

Prospects of Local Cricket Clubs.

MORLEY C. B. AND A. CLUB.

The prospects of the Morley Club, which will open the season on the 23rd inst., are very encouraging. A new interest will be given to the matches, the club having joined the Heavy Woollen District Cricket League, in which they have fixtures with Batley, Dewsbury and Savile, Birstall, Spen Victoria, Chickenley, Cleckheaton, and Hopton Mills. All these matches will be decided by points—2 for a win and 1 for a draw—and will in all cases be governed by the Yorkshire Council Committee. Hopton Mills is the only club in the League with which Morley have not previously had fixtures, but they played so well last season and are of such standing as to fully justify their inclusion in the League. The fact that Mr. R. N. Wheadley, of Mirfield, the president of the League, has given a handsome silver cup for competition will impart additional interest to the matches, and it is to be hoped that a much greater amount of patronage on the part of the public will be forthcoming. In addition to the clubs mentioned, Morley's list includes engagements with Yeadon, Castleford, and Ossett, and a special fixture with Scarborough, at Scarborough, on August Bank Holiday Monday and at home on East Monday. With such an attractive programme the season should be a successful and enjoyable one.

Robert Peel, the ex-Yorkshire and International cricketer, has entered upon his duties as groundsmen and is sparing no efforts in preparing a good wicket. Peel will also play in the matches and should prove a decided acquisition to the team, which will again include Charles Pratt, slow, and J. H. Thorpe, fast bowlers, and most of last season's players. The First Eleven will be captained by S. B. Brook, whose vice will be David T. Marsden. The Second Eleven also have fixtures with those in the League, and with Castleford, Morley Parish Church, and Newmillerdam.

The bowling section of the club will have the advantage of increased facilities for indulging in the ancient game. The new bowling green has been completed and is being got into a playable condition by the groundsmen, Herbert Potter. The old green was never in a better condition than at the present, so that the bowlers may look forward to a good time.

CHURWELL.

Churwell commence operations to-morrow week, the 18th inst., with a practice match. The groundsmen, who have been very attentive to their duty, have got the turf in excellent condition. The club's headquarters are the Commercial Inn, of which Councillor W. S. J. Botheras is landlord and also a liberal supporter of the club. The ground is, as of old, just behind the Commercial. The club is in a good financial position, but this has not been brought about without much effort on the part of earnest and active members. A good spirit has for some time been manifest, and during the coming season it is hoped the club will meet with appreciable success. Practically the whole of last year's players are again available, and there will probably be one or two additions. Promising Second Eleveners will also doubtless be given a chance to develop. A good list of fixtures has been arranged, though one or two dates yet remain open. John Jagger has been appointed captain of the First XI, in place of Harry Armitage, who will act when occasion requires as vice-captain. Mr. Jagger is a sound, capable and reliable bat, and should make a good captain. Albert Shaw is captain of the Second XI, Wilfred Hemingway being vice-captain. Amongst the fixtures which have been arranged may be mentioned Gildersome, Haddingley, Farnley, Woodlesford and South Hilling. The club has a bye for the first round of the Heavy Woollen Cup Ties. In the second round they will meet West Ardsley or Low Moor, at Churwell.

GILDERSOME.

DEWSBURY AND SAVILE CRICKET CLUB.

The annual meeting of this club took place on Tuesday evening at the Dewsbury Parish Church Schools, Mr. S. Shaw presiding. In referring to the report and balance-sheet, the chairman said that notwithstanding bad weather, the receipts were better by £12 than in the previous year. They were fortunate in having the county champions at Savile Town in June, and they ought to see that this match should not be a failure for lack of accommodation. As to the membership of the club, it certainly ought to be doubled. Indeed, it was a disgrace that with such a population they should have fewer members than some towns which were only quarter the size of Dewsbury. He also referred to the invaluable service rendered to the club by Mr. Hy. Hill, who has been captain for many years, and who is retiring. The report and balance-sheet were adopted.

CRICKET.

PROSPECTS FOR THE COMING SEASON.

Once more—and, unfortunately, once less—we have got on the right side of the winter and the cricket season approaches. That is all right, so far. The question is whether we shall get on the right side of the summer. One wonders whether 1910 has seen the error of the ways of 1909, and has decided to be orthodox and to divide itself into the usual four seasons, of spring, summer, autumn and winter, instead of leaving out the most important of the lot in the mistaken notion that cricket was played to the best advantage in a swimming bath. True, 1910 has been very well behaved so far, as though in a hurry to make amends. Let us hope it—or he or she, whichever it should be—won't exhaust all its, his or her, zeal in a premature effort, because 1910 seems to have been by way of making the mistake of supposing the cricket season to be in March, which all experienced cricketers—at any rate those who have played ten or twenty years—know is not. The wonder is that 1909 did not nearly break the heart of all local cricket clubs, and drive them to golf, which appears to be the last resort of disgruntled and disheartened athletes. [The writer alone is answerable for his eccentric opinions.—Ed.] But no, the real cricketer is made of sterner stuff than that, and even the mud-larking of marrow-freezing 1909 does not deter him from facing another possible summer with the smile of hopeful anticipation.

OSSETT CLUBS.

THE OSSETT CLUB.

How is it with the Ossett Club, the organisation whose title of the Ossett Cricket and Athletic Club, covers several departments—cricket, bowls, tennis, general athletics (one day per annum)—and the greatest of these is cricket? Really there is little to report. They are very much as they were, thank you—progressing as well as may be expected under the circumstances, etc., etc., and all the rest of it. Considering the havoc which the weather wrought last year all's well with the club. Not quite as well, maybe, as it would have been if the summer had not got lost on the way, and if the first team had won the cup, and been on the top of the Yorkshire Council, and if the second eleven had been the winners of the Wakefield and District Cup, and the bowlers had won the trophy for which they had competed, and if a few more things of this sort had happened. But, though none of them happened, the club is still there, it still has a big fat membership, and if the funds trouble the treasurer more by their absence than by their abundance, sewing teas, and whist drives, and concerts and bazaars, are fast putting that right; and if it did not win the cup and council competition in 1909, it has not yet lost them in 1910. Which is a tremendous consolation. The possibilities of the future are great—unlimited. Ossett have been very near winning the cup on more than one occasion. It is said—but is untrue—that once they had a brass band in waiting, to escort them home victoriously. Dame Rumour had been busy on that occasion, and she is a born liar. They have also been well in the running in the Yorkshire Council; in fact since they joined that organisation no club has had a more consistent record. What they may do in 1910, how near they may come to grasping the local "tin pot" of cricket; what position towards the top, or at the top, of the Yorkshire Council they may occupy—well, to tell the truth—that being our usual custom—we have given over guessing about cricket.

