of bowling did not upset the batsmen.

POWELL PAYS THE PENALTY.

When Surrey obtained their next wicket it was really in the nature of a presentation. Powell had a wild smash at a ball from Parker, which was quite beyond the out-stumps, and he paid a perfectly suitable penalty, for he touched the ball, and mobery did the rest. Mobery claiming his third victim of the innings.

Hockey, the former Essex player, quickly got off the mark with a capital 4 to the "on" on Gamble, but after a few more stylish strokes he should not have been hurt in the slips by Parker, though the catch was admittedly a very difficult one, especially on such a cold day. When the luncheon interval arrived, Suffolk had 87 runs on the board, with three men out.

On resuming, Suffolk quickly lost 2 wickets. With only 7 runs added, Darvill, who had played a valuable defensive innings during an awkward period, was out leg before to O'Sullivan, and at 10/ Wright gave Mobery the opportunity of bringing on his fourth catch behind the stumps.

BRIGHT BATTING.

With Catchpole joining Hockey, scoring proceeded more quickly than at any other time of the innings. Catchpole, of course, is always disposed to forcing tactics, but it was Hockey who dominated the scoring, and with a series of admirable shots all round the wicket he reached his 50, after he had been batting for 55 minutes. Catchpole's aggressive adventure came to an end at 148, when he was beaten by Parker.

When Covill joined Hockey, the cricket subsided into comparative quietude, with the scoring consisting chiefly of singles, but it brightened up when Goundry came in at 155, after Mobery had made his fifth catch of the innings to dismiss Covill.

HOCKEY'S GOOD BATTING.

Hockey and Goundry were associated in an enterprising partnership for the eighth wicket, which put on 41 runs before Mobery's ubiquitous nanas snapped up another catch to dismiss Goundry.

Meanwhile, Hockey was steadily approaching his century, but it was a destination he was not to be allowed to reach.

Hockey's score stood at 86 when the eighth wicket fell, but the two remaining batsmen could not give him sufficient support to enable him to add even a single to this total. A. S. Kent was out to a brilliant one-hand slip catch before he had scored, and, with F. H. Lloyd bowled by the first ball he received, the innings closed abruptly for 196. Hockey's innings was a model of sound defence and opportune attack. He was at the wicket for two hours and five minutes for his 86 runs, which included one 6, one 5, and ten 4's. O'Sullivan, making his first appearance for Surrey, was the most successful bowler of the home side, capturing half the wickets at the inexpensive cost of 37 runs. His success appeared to be largely due to his pace off the pitch, and on each wicket he should be a still more effective bowler.

SUFFOLK BOWLERS' SUCCESSSES.

To obtain the first innings' lead, Surrey needed to get approximately 200 runs in two and a half hours, and, judging by the way Wilson and Mobery began, the indication was that the task was not considered a particularly formidable one. Possibly Surrey still had in mind the untroubled ease with which they took runs from the Suffolk bowling in the corresponding match last season, when they ran up a total of nearly 500 for the loss of six wickets and then declared. But the brightness with which Mobery and Wilson began did not last long, and when Lloyd and Waugh found their length the batsmen discovered that their scoring opportunities were distinctly limited. By the time the innings had been in progress for half an hour, Surrey had not only fallen behind the clock, but had lost their first wicket in the process. Lloyd was keeping the batsmen continually playing the ball, and at 29 his well-directed attacks was rewarded when Mobery edged a ball into the gully for Hockey to make a clever catch. Twelve runs later Catchpole, who had relieved Waugh at the Vauxhall end, had Wilson leg-before, and a little later the same bowler beat Whitfield with a really good ball which came back sharply, the batsman playing well outside it.

Having disposed of three such batsmen as Wilson, Mobery and Whitfield for 81 runs, Suffolk had good reason to be well satisfied with their work, and before the game was much older it appeared that Surrey's chance of securing the majority of points for a first innings' lead had vanished outside the realm of practical possibility. With an hour (including the optional half-hour) left for play, Surrey still needed 117 to head Suffolk's total, and with McMurray and Parker apparently securely established, but not attempting to force the pace, interest in the issue of the game gradually began to disappear. But then the sudden fall of two more wickets galvanised it into life again. Parker was caught at first slip after the ball had touched the wicket-keeper's glove, and W. T. Cook was bowling without scoring (both these wickets falling to Hockey's bowling), and at a quarter to six Surrey found themselves with half the side out and only 87 runs on the board.

Anything might have happened then, but it didn't. H. P. Waugh claimed the extra half-hour, but it was not required, and stumps were pulled up at 8.15 p.m., with Surrey having increased their total to 124 without further loss.

COUNTY CRICKET AT LOWESTOFT

Suffolk in a Good Position

Lincolnshire Out for 118

Considering the amount of rain which fell at Lowestoft during the early morning storm yesterday, Suffolk and Lincolnshire were fortunate in being able to get in as much as five and a-quarter hours' play. The Denes Oval wicket dries very quickly, and the start was delayed only half an hour. The sun and wind helped the ground to recover, but the tea interval was prolonged to 45 minutes by a little more rain. During the time that play was in progress the wicket never became easy. The ball came off the pitch at varying paces and at uncertain heights which necessitated much caution and watchfulness on the part of the batsmen. Scoring, therefore, was never very rapid, but even the slow play was interesting because of the keen fight for runs.

Suffolk lost the toss and their captain expressed relief that the decision rested with the visitors. The Lincoln captain decided to bat, and at lunch time, when half the side were out for 64, he may have wondered if he had made a wise choice. Eventually a total of 118 was reached, and this figure the home county passed during the second of two good partnerships. At the close of play Suffolk were 44 runs ahead with seven wickets in hand.

Waugh, the captain, opened the Suffolk attack and he took the first and last wickets. His first and early success was important, as Houghton, the Aston Villa footballer, who bats No. 1 for Lincolnshire, is quite a good bat. Waugh found the edge of Houghton's bat, and Goundry at slip held the first of a series of good catches made during the two and a-half hours that Lincolnshire batted. Dods and Godby added 40 for the second wicket, and during their forty minutes' partnership the Suffolk captain worried the batsmen with the frequency of his bowling changes. Dods was over twenty minutes before he made his first run, and half a dozen different bowlers were tried. The wickets of Dods and Godby were secured in quick succession. Dods made one delightful square cut off Lloyd, but he and Godby collected most of their runs on the leg side. Jenner was out to a very good catch which Howard, the bowler, made close to the ground and retained his grip of the ball when falling. Ehrenfried, the second left-hander of the side, batted confidently and with a certain measure of ease. He had good strokes on the leg side and some equally as good in front of the wicket. When Howard got through his defence Ehrenfried had been at the wickets just over an hour. He was seventh out at 92 and hit four 4s, and was the chief scorer with 37. The side seemed likely to be out for under 100, but Cawkwell, the last man, took his courage in both hands and hit several balls on the wicket to the square leg boundary. The Lincoln wickets were shared among five bowlers, and Waugh, Catchpole, and Howard deserve mention for the steadiness of their length. Kent kept wicket very well indeed.

