The most important game of the series took place on the Rye, where Marsh Green opposed Penn Street. Up till recently, Marsh Green were in the running for League honours, but their defeat against Stokenchurch three weeks ago put them out of the reckoning. On the other hand, Penn Street are Stokenchurch's most dangerous rivals, but it was absolutely necessary for them to record a victory last Saturday if their wish to displace the League leaders was to be fulfilled. The match resulted in a terrific struggle, and after being behind on the first innings, some thrilling cricket enabled Marsh Green to win by three wickets. Tremendous excitement prevailed throughout the game, and just before the conclusion of Marsh Green's first innings, the unusual sight of two players in the road was witnessed. Penn Street led on the first innings by one run—54 to 53—but the Greenites might have taken the lead had their later batsmen displayed a little care. The second innings of both teams provided some thrilling incidents, and it is questionable whether anything like it has been witnessed on the old battle-ground before—at any rate, not for some years. Penn Street were skilful out for the small score of 54, and this left Marsh Green with 36 to get, and only 20 minutes remaining for play. The question was, "Would they get the runs in the time?" There were some openings to this query, but the players themselves soon solved the problem. They went for the bowling, to use a vulgar phrase, "bald-headed," and runs came fast. Three men were run out in the most ludicrous manner, but no sooner did a wicket fall than another batsman was there to fill the vacant place. As time drew near, the excitement was intense, but with a minute to go Marsh Green got the winning run amidst a perfect tornado of cheering. There must have been fully 500 spectators witnessing the contest, and many remained to watch the game to its conclusion. Marsh Green won well, but praise must be given to Penn Street for the true sportsmanship they displayed, and though on the losing side, they had the much of the glory. The following matches were played on the first division. As the result of their victory over Holmer Green, Wycombe Alexandra have, for the present, handed over the "wooden spoon" to their opponents. The Alex. won by 11 runs, a much smaller margin than at one time appeared probable. The winners scored 53, and Holmer Green 47 and 42. In this match the decisions of one of the umpires were very peculiar, one player being given out to a ball that pitched nearly a yard wide of the stumps. The other match took place at Kingshill, where Tyers Green suffered defeat by 18 runs. Kingshill knocked off 81, and dismissed the Greenites for 65.

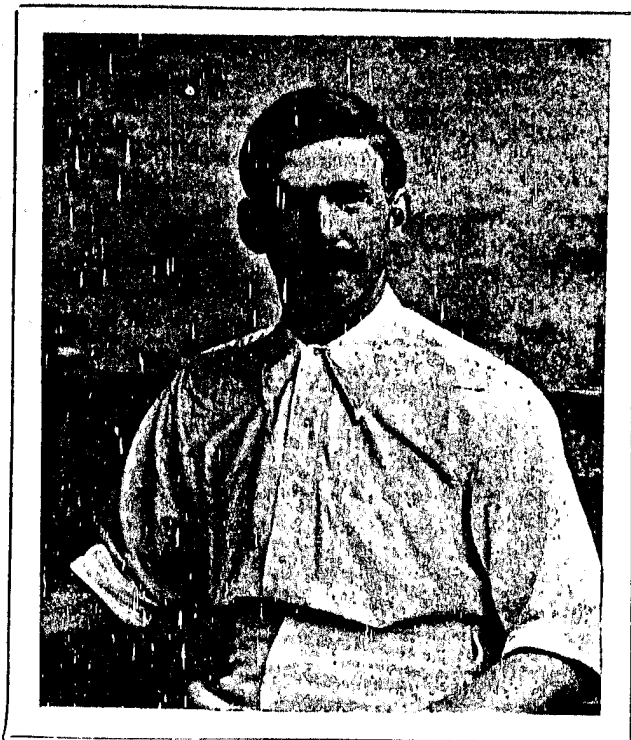
**"LADDIE" PAGE.**

Visitors to the enclosure of the Wycombe Cricket Club, in London Road, need no introduction to H. Page, ("Laddie"), than whom no more conscientious player ever donned the flannels. Whether on the field or off, this genial sportsman always displays a happy temperament which, allied to a modest and unassuming demeanour, make him a universal favourite. The writer has seen Page at home and away, and has found him a keen enthusiast, ever ready to acknowledge an opponent's good points, and always willing to bowl at an aspiring batsman at the nets, coaching him with a knowledge born of a long and honourable association with the King of games. That he may long continue to play the game, and assist the Town club is the genuine wish of all his sporting friends—and they are many.

