DURHAM'S COLLAPSE

DURHAM DEFEATED.

REMARKABLE BOWLING BY A STAFFORDSHIRE PLAYER.

TURNBULL'S PLUCKY EFFORT TO SAVE HIS SIDE.

Staffordshire County team opened this season yesterday by commencing a two days match at Carley Hill, Sunderland, against Durham, the fixture being connected with the Minor Counties Championship tournament. When the teams met last season the men from the pottery county won both matches comfortably. Winning the toss yesterday, they batted first in beautiful weather on a splendid run-getting wicket.

About 2,000 people were attracted by the game, and they witnessed some very fine cricket, in which the batsmen had the better of the arrangement. T. Briggs and Fereday opened the visitors' innings, and it was not until 44 was scored that the former, whose 56 included 7 fours, was bowled by the Bishop Auckland pro., Smith. The Staffordshire men who followed made good scores, and none of the bowlers seemed to cause them much trouble, except C. Brooks, of Sunderland. His slow break balls appeared to give all the batsmen a deal to think about, and scoring against him was not heavy, but he failed to obtain much success as a discomfiter of opponents.

At the beginning of the innings scoring was rapid, and at lunch time the total was 181 for a loss of only three wickets. The next three wickets increased the score to 283, which included the results of a bright innings by Nichols amounting to 46. Then Morris got rid of three of the batsmen with only 31 added to the score, and also obtained the last wicket at 304. The innings lasted three hours and 40 minutes for this total. One or two hot chances were missed, but generally speaking the fielding was good. Scores.

When Durham went in there was a display quite different in character, the home batsmen failing miserably before Barnes and Deyes, and being disposed of in an hour and three-quarters for 45. Barnes obtained eight wickets for 16, and the last seven only cost him two runs. H. Brooks was an hour and a quarter at the wickets for the top score of 22. Barnes's performance was all the more meritorious owing to the fact it was achieved on a fine batting wicket. Durham's display was poor in the extreme, H. Brooks being the only man to play the bowling. They followed on, being 259 behind, and when stumps were drawn required 239 to avoid an innings defeat, and had nine wickets in hand.

When the second day's play in the Durham and Staffordshire match at Carley Hill, Southwick, Sunderland, was commenced yesterday, the home county required 230 to save an innings' defeat, and had nine wickets in hand. The resumption was delayed nearly an hour by rain, but this was not sufficient to affect the wicket, which was good for scoring, and the overnight not outs, H. Brooks (25) and Turnbull (3) were able to show the Staffordshire men that Monday's miserable display at the wickets must not be taken as a standard of the county's batting ability.

Before lunch Brooks played with consummate skill, while Turnbull backed him up by careful tactics with the result that when the interval arrived the pair were still together, and the score stood 110 for the loss of one wicket taken on Monday night. Turnbull lived up considerably after luncheon, and by scoring 13 in one over against Nichols carried his score to 50.

H. Brooks was not so much at home with this bowler, and after giving the first chance of his innings at 66, which Fereday failed to take he was bowled for 77 by Nichols. C. Brooks contributed 12, and stayed until the score was increased to 178. In the same over A. E. Walker was bowled off his pads. W. Maynard and Turnbull carried the score to 211, when the former was easily caught and bowled by Deyes; and while his captain, T. Coulson, was with him, Turnbull passed his century. It had been difficult and uphill work, having occupied the batsman three hours and forty minutes to make. As the whole innings ended for 254, Durham were defeated by an innings and five runs. Through indisposition Briggs, of Staffordshire, was prevented from playing yesterday, and T. A. Bealmer fielded.

DURHAM IN DANGER.

STAFFORDSHIRE'S PROMISING START IN FIRST MATCH.

Staffordshire opened their first match of the season in the Minor Counties championship against Durham at the ground of the Warrington club at Carley Hill, Sunderland, yesterday, and at the conclusion of the play it looked very much as though they will win easily. Durham being left with nine wickets to fall in their second innings and wanting 200 to save a single innings defeat.

The rout of Durham was principally due to the fine bowling of Barnes, who took eight wickets for 16 runs.

The wicket was just the kind batmen like and Staffordshire, having won the toss, took every advantage of it, scoring their 50s in three hours and forty minutes. They started at top speed, Briggs knocking up 50 in forty minutes, and the partnership between him and Fildes producing 84.

The succeeding batsmen, with two exceptions, made double figures, but Shotton and Vost were both missed by Cowland early on. Durham were only at the wickets for an hour and forty minutes, and scored 45 runs, the last seven wickets falling for three runs; and, following on, they made 29 for one wicket. Scores:—

SUNDERLAND, Monday.

