GREAT STAND AT FEETHAMS.

DURHAM COUNTY VERY SEVERE ON CHESHIRE BOWLING.

VISITORS' BAD LUCK.

T. A. BRADFORD & C. BROOKS PUT ON 250 IN TWO & A HALF HOURS.

By scoring 310 for five wickets, declaring, and dismissing four of their opponents before the drawing of stumps, Durham County have sadly discomfited Cheshire, for whom the present Northern tour promises to be a disastrous business. But gratifying as it is to see Durham doing so well, it must be admitted that the visitors to Feethams had a great deal of bad luck. Otherwise the Durham score would have read very differently, and the great partnership between T. A. Bradford and C. Brooks, which surely constitutes a record for the Feethams ground, would have been broken soon after it was formed.

During their long period in the field, the Cheshire men dropped no fewer than eight fairly easy catches—not because they were careless or slovenly, for their ground stopping was excellent, but for much the same reason that in their second innings against Northumberland the previous day five of their batsmen played on—a really distressing and unusual number. The side is simply unlucky. There is material in the team that should produce much better results than those achieved either last season or this.

The team against Durham includes Mr. F. C. Hunter, who a few seasons ago did useful work for Derbyshire; Mr. F. G. MacLaren, a cousin of the famous Archie, and who in the first match he played for Lancashire II, made a 100 against Surrey II; Jack Holland, who has played in both the Leicestershire and Lancashire county teams; and the fast bowler Moorhouse, who has only recently severed a seven seasons' connection with Warwickshire. He is a younger brother of the old Yorkshire player, Bobby Moorhouse, and is at present the professional of the Crews Alexandra club.

It was Moorhouse who had to bear the brunt of his side's misfortunes yesterday. He bowled admirably, but no fewer than seven good chances were missed off his deliveries. Those who know what such a depressing experience may mean to a professional cricketer will best appreciate the good spirit in which Moorhouse withstood these slings and arrows of outrageous fortune.

The Cheshire side, by the way, differs in one respect from that which was beaten at Jesmond earlier in the week, Clutton taking the place of Percy Mason, the old Notts County man, who curiously enough was a member of the team which Notts sent to play Durham at Feethams in 1898.

The Cheshire County club has a rather interesting history, for it was only revived last season after a lapse of nineteen years. Mr. J. C. Fallows, the captain of the side, a pretty dapper little bat, was associated with the club in its old days, and was largely responsible for its resuscitation.

In an endeavour to find good players, the county committee have been forced to chop and change the side a good deal. Happily the club is being loyally supported by the affiliated clubs, and in spite of its lack of success thus far, those associated with it are confident that brighter days are in store.

The Feature.

The day's cricket will long be remembered for the stand for the fourth wicket of the Durham innings between Mr. T. A. Bradford, a Darlington man, who plays for Chester-le-Street, and Mr. C. Brooks, of Sunderland. The pair, after a rather slow commencement, put on 250 runs in two hours and a half. They became associated a little less than an hour before luncheon, when Cheshire had done very well to get rid of three good Durham wickets for 46, and even allowing for the fortune that blessed the partnership, the performance deserves the highest praise. It struck the onlooker as rather peculiar that both batsmen and Killick, who was bowling from the pavilion end at the time, were all left-handers. Mr. Bradford should have

