**NOTTS. CRICKET.**

County Season Ends with a Good Victory.

**A PRAISEWORTHY RECORD.**

Important Steps to be Taken for Next Year.

Notts. did not "get off the mark" particularly well in the season which closed at Bristol on Saturday with a well-deserved victory over Gloucestershire, but they have as a rule played bright cricket, won a fair proportion of their matches, and have not been beaten at Trent Bridge.

The record for the season is one to give a fair amount of satisfaction as a record; but looking beyond the prospects are certainly not so good. Notts. cricket, indeed, appears to us to be approaching a crisis something like that which followed the decadence of Attewell, Flower, and Barnes as bowlers, and the disappearance from the team of Shacklock. There were some three or four seasons then at the end of the nineties, before Wass had developed, and John Gunn had "come on," that whilst the Notts. batting was as strong as that of any other county, we could not win matches on account of the weakness of the bowling. This year Janies Ireneonger has come wonderfully to the rescue, but he has been playing twelve seasons, and Wass longer. The latter, though he bowls slower than of yore, has had a very fine year; in fact, he has rarely done more valuable service, but a summer of fast wickets might find us in a very sad pickle. Riley is likely to prove a most serviceable man in the attack, but Clifton appears to be just short of the class Notts. must look for in their leading fast bowler. It is in the department of the attack that the strengthening will have to be done. The bat and wicket-keeping are perfectly safe for some time to come. Whysall is destined to take a leading position. That much may with safety be said. In the old days had young men shaped with the graceful style, variety, and confidence of Whysall, all cricketers would have been talking about him. He is the one young player of recent days who has really learned that back play is of as much importance as forward play. Could Allerton have learned this we should have had a great cricketer in the young son of Anak. As it is, Allerton will repeatedly make runs on a true hard wicket, but he will not succeed under other conditions.

Presumably the Notts. C.C. committee, now that they have decided to have no more to do with the Minor County Championship, will reduce the ground staff very considerably, but G. Lee is one that should be retained. He has ability as a batsman, and can be made a good one, whilst practice may possibly make him a useful slow bowler. But as a batsman and fielder he is a player to keep.

The fact that Notts. are to play Kent next season indicates that one of the other counties will be dropped, as there are sufficient matches on the list, and the watchword for next season will be economy. The dropping of the minor counties will mean a saving of two or three hundred pounds, and the reduction of the ground staff a further considerable economy. When one gives a little thought to the matter, the magnitude of the sum which during, say, the past seven or eight years the Notts. Club has spent on training up young players strikes one as very large indeed; and not everyone would argue that the money had brought its due return.