It is interesting to note that Page's first appearance for High Wycombe was in the same year as witnessed the birth of the "South Bucks Standard." On July 5th, 1880, he was

wickets (52 for 870 runs—average 18.5), and hit 367 runs in 17 innings—average 21.6. Page's highest innings was scored in 1907, being 128, not out, against Maidenhead, and his total runs that season numbered 654, the average being 36.3. In bowling, Page took a hundred wickets—a great feat in club cricket—with an average of 8.03 runs per wicket.

Consistency was again a feature of Page's work in the 1908 season, and his average of 11.27 in batting, with 64 wickets for 775 runs in the bowling line (average 12.10), are meritorious figures. He was fifth in the batting and second in the bowling that season, positions which he maintained in 1909, when his batting average was 30.18, the chief score being 103 not out, against Bucks Club and Ground, and his bowling analysis 11.40, the wickets taken being 76. This season has found Page to be in better form with the ball than the bat. So far, he has scored 248 runs for 11 completed innings, an average to-date of 22.58, his highest contribution being 50 not out, against Wooburn Park on Saturday week. Against that he has some brilliant bowling feats to his name, taking nine Henley wickets for 43, eight of the "Occasionals" wickets for 17, and six Wooburn wickets for 18. His total now is 62 wickets for

included in the team which went to Maidenhead, and his initial essay was an exceptionally modest one, for he made one run and took one wicket. The Wycombe team, on that occasion, was composed of F. Langley, R. Barber (the Wooburn veteran), Rev. A. G. P. Baines (now of Reading), C. Harper, T. Smith, E. J. Lunnon, J. W. Turner, C. Birch, G. Darvill, H. Page, and T. Newell. The subject of my sketch followed Herbert Hearne (brother of J. T. Hearne, the famous Middlesex bowler), Lomas (Yorkshire), and Bilton (Keyworth, Nottingham), as groundman to the club, and in one of his earliest matches in that capacity took five Aylesbury wickets for 9 runs. Mr. George Darvill was the captain of Wycombe when Page first appeared, and the late Mr. A. J. Thurlow was mainly concerned in his appointment as groundman.

With both bat and ball "Laddie" has done great things for the "Chairmakers." In 1903 he came out at the top of the bowling averages, with a record of 69 wickets for 548 runs—giving an average of 8.4 runs per wicket. His batting performance was not quite so good, though he was sixth in the list, with an average of 17.1. The 1904 season was a great one for Page, who was top of both averages, winning the Bastick Cup with a total of 420 runs for 11 completed innings—average 38.18, and top score 58. His bowling average was 8.87, he having taken 73 wickets for 648 runs. Naturally with the wealth of cricket talent which High Wycombe possesses, it is difficult for one man to retain such a commanding position, but in the following season—1905—he was second in the bowling, with an average of 11.09 for 71 wickets, and fifth in batting with 21.41 runs per innings. In 1906 Page took over half a century of

420—an average of a fraction under 8 runs per wicket. More power to his elbow.

"Laddie" has been selected to represent his county no fewer than 68 times, and has rendered them useful service.

This note would not be complete without a reference to Mrs. Page—whose services at every match are highly appreciated. There is no better way of spending a summer afternoon—when the sun is shining—than by attending the cricket match, and partaking of the daintily-served teas in the southern corner of the ground—the refreshing cup being welcome to player and watcher. Mr. and Mrs. Page have two fine boys—both keen cricketers, who will carry the name of Page on in Wycombe—where already it has a most popular and respected place.

To-morrow (Saturday), Page takes his benefit, the proceeds of the match with Marlow being allotted to him. I trust there will be a large attendance, and those who cannot attend should most certainly purchase tickets, for the benefactor deserves a "bumper." Marlow always purchase Wycombe with a good game, and those who find time to witness the match will have plenty of entertainment, and should certainly stroll down and have a cup of tea on the ground.

