PROSPECTS FOR THE COMING SEASON.

THE OUTLOOK OF THE OSSETT CLUB.

The approach of the cricket season—indeed the arrival of it, if one may judge by the activity already displayed by some local clubs—is welcome to all who love the game, after the long winter recess, during which football holds the day as the most popular national pastime. Never were the prospects of the Ossett Club brighter or more promising. Since last season there have been important changes, not the least of which has been in the financial position of the club, under the magical influence of a gold-creating bazaar. That, however, is not what concerns us most, in inquiring what is the outlook of the cricket team, rather than of the club as a whole, during the season 1911, just commencing.

One thing is certain, the eleven will be much stronger than it was last season. Then, their performances, having in mind the position they occupy in what may be described as first-class club cricket, were only moderate. The eleven season was easy to recognise. The eleven needed a little more solidity in the batting, and a good deal more sting in the bowling. Since last season closed, the committee have set about remedying both defects, and there is every confidence that they have succeeded. Pepall, who was a failure, is replaced by Hartington, who is so well-known in this district that he needs no introduction. For several seasons he has been one of the most effective fast bowlers in the West Riding. Last year he played with Featherstone, and before that with Dewsbury and Savile and Chickenley, and while with the two last-named clubs the Ossett batsmen more than once had a taste of his quality. He will strengthen the bowling immeasurably, and, with Radley and Denton maintaining their form, there should be no uneasiness about the attack. But Hartington is not merely a bowler. He can use a bat to good purpose, and in our opinion the club could hardly have done better than to secure his services.

As to the rest of the eleven, we hear that P. Megson is not likely to be seen in the Ossett ranks, but notwithstanding that, and in addition to Hartington's help, the batting strength should be materially increased, first, by the return of Herbert Giggal, and, second, the addition of S. Grimshaw, of Batley. The loss of Giggal, consequent upon his removal to Birmingham, was a serious one, and his return all the more welcome on that account. He and Joe Megson used to make an excellent first wicket pair, both being forcing batsmen of the type calculated to upset the bowling, and if Giggal can reproduce his old form, and especially that attractive off-drive of his, he will be a very serviceable member of the team. Grimshaw is a type of batsman, for whom there is room in any team; not a punishing player, but of the correct, straight-bat school, that after all is at the foundation of good batting. Add to these players, A. F. Glover, the stout-hearted captain, Radley, Denton, Armitage, Whitehead and the two promising Horbury Bridge players who joined last season, Astin and Cawthorne, with Plewright behind the wicket, supplemented, it is to be hoped, before the season is over, by one or two of the best of the youngsters, and the combination strikes one as likely to improve materially upon last season's results. Compared with last year's, it is materially stronger in bowling and batting alike.

To prophecy is to invite disaster, but with a strong team like this, we shall be disappointed if the Ossett Club does not make a bold bid for the championship of the Yorkshire Council—in which competition they have an excellent record—and if they do not break through the long sequence of failures in the Heavy Woollen cup competition. That it is their turn to win will be admitted. A few changes in the fixture list will be noted. We understand that the disappearance of Batley, Birstall and Spen from the list of clubs to be played is due to difficulties in arranging fixtures, caused by the formation of the Heavy Woollen League, which the Ossett Club has thought it wise not to join. One or two other clubs also have dropped out, their places being taken by Scarborough and Rastrick, but the list remains a formidable one—especially in June, when there will be no fewer than nine matches—and the ability of the team is sure to be well tested. They could not take a more appropriate opportunity of winning the Yorkshire Council championship, seeing that this year's president of that body is Councillor T. W. Phillips, the president of the Ossett Club.

In another way the season promises to be an important one. The Ossett ground has been selected as the venue of a two days' match, to be played on Monday and Tuesday, May 22nd and 23rd, between the Yorkshire county second eleven, and a team chosen from Yorkshire Council clubs, which has been arranged with the idea of searching out promising players who may develop into useful acquisitions to the county eleven.

OTHER OSSETT CLUBS.

The majority of the junior cricket clubs in Ossett and district commence their cricket season this week-end, and no doubt much anxiety is being felt by most young cricketers about the weather, both during the holidays and the coming summer. At the time of writing the weather has been beautifully fine for a day or two, and according to the prophets, usually a most optimistic race of men, it is likely to continue over the holidays. But one Easter makes not a cricket season. According to a learned professor, the Gulf Stream, which is alleged to have such a great effect on the English climate, is running stronger this year than it did a year ago, and we are told that we may expect a more summer-like summer than has been recorded for a year or two in consequence.

