GLAMORGAN v. CARMARTHEN.

AN IGNOMINIOUS DEFEAT.

The Carmarthenshire team played their first match of the season at Stradey on Monday and Tuesday, being opposed by Glamorganshire. The weather was somewhat cold on the first day, and a strong wind blew across the field. It was unfortunate for Carmarthenshire that the two new Llanelly pros. (Hollinger and Simpson) were not qualified to play. As it was the home team were handicapped, being unable to call upon any change bowlers of first-class ability.

The game opened somewhat promisingly for Carmarthenshire. T. A. L. Whittington and W. J. Bancroft, who batted first for Glamorganshire, were not together long, the latter being caught by Captain Hughes-Morgan off Cyril Morgan, who, after being punished rather severely in his second over, improved and captured the wickets of three of the best bats at a comparatively small cost. Soon afterwards Percy Morris and Stanley Rees came together, and between them hit up a substantial score. The latter's 82 runs included nine boundaries. He survived two appeals for catches behind the wicket. Captain Eilers also punished the bowlers rather severely, his contribution being 43. Glamorganshire having been disposed of for 220, their opponents replied with a total of 140, the former thus leading on the first innings by 80 runs.

On the Carmarthenshire side Cliff Bowen, with 44, was top scorer. For Carmarthenshire, Cyril Morgan took four wickets for 108 runs, while Hugh Howell captured three wickets for 35. Creber took five wickets for Glamorganshire for 74 runs and Nash four for 50.

Whittington and Bancroft opened the second innings for Glamorgan, and between them carried the score to 116, when Bancroft, after scoring 56, was dismissed by Cliff Bowen. Whittington hit out merrily, contributing 92 not out, his score including 3 fours and 1 six. When the score stood at 195 the game was adjourned until Tuesday.

Heavy downpours of rain fell during the night, and on Tuesday morning it was still raining until noon, with the result that the continuation of the Glamorganshire match at Stradey was delayed. Glamorgan's score overnight was 195 runs for 3 wickets, and Whittington, who had 92 not out to his credit, took his stand at the wicket once more along with Hacker. They faced the bowling of Hugh Howell and Cyril Morgan, and Whittington after hitting three successive boundaries, soon reached his century. His batting was one of the features of the match, and when his total stood at 107 he was disposed of by an excellent delivery from Hugh Howell. Soon afterwards Glamorganshire declared their second innings closed, their score at the time standing at 224 runs for 4 wickets. The Carmarthenshire bowlers in both innings had been punished most unmercifully, and it is a lamentable fact that a better team is not got together. Year after year they are ignominiously beaten, and the sooner the better some steps are taken to improve matters.

Carmarthenshire's second innings was opened by Hugh Howell and Capt. Hughes-Morgan against the trundling of Creber and Nash, who found the wicket in just the condition that suited them best. The result was that the batsmen found their wickets being scattered almost in the twinkling of an eye, and within half an hour seven wickets had fallen for 32 runs. At this juncture an adjournment was made, and it was found after the specified time had been allowed for lunch that Ike Evans, whose eye was injured on the preceding day, and Percy Rees, whose hand was hurt, were unable to bat, while Cliff Bowen was not available, with the result that the umpires declared Glamorganshire to be the winners. Both men batted cautiously, but after 10 runs had been recorded Howell was dismissed by Creber. The remaining players, with the exception of Cliff Bowen, had a comparatively brief stay at the wicket.

East afterwards did well, and the ninth wicket added 44 runs and the last 42. LONDON'S PLAYING FIELDS.

At the Mansion House, on Monday, the Lord Mayor presided over an enthusiastic gathering of supporters of the London Playing Fields Society, amongst those present being Lord Harris, Lord Kinnaird, the Chairman of the London County Council, the Bishop of Barking, Sir Melvill Beachcroft, Sir E. Chandos Leigh, K.C., Mr. W. H. Patterson, Mr. S. Christopherson, the Mayors of St. Pancras and Paddington, Brigadier-General Bowles, Major-General Trevor, and others.

In welcoming the gathering the Lord Mayor said the society was doing an enormous amount of good in encouraging youths and young men to take part in games, not as a detriment to the work they had to do, but for relaxation and to give them enjoyment for the time being.

Sir E. Chandos Leigh, K.C., who confessed to having been chairman of the society for the twenty years of its existence, described the progress made during that period. Starting with the provision of playing accommodation for only 300 persons, the society now had 270 pitches, accommodating 6,500 cricketers and footballers, and 156 acres of freehold land, which were protected for ever from the encroachments and inroads of the builder, and would remain open spaces for the people of London. Their first freehold was Prince George's Ground, near Raynes Park Station, which was named after King George, who as Prince of Wales had been president of the society almost since its commencement, and who in May last, with the Princess of Wales, opened the Fairlop Oak Playing Field, near Ilford.

An earnest appeal was made by Lord Harris, Sir Melvill Beachcroft, Mr. T. Hall Hall, the Chairman of the London County Council, the Bishop of Barking, and others, for a sum of £33,000 to clear the society's liabilities and to place it in possession of an unencumbered estate on its "coming of age" next spring. It was announced that a sum £1,000 had been received towards this fund from the City Parochial Foundation.
