SPORTING NOTES.

THURSDAY.

The cricket season is moving on apace, the local competitions are now getting into full swing, and the county team will soon be busy. I sincerely hope the county team will be able to make a better show this summer. There does not seem to be much prospect of any very valuable recruits for the side, despite the number of clubs in the town and county. Local players are very good in their class, no doubt, but, unfortunately, that class does not seem good enough for county cricket, even though it is only of the minor variety. It is not for the lack of good grounds to play upon—in Cambridge at all events—for Parker's Piece is a magnificent training ground, such as few towns possess, and there are college grounds available during the vacation. Few towns can offer such facilities for cricket as Cambridge can, and yet superior talent seems hard to find. The county captain is doing his best and giving preliminary trials to promising players, and it is to be hoped that he may be rewarded by finding some good men.

At present it seems very much as if local cricket has got into a very mediocre rut. There are, as I have said, plenty of clubs, but the class of cricket they play is not good enough. The Senior League does not improve, to put it mildly, and there seems a dearth of good young players to fill the places of those who are getting on in years. There is need of something to lift things up a bit. There are plenty of good cricketers who could render a good account of themselves in better company, but it is just the practice in better company that is lacking hereabouts. There are few towns of anything like the size of Cambridge that have not a representative team, and it would be a rare good thing for local cricket if a Town Club could be formed in Cambridge.

I suppose there is some good reason why such a club has not been started, but I should very much like to know what it is. I could give a number of bad ones, one of which is the question of support; but I cannot think that there are not sufficient good sportsmen in the town to keep a representative club going. If such a club was started it ought not to be difficult to arrange matches of a superior class to those at present played in the locality. It is, of course, too late to think about such a club for this season, but there is no reason why those who have the interest of the game at heart should not put their heads together with a view to seeing what could be done in that direction for next season. With a club like that in the town there might be a chance of discovering some of the budding Haywards who are at present languishing for lack of opportunities. Certainly the cricket that is played in Cambridge at the present time ought not to represent the summit of local players' ambitions. Who will leave the first brick?

Turning to the Senior League, I find W. C. Hunt, whom I hope to see rendering a good account of himself in the county eleven before long, is keeping up his form well. He was unlucky last week in not getting his century for Albert Institute against Rodney. He gave a fine display, included in his hits being a couple of 6's and eleven 4's, and in one over from Clements he helped himself to 47. But for him the Institute would have fared badly. For Rodney, Stubbings did a good piece of bowling, taking three wickets in one over, and polishing off the Albert innings in quick time. Darby, Kitchener and F. Hayward gave Rodney a good start, and Titcomb, after being in difficulties at first with Baigh's slows, took out his bat for 19, Rodney winning with three wickets to spare.

Regent were given a lively leather-hunt by St. Giles' on Saturday, but they stood the ordeal remarkably well, and played so well when their turn came to bat that they were able to share the points. They did extremely well to hit up 136 for four in the two hours that St. Giles' left them for play, and they are to be congratulated upon coming so well out of the encounter after having such a formidable score run up against them. The members of the county team have been having quite a busy time of late, but I am glad to see that they continue to "make good" by pulling in the points. The return with Norfolk was the initial home fixture, and the visitors had to own up to defeat on the first innings. Commencing as the match did on a Wednesday, and considering the reputation that the county team have now won for themselves this season, one would have thought that the targets at Fenner's would have been kept fairly busy on Thursday afternoon, when so many people in Cambridge are set free by the early closing of the shops. Instead of this one saw a repetition of last year's game—a mere handful of spectators at the outside—which seems to give colour to the argument that Cambridge cricketers are willing enough to turn up in large numbers at anything that is free, but dislike putting their hands in their pockets. This may be true of football, but it appears to be so with cricket. Against this argument that Senior League matches on Parker's Piece are more interesting and scarcely less raised, as regards the Junior Cup matches have been much better than the League matches.

