The second eleven of Notts. opposed the Yorkshire second eleven yesterday at Trent Bridge in a Minor Counties Championship, and ideal weather conditions prevailed, whilst there was a good crowd of spectators. Throughout play was interesting, and when stumps were drawn the Yorkshiremen, who had the good fortune to win the toss and who went in first on an excellent batsmen's wicket, had, despite a breakdown of the last five batsmen, secured a total of 250, whilst Notts. were 123 in arrears with only three wickets standing.

Bates, who was missed in the slips when he had scored a single, afterwards played a careful game and reached his fifty in an hour and twenty minutes. Hardisty also had a "life" early in his innings, and he was dismissed by a smart catch in the slips by Armstrong with his total at 25, the second wicket falling with 73 runs scored.

Subsequently Bates and Turner scored at a slow rate, and when luncheon was taken Yorkshire had collected 105, the century having been telegraphed in just under a couple of hours.

Both Bates and Turner were dismissed when the game was resumed without having added to the total. Barnes then came on for Lee, and in his first over had Bates leg before wicket, whilst Oldroyd had contributed only one run to the total when Turner was cleaned bowled.

Although Bates was missed early on, his innings was the best of the side, and his chief hits were five 3's and three 4's.

Oldroyd and Richardson added 82 runs in an hour and a half. Repeated bowling changes were made, but without effect, the batsmen scoring at a steady pace and making some fine strokes.

Richardson completed his fifty in an hour and thirty-five minutes, and at the same time the 200 was signalled, the innings having lasted 3 hours and 40 minutes.

Oldroyd soon afterwards reached his half-century after being at the wicket an hour and three-quarters, but there was only a single added when he was out leg before wicket to Riley, whilst Tattersall was smartly taken at the slips by Iremonger of Riley's first delivery.

The remaining batsmen gave very little trouble, the dismissal of Richardson bringing the innings—which lasted three hours and forty minutes—to a close at half-past four.

Richardson, who played faultless cricket for two hours, was sent back by Clifton, who, running up from mid-on effected a brilliant right-hand catch behind the bowler. His chief strokes were three 3's and five 4's.

Notts. made a poor start, for Hemingway and James were dismissed before the innings was twenty minutes old, but when Lee and Iremonger became associated runs came at a fair rate. The latter soon had the measure of the bowlers, and indulged in some free hitting. He timed the ball with splendid accuracy, and was frequently applauded for fine strokes, whilst Lee kept the field very much on the alert. With the total at 47 Oldroyd took the ball from Blackburn, but the change had no effect. Walker's substitution for Broadbent at the Radcliffe-road end, however, was successful, for from the third ball from the fast bowler Iremonger was smartly caught by Blackburn, whilst the next uprooted the off stump of Armstrong, the half-century then having been secured with four wickets down. Lee, who was dismissed by the first-ball outcatcher at Richardson's dismissal, was the last batsman to be dismissed, and he was out by the bowler's first ball. The total of 250 was reached in an hour and thirty-five minutes.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP. FINE PERFORMANCE BY NOTTS II. YORKSHIRE II DEFEATED BY TWO WICKETS.

At Trent Bridge yesterday the Notts. second team accomplished a feat, the performance in defeating the Yorkshire junior side by two wickets after an interesting and exciting game, the merit of the achievement being enhanced by the fact that the winners were 27/10 bowlers on the first knock.

When play was resumed yesterday morning Notts. went on with their first innings which on Thursday had reached 121 for the loss of seven wickets, and added 22 runs more, the bulk of them coming from the bat of Mr. Staunton, whose off-driving was very crisp indeed.

Having just failed by 3 runs to cause their opponents to follow on, the Yorkshiremen themselves faced indignantly when they went to the wickets for the second time.

Hardisty, who, as before was Robinson, fell to a simple catch at slip in the second over before a run had been scored, and although Robinson and Bates played confidently through several overs, both these likely players had been disposed of at no greater cost than 20.

All three wickets fell to Barnes, who, bowling from the Pavilion grass, evidently made the ball come back considerably from the off, and tempted the batsmen to have a "go," with the result that two were caught in the slips and the other at the wicket.

Thus matters continued to go in favour of the holders, and at the luncheon adjournment eight wickets were down for 55.

The two remaining wickets added 12 to the score, Iremonger being about Toulson's dismissal by a pretty catch at point, and Walker was altogether too late for Barnes' faster delivery.

This bowler came out with capital figures, but despite the soundness of his work and that of Riley and Clifton, one cannot resist the feeling that the visitors' batting was singularly lacking in both skill and enterprise.