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HIGH WYCOMBE v. MARLOW. RAIN WEATHER FOR PAGE'S BENEFIT. GAME STOPPED BY RAIN.

The fate was altogether unkindly disposed to Page—the Wycombe groundman—when dull weather, with an almost incessant Scotch mist were the ruling factors in his benefit match between the Wycombe team and Marlow. Throughout the whole game the players experienced the discomfort arising from the untoward conditions, and with a gray ball, wet clothes, and the slippery foothold, there was a consultation in the Wycombe innings as to the advisability of continuing. Marlow showed a fine sporting spirit—as the handi-capped mentioned militated more against them—and continued to play, the decision being greeted with appreciative cheers. Cobb was not destined to furnish much leather hunting, as, before he had opened his account, Page rattled one up which deceived the new comer, and Beardley was joined by A. T. PAGE'S BENEFIT MATCH. HIGH WYCOMBE v. MARLOW.

For the second time this season Marlow appeared on the Wycombe Ground on Saturday, the riversiders' match with the Town Club being for the benefit of "Laddie" Page, the popular Wycombe groundman. For nearly 21 years Page has rendered yeoman service to his club, and during that long period he has shown consistently good form both with the bat and ball. It is, however, in the frizzling department that Page has secured most honours, and it is interesting to note that during his connection with the Wycombe club Page has taken nearly 1,500 wickets for the 100 in a season, and three times he has exceeded the 100 in a season, and the latter performance is an unusual feat in club cricket. In the batting department, too, Page has done well, and has scored several centuries, and he has held the Baslek Cup more than once. Page came from Kingshill to Wycombe when mere stripling of 17, and from the time he commenced with the club his success as a cricketer was assured. He has often played for Bucks, and has won more than one match for his ship. Page takes his cricket very seriously, and few club cricketers have done more for the game more than he has. By his most unassuming manner, Page has gained a host of friends and admirers, and many will regret when the inevitable time will compel him to leave the field and watch others taking the place of a player, such as the characteristics of Page and there can be no doubt that he deserves well of his club and its patrons. Unfortunately the elements on Saturday were most unfavourable, and it is a matter of regret that Page will not have the opportunity to show his skill. Only did rain delay the start, but even at the time when play was possible the players struggled on while a drizzling rain was falling. The players did their utmost to get the game through, but Jupiter Pluvius proved too much for them, and after most of the players had been soaked to the skin, the match had to be abandoned when at its most interesting stage. Marlow paid due compliment to the importance of the occasion, and the riversiders brought over the strongest side that has represented them this season. Chinnery, the one time Surrey captain, and Greaves, a former captain of the club, but now of Reading, were included in the team, which was exceptionally strong in batting. At one time it was thought that Gilbert Jessop, the greatest hitter of the day, would play for Marlow, but acting under medical advice the Gloucestershire captain was obliged to stand down. It will be remembered that in the Test match with the Australians at Leeds last season Jessop hurt his back, and he has not properly recovered from that injury. His absence from the Marlow side was a great disappointment to local cricketers, for it is more than probable he would have scored a large number of wickets played very early. Wycombe played their strongest side with the exception of Baker and Redington, who were both enjoying a holiday. Play was timed to commence at 11.30, but owing to the wet a start was not made until close on twelve o'clock. Chinnery and Beardsley were the first pair of batsmen, Samms (Bucksbury end) and Page (pavilion) leading the attack. Runs came steadily from the start, but 4 fours off Samms and one off Page caused the score to rise rapidly. Another century followed, and the score had advanced to 38, when Chinnery failed to stop one of Samms' fast balls, and was bowled after hitting a useful 24, marred by a chance at the wicket when 2. Chinnery hit four boundaries. Cobb joined Beardsley, but with one run added the new-comer went away