There have been many changes in the local junior cricket world during the "close season," the most striking being the demise of the Ossett and District Medal Competition and the birth of a new Ossett and District League. The president of the new Ossett League is Councillor T. W. Phillips, Mr. W. A. Smith, whose organising capabilities have been appreciated by more than one cricket and football club in the past, is the secretary, while Mr. C. H. Sheldrake occupies the position of treasurer. A dozen clubs have joined, as follows:—Ossett Central Baptists, South-parade Wesleyans, South-parade Primitives, South Ossett Baptists, Ossett Temperance, New Scarborough Adult School, Savile Town Gasworks, Crigglestone Mount Zion, Durker, Flashdyke, Kirkhamgate, and Outwood U.M.C. It will be noted that the majority of the clubs who were members of last year's medal competition have registered themselves in the new organisation, the exceptions being the Dale-street United Methodist Church club and Chickenley Wesleyans. The trophy is a silver cup, which the winning team hold for one year. The system of competition is based on points, a win counting two points and a draw one point, and the club with the largest number of points when the curtain falls on the season, will be the champion club of the league. Prizes, in the shape of a bat and a silver-mounted umbrella, have been offered to the players heading the batting and bowling averages, by Mr. F. Sugg, of Liverpool, and Mr. J. T. Auty, of Ossett, respectively.

The Central Baptists, who opened their season on Saturday last, have made several additions to their strength, which, they hope, will have no small influence on their success in the league. The additions referred to are Derry and Westmoreland, both of the United Methodist Church team, players who did very well last year, and T. Gorrick, who has played occasionally with the Ossett second eleven. They have also to mourn the loss of one of their best players, W. Raynor, who for the three years during which the club has been in existence has carried off the prizes for both bowling and batting. He is giving up playing. A large number of persons have become members of the club, and as a result the committee hope to place in the field a team stronger than any of their previous ones, especially in the batting department. W. Winpenny acts as leader, and is supported by H. Taylor. The fact that they won their first match augurs well for them.

The South-parade Wesleyan club commences a fresh season in a very cheerful frame of mind. Their force numbers thirty playing members, from whom they hope to pick a strong team. One thing is assured. The team will be no weaker than the one last year which succeeded in getting into the semi-final for the "Ossett medals," before it was defeated by Chickenley Wesleyans. W. H. Ward, the winner of both averages last year, is to be skipper, with C. Redfearn as vice-captain.

Perhaps the new season dawns on no other junior club more brightly than it does on the organisation connected with the South Ossett Church Institute. Enthusiasm in the game has grown amongst the members by leaps and bounds during the past year, and now the club is in a good sound position, financially and otherwise. From a good membership the committee expect to realise a "rattling team" to fight for the trophy of the Denby Grange and District League. It is the only Ossett team in the competition. Last year they finished fourth in the league, but this year they seriously intend planting their banner at the top. All the old players are standing by the team, amongst them being F. Cater, whose average for batting was 29 last year. A second team is also being run.

The Old Roundwood club has had a hard struggle during the last few years, there being a great lack of interest, but this spring life seems to have returned to it, and a successful

season is anticipated. A new secretary, Mr. Tom Garforth, has been appointed, and he has been successful in arranging an interesting list of fixtures with teams in the Leeds Second League. The club is running two teams, the second also being entered in the Leeds League. Most of the old players are eligible to play, whilst among several newcomers is an old Crigglestone player, B. Butcher, who last season acted as professional to the Barnsley Old club. He will play with the Roundwood team as an amateur. Aveyard will officiate as captain, while W. Stringer will captain the second team. Both teams commence active service in a fortnight.

The club connected with the Ossett Green Congregational Church Institute is now entering upon the third season of its existence, and this season appears more promising than its predecessors. Procrastination is the thief of time, we are told, a saying which points to the reason why the club has not joined any local league or competition, and will therefore play only friendly matches. A capital list of fixtures has been arranged by the secretary, Mr. H. E. Wilby, and the team is expected to be at least equal to that which in the last two seasons lost only six matches altogether. All the old players have undertaken to play, including G. Morton, H. Turner, T. Prince, W. Lister, E. L. Gledhill and R. A. Fawcett. The chief is to be George Morton, with Harvey Turner as assistant, while a second eleven is to be captained by Arnold Metcalfe.

The Ossett Wesleyan club, whilst hoping and anticipating a successful season, is rather uncertain about the probable strength of its team. Of one thing they are certain, and that is that they have a membership quite as strong as in previous years. Last year they competed for the Ossett medals, but this year they are going to try to capture the trophy offered in the league in the next town, Horbury. As a result of the labours of the secretary and vice-captain, Mr. J. T. Smith, a good programme has been arranged, under which the team will meet most of the local junior clubs. Mr. Herbert Mitchell is the captain.

