MONMOUTHSHIRE v. WILTSHIRE.

Home County's Brilliant Victory.

In striking contrast to Wednesday, when not a fall could be heard on account of rain, the weather was charming to-day when Monmouthshire entertained Wiltshire on the Newport ground.

A start was made at 11.15 in the presence of a small company of spectators, the home county having first with Silverlock and M. Stratton opposed to the bowling of Mitchell and A. Newman. Silverlock commenced the scoring with a single in Mitchell's first over. Newman began with a maiden, and then Stratton opened his account with a couple of 2s off Mitchell. Silverlock neatly deflected Newman to leg for a single, and next over Stratton made the first boundary he, though it was an uppish stroke from which he might well have been caught at long-on. The wicket was rapidly drying under the influence of the hot sun, and appeared to be every minute getting more difficult, so that run getting was slow work.

Stratton was getting nearly all the bowling, and at 14 he was injured by R. Audry in the long field. Silverlock then hit a four (all run), and Stratton sent 20 up after 28 minutes' play with a single off Mitchell, who was getting considerable work on the ball, and proving exceedingly difficult to play. Wiltshire's ground bowling was pretty smart, but Stratton made a couple of 2s off Newman, and at 28 Overton went on for Mitchell. With out any addition to the total Stratton scored another of Newman's wickets, and the time was well caught at long-on by R. Audry for 28.

F. G. Phillips then joined Silverlock, and was beaten and nearly bowled by the first ball he received from Overton. When 18, Silverlock was missed by Audry from a hard chance at mid-off, and he signalled his let-off by driving Overton to the boundary for four, and leaving Newman in a quibble discomfited.

Phillips hit Overton for two and three, and for runs of mounting interest, about Silverlock was displaying unusual patience. At 48 Mitchell went on again, vice Overton, and with his third ball easily got Phillips caught and bowled. Diver was the next batsman hit with 57 on the board he was run out before he had scored. E. Newman smartly throwing down the wicket from mid-off.

The home captain, E. E. Phillips, now partnered Silverlock, who after an hour's play, sent the 30 up with a four (all run) of Newman. Seven came from Mitchell's next over, but Newman, who had bowled unchallenged from the start, was much more difficult to score from, and at 65 he had the hard luck to see Silverlock, whose score then stood at 36, missed by Luce, the successful

Smith superseded Newman at 69, and off the first ball Silverlock fell to a "dolly" catch at point by Miller. The opening batsman's 33 comprised four 4s, five 2s, and seven singles. T. B. Williams, the next batsman, got another goodly try for three, and F. G. Phillips caused his score to mount rapidly with a three and a four, the latter being a barely possible chance to E. Newman.

At 80 the Wiltshire captain substituted Sandford for Mitchell, with the hope that Williams was then bowled, the "tele" recording 80-5-4. A. M. Masby, of Tring, then joined his partner, who, at 82, was easily caught at point by Miller off ball for 17.

Masby, on being joined by Weight, made some good strokes and with 89 up successfully survived a confident appeal for stumping. Weight brought the century on the board at one o'clock with a leg glide off Smith and Overton then went on at Sandford's end. In his first over Masby was adjudged stumped, his score then being 100-7-19.

Without any addition to the total Weight was apparently missed at the wicket, and at 135 Captain Giles, who had succeeded Masby, was smartly caught and bowled by Smith. R. Raikes, the new came, gave a difficult chance in the slips to R. Audry, who just managed to get one hand to it, but failed to hold the spinning ball.

At 168 Weight had another life at the hands of R. Audry in the slips, and A. Newman (then assumed bowing vice Smith with the object, if possible, of getting another wicket before lunch. He nearly did so Raikes having a narrow escape of being caught and bowled. Mitchell took the ball from Overton, and Weight drove his first ball to an timely for four. Raikes was bow to Mitchell at 18 and lunch was then taken, Monmouthshire having nine wickets down.

Williams opened their innings at 2.30 with A. M. Miller and C. S. Audry, the bowlers being (vice Phillips) and Silverlock. Phillips beat Miller with his first ball, but the next was despatched to leg for three and the fourth ball of the over was neatly placed by Audry in the same direction for four, all run. The first over altogether yielded eight runs and Silverlock's initial over produced five. Run continued to come at a good rate, 22 coming from the first three overs, to Raikes displaced Silverlock, but was promptly changed through the slips for three by Audry. Silverlock changed ends and was within an ace of getting Miller stumped. Then next over Audry was apparently well caught in the slips by Gordon Phillips. The captain's decision was in favour of the batsman, but it did not matter as next ball Audry was caught at mid-on, by Weight, and retired for a sparkling 20, made up of four fours, three threes, and but four singles. 35-1-20.

T. C. G. Sandford then joined his captain and the rate of run getting slowed down appreciably. Raikes had hard luck in beating both Miller and Sandford with successive balls which just missed the wicket and went for three and two runs respectively. Miller sent up the 30 after half an hour's play with a three to leg off Raikes.

At 55 Sandford was clean bowled by Silverlock and Sellox came in. Miller had another narrow escape of being bowled by Raikes with a ball which went for three byes. With 81 on the board Sellox was out in a magnificent catch by Weight, the "tele" recording 61-5-8. Two runs later Miller was caught at forward short leg and retired for 17.