No one showed greater patience or sounder defence than Darvill. He opened the Suffolk innings with Waugh and took an hour to make his first 15 runs, and another hour to double his score. Waugh's defence was also very sound, but he showed greater facility in forcing the ball away to the on and considerable skill in making scoring strokes on the leg side. For anything short of a length he had a good hook but opportunities for making it were rare, as Wilson maintained an immaculate length and Bennett nipped off the pitch quickly. Darvill scored 2 runs off Wilson's first ball, and not another run was made off the Lincoln veteran until his ninth over. In an hour before tea only 43 runs were scored, and when play was resumed Lincolnshire were handicapped with a wet ball. Even so the batsmen were

kept quiet, and when the first wicket stand was broken only 69 runs had been scored in ninety minutes. Waugh was brilliantly caught left-handed at second slip by Bennett off a wristy late cut. He hit six fours. Lockitt, who has seldom made runs for his county, though he makes heaps of them for the Bank of England, showed more freedom and enterprise. The hour he stayed in with Darvill was the brightest cricket of the day. Darvill increased his gait and with Lockitt cutting, driving, and leg-hitting 83 runs were added before Munnings came on and bowled Lockitt with his second ball, which kept low. Darvill left in Munnings's next over. The ball made haste off the pitch and Darvill played it into his wicket. Darvill was third out at 155 and scored 56 in two hours and thirty-eight minutes. He hit only two fours in his valuable innings. Hockey and Hawkes were together when stumps were drawn. Wilson had two spells of bowling and only 13 runs were scored from his 19 overs, of which 13 were maidens.

Playing will be resumed to-day at 11.

LINCOLNSHIRE SAVED BY HOUGHTON

Hockey's Innings for Suffolk

Drawn Match at Lowestoft

William Eric Houghton, the Aston Villa and International footballer, came to the rescue of Lincolnshire at Lowestoft yesterday afternoon, and by remaining at the wickets over two hours, at a critical period in the game when the visitors were in danger of being defeated by Suffolk, he enabled the visitors to effect a draw.

There was little prospect of a definite result being obtained after rain had delayed the resumption of play until two o'clock, but Suffolk, from the favourable position which they secured overnight, made a commendable effort to force a win. Although the wicket was never easy, the tendency of the ball to pop being an ever present danger on each day, the Suffolk batsmen showed their appreciation of the situation by attempting to get runs quickly. No one did this better than Hockey. He was one of the overnight not outs and during the hour he was at the wickets yesterday the spectators witnessed the brightest batting in the match. Hockey took a little time to settle down and to accustom himself to the pace of the wicket before he launched an offensive which delighted onlookers and discomforted the bowlers. In one spasm of aggressiveness he hit three fours in one over from Bennett. The latter asked for the new ball in the middle of one over when he saw 200 on the board, and Hockey promptly hit it among the glasses on the refreshment counter in the stand. It was an eventful over, for with the sixth ball Bennett made a mess of Glover's wicket. As it happened this was Bennett's only wicket in the match, and Hawkes, who shared with Hockey in the fourth wicket partnership of 41, had left to a slip catch just before the 200 appeared which was to be Wilson's only reward for a very long and very good bowling effort. Hockey took this wicket in his 25th over, of which 14 were maidens, and at that time only 23 runs had been scored off him.

Hockey then meted out unusual punishment to Wilson. He hit three boundaries in succession, two of them in one over, and no more maidens came from Wilson. Bennett and Wilson, who had bowled unchanged while the score moved from the overnight total of 162 to 235, were then relieved by Munnings and Ehrenfried. The change soon worked. Hockey hooked another four off Munnings, but the last ball of the over was hit back to the bowler, who made a neat catch. Hockey's 63 out of 90 comprised some glorious drives, especially those past cover. He picked the right ball to hit and hit it hard. His chief scoring strokes were one six and eight fours. His defence was so sound that he was never in difficulties with the bowling.

Kent carried on the good work and with the dismissal of Goundry the innings was declared closed at a quarter-past 3 with the score at 261 for seven wickets, the innings having lasted in all just four hours. In his two brief spells Munnings took three wickets for 18 runs and the fact that he quickly broke up the prolific second partnership the previous day and obtained the wickets of the two men when they were well set and also brought Hockey's innings to a close yesterday, made it surprising that more use was not made of his services.

Suffolk scored 99 runs yesterday for four wickets in seventy-four minutes, which gave them a lead of 143 runs and about two and three-quarter hours remained for play, including the extra half-hour, when Lincolnshire began their second innings. Dods again took Houghton in with him, and between them they shouldered the responsibility of carrying Lincolnshire into a position of comparative security. Five different bowlers and the tea interval failed to disturb them, and they had been together an hour and a-quarter when Goundry was given the ball and succeeded in breaking the partnership in his first over. Dods made a fine on-

drive off one ball and repeated the stroke off the next with a loftier hit and Lloyd, fielding on the boundary, brought off a very fine catch. Lloyd moved a yard or two, judging the ball well in the wind, and took it sideways. The catch was one of the highlights of the afternoon's cricket.

The score was 53, and shortly afterwards Goundry took another wicket by getting Godby lbw under the old rule. Houghton was still at the wickets. He was hit on the back of the head by a rising ball from Catchpole almost at the start of the innings, and the incident seemed only to make him more determined to hang on. He occasionally indulged in a flashing cut, but for the most part he was content to maintain a sound defence. This he succeeded in doing for over two hours, and Glover effected a surprise when he broke through it and hit the wicket. Houghton's share of the 82 when he left was 36, but the value of his innings to Lincolnshire was not to be measured by his runs. Houghton had stayed there till 20 minutes to 6, and at the hour the stumps and the match were drawn. Ehrenfried using the 20 minutes most profitably to show the power of his driving and leg hitting. At one period he hit six 4s in succession.

SUFFOLK'S LOWEST TOTAL.

HERTFORDSHIRE IN WINNING POSITION.

ESSEX STRUGGLE FOR RUNS.

MERCER AND D. DAVIES BOWL WELL AT CHELMSFORD.

Hertfordshire v. Suffolk.

Letchworth, Wednesday.

Suffolk were dismissed for their lowest total by Herts. in the Minor Counties Championship, being so helpless against clever spin bowling that the innings realised no more than 55. Rain came on after tea, and put an end to cricket, but by that time Herts. had gained a lead of 109, and were in a commanding position.

Suffolk experienced considerable difficulty in getting a full side together. Telephone bells were ringing all over the county late last night, but Suffolk were still one short when they reached the ground, though it was reported that an eleventh player from Lowestoft was on his way.

In addition there was another surprise in store, when it was announced that Waugh, having torn a muscle in his side, would be unable to play. In his absence Bailey skippered Suffolk, and won the toss, electing to bat first.

SLOW BATTING.

The wicket was still very wet after yesterday's rain, but in the absence of sun it was slow and lifeless, and so was the batting during the first half-hour, which produced only 12 runs. The excessive caution did not pay, however, and when Crossman brought on his spin bowlers, Suffolk's troubles began.