The picturesque ground of the Wearmouth club was the venue of the match between Durham and Staffordshire, which opened to-day. Glorious weather favoured the meeting, and a large crowd lined the ropes when the game commenced. The wicket was in perfect condition, and the opening stages gave promise of some really brilliant batting. H. D. Stratton, the Staffordshire captain, won the toss, and elected to bat. P. Briggs and Fereday were the initial batsmen, while the attack was shared by Morris and Thackeray.

VISITORS' LIVELY START.

Briggs was the first to test the bowling, receiving from Morris. The third ball bowled saw the Staffordshire scoring account opened, Briggs securing a single. He was soon back to the bowling again, because Fereday followed his example almost immediately by scoring another. Then Briggs turned the last ball of the over to account for: four, which was the outcome of a delightful glide to leg. The subsequent over from Thackeray, the left-hand bowler, was treated with greater respect, and it resulted in a maiden being recorded. Gradually the batsmen became settled, and played the howling in a fashion which evidenced that they had become the masters of the situation. Briggs was responsible for some lively cricket, but at the same time, he exercised every care, and throughout his innings he never gave a chance. His partner also played nicely, but scored rather the slower of the two. A fast pace of scoring was maintained, and 50 were procured in 25 minutes. The fielding was excellent, and on one occasion Coulson picked up splendidly at point from Fereday.

Subsequently the batsmen attempted a quick run, and Briggs had only just regained position when Thackeray hit the wicket. At 41, there was a double change of bowlers, Smith substituting Morris and Brooks going on for Thackeray, but the first over from Smith proved rather costly, eleven runs being the outcome. The first wicket fell at 84, Briggs being a victim to a ball from Smith. He had scored an excellent 55; his innings including seven fours, three threes, and seven twos. His batting was a treat to witness, and he played accurately all round the wicket.

With the advent of Barnes the score was increased, and the hundred was registered in five minutes short of the hour. At 123 Morris returned to the attack, and another 13 were added when Fereday was stumped in stepping out to a ball from Brooks. He had scored a useful 43, and his, like that of Briggs, was a masterly innings. Altogether, he was batting an hour and twenty minutes, while Briggs procured his runs in a little over forty minutes. Hardly 20 additional runs had been scored, before Barnes was clean bowled by Morris, his contribution being 37, included in his innings were three fours, two threes, and eight twos. H. J. Stratton and Vost were now partners, and both batsmen played cautiously runs coming rather slowly.

The Staffordshire captain scored two lovely boundaries: otherwise his runs were singles. Vost also played carefully and when the score had reached 185, another double change in the bowling took place, Turnbull relieving Morris and Thackeray going on for Brooks. From Thackeray, Stratton was missed in the slips, having then scored 13. At the luncheon interval, Stratton and Vost were still together, their scores being 21 and 11 respectively.

THE SECOND HUNDRED REACHED.

The resumption of play saw the attack still in the hands of Thackeray and Turnbull. In the first over, Vost gave a chance in the slips, which Gowland failed to take advantage of. Four runs were scored off the succeeding over, and, with Thackeray again in possession, a single was procured. Several singles were scored in the two subsequent overs, and then Vost placed a delivery from Turnbull neatly past point for three. Stratton afterwards played to mid-on for a single, and by so doing secured the bowling of Thackeray. Few runs were the outcome of this over, but in it Staffordshire carried their total to 200. Disaster soon befel them, however, because Vost, in attempting to play to mid-off, rose the ball, and Waller had no difficulty in taking the catch. He had scored 25, having secured 14 since lunch.

In the subsequent over, Durham were successful in capturing another wicket, Mr. Stratton falling a victim to an excellent delivery from Smith. He had carried his score to 34, while the total for the five wickets was

217. Nichols and J. W. Johnson were now partners, and the former quickly got into doubt figures. Opening with a lovely three, his next stroke was for four, following which he scored a couple of twos. Johnson opened with a couple of singles, an dthen cut Smith between point and cover point for a delightful four. The last ball of the over he placed through the slips for a single, but from the subsequent over from Thackeray, no runs were scored. Brooks again displaced Thackeray, and Nichols secured a delightful boundary on the leg side. Almost immediately, the score was carried to 280 within an hour after lunch.

RAIN INTERFERES WITH PLAY.

(SPECIALLY TELEGRAPHED BY OUR OWN REPORTER.)

Last season's result: Staffordshire won by eight wickets. Scores: Durham, 164 (T. Coulson 51, H. Eardley five for 47) and 77 (Barnes seven for 36); Staffordshire, 223 (Nichols 70, C. L. Winsor 48) and 22 for two.