However, whatever may be the cause of the present state of affairs, the officials may console themselves with the reflection that those who stayed away missed a very good game. Cambs' success was due to several reasons. First, the players—H. Tebbutt, K. G. Reid and Coulson. Before lunch on the first day the Norfolk batsmen ended a perfect wicket, and the first wicket went down for 224. This was not at all a pleasing prospect for the homesters, but afterwards Coulson got on the target and stayed there to such effect that the remainder left for an additional 116. Then when the homesters were in, Tebbutt and K. G. Reid both made centuries. The success of the former was extremely popular, for the fact that he is, he has been very unlucky during the last few seasons. On this occasion he was only batting for a couple of hours, his brilliant innings including two 6's and seventeen 4's. His batting figures for this season are 0, 6, 47, 14, 3, 127. Except for the occasional one or two rather risky strokes, he played almost perfect cricket. Reid's century was the first that he has made. It occupied him 200 and 10 minutes, and he gave only one chance, that being to the wicket-keeper when at 69.

On Friday Cambs. posted away to Luton to play Leeds. Here they were not quite so fortunate as in some matches, being successful in getting one point only. However, on the principle that half a loaf is better than none, one must not grumble. Cambs' 212 was fairly cramped by Leeds with 385. This left the county 173 to get to save the innings' defeat. A task as this appeared, it began to seem rather difficult in view of the rapidity with which the wickets fell. Fortunately, Cambs. this time were a batting side, and to this they owe the retention of one point out of the five. H. C. Tebbutt and Watts got together, and played with caution, helped to get their side out of trouble. Both men are usually rapid scorers, but they possess the inestimable boon of playing with their heads as well. In this case, instead of letting out they kept themselves well in hand, and so saved the situation.

Strong batting side as they are, Cambs. were still left with the moderate scores put up by Lincolnshire at Spalding at the commencement of the week, and returned home without even one point as a solace for their exertions. On the first innings they led by two runs, but Lincolnshire went 20 better on their second knock. King had the satisfaction of playing one of his best games in the course of making his 77. The first day was all in favour of the bowlers, and King was the only man to master the deliveries of the Lincolnshire men. G. A. Rose was having an off day, but Hunt stopped the home county from doing too much in their second innings. It is to be hoped that this failure does not mean a recurrence of Cambs' bad luck, which would mean a state of affairs no one would like to see after their recent run of prosperity.

Signs that the season is soon coming to an end are found when one glances at the fixture list. In the Cambs. Senior League four matches remain to be played to end the competition. St. Giles should stay at the top of the poll, although to do this they will need a more effective set of bowlers than they seemed to possess last Thursday against Albert Institute. The Institute were certainly in proper batting form, and it is a pity that the present system of giving points in a League competition should deprive a team from taking the brunt when they do so well, as in the present case. Much of their success was due to W. Hunt's century, in the getting of which Wolf was of valuable assistance through making a soft catch at 44. The St. Giles' men, I understand, wasted some time in getting to the wickets, or the game might have finished in a more advanced stage. Another cause of complaint was the ground, which was rather rough in places. Jack Richardson had the most cause to grumble, as a ball from Barker nearly closed his left eye.

Whether or not I am to feel gratified at the success I made last week that the test in League matches on the Piece should be removed from the danger zone having been acted upon, is a matter of opinion, but at any rate I noticed that in the Rodney v. Camden match on Saturday the test was placed in a far more suitable position than it has usually occupied. Not only was it out of the reach of the hard hitters, but from the scorers' table one was able to see something of the Cup match in progress on the Electric Light pitch. This was very nice, and the League match was inclined to be dull, and the Cup was, judging by the applause, rather exciting. Rodney reached 100 after an hour's batting, T. Brown and Stibben being responsible for a good half of that total. The bowling of Constable and R. Phillips caused the rest to leave very cheaply, and the Camden followed the advantage thus gained by winning with four

wickets to spare. P. A. French's 61 was well played for, but the number of byes registered was much too large.
