# COUNTY DASH TO THRILLING

# WIN v. LINCS

BRILLIANT BEDFORDSHIRE RACED TO VICTORY AND TEN POINTS IN THEIR FIRST MINOR COUNTIES MATCH OF THE SEASON AT LONG SUTTON LAST NIGHT. LEFT 76 MINUTES TO GET 138 TO WIN, THEY WERE ALWAYS IN FRONT OF THE CLOCK FOLLOWING AN EARLY ONSLAUGHT BY ROBINSON AND SMITH, AND WON WITH FIVE MINUTES TO SPARE.

To winkle out batsmen de- cision, termined on a completely passive role is never an easy task, but Bedfordshire managed it in the face of some ultracautious play by Lincolnshire on Monday.

On a good wicket the home batsmen showed signal lack of enterprise, so that the two hours before lunch, in which they lost two wickets, yielded only 60 runs. Ten of those came in one over, when Parker suddenly cut loose to hit Pratt for a six and a four.

That spoilt the professional's figures, because his 15 overs, seven of them maidens, had cost only 15 runs other-

Only when Taylor and Todd were associated in a stand of 88 was there anything but a struggle about the Lincoln-shire batting, but they reached 148 with only three wickets down before the collapse began.

Johnson caused it, by clean bowling four batsmen in a half-hour spell that cost him only six runs, and Lincolnshire limped to a tedious 180 which occupied 270 minutes.

Johnson's final figures of five for 44 were his best for the County, but all five bowlers used were accurate and economical. Morley, from Hertfordshire, looks like being an invaluable addition to the bowling strength.

Bedfordshire were not without their troubles when they began their reply, because at nine Chamberlain not only played back but across a ball from Drakes, who also claimed Lowings, who had been looking particularly sound.

It was left to Hoare to produce by far the best batting of the day, with 35 in an hour which included 14 in one over off Cherry-Downes, often the wrecker of Bedfordshire hopes in the past. However, at 64, in the past. However, at 64, Hoare's cultured contribution ended with what seemed to be a most unfortunate decision, and although Gunn was out to a bad stroke. Pratt, and the "night watchman" Crouch, not only played out the last 20 minutes, but added 20 runs.

With 29 runs added on Tueswith 29 runs added on Tues-day morning Bedfordshire lost their overnight pair, Pratt's dismissal came as a surprise—Drakes knocked his off stump out of the ground— for Pratt had looked supre-mely confident.

mely confident.

The score was then 120 for 6, but Robinson and Oliver overcame the shaky spell. Robinson was missed early on the square-leg boundary but this matured batsman was never in trouble afterwards and made a splendid half century in 64 minutes. Oliver was content to be the foil smothering the spin in brilliant style, and immediately first innings points were assured he declared.

Bedfordshire had batted

Bedfordshire had batted only 200 minutes and received 26 overs fewer than Lincolnshire.

Again the home County could not score quickly against Bedfordshire's accurate attack, and after lunch wickets began to tumble. Taylor was superbly taken one-handed by Lowings at short leg, and Parker left at 54 trying to drive Johnson.

Then Pratt took two wickets in consecutive overs and Lincolnshire had mustered only 87 in two hours. Good catches at slip disposed of Todd and Walton but Lincolnshire still had two wickets left and were 119 on when tea was taken.

THRILLINGLY, with even the home crowd cheering every scoring stroke, Bedfordshire raced to a two runs a minute victory over Lincolnshire at Long Sutton on Tuesday to collect 10 points in their first Minor Counties championship match of the season.

When Lincolnshire declared their second innings when they had only one wicket left and set the target at 138 runs in 76 minutes, there could not have been real optimism that Bedfordshire could achieve their task.

However, right from the first ball the policy was all-out attack, with Smith and Robinson putting the innings in front of the clock and it stayed that way until the end.

Nearly every ball produced at least a single and wickets were sacrificed willingly in the cause of quick runs. Gunn made 30 in 45 minutes and 24 from Hoare in 25 minutes brought Bedfordshire within easy reach of the required total.

# **Chase For Runs Too Much** For Bedfordshire

AFTER, between them, Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire had spent the better part of 10 hours collecting 427 runs, there was an attempt in the closing stages on Thursday afternoon, to secure a definite result and bring some life to what had often been a boring struggle.

As a result, Bedfordshire were set the rather unlikely task of scoring 173 in 115 minutes for victory. Unlikely, because their batting, bereft of the experience of Hoare, Pratt and Gunn, just had not the ability to cope with such a tall order,

Their chances really went in the second over of the innings when Robinson, trying to drive the accurate Hoyles, gave an easy catch to mid-olf and thus collected a somewhat undignified "pair."

Both Smith and Chamberlain showed aggressive intent for which they paid with their wickets and Bedfordsire were 19 for three and in a position from which there was little hope of mounting a winning rally.

With the arrival of Makin and

With the arrival of Meakin and the putting on of the spinners, runs began to come at a more respectable rate, but Cambridge-shire always had the means of curbing it when they felt so inclined, by the simple matter of the re-introduction of the very accurate Hoyles and Wilson to the attack.

This they did, so that the former removed Meakin, who made a very good 42 in 50 minutes which included five fours and, at 6 o'clock, the position was such that neither captain thought it worthwhile to claim the extra half an hour. the extra half an hour.

Bedfordshire were still 75 runs short of their target and their opponents still had six wickets to take, so that the game finally fizzled out into the tame draw that had been stamped all over it from the start.

Durley was 39 not out made bedfordshir in 85 minutes, an innings that seemed out of context to say the on the ball, least.

least.

The batting crawl that lasted for much of the match began on the first morning after the visitors had lost two wickets to Meakin for only ten runs

Batsmen complained that the

ball was not coming quickly enough on to the bat for scoring strokes to be made with any facility and the ball was inclined to lift at one end.

## CENTURY BY DAVIS

A painstaking century by Eddie Davis which occupied just over four hours, took away the effect of Bedfordshire's early blows and they were left facing a total of 243 and 75 minutes at the end of the day.

In that time, they lost three wickets for only 43, but it was difficult to understand next morning, the need for Crouch to spend 50 minutes over making four, or why the first hour should bring only 23 runs,

For Lowings, there was the valid excuse that he has been out of form but, even so, he could have produced more scoring strokes.

However, he was the sheet anchor of the innings to the extent of making 60 out of the first 123 and the Bedfordshire position was improved in the afternoon by brighter batting by

Oliver, who was not out with 50, and Smith.

Then, at the fall of the eighth wicket, Oliver declared 59 runs behind, and then came a hustle for runs by Cambridgeshire with Bedfordshire calling on regular bowlers only when the shine was controlled.



# Put in, Staffs hit 297—3

Bedfordshire paid dearly for putting Staffordshire in to bat on the first day of the Minor Counties match at Wolverhampton on Wednesday, Staffordshire declared at 297 for 3, with former England and Lancashire player, J. T. Ikin, undefeated with 116 scored in 95 minutes.

Staffordshire, in fact, tried five bowlers in a desperate attempt to make a breach, but at lunch Bedfordshire were 215 for four and up with the clock in run-scoring.

At this stage, though obviously well placed for first-innings points Bedfordshire declared in an effort to "make a game of it." Staffordshire accepted the challenge putting on a brisk 122 for the loss of three wickets.

Ikin got 34 of these to top 1,000 runs for the season a rare feat in the Minor Counties Competition.

Bedfordshire were thus left to score 205 at the rate of about 90 an hour, but in a gallant bid failed by 22 runs, being all out for 183 runs.