Notts. were set to get 185, and Hemingway and James took 39 of them in half an hour at the expense of Broadbent and Walker, but a change of bowling at that total put rid of the amateur, who was smartly taken behind the stumps.

Another fine catch at the wicket got rid of Lee just after the 50 had been signalled when the venture was three-quarters of an hour old, and then a serviceable stand by James and Iremonger carried the aggregate up to 82, when James was beaten by a particularly good one and unluckily missed his 50 by a single.

He took five 4's in a valuable innings, but did not always convey the impression of complete certainty when facing Broadbent, who had bowled with fine judgment since crossing over to the pavilion end.

Iremonger and Armstrong were together when the hundred was passed in an hour and twenty-five minutes, but three later the noted goalkeeper was dismissed, and for an addition of five runs more Richardson, who had come on at 108 vice Walker, uprooted Armstrong's off-stump.

Broadbent followed these Yorkshire successes up by getting rid of Whyall at 113, and thus what seemed to be Notts.' game had been changed into a very even thing.

Coming together at this rather critical stage, Stapleton and Staunton set about the bowling of Broadbent and Richardson, the professional on-driving the former for six, but Blackburn relieving Richardson, got rid of the Notts.' skipper when exactly 20 were required.

Riley contributed a useful eight and before leaving at 157 and with eight needed, Clifton joined Stapleton, who scored a further two, and then Clifton, after getting a couple of lucky ones behind the wicket, cracked Blackburn past third man to the boundary, and so won the match for Notts. by two wickets.

YORKSHIRE II. v. NOTTS II.

VISITORS' SUCCESSFUL DAY AT TRENT BRIDGE

Profiting by their opponents' lapses in the field, the Yorkshire Second Eleven established themselves in a good position in their game with Notts Second Eleven at Trent Bridge yesterday. That they are at last in a fair way to bringing off a victory over the Notts team must be gratifying to the Yorkshiremen, who last season twice suffered defeat at their hands. The visitors in this match are strongly represented by a team which includes two colts new to county honours—Walker, the fast bowler from Hull, and Tolson, the Army wicket-keeper. Both made very creditable first appearances yesterday. Walker, in particular, served his side well in breaking a troublesome Notts partnership, and then proceeding to take the next three wickets in quick succession. He has been nominated for a place in the county's second eleven as a fast bowler, and although his pace in general yesterday would be more accurately described as medium-fast, it is none the less true that his four wickets were all secured with very fast deliveries. The success of Tolson's wicket-keeping will be understood when it is stated that he made two fine catches and did not allow a single bye to pass him.

Other successes of the day were those credited to the Yorkshire batsmen Bates, Richardson, and Oldroyd. The first named profited from an early escape, as also did Oldroyd, and however the match may end the home county must necessarily reproach themselves for several mistakes in the field which proved very expensive. Apart from the one bad stroke which he made after he had scored a single, Bates played faultless and sparkling cricket, his innings, particularly in respect of his pull to leg, providing quite the best hour's sport of the day. Richardson, too, was enterprising, especially in respect of his on-drive, and if he did not bat with the same easy confidence of Bates, he at least gave no chance.

Yorkshire had a good wicket on which to bat on taking first innings, though in the process of trying in the first hour it was scarcely so true as it subsequently became. N. Robinson, the young King Cross batsman, who opened the innings along with Hardisty, started forcing tactics at the outset, and after giving an unexpected chance to Armstrong at third slip he was taken at the wicket off Clifton when he had scored four. Hardisty had not then scored, and for a long time he was content to play the defensive game. Not so with Bates at the other end. The Primrose Hill batsman opened with his customary assurance, and taking advantage of the life which he had from Iremonger after making a single he proceeded to knock up runs at a tidy pace. He made several pretty cuts through the slips off both Barnes and Clifton, but scored most freely with a hard pull to leg, timing his hits to a nicety. The 50 was signalled in exactly an hour. Bates having consumed 35 of that total.

Hardisty meanwhile had played correct cricket, and continued to do so until at 25 he was struck in the body and fell to the ground. After ten minutes' delay he resumed, and, singularly enough, was out with the very next ball from Clifton, which he tipped into the hands of Armstrong at second slip. The Leeds man had been at the wickets in all an hour and a half for his 25. Bates, with a fine off-drive for four, completed his fifty in an hour and a quarter, and he and Turner were together with the total at 105 at the luncheon interval. The first over from Barnes on the resumption brought about the dismissal of both these batsmen, Bates being given out l.b.w., and Turner being clean bowled. Except for this chance which he gave after he had scored his first single, Bates had not made a faulty stroke, and the enterprising nature of his batting may be judged from the fact that in an innings of just over an hour and a quarter he had scored 65 runs, his hits including 10 fours, 5 threes, and 3 twos.