There is exceedingly little change to record, either in the constitution of the eleven or the arrangement of the fixtures. With two exceptions, the club will rely upon the same players. G. Pollitt has retired from the team, and strangely enough his place will be filled by another ex-Chickenleyite, Percy Megson. The exchange is not expected to have any weakening effect. Megson is an improved, and no doubt an improving batsman, and moreover he is smart in the field, which, all other things being equal, is a distinct gain. The other change is the loss of H. Giggall. Not that he is deserting his old club in favour of another—he would be one of the last to do that—but for business reasons he is about to remove himself bodily out of Yorkshire, and his services will no longer be available. Here's a chance for one of the younger players in the club to develop his latent batting ability, so that Giggall's absence may not be felt. This exhausts the list of changes, so far as they are at present known or anticipated, though something has been said of the possibility of

another batsman, who has played with a club a few miles away, deciding to help Ossett. This, however, is too vague to reckon upon. The attack will be the same triumvirate.—(They ought to bowl well after that, anyhow).—Radley, the evergreen, Peppall, who last year headed the averages, and Denton, the imperturbable. Another good medium-paced bowler would be useful. As to the fixtures, Hull and Skipton have been dropped and Hopton Mills and Cleckheaton included, this having been done to avoid long and expensive railway journeys. Though not taking part in the new league, in the formation of which Louis Hall has been busy, Ossett play practically all the clubs which have joined. It is a matter for consideration whether it is now worth while to stand aloof. There may have been good reasons for discouraging the formation of the new competition, but now that it has been formed the position is different.

JUNIOR CLUBS.

Junior clubs in Ossett are thick on the ground, and one has only to glance at a list of local clubs to see what a hold cricket has upon the youth of the town and district. They often play under adverse circumstances—on wickets that are not and cannot be prepared with quite the same care that is given to a county ground, and the funds do not run to a new bat every match—but their enthusiasm and keenness are unmistakable, leading them often to play in wetness, either overhead or underfoot, or both, which would dishearten clubs which aspire to a higher status. We hear that the latest of the clubs to be formed by the Ossett Tradesmen and Co-operative employees are by no means certain to make a re-appearance this spring, strangely enough, not because there is a lack of players, but because of a difficulty in obtaining members who are prepared to undertake the business management of the clubs!

OLD ROUNDWOOD COLLIERIES C.C.

Old Roundwood Collieries, once one of the most formidable junior clubs in the district, fall to pieces last year, but now seems to have taken a new lease of life, which it enters upon with renewed vigour. An effort is being made to re-build the team in some, at least, of its former strength. Three new players have been secured; Harry Spencer, an old Hopton Mills cricketer; J. Wilby, formerly of the Silverwood (Rotherham) eleven, and J. Smith, of Hanging Heston. Spencer played with the club in three matches last year. Once upon a time the team were strong competitors, and occasionally the winners of the Wakefield and District Cup. This season they have not entered any competition, but have arranged a fairly good fixture list of friendlies, what are described as "road-side teams" having been omitted. The second eleven, however, has entered the Ossett Junior medal competition. Financially, the club has no difficulties, and it is to be hoped that interest in the game will be sustained among its members, so that some of the incidents which marred last year's record—the failure of the team to turn up, for instance—may not recur.

OSSETT CENTRAL BAPTISTS C.C.

The Ossett Central Baptists face another season with every prospect of continued success. All the old players, who did well last season, have decided to stick to the old firm, and, in addition, there is some new blood. The main feature of the season's programme will be the junior medal competition in August. In the first round they have a bye, but in the next they meet with Old Roundwood 2nd. The captain of the team is Mr. W. Wimpenny, and the secretary is Mr. W. A. Butterfield.

SOUTH OSSETT CHURCH INST. C.C.

Happy are the prospects of the South Ossett Church Institute team. They have nothing to complain about in regard to finances, equipment and strength, and are prepared to put up a good fight with all comers. A fresh experiment is being tried this year. Instead of entering the local competition (junior medal), they have gone further afield and entered the Denby Grange and District League, in connection with which is a league for second eleven. One of the changes which will come about as the result of this is that the club will face fresh teams, included amongst which are Netherton, Midgley, Grange Moor, Flockley, Denby Grange Colliery and Messrs. Chas. Roberts and Co. In addition to this league they have also joined the Dewsbury and District Shield competition, and are drawn to Dewsbury, Enzezer, at Dewsbury, in the first round. Mr. T. Amittas will lead the eleven, and the vice-captain will be Mr. Spurr; whilst the second eleven is to be captained by Mr. A. M. Hemingway, with Mr. Ward as vice. The season opens on April 17th, when the second eleven meets the Green Congregationalists on the Sowood-lane ground. The first team does not commence until the following week, when a visit is anticipated to Mirfield Parish Church.

SOUTH OSSETT P.M. C.C.

The ardour of the South Ossett Primitive Methodists remains unabated. They are forming a couple of teams, and have secured a few new players, and the hopes are that at the

close of the season they will not have made a bad show either in the ordinary matches or in the Horbury and district cup competition, which they have joined. Mr. W. Wood is to be captain, and Mr. C. Summerscales vice-captain.

GREEN CONGREGATIONAL C.C.

Another club which is equally as strong as last year is the Green Congregational. They have an excellent membership, and plenty of would-be players. They have not yet quite arranged their fixtures, having still a few open dates. They are in the Horbury and district cup, which is the only competition for which they have entered. All last year's players are available, and it is confidently expected that they will more than hold their own. Mr. W. Lister heads the first team, with Mr. E. L. Gledhill as his vice, and Mr. L. Waite is captain of the second, with Mr. J. F. Metcalfe as vice. April 23rd is fixed for the club's debut, the first team having an engagement with Flusdyke Bethel, at Flusdyke, and the second team with South Ossett Church Institute, on the latter's ground.

CHICKENLEY WESLEYANS C.C.

The members of the Chickenley Wesleyans Club have not lost all the increased interest and satisfaction which their triumphs of last season gave them, and are anticipating a repetition of that success. The club is in the happy position of being able to recommence with a stock of new tack, which the state of the finances has enabled them to purchase. The team, like the one last year, will be strong all round, but particularly in the batting department. They fully intend to put up another good fight for the Ossett medals, and are going in strongly for the Dewsbury and district shield. In the Ossett competition they meet the South Ossett Baptists on August 6th, and in the shield competition Bradley and Colne, at Bradley, on July 16th. Altogether their prospects are rosy and their enthusiasm unbounded.

OSSETT TEMPERANCE C.C.