Porter was badly misused by Roberts at short leg when 4, but Roberts quickly made amends by bowling him after he had scored another single. The total was then 13.

Three runs later Lookitt was beaten and bowled by one of Watson's off spinners, which turned rather sharply. Subsequent play proved what has been proved before, namely that the Suffolk batting does not shine against slow spin bowling.

BATSMEN IMPOTENT.

To such a degree of impotence were the batsmen reduced that the whole side was out before lunch for 55 runs. This collapse could not be blamed on to the pitch, though it was noticed that some balls came off faster than others.

The only batsman, who played the bowling with confidence was Darwin who shined excellently until he made a poor stroke, and was bowled. Catchpole and Kent tried attacking the bowling but soon left after hitting one 4 each.

Nearly all the batsmen were caught in two minds between playing forward and playing back and no one showed the quickness of foot required to counter good spin bowling. Both Roberts and Watson bowled remarkably well, the former taking four for 27, and the latter five for 16.

HERTFORDSHIRE GET GOING.

Such a paltry total was almost an insult to set before such a strong batting side as Hertfordshire were represented by. Suffolk's innings had lasted an hour and a half, and in half that time Herts. had gone ahead with only one wicket down.

F. P. Longton and Coverdale opened the innings, and they both played the bowling with an ease which indicated that they were in for a long stay in the field.

It was an errant long hop which gave Suffolk their first wicket. Longton cracked it round the leg, and Bailey made a good catch, after knocking the ball up in the air.

The Suffolk bowling was made to look very innocuous stuff when C. B. Fordham joined Coverdale. This pair took runs just how and when they pleased, and so brisk was the rate of scoring that 71 were added in forty minutes before Fordham, who had batted with perfection of style, was log-bored to Catchpole under the new rule.

Catchpole made Suffolk's position look slightly less ignominious by bowling H. N. Lambkin in the same over, when three wickets were down for 103, but Coverdale was well set, and shortly afterwards reached his 50.

Rain came after tea, and although one attempt was made to continue, it increased in intensity, and eventually play was abandoned for the day at 5.15. Wilson off a bad ball, also succumbed to a smartly accepted catch at short slips, four wickets being down for 59. Batting with confidence, Col. Brander never looked in difficulties, and when he was joined by Capt. Dean the total was advanced to 109 before a separation was effected. Steady batting afterwards brought a total of 182, thanks in no small measure to a last wicket stand by Lieut. Neep and Lieut. Whightwick, which added 34. Brander in his 59 hit half a dozen 4's. Capt. Dean had three boundary strokes and the same number of 3's, whilst Whightwick had three crisp boundary hits in his total of 14. Apart from exceptions, the fielding of the Gentlemen left little to be desired, M. J. P. Lacy and V. J. Covill being exceptionally prominent.

STIFF TASK FOR SUFFOLK TO-DAY.

SURREY II. RUN UP BIG TOTAL AND DECLARE.

After a rest from county cricket of nearly a month's duration, Suffolk resumed their Minor Counties engagements yesterday, when they began their return match with Surrey II, on the Victory Ground at Bury St. Edmund's.

The previous game with Surrey II, at the Oval, it will be recalled, was ruined by rain, and as both sides did not complete an innings each, the match did not count in the championship table.

The present game is the first Minor Counties match to be played at Bury St. Edmund's since the resuscitation of the Suffolk club, and local talent had been recognised by the inclusion in the home side of two West Suffolk players who have not previously appeared for the County in championship game. They were E. R. Heywood and R. Lummis.

Surrey fielded a team which included nine professionals, and among these was Watts, who has been bowling regularly for the 1st XI. this season.

Winning the toss, the visitors had first use of a capital wicket, and Wilson and Mobery gave them an excellent start by putting on 62 runs for the first wicket. They took about an hour to score these, and during this period they battled with such ease and assurance that it was somewhat surprising that the total was not more when Wilson left to an admirable return catch by H. B. Goundry, whose slow had commanded a degree of respect that was quite hattering.

When McMurray joined Mobery, runs began to come more briskly. This was largely due to McMurray's enterprise, for Mobery had been batting almost two hours when he reached his 50 just before lunch. It was an innings most notable for solidity, and it did not reveal the variety of scoring strokes displayed by McMurray, who scored nearly twice as fast.

A TALE OF MISSED CATCHES.

On resuming, after lunch, the play provided plenty of incident, but it was not exactly the type of incident which rounded to the credit of Suffolk cricket, being largely composed of missed catches.

To begin with, Mobery was badly dropped by Heywood at square leg.

Suffolk were still probably speculating on the possible cost of this lapse when McMurray provided diversion by offering a catch to short leg, which Covill eagerly accepted.

This was at 137 for 2, and a little later Mobery was missed again. This time it mattered not at all, except in moral effect, for without further addition to his score Mobery was caught at mid-on, and three wickets were down for 170.

Watts came in and, having made 7, offered two return catches to Burgess in one over. The bowler, however, apparently did not appreciate this form of generosity, and he turned both offers down. Watts went on to score 29 before Porter held a catch at mid-on to dispose of him.

W. T. COOK'S GOOD BATTING.

Meanwhile, W. T. Cook, the Surrey captain, was batting with delightful freedom and enterprise, and he gave the fielding side no encouragement to hope that they might dismiss him for a small score. Powerful hits to leg and off-drives typical of the left-hander's skill were prominent among the means which brought him runs at a good pace.

R. H. Williamson, a Sutton player, who rattled up 97 against Suffolk at the Oval last season, succeeded Watts, and spread further the epidemic of missed catches. He might have been caught at extra-cover when 4, and here again Suffolk were lucky in that they did not have to pay a very heavy price for letting an opportunity slip through their fingers. After scoring half-a-dozen more, Williamson edged a ball from Waugh towards third slip, and Catchpole held the catch securely. Waugh did his side another good service in the same over by getting Whittaker leg-before under the new rule. The score at this point was 269 for 7, and, considering the way things had run, Suffolk must have felt that it might have been a lot worse.

BRIGHT EIGHTH-WICKET STAND.

Surrey were not finished yet, however. Their total underwent a process of rapid expansion during an eighth wicket partnership between Whitfield and Parker, both of whom forced the pace with prosperous effect. Some of the most attractive batting of the day was witnessed during this stand which altogether realised 92 before Whitfield was sent back. Parker was allowed to reach his half-century, and then W. T. Cook declared the innings closed at 371 for 8.

Suffolk were thus left with about an hour and a half's batting at the end of the day, and the response of H. L. Porter and B. Darvill, the opening pair, was so virile that it looked as though the home side were going to play out time without the loss of a wicket. Just out time to seven Porter and Darvill had on a quarter to seven Porter and Darvill had on 78 runs, and were still together. Four scored, but had been tried without success, but bowlers had been tried without success. Young the fifth experiment altered the story. Young, a 17-year-old bowler of leg-breaks, was tried, and in his second over he captured two wickets, getting both Darvill and Lummis

caught in the slips. This rather changed the complexion of the situation, but just before stumps were drawn Porter completed an admirable 60, and he is still there to carry on this morning with his captain.

