SPALDING CRICKET CLUB.

SEASON 1892.

The Spalding Cricket Club have now completed their list of fixtures, and out of the 27 matches arranged, 21 were contested. Thirteen were won, 7 lost, and one drawn. Six matches were abandoned through bad weather and clubs failing to fulfil their engagements. This season the committee organised matches with several fresh clubs, and these alone have furnished some good sport, but the attendances at a great many of the matches have been smaller than in previous years. The team has been fairly represented in most of its games, though at times it has been rather weak, and for this cause Spalding has not been able to maintain the brilliant success of last year, when only one match was lost. The batting honours of the club have been won by F. A. Soames, his average being 47.5, Scott, the professional, obtained the greatest number of innings (23), securing for himself the creditable average of 21.4. In the bowling the club has had to rely chiefly upon Scott and Renshaw, and these two have done their work exceedingly well. Scott has sent down 396 overs, taking 95 wickets, of which 67 were clean bowled, and his average of 7.1 must be regarded as a first-rate result. Renshaw bowled 338 overs, and took 83 wickets, 48 clean bowled, averaging 7.3. In fielding an improvement has been noticed. We cannot conclude without congratulating Mr. W. Newton on the excellent manner in which he has again captained the team. The following table gives the results of the matches played:—

The club have thus scored 2898 runs for 210 wickets, or an average of 13.8 runs per wicket, whilst their opponents, for the loss of 288 wickets, only scored 2572, leaving them with an average of 8.9. Last season Spalding scored 2796 runs for 179 wickets, their opponents totalling 1903 runs. The largest scores made by the team this season, were 282 against Holbeach, 259 for five wickets against Spilsby, and 235 against Donington and Helpringham, and the smallest (21) was made in the return match with Donington. The largest score of an opponent realised 191, totalled by Magdalen College, Cambridge, and 190 secured by Peterborough, the smallest being Holbeach, who only got 20, Donington coming next with 28.