Ossett Temperance are running two teams. Last year they were not very successful in their efforts, but better luck is anticipated for the coming season, because interest has broken out afresh and more supporters are becoming members. They have got a new secretary in Mr. Tom Heighway, and the captains of the teams are Mr. W. Hutchinson (first team) and Mr. J. H. Ward (second team). The senior has entered for the junior medal competition and, besides the matches they hope to play under its auspices, have a good list of friendly engagements. They have still the old playing field in Runtlings, which is in good condition, and they do not lack funds. With a little of the favour of Dame Fortune and their existing enthusiasm they hope to make a better job of the season than they did last year.

HORBURY CLUBS.

County Cricketer's Wedding.

The wedding of the Rev. Frank Hay Gillingham, the well-known member of the Essex County cricket team and curate of St. James the Less, Bethnal Green, and Miss Mary Ryder Matthews, daughter of the Rev. E. W. Matthews (secretary of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society), and Mrs. Matthews, of Cawley Road, Victoria Park, was celebrated on Saturday at St. James the Less Church. The ceremony was performed by the vicar, the Rev. E. W. Matthews Ditchfield. The service was fully choral, and amongst those present was Lord Strathcona.

A reception was held after the wedding ceremony in the settlement buildings adjoining the church, and subsequently the happy couple left to spend the honeymoon at Sheringham, Norfolk. There was a guard of honour of the End South Wales Borderers, of which the bridegroom had been chaplain at Tidworth, Salisbury Plains.

Death of Mordecai Sherwin.

The death occurred yesterday at his residence in Nottingham of Mordecai Sherwin, the famous Nottingham wicketkeeper. Born on February 26, 1851, at Kingsberley, Nottingham, Sherwin first assisted Nettie in 1876, but for some years afterwards Fred Wild was the recognised wicketkeeper for that county, and it was not until the summer of 1880 that he really succeeded Wild. From that time forward to 1903 he was a regular member of the Nettie eleven. During that time he strapped 182 batsmen and caught 218; a record approached by no other wicketkeeper in this country. At no time, however, had he any superior being very much on his feet and making of some extraordinary catches. Sherwin was overshadowed at first by Richard Pinn, and later on by McCullough, but his late capture of Frank Gargrave, the first English against Australia in this country, has removed the distinction once at least. In 1895, he formed one of the team which Steve Smith, newspaper, took to Australia in the autumn of 1895, one of the strongest combinations that ever left the country. He was frequently chosen with the Players against the Gentlemen. He was a man of great bulk and of a cheery disposition. For some months he had been in failing health.

NOTTS. COUNTY CRICKETERS AT CLIFTON LANE.

INTERESTING CRICKET.

H. SYDDALL DISTINGUISHES HIMSELF.

Fortunately for the success of the annual fixture between Mr. Turner's Notts Eleven and sixteen of Rotherham, the weather on Saturday was delightfully fine, and there was a good attendance on the Clifton Lane ground, where some interesting cricket was witnessed. Mr. Turner (the Notts secretary) again brought a capital team, the principal members of the Notts County eleven being included. The rain which had fallen during the week had somewhat impaired the wicket, and the batsmen were always struggling for their runs, the bowlers receiving material resistance from the wicket.

As usual Rotherham were the first to occupy the wickets, but they did not make a particularly auspicious start, Mahon being dismissed before a run had been scored. Wickets continued to fall at regular intervals, only P. E. Cooper showing any aptitude to cope with the bowling of Riley and Iremonger. Cooper gave a first-class display, batting with rare confidence. Once he hit a ball from Riley dead out of the ground for six—a splendid stroke. He was eventually bowled for a grand innings of 31. H. Empson and W. Mickelthwait both played good cricket, but later the wickets fell fast, the last seven, in fact, going down for nine runs. Iremonger took six wickets for 37 runs, and Riley nine for 47.

The visitors opened their innings with G. Gunn and James, and the score was taken to 37 when a very smart piece of fielding by Cooper resulted in Gunn being easily run out. Thereafter Syddall was always difficult to play, and he had to be treated with the greatest respect. On a wicket that suited him he made the ball "do" all kinds of funny things, and after he had got Widdowson leg before he clean bowled James. Altonson got his legs in front of a straight one the first ball he received, Syddall thus taking two wickets with successive deliveries. J. Gunn came out with good intentions, but he didn't reign long, being bowled by a ball that went round his body and took his leg ball, which caused that batsman to humorously observe as he looked at his disarranged clothes: "I reckon I'm out." A. O. Jones had a great reception on going to the wickets, but he was not at home with Syddall, and before he had scored he offered a simple catch to Hancock at mid-off, the batsman to the surprise of everybody, who had to wait for the ball, allowing it to drop through his hands. However, when he had made eight, the Notts captain attempted to hit the capital ball from Syddall and was clean bowled. Notts had lost seven wickets for 74, and the match assumed quite an interesting appearance. Indeed the possibility of a Rotherham victory would have become a probability had Mahon taken an easy chance—also of Syddall—from Paton. An eighth wicket fell at 86, but Paton remained to pass the Rotherham total, the score being taken to 119 for nine when Notts put Rotherham in again. Syddall had bowled splendidly throughout, better even than his excellent figures make out. He had a couple of catches dropped, yet he sent down 16 overs for seven wickets at a cost of 57 runs. Green took one wicket for 11 runs, H. Parkin none for nine, and J. Hancock none for 12 runs. Scores—

Notts County Cricketers at Clifton Lane.

Mr. Turner (the estimable secretary of the Notts County Cricket Club) has again favoured the local cricket loving public with a visit of the more famous of Nottinghamshire's cricket representatives, and the match at Clifton Lane on Saturday proved as interesting as any of the series. Since these annual visits began Mr. Turner has brought to Rotherham some of the most stimulating "stars" of the cricket firmament, and casting one's mind back one can recall many well-known and distinguished figures. Some of them have now retired from the game, such for instance as William Attwell, the great William Gunn, Mr. Dixon, and the late Arthur Shrewsbury, but they are not forgotten by Rotherham cricketers. On Saturday Mr. Turner again brought a particularly strong and attractive side, which only goes to show how anxious he is to please his Rotherham friends. The match has, in fact, as well as its serious side, and several of the Notts players made so much of the fact that they look upon their visit to Rotherham as one of their most enjoyable holidays of the year. In fact, it was in order to visit Rotherham that Mr. A. O. Jones declined the invitation to play in the representative match between the Gentlemen and Players last week-end.

The Game in Brief.

