Then Robertson and Abrahams settled down to score runs at a steady rate, and when rain stopped play before tea the total stood at 106 for three. Robertson had 46 not out and Abrahams was 41 not out, including seven fours.

They put on 68 runs before Foy hit a ball into King's hands in the guiley. D. Clark joined Sunnucks, but with the score at 101 the latter was caught at extra cover off Pierpoint. T. A. Crawford was next man in and for some time the batsmen played entertaining cricket. Crawford's driving was a feature of his innings, which came to an end at 34, Daley accepting a chance at extra cover off Pierpoint. Clark followed three runs later, E. With 15 minutes to go Surrey drew level with Kent, and two balls later Whittaker snicked one through the slips to win the match for Surrey.
