The Yorkshire Second Eleven Match.

The financial result was one of the chief points of interest to the local public in regard to the first of the two Minor Counties Championship games that have been allocated to Rotherham this season. From this point of view it was to be regretted that the play was practically limited to one day, for although the game was not concluded until Tuesday, all interest had been taken out of it on Monday, Cheshire being in a hopeless position at the close of the first day's play. This was due to an astonishing collapse on the part of the Cestrians against some admittedly good bowling, but excellent though the Yorkshire attack was, one expected a better show from a team that contained several players—notably Moorhouse, Hilditch, and Smoker—who have had some experience of first-class county cricket. The short duration of the game was responsible for the decreased receipts, which amounted to something like £25. Though falling far short of last year's takings, this amount will turn out to be larger than that taken at most second eleven matches in Yorkshire this season. It is not at all bad when all things are taken into consideration, and Rotherham can take more credit for its patronage of this game than can some larger towns one could name for the support they have extended to several first-class county matches.

The Two Rotherham Representatives.

Some disappointment was felt because the two Rotherham cricketers included in the Yorkshire team did not show to greater advantage, although W. Micklethwait was the only one of the very early Yorkshire batsmen who demonstrated the fact that the bowling could be punished. Up to his arrival no one had dared to hit it, and his sixteen runs were the outcome of really good strokes. From both W. Micklethwait and P. E. Cooper big scores were hoped for and expected, and their comparative failure was disappointing. Cricket, however, is a funny game, and the best of batsmen fail at times. So far as Cooper was concerned he had the misfortune to be bowled off his pads, and he did not get the chance to prove to the outside world what his Rotherham admirers claim for him, viz. that there is no more stylish batsman in the county of Yorkshire. So far as Micklethwait is concerned, his ability appears to be fully recognised, and it is an open secret that the Yorkshire authorities regard him as one of the most promising left-hand batsmen in the shire of many acres.

A Promising Youngster.

Everybody who saw the Yorkshire Second Eleven match with Cheshire was impressed with the all-round play of Harold Harrison, who bowled right through both innings of the Cestrians, taking eleven wickets for 49 runs. Commenting on his play, "Flanour" in the "Leeds Mercury" makes the following comments:—"As a left-hand slow bowler Harrison has long been on the fringe of the Yorkshire team, and had it not been for the fact that Rhodes is still a great bowler, the Yeoman man would probably have had the chance he deserves a few years ago. But Harrison is not only a bowler; he is also a fine forcing batsman, as he showed by his not-out innings of 44 for the Yorkshire second eleven against Cheshire at Rotherham, yesterday, and Yorkshire need good forcing batsmen who are also capable bowlers. The success of Harrison in both departments of the game in the match against Cheshire gives me the opportunity I have desired for some time past to urge the County Committee to give this player's trial on the first favourable opportunity. Harrison has been doing well with both bat and ball throughout the season, and as he is only 25 years of age, he is not too old to develop."

CHESHIRE CRUSHED.

FINE BOWLING BY YORKSHIRE RECRUITS.

LOCAL PLAYERS IN THE YORKSHIRE TEAM.

The feebleness of the cricket played by the representatives of Cheshire as compared with that shown by the Yorkshire Second Eleven prevents the match which commenced at Clifton Lane on Monday, and was finished early on Tuesday, from being described as a great success. The attendance on Monday was good, 231 lbs. being taken at the "gate," but there were such poor prospects of the game extending for any length of time on the following day that the attendance naturally suffered, although there were quite as many people on the ground on Tuesday morning as anyone could expect, and the total receipts for the match will probably compare favourably with those taken at other Minor Counties matches played in Yorkshire. Beautiful weather favoured the match on both days, the sun shining from a cloudless sky. The game was never at any period of the match a matter for Yorkshire, and the contest culminated before lunch on Tuesday in a victory for Yorkshire by an innings and 147 runs. The Cestrians never showed any aptitude to successfully cope with the Yorkshire bowling, and the feat of Harrison, the Yeoman cricketer, who bowled throughout both innings, in taking eleven wickets for 49 runs, was most meritorious.

When play commenced on Monday the wicket did not appear to have fully recovered from the recent rain. At all events, it played queerly for a time, and all the early batsmen had to exercise the greatest caution. Wilson and Hardisty, who opened the innings, were often in difficulties, the latter being clean bowled with the score at 12. Both the Rotherham batsmen included in the team were among the early batsmen who had to meet the Cheshire attack when it was at its best. P. E. Cooper had the distinction of making the first boundary hit of the game, but the total had only mounted to 24 when he had the misfortune to be bowled off his pads. W. Micklethwait, who followed, opened his account in most promising style, off-driving both Mason and Smoker to the boundary in grand style. It was in opening his shoulders to Hunter, and thereby endeavouring to impart some "bite" into the game, that he misjudged a "hanging" ball, and was bowled after hitting up sixteen runs in quick time. Oldroyd, the next arrival, did not last long, but with Kilner in a complete mastery of the bowling was obtained, and runs came fairly fast. At lunch Yorkshire had scored 124 for four wickets.

The most interesting incidents occurred after the luncheon interval. Wilson, who was sixth out, batted with extreme carelessness for his 72—he was at the wickets two hours and 40 minutes—but he played a very useful innings. The real sensation was provided by Harrison and Hartington, who for the last wicket added 69 runs. Both played bright and attractive cricket, especially Harrison, who was not out with 64 runs to his credit.

Cheshire did badly on going to the wickets against the bowling of Broadbent and Harrison. They lost three wickets for 11, and had six down for 29. When stumps were drawn for the day the Cestrians had lost nine wickets for 47 runs.

