A GREAT SOLDIER-SPORTSMAN.

Owing to the death of General R. M. Poore a tall and familiar soldierly figure will be much missed on the sports grounds of Bournemouth and district. He was one of the most notable soldier-sportsmen of his time.

From the time when he first played for the county—in 1898—until his death he maintained the greatest interest in the County Cricket Club, and he has been a vice-president for many years.

He will be particularly missed by young players who he was always willing and eager to help by valuable advice. Wherever he went on the cricket fields, he could always be seen demonstrating to a player how a stroke should be made and his coaching classes at Dean Park, usually held during April for the past seven years, had been the means of setting many ambitious boys on the right road to cricket fame. cricket fame.

FAME AS CRICKETER.

By his great performances at ericket, Gen. Poore gained national prominence. He jumped into fame in 1899. His military duties in India and South Africa had prevented him from playing much in this country before then, but his name became known to English cricketers by reason of his fine batting against Lord Hawke's team in South Africa in the winter of 1895-96.

He scored the only hundreds against the tourists—112 at Pietermaritzburg and 107 at Durban—and played for South Africa in all three test matches. In 1897-98, when he was in Natal, he made 1,600 runs, which included nine renturies. centuries.

He came home in 1898, and, being qualified for Hampshire, played in 11 matches for the county in that season. His enormous height and reach—he stood 6ft. 4in—soon enabled him to make some big scores, and with an aggregate of 659 runs and an average of 34, he was third in the county averages for that year. iverages for that year.

REMARKABLE SEASON.

In the following season he met with remarkable success. With an aggregate of 1.551 runs, he averaged 91 runs in first-class cricket, while his average for Hampshire was 116. In a match igainst Somerset that season he cored 104 and 119 not out and in the return fixture he made 304.

This stood as a record individual core for Hampshire for 38 years, R. H. Moore surpassing it last year with 116 against Warwickshire.

General Poore made six other undreds for Hampshire in that sea-on, three of them in successive mings—his centuries against Somer-et at Portsmouth being followed by 40 against Lancashire at Southamp-

RECORD WHICH STILL STANDS.

On the occasion of his record-breakng score of 304 at Taunton, General
core, with Capt. Wynyard (who made
25), put on 411 runs for the sixth
ricket. This still stands as a record
arthership for Hampshire.

After terminating his county career, eneral Poore continued to play in epresentative matches and the best lub cricket, and when he was in his 8th year, he hit three successive centuries for M.C.C. during a West Country tour. Right up to last sea-son, he was playing in local cricket.

Besides cricket, Gen. Poore also excelled at golf, and until recently he played regularly at Broadstone, the course of the Dorset Golf Club, of which he was a member.

SKILL IN OTHER SPORT.

He was also a good footballer in his younger days, playing for Old Carthusians in an English Cup-final. He was a crack polo player, won tennis championships in India and Africa, and on four occasions was Best Man-at-Arms in the Royal Naval and Military Tournament, his skill as a swordsman being unsurpassed.

His three successive centuries for Hampshire were made in the same fortnight of June, 1899, that saw him play in the winning team of the Inter-Regimental Polo Tournament and become in addition the Best Manat-Arms at that year's Royal Tourna-

He was a member of the 8th Hussars polo team which won the Inter-Regimental tournament twice in India and later repeated its success

HANTS C. AND G. SCORE FREELY.

Batsmen were on top in the match between Hants Club and Ground and the Portsmouth and Southsea Club. There were 459 runs scored and only seven wickets fell.

Arthur Holt, scoring a good many of his runs on the leg side, hit a not out century—126—and "Don" Walker and Lloyd Budd also batted very well for 75 and 58 not out respectively. Club and Ground declared at 266 for two, but the visitors saved the game by scoring 193 for five.

New Milton's Distinction In The League.

MOORDOWN'S FINE FEAT.

Dean's Century Brings About Electric's First Defeat.

New Milton are now the proud possessors of the only unbeaten record in the Bournemouth and district League, but they had a nasty shock against Hannington-road and it looked at one time as if they would go under. Although Hannington could muster only 55 it was a big enough total to make the eastern section leaders go all the way. They were able to win with the help of a last wicket stand which put on 22.

Hannington had only two batsmen who reached double figures. Weatherburn and Rochester. The former opened the innings and made 18, and the latter went in at the fall of the sixth wicket at 39 and scored 13 of the last 16 runs, carrying his bat. Church bowled through the innings and took three for 25, while Scott and Whitcher shared the other wickets. Each claimed two victims in an over, and they finished with three for 18 and four for 11 respectively.

A deadly spell of bowling by Rochester brought about New Milton's collapse. In three overs he dismissed four men at a personal cost of three runs, and half the side was out for 25. At this stage Rochester had sent down eight overs for nine runs. Cook and Church improved the position after the sixth wicket had fallen at 26, taking the score to 47, but the ninth man was out at 52, Rochester having got two more quick wickets. That

Southbourne Fall to P.O. Engineers.

Dean Beats Electric on His Own.

Moordown, struggling all the season, must take pride of place in the western section for their very fine win over Bournemouth Electric, who thus lost their unbeaten certificate. It was really Gordon Dean's match for he hit a brilliant century—the second played in the league this season—and brought off a fine bowling feat.

Desn, who is a keen airman and holds a pilot's licence, opened the innings and set about the bowling from the start, although he lost two partners while 29 were being scored. Then he was joined by Farmer, who was content to keep his end up, and they put on 67, of which Farmer's share was 15.

Dean, a very aginessive bateman with a good style, galloped along to his century, getting into the nineties with a six and reaching three figures with a boundary. He was eighth out at 145, his last 23 runs coming from seven strokes. He hit two sixes and fifteen fours. The innings closed for 168

Only Kingman and Gowenlock appeared at home against the bowling of Dean and Macklin when Electric batted, and Dean dismissed the latter with a great slip catch, going full length to hold a ball that was travelling fast. Low Scoring by Villagers.

West Moors were another side to be put out for a low score, Hamworthy skittling them for 25 in 18.3 overs. They made a bad start, Dennis getting two wickets in the first over with only one scored, and they never recovered from it. Dennis finished with six for 10 in 9.2 overs, and Beaumont claimed the remaining four for 14.

Hamworthy lost three wickets while knocking off the runs, but a fifth wicket stand between Rigler and Pascoe took the score from 36 to 122. Pascoe claimed 60 of the 36 put on, hitting seven fours.
