KENT'S DEFEAT BY ESSEX

On the St. Lawrence Ground, on Saturday, Kent Schoolboys lost to Essex Boys by 8 wickets, the winning hit being made nearly half-an-hour before time. This was the first time the teams had met. The Kent side included two Canterbury lads—Tucker, a Payne Smith scholar, and Bengo, from the City Council School. Neither did anything outstanding.

Kent took first knock, under ideal conditions, and would have made a sorry show but for a courageous innings by Wood who, going in to open with Smith, carried his bat and defied all the efforts of the Essex bowlers to dislodge him. GOOD BOWLING BY NEWNHAM.

KENT RETROSPECT

WHY KENT'S DISASTROUS SEASON FAILED

Kent has concluded the most remarkable season since the championship started and finishes 12th — the lowest she has ever reached. A bad start was made and everybody asked, "What is wrong with Kent?" The correct answer is that the most reliable bats were inconsistent. For instance Ames, Woolley, Ashdown and Todd might hit up big scores in one innings and do nothing in the next two or three.

Such unreliability does not win in such a contest as the championship. You must keep going and not have bad patches.

And our colts, such as Wright and Spencer, did not show quite the batting form we expected, but I still believe they are good for runs next season.

Other counties, who mainly play professionals, do not suffer as Kent does in early months. For instance, if Davies, Chalk and Valentine could have played oftener what a difference it would have made. I look upon Davies as the strongest man in the team, with his sound batting, clever bowling and superb fielding.

Undoubtedly we felt the absence of Freeman, for neither Wright nor Lewis came up to expectations, especially Lewis. But, although now and again Kent made huge scores—as every eleven will do at times—our batting as a whole was disappointing. Had Fagg been well enough to play, the whole season's matches would have been changed. Let us hope he will be well again next year. It's been hard luck on a good cricketer and a charming fellow.

The bowling was not so bad. Taking the season through it was the batsmen who failed after our bowlers had disposed of the other side for low scores. The arrival of Harding will make a great difference next year. Only a lad, he has the making of as good a bat as he is a bowler, and his fielding is above the average.

Ever since the War we have been clamouring for a new fast bowler. And now this Reading boy has qualified for Kent after two years at the Nursery. Even the coaches at Canterbury had not fully recognised his strength until he made his first appearance at Dover. Had they done so he should have played earlier in August instead of playing havoc with the ball as a member of the Second Eleven. He was qualified.

Next year our batting may be weakened with Ashdown gone and Woolley a year older. On Spencer and Sunnucks we shall have to depend to fill the gaps. But Sunnucks must stop that terrible stone-walling; he must learn scoring strokes as well as defensive ones. There are times when pure defence is necessary, but every batsman, if he likes, can force the pace when he has been at the wicket an hour and got his eye in.

Two exciting incidents occurred during the month of August. In the first place Kent at Dover created a record by scoring 219 runs in 71 minutes against Gloucestershire and scored a brilliant victory. There has never been such hitting and Woolley, Ames and Ashdown absolutely conquered

The other exciting game was at Canterbury. For two days Kent seemed to be beating the New Zealanders easily. But when on the third day they had to make a very few runs, there was a sudden collapse and Kent won when the last man, Lewis, was in and thus secured a victory by one wicket only.

Another curiosity is that, with the exception of Levett and Chapman, every man

who played for Kent this season, bowled. And Ames had the best average—3 for 22-1.

And now let us glance at the individual play, taking the amateurs first. R. T. Bryan, as skipper from the commencement of the season up to the end of July, had an anxious time. Real hard lines when Kent cricket was at its lowest ebb. In 20 matches, four were won, 4 drawn and 12 lost. Bryan's captaincy was excellent, with the exception of being inclined to over-bowl his men and tiring them. His batting at times was worthy of a Kent skipper, for he showed fine defence. His best innings was 89 not out against Surrey.

F. G. H. Chalk, as soon as his holidays began, at Malvern, came into the side at the end of July. His batting has greatly improved. His highest score was 107 against Middlesex, while he made 62 and 59 against New Zealand, and 83 against Hampshire; and 60 v. Derbyshire. He is next year's captain.

B. H. Valentine took over the captaincy from Bryan and soon scored 104 against Hampshire. He made 43 against Sussex, but, with the exception of his century, he never again reached 40. He is smart in the field and always puts spirit into the side. And at times the eleven had to be awakened from slowness.

T. A. Pearce, home from China on leave, was disappointing. His highest was 59 against Gloucester at Dover.

W. H. V. Levett assisted in 10 matches, deputising for Ames. He made 19 catches and stumped 15. He is the best amateur wicket-keeper in England and was at times brilliant. But he had a few lapses. Last year he often made runs, but his only big innings this season was 44 against Surrey.

J. G. W. Davies came into the side at the end of June, but his duties at College did not permit him to assist in more than eight matches. His best innings were 89 and 80 against Leicester, 68 against Sussex and 49 against Notts. As I have already said he is the best all-round amateur in Kent.