without scoring, and left Page bringing about his dismissal. With A. T. Knight and Beardsley together a useful stand was made, the score being nearly doubled before Samms bowled Knight for 12 (one four). At the same total (60) Church was treated in the same manner, while at 68, Greaves, after hitting a boundary, had his fingers upset by the fast bowler. Mockett then joined Beardsley, who had in the meantime batted very steadily, and the pair put on 28 runs before Keen, who relieved Page at 79, bowled Beardsley for a fine innings of 38, which included 4 fours, a three, and 6 sixes. Mockett was done for 82 runs, and Marlow did not appear to be in a very strong position at 113. Beardsley assisted Mockett to add 15 runs for the 7th wicket, when Barnett was taken at cover-point by Anthony off Keen. Wellcome was the next batsman in, and runs came with more frequency. The century and 200 runs came amid cheer and alacrity after lunch was taken, the score then being 114 for 7 wickets. On resuming, both batsmen settled down and played fine free cricket. Wellcome made some good hits to the off, his pinning being splendid. Both batsmen were often in difficulty, and Keen was twice caught by T. Brocklehurst off a no-ball from the fast bowler. The score afterwards rose rapidly, and at 144 Page took the ball from Keen, and the latter relieved Samms, who was losing his length. Despite these changes runs continued to come at frequent intervals, and Page went on himself when he wanted but one run to the second century. Wellcome sent the 200 up with a single, but in trying to drive James in order to reach his 50, the batsman was bowled by Keen. Wellcome batted freely, and got his runs when Marlow were in a weak position. He never gave a chance, and hit 6 fours. M. Knight was missed off the first ball he received by Brocklehurst fielding in the country, and off the next ball he was let off squarer by Murgatroyd, who slipped up as he gathered the ball. These mistakes did not affect the score very much, as Mockett was caught by Murgatroyd off Samms, the first bowler having gone on again at the lower end. Mockett hit 47, which included 5 fours, and 2 threes, and his innings was a very successful one. Although he made several uphill strokes, with the exception of the chance referred to, the Marlow captain did not make a mistake. Nine wickets were down for 202, and with 2 added M. Knight was stumped off James. M. Barnett being the net out of a total of 204 runs. He considered a splendid one considering the nature of some of the better bats, but Wycombe ought to have got rid of their opponents for a smaller total. The fielding of the home side was good and had alternately, but allowances must be made for the wet ball, which when it travelled along the ground was frequently slow, but catching the wheel. Samms bowled grandly before lunch, but afterwards he tired, and was kept on too long. He took half the wickets at a cost of 85 runs. James took 2 for 2, Keen 2 for 39, and Page 1 for 49. Marlow's innings lasted two hours and a half. Wycombe started on their venture at 3.31, but left about 10 minutes in the afternoon to get the runs. Jackson and Keen went to the wicket first, Cobb and Greaves sharing the attack. Both batsmen got quickly off the mark, and some fine hitting. Keen scored very fast while Jackson maintained a steady defence. Fifty runs or so were the result of half-an-hour's batting, and at 53 Chinnery, out with "slogs" in place of Cobb. With his third ball the ex-Surrey player got Keen out in a peculiar manner; he sent up a very high pitched ball, which Keen never attempted to play, but was bowled in order to avoid. The ball, however, fell on top of the wicket and Keen retired with 31 to his credit, which included 3 fours, a three, and 7 twos. Murgatroyd joined Jackson, and the score was taken to 61, when the former was out to exactly the same kind of ball which dismissed Keen. Jackson was then partnered by the Captain, and the

score rose slowly. Greaves went on bowling in place of Wellcome, who had relieved him earlier in the innings, and at 82 Beardsley took up the attack in place of Chinnery. With a single scored, the new bowler got James caught at cover off a bad ball, the batsman making a blunder. James had scored 10 runs (1 four), and the players slack to the game. At 97, the tea interval arrived and it was deemed advisable to abandon the game, there being little prospect of the weather clearing. 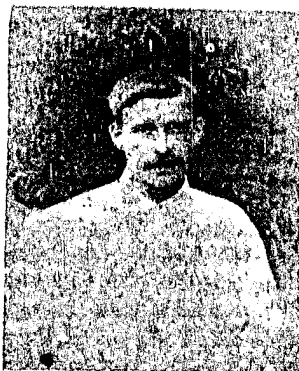
**WYCOMBE CRICKET CLUB.  
REVIEW OF A SUCCESSFUL  
SEASON.**

