CAMBS. TAKE FIRST INNINGS POINTS.

The Cambridgeshire versus Norfolk match, which ended with Cambs. taking first innings points, left two impressions. The first is that the wicket, from the start, ruled a finish out of question, and the second concerned the attendance. The wicket was described as far too good for a two-day match, and no doubt the bowlers who laboured for hours on end—some without success—will agree with this view! The most unlucky member of the Cambs. attack was C. J. Smith, who delivered 46 overs for 98 runs and no wicket. Eagle was a little more fortunate, getting four wickets in his 47 overs at a cost of 110 runs.

The attendance was disappointing, to put it mildly. One would have expected a record crowd to show appreciation of the valued services of Cliff Smith, but the attendance was much below expectations, particularly on Saturday. As has often been said, there is so much free sport in Cambridge (there was a bigger gallery on the Piece) that it has to be something well out of the ordinary to draw a "gate." The Cambridgeshire batting and fielding were the most satisfactory features of the encounter. In a first innings of 426 for seven, declared. Crouch, who was awarded his County cap on Friday, got 162 in an innings that it was always a pleasure to watch. John Covill's 111 was quickly gathered and notable for some off-strokes full of punch, and H. W. Taylor and F. A. Ridgeon both exceeded the 50 mark in contrasted knocks. Only two Norfolk batsmen, H. E. Theobald (104) and T. G. L. Bance (103) caused Cambs. any trouble, and if Theobald had not been dropped in the forties, the complexion of the game would have been altered quite a lot. In the second innings Theobald got 53, not out. He scored a century in the corresponding match last year. He evidently likes Fenner's! The Cambs. fielding was always keen, H. W. Taylor, in particular, never being content to let the ball run to the boundary. Crouch and Eagle held difficult catches.

ST. GILES' IN A DRAW.

After Letchworth had scored 196 for six wickets in 2½ hours on St. John's College ground on Saturday, St. Giles' made a bold bid for victory by obtaining 173 for the loss of five wickets with 100 minutes left for play. Hayward, who opened for Camden, scored a nice 59 before being dismissed, but otherwise the batting was patchy, Kerridge, going in No. 10, hit hard for 18 before being run out. W. Goodey, with three for 36, H. Clark three for 39, Brough two for 31, and Reynolds one for 19, were the successful bowlers. Halstead lost a couple of cheap wickets, but then came a steady spell of batting. Adey, Brough and Goodey being concerned in useful stands. Of Camden's bowlers, Warren had two wickets for 25 runs, Daisley two for 40, Hayward one for 12 and Abbs none for 22.

OLD PEROWNIANS IN LEAGUE FINAL.

Old Perownians have a chance of a Cambs. Cricket Association treble. They have already won the Junior Cup and the Thursday Junior League championship, and on Saturday they reached the final of the Saturday Junior League in which they

will meet the winners of Harston and Lode. Saturday's victory was at the expense of New Chesterton Institute, the winners of Division D. Winning the toss, the Institute decided to bat, but they lost a wicket very quickly.

Then came a good second wicket stand by P. Arnold and Hempstead, who put on 69 runs. N.C.I. then had a bad spell, losing their next five wickets for eight runs, making the score 77 for six. Of the remaining batsmen, Chambers batted well for 20 and the innings closed at 121. Barr and Claydon pushed the score along, and a declaration was made at 147 for seven, Barr having hit an excellent 64 not out. Apart from two hard chances it was a good innings and showed that his recent high scores have been no flukes!

Thetford were early in trouble, losing a wicket at four. Half the side were out for 31, and seven wickets down for 34. At this stage Nudds, the veteran wicket-keeper arrived, and he gave an easy chance which was not accepted. Pro-fitting by the life, he hit hard and stayed until the end for 32 not out, and the Thetford score had reached 68 for eight for a "duck" by taking three wickets for seven runs and also made two wickets for catches. Stokes also bowled two good slips for ten in nine overs, and he also took a couple of slip catches.

When visited by Peterborough second eleven on Saturday, Ely City second eleven were saved by the clock. Stumps were drawn when Peterborough were only 14 runs behind with three wickets in hand. Ely started badly, having two wickets down with only six runs on the board, but when Tannahill was joined by P. L. J. Onkey, 70 runs were added before Onkey was caught, having made a valuable 52. Tannahill was out at 96 after scoring 25, and apart from B. M. Broker (18) and G. Leach (25 not out), the rest of the Ely batsmen failed. Most of the Peterborough bowling was done by T. L. Atkins and W. Pinder. Atkins taking five wickets for 43, and Pinder two for 18. The other bowlers to take wickets were H. Allpress, two for 13 and G. Woodhouse one for 13.

TRIBUTE TO COUNTRY CRICKET

Londoner and Cambs. Teams

The Sports Editor has received the following letter from "Just a Cockney":

"Holidays in Cambridge, I came across one of those quiet little sports grounds, with which the town seems to abound. This particular one was in Oxford-street, or Oxford-road, I am not certain of the name.

"However, I found a cricket match in progress and decided to stay for an 'over' or two. The 'over' or two, lengthened to a stay until the stumps were drawn at 8 p.m. For this match (a final of some sort between two village teams) proved to be one of the most exciting I have ever had the good fortune to witness.

"The team that batted first scored 205 runs, which struck me as being remarkably good for a village eleven. I felt rather sorry for their opponents. My sympathy, however was entirely unnecessary, as the said opponents appeared not at all concerned about the size of the score, and proceeded to rattle up a useful 140 or so for the loss of four wickets. Three hundred and forty odd runs for a Saturday's cricket proves our country cousins are not so slow after all.

"I decided to see the finish of this amazing match, which I learned was due to take place the following Wednesday. I was well rewarded, for the batting side, amid great excitement, carried their 140 odd for four to 211 and won the game. Football, with all its thrills, can never produce anything like this.

"Incidents that will live in my memory were:

"The great innings by the frail looking man, with a heart as big as a house, and the smart work of the man who stumped him. I have seen nothing better at Lord's. The terrific frown on the face of the left-handed batsman who went in when his side were one run behind. The hush that came over the ground as he faced the bowler, and the yell that almost lifted the roof off the pavilion as he turned the first ball to leg to make the scores even. Finally, the lusty fellow who went in last with one run needed for victory and clouted his first ball for two, and opening his shoulders, sent the next one crashing to the boundary!

"What mattered it that the next one shattered his wicket, he had done his bit—you could have heard the cheers in the next county!

"Here was cricket and cricketers of which Cambridge may well be proud. No wonder it produced a Hobbs!

"When I read of the squabble between Surrey and Middlesex at Lord's, I thought again of the two gallant teams who cared not whether the ball was new or old so long as they could 'have a go' or take a wicket. Whilst such men live cricket cannot die. Thank you, Cambridge, and your village lads, you have restored an old man's faith in a well loved game."

"P.S.—I was told on inquiry that one of the teams was from a place called Waterbeach and their opponents from Over! I thought my leg was being pulled with regard to the latter, until I looked at a map of the county and saw there really was a village with that somewhat curious name."