been taken by the wicket-keeper, standing back in the first over he received; but afterwards he batted with splendid freedom and confidence. A fine athletic figure, standing with his bat always uplifted a couple of feet from the ground, Mr. Bradford is one of the most graceful of left-handers. The century was reached just before half-past one, and after the interval the batsmen commenced to pile up the runs. The Chester-le-Street player on two occasions found the boundary three times in one over. It was not until his score reached 129 that he gave a second chance, and this was in the long field to Moorhouse, who caught the ball but was unable to hold it. He passed his century after two and a half hours' batting, just after Mr. Brooks had reached his 50. The Sunderland man, however, was never safe, although he made several fine drives, and had nine or ten lives. A feature of Mr. Bradford's batting was his superb placing on the leg side, which was most attractive to watch. A separation came when Mr. Brooks was smartly run out. Altogether he had batted 2½ hours and hit 11 fours and 5 twos. Two overs later saw the other left-hander making his exit. He lifted a ball over mid-on, and Moorhouse, who was standing very deep, had no difficulty in catching the Chester-le-Street man, who was at the wickets about 3½ hours. His hits included 13 fours, 6 threes, and 15 twos. With the total 310 the innings was declared. Cheshire started disastrously on a wicket which had cost a lot of its sharpness. Holland was sent back with only three runs on, MacLaren quickly followed, being neatly taken by Coulson at point. Mr. Fallows, the captain, had a very unhappy time with Morris, and was twice struck on a spot on the leg which had been injured in the match against Northumberland.

DURHAM WIN EASILY

IN SPITE OF A PLUCKY EFFORT BY CHESHIRE.

Cheshire remember their visits to Darlington and their encounter with Durham County XI., for both occasions they have received a severe trouncing. Yesterday the Benelmians claimed a nine wickets victory, and a year ago the verdict was even more pronounced. Their position the previous night was not an enviable one, and the outstanding six wickets of the first innings fell within 35 minutes, the visitors being 194 runs behind. F. S. Church made a plucky stand, and eventually carried out his bat for 36. They followed on shortly before 12 o'clock, and when the lunch interval arrived had lost four wickets for 120 runs. Scoring was very slow, but the total was gradually increasing, and it was not before 149 was reached that the fifth wicket fell, Clutton being clean bowled by C. Brooks. This was the beginning of the disaster, and within an hour the side were all out for 217, being 24 runs on.

Hunter batted patiently, and reached his 50 in an hour and three-quarters, when he fell a victim to C. Brooks. Wickets fell rapidly after this dismissal, notwithstanding an effort by Mr. Fallows. Morris was seen at his best in the closing stages, and captured the last three wickets in five overs. Once he knocked the off-stump several yards behind the wicket, and had not the fielding been somewhat slack he would have had a much better average than 66 for 5. Several neat strokes came from MacLaren, who found the boundary five times.

Requiring 24 runs, H. Brooks and A. W. Gowland opened the Durham second innings, but the latter was taken behind the wickets in Killick's first over when no runs had been scored. T. A. Bradford joined the Sunderland man, and twenty minutes sufficed for the making of the necessary runs.

On both days the attendance at Feethams has been disappointingly small—very much less indeed than is seen at the Darlington club matches, and unless better patronage is extended, the Durham County Committee will no doubt have to consider the advisability of allotting a county fixture to Darlington.

DURHAM CENTURY.

SPLENDID AGGREGATE AGAINST THE CESTRANS.

COUNTY CRICKET SCORES.

With a ten-wicket margin at the hands of Northumberland, remaining in their stride, Cheshire yesterday opened their match with Durham, at Darlington, full of hope to score well for their disappointment. Their hopes, however, somewhat faded before the game was very odd, for a few hours of Dunselman batting soon convinced them that they had a formidable side to face.

The few spectators—though not so sparse as might have been expected considering the threatening and showery weather—were quickly prepared for a score when Bradford, of Chesham-street, who went in second wicket down, immediately began to hit briskly. Despite the "quickenings" of the pitch, due to the rain, he punished the bowling severely, and contributed an almost faultless innings of 100.

Taken on the whole, Durham did splendidly, and the captain's wise discretion in declaring with five pegs down will doubtless prove the chief factor in what appears to be a certain victory. Scores:—

BY NINE WICKETS.

CHEESHIRE'S SECOND BIG DEFEAT IN THE NORTH.

POOR BATTING.

The match continued at Darlington yesterday between Durham and Cheshire resulted in another disastrous defeat for the Cestrans. The wisdom of the Durham captain in declaring with 510 for five wickets the previous day was amply justified, for Cheshire could do only moderately with the Durham bowling, and after following so were all out with only 28 ahead of the home county's total.