SURREY II. WIN BY SEVEN WICKETS.

EXCITING FINISH TO SUFFOLK MATCH AT BURY.

SOMERSET'S TRIUMPH AT CLACTON.

WELLARD AND ANDREWS SHINE AGAINST ESSEX.

Suffolk v. Surrey II.

There was quite a thrilling finish to this match, on the Victory Ground at Bury, yesterday, and Surrey had to claim the extra half-hour and then engage in an exciting race with the clock before they were able to beat Suffolk by seven wickets.

The resistance that the Suffolk batsmen offered to the varied bowling resources of the Surrey side was a good deal stronger than was generally anticipated, and the people who were most surprised were probably the visiting bowlers themselves. It was rather a piquant sight to see local batsmen, who usually get into cricket flannels not more often than once a week, cheerfully defying for over after over an attack which is normally in action every day of the week, and which has as its spear-head a bowler who is more often found nowadays in his county's 1st XI. Watts, in fact, is proceeding from Bury to Clacton to play against Essex to-day.

AN EXCITING FINISH.

When Suffolk's first innings was brought to an end just before lunch, at a figure (223) which allowed W. T. Cook to exercise the privilege of making them go in again, it was no secret that the Surrey players expected that they would be able to catch the 5.40 p.m. train from Bury with an innings victory in their pocket. And at first, when Suffolk went in again after the interval, the run of the play suggested that the Surrey cricketers would have plenty of time to walk to the station. If they liked, and catch this train. But strange things happen at cricket. Suffolk, after losing half their side for 88, staged such a remarkable recovery that the second innings eventually reached the highly respectable total of 207. This, of course, meant that Surrey would have to bat again, and it also meant that the 5.40 p.m. train went steaming out of Bury Station while Surrey were engaged in the hectic task of scoring 60 runs in about half-an-hour. They succeeded, and lost three wickets in the process. And they might, perhaps, have lost six, if all the catches they offered in their race against time had been held. Still, in spite of lapses in the field and everything else, although Suffolk were beaten they were not discredited, and for the spectator the game had the virtue of being full of life right until the last ball was bowled.

GOOD BATTING BY KENT AND HOWARD.
When play began in the morning, Suffolk, continuing their first innings, still had a long way to go if they wished to escape the indignity of the follow-on, 188 runs still being required with eight wickets in hand. Porter and Waugh remained together to see the 100 safely up, but after that there set in a depressing collapse, which resulted in four batsmen being sent back, while 7 runs were being added to the total. A catch by Whitfield, which dismissed Waugh, started the wickets

falling. Catchpole and Goundry were easy prey, and when at 112 Porter put up a simple catch to slip mid-off it looked as though Suffolk's hopes of recovery had completely foundered. Kent, however, had other ideas on the subject, and very definite ideas they were, too. He did not get much support for his proposition from either Burgess or Heywood, but when Howard came in Kent found him perfectly ready to aid and abet him in giving Surrey's bowlers a lot of unexpected trouble. In a ninth wicket partnership of high courage, and not a little skill, this pair added 68 valuable runs. It would not be correct to say that these two batsmen were never in difficulties. They had anxious—at times even precarious—moments, but in between them they batted really well, Kent showing especial prowess in dealing with the slow leg-breaks of McIntyre, from whom he took several 4's by drives which had no nonsense about them. Howard also made some good forcing strokes behind which there was the eye of the opportunist, but after his dismissal the only thing to record before the innings closed for 223 was a capital off-drive for 4 by Covill.

COLLAPSE AND RECOVERY.

Suffolk's second innings started off optimistically enough with Porter scoring 30 out of the first 37, but his dismissal was the signal for another collapse which saw half the side out for 88. Catchpole, however, was quite unperturbed by this succession of failures, and he went on batting with fine courage and enterprise to score a valuable 54. The surprise of the innings, however, was the resistance put up by the tall-end batsmen, who showed considerably good form, and served their side so well that Surrey were set to get 60 runs in forty minutes to secure victory.

As indicated above, they accomplished this task with ten minutes to spare.

Cambridgeshire v. Suffolk.

Suffolk made a good start in their Minor Counties match against Cambridgeshire at Fenner's yesterday, and a good deal of excellent batting was represented by the lunch time score of 156 for 4. They had the advantage of batting first on a perfect wicket, and the fast outfield was conducive to high scoring, but it was all to the credit of the batsmen that they were able to make the most of these favourable conditions.

Porter and Burgess laid the foundations by putting on 51 for the first wicket. Porter began in buoyant style, and runs came so freely from his bat that he looked set for a big score when an appeal for lbw was upheld against him. Burgess left five runs later, and Catchpole also could not get going properly, but after the last-named was dismissed at 89 there followed a productive partnership between Lockitt and Waugh, which was not terminated till the last ball before the interval. Lockitt, after a slightly tentative start, in which he gave a chance in the slips, settled down to a fine exhibition of entertaining batting.

LOCKITT'S GOOD INNINGS.

Lockitt's offside play was a conspicuously good feature of his batting, and several drives through the covers reached the boundary. At the interval he was still unbeaten, with 67 to his credit, and these runs had occupied him only a little more than an hour.

The quick fall of the remaining wickets after lunch largely discounted the value of a good morning's work. Lockitt was the first to go, after adding 10 to his score. He had hit one 6 (from an overthrow) and nine 4's before he played across the line of a ball from Smith and was bowled.

Meanwhile, Ormsby, who is captain of cricket at Uppingham, was showing promising form, and he made several nice strokes before he fell to a catch at the wicket at 195. His departure was the signal for a collapse, for the four outstanding wickets went down for 36 runs.

Goundry on-drove Whewell for 6, and Hall hit a couple of fours, but apart from these strokes the batting of the last four men was undistinguished. The innings closed for 231, a distinctly disappointing total after Suffolk had 100 on the board, with only three men out.

Cambridge had an hour's batting before tea, and during that time Coote and Covill batted successfully well to make Suffolk's score look inadequate. Both batsmen took their time about run-getting, and, considering the large number of loose deliveries that were sent down, their method rather erred on the side of restraint. However, their patience was rewarded in an opening partnership of 83 before Covill was caught in the slips just before the tea interval.

SUFFOLK'S ADVANTAGE SLIPS AWAY.

Thus far, the start of the two innings had run a very similar course, both opening partnerships having yielded almost exactly the same number of runs. On resuming after tea, however, Cambridgeshire soon stood at a disadvantage when they lost their next three wickets for the addition of 45 runs. This disadvantage might have been still more pronounced if Suffolk had been able to hold two hard, out-pitched catches which Coote offered on successive balls when he had scored 27—one to square leg and the other in the slips. However, the non-acceptance of these opportunities did not prove frightfully expensive, for Coote only survived to make 12 more runs, and, ironically enough, it was a brilliant piece of holding which brought about his dismissal. Lockitt at cover picked up a hard drive and threw in in great style to get Coote run out. That was at 78; nine runs later Parfitt was caught in the slips, and at 88 Goundry held a spectacular return catch with his left hand to dismiss Whewell. From this point, however, Suffolk's advantage slipped away. Warren and Eagle, in a wicket stand of 104, did much as they pleased with the Suffolk bowling. Eagle, who, incidentally, has a birth qualification for Suffolk, and was making his first appearance for Cambridge, had an early "lie" at 9, when he might have been caught at the wicket. He took full advantage from this escape, and went on to complete a vigorous 50 before Porter had him lbw, with a full toss. Warren also added to the Suffolk bowlers' discomfiture, and he, too, had reached his half-century when the close of play came with Cambridgeshire only 18 behind with 5 wickets in hand.

