PERCY REES CREATES A RECORD.

AN INNINGS OF 180 NOT OUT.

Cricket, since the advent of Holsinger and Simpson to the town, is looking up locally, and to warrant this statement it is but neces eary to refer to the unusually large crowd that witnessed the Llanelly v. Neath match at Stradey on Saturday, when the weather was bea tifully fine and the wicket in splendid condition. There were certain aspect of the game which deservedly appealed to the did condition. There were certain aspect of the game which deservedly appealed to the spectators, but unfortunately things did not pan out exactly as one would have wished. The game ended in a draw when a victory by exercising a little more care, might have been registered. The fielding on the part of the Llandly men was at times good, bad, and indifferent, and in a large measure this accounted for Llanelly's inability to emerge from the ordeal with flying colours. Moreover a win might easily have been secured by the homesters in another way. If all the Llanelly captain felt disposed he could have taken advantage of the absence of three of the visitors, including T. A. L. Whittington, who not only succeeded in piling up a score of 102 (not out), but was chiefly instrumental in playing the game to a draw. It will be recalled that when the teams met earlier in the season Llanelly inflicted a decisive defeat upon their opponents, and that on that occasion Holsinger captured eight wickets for 38 runs, five of which were taken in the same over. Neath, who brought down a new "pro." in the person of Whittle for the return match, succeeded in putting up a far more creditable fight.

The Lianelly innings was opened by Percy Rees and Ike Evans, who faced the bowling of Whittle and Taylor. For a little while both batsmen played cautiously when Whittle was doing the trundling, but Taylor was hit about unceremoniously, particularly by the Lianelly captain, who managed to get a number of boundaries early in the match. When 40 was reached, Ike Evans was well caught out by Taylor off Whittle. Wheldon was the new comer, and he vied with his captain in making things lively, but after contributing new comer, and he vised with his capitain in making things lively, but after contributing 25 he was caught and bowled by A. E. Freethy. Hugh Howell then appeared on the scene and runs were coming at a rattling pace, but Percy Rees gave a hot chance to a sub, when his score stood at 47, and after this played faultless cricket.

Hugh Howell having been disposed of, Cliff Bowen put in an appearance, and if the play was exhilarating before it made the spectators become quite exuberant at this stage. Boundaries seemed to be the order of the day, both batsmen hitting out in all directions with confidence. After a little while Percy Rees slackened his pace as his century was drawing near, and when his score stood at 97 there was a short suspense which caused a little auxiety to the spectators. The Llanelly captain, however, was only exercising a little more care, and when he eventually scored his century, a volley of applause broke out all round the field of play. There was no turning back after this on the part of Percy Rees, who was giving as excellent a display of cricket as one could wish to see. Boundary after boundary was put to his credit, and he carried his total to 180 (not out) before the innings was declared closed when Llanelly had scored 316 runs for 4 wickets. Prior to this, Cliff Bowen, who had scored 46 runs, which included no less than ten boundaries, was caught by Whittington off J. D. Davies, and his place had been filled by E. Gee.

Percy Rees, by hitting up a score of 180, has created a new batting record for the club, and it is worthy of note that he previously had the distinction of being the

record hotter. He topped his higgest total by three runs, and when he entered the pavilion after his magnificent pertormance he was accorded a most enthusiastic reception, in which the visitors heartily joined. In January, 1896, a feeling prevailed in local cricket circles that it would be well to form a Carmarthenshire Cricket League on similar lines to those formed by the local clubs in the Swansen and Cardiff districts. In order to give an impetus to the summer pastime the committee of the Lianelly Cricket Club took the matter in hand, and asked Mr. Wm. Griffiths, of Felinfoel, to convene a meeting of the various clubs in the district to consider once more the desirability of forming a League for the season.

It was eventually decided to again form a League, and the following clubs became affiliated:—Burry Port, Llangennech, Felinfoel, Llanelly 2nds, Pontyberem, and Kidwelly. Mr. Thomas Seymour, Pontyberem, was electurely Port proved to be the holders, Felinfoel Felinfoel, the hon secretary.

RULES OF THE CRICKET LEAGUE.

1. This combination of clubs shall be called The Carmarthenshire Cricket League, and shall consist of the following clubs.—Burry Port, Llungemech, Felinfoel, Llungemy 2nd XI., Pontyberem, and Kidwelly.