The balance was wiped out for the loss of one wicket, and Durham secured a deserved and smart victory by nine wickets.

Church and Clifton opened for Cheshire yesterday, backed by an overnight score of 72 for four wickets, and but for the former's useful and judiciously secured contribution of 36—the highest score of his side—the second visit of Durham to the wicket would have been unnecessary.

Before lunch had arrived Cheshire were at their second innings, and the spectators, who numbered only a handful, were treated to a rather tame display of careful batting.

Hunter for the Cestrans followed up his previous 19 with a well contributed score of 20, and this, with Church's 36, was the only feature of the game. Scores:—

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Century at Feethams.

BIG SCORE BY DURHAM AGAINST CHESHIRE.

SOME CRISP BATTING.

The meeting of Durham and Cheshire in the Minor Counties' Championship did not attract a very big crowd of enthusiasts to Feethams, Darlington, yesterday, and, indeed, the attendance was a very poor one all through, but those present saw some bright and attractive cricket.

Cheshire lost the toss, and with the wicket fast and dry Durham naturally took first innings, H. Brooks and Gowland opening to Moorhouse and T. S. Killick, the former beginning with a single. Play opened quietly to some good length bowling, the ball getting up awkwardly, especially from Killick. The first boundary came off the last named, Gowling lifting one of his deliveries over the slips, but the partnership was soon dissolved, a smart catch at deep square leg by Hunter sending Brooks back.

T. A. Bradford followed in, and remembering his display in the corresponding match last year, some lively batting was anticipated, but five runs later Gowland was taken by the wicketkeeper off Killick. Two for 20 was anything but a promising start for the Durnelians, and even with Turnbull in matters were dull and uninteresting. No doubt the ball took a lot of watching, and while the wicket kicked a bit it would get worse for the later batsmen. On settling down, however, the two put on runs steadily, and at 40 the first bowling change was effected, Clutton, who had displaced Mason in the team that was beaten by Northumberland, going on at Killick's end, and with his fifth ball he got Turnbull's wicket, a dangerous batsman being thus cheaply got rid of.

BEGINNING THE PARTNERSHIP.

C. Brooks took the vacancy, and after the half century had been registered Moorhouse retired for Killick at the town end, but the batsmen still got runs at a steady pace, and at 72 Moorhouse took the ball at Clutton's end, while Groom went on for Killick at 74. Brooks was badly missed in the slips off Moorhouse, who had been previously unfortunate in not claiming a wicket, Bradford being missed first ball, and the mistake then proved costly, the amateur up to this point having put on 13 runs.

He reached his fifty in an hour and a half, the hundred going up when he drove the next ball from Groom to the boundary. Despite repeated bowling changes Bradford and Brooks remained together to the interval, having carried the score from 46 to 109, at which total lunch was taken. Resuming under weather conditions which had become worse with a slight mist overhanging the ground and rain threatening, the two batsmen faced the attack of Moorhouse and Killick.

Shortly after the restart rain began to fall, and at 2.40 a cessation of play was necessitated. The stoppage, however, was of short duration, and on resuming again the batsmen gave the bowling some stick. Changes in the attack were resorted to by Mr Fallows, but without avail.

By pretty leg glances and full drives Bradford rapidly approached his century. Brooks had several "lives," but his partner had only made one mistake, and that before he had scored. Brooks reached his fifty after ninety minutes' batting, while Bradford topped the individual century after a stay of two hours and 25 minutes.

CLEVER STROKES.

Except for the chance before he had scored the Chester-le-Street batsman had not made a mistake, having obtained his runs by a combination of clever strokes and hard driving. At 129 Bradford was missed on the boundary by Moorhouse, who dropped the ball, and batting in open style he reached his 150 after a three hours' stay. Another shower caused a slight stoppage, and just after the resumption the partnership was dissolved, Brooks being the first to leave.