Although the 1910 cricket season—which was concluded by the Wycombe Club with a win over Chesham, on Saturday—has not furnished for the local eleven so large a number of matches as 1909, the pursuit of the great summer pastime in Wycombe has been attended with pleasure and success. Only two games of the fixture list were not played, the match v. Paddington, on Whit-Tuesday being abandoned on account of the national mourning for the death of King Edward VII., and the game with Mr. Stanley Briggs' XI. not taking place. Of the sixteen games engaged in, ten were won, two lost, and four drawn. Chesham, Wooburn Park, and Henley were each defeated twice, Mill Hill Park, the Occasionals, Bucks Club and Ground, and Marlow, succumbed once to the prowess of the Wycombe players. Only two clubs inflicted defeat on Wycombe, these being Reading Town and M.C.C.; whilst drawn games were played with Reading Town (away), Paddington, Wycombe and District Cricket League, and Marlow (home).

During the season, Wycombe have totalled 2,564 runs for 123 wickets—an average of 20.85; as against 2,191 runs scored for 187 wickets by

their opponents, an average of 11.71 runs per wicket. The balance in favour of Wycombe is thus 8.64 runs per wicket.

The season has revealed several good batsmen, while the Trojans of the 1909 season—when 21 games were played, 18 won, 4 lost, and 4 drawn—have all been wanting in scoring form. W. L. Jackson has been the most consistent scorer for the club, and he has maintained an average sufficiently high to establish him as the winner, for the second season in succession, of the Bostick Cup. He has exceeded the century once this season, making 109 not out against Henley, and the only other centurion of the year is W. J. Samms, who hit up 107 not out against the Occasionals. The latter has proved a fine fast bowler for Wycombe, and has, on several occasions, done deadly work in the trundling department. But the brunt of the work during the season fell to Page, who has excellent achievements to his credit. His nine wickets for 45, out of a score of 156 made by Henley, ranks as a first-class performance, and his 8 for 17 against the Occasionals is another outstanding performance. A. W. Keen experienced an unaccountable loss of form in both batting and bowling, and on hardly a single occasion has he got really going. W. A. Murgatroyd has also been unsuccessful, but H. Baker, and E. A. Janes have some good innings to their names, notably the Secretary's 63 in twenty minutes against Paddington.

Wycombe's highest total this season is 360 for 9 wickets against Paddington, and their lowest 66, against Marlow. The highest score made against Wycombe is 204, by Marlow, who were the only team to score over 200 runs against Wycombe. The lowest score was Wooburn Park's 40. Below are the results of the season:—

**SLOUGH CRICKET CLUB.**

**THE FIRST ELEVEN—SEASON 1910.**

With Saturday's gaslight match the Slough Club brought its long programme to an exciting termination by defeating Burnham in the dark a few minutes before time.

The season has provided a lot of cricket, and in spite of the inclemency of the first half of the summer there has been excellent sport and a good deal of enthusiastic interest.