The Primitives of the South-parade, Ossett, are just now experiencing a revival of interest. A larger membership has brought the club into touch with new players, and as all the old players are available, the club hopes to send out a strong team to do battle in the newly-formed local junior league.

South Ossett Baptists, who are also trying for league honours, opened their season on Saturday last. Whilst not being one of the strongest teams in the league, they are looking forward to an enjoyable season. J. C. Ross captains the eleven, and Mr. A. Watson is his vice.

The club connected with the United Methodist Church, Dale-street, is not this season identified with any league, their matches being purely friendly ones. There is no great promise of a very strong team, owing to the fact that Derry and Westmoreland, two of the most reliable men, have gone over to the Central Baptists.

CHICKENLEY.

The Chickenley Cricket Club in the last few years has borne its full share of the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune with commendable fortitude. In the competition of the purse-strings the Chickenley Club has been worsted. Indeed, it has been almost a passive resister, having no deep pockets which, in these days of commercial cricket, are necessary as an antidote against the allurements with which promising young players are beset by other and more wealthy clubs. So the Chickenley eleven has been under a cloud—temporarily, it is hoped, in the interests of cricket, though it must be confessed that at the moment the silver lining is not very prominent. Hope springs eternal in the Chickenley breast, and notwithstanding that the eleven will be largely composed as it was last season—when, to be candid, it was merely a shadow of its former self—there is no lack of confidence in commencing another season. The suggestion made—jocularly, perhaps—at the annual meeting that a professional fund should be opened has not borne fruit, and no accession of strength may be expected from this source. But "Dick" Bailes is a tower of strength in himself, and he will again be the mainstay of the eleven. J. H. Ward has left the club, but Percy Megson, who last year played with Ossett, has returned. J. A. Yonge, the headmaster of Silcoates School, and a big hitter when he gets going, who joined the eleven in the middle of last season, hopes to be a more regular player, and G. W. Firth, a young Mirfield cricketer, who promises to develop into an effective fast bowler, will again be available. Something has been said of a couple of recruits from the Bradford district, one a coloured gentleman from South Africa, but this does not appear to have any solid foundation. For the rest, some of the old hands—W. H. Senior, a player of 26 years' standing—and a few of the more promising youngsters will complete the bill. The club will take part in the Heavy Woollen League in connection with the Yorkshire Council, and will once again appear in the cup-ties. Councillor J. Greenwood is the president, and Mr. S. Rigg the secretary.

HORBURY CLUBS.

There are about four clubs of note in Horbury, namely, Horbury Bridge St. John's, Messrs. C. Roberts and Co., Ltd. (Horbury Junction Waggon Works), Horbury and District Railwaymen, and Horbury St. Peter's. The Horbury Tradesmen's Club, which has played a full list of matches for several seasons, has disbanded. As usual, the old-established Horbury Bridge Club ranks first in importance, and its members are anticipating the season with renewed hope. The majority of both the first and second team matches will be played under the auspices of the Wakefield and District League, and the premier eleven will compete in the Wakefield and District Cup Competition, while the second team will try their fortune in the Horbury and District Junior Cup contest, meeting representatives of Wakefield Trinity, on the latter's ground, in the first round. The clubs to be encountered are pretty much the same as in previous years. Walter Audsley has been chosen captain of the first team, with E. Allatt as vice-captain, and George Peace will have charge of the second team with Bernard Lister as deputy.

The club associated with the wagon works of Messrs. C. Roberts and Co., Ltd., Horbury Junction, is again running a couple of teams, both of which are striving for honours in the Denby Grange and District League. Mr. T. Speight, the secretary, has succeeded in arranging a full list of fixtures, including several friendly matches. H. Charlesworth will captain the first team, with T. Hutchins as vice-captain, and similar posts in the second team are to be filled by G. Smith and L. Wain respectively.

The Horbury and District Railwaymen are looking forward to one of the best seasons they have yet experienced. Commencing on the 22nd inst., they have practically every Saturday, and several Wednesdays in addition, booked up to the middle of September next, all the matches being of the friendly order. The joint duties of captain and secretary are undertaken by J. Chappell, whose enthusiasm for the game is well shared by the other members of the club.