The total was at 236 when he was run out for 93. His innings was marred by at least half-a-dozen chances. He hit eleven 4's, and five 2's. He was run out in attempting a second run. Four runs later Bradford was caught at deep mid-on after giving a polished display for three and a half hours. He hit eighteen 4's, six 3's, fifteen 2's, and gave only one palpable chance at 129.

His 168 was obtained by stylish cricket. The partnership for the fourth wicket realised 250 runs in two hours and a half. Couleon, the captain, and Albert Walker became associated, and the Shields man was missed in the slips right at the start.

THE DECLARATION.

With the score at 310 Mr Couleon declared the innings with only five wickets down, and Cheshire at 5.5 p.m. set about their task with J. C. Fallows and Holland, who opened to Morris and Turnbull respectively. The visitors began none too well, losing two wickets for 18 runs, and at 29 Thompson Smith took Turnbull's place at the town end with the ball.

Runs came slowly, but nevertheless the total mounted steadily, and when play ceased for the day Cheshire were 288 behind with four wickets to fall. Scores—

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Durham's Easy Victory.

CHESHIRE BEATEN BY NINE WICKETS AT FEETHAMS.

C-STRANS STAGGLE HARD.

A glorious morning favoured the resumption of the Minor Counties match at Feethams, Darlington, yesterday, but at the start the attendance scarcely numbered twenty. Cheshire, who overnight had lost four wickets for 72, resumed with the not outs, F. S. Church and Clutton, to the bowling of Morris and C. Brooks on a wicket which, eased by a shower in the morning, still remained fast.

The batsmen soon got to work, and the score was advanced to 88 when Clutton put one into Gowland's hands at mid-off, while F. A. Jones did not stay long, and Moorhouse joined him on the pavilion a few minutes later. It now looked as if the Cestrians would have to follow on, though the hundred went up without further loss, but at 108 the eighth wicket fell, four batsmen having been sent back in just over half-an-hour for the addition of 36 runs.

The ninth wicket fell at 109, and the innings was all over at 11.35 a.m. for 116, so that Cheshire followed on 194 in arrears. The outstanding batsmen made a very poor fight, and going in a second time, F. S. Church and Holland faced Morris and Thompson-Smith. At 17, Coulson missed a simple catch off Holland, but as it happened the mistake was retrieved by Morris, who dismissed the pro. with the first ball in his fifth over.

The first change in the attack came with the score at 32, Turnbull then relieving Smith. Church and Hunter by singles mostly, took the total to 60 runs, when Morris, with a fast Yorker, drove one of the stumps at Church's end six yards out of the crease. Cheshire so far had done much better than in their first innings, for then four wickets were lost for 62.

At 88, C. Brooks went on for Turnbull, and when within one of the century for the visitors, lost Woods, who was taken at point by Coulson. Thackeray took Morris's place with the score at 110, and in his second over had Clutton missed in the slips by C. Brooks. By degrees, the score mounted to 116, at which the luncheon interval was taken.

Hunter and Clutton continued with a steady front until 149 had been registered, when the professional was beaten by C. Brooks. Meanwhile the amateur slowly reached his half-century at 245, but did not get beyond that mark, for Brooks shifted the bails at the bottom end. His innings could not by any means be considered brilliant, for it was characterised by general quietness with little aggressiveness, as may be gauged from the fact that he only hit two 4's, one 3, and seven 2's.

The captain joined Moorhouse, who was run out, but with McLaren in, the innings' defeat was avoided at 3.25 with three wickets to fall, but at 207 McLaren had his defence broken by a fast one from Morris, Cheshire being now 13 runs on.

Groom also fell a victim to the Sunderland pro.'s "expresses" and had the wicket-keeper taken the chance off Killick first ball, "talent" money would have been earned by Morris.

As it happened, he bowled Killick two balls later, and the innings closed for 217, leaving Durham 24 to get to win. These were secured for the loss of one wicket, Gowland being caught before a score had been registered, but Brooks and Bradford soon got the runs required, the match being over at 4.30.