Thirty-four first eleven engagements were on the programme, and of these two were scratched—the first on May 7th, owing to the National mourning for King Edward VII, and the other on August 27th, when Slough failed to muster any sort of team to go to Marlow. One match, against Mr. Carr-Gomm's eleven at Farnham Chase, ended in a tie—and the team was most hospitably entertained by the host. Sixteen were drawn, and if any adjudications were made it would be fair to say that in half of these Slough were probable winners and in only one can they be said to have escaped probable defeat. Seven of the drawn games were interfered with by rain in greater or less degree. Four matches were lost—the first at Uxbridge after looking well won; the second at Hanwell, when Slough took the field with several substitutes and about four of the regular team, and the third at Slough against Bucks Club and Ground, when the visitors took advantage of a weak bowling side and snatched a victory by the magnificent hitting of Orton. The fourth defeat was at Reading on a very indifferent wicket, when all the Slough bats had an off day, and Fisher and W. Johnson put on 49 runs for the 9th wicket out a total of 87, and no one on the Slough side could catch! The remaining eleven games were won—frequently by very wide margins; for in afternoon cricket on Fisher's wickets unless one side is badly inferior to the other, or has a specially bad day, the drawn game is very difficult to avoid. Beaconsfield, a weak Ealing team, Hampstead Itinerants, Windsor Home Park, the Rev. P. H. Elliot's XI., Mr. Harker's XI., the M.C.C., Clapham, and Burnham were all defeated at Slough, while Windsor Alexandra and Burnham were beaten on their own grounds. Of all these the keenest and closest fight was with the M.C.C. on July 27th. The Bucks skipper, Mr. Lowndes, had kindly promised to captain the visiting side, and when it was found that he had brought the world-famous J. T. Hearne, and Hendren, of Middlesex, and Coleman, of Herts, besides several good amateur players, it was felt that he had indeed considered highly of the local strength. Slough was well represented, in spite of the absence of T. H. Kent, Austin, Leach, and Butt; in fact, with Guppy and Mat Wright playing, it is doubtful whether a really better local side has ever been assembled. If Kent had been able to play someone would have had to stand out for him, but otherwise the committee could hardly have made any changes. The M.C.C. bowling was never mastered, but all but one of the Slough batsmen contributed to the score of 176, Dewley's share (35 not out) being the highest. At one point in the M.C.C. innings it looked as though they were easy winners. Hendren was hitting hard, and high, and often, and Mr. Lowndes was quietly playing himself in, and the score was 85 for two. Three runs later Hendren was taken high up and wide with the left hand at mid-off by Southall off Hill, and Coleman was magnificently caught and bowled one hand by the same bowler. This made a difference! But first Price and then Franklin stuck in while Lowndes steadily added to the score, and 150 was reached with only half the side out. Then came a collapse: Franklin was bowled by Robertson, the Bucks captain was well caught in the slips by Guppy off Mat Wright, and J. T. Hearne beautifully taken one hand by the same holder off Hill, who had resumed after a short rest. A smart run out made 9 for 165, and Mat Wright clean bowled the last man first ball—so Slough won by 11 runs. Hill bowled better in this match than ever before or since; 21 overs for 58 runs and 5 wickets on a true pitch against batsmen of this class is something to be proud of, and his victims included the three professionals and the two first amateur batsmen.

A most successful innovation to the programme was a cricket week at the end of July. Between Saturday, July 23rd, and Monday,

August 1st, the club played seven first eleven fixtures (of which they won five and drew two), a ladies' match (which they lost), and a very keenly-fought married v. singles, which the latter won, thanks to a brilliant innings of 157 by Hill.

Another ladies' match had been previously won by the club eleven, but twenty-two (or was it thirty?) Slough tradesmen very nearly succeeded in defeating them in an enjoyable game earlier in the season. Collectively the Slough sides have scored 5,424 runs (363 being extras) for 224 wickets, and their opponents 4,300 runs (329 extras) for 239 wickets. These figures are larger than any previously recorded, because so many more matches were played, but the averages per wicket give interesting comparisons with former years. Excluding the extras, every wicket for Slough has produced 22.6 runs, and every adversary's wicket has cost 16.6 runs. The Slough batsman has not, on this showing, done over well, for since 1905 the average has only once been lower than this figure, and in 1907 it was as high as 26.6. The visiting sides last year only averaged a nett 9.2 per wicket, but in 1908 they obtained 19.3, in 1907 16.7, and in 1906 only 14.6; therefore their figures for this year speak well for our bowlers, as we have every reason to believe that we met a stronger series of teams than was the case in 1909.

In order to ensure this, several new clubs were added to the card, two matches being played with Shepherd's Bush, two with Pailingswick, one with Hanwell Asylum, and two instead of one with Kilburn. With the exception of the Hanwell match all these new games were drawn, and the enemy in each case showed themselves to be cricketers of high class.

Taking the season through, the club as a whole must be well satisfied, the only department of the game which has given disappointment being the fielding. The dropped catch is said to be fairly general, but Slough bowlers must have had more than their share this year. The ground fielding and the throwing-in have not been consistently as good as usual, and it is much to be hoped that the players next year will put more zest and thought into this branch of the game—so pretty to watch if well done, and so saddening if slovenly and wild.

