RACE WEEK CRICKET.

YORKSHIRE II. WELL AHEAD AT JESMOND.

CENTURY BY TURNER.

In the first of their Newcastle Race Week cricket matches on the county ground at Jesmond the Northumberland eleven left off yesterday with much the worst of a moderate day's play, Yorkshire II. holding a lead at the close of the day of 66 runs with half their wickets standing.

Northumberland, batting first on a fast wicket, did none too well, six wickets being down for 56, but subsequently Skinner hit out briskly, the eighth wicket adding 76, and altogether got 65 in an hour, with only one chance at 22.

Faced with a total of 214, Yorkshire II. began in even worse fashion than the home county, losing their second wicket at 19, but Turner, let off from a rather hard chance at 7 by Eley, turned the game in his side's favour. He, Oldroyd, and Richardson, who was dropped when 8 by Nash and Bell of successive balls, scored with fair freedom against some slack fielding, and whilst the first-named pair took the score from 62 to 150, Richardson aided Turner to add 106 for the fifth wicket.

Turner, who is not out 128, has so far batted about 2 1/2 hours, and Richardson made his 38 in forty minutes. Scores:—

NORTHUMBERLAND CAPTAIN'S GREAT ACHIEVEMENT.

CENTURY BY GILLESPIE.

Northumberland fought a great uphill battle in their Minor Counties cricket match with Yorkshire II. at Jesmond yesterday, and in the end saved the game easily. The credit for such an achievement must go down to the captain of the Northumbrian side, F. W. Gillespie, who, after things had gone badly for the home side in the second innings, came to the rescue, and by a magnificent innings of 177, in which he never gave a chance, he set the foundation of a big score.

With Ord Richardson siding him, the Northumberland second innings realised 346 for eight wickets, and Yorkshire were set to get 194 runs in thirty-five minutes to win the game. Naturally they failed; in fact the visitors lost five wickets for 46 runs, and Northumberland easily saved the match. Scores:—

SECONDS IN FORM.

TYKES GIVE FINE EXHIBITION IN NORTHUMBERLAND.

With just sufficient breeze to temper the scorching rays of a hot sun, yesterday was an ideal day for cricket, the conditions being appreciated by the large concourse of spectators who gathered at the Jesmond ground, Newcastle, to witness the game between Northumberland County and a strong Yorkshire II. eleven, which, with the exception of one player, G. Tattersall, was composed entirely of pros. Northumberland was represented by practically the same team as that which defeated Durham and Cheshire. The Northumberland innings was opened by C. F. Stanger-Leathes and W. G. Davis, both batsmen of St. George's, the former of whom was clean bowled when the total had only reached six. Thereafter a good stand was made by the surviving batsman and Norbury, the latter of whom scored the faster, playing pretty cricket. He was, however, bowled by Broadbent when his score stood at 31 out of a total of 50. F. W. Gillespie was unfortunate to be caught at mid-on when he had notched but two, and things looked anything but promising when Davis was dismissed for 30, and four wickets had been lost for 77.

Poor fielding was a feature of this portion of the game, as it was during the Yorkshire innings later in the day. Neither side was blameless in this respect.

S. P. Bell and S. Nesbit did not improve the Northumberland total very largely, and George Milne only scored 13. At luncheon time the score stood at 130 for 7 wickets, Broadbent having bowled with success all the morning. Richardson and C. M. Skinner, who were destined to have the honour of being top scorers for their side, were at the wicket, and it was their partnership that had the effect of making the total eminently respectable. The former scored 34 before being bowled by Harrison, and C. M. Skinner played pretty cricket for his 65, which included a six and 8 fours. Driving straight and hitting all round the wicket, Skinner's display had but one blemish—a chance he gave at 42.

Yorkshire's start was as unpromising as that of their opponents, for one wicket was down for 0, two for 19, and three for 62. Bates was splendidly caught by Elsey in the slips after that player had missed Turner at 7, a costly mistake, for the latter lived to record his first century in county cricket.

