Cooley trial for Lancs

Interest is quickening in Bedfordshire's Gillette Cup clash with Northamptonshire at Wardown Park, Luton, on April 26 (11 to 7.30), and this week the selectors chose 13 players from which the County team will be finalised.

Names will be announced on acceptance, and the choice of 13 is no doubt due to availability and the weather on the day.

One of those expected to be on the list—Bedford Town footballer/cricketer Norman Cooley—goes for a two-day trial with Lancashire this Monday and Tuesday.

The trial offer came in a letter and this week Cooley said: "I think it was my game for Minor Counties against the West Indians last summer which brought me to Lancashire's attention."

Before that, of course, Cooley achieved the rare distinction of two unbeaten 100s in Bedfordshire's game with Shropshire, and clearly he has the ability and temperament to make his way in the first-class game.

Cooley is now 26 and he has, of course, had offers from other counties before. Always the tug of local ties, his job at Brookhirst Igranic and the Eagles have proved too strong. "But this is the best offer yet," he says, "I must go and see what they propose."

BIG-HITTING Colin Milburn, heavyweight Northamptonshire opening batsman, goes into eager action against Bedfordshire in the first round of the Gillette Cup at Wardown Park, Luton, on Wednesday with a hidden warning to

the Minor Counties side. Said Milburn, known in his native County Durham as the Burnopfield Belter: "It is my nature to go after the runs, the quicker the better. The Gillette Cup games are just up my street. I like to hammer the ball and put all my beef behind it."

The last sentence carries the real threat to Bedfordshire. Milburn's beef is not inconsiderable.

If there was a deficiency in the county side last season it was a pace bowler to share the opening brunt with Bill Bushby: 29-year-old Davison can fill this gap.

Bedfordshire should not be let down for spin: skipper Jack Smith even kept the Australians quiet and if there is any help in the wicket Graham Jarrett will exploit it.

The county are also well equipped for batting—Bushby is eminently capable of hitting a few at No. 9—and if any of Geoff Millman, Peter Taylor, David Hoare or Norman Cooley "come off" there will be runs, attractive ones, in plenty.







latter have played only the one game!







WATCH THAT FRONT FOOT

AFTER several seasons of trial in first-class and Minor Counties Cricket, experimental laws relating to no-ball, caught, on-side fielders and interference with the ball will now apply to all grades. To help local clubs the new laws are set out here followed by a comment from Mr. Ken McCanlis. chairman of the Bedfordshire Association of Cricket Umpires.

NO BALL

(a) For a delivery to be fair, the ball must be bowled not thrown: if either umpire be not entirely satisfied of the absolute fairness of a delivery in this respect, he shall call and signal "No Ball" instantly upon delivery. The umpire at the bowler's wicket shall call and signal "No Ball" if, in the delivery stride, the bowler's front foot lands clear beyond the popping crease, of if he is not satisfied that the is not satisfied that the bowler's back foot has landed within and not touching the return crease or its forward extension.

extension.

(b) A ball shall be deemed to have been thrown if, in the opinion of either umpire, the process of straightening the bowling arm, whether it be partial or complete, takes place during that part of the delivery swing which directly precedes the ball leaving the hand. This definition shall not debar a bowler from straightening an over-extended arm nor from the use of the wrist in the delivery swing.

(c) In conjunction with the experimental law, the length of the return crease shall be 4 ft. and the popping crease shall extend 6 ft. either side of the line of stumps.

Paragraph (a) sets out the law while (b) defines a throw—a long overdue and welcome addition to the official notes. Paragraph (c) will entail additional work for those marking out pitches and it is hoped all groundsmen and players will be fully aware of the requirements.

CAUGHT

The striker is out "caught"—if the ball, from a stroke off the bat or off a hand holding the bat, but not the wrist, be held by a fieldsman before it touch the ground, although it be hugged to the body by the catcher, or be accidentally lodged in his dress. The fieldsman must have no part of his body grounded outside the playing area in the act of making the catch and afterwards. The act of making the catch starts from the time when the fieldsman first handles the ball.

the old existing law. provided a fieldsman had completed a catch inside the boundary he could carry the ball over and still be credited with a valid catch. This will no longer be the case.

ON-SIDE FIELD

The number of on-size fielders behind the popping crease at the instant of the bowler's delivery shall not exceed two. In the event of an ament, the square-leg "No Ball'.

This law has a misleading title: "Limitation of the number of on-side fielders," The number is not limited at all: a side could put all nine fielders on the on-side pro-vided not more than two are behind the line of the popping crease at the instant the ball is delivered.

INTERFERENCE WITH THE BALL

No polishing or other inter-ference with the natural con-dition of the ball shall be allowed. Wiping and cleaning the ball shall be allowed under the umpires' supervi-

This final experiment is probably the one which will be most difficult to enforce. For generations bowlers and players have polished the ball. Umpires will have to exercise much tact and diplomacy and players, and captains in particular, must do their best to help.


