CLOSE FINISH. FINE BOWLING BY G. B. RAIKES AND PENFOLD.

CAPTAIN WILSON'S BIG HITTING.

1ST DAY INSURED 25 COP BY COLLETT

There was a full and entertaining day's cricket at Labbam yesterday. The result was not quite so satisfactory to Norfolk as might have been anticipated from the run of the game, but the home side has started its account in the Minor Counties Competition with three points for a first innings lead in a drawn match. They got very near the maximum points, only 4 runs being required for victory when stumps were drawn, a full two minutes before Greenwich time, and Norfolk had two wickets left. The concluding stages, which presented possibilities of victory to either side, were followed with a deep interest, but to Norfolk people the result was rather disappointing. After some fine bowling by the Rev. G. B. Raikes, who took nine wickets in Suffolk's first innings for 24 runs, and a great display of forcing cricket and magnificent driving by Captain Wilson, a sporting declaration by the Suffolk captain left Norfolk with rather more than an hour and a quarter to get 100 runs. Norfolk went boldly for victory, and the early batsmen did so well that success seemed certain, but subsequently Penfold, whose match record of eleven wickets for 30 was slightly better than that of the Norfolk captain, and Captain Wilson met with a run of success, and so changed the aspect of affairs that during the last quarter of an hour the batsmen desired it expedient to take no risks. Except for two missed catches by Suffolk men, the fielding of both sides throughout the day was worthy of the highest praise.

By arrangement, play began yesterday at half-past ten, and in the course of forty minutes play the six remaining Suffolk wickets were captured for the addition of 33 runs. The wickets all fell to the prowess of the Norfolk captain, and his magnificent bowling was the outstanding feature of the innings. Overnight the Rev. G. B. Raikes had taken three wickets in four overs for 8 runs, and yesterday he captured six wickets in 6.3 overs for 36 runs. His complete analysis for the innings was therefore 10.5 overs 24 runs 3 wickets. V. J. Lewis and A. H. Lang took the score from 14 to 27, and then with the bowling of the Harrow captain by a short ball, which was attempted to null the profession of batsmen commenced. With the total at 35, Raikes dismissed H. L. Wilson and A. Barnes with the last two balls of an over, Wilson, who jumped in to drive, being caught at slip, and Barnes being well taken at cover point, close to the ground by Dunning. Following an over bowled by Gibson from the top end, Raikes dismissed J. Forrest with the first ball of his next over, and thus accomplished the "hat-trick." Forrest played the ball into his wicket, and in his next over Raikes bowled Lewis. V. F. Gaby made a nice stroke to the off boundary of Gibson, and had collected ten nicely when he was caught at cover point, almost at the end of two minutes past eleven for 47, having lasted altogether sixty-five minutes.

Norfolk started on their venture at twenty-five minutes past eleven, and the Rev. G. B. Raikes took Allopp in with him to face the bowling of Penfold, top end, and Captain Wilson, the professional, who bowls left-handed, sent down a maiden to Raikes, and Allopp played Wilson's next ball away to leg for a couple returned the next ball to the bowler for an easy c and b. G. A. Stevens came in, and the score was taken slowly to fifteen. Stevens succumbed to a kicking ball from Penfold, the ball going off the edge of his bat to be secured right-handed by Captain Wilson at slip. C. E. Dunning next joined his captain, and extreme caution was shown, both batsmen occasionally protecting the wicket with their legs. The fieldsmen crowded round Dunning, and the fielding was very keen, but he occasionally went in a direction not intended by the batsmen, but the bowling was good, and the ball was apt to do queer things. Raikes made some nice strokes, but with the total at 30 he was finely caught at hand by C. S. Wilson taking the ball dead high at mid-off. Raikes was batting forty minutes, and his score of 16 was so far the highest of the match. R. V. Thurgar partnered Dunning in the cricket because very slow. Captain Wilson bowled a succession of full tosses to Dunning, who missed a few of them which passed over the stumps to fall into the hands of the wicket-keeper. A nice stroke by Thurgar between mid-off and cover took the score past the Suffolk total, and a leg hit from the same player sent up 50. In trying to hit Wilson's full tosses Dunning was twice in danger of being caught at short leg. Thurgar drove Wilson straight to the wicket, and at V. F. Gaby relieved Penfold. The Ipswich "two men" is also a left-hand bowler, and Thurgar put a short one in the square leg boundary. Dunning continued to have a bad time with Wilson's high tossed ones, but he got one away nicely to fine leg, and at 80 Trudgett was tried at Wilson's end. The new bowler made unsuccessful appeals for lbw against Thurgar off successive balls, and just before lunch, which was taken at one o'clock, Penfold had another turn. Trudgett made yet another appeal against Thurgar, but the batsmen were still together at the adjournment, the total being 84, the partnership having so far produced 34 runs in as many minutes.