The partners for the fifth wicket were Oldroyd and Richardson, and they made the best stand of the day. They both hit out vigorously, and, despite many changes in the attack, punished all the bowling impartially. Oldroyd, it is true, was rather fortunate, inasmuch as he was missed at the wicket at 15, and again at 27 saw a catch slip out of the fingers of the Rev. H. Staunton as forward short leg. Richardson, who had shown particular punishing power with his off-drive, completed his 50 with a four (all run), which stroke also carried the total to 200. The innings had then been in progress 3 hours and 40 minutes, and Richardson's 50 had occupied him an hour and a half. Oldroyd completed his 50 in an hour and three-quarters, but two balls later he was out l.b.w. to Riley. His partnership with Richardson had added 117 runs for the fifth wicket, having started the total to 223.

From that point the Yorkshiremen collapsed in unexpected fashion. Mr. Tattersall was taken in the slips off his second ball, and Broadbent, who followed, was also caught at cover-point in his first over. Tolson was clean bowled by Riley before he had scored, and Walker, after nicking a single, fell a victim to Barnes. When Blackburn joined Richardson for the last wicket, the latter began to hit indiscriminately, and paid the penalty in being out to a brilliant one-handed catch by Clifton, who had to run from mid-off to behind the bowler. The last five wickets had only produced seven runs, the all-out score being 230, which had taken the Yorkshiremen four hours and a quarter to compile. Richardson, in making 64, had been at the wickets exactly two hours, and his best hits were 5 fours, 3 threes, and 5 twos. Most successful of the bowlers were Riley and Barnes, who had five wickets for 52 and four wickets for 71 respectively.

Notts in the hour and three-quarters which remained for play had very much the worse of the argument. Their two first wickets—those of Mr. Hemingway and James—fell for ten runs. Mr. Hemingway was first to

leave, being clean bowled by Broadbent when he had only made a single. Then James, in trying to play Blackburn to leg, stepped across his wickets, and the umpire, on being appealed to, promptly gave the batsman out l.b.w.—a decision which appeared to cause James considerable surprise. Lee and Iremonger forced the pace for a time, but a change in the bowling—Walker going on for Broadbent—had immediate effect not only in dissolving the partnership, but in materially improving Yorkshire's prospects. With his third ball Walker got Iremonger easily caught at mid-on. His fourth ball was glided to the leg boundary by Armstrong, but with his next delivery Walker completely lost the same batsman and took his leg stump, making four wickets down for 53. Lee was next to fall a victim to Walker with the score at 70, Tolson bringing off a very fine catch low down behind the wicket. Stapleton was clean bowled by Walker for 19, and at the close of play Notts were 120 runs in arrears with only three wickets in hand. Present score and analysis:—

YORKSHIRE II. v. NOTTS II.

NOTTS WIN IN A SPORTING FINISH.

After establishing a substantial, and what looked like a winning, lead on the first day's play, the Yorkshire Second Eleven had the tables completely turned upon them at Trent Bridge yesterday, and in the end they suffered the Notts Second Eleven to gain a narrow victory by two wickets. At the conclusion of the first day's play Notts were 120 runs in arrears, and had only three wickets in hand. That they should win in the second day's play suggests either that they must have made a remarkable recovery or that Yorkshire's cricket must have been very poor. Both conclusions are true. The Rev. H. Staunton served his side well in enabling them to save the follow-on, and Barnes proved his individual merit by a valuable bowling performance in which he took six of Yorkshire's wickets in their second innings for 30 runs.

Considering that the wicket was plumb and easy, it is reasonable to add that the accomplishment of that performance was in part due to weaknesses in the batting. Much of the batting, indeed, was rank bad, and not a man on the side got into double figures. Even so, Yorkshire, with a lead of 104 runs, might have won if they had had the assistance of another bowler of the calibre of Broadbent. He bore the brunt of the attack and bore it well, but from the other end, the bowling—except for three or four of Blackburn's overs—was of very indifferent quality. Still, Notts had all their work cut out to win. Yorkshire's work in the field was very much more effective than it had been at the wickets, the smart fielding of Bates, for instance, at short leg and first slip, and the effective wicket-keeping of Tolson being among the best features of the day's play. Notts had to proceed very carefully, and it was due to the very steady batting of James, with his faultlessly played innings of 49, and of Stapleton, with his not out 28, that the home county were able eventually to add another to their sequence of successes over the Yorkshire Second Eleven.