2. Each club shall pay an entrance fos of 5s., and an annual subscription of 5s. to be paid by April ist in each year; and in case this amount does not meet the expenses, the clubs shall contribute equally such a sum as

clubs shall contribute equally such a sum as may be required.

3. The League shall be governed by a general committee, consisting of the officers and two representatives from each club, five to form a quorum. From March to October inclusive, this committee shall meet at least monthly, viz., on the second Monday in each month, at 6 p.m., other meetings shall be called at the written request of three clubs, or at the discretion of the secretary. The annual meeting shall be held during the month of February, when a statement of accounts, dily audited, shall be presented, officers elected, and other such business transacted as may be deemed advisable.

4. The match committee shall consist of one member from each club, three to form a quorum.

a quorum.

5. The reference committee shall consist of one member from each club, three to form a quorum. This committee shall have full

a quorum. This committee shall have full power to decide any dispute.

6. The clubs engaged in the competitions must play two matches with each other during the season, and the clubs scoring the most points at the end of the season shall be considered the League champions for the year. In the event of two or more clubs at the head of the list scoring the same number of points, they must play off for first place. Umpires, ground, and time for same to be arranged by the match committee.

ground, and time for same to be arranged by the match committee.
7. The points to govern the competition shall count as follows:—Two points for a win and one for a drawn game.
8 All matches shall commence not later than 3.30 p.m., and any team not being on the field and ready to play by that time shall forfeit choice of innings. Play shall continue until four hours from the time the Umpire calls play. If the commencement of a match be unavoidably delayed, and no disadvantage accrue to either side by the delay, the match

committee shall have power to declare such

committee shall have power to declare such match valid.

9. All matches shall be played under the revised rules of the M.O.C.

10. The umpire shall decide as to the state of the ground, and if the weather makes it impossible to play or continue a match. In all cases, both clubs must be ready to play, unless, in consequence of bad weather, the clubs have mutually arranged to postpone the fixtures, in which case, should the visiting team have started for or renched the ground of play ,the match shall be played on their ground. In the event of any club failing to fulfil their engagement, the match shall be awarded to the club prepared to play.

11. The competing clubs shall appoint their own scorers and each club shall send the result of the match and names of the players and unpires to the League secretary by the following Wednesday morning—any club neglecting to do so shall be fixed one shilling.

12. The competing clubs shall send a list of not more than eight umpires to the League secretary for the approval of the match committee. No unpire whose name is not included in the list will be eligible to umpire in any League match.

13. By April 16th, every club shall send to the League secretary, for the approval of the match committee, a list of nuembers whom they may wish to play in League matches during the season. A player who has been a member of a club for one month can, after being registered by the match committee, play in League matches on the following Saturday. No member whose name has not been registered by the match committee will be eligible to play in League matches. No club shall play any but those who are bona fide playing members of that club, nor shall a player play for more than one club in the competition in the same season, unless by consent of the general committee and the clubs he has previously played for. Should any club play in the same season, unless by consent of the general committee and the clubs he has previously played for. Should any club play an ireligible player, the match shall be awarded to their opponents.

14. No professional shall be allowed to play in League matches.

14. No professional shall be allowed to play in League matches.

15. No regular player of the Llanelly 1st XI. residing in Llanelly shall be allowed to pay in League matches.

16. The reference committee shall have power to adjudicate any disputed matter in the competition, or in the affairs of the League, and their decision shall be final. Any club protesting against another club shall, within seven days of the alleged offence, lodge their protest, with a deposit of 2s. 6d. with the League secretary, who shall immediately forward a copy of the protest to the club protested against. Unless the deposit is made, the protest will not be entertained. The club failing to sustain their protest to forfeit their deposit to the funds of the League, and in all cases of appeal, representatives of the clubs concerned shall not be allowed to vote.

17. The general committee reserve to themselves the right to alter or add to these rules, seven days' notice to be given of ahy proposed alteration.

18. In the event of any club being disqualitied from taking past in the correction of the content of the company of th

posed alteration.

18. In the event of any club being disqualified from taking part in the competition, all matches such club has played, no matter what the result has been, shall be considered void, and all matches they are engaged in shall be considered void as League matches.

19. Should any registered player desire to be transferred to another club, he must state his reasons in writing to his club secretary, who will forward the same to the League secretary, and should the reasons be not considered valid by the match committee, the application will not be entertained.
