For the winners, there were 4 sixes, 17 fours, ? threes and ? twos in Spring's 116, scored in little over an hour. Mason's 72 included 1 six and 5 fours. In the Surrey first innings, Mason and Blackledge added 70 runs for the seventh wicket and Mason and Ruddy 65 runs for the eighth, whilst in the second innings Spring and Ruddy put on 75 runs for the eighth wicket. SURREY 2nd BEATS WILTS.

This match, the proceeds of which are set apart for the benefit of Overton, was commenced at the County Ground, Swindon, on Friday. The following excellent description of the game appeared in our Swindon contemporary, *The Evening North Wilts Herald*:—
Both counties were well represented, and the home side included two Swindon players in Pugh and C. S. Awdry, the former of whom had been in the county for a few days at Reading the previous day. Winning the toss was a questionable advantage, for, following the night's rain, the wicket was bound to play poorly at first, under the influence of a hot sun, with every prospect of a marked improvement as the day progressed. The chance fell to the Surrey captain, and he decided to take first innings. Batters turned out pretty well as had been anticipated, for the early batsmen were by no means over-enthusiastic, and the bowlers had so much to do that six men were out with but 15 runs registered. Newman claimed four of the wickets, and when he eventually went off only 11 runs had been obtained at his expense. The association of Mason and Blackledge led to an improvement in the Surrey outlook, for if this pair did not exactly master the bowling they played with confidence. Several changes in the attack were tried, but the total had been swelled by exactly 70 runs before Blackledge was out rather unluckily, peeling a ball from Miller into his wicket. The total was then 115, and Ratty kept Mason company until the luncheon interval, when there were 124 runs on the board. On the resumption the score mounted rapidly, Ratty hitting freely. The amateur was out at 179 with a hard hit 35 to his credit, and it may be noted that his first scoring stroke was a six from a straight drive on to the track. Mason soon followed for an admirably played 72, the value of his runs being enhanced by the fact that they were got at a critical time. He made one fine off drive for six, and also hit for 14. The innings closed for 187.

Pugh and C. S. Awdry gave Wilts a capital send-off, and they scored so freely off Wilkinson and Spring that they retired in favour of Blackledge and Jewell. Of the latter's first ball Pugh was missed in the long field by Goatly, but the same over witnessed the dismissal of Awdry through the medium of a genuine "googly." This led up to a Swindon partnership at the wicket, Mathews joining Pugh. The latter did the bulk of the scoring, and came down on any loose ball with characteristic force. Nor was Mathews by any means idle, and the score mounted apace. The advent of Goatly at Jewell's end, however, broke up the partnership, for Pugh cut a ball into the hands of the third man and retired with 45 to his account. Newman had a short stay, but Awdry, after a shaky opening, hit with power, and once lifted Spring right into the pavilion enclosure, where Pugh brought off a fine catch! Mathews, joined his partner in the hitting duologues, and the bowlers were in distinct difficulties until Jewell resumed and got Awdry easily taken at point. Warrilow only stayed to register seven, and made way for Grant, on whose arrival Mathews reached half a century, and was then missed in the "deep" by Goatly. Grant failed to get off the mark, and Overton only just "broke his duck" before succumbing to Spring. Miller was out in the same over, and the eighth wicket was down with 171 on the records. Luce remained with Mathews until the game was a tie, and Smith put Wilts ahead from the first ball he received. Chief interest then centred round the possibility of Mathews reaching his century. He got most of the bowling, and amid loud cheering reached the three-figure mark. The Swindon man was out directly afterwards, and the innings closed for 211. Mathews had played free cricket, and his innings was marred by only the one chance mentioned. His chief hits were ten 4's, four 3's, and thirteen 2's.

In a majority of 24, Surrey lost two men cheaply, but Knight and Jewell improved the complexion of affairs; and when stumps were drawn for the day the visitors were 28 runs to the good, with eight wickets to fall.

When the game was resumed on Saturday the sky was very overcast and the outlook by no means promising. Knight was out with no addition to his score, but Jewell and Wilkinson carried the figures along at a respectable rate. The former played attractive cricket, and when he was sent back at 108 he had put 41 to his credit. Shortly afterwards there was an adjournment on account of a shower and bad light. Spring celebrated the resumption with a grand drive for six on to the track. The fourth wicket had produced a useful 61 runs when Wilkinson was bowled, and Surrey now had a substantial lead. Mason failed to repeat his success of the first innings, and made way for Blackledge. Spring got his second six at Overton's expense with a glorious drive which cleared the pavilion rails, and his was truly a Jossopian innings. He was at last brilliantly caught for 116, which included four 6's and seventeen 4's. He was batting very little more than an hour, and he gave one of the finest displays of hard hitting ever seen on the ground. The innings closed for 284, leaving Wilts to get 281 to win.

The last Surrey wicket fell on the stroke of the interval, and when the game was resumed Wilts entered on their task of getting the 281 runs necessary to win. Only one over had been sent down when a sharp shower fell, and the players sought shelter. When they took the field again Pugh was dismissed, and then came a longer adjournment than before, consequent on a heavy fall of rain. It was after four o'clock before the proceedings could be re-commenced, and then Mathews was caught at the wicket. The bowlers were somewhat handicapped by having to handle a wet ball, and sawdust was in great request. A capital stand was made by C. S. Awdry and Newman, and when the former, for the second time in the match, fell a victim to Vigar's vigilance he had made 45. R. W. Awdry was caught behind the wicket, and Newman was adjudged to be stumped, although he did not appear to agree with the official ruling. Matters were now in a bad way for the home side, but Warrilow and Grant came into the breach and caused the bowlers considerable trouble. The old Chippenham player scarcely shap'd with the confidence reminiscent of his most palmy days, and he was morally out on more than one occasion, but he remained undefeated until Spring, going on a second time, bowled him with a beautiful ball. The innings lasted some time longer, but few runs were added. Overton was easily stumped, Miller begged a brace, Luce was bowled, and Grant was last out for a well-compiled 46. He made a great effort on behalf of his side, and it was none the less meritorious because the end was not achieved. Wiltshire were all out shortly after