The game in the course of yesterday's play was of a very see-saw character. In the morning, for instance, it appeared very unlikely that Notts would save the follow-on, but while Barnes, Riley, and Clifton were all got rid of cheaply, the Rev. H. Staunton realised the necessity of the situation, and with his not-out innings of 35, occupied mainly by onsp off-drives, he just managed to save the follow-on by three runs. Forty minutes' play in the morning sufficed to bring the Notts innings to a close, after it had lasted in all nearly two hours and a half. Yorkshire in their second venture were only at the wickets two hours. They found the fielding of the home side much better than it had been on the previous day, not a single catch being dropped. Barnes, too, bowled exceedingly well, and caused much trouble to the early batsmen in particular with his breaks from the off, getting Hardisty and Robinson caught in the slips, and Bates taken at the wicket whilst only 20 runs had been scored. Turner was well beaten by Riley, and Oldroyd made the mistake of playing forward to a half-volley from Barnes, which took his off stump. Richardson and Mr. Tattersall looked like making a stand until the former was given out leg before wicket to Clifton, and another good catch by Stapleton at the wicket dismissed Broadbent, while Mr. Tattersall was out to a catch in the slips by Iremonger, off Clifton.

Thus eight of the Yorkshire wickets were down at the luncheon interval for 55, and a quarter of an hour's play on the resumption sufficed to bring the venture to a close. A very smart catch by Iremonger at point dismissed Tolson, and Walker was altogether too late for a fast ball from Barnes, the innings closing for 67, which left Notts 165 to get to win.

James, who opened the Notts innings along with Mr. Hemingway, laid the foundation of the home county's victory by his steady batting. He at first scored freely both off Broadbent and Walker, but when the Sheffield professional changed over to bowl from the pavilion end, runs were more difficult to obtain, and no batsman through the remainder of the innings seemed able to play his bowling with certainty. The first wicket—that of Mr. Hemingway—fell at 39 when Blackburn went on to bowl, Tolson bringing off a splendid catch at the wicket from the Barnesian men's third ball. Another catch at the wicket dismissed Lee at 53, but the score had been run up to 92 for three wickets before James had his balls dislodged by a ball of perfect length from Broadbent. Iremonger was well caught in the long field by Robinson, Armstrong was completely beaten by a fast ball in Richardson's second over, and the Yorkshiremen's hopes rose when Whysall was given out "l b w" to Broadbent, making six wickets down for 113.

Stapleton, however, had meanwhile come in to cause trouble, and on being joined by the Rev. H. Staunton, he proceeded by patient play to wear down the bowling. Occasionally he opened his shoulders, as, for instance, when he hit Broadbent over the on-boundary for six. So the score mounted to 145, at which figure Mr. Staunton was dismissed by Blackburn, who had just gone on to bowl again. At 157—when eight runs were still required for victory—Riley was cleverly stumped by Tolson. The game had now reached a very critical stage, and anything seemed possible, but after Clifton had luckily nicked a four and a two, Stapleton settled the issue, Notts winning by two wickets. The opening day's play in this match was interesting and even, the University scoring 157 for six wickets after Sussex had been dismissed for 157. For getting rid of the county for such a total, Cambridge owed much to the fast bowling of Cowie, who took the first five wickets for 29 runs. After seven men had been dismissed for 89, Leach helped Chaplin to add 58, but he was missed at square-leg by Mann when only 3. Cambridge had two wickets down for 9 and three for 40, but Ireland and Falcon put on 76 in an hour and Mann and Susskind 35. Ireland made his 60 without a mistake of any kind and hit ten 4's. A good innings on the part of Collins and a useful 24 by Lockhart enabled the University to obtain a lead of 78 on the innings, but the County afterwards did so well that by the end of the day they had made 201 for the loss of only three wickets. Vine and Robert Relf laid the foundation of the good score by making 90 for the first wicket, and Killick and Cox subsequently made runs freely on a wicket rendered easy by rain which delayed the game for a couple of hours. On the third morning the last seven wickets added 149, thanks chiefly to Cox and Relf (A. E.) who put on 70 for the fourth wicket and to Chaplin and Lea, who added 73 for the ninth. Cox batted two hours and a half for his 52, and Relf made five 4's in his 48. The University were set 273 to win. A fair start was made, the total being up to 55 ere the second wicket fell.
