In the Cornwall first innings, when the eighth wicket fell at 66, the home side still required 53 runs to save the follow on and this was achieved by J C Bickford-Smith and Hawken, who added 66 for the ninth wicket. In their second innings, Cornwall were set a victory target of 222 runs in ? hours. For the winners, Webb took 10 wickets in the match for 73 runs, including 8 for 49 in the Cornwall second innings. There were 11 fours in Gordon's 68. For the losers, W N Bickford-Smith top-scored with 44, which contained 9 fours.

CORNWALL v. DORSET.

Cornwall entered on their last engagement in the competition at Truro on Monday with Dorset. The visitors batted first, and lost Sewall and Bolton with 13 runs on the board. Knight scored freely, and was missed at cover point, but Vibart snapped him at the wicket. Greenhill was badly missed at extra cover by J. C. Bickford-Smith, when he had made 11, but Arundell was smartly taken in the slips by Whitworth. Webb was missed before he had scored, and these mistakes proved expensive, both Webb and Greenhill putting on over 40 runs each. Whiting accepted a hot return from the latter, and half the side were out for 82. Webb, Gordon, Cummins, and Harrison put on useful scores, and the score stood at 180 with six wickets down. Tressawna then went on, and with his second ball beat Webb and Trevarthen flushed off the innings with the score at 222, made in 3 1/2 hours. Nearly three hours remained for play, when Cornwall commenced their innings. W. N. Bickford-Smith scored 13 out of the 16 registered before he left, and with Coad and Whitworth in play was painfully slow. The home batsmen slumped very feebly, and eight wickets went down for 59 runs, which took two hours to make. Whitworth was batting eighty minutes for his 12 runs, and displayed solid defence, but lacked enterprise, and failed to pick out the loose balls. When J. C. Bickford-Smith and Hawken came together 54 runs were required to save the follow on. The former hit with delightful freedom, and Hawken played sound cricket, and in forty minutes the couple added 63. The innings closed just on time, Dorset leading on the first innings by 82.

Dorset on Tuesday put on 100 before the fourth wicket fell, but after Arundell left, Gordon, whose total included eleven 4's, received little assistance from the rest, Trevarthen and Whiting, going on with the score at 139, taking the last three wickets at that total. Cornwall were set 222 to win, and lost Tressawna with 5 on the board. W. N. Bickford-Smith made 44 out of the 55 registered whilst he was at the wickets, hitting nine 4's, and Whitworth was batting 50 minutes for his eleven. Most of the other batsmen scored consistently, but Webb was in sterling form with the ball, and took the last eight wickets, the innings closing at 3.30 for 156, Dorset winning by 65 runs. MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP

CORNWALL v. DORSET.

This match, previously arranged to take place at Newquay, opened at Truro, on Monday. The weather was fine, but the attendance was not large. Obtaining first knock the visitors' start proved far from satisfactory, only a dozen runs standing to their credit, which Sowell was clean bowled by the Kennace pro. With the addition of a single, and the third over in progress, Bolton fell to a catch at cover-point by Treasawna. At 19, Knight came very near dismissal, two successive shots of his coming perilously near Treasawna, but despite the home skipper's best efforts they proved to be outside the limit of his reach. Fortune still continued to smile on Knight, Treasawna being at fault with a chance, whilst the batsman was almost run out. With the substitution of W. N. Bickford-Smith for Whiting, his career quickly terminated, the Cornish keeper taking him behind the wicket. Greenhill had quickly run up a dozen, including a couple of boundaries, when J. C. Bickford-Smith dropped a catch at extra-cover. Arundell, who opened the innings, was next to leave, being well-taken by Whitworth, following an unsuccessful appeal by Hawken for obstruction. Greenhill, proudest by his early escape, now created the bowling with scant courtesy, and Trevarthen shared the attack in place of Hawken. Eventually, he returned one of Whiting's deliveries to the trundler, after making 46. During his stay at the wickets, he reached the boundary on seven occasions, once for six. Vibart mis-timed a delivery from Guy, and received temporary injury.

The lunch score of 119 for five had increased to 142, when Gordon was well taken on the boundary line by Whitworth. Runs came steadily on Cummings joining Webb, and Treasawna relieved Whiting. With his second delivery he accounted for Webb's wicket. Harrison and Cummings registered the double century, but with the substitution of Trevarthen for Hawken, the Helston bowler captured the last three wickets in two overs, the innings closing for 222.