The luncheon interval produced an unsettling effect upon the Norfolk batting, for on resuming Trudgett and Penfold speedily finished off the Norfolk innings, the seven outstanding Norfolk wickets falling in thirty-five minutes for the addition of 24 runs. Thurgar and Dunning each added 4 runs, and the fourth wicket partnership had produced an invaluable 62 runs in an hour, when Thurgar was bowled by Trudgett. Three other wickets fell at the same total—55. Penfold bowled Dunning and Trudgett, G. W. Birkbeck and C. J. H. Treglow in the same over. A bye was run, and then Penfold bowled A. P. Taylor, W. J. Thurgar, and Gibson took the score to 108, the Suffolk player hitting Penfold away to the on and driving Trudgett beautifully to the boundary. A catch at cover point from a half hit dismissed Thurgar, and with Watson caught at mid on the innings closed at twenty minutes past two, the total of 108 having been made in 130 minutes. Taking four wickets for 31 after lunch, Penfold had the fine analysis of six for

lunch, Penfold and his own analysis of six for 28, and Trudgett took the ball break wearily, took three wickets for 20.

Raikes for 4, 6, and 6, and the total reached 21 quickly, while some good stopping by the fieldsmen. At this stage a smart catch by Raikes at mid-off broke up a valuable partnership. Mr. L. Wilson was the de-facto batsman after the captain was joined by A. H. Lang. Wilson pulled a short ball from Gibson round to the boundary, and in the same over he scored 8 more for a straighter shot. He helped his score along by a magnificent drive off Raikes, the ball pitching over the fence into the trees by the tennis courts. Captain Wilson scored 33 out of 54 first 54 inside half an hour, and with Allopp bowling at Raikes's end he hit a fourer to square leg. Driving Gibson Wilson reached the 50 out of 56 in thirty-four minutes. The third partnership had added 48 in twenty-three minutes when Lang was caught at third man in attempting a drive. The third and fourth wickets fell to successive balls from Gibson at 73. Captain Wilson having the off stump knocked both by the first ball he received, V. J. Lewis lent Captain Wilson some assistance, and the 100 was reached in an hour, the captain continuing to drive with great power and facility. A wicket changed over, and Watson had a spell at each end, the captain making one pretty cut off the fast bowler. Watson, however, was decided to obtain a pleasing revenge, for just when speed was being prepared themselves for another 2-figure contribution from the gallant Suffolk officer, he was beaten by a ball which disarranged his wicket. The captain was hit out at 125, and in seventy minutes he had collected a fine 80. The main feature of his innings was his superb driving, and among his best hits were two sixes and eight fours. With the departure of the captain, Raikes went on to bowl again, and immediately got Lewis caught behind the wicket. Lewis made 18 in half-an-hour, Penfold and A. B. Barnes came together, but their partnership was brief, a fine catch in the country by Treglow getting rid of Barnes, a troublesome left-hander. The seventh over Penfold's off drive Raikes inspired his bowing hand, and G. W. Birkbeck took up the attack from the pavilion end. Penfold and Barnes were in the mood, and though the batsmen were very busy the score did not mount very quickly. The light had been gradually getting worse, and just before half-past four Penfold, after a sporting declaration, leaving Norfolk about seventy-five minutes to get 100 in their second innings, had taken 11 wickets for 30 runs in 110 minutes.

CRICKET TOPICS

NORFOLK v. SUFFOLK.

G. B. RAIKES TO PLAY ON THURSDAY.

Lancashire and Yorkshire both suffered defeat last week, the success of Northamptonshire at Sheffield being the first recorded by a Northampton team against Yorkshire. Rain played havoc with much of the cricket at the close of the week, and Kent dropped from 78.00 to 68.00 as the result of their drawn game with Surrey. The position would have been just the same had Kent lost, and as they had actually passed the Surrey total with only three wickets down, the chief weakness of the new method is well illustrated. It would, however, be impossible to devise a perfect scheme, the chief difficulty being the weather.

On Thursday and Friday next at Lakenham Norfolk play their first match of the year in the Minor Counties' Championship. The selection of the Norfolk eleven for this match engaged the attention of the County Committee for over an hour on Saturday, and it is good news to learn that the team will be captained by the Rev. G. B. Raikes. The old Oxonian stands in no need of recommendations as to his fitness for the post. As Mr. H. K. Wilson points out in his admirable review of the county's doings last year in the Norfolk Cricket Annual, the clergyman is in a class by himself in all departments of the game, and it has been a great loss to Norfolk that he could not play more than a brief period during the last three seasons. The moral effect of his presence on the members of the team cannot be overestimated. He is in every sense a strong pillar, and his confidence and firmness are infectious. Six years ago he laid the foundation of an innings victory over Suffolk by a score of 145, and Suffolk have not often won when he has been in the Norfolk eleven. We remember one instance which occurred in 1905, the year in which Norfolk carried off the Minor Counties' Championship, and it was the only blot on a brilliant season. Norfolk obtained ample revenge for the Ipswich defeat, and the fate of Suffolk was sealed by a hub partnership between G. B. Raikes and C. E. Dunning.