The individual performances of members of the team are tabulated in the lists given below. First mention in the batting department must be made of T. R. Kent, who unluckily had duties away which prevented him from playing for the club till July. His 202 not out at Virginia Water will probably stand for a long

time as a record, and its excellence and variety were worthy of the huge total. In addition to his unequalled performance for Slough, Kent has played with much success for the County, and has regularly gone in first and heads the averages of the regular players. For so young a batsman this is very good indeed, and we confidently expect greater things. He has gained more control of a number of strokes, and puts more power into them than last year, and altogether he is a rapidly improving player, for his fielding is now smart and accurate, he can catch reliably and well, and he throws in with pace and judgment.

H. Austin has not batted often, but he can make runs as well as bowl. His 8 for 49 against Burnham was the result of steady length and well concerted changes of break and pace. Dr. E. Weaver Adams has exceeded the thousand runs for the second time, but on the previous occasion, in 1907, his average was rather better (62.7). Three times he has reached the century this season. The bats have been freely used, and on one occasion got 7 for 20. Leach as usual is not far down from the top of the list, but he ought to play more. L. McCoy Hill returns an average a shade better than last year's, but his best effort—a perfect one—was made in the Inter-college battle in the cricket week, and does not count in the averages. Not only has he been a consistent and dangerous bat, but he has done the greatest service with the ball also, and his exceptional performance against the M.C.C. is only the brightest of many fine feats. 7 for 46, 6 for 42, 7 for 29, and 4 for 15 are other examples of his figures, but towards the end of the season he has not been quite so deadly and his average has lost some of its glory. The next name on the batting list is that of a young player who promises to do very well indeed. B. Smith has only played three times for the first team, but on these occasions, and frequently for the second eleven, he has shown the steadiness and ability to score off loose balls that are sure to make him at any rate useful, and possibly more than this if he perseveres and learns new strokes. F. Butt

has, next to the skipper, played most innings for the club, and has several times proved a tower of safety to the side. His average of just under 30 is well-earned, for he began the season very moderately; but by steady pluck he worked himself into form and his 103 not out against Shepherd's Bush put a fitting climax to his efforts. He is a thorough good sportsman who has the well-being of the side and of the club top most in his heart.

Ross is a brilliant bat who would do better still if he played more and got good practice. He got 109 against Bucks Club and Ground, and was very useful in the County team. Southall we never see enough of. He can bat as well as anyone in Bucks and can bowl very successfully now and then, as 5 for 15 against Windsor Home Park testifies. He had the worst of luck in being run out by his partner's mistake in the M.C.C. match, when he looked like making a big score. E. J. Leat is not the Leat of old, although he again played for Bucks and for Somersetshire in the same season. Three "ducks" in eight innings were not his worst, and his bowling is absolutely gone. But we fully expect he will regain his effectiveness, and, perhaps, in more subdued style, but none the less gracefully and forcibly, return to averages of 50 and more.

