Rain defayed the start until half-an-hour before lunch, and when Cheshire won the toes they took possession of a wicket which was at first quite lifeless, and which at no time gave much assistance to the bowlers. Bod batting in a measure accounted for the dismissal of the Cestrians in under two hours for 34 rurs. They had only 11 runs on the board when Richardson got Mr. Chadwick cought at cover-point by Robmson for four, and the captain, the Rev. W. S. Cakhwell retired in Richardson's next over.

At the hundson interval only 17 runs were on the board for two wickets, and on resuming Broadbents got through the defence of Mr. MacLaren with the total at 31. The outgoing batanan, who is a cousin of the famous Lancastrian, had played corvect cricket for 11, which turned out to be Cheshirs's top acore. Smoker, who succeeded, was out to a smart catch low down by Turner at long-on off Broadbent's towling. The first 50 was signalled after an hour and a nuartor's batting, and was akmost immediately followed by the dismissal of Mr. Hunter by Broadbent for five. Mr. Jones, who had been batting vary carefully, was not man out for 14, being clean bowled by Richardson, who also, with a gatch off his own bowling, captured the wicket of Mr. Turner, who has a reputation for hard hitting, and Broadbent finished off the innings by taking the lest three wickets in quick succession.

#### CHESHIRE V. YORKSHIRE SECOND XI.

Owing to the incicement weather there was only a handful of spectators on the Bollington grannel on Wodnesda when cheshire met Yorkshire II in connection with the Minor Countles' Champtonship. Notwith standing the showers of the morning the ground was in Iailly good condition, the creases having been protected by mats. During the past week much interest had been centred in the fixture among the villagors, though when the Cheshire toam was frest picked there was great disappointment at the non-inclusion of A. S. Turnor in the Cheshire team, after his fine display against Manci ester University last week, when he made 75 for Bollington. However, owing to an injury to Mocrhouse, of Crewe, the local champlon's service; had to be requisitioned, and Dixon, the local professional, was also selected late to play in place of Mason, of Oxton, injured.

This was Cheshire's first match this season, but the Yorkshiremen had already been in the field, and they brought a very strong team, among them being Hardisty, Rudston, Bates, Broadbent, Dotphin, and Foster Cheshire were fairly strong, one well known player being the Rev. W. S. Caldwell, formerly of Bollington, who has lately played for Worcester. The Cheshire eleven included only two professionals.

The match started about two hours late owing to the rain. Cheshire went in first, MacLaren and Chadwick going in to face the somewhat fast bowling of Broadbent and Riebardson. The batsmen shaped well at the start, Chadwick holding his wicket stoadily, while MacLaren made a boundary with his first stroke, following this up with a cut for two. After a stay of a quarter hour, however, in which time he had made four, Chadwick was caught by Robinson at mid-off, and the Rev. W. S. Caldwell took his place, but after several ineffectual attempts to get the ball away the rev. gentleman was bowled by Richardson without any score. With the score at 17 for two wickets the luncheon interval was taken.

On resuming it was seen that there was an appreciable increase in the number of spectators. W. E. Jones took the place of the Rev. Mr Caldwell, and after several attempts litted a ball from Broadbent to the boundary. A couple of maiden overs followed, the visiting fielders being very smart. A single and a couple from Macfaren were all that the next two overs yielded, but in the following over the bowler's efforts were rewarded, MacLaren's middle stump being upset by a low delivery which dismissed him after sooring 17. Smoker, the professional from New Brighton, took his place at the wicket, but though securing a three off the fourth ball he received, his attempts to hit out were not effective during the next few overs. Jones made a good boundary hit, though missed at long-on, and brought up his score theroby to 10. The batting was very slow, twenty-four overs only yielding by suns. Broadbent made an unsuccessful appeal against Smoker, the latter reaching any crease only just in time, but the bowler hal his satisfaction shortly afterwards in temping Smoker to life a ball into Turner's handa, the New Brighton man being sent to the pavilion after having compiled a half-uosen. Jones with a long drive sent the ball ever the boundary, and

was brought up by Hunter with a hit for three, but that basman in the next minute was clean bowled by Broadbent. R. J. Shute was next at the wicket, but soon his companion's bails were disturbed by Richardson, the bataman retiring with 14 to his credit. As A. S. Turner took up his place in the crease he was loudly applauded by the spectators, whose enthusiasm grew as be made a boundary with his first ball and a three with the next he received. He hen eadopted cautious tactics owing to the barrising badly, but anticipating his intentions the nielders were wdely distributed. Turner hit out with spirit and soon brought up all score to sixty, but receiving a high ball from Richardson ne sent the ball back to the bowler, and thus brought about his downfait, retiring after adding ten to the score in about as many minutes.

After making eight Shute was caught at square leg by Robinson. Bratby indied to the score.
