WORCESTERSHIRE CLUB AND GROUND
V. WORCESTER CITY.

An ideal day for cricket favoured this the second of the Club and Ground fixtures, arranged for the purpose of fostering the rising talent of the city and county. Mr. Brierley had succeeded in getting a fairly representative side together to represent the city, and was fortunate enough to get choice of innings. Messrs. Curtis and Ellis were the first to defend, the attack being shared by Douglas Smith and Lieut. Wodehouse; the latter clean bowling Curtis in his first over—1 for 3. Ellis fell to the same bowler, and Souch was taken in the slips off Smith—3 for 14. Hefford and Brierley made a stand and brought on a change of bowling, Hefford smacking the new bowler to the leg boundary first ball. Mr. Brierley was unfortunate in being given out lbw just as he was getting set. Mr. Caldwell played a lively innings of 25, and with F. Smith put on 26 runs for the ninth wicket; when he left the innings soon closed, falling one short of the century.

The Club and Ground opened their innings with Douglas Smith and Mr. W. R. Harrison. The latter fell to a smart catch at the wicket, one for 11. D. Smith left at 17, smartly caught in the slips. Poole and Perkins brought on a double change, which caused a separation, Hefford yorking Poole—three for 34. T. J. F. Smith left at 33, which E. Perkins fell to a splendid catch in the long field just after. Wickets then fell rapidly, until Mr. Thomasson joined Mr. Hadlow, when the longest stand of the innings was made. Lbw sent Mr. Thomasson to the pavilion, and Mr. Norbury being cleverly caught and bowled, the City were left successful by 21 runs. Score and analysis—

CRICKET MATCHES.
WORCESTERSHIRE CLUB AND GROUND
V. DUDLEY.

With a large and influential list of members and situated in the midst of the chief centres of the coal and iron industries, it is not surprising that the Dudley Cricket Club in a flourishing condition; and as regards Dudley, it includes a team far above the average all round. Since last year a capital ground has been made, and it would be difficult to find a better pitch in the Black Country, whilst the picturesque view on the west, of the ancient castle and woodland scenery, presents a striking contrast from that on the northern side, where for miles nothing but chimneys and collieries in full swing can be seen. A few weeks ago the first match was played at Boughton, when an exciting game resulted in a draw, but in the return engagement on Saturday fears were entertained that a county team could not be got together, owing to so many club engagements. Even at the last moment there were several absences from those that had promised to play, which was a regrettable circumstance, as it requires a good team to lower the colours of Dudley. Defeat was next to an impossibility when the home team, who won the toss, elected to defend. Brown and Smith were the first pair. Fifteen were scored, when the latter was bowled by a splendid delivery of Douglas Smith. Billing, who came next, gave a deal of trouble. He was a striking batsman, and got his leg in front to the veteran Smith. It was a capital played innings of A. W. Dando, a remark which also applies to Deeley, whose total was obtained by nine hits, one being a grand straight drive, which realised five runs. At the fall of the eighth wicket, the Dudley captain adopted the closure, and it was a fortunate circumstance that he did so at that period, as the last Worcestershire wicket only fell a few minutes before the time fixed to draw. The county side did not show to advantage with the willow, as only four of their number acquired double figures, by far the best being the young professional Dixon, who defied the attack for forty-five minutes. The match ultimately resulted in a victory for Dudley by 24 runs. The weather was beautifully fine, and the play was witnessed by a great number of spectators. Score and analysis:—

Lathouse hit freely for 26, and towards the end Boycott made a useful stand, but the total amounted only to 83, so that Worcester were victorious by 23 runs. CRICKET.

WORCESTERSHIRE CLUB AND GROUND V. WORCESTER CATHEDRAL SCHOOL.

The early part of the day gave small hopes of any cricket taking place, rain falling heavily at noon. A better prospect, however, was seen after dinner, and the Club and Ground, who won the toss, went to bat. The first three wickets being represented by Douglas Smith and G. Bearcroft. From the first the bowling was excellent and runs came fast. Smith, who scored much the fastest, being well caught in the slips just as he had compiled a meritorious 50, made without a chance; the first wicket putting on 85, the second falling at 120. Mr. Bearcroft, who had put on 60 in good style, was out to a splendid catch in the long field. After three more wickets had fallen without greatly increasing the total, Mr. Young applied the closure, giving the school two hours in which to get the runs; and, notwithstanding that a heavy shower made the wicket easy, they failed, the tenth wicket falling to the last ball, as time was up. A good stand was made by the Rev. W. E. Bolland and Rammell, bringing on several changes of bowling. In the early part of the innings Brierley was the only bowler who met with any success, and it really seemed that the school would at least play out time if they did not actually win. WORCESTERSHIRE CLUB AND GROUND V. KIDDERMINSTER.

The great number of Saturday cricket engagements makes it a very difficult matter to get anything like a strong team together upon that day, and from this cause alone Kidderminster, supplemented their previous week's success against a County eleven by closing their innings when six wickets were down, and dismissed the whole of their opponents in a little under the hour.

A glance down the names of the representatives of each side would leave the impression that the eleven who did battle for Kidderminster on Saturday were superior all round, and so the result proved, notwithstanding that they lost one of their chief batsmen, who was caught at point, when only two runs were scored. With Powell batting in his best style, the total had reached 26 before the next wicket fell. When the third batsman was dismissed, Captain Monro had captured each of the three wickets at a cost of 8 runs. Upon Kempson becoming associated with Powell, a prolonged stand was made, and, although six bowlers were tried and changed at intervals, they failed to effect a separation for upwards of an hour. With a view to bringing the match to a definite issue, the closure was adopted, each batsman receiving very hearty cheers from the large company present. When the county side went to defend, they had about 20 minutes to obtain the required number. Although there appeared slight probability of these being acquired in the stipulated time, it was hardly to be expected that the County players would have been got rid of so very easily, for only in one instance was a double figure total attained. This result was to be attributed to the bowling of Rollings, whose seven wickets only represented a fraction under three runs each. Brinton also captured the last two for three runs. The match ended in a decisive victory for Kidderminster by 96 runs and four wickets. Score and analysis:—