SUNDERLAND, Tuesday.

When Durham went to the wickets at four o'clock yesterday, afternoon it was anticipated, at all events, that they would make a respectable show, because the wicket was absolutely perfect, but they had been playing exactly an hour and forty minutes when the whole side were dismissed for the scanty total of 45. The chief performer was the invincible Barnes, who kept a splendid length. He turned the ball both from the off and leg sides, and his bowling was a real treat to witness. He introduced quite a variety of deliveries, and after the first wicket literally paralysed the various batsmen. So successful was he that the last seven wickets he captured only cost him two runs, and at the close of the first innings he had secured eight wickets for a total of sixteen.

At the other end Deyes did not meet with the success he deserved. He also bowled a splendid length, and kept up an exceedingly fast pace, though faced with a strong south-easterly wind. Turnbull, who is invariably such a source of trouble to his opponents, lost his wicket to Deyes, while H. Brooks, who scored practically half the runs for his side, was also a victim to his bowling. Durham followed on—going to the wickets again just before six o'clock—and, before stumps were drawn, Gowland lost his wicket, being caught at square leg. He had only scored a single. At the close of play, H. Brooks and Turnbull were together, their scores being 25 and three, respectively.

MR. P. BRIGGS INDISPOSED.

Play was resumed this morning 50 minutes late, owing to rain, which fell for a matter of half-an-hour. Mr. Briggs was indisposed, and Mr. T. A. Bulmer, secretary of the Durham team, fielded in his stead. The overnight net outs continued the Durham innings, Barnes and Deyes, the heroes of yesterday, again sharing the bowling.

Barnes still bowled from the Carley Hill side, while Deyes was again unfortunate in having to face the strong south-easterly wind which prevailed. In the first over from Barnes each of the batsmen scored a single, while the score was further augmented by four byes. Then Deyes bowled a maiden over, following which Turnbull put to good account a ball from Barnes, which he placed through the slips to the boundary. In the next over Turnbull tested the bowling of Deyes. Overnight he was missed at the wicket from the same bowling, but this morning he seemed bent on making amends for his mistake. He successfully placed Deyes to the boundary through the slips, and followed with a single, by which he again received the bowling. The score was

carried to 50, after 25 minutes' play, and when 65 had been scored Gill bowled instead of Deyes.

The batsmen continued to be cautious, and, taking into account his portion of the innings last night, Brooks completed his 50 in an hour and 25 minutes. The total score was then 79. When an additional ten runs had been scored Deyes relieved Barnes, and bowled with the aid of the wind. The hundred was reached in an hour and 50 minutes, but when the score was 99 Brooks had a narrow escape of being run out. Turnbull at this juncture had made 23 singles out of his total of 33, and it was by this method that the score was slowly increased. At 102 Bucknell bowled vice Gill, and seven runs had been added when Nichols substituted Deyes. The lunch interval was taken after his first over, the score registered being 110 for one wicket.

NICHOLS BREAKS THE PARTNERSHIP.

Bucknell and Nichols continued to bowl on resuming, the former opening with a maiden over. Then Turnbull carried his score to fifty, hitting Nichols to the leg boundary twice, to the off boundary once, and also to mid-on for a single. Immediately afterwards Brooks gave an easy chance at point, when he had scored 66, but Fereday failed to take advantage of the opportunity afforded. Fortunately, however, the batsmen did not remain long, because Nichols, who had frequently troubled him, bowled him after he had added to his score another 11 runs.

The second wicket fell, therefore, at 137. Brooks' innings included eleven 4's, one 3, and three 2's. C. Brooks filled the vacancy caused by his brother's dismissal, but it was some time before he had an opportunity of testing the bowling; Turnbull received several consecutive overs. Runs were coming very slowly, and Nichols proved a source of great anxiety to the batsmen. There was no big hitting, singles being the chief feature, but on one occasion Turnbull got Nichols to the off boundary in clever fashion. Barnes again went on to bowl when the score stood at 150.

Turnbull accepted his first over, the first ball of which he sent just wide of the wicket-keeper for four. His next stroke was to long-leg, three runs being the outcome, following which C. Brooks scored a single. The next two overs were nothing near so costly, one being scored off Barnes and three off Bucknell. Rain stopped play at 162 for a matter of 15 minutes, and when the players reappeared Deyes howled instead of Bucknell. Once again Turnbull played a ball from this player over the heads of those in the slips for four. Brooks neatly played Barnes past third man to the boundary, but apart from this the whole of the runs he had scored were singles. Turnbull had now 77 to his credit, and still played very steadily. The fielding was very keen, and ultimately further success was met with, for to the bowling of Deyes, Brooks was neatly taken in the slips, by Barnes, having contributed a dozen to the score, which had now reached 178.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.
STAFFORDSHIRE V DURHAM.

