In the same innings, the umpire Hughes had to retire after being hit on the ankle by a drive from Overton, and Miller temporarily took over his duties. Shortly before the start of the second Buckinghamshire innings, Shail received a telegram notifying him of an accident to his child, and he returned to Swindon. C G Fraser, the Chippenham wicket-keeper, agreed to take his place, but Lowndes declined to let him keep wicket. He caught Orton in the outfield. The 68 overs bowled by Wright in the match were the third highest of the season, and the 18 maidens he bowled in the Wiltshire first innings were the joint second highest of the season. The Buckinghamshire total of 249-9 wickets was the highest fourth innings total of the season. The match aggregate of 1038 runs was the second highest of the season. 8 hit wickets fell with 5 mins left.

WILTS Y. BUCKS.

Delightful weather favoured the opening of the return match at Chippenham on Monday. Wilts winning the toss began to bat on a good wicket with E. Newman and E. S. Warrilow, the latter having just completed a tour with Bury. Warrilow had just opened his score when he was taken in the slips. A. Newman joined his brother, and both gave an exhibition of superb cricket. Frith, off whom A. Newman scored several boundaries in succession, was displaced by Vickerstaff at 26. The game proceeded quietly, and at 46 Baker took the place of Wright, who was transferred to the other end. Vickerstaff retiring, 50 was reached in 47 minutes. At 64 E. Newman was caught behind the wicket by Shaw off Wright, having contributed a useful 15. Sellick followed, and A. Newman was applauded on reaching his 50, which were obtained in exactly an hour. Only five more runs were added to his when Newman was caught at mid-off by Lowndes, the third wicket falling for 78. His chief hits were eight 4's, two 3's, and four 2's. R. W. Awdry joined Sellick, who was nearly caught by the bowler, Baker, but soon afterwards he played on a ball from the same bowler, W. R. C. Laverton has been most unfortunate so far in the two county matches at Chippenham, he had just opened with a single when he had to retire for obstructing the wicket. With the captain and Awdry together the 100 went up as the result of 90 minutes' play. Miller was immediately afterwards bowled by Baker. J. R. Taylor filled the vacancy, and he remained with Awdry till the luncheon interval, when the score was 110 with six wickets down.

In the match against Monmouth last week Wilts gave a disappointing display each day on resuming play after lunch, but on Monday the reverse was the case; its most successful performance was at this period of the day's play. Awdry batted in splendid style, and some fine strokes were made by the young batsman from the Pewsey Vale. At 140 Frith again went on, Wright, whom he displaced, relieving Baker at the top end. The change was effectual, Frith dismissing Taylor with his second ball. Overton was the next to be associated with Awdry, and he began to hit with freedom. The second century was hoisted when the game had been in progress two hours and thirty-five minutes. Awdry was caught at mid-on, but the umpire had just declared "no ball." The ball, hit with great force by Overton, came in contact with the ankle of Mr. Hughes, one of the umpires, who was obliged to retire, and was unable to officiate for the remainder of the day; his place was temporarily taken by Mr. Miller. Kent relieved Vickerstaff, and 15 were obtained off his first over. Butler took the place of Wright at 226. Overton called to Awdry, but it was impossible for him to get to the other end, and he was run out. He was in two hours all but five minutes, during which 176 were obtained, his own contribution being 60. It was the most attractive batting display that has been witnessed in this part of the county for some time, and he was heartily applauded all round the ground on his retirement. Mitchell, who followed, was given a life. The partnership only lasted five minutes, Overton being defeated by Wright. He made a splendid stand, producing 45 runs in fifty minutes. The last wicket added a single, and the innings, which lasted three hours and ten minutes, closed for 280.

Dr. Weaver-Adams and T. R. Kent opened the innings for Bucks. The former was caught behind the wicket and the latter was taken at square leg. Orton had a brief stay, the third wicket falling for 57. With Russ and Lowndes the century was reached as the result of 65 minutes play, and when eight were added it was caught at cover. Lowndes, who was joined by Edwards, was given out leg before, a decision to which he demurred, and Mr. Miller, with his sportsmanlike spirit, was of opinion that a mistake had been made and allowed the batsman to resume play. Lowndes assisted in bringing the score to 140, when he was bowled by Mitchell. With nine more runs Edwards was given out leg before, and with the second ball from Mitchell Edwards had his balls disturbed. Wright was out to a marvellous left-hand catch taken low by Awdry, and Shaw was cleverly taken by Sellick, who disposed in the same way of Vickerstaff, after he was missed by Taylor. The innings closed at 6.10, having lasted two hours and twenty minutes.

Wiltshire, with the substantial lead of 85, opened its second innings, but only two overs were bowled before stumps were drawn for the day. Play was resumed on Tuesday punctually at the advertised hour, eleven o'clock. Miller (4) and Overton (1) who opened the innings the previous evening, opposed the bowling of Frith and Wright. In the first ball of the former's third over the captain was bowled. J. R. Taylor came in, and in the same over Overton hit Frith twice to the boundary. Dr. Weaver-Adam took the place of Frith at 49, and the half century was reached after 35 minutes' play. Overton took advantage of every possible run. The bowling was somewhat difficult and runs came slowly. With 48 to his credit Overton was nearly caught in the field. With a fine drive to the boundary he completed his 50 in exactly the same number of minutes, but with nine added he skied a ball which was easily taken in the slips by Vickerstaff. His chief hits were eight 4's, one 3, and three 2's. A. Newman partnered

