# SPORTING NOTES.

THURSDAY.

In the death of Dan Hayward at the age of 77 one of the few remaining links with the famous cricketers of the sixties is snapped. For several weeks Dan had been seriously ill, so seriously, indeed, that Tom Hayward had thought it wiser to remain at home than to play for Surrey. The Oval men have in the interval sadly missed their famous first-wicket man. Surrey without Tom Hayward has in-deed been making a poor show. I have heard some gossip to the effect that now his father be seen no more in first-class cricket. I hope, however, that such a report may be "slightly exaggerated," as Mark Twain wired to a newspaper which had announced his premature demise. has gone to join the great majority Tom will

paper which had announced his premature demise.

The passing of Dan Hayward has brought to my notice the fact that there is still alive and hearty in Cambridge a member of the famous Cambs. county team of the early 'sixties. Those were the days when Cambs. was a county to be reckoned with, and now that Dan has gone Mr. Fred Pryor, of Chesterton, is, I believe, the sole remaining member. It will sound strange to hear Cambs. spoken of as a county that put up a good game and sometimes fairly walloped such famous teams as Surrey, Yorkshire and Kent. Such, however, is the case. Owing to the kindness of Mr. Pryor, I have been permitted to make some extracts from a book of newspaper cuttings he has made relating to the cricket of those days. Then, it must be remembered, it was the fashion to play cricket in top hats, the pitch was only cut with a seythe, and the bowling was deadly stuff. One can imagine faintly what sort of game cricket was half a century ago. It weems, from what I can gather, to have been a sporting affair in the proper sense of the word. A batsman leaving the tent for the wicket, must, I fancy, often have felt inclined to bid farewell for ever to his comrades he was leaving behind. It was no light task in those days to face a fast bowler. The only wonder is that any of the famous crioketers ever lived long enough to become famous.

The following lament from Mr. Pryor's book, written about 1864, I believe, is delightful:—

The following lament from Mr. Pryor's book, written about 1864, I believe, is delightful:

"Formerly Cambridge possessed but one ground, and now the town can boast of six, namely, Parker's Piece, Fenner's, Trinity, St. John's. Jesus and Corpus; and runnour says that a field is about to be prepared for Clare College. Certainly cricket has undergone considerable transformation. View the game from the angle of tweaty years ago and plenty of onew features become apparent, those worthy of onumeration being the comparative elegance of weapons used, the great improvements of wickets, or rather, the ground between them; the unlimited licence given to bowlers anent style of delivery, and the remarkable modification of dress. Fourteen or fifteen seasons since a black or white 'chimney pot' was considered to be the proper' deportment' for a man's head; but were a player to appear nowadays in a hat similar to the one worn by that fine old bat, John Bouing, irreverent persons would soon make rude allusions to the 'bee-skip' and immediatedly denounce the article as 'long-gleeved.' Speaking of Cambridge celebrities, how prome are many to look about for faces conspicuous for their absence!

"In the matter of past players old greybeard is exceedingly garrulous and very conservative. One professes to miss the lithe and lissome limbs of Charley Pror as he bounded like a roe from cover-point or long-leg. Many equals has he had, but few superiors. Another looks in vain for the stately form of Frank Fenner, around whom a posse of college dons would always congregate to hear his manly and generous deductions. Where, too, is the happy face of the danper Mr. James Martin, ex-tobacconist, comedian, and reporter? Who that knew him can fail to picture his faultiessly fitting coat, illustrated with a geranium? Who can forget his scrupulously white inexpressibles, supplemented by boots of the blackest polish, as 'Jenmy' stood, havannah and pencil in hand, depicting a match in all integrity. Compare his, or Frank's, genial effusions with the dronsical rigmarole of some of your modern scribes, to say nothing of the wretched verbiage of your down-at-hele and dirty-shirted penny-aliner hailing from nowhere, and bound for the same place. Now and then the members of the 'fourth estate' grumble at the 'cold shoulder' they receive from high quarters, but what can the Press expect if it is represented by men of no social status whatever? And will our readers deny that many cricketers are newspaper made? Are not professionals feasted with flattery till they become billous with pride? and the runs of the field look as nothing to the rotches of the printing office, especially if they are brought out in strong relief."

What the gentleman who wrote the above slashing paragraph would say of some of our even more modern scribes of to-day, "of no social status whatever," is more than will bear thinking about. What a world it is to be sure! One can at any rate thank one's stars that to-day we are rid, in a very large degree, of such canting hypocrisy and snobbery. It seems almost incredible, however, that such views were perfectly common only fifty years ago. And the splendid thing is that the charming

gentleman—for he had the real genteel touch which made him write "inexpressibles" instead of "trousers"—really does regret the absence of the reporter "illustrated with a geranium." That paragraph takes one back to the sentiment and stupid respectability of the fifties more than anything I have come across for a very long time. One thing I should like to whisper in the ear of the ghost of the past: "Were you really so moral and chivalrous and genteel as you made yourselves out to be; and if you were, how on earth did you reconcile such perfect behaviour with your undeniable beastly black-guardism when in your cups?"

Wisden. To these must be added Dan Hayward, who died only on Monday last, for Dan
seems to have been a sound cricketer. He was,
of course, never so notable a figure in the
cricket world as his elder brother Tom, but
he figures in several of the matches recorded in
Mr. Pryor's book. In 1866, at Fenner's, Cambs.
fairly took the measure of the Surrey bowling,
for the scores were: Cambs, 325 (T. Hayward
112 and R. Carpenter 57), Surrey 252. Then,
again, in the same year, on Parker's Piece,
versus Yorkshire, Cambs. secored 144 and 125 to
Yorkshire's 114 and 182. For Cambs. T. Huyvard scored 39 and 10, F. Pryor 0 and 64, R.
Carpenter not out 44, and Dan Hayward I and
3. Twenty years earlier than this there is a
record of Cambridge (with Box and Hillier)
playing England on Parker's Piece. The rereport says of the English team: "Kent furnished her lions "Alfred the Great" (referring
to Mynn), the renowned Fuller Pilch, and the
incomparable Hillyer. Sussex sont forth her
nonparell Taylor: Box, the prince of wicketkeepers, and the hard-working, ever-tough yet
maileable Jemmy Dean." The result of the
famous match was that Cambs. won by one
wicket. T. Hayward scored not out 4, and was
bowled by Mynn for 17 in the second innings.
Pryor was b Mynn I and run out 5. Another
interesting match was Surrey v. Cambs. in
1862. Surrey scored 88 and 294, and Cambs.
reptiled with 309 and 14 for 4 wickets. For
Cambs. R. Carpenter played a fine innings of
80 at the "first knock," but only got 2 in the
second innings. T. Hayward, however, scored
35 and 25 not out.

It was a rare treat of a sporting finish. The Camden captain, it might be suggested, was guilty of an error of judgment, but on the other had he has the justification of having made a sporting declaration. This is cricket in the proper sense of the word. A draw when neither side can win outright is not cricket at all: it is a confession of your own dishelief in the abilities of your teams I congratulate the Camden captain most heartily on his action, for although he lost the match he did not adopt the milk-and-water attitude of preventing the other side from playing cricket. I hope we may have some more of this sort of thing; there is far too much playing for points and forgetting the game in our cricket to-day. After all, is it quite cricket to allow the opposing team time to get out but not time to knock off the runs? In my opinion its only tip-and-run, and pretty tame at that.