SUFFOLK BATSMEN SHOW GOOD FORM.

FIRST INNINGS TIE AT CAMBRIDGE.

Cambridgeshire v. Suffolk.

A belated declaration—almost late enough to be called posthumous—deprived Suffolk of any reasonable chance they might have had of forcing a win over Cambridgeshire, at Fenner's, yesterday, and, as a result, the game collapsed more or less unconsciously into a futile draw. In their second innings, Suffolk found run-getting as easy as falling off a log, and they revelled in it until after closing hours, so to speak. The outcome of their exuberance was that Cambridgeshire were asked to perform the well-nigh impossible feat of scoring 341 runs in a little over two hours in order to win. Needless to say, Cambridgeshire did not accept the challenge. In their determination to make their position safe from defeat, Suffolk had also annihilated their chance of success. There are two ends to a sausage, and you can't eat them both at the same time.

AN UNEXPECTED COLLAPSE.

The uncertainty of cricket was vividly illustrated when the match was resumed. Continuing their unfinished innings, Cambridgeshire, being only 18 runs behind, with five wickets in hand, looked to be well placed for a substantial first innings lead.

In the event, however, they had to struggle hard not to fall into arrears, and the best the five outstanding wickets could do was to score the 18 runs, which made the two first innings totals exactly level.

The confidence of the home side was severely shaken when Catchpole's first ball bowled Warren off his pads. This unexpected reverse seemed to give Cambridgeshire an inferiority complex, and Waugh took full advantage of their weakened resolution by capturing the four remaining wickets for 9 runs in less than six overs.

A good catch by Hall at mid-off, and a smart piece of stumping by Kent, of Worthington, sent back Smith and Wilkinson, and then Waugh hurried on the innings by bowling both Taylor and Cockell. Cambridgeshire were four runs behind when their last man came in, and the atmosphere was, naturally, full of tension. Waugh, single by single, they obtained this number before Waugh mutilated Cockell's stumps, and cut short the possibility of Cambridgeshire gaining a first innings lead.

SUFFOLK SCORE FREELY.

So Suffolk entered on their second batting venture at noon, much earlier than they could have anticipated when play began, and they made such excellent use of the 30 minutes' lay before lunch that when the interval arrived they had 100 on the board for the loss of only one wicket.

Porter left before the innings had got properly under way. After hitting a couple of 4's in the first over, he was out to a capital catch by Whewell with only 13 scored. Any hopes that Cambridgeshire may have entertained at this point of getting some more cheap wickets were quickly and fully dispensed by Lockitt and Burgess, who forced the pace with splendid effect and gave the bowlers no encouragement whatsoever until just before the first interval, when Burgess offered a chance which was not accepted.

BURGESS'S HARD-HIT CENTURY.

Burgess made Cambridgeshire pay dearly for this error, for, making the most of his good fortune, he went on after lunch to complete a hard-hit century, in which his square cutting was a feature of conspicuous merit. No bowler had reached three figures than he was caught at square-leg. Altogether Burgess batted two and a quarter hours, and among his major strokes were one 6, one 5, and twelve 4's. It was an innings admirably adapted to the interests of his side.

So, too, was that of Lockitt, who meanwhile had been scoring almost as fast as Burgess. Once again he exceeded with well-timed drives on the off, and when he was caught in the gully, having hit one 5 and nine 4's, he was only nine short of his century. Altogether, with a score of 77 to his name in the first innings, Lockitt enjoyed a very good match.

A GLUT OF RUNS.

With 213 runs on the board and only three wickets down, Suffolk could afford to put their foot on the accelerator with a view to a declaration in the near distant future. Catchpole and

Waugh pressed on with the run-getting heartily enough, but the declaration was postponed by an hour when it ceased to have any virtue in it. At nine-past-three, Suffolk had scored 256. A declaration then might well have saved the game from dying a "natural" agonising death, for (taking out the tea interval and the ten minutes between innings) it would have meant that Cambridgeshire would have been set to get 257 to win in two hours and thirty-five minutes—a formidable enough task for the bravest set of batsmen. Presumably, Waugh did not consider that Suffolk had yet safely reached the score. So he waited a further half-hour before applying the closure. During this time there was some hectic hitting, 66 runs coming from the warlike bats of Catchpole and Waugh, but it was rather a spate of unwanted runs and an avuncular swallowing of valuable minutes. Catchpole scored his first 50 in thirty-five minutes and the rest faster than a respectable timepiece could compute, but it was a smashing innings (his 91 included sixteen 4's) in a moribund cause.

At no time during their batting had Cambridgeshire revealed a notable faculty for fast scoring, and it was not to be expected that a side which had lost five wickets for 18 runs in the early morning would be foolhardy enough to try to get 341 runs to win in little more than two hours. Half a loaf is better than none at all, and they guarded that half as jealously as Fafner guarded the treasure of the Mibelung. In scoring 82 before stumps were mercifully pulled up, they lost one wicket, but long before that, the best thing that could have happened to the game would have been to give it a large dose of chloroform.

SUFFOLK TIE ON FIRST INNINGS

Big Scores by Burgess, Lockitt, and Catchpole

Visitors Declare Too Late

Most of the excitement of yesterday's play at Fenner's between Suffolk and Cambridgeshire was pressed into the first half-hour.

In an hour and a-half before lunch Suffolk made 139 for the loss of Porter's wicket. Burgess and Lockitt were in great form and after they had been disposed of in the afternoon Catchpole also batted in vigorous style. Burgess batted 2½ hours for his century hitting one 6, a 5, and twelve 4s. Suffolk's last 86 runs were scored in half an hour.

Suffolk, however, declared too late to have any reasonable chance of forcing a win. Cambridgeshire, left with two hours and ten minutes to get 341, naturally played for safety and the game petered out tamely into a draw.

Suffolk v. Hertfordshire.

This, the first County match played in the town for over twenty years, was commenced on Ipswich School Ground yesterday morning. Hertfordshire, who have won five of their seven minor championship games this season, proving an attractive side, with the result that there was an excellent attendance before lunch, the trees on three sides of the ground providing welcome shade. Gratifying, however, as the morning attendance was, the increase during the afternoon hardly came up to expectations, although it was undoubtedly by far the biggest seen at a cricket match in Ipswich for many years.

