Staffordshire met with no further comfort before the luncheon adjournment, Whyssall and Stapleton, both of them wicket-keepers by the way, meeting the varied bowling of the original pair, together with Bucknell, Vost, and Bourne, with every confidence, and taking the score to 115 after an hour and fifty minutes' play.

When the game was resumed before a more numerous attendance, play proceeded uneventfully during a few overs, Barnes and Deyes being well on their feet, but when the aggregate had been advanced by 14 more runs, Stapleton, having previously made a dangerous shot, to which first-slip just got his hand, was taken off slip, half the side being then out for 150, of which number the fifth wicket had accounted for 58.

Joined by Sutton, Whyssall passed the half-century after being at the crease an hour and twenty-five minutes, and after that he played with refreshing freedom, neither bowler causing him the slightest inconvenience. The amateur, too, showed solid form, and at 150 Bucknell was introduced at the pavilion and vice Deyes.

BARNES' LEG THEORY.

Presently Barnes adopted the ruse of bowling on the leg side, with a "boat" of fielders crowding round the crease, and although Sutton was tempted into giving a catch which was readily accepted, the leg "theory" was not a great success, both Whyssall and Lymberry, who came in at the fall of the sixth wicket, adopting the right tactics, and Barnes was taken off in favour of Nicholls, a thick-set fellow, not unlike Coe, of Leicestershire.

His bowling was a curious mixture of a very, very slow ball just tossed up and a fast one right into the batsman, but apparently Nicholls is not to be feared greatly on such a "batman's paradise" as this.

Nicholls was soon taken off in favour of Deyes, and very shortly Whyssall received a salvo of cheering on completing his splendid century at the end of two hours and three-quarters' batting.

The seventh wicket had tacked on 58, when Lymberry was forced back on to his stumps by the fast bowler, and when joined by his captain Whyssall laid on the wood to excellent tune, drawing Bucknell round to the ropes on the leg side for a couple of 4's, which were followed by two more boundary strokes in front of the wicket at the expense of Deyes. Barnes returned at 840 in charge of the pavilion crease, but Nicholls resuming captured the next wicket clean bowling the Nottingham captain at 870. Turner, a neat little fellow who bats left-hand, was Whyssall's next partner, and they were together when the players went into tea at 4.30.

AWAITING PROMOTION.

The break in the proceedings, however, boded ill for Whyssall, who, in the third over, was given out to a catch by the stumper standing several yards back to Deyes—a decision the batsman did not appear to relish. Anyhow, the young professional had done himself infinite credit, and his fine display following others recently certainly should make him a candidate for first team honours.

Playing in good style for three hours and a half and bringing into his service a wide range of strokes, Whyssall's unmarred 140 included fourteen hits which reached the boundary (five 4's in succession) and eleven 3's.

On retiring he received an ovation in which the Staffordshire players joined.

The last wicket gave considerable trouble, and Nottingham held possession of the pitch until ten minutes past five, their venture lasting four hours and forty minutes.

Deyes had the best bowling figures, but they did not do full justice to the value of his work, inasmuch as four catches were missed off him. As it happened the mistakes did not make much difference to the total, but in two instances someone else secured the wicket which should have been credited to the one-time Yorkshire cricketer.

Briggs and Hollowood put up 32 for the first Staffordshire wicket against Iremonger and Barnes, and after the captain had returned one to the bowler Hollowood and Bourne (both of whom received a nasty blow on the inside of the knee) played fine cricket together, and though Lymberry and Sutton were introduced with the ball and the original pair came back they had not been separated when stumps were pulled up for the day.

About 1,000 people paid gate, but the fixture merited more liberal patronage, particularly on Bank Holiday. Score:—

HOLLOWOOD'S HARD LUCK.

The match at Trent Bridge between the Nottingham Eleven and Staffordshire was left drawn yesterday, but the home side justified themselves under the rules to the last possible pointage by virtue of their lead on the first knock.

On Monday Staffordshire had collected 84 for the loss of one wicket, in response to the Nottingham total of 315, and when the strife was resumed yesterday the not outs, Hollowood (40) and Bourne (26), were opposed by Iremonger, and Barnes (J.), and just after the century had been signalled the Fenton amateur put one up to point and was easily secured.

The second wicket had put on a valuable 60, of which Bourne claimed 35, chiefly by means of well-placed strokes through the covers.