I. Akers-Douglas is disappointing. Last year he played in several matches but had an average of only 13. This year he played once. T. A. Crawford was also disappointing this year. C. S. Marriott's bowling was expensive, 1 wicket for 116 runs! A. P. F. Chapman made his only appearance at Canterbury against New Zealand.

Now, what about the professionals. Ames, who took his benefit in the first match of the Canterbury Week, easily heads the batting averages. He has kept wicket in the Test matches with New Zealand and did exceedingly well. Last season it will be remembered Ames was unable to play for the greater part of the season, appearing in only six matches, but scored two centuries. He also made the quickest 100 of the season and won the "Laurence" trophy. Several of his innings this season have been superb. Against Worcester he made 201 and 44, both times not out, 182 against Leicester, 125 against Worcester, and 119 and 127 v. Surrey, and 108 v. Derby. On three occasions Ames scored over 80—against Notts 93 and 85, and Middlesex 80, against Sussex 84, and 74 and 73 v. Middlesex. What a magnificent batsman he is! And as a wicket-keeper stands ahead of anyone else.

How we shall miss Ashdown, an ideal opening batsman. He's too good and too young to give up county cricket, but he becomes coach at Rugby next season. And a good coach he will make. This year he has not missed a match. On three occasions he has topped the century—109 v. Worcester, 102 v. Glamorgan, and 116 against Hampshire. Other capital innings

were 89 Yorkshire, 80 Sussex, 62 not out Gloucester, 60 Derby and 55, Sussex.

Sunnucks, of whom a good deal was expected as opening batsman with Ashdown, has not come up to expectations. He got off the mark against Worcester with 59, and 62 against Yorkshire. Then in eight matches he was out of form, but against Notts he suddenly came to life, like a moth bursting from its chrysalis, and had a splendid knock of 162. Since then he has done little.

Woolley is still Woolley the Wonder. During August he showed the power we remember before the War—a punishing and graceful bat. Yet he is 50. He has bowled over 200 overs and taken 31 wickets. His best scores were 86 against Worcester, 193 v. Somerset, 114 v. Surrey, 100 v. Gloucester, 85 v. Essex and 79 against New Zealand. His average has improved upon last season. He will be playing next year.

Todd must be temperamental. Sometimes he seems invulnerable and brilliant, at other times out for a mere song. His bowling, too, has not been consistent. But he is one of the most valuable men in the Kent eleven. He made 59 against Glamorgan, then in 9 innings he only collected 33 runs. After that he improved and made 82 v. Worcester, and 58 v. Surrey. Another bad time followed till the Notts match when he made 100 not out. Again against Notts he scored 135 and 72 and 114 against Somerset. Todd's best bowling feats were 6 for 57 v. Worcestershire, 6 for 81 against Gloucester and 6 for 87 against Hampshire.

Spencer will come along when he can exercise greater patience in the early overs. He is, however, the most brilliant fieldsmen on the side. During the winter, he will keep fit by playing in Kent League football, having signed on for Ashford.

I now come to the bowling. Watt has had a gruelling season and was bowled many a time until he almost dropped. However, he took over a hundred wickets. His best performances were six Derby wickets at a cost of 34 runs; against Leicester 8 for 100; and against Hampshire 5 for 68. He has maintained his reputation as a mighty hitter and apparently has the desire to make nothing less than six runs at a time. With a little more patience he would make more runs, for when he does restrain himself he can play the bowling steadily. His highest score was 50 against Glamorganshire.

Wright has taken over a hundred wickets but his average is not as good as last year. In the early days of the season, when wickets were more in favour of the bowler, he did not take advantage of an opportunity, but later on, on the hard wickets, he was far more successful. Twice he performed the hat trick—against Worcestershire and Notts, —his average being 1 for 27 and 6 for 47 in those two matches. Last year Wright promised to be a great batsman, but I cannot help thinking he received a knock-out blow when, after batting early, and even opening the innings with Ashdown, he was relegated to the last two places.

He obviously struck a bad time, but it was far from encouraging to be so drastically brought down. He suffers the same fault as Sunnucks—will not take advantage of weak bowling. With more freedom I still believe him to be almost as useful batsman as he is a bowler.

Harding the colt has a graceful and easy action and keeps up his pace. He will never forget his first county match at Dover, when he had six catches missed off his bowling, in one instance off three successive balls. Apparently, however, he possesses a happy and hopeful disposition, and these disasters made no difference to his bowling. His average is not good. But that does not matter, for we have these misses to remember. Next year he will be first-class, and I believe that he is a promising batsman, while we know he is smart in the field.

Todd and Davies I have already mentioned. The amateur's best performance was when he took 6 Hampshire wickets for 54.

Cole, it was hoped, would come on to support Watt as a fast bowler, but although difficult.

And so I conclude my retrospect with a glimpse into the future. Confidently I look forward to Kent being nearer the top of the championship table next season.