Suffolk, who had C. B. Hall, of Lowestoft, in place of F. H. Lloyd, and completed their side with A. M. Gardiner, an old Felstedian, batted first on a fast wicket, H. L. Porter and B. Darvill opening in confident style against C. V. Ford and H. F. Piper. Thirty runs came in five minutes less, despite the fact that the bowling was changed four times. With the bowling, however, Darvill was leg-before. After a quiet start, Hugh Catchpole, who followed, opened his score with a couple of lusty boundary strokes, and passed Porter in the run-getting, only to be stumped with the total at 61, his own 20 made out of the 30 added during his stay containing four 4's.

Suffolk had a severe set-back in the next quarter of an hour, losing R. C. Wright, H. F. Waugh and Porter, for the addition of only eleven runs. Wright was bowled after making three singles, the skipper caught at cover, and Porter, who had been at the wickets for just under an hour and a half, smartly taken in the slips. Further disaster was averted by the association of Gardiner and N. Catchpole, the pair remaining together to see the hundred passed, and being unseparated at the lunch interval, when the total had reached 113 for 5.

Only seven had been added after the resumption when Gardiner was caught in the gully, but Catchpole and H. B. Goundry made runs without apparent difficulty, to take the total to 145, when Catchpole, wanting only a single for his 50, cocked one back to the bowler. In an enterprising and particularly valuable innings he sent the ball to the boundary on half a dozen occasions. Goundry left four runs later, giving Roberts, who had sent down twenty-one consecutive overs for 51 runs, his fifth wicket. He secured another when he got C. B. Hall caught at deep mid-off, the ninth wicket falling 163. With H. S. Greenland in, R. V. Howard got three 4's in succession, the partnership materially advancing the total towards the second hundred, which, however, they failed to achieve by 20 runs, the innings, which had lasted just over four hours, closing for 180, with the dismissal of the Suffolk wicket-keeper. The visitors' bowlers were frequently changed, seven of them, with the exception of Roberts, being given a succession of short spells. Roberts, however, who was always commanding respect, was kept on for 29 overs, a policy which was justified by his ultimate figures of 7 wickets for 64 runs.

The Suffolk total was certainly not a formidable one under the conditions prevailing, a fact which was evidently recognised by G. M. Crossman and F. P. Longton, who set about the task of getting them with little ease. A smart effort by Darvill, at cover, however, cut the partnership unexpectedly short at 25, Crossman being sent back with only 13 to his credit. It was not, however, until two short of another 50 had been added that another wicket fell to Suffolk. With the score at 73, Waugh bowled Longton with the last ball of one over, and C. B. Fordham with the first of his next, four runs having been added in between. With C. W. Ford and F. C. de Saram together, however, 90 more runs were added before the home county met with further success, chiefly as a result of the punishment meted out by de Saram, who before he was beaten by a " Yorker" from N. Catchpole had hit 88 of the 142 added during his stay. After his departure further impetus was given to the scoring when Coverdale joined Ford, and Darvill was given the ball for the first time. He only had two overs, but managed, in the last, to get the Hertfordshire professional dismissed. The second hundred was passed before the fifth wicket fell, 11 runs later, but the sixth and seventh were down for 241 and 248 respectively, a splendid catch in the remotest corner of the ground sending back H. F. Piper, but afterwards the bowlers met with no further success, stumps being drawn with the visiting county 118 runs on and having three wickets in hand.

Play will be continued at 11 o'clock this morning, and a full day's cricket should be in prospect.

CENTURY BY C. W. FORD.

Quite a good attendance again marked the interest which was taken in this Minor Counties Championship match, when play was resumed on the Ipswich School Ground on Thursday. Against Suffolk's first innings total of 180, the visitors had scored 298 for seven wickets overnight, and when play was continued it was obviously desirable from this point of view to make early runs on a wicket about which there were some doubts of prolonged wear.

The not-outs, C. W. Ford (81) and A. Grimsdell (26), at once set about forcing the pace, and when the latter was beaten by Waugh twenty had been added in half as many minutes. With F. Appleyard in, Ford passed his century, but at 31, a spectacular catch in the slips by Waugh sent back Appleyard. Roberts and Ford afterwards continued to force the pace, with the result that when the professional was out to a brilliant catch in the long field by Hall 85 runs had been added during the morning in fifty-five minutes. Going in at the fall of the third wicket, Ford, who remained undefeated, had seen 306 balls during his stay, his individual 121 containing thirteen boundary strokes.

Waugh and N. Catchpole, who bore the brunt of the bowling, shared seven of the wickets between them.

SUFFOLK'S COLLAPSE.

To face a deficit of 203 was not a very heartening task, but H. L. Porter and G. Darvill, who again opened the home county's innings, played all the bowling with confidence in one over from Ford, Porter obtaining four 4's. The fifty went up in forty-five minutes, but with only half a dozen added Porter played one from Roberts on to his wickets, and with no addition to the runs Darvill was leg-before to Appleyard. Two down for 58 was not hopeful, but worse was to come when A. M. Gardiner, who had opened promisingly, was run out at 70, and H. F. Waugh caught at mid-on off the second ball he received. At this stage, Roberts had sent down eight overs for nine runs and two wickets. With Hugh Catchpole in, R. C. Wright did most of the scoring, but Suffolk's misfortune was made worse when Catchpole was leg-before to Fordham, five batsmen being out in 75 minutes for 79 runs. Wright continued to lay on the wood, once hitting Fordham over the boundary close to the flagstaff for 6.

When the sides went into lunch Suffolk had lost five wickets for 90 runs, with Wright claiming 25 of them.

There was little attraction for afternoon supporters, Catchpole being caught in the slips from the first ball sent down by Roberts after the resumption, and H. B. Goundry being dismissed in exactly the same way six runs later. Wright, who had just previously hit another six, was stumped in a desperate effort to repeat the stroke at 115, and, despite valiant efforts by R. V. Howard and R. S. Greenland, both of whom got the ball to the boundary, the Suffolk second innings was terminated before three o'clock for 135. Wright, in his 38, had two 6's and two 4's, but twice had lives as a result of his free hitting. Roberts was again the best Hertfordshire bowler. On a wicket which suited him, he secured five wickets for 33 runs, in seventeen overs, six of which were maidens, making his total analysis for the match twelve for 97. Suffolk suffered from the lack of a bowler who could spin the ball on a similar wicket, and were defeated by an innings and 88 runs.

Suffolk v. Cambridgeshire.

Good progress was made in Suffolk's final Minor Counties' championship match against Cambridgeshire at Denes' Oval, Lowestoft, yesterday. By six o'clock the game had reached its half-way stage, with each side having completed an innings. The advantage at this point was with the home side, who had a lead of 60, but in the last fifty minutes' play, Cambridgeshire came nearing wiping of this deficit by scoring 43 for the loss of one of their second innings' wickets.

VISITORS PUT IN TO BAT.

Suffolk fielded what was commonly agreed to be the strongest side which has represented the county this season. On paper, the team certainly had the appearance of being well equipped in both batting and bowling, and when H. P. Waugh won the toss, he decided that the most politic thing to do was to ask Cambridgeshire to bat first. There had apparently been a fair amount of rain at Lowestoft on Sunday, and there were still some signs of dampness at one end of the wicket.