The Horbury St. Peter's is a newly-formed organisation, with plenty of members who, if nothing else, have youth on their side, and they are intent on making their existence known. They are sharing the use of the Low Park with the railwaymen, so that practically on every Saturday throughout the season, if weather permits, one or other of the teams will be engaged there. The Roundwood and District Competition has been entered. The principal officials of the club are B. Higgs (captain), H. Giggle (vice-captain), Willie Chappell (secretary) and C. Schofield (treasurer).

SUGGESTED ALTERATION OF SCHEME.

A meeting of the committee of the Heavy Woolen District Cricket Challenge Cup Competition took place on Monday evening at the George Hotel, Dewsbury. Mr. J. E. Legg, of Ossett, presided, and, despite the bad weather, there was a good attendance of representatives.

The Chairman remarked that they expected a deputation to visit them that night, and although the deputation was there, it had failed to notify the secretary of its business. In view of that, perhaps it would be advisable to allow the deputation to lay the scheme before the meeting. He expected that they had some sort of scheme in their minds, and he understood that it came from the Heavy Woolen District League. If it was a feasible scheme he took it that this meeting would be adjourned, so that the representatives could place the matter before their respective clubs for acceptance, rejection, or amendment. The scheme could not affect the draw for next year, but would have to be adjourned until 1913.

CONFlict OF COMPETITIONS.

SUGGESTED PRELIMINARY ROUNDS.

Mr. L. Hall of Batley, who, along with Mr. Bailey, of Chickenley, formed the deputation mentioned, was next called upon to lay before the meeting the matter he had in hand. He apologised because the matter had been laid before the competition secretary, and explained how the mistake might have occurred, and he also apologised for the absence of Mr. C. Marsden and Mr. George Green, who were first appointed delegates. Not all he wanted to congratulate the committee on the extraordinary success which had attended the competition for 23 years, and when he remarked that the final ties had amounted to £2,000, he thought they would agree with him. He was there to voice the opinion of the Heavy Woolen League Committee, and when they asked that competition to adopt a new scheme for the purpose of having some preliminary rounds. He said that night that they were in a dilemma, because four clubs had to have byes. Under the new rule, which they wished them to adopt, with the same number of clubs, that could be avoided. They suggested that twelve clubs, of the twenty-eight clubs should be drawn in the first round. This would leave sixteen clubs, which would have preliminary rounds. This would then drop down to four clubs, and those four clubs, with the other twelve and they would be fifteen clubs, which would take four rounds. Under that system they would have byes, and it would simply make one round less. The difficulties which were brought forward by Mr. Marsden, who had brought out the question, were that in the middle of the season and the call on the various Council clubs made it rather

difficult those clubs to fit in all their fixtures, and they were to have five rounds in all, and it was thought from all sides that it would be of benefit both to the clubs and to the competition. It might be said that the clubs would suffer. Personally, he thought they would not, because they had those preliminary rounds and that the calibre of the clubs would be more evenly balanced and there would have better "gates," and they have a probability of playing further rounds than they had at present, and it simply meant an extra round.

He quite saw that there would be some difficulty as to which should be the twelve clubs that should be guarded from the preliminary rounds.

Member: We should all be well aware who those clubs would be.

Chairman: I have remarked that, so far as the proposal of the scheme could see, there was no difficulty whatever. The scheme, however, could not come into force before

January, of Chickenley, supported Mr. Bailey's remarks, and drew attention to the fact that the clubs in the Yorkshire Council agreed to play, if at all possible, any fixture with which they were interfered with during those months.

That compulsion by the council to incur expense to any club that had to change its fixtures at the end of the season.

Chickenley had had three games interrupted, two of which had to be played in the ordinary season was over, which incurred some expense to them and to their opponents.

Bailey and Morley, who did not demand "gate" out of those matches to incur expense for the extra expense.

It required some consideration. The committee had no idea of forcing the clubs to do this.

A delegate had remarked that the clubs who would be the clubs to be affected.

It was not a question of pushing the clubs to do this.

He asked them to discuss it fully, and the scheme would be more beneficial than that had most expense.

If any club suggested something better than the preliminary rounds the league committee would be glad to listen to it.

There was the question of the question arising "Which clubs to be the junior clubs and which senior clubs."

Every club should have a right to discuss the matter.

Chairman: I remarked that it did not affect the competition.

Mr. Staincliffe, of Staincliffe, said that they would be no good to them.

They had in mind that some Spen Valley clubs in that competition, and they play their matches just the same as the senior clubs.

The competition clubs should be in their own house in order, before going with their suggestions for altering the competition.

They ought to alter their fixtures so as to get their matches in.

Mr. Crowther: The competition had been a great success.