Staffordshire batted first on a firm wicket against Durham, and E. Briggs and Fereday gave the side a fine good-off, adding up the half-century by crisp batting in 35 minutes, and altogether scoring 84 for the first wicket, of which the amateur claimed 56. Fereday was slower, and played with Barnes till the total reached 138; he took 58 minutes to score his runs. Barnes was strong on the outside as usual, and with H. D. Stratton and Vost, both aided by a mistake in the slips, 200 appeared on the field with only three wickets down. Both batsmen, however, left soon afterwards, the captain having given an attractive display, and then Nichols forced the pace slowly. He hit up 46 out of 69 in about 46 minutes, once hitting Brooks clean out of the ground for six. The innings closed for 324, scored in three hours and 46 minutes. Durham went in at four o'clock, and found Barnes unplayable. H. Brooks and A. W. Gowland made a respectable start, but Barnes soon began to make the ball turn, and then his swinging leg break dashed through the defence of man after man, and the innings received itself into a procession to and from the wicket. Seven runs failed to score, and the last seven wickets fell to the international at a cost of two runs— one of the most sensational pieces of bowling that even the day has ever accomplished. His analysis for the innings, 7 for 19, is a wonderful record, and any assistance he received from the pitch must have been the result of wear and not of wet. But that there could have been anything very serious the matter with the wicket was proved by the batting of H. Brooks and Turnbull in the second innings, though, of course, a night's rest and a morning roll might have taken some "devil" out of the pitch. Still, it was curious that Barnes should fail to secure a wicket in the second innings after so remarkable a performance in the first. Brooks and Turnbull, by a marvellous second wicket partnership, added over 130 runs, and both played excellent cricket, though Turnbull was early missed at the wicket from Deyes. Brooks hit 111 runs, and his only serious mistake was an easy chance at point when 68. Turnbull passed the century in three hours and 20 minutes. He was eventually slighted out, having seen the score augmented by 250. Both Deyes and Gill bowled exceedingly well. Scores and analysis—

BELGIUM v. FRANCE.

For the first time in the history of the game a match took place between Belgian-born and French-born players. Except in fielding, the Belgians were superior in every department. France won the toss and put Belgium in, and for some time play was very slow, Seeldrayers scoring only one run during the first 45 minutes he was in: altogether he batted three hours for 27. Schots played the best cricket of the day and made his 61 out of 82 obtained whilst in. Belgium lost their last five wickets at the same total. With the side that played such a fine game against Middlesex at Lord's, Yorkshire batted for four hours and a-half on Monday for 288. For their total they were indebted largely to missed catches. Rhodes was let off when 27 and Denton when 56 and 63, and together the pair put on 135 for the second wicket in 115 minutes. Rhodes hit five 4's and Denton ten. Wilkinson and Hirst subsequently added 54 for the fourth wicket and Radcliffe and Haigh 50 for the eighth. The Northants bowlers did capital work, and deserved far better support than they received. In the last 45 minutes of the day Pool and Seymour made 42 for the home side without loss, five bowlers being tried during the period named. Only two runs had been added on Tuesday ere Pool was out to a smart catch at slip, and with Vials in, the total was taken to 79 when Seymour was bowled. Smith played bright cricket and once hit Rhodes for three 4's in an hour: he reached 50 out of 80 in an hour and, altogether, claimed 53 of the 84 runs added in 70 minutes for the third wicket. His chief hits were nine 4's. At lunch four men were out for 173, but after the interval there was such a collapse that the innings closed for 237. Vials was eighth out, at 236, and in his innings offered only one chance, and that not an easy one—to Rhodes at cover-point when 57: he hit fourteen 4's. Yorkshire, going in the second time, lost both Rothery and Rhodes for a single, at 18 both Denton and Hirst were sent back, while the total was only 51 when the sixth wicket fell and 95 when the eighth went down. Haigh and Newstead then put on 35, but the innings closed for 132, leaving the visitors 134 to win with a full day before them. Yesterday Northants lost Pool in the second over, but with Vials in the total, despite changes in the attack, was taken to 43 before another wicket fell. Seymour, who had gone in first, was third out, at 66, and with no addition Smith also left. With East and Thompson together the play became very keen and the stand for the fifth wicket realised 53—a most valuable partnership. After the interval Haywood and Thompson, by steady play, obtained the balance of the runs without further loss, leaving Northants with a thoroughly deserved victory by five wickets.