Waugh's plan of campaign was handsomely justified, for in little more than two hours' cricket, Cambridgeshire had been all disposed of for the surprisingly small total of 111. It might well be inferred from these bare facts that the wicket played all sorts of fiendish tricks. Actually, however, its behaviour was never guilty of any real uncharitableness. Occasionally, a ball would come off the pitch at an unorthodox height, but for the most part the wicket was docile and well-mannered, and the three principal determining factors in Suffolk's success were, firstly, some startlingly effective bowling by Dr. K. R. Cussen; secondly, some irresolute batting; and thirdly, irrefragably good wicket-keeping by A. S. Kent, who took three catches, and did not concede a bye. Dr. Cussen, who plays for Lowestoft, was making his first appearance for the county, and he marked his debut by taking six wickets for 26 runs in the course of sixteen overs.

ONLY ONE NOTABLE STAND.

But it was Norman Catchpole who started Cambridgeshire on the run by dismissing Covill and F. W. Wilkinson with successive balls when only 11 runs had been scored. Covill walked into a ball which appeared to swing late, and was leg-before under the new rule, and Wilkinson cocked up the simplest of catches to forward short-leg. But Suffolk had to bowl for quite a long time after that without further reward, while C. E. Coote and F. W. Parfitt scored 76 of their side's total. There may have been moments during this prolonged third-wicket partnership when the Suffolk captain may have wondered retrospectively about the aptness of his decision, for, although Coote made one or two uppish strokes, neither batsman appeared to be in any serious difficulty. Runs came steadily, if slowly, until, at 88, Kent made the best of his three good catches to dismiss Coote. It was largely a procession after that, and when, after W. T. Whewell had also been taken at the wicket, Parfitt pulled a ball on to his stumps, half the side were out for 92. Cussen, who had failed to capture a wicket during his first spell, was now irresistible, and against his bowling Cambridgeshire never showed any sign of recovery. At lunch seven wickets were down for 101, and the remaining three fell afterwards for the addition of 10 more runs.

HOCKEY'S VALUABLE INNINGS.

The good work of the Suffolk bowlers was hardly supplemented by the home county's batsmen as well as it deserved to be, and but for a capital innings by G. W. Hockey, Suffolk might well have fallen into a ream on the first innings. As it was, the home county gained a lead of 66 runs—an advantage which was considerably smaller than at one time looked probable. The start of the innings was promisingly good, with H. L. Porter controlling the scoring in dominant style. He looked set for one of his big innings when he was run out—or, to be more accurate, ran himself out by hesitating in the middle of the pitch. There followed, however, an excellent partnership between B. Darvill and G. W. Hockey, and this pair carried the score to 80 before the former was bowled by Whewell. Suffolk were now only 21 behind, and they had eight more wickets in hand, so that it was only reasonable at this point to anticipate their securing a substantial first innings' lead. The majority of the remaining batsmen, however, offered surprisingly little resistance. Hockey reached his 50 in an hour and five minutes—an effort that was notable for versatile stroke-play—but when he found wickets falling with unexpected rapidity, he became more restrained, until at 133 he was bowled in attempting a big hit. A. M. Ormsby, the Uppingham boy, made a few nice strokes to leg and through the covers, and N. Catchpole turned his opportunities to profitable account during a brief, but bright stay, but with these exceptions, the Suffolk batting was rather disappointing. Cambridgeshire began their second innings badly, losing Covill, who was "yorked" by N. Catchpole, with only a single scored, but by careful batting Coote and Senior played out time without further loss.

Suffolk v. Cambridgeshire.

Suffolk defeated Cambridgeshire by five wickets at Denes Oval, Lowestoft, yesterday, and thereby gained their second clear victory of the season in the Minor Counties Championship. It would not be strictly correct to say that they only got home by the skin of their teeth. But, on the other hand, it would not be a very wide asseration from the straight and narrow path of truth to say that, once the main issue seemed plainly carved out for them, they jumped nimbly to their goal. However, all went thus well, and by this victory Suffolk, in the second season of their re-organisation, now stand quite proudly and honourably placed in the championship table.

The game went on much longer than at one time looked probable—in fact, much longer than it should have done. At half-past two in the afternoon Cambridgeshire lost their eighth wicket, and at this point they were only 14 runs ahead. Those optimistic souls who had just paid to come in must have thought, on looking at the score-board, that their six-pence might have been better spent on a stick of Lowestoft rock. In the event, however, they got their money's worth, for, thanks to an astounding faculty Suffolk exhibited of missing catches at the rate of about three in ten minutes, the game went on till nearly dark.

This very "catching" epidemic of non-catching began when D. Pask was dropped at long-off. That didn't matter much, for Pask was given his exit immediately afterwards. That was when Cambridgeshire, with eight second innings wickets down for 80, were only 14 ahead. Then P. S. Morton came in, and did his level best to get himself out. With curious strokes of doubtful pedigree he closed catches with a liberal hand, but his generosity was met with rank ingratitude, until at long last he presented a Kindergarten until at long last he presented a Kindergarten until at long last he presented a Kindergarten.

N. CATCHPOLE'S FINE BOWLING. But this is anticipating events, as the street musician thought when he held out his cap. Earlier in the day, when the rain-soaked pitch allowed play to be recommenced at a quarter to one, Norman Catchpole placed his side on the high road of prosperity by taking four Cambridgeshire wickets for eight runs. The visitors had resumed their innings at 42 for one, and, as a result of Catchpole's deleterious bowling, they found their score at the luncheon interval was 67 for five—which meant that, with half their side out, they were only one run ahead. The first ball from Catchpole after the interval "yorked" F. Morton; then P. W. Wilkinson was bowled by K. R. Cussen; and then Pask was caught in the slips. And that was 80 foresight.

MISSED CATCHES.

From this point Suffolk's commanding advantage began gradually to slip away. Almost as soon as he came in, P. S. Morton asked mid-on to take a not-too-difficult catch, but H. L. Porter declined the invitation. In the next over Morton lofted a ball to long-on, and it didn't really need a Jack Lovelock to make the ground to get to the ball. At ten minutes past

three the 100 crept up surreptitiously, whereupon Morton offered two catches, behind the stumps, but neither of them found their rightful home.

In the meantime, C. E. Coote, who had been playing an innings of immeasurable value to his side, had reached his 50. For two hours and twenty-five minutes he had kept one end closed and invulnerable to all the variations of the Suffolk attack. He was as firm as the Rock of Gibraltar—and sometimes almost as immobile. He gave the impression that, if need be, he could have stayed there at the wicket till the chickens go to roost, so squarely and determinedly did he play every ball in the middle of the bat. Thanks to the little matters aforementioned, this ninth-wicket partnership was allowed to put on 61 runs. Eventually medical aid had to be invoked to cure Morton of his catch-giving propensities, and at 141 Dr. Cussen, fielding at short leg, signed Morton's discharge-sheet.

HOCKEY BATS WELL AGAIN.