As the result of the match was of little or no consequence to either side, the spectators' desire was to see some good and interesting cricket, and this they witnessed, though there was nothing in the way of sensational or even big scoring. On a wicket that rendered material assistance to the bowlers, the batsmen had to struggle hard for their runs. When, however, the local sixteen were all out for less than a hundred runs, it was generally thought that the visitors would pass the total for the loss of but one or two wickets. The estimate proved entirely wrong. Following a promising opening and the dismissal of G. Gunn as the result of a very smart piece of fielding, the Notts batsmen were constantly in difficulties with the bowling of Syddall, and when seven wickets were down for 74 the game had a touch of real excitement given to it. Harabonts Paton was badly let off by that usually safe selder, C. Mahon, and this mistake, possibly, prevented Rotherham from finishing in front. As it was, Notts passed the Rotherham total with a couple of wickets in hand. Rotherham were sent in again, when Mickelthwait and Mahon batted with confidence and ability, but this part of the game was not what could be called serious, though the Notts bowlers no doubt put in all they knew in their endeavour to demonstrate their superiority over the local batsmen.

The Batting of Rotherham.

There is not a great deal to be said in favour of the Rotherham batting in their first innings. P. E. Cooper's display stood out by itself in point of merit, and also for the number of runs scored, and beyond W. Mickelthwait and H. Empson none of the others did anything of note, the feebleness offered by several of them suggesting that they had hung up their hearts with their coats in the dressing room. However, they were asked a big question to oppose such excellent bowling as that which was supplied by Riley and Iremonger, and under conditions which materially assisted the attack. As was subsequently shown by the comparative failure of the Notts batsmen, run-getting on Saturday was not easy.

The Bowling of Syddall.

Quite the most pleasing feature of the game from a Rotherham point of view was the bowling of H. Syddall, who had the honour of clean bowling the most reputed of the Notts batsmen and finishing up with the really fine analysis of seven wickets for 59 runs. This is the best performance ever accomplished by any Rotherham bowler against the Notts team. During his long career Syddall has never bowled better than he did a week ago. He maintained a splendid length throughout, and the state of the wicket enabled him to get just that "bit of stuff" on the ball which proved fatal to the majority of the batsmen. He got the wickets of A. O. Jones and J. Gunn with magnificent deliveries, and he non-plussed and beat others in a way which showed how difficult he was to play. He bowled even better than his figures represent, for he had a couple of easy catches dropped. The very best of fielders made mistakes at times, and it would be unfair and unkind to chastise either of the two Rotherham players who dropped what seemed a simple catch in this game. Such mistakes are always regrettable, but they form part of the glorious uncertainty of cricket.

Fred Turner Wins Another Match for Swinton.
 One of the most useful players taking part in Mexbro' and District League cricket at the present time is F. Turner, of Swinton. He may now be approaching the veteran stage, but he can still stake wickets and score runs, as he shows almost every week. He turned his attention to run-getting in the match against Wombwell Main on Saturday, and his not-out innings of 63—only another Swinton batsman reached double figures—was the chief feature of the game. Moreover, it helped Swinton to gain a comparatively easy victory, although one can't overlook the splendid bowling of Tom Simister, whose destructiveness was shown by his seven wickets for 11 runs.

Mexbro' Easily Overcome.
 There were several batting collapses in the Mexbro' and District League a week ago. Playing against Hickleton Main, Mexbro' got a sorry figure, and, like Rotherham, they were disposed of for less than 60 runs. A total of 37 represented Mexbro's combined efforts. Beckett captured six wickets for 16 runs. As Hickleton put up a score of 127, their success was decisive. With vent to Monk Bretton, where they brought off an easy victory, passing the Monk Bretton total of 79 for the loss of only two wickets.

Rotherham Turn the Tables on Denaby.
 Everybody who follows cricket in the district is just now talking of the victory which Rotherham gained over Denaby on Thursday in the Mexbro' and District League. It is the cricket sensation of the week. As recently as Saturday Denaby did simply as they liked with the team that represented the Town Club, but on Thursday Rotherham put a somewhat stronger side in the field, although it could not by any means be described as the Yorkshire Council eleven. However, the team proved itself good enough to win by 88 runs. Rotherham totalling 119 and Denaby being got out for 31. Walter Parkin and H. Empson both batted well for Rotherham, the bowling honours being shared by T. Aislewood, H. Parkin, and S. Gummer. This was Denaby's first defeat, and the surprising thing about it is that it should have been brought about by the despised Rotherham team, but the Clifton Lancers are an uncertain side, and may one day lose to the weakest club in the Mexbro' and District League and the next day beat the strongest of them.

A Collapse at Aldwarke.

CRICKET NOTES.

County Cricketer's Wedding.

The wedding of the Rev. Frank Hay Gillingham, the well-known member of the Essex County cricket team and curate of St. James the Less, Bethnal Green, and Miss Mary Ryder Matthews, daughter of the Rev. E. W. Matthews (secretary of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society), and Mrs. Matthews, of Cavley Road, Victoria Park, was celebrated on Saturday at St. James the Less Church. The ceremony was performed by the vicar, the Rev. J. E. Wats, Ditchfield. The service was fully choral, and amongst those present was Lord Strathcona.

A reception was held after the wedding ceremony in the settlement buildings adjoining the church, and subsequently the happy couple left to spend the honeymoon at Sheringham, Norfolk.

There was a guard of honour of the End South Wales Borderers, of which the bridegroom had been chaplain at Tidworth, Salisbury Plains.

Death of Mordecai Sherwin.

The death occurred yesterday at his residence in Nottingham of Mordecai Sherwin, the famous Nottingham wicket-keeper. Born on February 26, 1851, at Kingsberley, Notts, Sherwin first assisted Notts in 1876, but for some years afterwards Fred Wild was the recognised wicket-keeper for that county, and it was not until the summer of 1880 that he really succeeded Wild. From that time forward to 1883 he was a regular member of the Notts eleven. During that time he strumped 182 batsmen and caught 218, a record approached by no other wicket-keeper in this country. At his best, he had few superior being very quick on his feet and striking off some extraordinary catches. Sherwin afterwards shadowed as first-class in Kent, Glam., and later on at Malvern he had the honour of being selected to play for England against Australia in this country, but he removed the distinction once at Lord's in 1885. He formed one of the team which Steve Sneyd subsequently took to Australia in the autumn of 1885, one of the strongest compositions that ever left the country. It was frequently chosen with the Players against the Gentlemen. He was a man of great bulk and of a cheery disposition. For some months he had been in failing health.

NOTTS. COUNTY CRICKETERS AT CLIFTON LANE.

INTERESTING CRICKET.

H. SYDDALL DISTINGUISHES HIMSELF.

Fortunately for the success of the annual fixture between Mr. Turner's Notts Eleven and sixteen of Rotherham, the weather on Saturday was delightfully fine, and there was a good attendance on the Clifton Lane ground, where some interesting cricket was witnessed. Mr. Turner (the Notts secretary) again brought a capital team, the principal members of the Notts County eleven being included. The rain which had fallen during the week had somewhat impaired the wicket, and the batsmen were always struggling for their runs, the bowlers receiving material resistance from the wicket.

