114) **George William BAYES** – Born 27 Feb 1884 in Flamborough, E Yorks
Died 6 Dec 1960 in Flamborough, aged 76.

He was a RH batsman and RA fast bowler

First-class debut – v MCC, Scarborough, 1-3 Sept 1910 (Festival match)
Yorks career -1910-1922

His highest first-class score (36) came against Cambridge Un at Fenner's on 1-3 June 1911 (First Class game)

His best first-class bowling figs (5/83) occurred in the game against Hants at Bramall lane, Sheffield on 28-31 May 1921 (County Championship)

His career-best score (63) came in the Minor Counties Championship game against Lancs at Old Trafford on 1 & 2 Aug 1921

His career-best bowling figs (8/21) were recorded in a friendly game against the Yorks Cricket Council at the College Grove Gd, Wakefield on 18 & 19 June 1913. He recorded 7/46 in the first innings of that match to finish with match figs of 15/67.

Yorks career – 1907-1910

His career-best score (27) came in a friendly match against Surrey at the Clifton Lane SG, Rotherham on 10 & 11 Aug 1910. After the First World War, he was known as P E Whiteoak-Cooper and played 11 Minor Counties matches for Kent from 1921-1923

Yorks career – 1910. A brief career saw him score a career-best 10 against Lancs in a friendly match at Keighley CC on 1 & 2 Aug 1910. His best bowling return (4/46) happened in the same match.

117) **Edwin Pearce HARDY** – Born 20 Aug 1892 in Esholt, Bradford
Died 31 Dec 1968 in Little Bookham, Surrey, aged 76

First-class debut – v the Muslims, for the Europeans at the Deccan Gymkhana Gd, Poona, India on 9-11 Sept 1915
Yorks career – 1910-1912

His highest first-class score (53) was made for an England XI v an Indian XI at the Bombay Gymkhana Gd on 13-15 Dec 1915. He did not play any first-class cricket for Yorks.

His career-best score (111*) was made in friendly cricket against Wakefield at the College Grove Gd on 5 & 6 July 1911, His bowling came in two spells against the Bradford CL at Bradford Park Avenue on 13 & 14 June 1910 and against the Keighley & Craven district at Keighley CC on 1 & 2 Aug 1912. Both were friendly affairs.

Roy Kilner was the second son, and one of eleven children, born to Seth Kilner and his wife Mary Alice (née Washington). Irving Washington, one of Yorkshire's earliest and greatest left-hand batsmen, was Roy's uncle. With such a cricketing background, there was plenty of encouragement for the young Roy and he showed enough promise to join the local Mitchell Main club in 1905. After five years with the club, his performances were beginning to attract the attention of Yorkshire. He made his debut with the second eleven in 1910 and, in 1911, left Mitchell Main to join Harrogate CC for a higher standard of cricket and a better batting surface. From 1912, he was a regular in the first eleven.

During the First World War, he enlisted with the Leeds Pals battalion, alongside his friend Major Booth. At the outbreak of hostilities, he had married Annie Campbelljohn, a ceremony at which Major Booth was best man. Roy saw service in France and Egypt. He received a shrapnel wound in the same action in which Major Booth was killed, the battle of the Somme. His wound forced him home and he recuperated in a military hospital near Blackpool. In September 1918, he made his debut for Preston North End FC as a right-back.

After the war, Yorkshire's bowling attack had lost Booth and Alonzo Drake, whose health had failed him. George Hirst's form had declined also so Wilfred Rhodes encouraged Kilner to develop his bowling. And the first season after the war, 1919, saw Kilner take 45 wickets and score 1135 runs. Rhodes gave even more encouragement to Kilner as Rhodes was now in his forties and needed help with his bowling.

By 1922, Kilner was established as a genuine all-rounder and he was selected for England in 1924, making his debut at Edgbaston against South Africa. He also played at Old Trafford in that series. In 1924/25, he toured Australia under Arthur Gilligan. He played in three tests in that Ashes series and then four more in England in 1926, when Australia toured here. And that was the end of his international recognition.

In the winter of 1978/28, he was invited to India by the Maharajah of Patiala to coach. He thought long and hard before accepting but did eventually accept the invitation. And sadly, it was during that stint in the Sub Continent that he contracted Typhoid fever. He was well enough to return home but his health deteriorated and he died on 5 April 1928 in Kendray Fever Hospital, near Barnsley. He was just 37 years old.

One of the most popular players of his generation, some 100,000 mourners lined the route as his cortège followed his final journey. He is buried in Wombwell cemetery.

119) **J A MEAL** – Born 1888, Golcar, Huddersfield

Yorks career – 1909-1910. His only game in the Minor Counties Championship was against Staffs on 8 & 9 Aug 1910 at Stoke-on-Trent
His career-best score (29*) was in this match, as was his only bowling spell for the county.

120) **T TOULSON** – Born 1887 in Armley, Leeds. His Yorks career lasted from 1910-1914. He was a wicket-keeper.

His career-best performance with the bat (7) came against Surrey in friendly cricket at the Clifton Lane SG, Rotherham. His batting record, seven matches and 11 inns for 25 runs, perfectly illustrates that wicket-keepers for many years were not expected to contribute seriously with bat.