Joined by G. Nicholls, Hollowood, who had completed his 50 after a stay of eighty minutes, continued to bat finely, and a double change of bowling was tried, Lymberry and Sutton going on, with the result that both Nicholls and Taylor, who succeeded him, were disposed of.

But Hollowood then found a valuable partner in Vost, and while they were together the second hundred appeared on the board, Iremonger and Barnes in the meantime having come back again. Hollowood seemed certain to reach three figures, but when 3 short he had the mortification to see a full-on drop on his middle stump.

Playing in faultless style for two hours and fifty minutes, Hollowood hit nine 4's, five 3's, and seven 2's and the easy manner in which he placed the ball for runs all round the wicket was very entertaining to watch.

No one else did anything in particular, the last five wickets falling for an addition of 23, and the visitors had all been disposed of at half-past one, leaving Nottingham with an advantage of 81 runs on the first knock.

A GREAT CATCH.

The catch which dismissed Bucknell was a very fine one indeed, Iremonger at slip taking a fast ball which was going away from him very wide, and retaining his hold of it whilst measuring its length on the sward.

Iremonger and Barnes bowled capitally, enthusiastically supported in the field, and Stapleton made three very neat catches behind the stumps.

Comfortably placed, the home side went in again at a quarter past two, when Sidney Barnes and Deyes bowled to James and Armstrong, both of whom enjoyed a little luck; but with 18 on the board Armstrong was well beaten.

Deyes pitching rather short made the ball rear nastily at times, and shortly after the Staffordshire stumper, Dearing, had been laid out by a blow in the stomach, James received a severe knock on the head and was compelled to retire for a time. Iremonger took his place, but soon lost the companionship of Lane, who played one into the slips, while Bucknell brought off a clever left-hand catch.

A fine catch on the square-leg boundary got rid of Iremonger, who was third out at 51, and there followed a capital stand between Whyssall and Stapleton, which, despite several variations in the attack, put up the century before the elder batsman was bowled, and then a sharp shower drove the players to shelter.

There was a lengthy delay, which included the tea interval, and when the players returned James resumed his innings, and with Whyssall advanced the aggregate to 123, when the innings was declared just after five o'clock.

Of course, there was no chance of bringing the match to a finish, and when Briggs and Hollowood had scored 34 stumps were pulled up at five minutes past six to enable the Staffordshire players to catch their train. Only a few hundred spectators were present at Trent Bridge yesterday. Score:—

Second-class Counties Championship.

Visiting Team's Experience: A Day in the Field.

WHYSALL SCORES A CENTURY.

TRENT BRIDGE, Monday.

Ideal cricket weather prevailed this morning, when Nottinghamshire and Staffordshire met in the return match in connection with the second class counties' tournament. The fact that Staffordshire had won on the occasion of the previous meeting added interest to the match, and a large crowd of spectators were in attendance when the game opened. Mr. P. Briggs captained the Staffordshire side, in the absence of Mr. H. D. Stratton, and there was satisfaction in the fact that Barnes was again included, having recovered from the injury he received at Crewe, and consequently the attack was greatly strengthened. Notts were represented by a strong eleven, and the Rev. H. Staunton commenced well by winning the toss. The wicket was very favourable to the batsmen, and when James and Armstrong opened the Notts innings shortly after 11.30 it was not at all surprising that they should meet with a large measure of success.

Despite the fact that Barnes and Deyes shared the attack, runs came at a good pace, and once Armstrong drove Deyes to the long-field boundary, while his colleague followed with a nice stroke in the same direction, four being run. Seven runs were registered in the first over of the match, Barnes being the bowler, following which three singles were scored off Deyes. The batsmen again punished Barnes to the tune of seven in his next over, following with 10 off Deyes, and thus the scoring continued. As the game advanced the bowlers were treated with greater respect, three overs being bowled without any great addition to the score. Deyes had had 16 registered off his bowling when he appealed for leg-before-wicket, against James, but the umpire decided against the bowler.

THE FIRST WICKETS.

In the same over, however, Deyes upset this batsman's wicket with a splendid delivery. J. K. Lane followed and opened with a two, but disaster again befell Notts when Barnes was bowling, because he accounted for the dismissal of Armstrong when that batsman had scored 25, and with the total at 36. Iremonger introduced himself by registering a single, following with a nice four through the slips. He further augmented his score by a boundary hit, another to leg for three, and a single when he played on to Deyes. The total was now 51; the outcome of 40 minutes' batting.