Fisher has had a good year, for not only has he prepared some forty excellent wickets on the ground, and bowled more on them than in any recent year, but also he has been the hero of two fine sporting efforts—at Windsor and at Reading—and has had a benefit which will realise something over £13. He deserves every penny. Rather unexpectedly low on the list comes G. Dewley, but his highest score in 16 innings appears to be 38, while his average is 20, and this is characteristic of the batsman, for he nearly always makes 20 or 30 and a short spell of ill-luck after his good form against the M.C.C. has rather spoilt his average. He has been a valuable change bowler now and then, and has fielded steadily and reliably throughout the season. Robertson is a much improved batsman who watches the ball very closely and will with practice make many runs. At present his reputation of scoring strokes is small, but he will enlarge it every year. As a bowler he has been most helpful, usually doing best when most depended on him. There is no one in the club who bowls a more difficult ball than he occasionally puts in, with swerve and top-spin and break combined; and he often performs best against the wind, for with his easy action he rarely gets tired. Of the remaining batsmen Hogarth and W. Johnson only have played a double-figure number of innings. Hogarth has gone back nearly to his low average of 1907, but it has by no means meant that he was playing badly all the time. He had poor luck, and could not get the ball away. W. Johnson has a lower average than he ought to have, for his innings against Ealing and his spirited effort against Reading showed that he might well be a thorn in the side of the enemy. But it has rather been his lot to bat when runs were not very much needed, and this fact perhaps led to indifference. His wicket-keeping lacks life and style, and we would recommend him to go and see some really great performers and try to learn a few points. He has plenty of pluck and a good eye, but seems to lack that keenness and dexterity which keeps a batsman in continual anxiety. A little more dash would make all the difference in the world—and why shouldn't it come? The Rector played several useful innings early in the season, and held at cover-point in his usual active and clever fashion. His bat played all too rarely, and distinguished himself by a magnificent hit very nearly into the Chalvey road, and also by being requested to go and change his trousers, as the Kilburn team objected to a bowler wearing rather garments of a dark material. Robdo does not make as many runs as he ought, and is one of the most useful bowlers we have on a wet wicket. Walter has come on in batting, and is a very plucky reserve wicket-keeper; Staines is both plucky and dashing in that capacity, and might well fill it more often; Guppy made a welcome re-appearance, but was unlucky to tear a muscle of his thigh in the match against Bucks Club and Ground—an accident which no doubt lost the game for Slough. A valuable new-comer was found in Dr. Wood, of Langley, who bowls very steadily, something in the style of F. B. Roberts, and who can bat very effectively also. By his wonderful bowling at Windsor against the Alexandra, getting 8 wickets for 30, W. Gooderson heads the list of bowlers, and if he would play more often the club would be the richer, for his power of turning the ball is only approached by Robdo and occasionally by Southall and

Dr. Meggs. W. Baker is a keen cricketer who will do a lot of good for the club as an all-round performer, but he needs steady practice. Major O'Dowda has occasionally turned out, and has rather been called on to bear the brunt of the bowling when his side was weak. He rarely had much luck. C. J. Dillon is capable of bowling remarkably well for a few overs, and will bowl better yet with more experience. He alone succeeded in really beating Hill during his splendid innings for the

bachelors, and it was a magnificent break-ball which just missed the balls. Martin had the cruellest luck as a bowler. On three separate occasions he was put on to get the wicket of men well set and scoring freely. On each occasion he defeated the batsman and caused him to put the ball comfortably into the hands of short slip, and on each occasion short slip dropped it! Two of the three batsmen went gaily on beyond the century, after the life received. Martin also has reason to be proud of his innings at Farnham Chase, when he assisted in equalling the opposing score amid great excitement, and carried his bat.

For the first time for many years the club has practically gone through the season without the services of Sidney Golding, their famous fast bowler. In the five years—to go no further back—from 1905, he took 239 wickets at an average cost of about 14 runs, the best year being the first of that series, when he was responsible for 77 wickets for 830 runs. His name is still one which strikes terror into the hearts of many of the old opponents, and it is to be hoped that his duties next year will not so seriously interfere with his cricket.

The thanks of the club are most heartily proffered to those gentlemen—the Rev. P. H. Eliot and Messrs. J. Harker and W. F. Lowndes—who brought teams in the cricket week and did so much to make that series of events successful.

It will therefore be seen that F. R. Whiteman wins the gold medal for batting, thanks to his two big innings of 87 (not out) against Farnham and 84 against Stoke Green. The highest score, however, was A. Johnson's 96 against the Gotha. It will be noticed that there is a big drop in the averages after the first four names. The gold medal for bowling has been secured by Dr. C. H. Wood, the Langley captain, but he has only just beaten J. Wright, with F. R. Whiteman a close third. In fact, the competition between these three has been such a near thing that Mr. H. V. Free, the League hon. sec., has been through the figures two or three times to ensure their accuracy. Only A. Brown (Eton Wick) has bowled more overs than Dr. Wood, but the last-named is the only one who can claim 50 wickets, and his success is thoroughly deserved and will be a very popular one.