As usual Rotherham were the first to occupy the wickets, but they did not make a particularly auspicious start, Mahon being dismissed before a run had been scored. Wickets continued to fall at regular intervals, only P. E. Cooper showing any aptitude to cope with the bowling of Riley and Iremonger. Cooper gave a first-class display, batting with rare confidence. Once he hit a ball from Riley dead out of the ground for six—a splendid stroke. He was eventually bowled for a grand innings of 31. H. Empson and W. Mickelthwait both played good cricket, but later the wickets fell fast, the last seven, in fact, going down for nine runs. Iremonger took six wickets for 37 runs, and Riley nine for 47.

The visitors opened their innings with G. Gunn and James, and the score was taken to 37 when a very smart piece of fielding by Cooper resulted in Gunn being easily run out. Thereafter Syddall was always difficult to play, and he had to be treated with the greatest respect. On a wicket that suited him he made the ball "do" all kinds of funny things, and after he had got Widdowson leg before he clean bowled James. Altonson got his legs in front of a straight one the first ball he received, Syddall thus taking two wickets with successive deliveries. J. Gunn came out with good intentions, but he didn't reign long, being bowled by a ball that went round his body and took his leg ball, which caused that batsman to humorously observe as he looked at his disarranged clothes: "I reckon I'm out." A. O. Jones had a great reception on going to the wickets, but he was not at home with Syddall, and before he had scored he offered a simple catch to Hancock at mid-off, the batsman to the surprise of everybody, who had to wait for the ball, allowing it to drop through his hands. However, when he had made eight, the Notts captain attempted to hit the capital ball from Syddall and was clean bowled. Notts had lost seven wickets for 74, and the match assumed quite an interesting appearance. Indeed the possibility of a Rotherham victory would have become a probability had Mahon taken an easy chance—also of Syddall—from Paton. An eighth wicket fell at 86, but Paton remained to pass the Rotherham total, the score being taken to 119 for nine when Notts put Rotherham in again. Syddall had bowled splendidly throughout, better even than his excellent figures make out. He had a couple of catches dropped, yet he sent down 16 overs for seven wickets at a cost of 57 runs. Notts County Cricketers at Clifton Lane.

Mr. Turner (the estimable secretary of the Notts County Cricket Club) has again favoured the local cricket loving public with a visit of the more famous of Nottinghamshire's cricket representatives, and the match at Clifton Lane on Saturday proved as interesting as any of the series. Since these annual visits began Mr. Turner has brought to Rotherham some of the most distinguished "stars" of the cricket firmament, and casting one's mind back one can recall many well-known and distinguished names. Some of them have now retired from the game, such for instance as William Attwell, the great William Gunn, Mr. Dixon, and the late Arthur Shrewsbury, but they are not forgotten by Rotherham cricketers. On Saturday Mr. Turner again brought a particularly strong and attractive side, which only goes to show how anxious he is to please his Rotherham friends. The match has, in fact, as well as its serious side, and several of the Notts players made no secret of the fact that they look upon their visit to Rotherham as one of their most enjoyable holidays of the year. In fact, it was in order to visit Rotherham that Mr. A. O. Jones declined the invitation to play in the representative match between the Gentlemen and Players last week-end.

The Game in Brief.

As the result of the match was of little or no consequence to either side, the spectators' desire was to see some good and interesting cricket, and this they witnessed, though there was nothing in the way of sensational or even big scoring. On a wicket that rendered material assistance to the bowlers, the batsmen had to struggle hard for their runs. When, however, the local sixteen were all out for less than a hundred runs, it was generally thought that the visitors would pass the total for the loss of but one or two wickets. The estimate proved entirely wrong. Following a promising opening and the dismissal of G. Gunn as the result of a very smart piece of fielding, the Notts batsmen were constantly in difficulties with the bowling of Syddall, and when seven wickets were down for 74 the game had a touch of real excitement given to it. Harabonts Paton was badly let off by that usually safe selder, C. Mahon, and this mistake, possibly, prevented Rotherham from finishing in front. As it was, Notts passed the Rotherham total with a couple of wickets in hand. Rotherham were sent in again, when Mickelthwait and Mahon batted with confidence and ability, but this part of the game was not what could be called serious, though the Notts bowlers no doubt put in all they knew in their endeavour to demonstrate their superiority over the local batsmen.

The Batting of Rotherham.

There is not a great deal to be said in favour of the Rotherham batting in their first innings. P. E. Cooper's display stood out by itself in point of merit, and also for the number of runs scored, and beyond W. Mickelthwait and H. Empson none of the others did anything of note, the feebleness offered by several of them suggesting that they had hung up their hearts with their coats in the dressing room. However, they were asked a big question to oppose such excellent bowling as that which was supplied by Riley and Iremonger, and under conditions which materially assisted the attack. As was subsequently shown by the comparative failure of the Notts batsmen, run-getting on Saturday was not easy.

The Bowling of Syddall.

Quite the most pleasing feature of the game from a Rotherham point of view was the bowling of H. Syddall, who had the honour of clean bowling the most reputed of the Notts batsmen and finishing up with the really fine analysis of seven wickets for 59 runs. This is the best performance ever accomplished by any Rotherham bowler against the Notts team. During his long career Syddall has never bowled better than he did a week ago. He maintained a splendid length throughout, and the state of the wicket enabled him to get just that "bit of stuff" on the ball which proved fatal to the majority of the batsmen. He got the wickets of A. O. Jones and J. Gunn with magnificent deliveries, and he non-plussed and beat others in a way which showed how difficult he was to play. He bowled even better than his figures represent, for he had a couple of easy catches dropped. The very best of fielders made mistakes at times, and it would be unfair and unkind to chastise either of the two Rotherham players who dropped what seemed a simple catch in this game. Such mistakes are always regrettable, but they form part of the glorious uncertainty of cricket.

GENTLEMEN OF IRELAND v. GENTLEMEN OF SCOTLAND.

A MODERATE DAY'S PLAY.

Two fairly representative teams of the amateur talent of Ireland and Scotland began a three days match in the College Park, Dublin, yesterday, the game being witnessed by his Excellency the Lord-Lieutenant, the general attendance being poor.

Following a wet night, the day was very fine but history, while the pitch was slow, but not giving much assistance to the bowlers.

Going in first, the Irishmen were dismissed in two hours for 142. The batsmen did not accomplish anything of note, although several got into double figures, the highest score being L. A. Meldon's 26. This comparative collapse was mainly owing to the bowling of the Cambridge googly man, Mr. Bruce Lockhart, who claimed five wickets for 31 runs.

Poorly as Ireland had done, Scotland fared even worse, two hours and a half seeing the side disposed of for 107. Mr. Kelly, in the first over of the innings, got two wickets for two runs, and half the side were disposed of for 47, but subsequently an improvement took place with Messrs. THE CRICKETING SMELTS.

Three Brothers who can Bat and Bowl.

During the cricket season just ended the performances of the three brothers Smelt in two of the local leagues attracted considerable attention. They shone chiefly as bowlers, and put up many splendid achievements, but as batsmen also they displayed prowess above the ordinary. They all had double-figure batting averages, and those who are acquainted with local cricket know that that is a record far from easy to attain.

Two of the brothers, Leonard and Harry, have figured with Steel, Peach, and Toser, who have made such a spirited bid for the championship of the Rotherham and Sheffield League, only to be beaten on the post.

Leonard has actually taken 72 wickets, which is a very clever performance, taking into account the fact that the match list comprised only eighteen games, in two of which not a ball was sent down, owing to bad weather. Those wickets cost an average of only 1.2, and with the bat he averaged 12.

Harry, who is younger and shows very bright promise in both departments of the game, captured exactly 66 wickets, at a cost of 4.13 runs each, and in batting he had an average of 11.87.

The record of Alfred Smelt, with Royal George, in the Rotherham Licensed Victuallers' League, is even more wonderful, so far as the figures are concerned, though it must be remembered that the class of cricket is not so good.

He passed the hundred in wickets taken, the exact number being 105. These entailed an expenditure of but 25 runs, or 2.15 runs per wicket. He also made many good scores, his batting average being 17.

It would be difficult to find three members of one family so distinguished themselves in one of our national pastimes.

YORKSHIRE CRICKETER SIGNS ON IN BIRMINGHAM.

NO ROOM IN THE COUNTY ELEVEN.

The announcement is made that W. H. Wilkinson, the Yorkshire left-handed batsman, has signed on as professional for next season with Mitchell and Butler's, a Birmingham league club.

Wilkinson, who is 29 years of age, was regarded two or three years ago as a young batsman with a big future, and the probable successor in the Yorkshire team to Washington. After scoring over 1,000 runs in 1908, he lost his form completely in 1909, when, however, he has very had luck in the way of injuries. In the past season he was not given a chance in the earlier matches, and when he did come into the team it was evident, although he made one or two good scores, that his exclusion had affected his play.

Thus is added one more departure to the long list of good cricketers who, unable to find regular places in the Yorkshire First Eleven, have migrated elsewhere. Ringrose, a fast bowler who promised well a few years ago, is in Scotland, whither Broadbent—who created a record by taking 100 wickets in second eleven matches for Yorkshire in the season just ended—is about to return. Another former Yorkshire fast bowler, Deyes, has become qualified for Staffordshire; and Grimshaw has this season been running up big scores in Birmingham league cricket. Harrison, the left-arm bowler, has gone to the Lancashire league, so that Yorkshire's reserve strength must be considered to have been considerably depleted of late.

CRICKET.

NOTES.

It was a weak team which Batley brought to Ossett on Saturday, and the cricket was not of high quality. They were short-handed—only nine men—and it was all over by half-past four. Thus the season closed very lamely, though with a win to improve Ossett's record. Batley batting first made a weak display, being all out—that is, eight wickets down, for 89. H. Preston scored freely, making was the best contribution in his total of 20, and that was the "Mr." Extras—whose proper name was P. Megson, equalled it. Megson does not make an ideal stumper, but it is not every batsman who is willing to take his stand behind the wickets in the absence of the player who regularly takes that hazardous position. Denton was again the most successful bowler, although Astin, who closed the innings abruptly, took a couple of wickets at a much cheaper rate.

Ossett knocked the runs off at a very fast rate, owing to a vigorous innings by F. Craven, who, by continuing the play a little longer than was necessary to decide the issue, was enabled to reach the half century. His innings, being not out, materially improves his average. On the other hand, A. F. Glover, being bowled for six, loses his place at the head of the averages, especially as Radley played a not out innings for a dozen. Only two wickets were down when the winning hit was made. Cawthorne had batted very steadily for 14.

So ended the cricket season 1910, a season which, though fairly successful so far as the Ossett club is concerned, has not quite realised all that was hoped of it at the commencement. Ossett have neither the championship of the Yorkshire Council nor the Heavy Woollen Cup. Until they secure either the one or the other, or both, they will fall short of giving entire satisfaction, for their supporters are not content with an ordinary share of success. The top is the place they aim at, and when Ossett are not there they are doing badly. For the realisation of their ambition they must, at any rate, wait another season, and in the meantime be content with the moderate performances of the eleven in 1910. During the season Ossett have played 28 matches in all, have won 13, lost 6, drawn 6 and tied one. On the face of it that is not a bad record. They have considerably more than held their own. But in the light of what was hoped of them, and the substantial sum which is swallowed up by engaged players, it is not too good.

Altogether they have scored 3,258 runs at a cost of 187 wickets, an average of about 16½ per wicket, against 3,021 scored by their opponents for 221 wickets, an average of slightly over 13½. These figures indicate a general superiority over their opponents, yet the cricket has not been quite of the high-class standard that was reached two or three seasons ago. They have beaten Batley and Birstall three times each, and Spen twice, but their record against such clubs as Wakefield, Dewsbury and Savile, Sheffield, etc., does not compare favourably with recent seasons; in fact Dewsbury and Savile have beaten them three times this year. The team has lacked that ability to play an uphill game that it once possessed and that produced such exhilarating cricket. For the purpose of comparison we give the total runs, etc., scored in each year since the Yorkshire Council was joined.

As to the players individually, the averages, which are given below, speak for themselves. Radley heads the batting with 24.15, and despite his run of non-success in recent matches has done better with the ball than in 1909, when he took 59 wickets for 15.44 a-piece. This year he has taken 66 wickets for 12.87 each. Radley, of course, bowls short, and pitches too many balls on the leg side, and his bowling is so plain that all you have to do is to play forward and you can play him a week; and he has been playing so long and cannot be expected to last for ever, and so on and so on, ad infinitum. The answer to all that is the fact that he keeps getting wickets as cheaply as most professional cricketers, and cheaper than many, and that he can still knock enough runs with the bat to place him at the head of the averages. Yet first place in the batting department is due to A. F. Glover who has been far away the most reliable batsman in the eleven, and in recognition of whose quarter

of a century's play with Ossett a presentation is to be made to him. Time after time has he gone to the wicket when others have failed and played as though he were a cricketer of five, and not twenty-five year's standing. Gill is a better batsman than his average of 21.85 indicates. Armitages owes a great deal to his score of 177 not out made against weak bowling. Denton has not done as well with the bat as he did the year before, but with the ball he has been a great success, especially in the last two months, being at the top of the averages with exactly the same number of wickets as Radley. Pepsall, it must be confessed, has been a great disappointment. This has been by far the worst of the three seasons he has had with Ossett. A really fine bowler in practice, his bowling in matches has certainly not been of the stamp which Ossett requires. The cause, we fancy, has been ill-health, which has affected his nerves. A couple of Horbury Bridge players have joined the eleven this season. Astin is a promising fast bowler, who is worth encouraging, and Cawthorne is a steady batsman who may develop into a useful player.