When Whysall joined Lane the score was advanced chiefly by the aid of singles, the batsmen seeming to experience a difficulty with the bowling, which was undoubtedly excellent in quality—and they contented themselves with exhibiting steadiness and running no risk. At 67 Lane was receiving an over from Deyes, when he gave a chance to Barnes, in the slips. It was a left hand catch, and the ball was travelling at a fast pace, and although the fielder stopped its progress, he failed to hold it, Lane having a narrow escape. But Barnes soon made amends, because in his next over he got the same batsman dismissed, by an excellent catch in the slips by Briggs.

Another error in fielding gave Stapleton a lift before he had scored, and once again Deyes was the bowler. It was a chance in the slips, and this time Nichols was at fault. A double change in the bowling was made at 93, Bucknell and Vost taking up the attack. The century went up after an hour and forty minutes' play.

There was a frequent change in the bowling during the last fifteen minutes prior to the luncheon interval: Bucknell, Vost, Bourne, and Deyes each being called upon after the first change, but neither had effect, and the score-board was kept on the move. Stapleton made good use of his opportunities, and Staffordshire paid the penalty for giving him a chance before he had scored. When the players retired for lunch he had scored 21, while his partner, who had been responsible for some really good batting, had 36 to his credit when the batsmen resumed, first to the bowling of Barnes and Bourne, and subsequently to Barnes and Deyes.

They displayed much confidence, and at the same time paid due respect to the bowling, and once Whysall cut Deyes for four and his next delivery he drove for three. Apart from the two catches dropped, the fielding was a great improvement in comparison with what Staf-

fordshire have been responsible for of late, Bourne and Hollowood being particularly keen in the slips, and at point, respectively. Stapleton had only added a single to his score when he gave a difficult chance at third man, Bourne failing.

The third time of asking saw this batsman's dismissal, because, in the next over, he was taken by Briggs in the slips, off Barnes. Whysall batted in superb fashion, and passed his fifty after an hour and thirty-five minutes at the wickets.

BRILLIANT CATCH BY VOST.

Immediately afterwards he drove Barnes splendidly for four, and so far he had not given the semblance of a chance. He had undoubtedly got quite accustomed to the bowling, and on several occasions he played Deyes nicely to leg and also dealt with Barnes in masterly style. The services of Bucknell were again requisitioned when the score had reached 159, Whysall having registered 75.

Barnes changed his method and bowled on the leg side. Whysall caused some amusement by immediately taking up the attitude of a left-hand batsman, but quickly put his jocularism on one side. The change had its effect, because in the same over Sutton was out to a brilliant catch by Vost. The fielder took the ball low down, after falling full length. Lymbery was the succeeding batsman, and he opened with a boundary hit through the slips and followed with a second stroke in the same direction for three both off Barnes' bowling.

The innings closed for 313. When stumps were drawn Staffordshire had made 84 for the loss of one wicket.

PROMINENCE deserves to be given to the fact that, when he bowled Ellis in the second innings of Northamptonshire on Tuesday, Smith obtained his 200th wicket of the season. He is the first bowler to reach that number this year in first-class cricket, and it may prove that he will be the only one to achieve the distinction. His success is the result of consistent play of a very high standard, and he is deserving of very hearty congratulations on his performance, for he has not only taken a larger number of wickets than any other player but occupies first place in the averages. Strange though it may seem, never until this season had he obtained as many as a hundred wickets in a season, his nearest approach being last year, when he took 95 for 1248 runs apiece and was second in the averages. In the two matches he has played against Northants this summer—season he has obtained 25 for 76 runs.

ON the East Gloucestershire ground at Charlton Park, Cheltenham, on the 2nd inst, the home side kept the Nondescripts in the field whilst they made 460 for two wickets, innings declared closed. O. L. C. West scoring 272 not out, J. Williams 87 and G. C. Clarke 70. West, whose innings is the largest ever played for the club, hit a 6, a 5 and thirty-five 4's, but the biggest individual score made against the Nondescripts remains the 386 obtained by Col. J. Spens for the United Services at Portsmouth in August, 1882. When play ended in the match at Cheltenham, the Nondescripts, with one wicket in hand, were 356 runs behind.

Fane, left off when 8 (at 113) remained to score 51 and with Gibson put on 79 in 65 minutes.