Set to get 76 to win, Suffolk did not obtain them without some trials, tribulations, and anxieties. They lost five wickets in the process. B. Darvill left with only 3 scored, and H. L. Porter followed at 20. G. W. Hockey, however again proved himself to be a very present help in trouble, and batted with cheerful confidence, in spite of the hostile manner in which the Cambridgeshire captain hopelessly set his field close in. Although adopting methods which, in their restraint, were foreign to his temperament, H. Catchpole helped Hockey to take the score to 60 for the third wicket. At 69, A. N. Gardiner was caught at short leg—unluckily, for this was no pusillanimous stroke, and it required a brilliant catch by Coote to stop a certain 4. Then, at 75, when the scores were exactly level, A. M. Ormsby was stumped. A. S. Kent had the distinction of making the winning shot—a jovial hit into the No-Man's-Land of strenuous, but uncertain, endeavour. He broke his bat in the process. I thought he would do something rash after not conceding a single bye in either innings!

SUFFOLK PUT CAMBS IN TO BAT

Lowestoft Match in Interesting Position

Suffolk had slightly the better of matters in their encounter with Cambridgeshire at the Denes Oval, Lowestoft, yesterday, and when stumps were drawn the game was in an interesting position, with Cambs 24 runs behind and nine second innings wickets in hand.

Wickets were cheap, 21 falling for 330 runs. Cambridgeshire collapsed in surprising fashion in their first innings. This occupied two and a-quarter hours, and justified Waugh's policy of sending them in first. There had been a heavy overnight dew, which was succeeded by a hot sun all day, but the wicket was never really difficult although there were occasions when the ball lifted. Cussen, a newcomer to the Lowestoft Town Club this season, and Norman Catchpole formed the spearhead of Suffolk's attack. Cussen returned the best analysis. Bowling a fine length, he took six wickets for 26.

Cambs received an early shock when two wickets were down for 11. For the next wicket, however, Coote and Parfitt added 75 in as many minutes, and between them made three quarters of the total. After Coote's dismissal came a procession, the other seven wickets adding only 25 runs.

The home county began well, and the 100 was hoisted with only two men back in the pavilion. Wickets then fell at regular intervals and the innings, which lasted just over three hours, closed at 177. Suffolk suffered a great misfortune when Porter was foolishly run out, but Hockey held the fort in great style. He was at the wickets 110 minutes for an invaluable 64 which included six 4s. Wilkinson, the Cambs captain, was the most successful bowler, his four wickets costing 53 runs. Smith, who bowled nearly through the innings, maintained a fine length, and was extremely difficult to score off, his 30 overs yielding only 46 runs.

When Cambs commenced their second innings, N. Catchpole soon bowled Coville, and Coote and Senior were mainly content to keep their wicket intact during the last half an hour.

SUFFOLK'S 5 WICKETS VICTORY

Coote's Effort for Cambridge- shire

N. Catchpole's Fine Bowling at Lowestoft

Suffolk, in their last Minor Counties match of the season, gained their second victory in the competition when they defeated Cambridgeshire by five wickets at Lowestoft yesterday. Cambridge, who overnight had scored 42 for one wicket, were dismissed for 141. Suffolk needed 76 runs for victory and these were secured for the loss of five wickets.

At one time it looked as if the game would finish much earlier than was actually the case. At the fall of the eighth wicket Cambridgeshire were only 14 runs ahead. P. S. Morton then joined Coote, and the pair defied the Suffolk bowlers for over an hour, during which time 61 runs were added. Morton, whose contribution was 30, was missed on at least four occasions, twice by Kent behind the stumps, and once by Porter at mid-off, and Darvill at long on.

The mainstay of the Cambridgeshire innings, however, was Coote, who carried his bat for 71, which included seven boundaries, all on the leg side. The left-hander, who was at the wicket for just over three hours, presented a rock-like defence, and revealed sound judgment in waiting for anything in the nature of a loose ball. He might have been out when in the forties, when Waugh dropped him at point.

The start was delayed for nearly two hours by heavy rain during the night, and there were early surprises when Norman Catchpole and Cussen opened the bowling. In half an hour before lunch Catchpole, bowling in his most deadly form, sent back four batsmen at a personal cost of only 8 runs, and at the interval Cambs were only one run on with five wickets in hand. Cussen quickly dismissed Wilkinson after the resumption, and Norman Catchpole captured his sixth wicket by bowling F. Morton. Pask threw his wicket away by jumping out wildly to Goundry, and it was left to the Lowestoft slow bowler to break up the Coote-Morton partnership.

Catchpole, whose full analysis was 27-7-50-6, received some assistance from the pitch in the pre-lunch period, but throughout the afternoon the pitch was practically dead, the ball seldom or never lifting more than bail high.

Suffolk kept well within the clock when they went in to hit off the necessary runs, and there were 45 minutes to spare, including the extra half hour, when the winning hit was made.

Felixstowe v. Gentlemen of Suffolk.

SIX WICKETS' WIN FOR SEASIDERS.

When stumps were drawn on Wednesday, Felixstowe had scored 209 for five wickets against the visitors' first innings total of 208, and early arrivals to the Town Ground yesterday were surprised to find the Gentlemen of Suffolk again batting. This was due to the fact that H. P. Waugh had declared the Felixstowe innings at the overnight score. The policy was justified by the result, the visitors being dismissed for a bare total of 124. In response, with a full three hours and a half in which to score the same number of runs to win Felixstowe, after having 86 on the board before the second wicket fell, lost three batsmen for the addition of but 2 runs before C. M. Wright and B. Darvill hit off the necessary 36 in time for the customary tea interval, the seashiders winning by six wickets.

Maurice Lacy and J. Holt Wilson again opened the Suffolk side's innings, on a wicket which was faster than that of the previous day, Wilson being leg-before to H. E. Gabriel at 23, and Lacy, who had just hit three successive 4's, finely taken at cover off the same bowler at 78. A. H. Sleigh, who had batted with steady consistency, fell to another excellent catch at mid-off 3 runs later. Three figures were reached with Capt. Beauford and Capt. Goodwin together, but, after both had been sent back by really smart catches, the whole side were out for another 24 runs. Gabriel, who, with Hugh Catchpole, again bore the brunt of the bowling, secured five of the wickets for 35 runs in twenty overs, from seven of which nothing was scored. Catchpole's eleven overs produced four maidens and three wickets for 25. A. N. Gardiner sent down half-a-dozen overs for 11 runs and a wicket.

With a comparatively easy task before them, the seashiders' second innings was opened by H. P. Waugh and H. L. Porter, who were making runs in such easy fashion that the skipper's dismissal by E. C. Aitken at 23 was something of a shock. With Porter and H. Catchpole together, however, runs continued to come so steadily that those that were necessary looked like being hit off without further loss. In one over from R. T. Robins, however, first Catchpole, and then Porter, were sent back, and, with K. F. Marks beaten, without scoring, by Lacy, three wickets went down for a couple of runs, but the 24 wanted to win were hit off by C. M. Wright and B. Darvill just before the tea interval.