Twice when he was six Richardson was missed by Bell and Nesbit, and jubilant at his escape the Yorkshireman opened his shoulders and with delightfully free hitting knocked up half a century in forty minutes. Both Turner and Richardson were now hitting out freely, and in vain was every bowler of the side given an outing. Skinner, Milne, Norbury, and Richardson failed to make any impression, and what chances were given were not taken advantage of by the fielders. When Richardson was at last dismissed by a catch by Milne he had knocked up 38, which included 9 fours. Turner, who had scored 100 in two hours and ten minutes, was still batting easily at the wicket, and the Northumbrian bowling was lifeless. Richardson's confidence had been well repaid. At the close of a somewhat uninteresting day's cricket, Yorkshire II. with but five wickets down, held a commanding position, having scored 278 against their opponent's 214. Turner had scored 128 not out, which included 22 fours.

BRISK SCORING.

A FIRST INNINGS WIN FOR YORKSHIRE SECONDS.

The Northumberland and Yorkshire II. match was resumed at Newcastle yesterday in variable weather before a fair attendance. A couple of showers had threatened to delay the start, but Turner and Watson were able to resume their innings at 11.10. Yorkshire had a considerable overnight advantage in having scored 278 for five wickets against Northumberland's 214. Turner, who was not out 128, did not add to his total, being bowled by Skinner in the second over, having batted for two hours and three-quarters, with a lucky lot-off at 7. His score included 22 fours. G. Tattersall joined Watson, and with the two in association the third century was passed, and the score reached 343 before he was bowled by Norbury. The same player accounted for Broadbent and Harrison with successive balls when 41 had been added to the total, and the last wicket then added 20, the innings closing for 367, a much smaller total than at one period appeared probable.

Northumberland again opened with W. G. Davis and C. F. Stanger-Leathes, but with only a single recorded Davis was out, and Stanger-Leathes quickly followed, two wickets being down for 19, as in the Yorkshire innings. Gillespie and Norbury added another dozen, and then the professional was stumped in jumping out to Harrison. The rot was stayed by Gillespie and S. P. Bell in association, and then Nesbit and Richardson stayed with Gillespie, who batted freely and confidently. The sixth wicket fell at 133, the seventh for 144, and then came a long stand, in which Gillespie and Richardson carried the total to 313 before the Northumbrian captain fell to a catch by Harrison. The issue was by this time safe, and Ullathorne kept Richardson company until Gillespie declared with the score at 346 for 8. Gillespie hit one six and 27 fours.

Yorkshire were put in for a second time wanting 194 to win, and with only 35 minutes to play lost five wickets for 45, but they get three points for first innings win.

YORKSHIRE II. v. NORTHUMBERLAND.

A CENTURY BY TURNER

The match between Northumberland and the Yorkshire Second Eleven, commenced at Jesmond Dene yesterday, was marked by two or three notable batting performances, chief of which was a well-played innings of 128 not out by Turner, the Huddersfield Main batsman. His was a timely return to form. The very favourable impression which he created when he was drafted into the Yorkshire Second Eleven three seasons ago was not at all supported by his moderate play last season, but good judges of the game are convinced that Turner possesses the style and qualities which combine to make a first-class player. By such his performance yesterday, which is the best he has ever made, would be regarded as a proof of prowess. The innings was a finished and elegant one, marred only by one chance—and that a very difficult one—which he gave in the slips when he had scored seven runs. From that point onwards he made no sort of faulty stroke. His timing was accurate, his placing of the ball very well judged, and his hitting crisp and powerful. It should be added, however, that his score at the close of play was much greater than it would have been but for the poor fielding of the Novocastrians, which was at times even slovenly.

At one period of Northumberland's innings it looked as if they would all be out for a much less score than that which they actually made. Their excellent batting conditions were justified. Their batting was strangely uneven. After Mr. Stanger-Leathes had been bowled by Broadbent with the total at six, a stand was made by Mr. W. G. Davis and Norbury, when took the score to 50 before the professional was well beaten by a first perfect length ball from Broadbent. For his 31 Norbury had batted very well on all sides of the wicket. He is a Hampshire cricketer who, having qualified for Northumberland this season, has been retained on the ground staff at Jesmond in place of Marshall, who has returned to Yorkshire. Northumberland had lost six wickets for 96 runs when Mr. Skinner came in to alter the complexion of affairs. He was partnered for the eighth wicket just before luncheon by Richardson, and in half-an-hour's play after the interval the pair added 66, carrying the score to 196, when Richardson, in attempting to drive Harrison, was clean bowled for 34. The last two batsmen gave little trouble, and so the innings ended for 214, after having been in progress two hours and three-quarters. Mr. Skinner carried over his bat for a merrily hit 65, though he should have been out at 42, when he was missed by Mr. Tattersall at point. In all, he was only batting an hour, and his hits included a 6 off Harrison, 8 fours, 2 threes, and 3 twos. Broadbent, in capturing five wickets, did best in the attack, though his later overs proved so expensive that his wickets in all cost him 92 runs. That was after he had taken his first four for 25 runs.

To Turner chiefly was it due that Yorkshire made so good a show on taking their turn at the wickets. The first two batsmen were neither of them comfortable with the bowling of Mr. Skinner and Milne, and whilst Robinson played on to his wicket when he was four, Hardisty suffered himself to be bowled by a " Yorker " from Mr. Skinner when he was 12. Bates opened confidently, and scored smartly by means chiefly of a gliding stroke to leg. He had batted just over half an hour for 26, when he was well caught in the slips by Eley off Mr. Skinner's bowling. Turner and Oldroyd then came together, and both played good cricket. Turner, it is true, might have been out when he had scored seven, but the catch to Eley at second slip off Mr. Skinner was a very hot one, and no surprise could be expressed that it was not taken. His first 60 occupied him an hour and a half, and when he had reached 63 he lost his partner Oldroyd, who, after surviving a one-handed chance to Mr. Davis at mid-on, was given out " l-b-w " to Milne when he had made 20.

Richardson, who followed, was very lucky at the start. He had obviously set himself to force the pace, and in doing so he took big risks. He was twice missed when he was seven—once by Mr. Nesbit at mid-on, and the next ball by Mr. Bell at extra-cover. It was while Turner and Richardson were together that the 200 was telegraphed after the innings had been in progress two hours and a half. Turner completed his century in two hours and ten minutes, but much more vigorous scoring was done by Richardson, who by hitting out at most of the bowling, knocked up 60 runs in forty minutes. He was out finally at 68 to a " skied " ball in the slips, and when he retired it was seen that his partnership with Turner for the fifth wicket had added 101 runs in three-quarters of an hour. Watson was the next batsman, and he remained with Turner until the close of play, when Yorkshire had a lead of 64 runs, and had five wickets in hand. Present score and analysis:—

NORTHUMBERLAND v. YORKSHIRE II.

MATCH DRAWN: FINE INNINGS BY MR. GILLESPIE.

After having a victory apparently well within their grasp, the Yorkshire Second Eleven, in the concluding day's play against Northumberland at Jesmond Dene yesterday, had to be content with a draw. Such a result was brought about entirely by a great effort on the part of the Northumberland captain, Mr. Gillespie, who, aided by Richardson, completely changed the fortunes of the game when things were going badly with his side. Yorkshire at the close of their second innings, had a lead of 153 runs, and looked like winning by an innings, until Mr. Gillespie and Richardson came together. Playing the correct game they made the issue safe without either of them giving a chance, and though Mr. Gillespie subsequently made some risky strokes, the pair made most of the Yorkshire bowling look very poor stuff. The value of their partnership will be understood from the fact that they added 169 runs for the eighth wicket. Mr. Gillespie, who had gone in at the fall of the first wicket, was eighth man out for 177—his best score, by-the-by, in county cricket, though previously he has made scores of 172 and 168 against Yorkshire. On previous occasions he has saved his side from defeat at Yorkshire's hands, but on no occasion can he be said to have played better cricket than he did yesterday.

Resuming in the morning with a lead of 64 runs and five wickets in hand, Yorkshire made it their purpose to score freely. In so doing, they lost the wicket of Turner in Norbury's second over, the batsman not having then added to his overnight score of 128. Altogether he had been batting nearly two hours and three-quarters, and his innings, which was quite the best he has ever batted in county cricket—not excepting his 113 against Lincolnshire two seasons ago—was marked by crisp and stylish hitting all round the wicket. It was a finished innings, too, except for the hard chance which he gave in the slips when he had scored seven. Mr. Tattersall and Watson, who had added 50 runs to the seventh wicket, when Norbury, who had displaced Mr. Skinner in the attack, clean bowled the Yorkshire captain for 30. The same bowler got the wickets of Broadbent and Harrison cheaply, and Watson, after batting just over an hour for 37, was last man out to a catch by Richardson off Milne. Altogether the innings had realised 367 runs in four hours' batting.

After Northumberland, on their second venture, had lost three wickets—those of Mr. Davis, Mr. Stanger-Leathes, and Norbury—for 31, there seemed every prospect that Yorkshire would win by an innings. This possibility, however, gradually disappeared with the steady batting of Mr. Gillespie, who, with the association of Mr. Bell, carried the score to 85 in half-an-hour's batting after lunch. At that figure Richardson, who had taken the ball from Harrison, clean bowled Mr. Bell for 19 in his first over. Five runs later Mr. Skinner was well taken in the slips by Richardson off Walker. Mr. Nesbit then joined Mr. Gillespie, and with their backs to the wall, so to speak, the batsmen played carefully until at 130 Nesbit was dismissed in the first over taken by Oldroyd, who got him " c. and b. " Milne was out 14 runs later to a good catch at point by Robinson, but the next partnership—that between Mr. Gillespie and Richardson—quite settled the fortunes of the game.

Surviving an appeal for leg before wicket by Oldroyd, and another appeal for a catch at the wicket, Mr. Gillespie reached his century after having been at the wickets two hours and a half. Then he proceeded to hit out with greater freedom. At 138 he escaped being out to a one-handed chance which he gave to Turner at mid-off, and a few balls later Oldroyd failed to hold a high catch at third slip. With a mighty drive clean out of the ground off Harrison for six, he sent up the 200 when the innings had been in progress two hours and 30 minutes. When he had made 136 the Northumberland captain might have been caught with a ball which passed through the fingers of both Watson and Bates, but he was, of course, taking more risks at this stage than he had done previously. It was not, however, until he had saved his side from any possibility of defeat that Mr. Gillespie " let himself go. " He was splendidly supported by Richardson at the other end, and between them they carried the score to 313—having added 169 for the eighth wicket—when Mr. Gillespie was out to a catch at deep point by Harrison, off Walker.

Altogether, the retiring batsman had been at the wickets four hours for 177 runs, in which were included 1 six, 27 fours, 4 threes, and 11 twos. His chief scoring stroke up to reaching the century was an easy gliding stroke to leg, but afterwards he played a lot of nice strokes past third man to the boundary, besides getting runs freely by off drives. Mr. Uththorne, who partnered Richardson until the declaration, scored 22 in very few minutes, and among his hits was a drive for six off Bates. Richardson carried out his bat for a well-played 82. He had at first been somewhat unsteady, Broadbent, in particular, having him in difficulties several times, but he gave no chance, and after making his 50 in an hour and ten minutes, gave an exhibition of hard driving to the off boundary. He had been at the wickets an hour and three-quarters when the closure was applied, and the Northumberland innings altogether had realised 346 runs in four hours and a half.

With only half-an-hour to bat, Yorkshire, of course, were in no danger of losing the match, but as they lost five wickets for 43 runs, there was sufficient to make the Northumberland captain ponder as to whether it would not have been well to have declared earlier. Score and analysis:—