Less than fifteen minutes sufficed to bring the innings to a close on Tuesday morning. Cheshire, of course, followed on, being 229 runs behind. They made a better start in their second venture, Cook and Church taking the score to 39 before the first wicket fell. Thereafter another "bat" fell in, five wickets being down for 83. A grand catch, almost on the pavilion rails, by Micklethwait got rid of Turner, and by 1.30 all was over, Yorkshire winning as stated. Score—

YORKSHIRE II. IN ROTHERHAM

Cashire Study Boston.

LOCAL BATTERS OUT OF LOCK.

A Fine Last Wicket Partnership.

The first of the two matches on the Yorkshire II. card arranged by Rotherham was decided on Monday and Tuesday, when Cheshire were met, and heavily defeated by an innings and 167 runs.

The sun shone beautifully on both days, the cricket being played under ideal conditions. The attendance was splendid on Monday, and one might imagine the attention that the County authorities have been compelled to pay to the town. On Tuesday, with the game in such an advanced stage, there was, of course, only a moderate attendance.

The Yorkshire team included the brilliant Rotherham pair, Micklethwait and Cooper. The result of the first day's play, of course, caused first innings, the opening Yorkshire pair being Wilson and Hardisty, who were opposed by Mason (yardion rod) and Smoker, the old Hampshire player. Seven came from Smoker's first over, but the visitors had not to wait long for a wicket, Hardisty playing over a well-pitched ball from Mason.

This made way for Cooper, who was given a warm greeting by the spectators. He batted well for a short time, and obtained the first boundary of the innings, a fine square leg stroke, which went at a rare pace. Then he experienced ill-luck, being bowled off his pads. The disappointment felt at his non-success gave place to another encouraging cheer as Micklethwait stepped from the Pavilion. He made several lusty strokes, just cover, and twice found the boundary with grand drives, the last of these sending the ball off after nearly an hour's play. The next ball, a slow one from Hunter, who had displaced Smoker, completely bent and bowled off him. He had played a dashing little innings, and it was acknowledged in rousing fashion.

With 30 up Moorhouse, the Yorkshireman, who up to last season served Warwickshire so well, relieved Hunter, but his further change did not trouble the batsmen, though Oldroyd was soon taken by Mason. Kilner now joined Wilson, who was batting correctly but scarcely briskly. Still, he was heard to remark that he was in that long, though valuable innings, for Scarborough, on the same ground a little while back. He reached his 50 in 100 minutes, and Kilner shared free, attractive cricket, leaving well to the off and placing drives to leg. The couple remained together until lunch-time, when the score was 123 for four. The young Micklethwait batsman did not long survive on the resumption, and not long after his departure Wilson was bowled by Smoker in trying to turn a well-pitched ball to leg. His ankle suffered, and he was limping for the remainder of the match. He was occupied for two hours and forty minutes in making his runs very slow, if sure. He hit seven fours and four threes.

Harrison had made a few when, with the score at 196, Harrington joined him for the first wicket, which was to prove so remarkably productive. They put up the 200 after the innings had been in progress for three and a quarter hours. With set about the tired bowling with a will and fine long handle, Harrison played capital cricket, and gave no chance whatever, whilst Harrington was more venturesome. He hit Hilditch high over the sight screen, smacking the next ball for another four in the same direction. Eventually, when the two bowlers had been associated in their plucky batting venture for a little under an hour, Harrington got in front of a straight ball from Mason, and the innings closed for 231, the tenth wicket having yielded no less than 22 runs.

Cheshire responded very faintly. They started badly, losing Moorhouse with only four on the board, and they never looked like offering any serious opposition to the efforts of Harrison and Broadbent. Four wickets were down for 20, and the next five fell in the addition of only seven runs. As in the Yorkshire innings, the last wicket was destined to be the most troublesome. Church and Cook came together with the score at 30, and stared until play closed for the day, having put on eleven. On Tuesday morning the innings was soon brought to an end, though the pair continued to stay for fourteen more minutes and add 12 further runs, making 23 for the wicket, and the total 350, the 231 being. By getting the last wicket Harrison made his record six for 31, whilst Broadbent who perhaps had scarcely enjoyed the same good luck, had four for 27.

Cheshire, of course, followed on, and they entered upon their hopeless enterprise before a handful of spectators. The match was too much of a certainty for Yorkshire to attract many people. On Monday the receipts were about £20 15s., accounting for an attendance of about 1000 persons. Wild and Church made a steadier start than that of the first innings, with the same two bowlers to face. It was evident that the wicket was playing much easier, the effect of the week-end rains appearing to have quite disappeared. It was not until Harrington was tried, with nearly 20 on the board, that trouble came, he soon had the batsmen in trouble, then bowling Wild getting Church caught at the wicket, and hitting Hilditch's stumps in quick succession.

Harrison was still persevering at the other end, and at length bowled Hunter round his legs with a beauty. A lovely hauler from Harrington, with plenty of spin on it, quite demolished Moorhouse. After that Harrison was the leading character in the story, and with the exception of a run out, which sent Rigby back to the pavilion, the left-hand transfer got rid of all the remaining batsmen. It was an artful move, which proved Turner's undoing. The bowler played Micklethwait in front of the pavilion rails, and then sent down an extra special tempter. The run succeeded, and the Cheshire batsmen had scarcely to move more than a yard to take the catch, which he judged perfectly and held very securely. The innings realised only 22, a remarkably low score, considering the early promise and the favourable conditions, and his full record of 11 for 10 for the match was a very fine performance. Scores:
