HOME COUNTY WIN BY NINE WICKETS.

Lincolnshire has started the season well, defeating Suffolk at Lincoln this week. Suffolk batted first, and Penfold and Phillips made a good start. After the former left no one was found who could withstand the deliveries of Day and Gibson. Penfold had knocked Geeson out of the ground twice, and the score at lunch was 93 for four wickets. The whole side was out for 100, Day taking five wickets in less than eight overs for 11 runs. Lincolnshire batted steadily, Pullen, Ward and Day making useful contributions, but with half the side out the home county was badly in arrears. Thompson pulled the game round with some vigorous work, and Lincolnshire had the satisfaction of leading, but only by the narrow margin of five runs on the first innings. This was an important fact seeing that in case a match is unfinished it is decided on the first innings.

The ball had been beating the bat all the day, and before the close of the first day's play Suffolk went in again and lost nine wickets. Again Day was responsible. Bowling in irresistible fashion he was always master of the situation, and Suffolk had only scored 23 for nine wickets. One over from Day was sufficient on Tuesday to dispose of Suffolk, and with 27 runs required to win Lincolnshire entered upon their second innings. Pullen made 10 before falling to a catch, and Ward and Day then knocked off the balance of runs, Lincolnshire, winning nine wickets.

The outstanding feature of the match was the bowling of Day. His full figures for the match were 11 wickets for 30 runs in less than 20 overs. Ten overs were maidens. Probably the pitch was one that favoured him, but with that allowance the performance is a highly creditable one. Gibson took four wickets for 23 in the first innings, and three for 14 in the second.

**CRICKET NOTES.**

The opening of the County Club's fixtures was not a very exciting affair, for the Suffolk side was much too weak to do much against the Lincolnshire bowling, and the result was an easy victory for the Imps, who gained the five points by a margin of nine wickets.

Yet it was not without its interesting moments, and one of these was when, during the first innings, Lincolnshire looked like being behind the Suffolk score, small as that was.

W. E. Thompson, the popular captain of the side, once more came to the assistance of his comrades, and, by an invaluable and judicious innings of 31 not out, he pulled the side out of the fire, and Lincolnshire were five on on the first venture.

Another feature of the game was the remarkable bowling of Day, the Lindum professional, who trundled with such success in each of the Suffolk ventures that he had the very creditable figures of 11 wickets for 20 runs. It was certainly the most useful performance Day has contributed to the County's records.

Honours were shared in this department with A. E. Catling-Gibson, the Stamford youth, of whom the Captain expects great things. Gibson certainly made a very promising debut for his County, and the fact that he took, during the match, seven wickets for 47, speaks for itself. I trust he will have a long and useful career with the County.

Lincoln is unfortunate with regard to the County engagements. A year ago rain stopped play on the second day against Suffolk, and this year the visiting side were so palpably weak in batting that less than an hour's cricket was required to conclude the match on the second day.

The same thing occurred when Norfolk visited the Lindum enclosure in August last, for, Lincolnshire winning by ten wickets, the game was over before luncheon on the second day.

It is not surprising, therefore, that the "gates" should have suffered. I have heard a grumble on this score with reference to matches at Lincoln, but how can those organising the games provide against such exigencies as these?

At one time it had been feared the match would not take place, for Suffolk had some difficulty in raising a side, but after declaring off they decided to fulfil the fixture.

Thompson won the toss, and sent in the visitors on a tricky wicket, and the first wicket put on 57, Penfold hitting two runs out of the ground off Gosson. Wickets fell somewhat faster subsequently, and at the luncheon interval, which was not taken until 1.45 (a late start having been made), the score stood at 94 for four.