Chickenley concluded their season on Saturday with a home match with Birstall. Having first use of the bat, the Chickenley men found the bowling of Hutchinson too much for their most reliable batsmen, and but for an unexpected stand on the part of C. Tinker, their score would have been a poor one indeed. That player made 52, nine of his hits being boundaries. The total score was 103. Hutchinson captured eight wickets for 43 runs. The match was speedily terminated after Chickenley were out. Russell's 73 was backed up by Fenton's 17 and Mason's 11. Thus Birstall won the match by seven wickets.

YORKSHIRE COUNTY COMMITTEE.

LOSS OF £1,100 ON THE PAST SEASON.

A meeting of the Yorkshire County Cricket Committee was held on Monday at the Queen's Hotel, Leeds, Lord Hawke presiding.

Lord Hawke formally announced his resignation of the captaincy of the team. He did so he said with great reluctance, but the time had arrived when, at the age of fifty, he felt he could no longer actively participate in the game.

The resignation was received with expressions of regret, and Mr. Bower, the Rev. E. S. Carter, and Mr. Shaw feelingly expressed the thanks of the committee for the invaluable services which his Lordship had rendered to cricket in general, and the Yorkshire Club in particular, during his twenty-eight years' captaincy.

A draft of the financial statement for the past season was submitted by Mr. Toone, and this showed that a loss had been sustained of close upon £1,100, even allowing for a large number of subscriptions which were still unpaid.

Arrangements were made to play a match against next season's touring team of Indian cricketers, the venue being fixed for the Hull ground.

The Committee had under consideration their relations with young players of the Second Eleven, and it was decided that, in order to prevent misunderstandings in the future, regulations be drawn up under which all young players engaged by the County Club will be treated alike. Under this new arrangement young players on joining the Second Eleven will know exactly what they are to expect from their connection with the County Club. The players engaged at Monday's meeting for next season are Watson, who will be allocated to the Skipton Club; Kilner, who will go to Harrogate; and Hardy, whose club cannot yet be decided upon.

ley's Record for the Season.

have had a successful season, even though they were beaten out of the Heavy Cup Competition by the semi-final Dewsbury, and also by a narrow margin to secure the championship of the famed Heavy Woollen League, interest in which was maintained almost up to the last. In the Yorkshire Council table they appear the fourth, albeit they share that position with Sheffield and Skipton. Bradford won the Council championship after Dewsbury had seemed very likely to repeat, and Featherstone and Dewsbury occupy the second and third places respectively. In the Council record Morley are down as having played 22 matches, 9 of which they have won, 11 lost, and 10 drawn, which gives a percentage of 65.90.

Altogether Morley have played 27 matches, and have won 12, lost 11, and drawn 8. They have scored 2,762 runs for the loss of 169 wickets, an average per wicket of 16.34 runs. Their opponents have scored 2,806 runs for the loss of 200 wickets, an average of 14.03. George Glover has finished at the top of the batting averages with an average of 35.90. Herbert Saville comes second with 30.84, and S. B. Brook third (21.00). Robert Peel has done remarkably well, considering his years and the time that he has played, for he has not only assisted in the bowling department but has scored 363 runs and averaged 20.16, and he has more than once rendered valuable service when things were not going well with his side. David Marsden has not quite fulfilled the promise of the early part of the season, but he has averaged 14, and Craven (13.69) has fallen off compared with his figures of 1908 and 1909, when he averaged 17.50 and 18.06 respectively. "Little" Moody has batted well at times, and on one occasion he pulled the match out of the fire. He has also improved behind the stumps. C. Pratt has not managed a hundred wickets, but he has not come far short, 90 wickets having fallen to him at an average cost of 10.34 runs per wicket. J. W. Thorpe has taken 56 wickets for 12.62 runs per wicket, C. Chaffer 20 for 14.05, and R. Peel 14 for 20.50.

D. T. Marsden has taken most catches—13, and one or two of them will be vividly remembered. J. W. Moody has caught 9 batsmen and stumped 5, and catches have also been taken by the following:—C. Chaffer 9, G. Glover 8, H. Craven 7, R. Peel, 6, S. B. Brook 6, H. Saville 4, J. Lassey 4, J. Peel 3, C. Pratt 2, A. Hartley 2, F. Hill 2, and A. Sowry, J. W. Thorpe, F. Leathley, and E. Stansfield one each.

The Treasurer (Mr. J. R. Metcalfe) said that in the case of the previous presentation the subscription had been restricted to half-a-guinea, and it was agreed to adopt the same course on this occasion.

ALLOCATING THE CUP PROCEEDS.

Mr. Metcalfe reported that the gate-money at the final tie between Dewsbury and Ossett amounted to £54 7s. 6d., and with the balance in hand of £11 18s. 3d., and interest 4s. 9d., the total receipts amounted to £66 10s. 6d. The expenses amounted to £15 4s. 8d., leaving a balance of £51 5s. 10d.

It was agreed to allocate £33 7s., as follows: Dewsbury and Ossett Nursing Associations, five pounds each; Birstall, Mirfield, Heckmondwike, Batley, Drighlington, Cleckheaton, Liversedge, Brighouse and Rastrick, Gildersome, Thorpe and Ardsley, Birkenshaw and East Bierley, and Morley Nursing Associations, one guinea each; Dewsbury and District Infirmary, three guineas; Batley and District Hospital, three guineas; Leeds Infirmary, two guineas; Bradford Infirmary, two guineas; Halifax Infirmary, one guinea; Halifax Blind Institution, one guinea; Mirfield Memorial Hospital, one guinea; and Convalescent Homes, two guineas.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The officers were re-elected as follows: President, Mr. W. Runciman, M.P.; vice-presidents, the Mayors of Dewsbury, Batley, Ossett, Morley, and Halifax, Messrs. F. Dickenson, Sam Shaw, and Louis Hall; chairman of committee, Mr. J. E. Glover, Ossett; treasurer, Mr. J. R. Metcalfe, Liversedge; secretary, Mr. J. P. Crowther, Heckmondwike.

PROPOSAL BY THE BIRSTALL CLUB.