They why alter it? It was not their heart.

Mr. Taylor, of Liversedge, asked if a club was successful in winning the cup,

the next season, consider that among the shielded clubs.

Hall said that they had not discussed the question, but that that committee would then be the twelve clubs.

Chairman: I remarked that it was a hypothesis, but that committee would have power to govern its own competition.

It had its own rules that it had at the time, and he took it that, whoever the club were which reached the semi-final, would be among the twelve clubs.

They could not ignore merit of that club.

Hall said that every club had got to knock out, either by its own fault, or by breach of the rules, or by being beaten in action.

Chairman: I suggested that the deputation should send a circular letter to each of the clubs giving particulars of the scheme.

Hall and Mr. Daftary readily fell in with the suggestion.

Chairman: I remarked that they had had a competition before them once before, and the (Mr. P. Crowther) remarked that

them in 1908.

Mr. Wilson of Ossett proposed that the competition should be adjourned at the conclusion of the preliminary business, for one month, and that meantime printed circulars should be sent to the delegates.

Chairman: I said that the competition had been the most successful that had been inaugurated, and he would not like to do anything to spoil it. He did not think that much money had been raised by the competition since it started than had been

raised this year. He meant in all the rounds. The attendance of the public at the various matches had been excellent. That showed that the interest in the competition was not on the wane, but was just as enthusiastic as it had been all the time.

Mr. L. Goodall, of Dewsbury and Savile, seconded Mr. Wilson's motion, which was carried.

Mr. Wilson moved the re-election of the chairman, secretary, and treasurer. Mr. Lodge, of Hanging Heaton, seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

The Chairman said he would be pleased to serve them as long as ever he could. (Applause.) He was not speaking for all time, but as far as the time before them—one year. He had been with them now since the competition began, and he was just as desirous as ever of continuing.

He had had a warning or two lately, in regard to his health, but whilst he could go amongst them they would have his best services. He had not the least doubt that he could speak the same words for his two colleagues, Mr. Crowther, the secretary, and Mr. J. R. Metcalfe, the treasurer. Mr. Metcalfe was almost as old a servant as he was. Mr. Crowther and Mr. Metcalfe had always been willing and desirous to do all that they possibly could to lighten his work in connection with the league, and he was very thankful to them for their assistance.

The Secretary thanked the delegates for his re-election and also for the handsome present they had made him.

ALLOCATION OF FUNDS.

The Chairman said that the local officer of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children had made application that the Society should be considered when the surplus funds were being allocated to charities, and a donation had been applied for on behalf of the family of an old player, J. W. Drake, of Scholes, who had died and left a wife and four children unprovided for. Some members of the competition thought the latter a fair case for consideration.

Mr. Squire, of Scholes, said that the deceased man—who died very suddenly of pneumonia—had been a leading committee man of the Scholes club, and had been an umpire for about ten years. The cricket club had raised about £12 or £13, and that would be handed over to the widow.

Mr. Wilson said he would be willing to allocate to a cause like that a fair slice, and he would also be prepared to support well the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

Mr. Taylor, of Staincliffe, said that no doubt both those cases would receive the sympathy of the committee, but he was going to speak on another subject—the final tie. They had a record "gate" and a record score, and he thought the competition committee ought to do something towards the player who made the record score. Crowther, of Batley, made a bigger score than had ever been made since the competition began and he now held the record for the Dewsbury and Savile ground, whilst he had made over 1,000 runs this season. The competition ought to make him a present of a medal.

The Chairman remarked that they had never before done anything in that direction, and at the final this year a liberty had been allowed to the Batley club, which had never been allowed before. They were allowed to make a collection on the ground for Crowther and they got £8 or £9, and he would appreciate that more than a medal.

Mr. Taylor: No! (hear, hear).

Mr. Wood, of Batley, said that he thought medals ought to go with the cup, both to the winning team and to the runners-up.

The Chairman said that as soon as ever they began to trench on their funds in that way the charitable purpose of the competition got destroyed, and, if it had not been for that question of charity being so closely allied to it, many people would not have taken the interest in it that they had done. He hoped the time was far distant when the money, which in his opinion ought to go in charitable channels, would be devoted to personal or other matters. He knew that medals had been given, but given by the successful club, and he thought that the honour of winning the cup was sufficient.

Mr. Wood: It is a very big drain on a club to provide medals.

The Chairman replied that he had not had forty years' experience of the management of cricket clubs without knowing the strain and struggle which the managers had to make ends meet. He did not think that the provision of medals should be undertaken by the competition at all.