After luncheon Day bowled a magnificent first over, which proved the downfall of two of the Suffolk batsmen, for in the last two deliveries the Lincoln pro. cleaned bowled Goldsmith and Tacon. Trudgett succumbed in the next over, the second of Gibson's since lunch, being smartly stamped by Allen, and Wilson, who followed, was completely beaten by the Stafford lad without scoring, four wickets having fallen since the interval for the addition of only three runs. Archer, who with Henley, had only just arrived on the ground, went in, but he managed to add but a single before Allen snuffed him off Day, and run were down for 22. Henley was the last man in, and he collected a leg ball from Day, scoring a boundary, which sent up the century, but the next delivery broke his wicket, and the innings closed 102, Phillips being still not out, with his luncheon total unaltered. Gibson's four wickets cost only 33 runs, while Day had the fine analysis of five for 11.

Lincolnshire opened their innings at 3.15 with Rev. C. G. Ward and E. Pulten, to the howling of Trudgett and Penfold. The home side failed badly, for after both batsmen had scored considerable runs they were each dismissed with the total at 22, bowled by Trudgett and Penfold respectively. With only one wicket remaining was taken at the wicket, and Cook, who followed, was smartly caught at mid-on, Thom's hitting the catch single-handed, and high up. Further disaster awaited the batsmen, for Gosson stepped on to his wicket, in pulling one round from Trudgett, and half the side were out for 23. The score had been taken to 40, when Day put one into Gosson's hands, and this made way for Cook to join Capt. Thompson.

These two sent us 60 without further loss, but Cook then gave a hard chance of escape and bowled to Penfold. Then he hit his wicket, playing back to the same bowler, the seventh wicket going down at 64. Thompson was playing steady cricket, but Davy was stamped at 78, and then the captain and Allen put on 20 for the ninth wicket, so that with the last man in Lincolnshire required three runs to top the Suffolk first innings score.

An overthrown and three byes assisted the home county considerably, and the innings closed for 107, Lincolnshire thus being 5 runs on. The captain had batted very patiently at the critical time, and carried his bat for an innings 51.

CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY v. SURREY.

Played at Cambridge on May 12, 13 and 14 Cambridge University won by two wickets.

Owing to a bruised leg, Hayes did not play in this match for Surrey, but J. I. Piggott, an old Cheltonian and present Captain of Pembroke, appeared in his stead and scored well in each innings. On the Thursday the County had the worst of the wicket, but, even so, they did poorly to be dismissed for 173 in two hours and a quarter. Holloway and Cowie, both fast bowlers, and the former with a good fast ball, were wholly responsible for the small total. Cambridge lost Nason and Collins to consecutive balls at 14, and the total was only 54 when the fourth wicket fell. Then the much-needed stand was made by Susskind and Mann, who, during the 95 minutes they were together, put on 128. Mann obtained runs all round the wicket and hit eight 4's in his sound display. At the end of the day, when the University, with five wickets in hand, were 9 runs on, Susskind was not out 79. On the second day the player named took his score to 92 and then fell to a smart catch at the wicket: he made thirteen 4's—the majority of them square-cuts and off-drives—during the two hours and three-quarters he was in. Smith quickly took three wickets for 10 runs, and the University's lead was restricted to 31. In their second innings Surrey lost Hobbs (bowled round his legs) at 15, Hayward (yorked) at 25 and Bird at 28, three wickets thus being down before the arrears were accounted for. Davis played even more freely and of the 91 added for the sixth wicket in 55 minutes with Piggott claimed 55. The wicket had been improving and it was strange to find the last four wickets going down for 34. Holloway again did well with the ball, and took ten wickets in the match for just under nine and a-half runs apiece. The University, set 223 to win, made 72 of the number for the loss of two wickets by the end of the day. The not outs were Nason (32) and Ireland (0) and it was due largely to the pair that Surrey were beaten on the third day by two wickets. Together they took the total to 154, and then Nason, who had batted for two hours and 40 minutes, was leg-before-wicket. The pair had put on 84 for the third wicket in an hour and a-quarter. Susskind was out to a very fine catch and when Mann left half the side were out for 180. Windsor-Clive helped to put on 34, and Ireland (then 103) was missed by Hitch with the game a tie.
