COUNTY CRICKET.

Lincolnshire v. Cambridgeshire.

ANOTHER EXCITING GAME.

DAY WINS THE MATCH FOR LINCOLNSHIRE.

Yet another exciting game was provided in the annual county cricket fixture decided at Spalding on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. Cambridgeshire, as last season, were Lincolnshire's opponents. Lincolnshire was not well represented locally, and Couke was an absentee, owing, we understand, to indisposition. The weather was just suitable for cricket, and it was a great pity the attendance was not larger.

The Lincolnshire skipper having won the toss, rightly decided to bat first, and put the Rev. C. G. Ward and himself in to face the howling of Coulson and Rose.

The home county commenced disastrously, although it is only fair to say they were the victims of ill-luck. The Rev. C. G. Ward tipped the ball with the end of his bat and was caught behind the wickets at 4, and Broughton was clean bowled a run later. J. D. Edwards, who was in next, hit the first boundary, and commenced to play pretty cricket. Some of the balls got up nastily, and he reached to one and sent it to the pavilion, but unluckily slipped and fell on to his wickets. Day, the old Spalding professional, was also unlucky. The leather again bounced high, and he endeavoured to avoid it, but the ball just touched his bat and he was caught in the slips. Four for 34. At 37 an appeal was made against W. A. Trasenster, for lbw, but was not allowed, and two runs later the captain's (W. E. Thompson) off stump was taken by Rose.

L. S. Harrison, the only local man playing, joined Trasenster. He was missed behind the wickets the first ball, but he scored nine off the next three deliveries. When he was joined by Riley some beautiful cricket was witnessed, and the balls were sent all over the field. Harrison was bowled at 98 after contributing a creditable and useful 37. Brooke's wicket was taken with the first ball he received, and then A. E. Gibson, the young amateur, and Riley got together, and as a result there was some brilliant cricket. Gibson sent up the hundred, when the innings was eighty minutes old, with a four. Riley's cricket was particularly fine, and he sent the leather all round the wicket, and mostly scored with boundaries. He scored 50 runs after batting 46 minutes, and at 51 sent a rather hot shot to the Cambridgeshire skipper, who held. The innings closed at 166.

Cambridge scored five runs without loss before lunch. After the recommencement frequent changes of bowling were made. For the batsmen, B. W. Pigg made the best effort with 49. He was not long at the wicket before he opened out, and then treated the bowlers with scant courtesy. Seven wickets were down for 149, and a win for Cambridge on the first innings appeared inevitable, and especially so, when the next man was out within one run of the Lincolnshire total. Cambridge then had two men in hand, and required two runs to surpass their opponents' score. Broughton's next delivery bowled Ford, and when the last man came in with still two runs required, the pitch of excitement was very high. He scored one run, and got the bowling again the other end. With the first two balls he did nothing, and the next he attempted to drive, but the ball just touched his bat and fell into the wicket-keeper's hands. The result of the first innings, therefore, was a tie, the batsmen in each team scoring the same number of runs, and the extras also being the same.

Such was the progress made with the match that Lincolnshire were able to go in again, and were all out for 119. The tail end was not up to first innings standard—hence the smaller score. Broughton, who made the biggest compilation, was missed early by B. W. Pigg, but after that played perfect cricket, and was eventually caught near the boundary line. Rose was bowling well, and took Day's off stump after the latter player had scored 20. Harrison made two or three big hits, but when attempting to lift one from Coulson, was clean bowled. No further double figures were scored after Harrison, and the innings closed, as stated, at 119. Coulson and Rose had bowled unchanged throughout.

Cambridgeshire, upon going in again, made 33 for the loss of one wicket. An appeal was then made to the umpires on account of bad light, and they decided that play must close for the day. Cambridgeshire thus held the advantage on the day's play, but there was a prospect of an exciting finish on Wednesday.

On the second day's play the ground had changed very little. The second wicket fell at 49, and Cambs. were now almost confident of victory. They reckoned, however, without Day's bowling. The finish was exciting, and came within an hour of the start. Day took Collier's middle stump at 50, and with seven men to come, Cambs. required 70 runs. The task appeared to be easy enough, but at 53 Ling was bowled by Day, and Pigg was a victim lbw to Broughton at 64. Sixty-four for five. Watts sent a skier, and Riley made a creditable catch whilst running. This took the score to 71, and at 83 Gray was bowled by Day. At 86 Rose made a swipe at one of Day's deliveries, but the ball beat him, and took his balls. The two remaining wickets both fell at 86, and the match was won. The credit of victory belongs to Day, for by his extraordinary bowling he pulled Lincolnshire out of difficulties. In the second innings his eight wickets only cost him 24 runs.

DAY WINS.

Day, the old Spalding pro., was the hero of the county cricket match held at Spalding on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. When everything was against Lincolnshire he successfully pulled them to victory. Day played his first colts' match eleven years ago, and in 1900 joined the Notts. County Club. In 1905 and 1906 he played for Notts. throughout the season, and also played a number of matches in 1907. The next year he joined the Spalding Club, and since then has been playing for Lincoln Lindum. He has played against all the principal cricketers in the world, including Australians, South Africans, West Indians, and Philadelphians, and, of course, the first class English cricketers. W. Gunn has spoken of him as a first-class cricketer. In the winter he is well-known in the football world.

CLOSE FINISHES AT SPALDING.

Thus far all the matches played at Spalding in connection with the revived Lincolnshire County Club have ended in a victory for the home county. Four have been brought off, and three of these have ended in exciting finishes. In 1907 Durham were the opponents, and rain greatly interfered with the play, and there was little prospect of the match coming to a definite finish. So well, however, did Lincolnshire bowl in Durham's second innings that the whole side was got rid of in extra quick time, and instead of a draw resulting the match ended in a magnificent victory for the home county. The following season Lancashire visited Spalding, and were within an ace of victory. With two wickets in hand they were nine runs behind, but Lincolnshire were able to win by 4 runs. Then there was the match last week. The first innings resulted in a tie, and in the second the homesters, with the help of Day, were able to snatch a victory.

Remarkable progress was made at Spalding yesterday in the above engagement, three innings being completed and a fourth begun. With six wickets down they were only one behind the Lincolnshire score, but amid excitement Riley brought about a sensational finish, neither claiming a first innings advantage.