Since the reconstitution of the Suffolk club in 1902 each county has beaten the other six times, the remaining four matches being drawn. At one period the matches produced exceedingly close finishes, Suffolk winning both in 1903 by 21 runs and one run, and in the following year they were successful at Ipswich by 13 runs. In 1902 at Ipswich the first innings totals were identical. Suffolk gained the biggest victory in 1908, when they scored 450 at Ipswich for six wickets, and won the match by an innings and 245. Captain F. Wilson was the hero of a fine innings of 188, and he received able assistance from Quaife and P. Ireland. Norfolk won the return match by eight wickets, and last year they took eight points out of a possible ten from their neighbours.

A capital bowling performance by Stevens, the Lynn Grammar School professional, assisted Norfolk to victory at Norwich last year, and after the Lynn man's achievement in the Club and Ground match at Lynn last Wednesday it would not have been surprising if he had been chosen for the match this week; but there is no lack of variety in the bowling in the team selected, and Stevens' chance should come in the next match, when Durham appear on his own ground. The easy victory of the West Norfolk team over the Club and Ground side should have the effect of directing attention to the claims of players in that part of the county, and it will be noticed that a trial is to be given to W. Thursby, a son of the Rector of Castle Rising, who played a not out innings of 58 on Wednesday.

Thursby learned his cricket at Sedburgh School, among the hills and dales of Yorkshire, and his play was so full of promise that he went up to Cambridge this year with hopes of following in the footsteps of his former schoolfellow, J. H. B. Lockhart, who received his "Blue" as a fresher. C. Popkin, the old Cambridge Blue, who writes so entertainingly of public school cricket in "Wisden," says that Thursby was easily the "star" performer at Sedburgh last year, and, if his performances count for anything, he should be watched at Cambridge, especially as he is emulating his former confederate, J. H. B. Lockhart, as a googly bowler, by way of adding another string to his bow. Thursby has placed a number of good scores to his credit in college matches, and he also did well in the freshers' match, and, judging from the number of times he is undefeated, his wicket does not appear an easy one to get.

C. J. H. Treglown and A. P. Taylor have been chosen again, and lest it might be thought the committee were unmindful of the merits of H. W. Collinson and J. J. Compton, it may be mentioned that business will take the Carrow man out of the city this week, and that Compton has not quite recovered from the blow he received on his weak knee in the Essex match. A few hours after the meeting of the Selection Committee E. J. Fulcher played his second innings of over 90 during the week, and, although it has been his misfortune to fall in some of the better class matches, he has undoubted ability, and is more than a useful bowler.

In reply to our request for the Suffolk eleven, Mr. Horace Groom sent us ten probabilities, and said that it was a very weak side indeed. He is faced with the difficulty of getting some of the best players to assist in the early matches. For their later matches Suffolk will have the assistance of J. F. Ireland from Cambridge, K. Raynor from Oxford, H. Bassett, the old Oxford University and Oxfordshire player, and now a master at Framlingham; F. W. Cobbold, whose performances against Norfolk are well known in the history of the two counties; O. H. Walters, and our old friend, A. K. Watson. As the headmaster of Ipswich School, the latter is now qualified to play for Suffolk, and has promised to assist his new county, but he declines to play against Norfolk. In his two matches for Norfolk last year A. K. Watson scored 22, 7, and 66.

No side can be called really weak which includes the three brothers Wilson, and the recollection of the Captain's brilliant innings at Norwich on the occasion of Suffolk's last victory over Norfolk is sufficient to mark him as dangerous. He is, moreover, a really good slow bowler of the googly and leg-break variety. It was his bowling at Lord's which recently gave the Army such an easy victory over the Navy. He took eleven wickets for 112, and the "Times" said he is among the best amateur bowlers of his type in England. He has cunning, skill, and that the wicket-keeper of length. We were told that the wicket-keeper was more than once deceived as to which way the ball was going to break; and this is a good test of the googly bowler. He is just fast enough and low enough in the air to make it difficult for any but a very quick-footed batsman to get out to the pitch and hit him, and it wanted a good player to play back to him with certainty.

H. L. Wilson, the captain of the side, has often batted well against Norfolk, and C. E. Wilson, who only played in one match last year, is also a good bat. In A. H. Lang, the ex-Harrow captain, the side will have a good wicket-keeper, and Norfolk has on occasions found it difficult to do well against the Bury bowlers Fradgott and Penfold.