When W. N. Bickford-Smith, who opened with Whitworth, had completed 13 out of a total of 18, Cummings reached his stumps. Coad and Whitworth treated the bowling with respect the scoring being very slow. At 53 Coad played one into the hands of Webb (fielding at point), but the chance was not accepted. The mistake, however, did not prove an expensive one, Stacey beating him shortly after. Vibart and Whitworth did not long survive each other, the latter's total being 12—the result of 60 minutes' play. The bowlers now took charge of the game, and Treasawna, Trevarthen, Romer, and Guy were dismissed after contributing small scores. Everything pointed to a follow-on, 53 runs being required and only two wickets to fall. But J. C. Bickford-Smith and Hawken exceeded expectations, and the scoring became faster than at any previous period. One over of Stacey's yielded 13, and this was followed by a change in the attack. With the score standing at 132, Webb held one from J. C. Bickford-Smith, after he had contributed the highest score of the innings—42. The partnership, which was most opportune, realised 63 runs, and produced by far the best cricket of the day. Hawken and Whiting added another eight runs, and Cornwall left off 82 runs in arrears. A feature of the day was the low number of "extras," Vibart only having a single leg-bye registered against him out of a total of 222, whilst Greenhill's extras amounted to two.

The attendance at the opening of the second day was very meagre, but improved as time progressed; at no time, however, did it exceed that of the previous day—about 100. Vibart's injury, sustained on Monday, proved more serious than was anticipated, necessitating a change of keepers. J. C. Bickford-Smith took his stand behind the stumps, whilst Vibart occupied a position in the field. Arundell and Greenhill opened the innings, but the latter was quickly disposed of, only five runs being up. A feature of the innings was the numerous changes effected in the home bowling. This proved successful, as is shown by the scores, for with the exception of two players (Gordon, 68, and Arundell, 33), only one of the remaining batsmen reached double figures. Whiting, who relieved Guy at 130, secured the last two wickets in one over, without any addition to the score. Gordon, who took his stand at the crease at the fall of the third wicket, was second last to leave. His score was practically free from blemish, and included a variety of strokes.

Just prior to lunch Cornwall started on their rather difficult task of obtaining 222. W. N. Bickford-Smith going with Treasawna to the wickets. The latter, following an indifferent start, quickly returned, Cummings penetrating his defence. Whitworth and "W. N." stayed together until lunch-time arrived, and things looked more hopeful. The half-hour interval evidently suited the bowlers, for two wickets fell shortly after resuming. Vibart stopped the rot for a time, until Webb held a hot return. Hawken and Trevarthen hit out quite merrily, nor had the scoring terminated when these two were dismissed. Whiting and Romer made

the next stand, the Kennace pro. on one occasion lifting Webb out of the ground for six, but endeavouring to repeat the performance led to disaster, he being well taken on the boundary line by Bolton. Cornwall was defeated by 66 runs. Scores:—

After an idle day on Monday owing to rain the start of this match was delayed on Tuesday until noon and there were a couple of interruptions later. Surrey gained an advantage by winning the toss and late in the afternoon declared—prematurely, as many thought—with eight wickets down for 221, leaving Middlesex an hour in which to bat before stumps were drawn. Hayward was in an hour for 4, but Hobbs scored 50 out of 94 in 95 minutes by faultless and skilful cricket. The best batting of the day was shown by Campbell, who forced the game splendidly and obtained his 55 out of 80 in 50 minutes; he hit two 6's and six 4's in his delightful display. Hayes made his 69 in 135 minutes, but was not seen at his best, though his innings was a most valuable one. Middlesex quickly lost Douglas and Hendren, but by the end of the day Warner and Tarrant had taken the score to 47 without further loss. Yesterday the weather showed a great improvement, the conditions being almost reminiscent of summer. For some time runs came readily, chiefly from Warner, who played with confidence from the start. The follow-on was saved with only two men out, and it was not until the third wicket had added 62 in 65 minutes that Tarrant was caught at long-on. Then followed three useful stands, Hearne (J. W.) helping to put on 28, Baker 48, and Mann 42. The last-named hit freely and well for 32, though he was almost caught off Platt when 18. Warner reached 50 in 110 minutes and 100 in three hours and a-half; in all he made 137 out of 201 in 240 minutes, being first in and last out, and hit fourteen 4's and ten 3's in his chanceless display.