Taylor, and delighted the spectators with his powerful hitting. The century appeared after one hour's play. At 123 Taylor in attempting to pull a ball to leg hit the wicket. He played sound cricket, and some of his strokes were remarkably fine. This young player gives promise of being a valuable acquisition to the county; his 37 included four 4's, one 3, and two 2's. R. W. Awdry joined Newman, and at the outside he did not appear comfortable with Dr. Adams' lob, but he soon got his eye in and runs came at an unusually quick pace. At 160 Baker went on, Wright going to the other end. When the score had reached 184, a ball off Baker was skied by Awdry and accepted by Ross at mid-on. The partnership produced 81 in half-an-hour, and it is a coincidence that the retiring batsman's chief hits were identical with those of Taylor. E. S. Warrilow became associated with Newman, and several changes took place in the bowling. Wright returned in favour of Ross, whose attack however was weak, runs coming freely. He was displaced by Vickerstaff at 194, and the double century appearing on the board after one hour and fifty-five minutes was the signal for applause. Both players continued to bat in magnificent style, but a separation came at 235, when Newman was taken in the slips by Baker. During his seventy-five minutes stay at the wicket 130 were added to the score, of which he contributed 72, it including eight 4's, four 3's, and three 2's. Warrilow soon afterwards shared the same fate, being taken in the slips by Vickerstaff off Baker. Laverton met with more success than in his previous effort and contributed 15, he being caught off Frith, who relieved Baker at 256. E. Newman did not trouble the scorers, and at the luncheon interval the score was 262 for eight wickets. It was thought that Miller having a load of 345 would have declared, but Sellick and Mitchell continued the innings, and the latter gave the spectators a most interesting display of vigorous hitting. The rate at which runs scored was really astonishing, and when the innings was declared closed at 2.30 the total was 312, no fewer than 50 being added in twenty minutes.

When Bucks entered upon its second innings at 2.45 the most it could hope for was to draw, having lost points on the first innings. Shall received a telegram of an accident to his child and he had to return to Swindon. Fraser, the Chippenham wicket keeper, consented to act as substitute, but the Bucks' captain would not permit his services being utilised as wicket keeper, which afterwards proved the weak spot in the eleven. We cannot but contrast the action of the Bucks' captain with that shown the previous day by Miller when he allowed an opponent who was given out by an experienced and impartial umpire for obstructing the wicket to continue his innings and subsequently add substantially to his score. Fraser has never been seen in the field at Chippenham but on this occasion he distinguished himself. Mr. Miller, who is no mean authority, described Fraser's fielding as brilliant. The innings for the greater part was uninteresting; it was evident the efforts of the players were directed towards making a draw. Edwards was at the wicket two hours and a half for 74. A good stand was also made by Wright, who maintained his wicket intact against all the efforts of the bowlers Miller had at his command. When the last man went in there still remained a quarter of an hour, but to the intense delight of the Bucks' representatives time arrived without a dissolution of the partnership. Wilts had, therefore, to be satisfied with the points gained in the first innings. Scores:—

Wilts v. Bucks.

This match was started at Chippenham on Monday, and although rain fell heavily through the night the wickets at 12 o'clock was as sound as could be. The Wiltshire team were slightly changed from last week when they played Monmouthshire, getting defeated by 8 wickets, Warrilow, Sellick, Mitchell and W. Shail being in the places of E. Trotman, W. C. Bambridge, Smith, and Sheppard. Winning the toss Wiltshire sent in E. Newman and E. S. Warrilow to start the innings, but Warrilow was disposed of for only one run, being caught by W. Adams. A. Newman then went in, and the two brothers getting together, played with confidence, till E. Newman was caught by Shaw, having made 15 runs. Sellick then joined A. Newman, who started hitting very hard, making five over the half century before he was caught out. R. W. Awdry, who made the best score of the day, went in, and carried his bat until it looked like his getting a century, but he was unfortunately run out, having only five more to get. Overton made a good score, getting a steadily-played 45. W. Shail then joined Mitchell at the wickets, the latter getting caught out by Lowndes. The Wilts innings then ended, they having made 280 runs, out of which there were 18 extras. Going in about 3.30, Bucks sent in Dr. Weaver-Adams and T. R. Kent. Adams was not in long, being caught out by Shail for four runs. M. D. C. Ross joined T. R. Kent, they making just 70 runs between them. Overton joined Ross, getting bowled out for 3 runs. Lowndes then went out to face the bowling, and after steady work compiled a well-made 41. Wright and H. L. Frith got together, when eight wickets had gone down, but Wright was caught by Awdry, having only made 2 towards the total. Vickerstaff, the last man to go in, made six runs, P. L. Frith being not out, and having 19 to his credit. Bucks were all out about 10 minutes before time for 197, Wilts having had by far the advantage of the first day's play. Mitchell did some good bowling, getting 8 wickets for 60 runs. A. M. Miller and Overton got the other two wickets between them, the former for 61 runs, and the latter for 13 runs. Having about another 10 minutes to time, the Wilts captain decided to go in for a couple of overs. A. M. Miller and Overton were sent in, and at the close of play the score stood, Miller, not out, 4; Overton, not out, 1.

WILTS v. DUCKS.

The return match between these teams commenced at Chippenham on Monday, in ideal weather. Wiltshire won the toss, and began on a good wicket, and the innings lasted three hours and ten minutes. Bucks were all out in two hours and ten minutes, and when stumps were drawn, the home county led by 69. Hughes, one of the umpires, had to retire, owing to receiving a severe blow on the ankle from a ball, driven with great force by Overton. On resuming on Tuesday, Wiltshire knocked up 312 runs for 8 wickets, and then declared. Bucks were left to get 396 runs to win—a task they could not accomplish. They, however, made one of their best scores of the season, and including 74 by Edwards and 54 by Wright, they contributed 249 runs for 9 wickets. Time did not permit of the game being finished, consequently Wiltshire claimed the points on the first innings. H. Baker (Wycombe) secured 4 wickets for 96 runs and 2 for 53.