It was now recognised that Monmouthshire had a sporting chance of defeating the conquerors of Gloucestershire, and the spectators, who had materially increased in numbers since the lunch interval, followed the game with the keenest interest. There was some applause when at 69 Newman (A.) was magnificently caught in the long field by Stratton, who had to run several yards in order to make the catch.

Silverlock and Raikes were now bowling to keep the runs down, and with R. W. Audry and T. Luce in association it was long time before 80 was signalled. Raikes bowled Audry for 11 with 10 on the board. E. Newman was the next batsman, and with 40 wanted to win and four wickets to fall the game became very interesting. At 82 Luce should have been caught at square leg off Silverlock, but Williams missed the chance, but at 89 he was smartly stumped by Diver off Silverlock, who was bowling in really magnificent fashion.

Overton was refused to play the 100 and run game, but at 165 Smith opened his century to Raikes, and was magnificently caught at mid-off by F. G. Phillips, the innings closing for 108. Monmouthshire thus won an exciting game by the narrow majority of 23 runs, the match being decided on the first innings.

SUSSEX v. MIDDLESEX.

Taking every advantage of batting first on a perfect wicket, Middlesex stayed in the whole of Thursday afternoon, scoring, in five hours and a-quarter, 380 for the loss of four men. Warner and Tarrant laid the foundation of a good total by making 180 together in 140 minutes for the first wicket. Both men made their runs by a variety of strokes. Warner hit a 6 and eleven 4's and Tarrant (second out, at 182) a 5 and thirteen 4's. Douglas gave no trouble, but Hearne (J. W.) played with marked skill and carried out his bat for 101 at the end of the day: with Baker he added 64 in 40 minutes and with Saville 124 without being parted in an hour and three-quarters. Rain restricted play to two hours and three-quarters on Friday, during which time Middlesex increased their total by 46 and Sussex lost six wickets for 57. Hearne was soon out, caught at mid-on at 397. For three hours he played free and attractive cricket, and without making a mistake scored 108. His most remunerative strokes were ten 4's. Saville, with whom he put on 141 for the fifth wicket in two hours, drove very well and hit seven 4's. With eight wickets down for 426 the innings was declared closed, and then in 95 minutes Sussex fared so badly on a wicket all in favour of the attack that when stumps were drawn they were 369 runs behind with only four wickets in hand. On Saturday it was not found possible to resume play until after lunch, and then the home side fared very badly on a wicket altogether against run-getting. Killick and Cox added 13 more together and Vincett made a few good hits, but the innings closed for 108. In the follow-on Vine, Robert Relf and Heygate were all out for 8. The elder Relf hit successfully and was fourth out, at 84, for 61. The last six wickets, however, went down for 69, and Middlesex won by the margin stated. SURREY v. YORKSHIRE.

Although only 260 runs were made during the first day of this match, the cricket was always interesting. Over 12,000 persons were present at one time during the afternoon. By rather quiet cricket Yorkshire put together a very useful total, but for their comparatively slow run-getting the excellent fielding of the home side must be held chiefly responsible. Rhodes and Wilson made 45 for the first wicket in an hour. The latter, second out, made 40 out of 76 in 80 minutes ere falling to a splendid catch close in at short-leg. Wilkinson and Denton, at 79 and 98 respectively, also fell to fine efforts on the part of the fieldsmen. Hirst, after a quiet start, drove and pulled vigorously and made his 50 in 80 minutes. Haigh, however, was the highest scorer of the side with a rousing 61 not out, made in 65 minutes without a chance. When Surrey went in an appeal was made at once against the light—at 6.5—and the commencement of the innings was postponed until the next morning. The home side were seen to great advantage on the second day, and as the result of some very consistent batting gained a lead of 171 runs. During the night there had been some rain, but the steady tactics of Hayward and Harrison took the sting out of the attack and enabled the ground to become fast again before the later batsmen went in. After Hayward had made 46 out of 73 in an hour and a-half, Hayes and Harrison added 43 in 40 minutes and the latter and Bush 23 in 20. Harrison's valuable 47 were made out of 189 in two hours and a-half. When Bush was out, at 147, the game was in a fairly level state, but the association of Ducat and Hobbs enabled Surrey to secure the advantage. By brilliant hitting the pair put on 121 in 75 minutes for the fifth wicket, Hobbs, who drove splendidly, hitting a 5 and eight 4's in making 62 of the number. Abel made 18 of the next 85 runs, and then, with Hirst in, the Yorkshire bowling again came in for punishment, 127 being added for the seventh wicket in 55 minutes: the first 100 of them were obtained in 38 minutes. Ducat's batting was by far the best of the day. He made his 133 out of 298 in 170 minutes by bright and brisk cricket without a mistake of any kind. His on-driving and forcing strokes to leg were excellent, and he hit twenty-one 4's. Hirst also played a free game, and a six and five 4's were included among his hits. The last few wickets went down very quickly, leaving Yorkshire 10 minutes in which to bat at the end of the day. During that time they scored 7 without loss, Rhodes and Wilson in.
