Newport v. Guy's Hospital.

This match was commenced at Newport on Thursday morning. Butcher had prepared a first rate pitch, the turf being in capital condition. The captain of the "Medicos" won the toss and elected to bat. Holdship and Francis did good service for their side, scoring 25 and 51 respectively, but at the luncheon interval the visitors had only scored 107 for six wickets, five of which had been secured by Silverlock.

After lunch the hitting was very free and the run getting fast, the two not outs taking the score to 174. Before Reid was caught by Silverlock off Harding for a well played 38, having helped to add 68 runs for the 7th wicket. At the same total, however, Harding found his way to the wicket of Joyce, the newcomer, whose place was filled by Long-Innes. From this point the score rose rapidly until with two 2s off Silverlock in the same over Hancock passed his 50. Soon afterwards the 200 went up, the hitting continuing to be free and hard. An over or two later a slight misunderstanding between the two batsmen resulted in a near thing for Long-Innes being run out off a return by Rees, in fact several of the spectators thought the batsman was out, but the umpire gave his decision in favour of the visitors. The score still rose steadily, boundaries being registered in quick succession by both batsmen, when Morgan was put on in place of Silverlock, but the former's first over was severely punished, as was also his second. A change was likewise tried at the gymnasium end, Harding taking the ball from Webb, who was given a turn at the opposite end an over or two later. The rate of scoring, however, continued to be very rapid, and the leather hunting began to tell on the home team, who were at this point fielding very slovenly. Hancock by means of vigorous play had raised his score to 92, and considerable interest began to be evinced as to whether he would obtain his century, and still hitting both bowlers with perfect impartiality he soon knocked off the remaining 8 runs. The visitors' captain then declared Guy's innings closed, with the score at 286 for eight wickets. Hancock had played a really brilliant innings, which was only marred by one chance at the commencement. He hit 13 threes and 10 twos. Long-Innes had also played well for his 39 not out, and had helped Hancock to put on no less than 112 runs from the fall of the eighth wicket.

The batsmen on the other hand G. Bates, the bowlers being J. H. Joyce and J. H. Bettington (gymnasium end). The professional hit out and scored a three off the second ball, but an over or two later saw his partner clean bowled, with the telegraph 7-1-0. F. Rees filled the vacancy, and the scoring was rather slow for a time till Silverlock got Joyce for 3 and a little later sent up the twenty with a three off the other bowler. As both batsmen continued to score, Hancock was tried instead of Joyce, this change immediately met with success as Silverlock played on with his fourth ball--33-2-16. With the advent of W. P. Levick, who was the next batsman, the scoring became more rapid, though it was Rees who did most of the run getting, and soon afterwards the 50 went up. Seven runs later, however, Levick was given out leg before to Hancock. G. F. Harding then came in, and was evidently in form, for he hit out vigorously at both bowlers, and got four boundaries in a very few minutes. Consequently a change was tried, Joyce resuming instead of Hancock, and C. A. White taking the ball from Bettington. Nevertheless, the hitting still continued, and not long afterwards Harding sent up the 100 with a splendid hit out of the ground square for six. This brought on C. J. Francis, and his first ball was despatched by Harding on to the roof of the ropery for four, and his second for three, but after Rees had made 1, Francis had his revenge, and got Harding caught at third man. The outgoing batsman had played a lively innings of 36, composed of one 6, two 4s, seven 3s, and one single--115-4-35. P. C. Phillips was the next to go in, and did not seem to know quite what to make of the first two or three deliveries from Francis, but Rees still played with the greatest confidence and freedom, bringing on Hancock again in place of Francis. Rees soon after, by means of a fine drive to the off, secured his fifty. Phillips, too, was showing more confidence at this time, and runs were coming at a very quick rate, some fine drives by Rees both to the off and on being very noticeable. He continued to hit freely treating all bowling alike, but in attempting to drive Bettington, who had resumed at the gymnasium end, he was caught at mid off for 63 in which were 12 threes, the score at this time (6 o'clock) being 150. H. Ward, the new comer, did not stay long, but was soon bowled by Holdship, who had gone on vice Hancock, 150-6-0. A. Gould now partnered Phillips, who directly afterwards drove the new bowler to the on and the off for 4 and 3 respectively. Stealing runs was now brought on the day.

but was tried almost once too often, for Phillips was nearly shied out after an overthrow, the appeal being luckily in favour of the batsmen. Runs continued to come quick, and so Layman took the ball from Francis, and the change was successful, for off his second ball Gould was caught at the wicket--196-7-14. Immediately afterwards Phillips, with a fine drive to the on, completed his fifty. In the next over Morris, who had filled Gould's place, was missed by the wicket-keeper. Phillips, however, still played steadily, and with a cut in the slips sent up the 200, but Morris was caught three balls later--201-8-1. Webb was the ninth man in. Soon after his advent he got a bad smash on the fingers, and in the next over Phillips was let off by point. It was, however, a one-handed catch and the ball was travelling very fast. Another catch at the wicket was missed in the next over off Webb. The match was now very exciting, as it wanted but five minutes to time, and there were only two wickets to fall. Every stroke and ball were watched with breathless interest by the spectators. In the very next over Webb was smartly secured at short slip by Layman off Bettington. Morgan brought up the rear, and his feelings may no doubt be better imagined than described, as everything depended on his keeping up his wicket. This, however, he did successfully, and time was called before the visitors could secure the last man. The match was, therefore, drawn. P. C. Phillips deserves great praise for the plucky way in which he played an uphill game, and his 61 not out was a really brilliant innings. As far as could be seen he only gave one palpable chance, and that, as stated above, was by no means an easy one.