The meeting then considered a proposal by the Birstall Club. "That the team taking first innings may declare at any time, but shall have the option of continuing their innings if the opposing team should pass the declared score." A letter accompanying the proposal stated that the idea of the alteration was to bring the matches to a close on the Saturday, so that it would not be necessary for players to have to break their work to participate in mid-week matches.

The Chairman said that the proposal was contrary to the laws of cricket, as laid down by the M.C.C., but there was no reason why the competition should not adopt it if they thought fit to do so.

Mr. S. Atkinson (Dewsbury and Savile) said he had shown it to be done by agreement between the two captains.

After further discussion the proposal was put to the vote, ten being in favour of it, and twelve against.

The Chairman said that decision did not preclude the captains of two teams making such an agreement if they cared to do so, but he suggested that where an agreement of that nature was entered into the umpires should be acquainted.

THE SUGGESTED MATCH WITH THE YORKSHIRE SECOND ELEVEN.

The suggested match between Yorkshire second eleven and a team representing the competition was again considered. When the matter was first broached by Mr. F. C. Toone, secretary of the Yorkshire County Club, the committee instructed Mr. Crowther to reply stating that they were willing to play a match provided they were not responsible for any financial loss. Mr. Toone had replied stating that there was no necessity for the committee to trouble over the financial responsibility of the match. The committee, no doubt, would endeavour to keep

the expenses as low as possible, and doubtless the players would participate for expenses only. Mr. Toone pointed out that last season the Bradford League made between £5 and £10 out of the match, selling tickets before the day, so as to ensure its success.

Mr. Wilson said he had had a conversation with Mr. Toone, and that gentleman had assured him that the County Committee would not allow the competition to be at any loss in connection with the matter. He thought they might play the match; they would lose nothing, and perhaps gain a trifle.

The Chairman asked if the clubs were willing to send any players who might be chosen, on the terms suggested by Mr. Toone.

Mr. Wilson said he had put the matter before his committee, and they were willing to send the players chosen.

In answer to a question, the Chairman said the match would be a two-days' one, whereupon a representative remarked that he did not think the young players in the district could afford to play two days on the terms suggested. He assumed, of course, that young players would be chosen, as it was the County Committee's desire to unearth "talent."

The Chairman said that would be determined by the committee, and he hoped it would be taken into consideration. The chief object of the match was to find the best young talent they had in the district.

Eventually, on the motion of Mr. Wilson, seconded by Mr. Atkinson, it was agreed to inform Mr. Toone that the committee were willing to arrange a match so long as the competition was freed from any financial obligation.

WAKEFIELD AND DISTRICT UNION.

ANNUAL DINNER.

PRESENTATION TO MR. A. N. GREEN.

The annual dinner of the Wakefield and District Cricket Union was held at the headquarters, the Stratford Arms Hotel, Wakefield, on Saturday night last. The attendance was not very large, but the affair was of an exceedingly interesting and pleasing character. A capital repast was served by Host and Hostess Dobson, and was done full justice to.

In the absence, owing to illness, of Mr. Joshua Harrop, C.C. (president), the after-proceedings were presided over by Mr. J. H. Thorn, of Normanton, who is one of the vice-presidents of the Union. Messages were read, regretting absence from the President and the Rev. W. P. Kingston (Darton). The loyal toast having been fittingly honoured.

Mr. A. H. Barnes proposed "The Wakefield and District Cricket Union," and, in doing so, said he found that in the 27 years during which the cup had been played for it had been won by eleven clubs, which showed the exceedingly good competition which had taken place. Of the winners Whitwood were the leaders, having been cupholders six times; East Ardsley five times, Old Roundwood four times, and Darton three times. He thought such a competition as there was one of the best ways of keeping up the interest in cricket. He was sorry that the Wakefield second team did not appear in the list of the winners. They did get in the final one, but a stupid team called Whitwood prevented them from winning!

Mr. Earnshaw, in replying, regretted the absence of the President, and said that, as one of the vice-presidents, he had had to take the chair on some occasions when things might have been better managed. He was sorry to find they did not stand quite so well in regard to numbers as previously, and hoped the representatives present would do their best to induce other clubs to join the competition, which was doing a considerable amount of good in the district (applause).

"Kindred Sports" was proposed in a bright little speech by Mr. Eckersley, who said it had been his misfortune not to take part in the kindred sports since he left school. He had, however, found much pleasure in cricket for many years. Sport was one of the necessities of life, and, without it, they would find life very dull indeed. Played properly, any game tended to benefit any man or woman taking part in it. He urged players to always "play the game," and not get so excited and overcome that they would not listen to reason. He had known a team walk off the field because the umpire gave a decision which did not please them!

Mr. W. Ticken-Smith (President, Horbury and District Cup Competition) made a very felicitous and humorous reply, in the course of which he referred to the good feeling and fellowship engendered by cricket, as was instanced by the international and inter-colonial matches, which were now being played. They all had their ups and downs, and just now the Wakefield Union was not so robust as previously. In eulogistic terms he referred to the good work put in by the President (Mr. Harrop) and Secretary (Mr. Green), remarking that they and the Union had done a great deal for sport in the Wakefield neighbourhood.

The Chairman then presented cricket jackets to the Robin Hood team, through Mr. J. Horner.

Mr. Horner, in replying, said he thought it very nice to give the runners-up such a grand present. In fact, they almost preferred them to medals (laughter).

Another pleasing item—not on the programme—was the presenting by the Chairman of a handsome gold guard and medal to Mr. A. N. Green, in commemoration of his 21 years' service as hon. secretary to the Union.

In his reply, Mr. Green warmly thanked the members for their splendid gift. Speaking in a reminiscent strain, he said that in the early years of his secretaryship they had a lot of trouble with the grounds of clubs in the Union, and there was still a rule giving a club power to object to an opponent's ground. All this had now been changed, and there had been no such objection for over ten years. Compared with what they were 20 years ago, the grounds of junior clubs to-day were billiard tables! Going through old books connected with the Union, he found that 14 clubs once connected with the competition were now defunct, but he heard there was a likelihood of one (Altho West Eiding) being reformed (applause).

"The Visitors" was suitably proposed by Mr. E. L. Quarumby, Mr. Fred Lodge replying in a short but appropriate speech.

During the evening Mr. Fred Fallas's Quartette gave a number of fine pieces. The party was composed of Messrs. F. Fallas, Turner, W. Blackburn, and Charlesworth, all being members of Dewsbury Church Choir. The glass was much enjoyed, as were also the solos of the members. Mr. Fallas was eponored on more than one occasion for his beautiful singing. Mr. A. E. Blackburn was a capable accompanist, and he added to the harmony of the proceedings with two humorous sketches.
