The match between the two teams at Bushey in June had been won by Bedfordshire by 9 runs. For the winners, Wharmby took 9 wickets in the match for 81 runs, including 5 for 46 in the Hertfordshire first innings, and Grierson 9 for 83, including 5 for 50 in the first innings. Wharmby played two innings of 52 and 51, the latter containing 3 fours. Orr scored 53. For the losers, Shelford took 12 wickets in the match for 100 runs, including 7 for 78 runs in the Bedfordshire first innings and 5 for 22 in the second. The debutant Bonsey scored 55. Holdstock did not bat in the Bedfordshire second innings due to a family bereavement. BEDS. v. HERTS.

ANOTHER VICTORY FOR BEDFORDSHIRE.

On the Elstow School ground on Friday, Bedfordshire commenced their first home match against Hertfordshire. This was the return and in view of Bedfordshire's narrow victory by 9 runs at Bushey Park the previous week, an interesting game was anticipated. It was real cricket weather, and a beautiful wicket had been prepared, and there was a fair number of spectators. At the last minute Rogers came into the Beds. team in place of H. Willerts, who had to yield to the claims of business. Mr. Orr won the toss and sent Holdstock, and Wharmby in to open the venture to the bowling of Coleman and Burton. Wharmby soon got to work, scoring with delightful crispness and freedom all round the wicket. He was particularly severe on the fast off-spinning balls of Coleman, which he usually square cut to the boundary. Holdstock was in a defensive mood, but allowed no loose delivery to go un punished. 50 was signalled after half an hour's play, and Shelford, the slow bowler, relieved Coleman at the far end. At 60 Wharmby reached his half century. This excellent first wicket partnership was dissolved at 66. Wharmby misjudging a curly ball from Shelford, and getting snapped at the wicket. His 52 had been compiled in vigorous and polished style. R. N. Bocquet took his place, and with Shelford troubling both batsmen the scoring slowed down considerably. At 1. W. H. Marsh, the Herts. captain, relieved Burton at the School end, and the change proved successful. Marsh finding the way to Holdstock's wicket in his second over. 84-2-30. Squire came in, and proceeded to hit out lustily. Shelford was bowling cleverly at this stage. His length was irrefragable, and he got a lot of work on the ball. The Beds. batsmen could take no liberties with him, and at 90 Bocquet returned the ball to him. Applause greeted Orr as he came in, and quickly settling down he made some pretty shots off Marsh. The hundred was arrived at after 80 minutes' play. At 103 lbw. terminated Squire's short but lively innings—he had made 16 in about 10 minutes—and Apthorp joined the skipper. Orr was batting confidently, and showed an excellent judgment in running, but Apthorp never appeared comfortable, and at 113 Lemoine (who is a wicket-keeper of more than average ability) secured him from a snick. Rogers, who made his debut as a professional, played the right game at a critical point, for he left Orr to make the runs while he kept his wicket up. The pair carried the score to 131, and then the lunch interval arrived.

On resumption Orr continued to master the attack and Rogers began to come out of his shell and select the right ball to hit. Runs came along at a good pace. Marsh gave way to Burton at the School end, and at 170 Coleman took the ball from Shelford. Orr reached his 50, and there was enthusiastic applause from the Elstonians, and everyone else, but immediately after in attempting a fourth-run from a big hit he was run out. The partnership had produced 73 runs, and the telegraph now read 185-6-52. The new-comer was S. V. Graham, the Modernian, and he shaped confidently and well. Shelford again displaced Coleman at the far end, and with his first ball had Rogers smartly caught in the slips. Rogers had made 32, a useful and steady innings, and had thoroughly justified his inclusion. He came in for many congratulations, as did his father, the genial "Dick" Rogers, who was a spectator. Saunders had only made 2, when he sent an easy catch to long off, and Graham was just beginning to feel at home when Lemoine stumped him. However, the second century was sent up by H. Grierson, and Pilgrim. The "Blue" hit out with his wonted pugnacity, and carried his bat for 25. The last wicket added 34, and the innings closed for 231. Shelford was by far the most successful of the Herts. bowlers, his seven wickets costing only 11 runs each.

A. K. Gibson and Golding opened the Herts. innings against the bowling a Wharmby (at the School end) and Grierson. Grierson's third ball clean bowled Gibson, but unfortunately it was a no-ball. Only 11 had been scored when Golding returned a ball to Wharmby. Runs came faster with the advent of the Rev. F. R. Bonsey, and at 36, Orr went on vice Grierson. The skipper's leg-breaks, however, were not at all deadly on the hard wicket, and he came in

for some rather severe treatment from the rev. gentleman. At 63, Pilgrim relieved Orr at the far end, but the change did not prove effective. 81 had been scored by tea time. After the interval Grierson was put on at the School end, and bowled Gibson with his third ball. At the other end, Pilgrim was displaced by Wharmby, and thereafter the bowlers were the dominant force. The hundred was signalled after 65 minutes' play, and immediately after Titchmarsh got his leg in front of a straight one from Wharmby and had to retire. Next Bonsey was taken at the wicket off Grierson, after batting nearly an hour for 55. It was a fine lusty innings, and included several boundaries. Wharmby and Grierson were bowling dangerously now, and caused a collapse among the remaining Herts. batsmen. E. L. Wright was caught in the slips off Grierson. Marsh also fell to a fine ball from the Cantab, and 6 wickets were down for 109. The tale of woe was not yet complete, for Household was snapped at the wicket, after one more run had been added. Shelford was easily caught by Bocquet, and Lemoine returned the ball to Wharmby, who claimed all three wickets. Coleman and Burton made a little stand, and the day's play closed with the score at 131 for 9.

On Saturday, Burton and Coleman, the overnight not-outs, continued to the bowling of Grierson and Wharmby, but only 3 had been added when Grierson got Burton caught by Rogers, and the innings terminated with the score at 134, or 97 behind. Grierson and Wharmby shared the wickets at the cost of 50 and 45 runs respectively. Orr and Wharmby opened Bedfordshire's second venture, but the skipper was bowled by Burton with only 6 on the board. Bocquet came in, and exhibiting much more confidence than on the preceding day, began to punish the bowling with much severity, while Wharmby was, as on Friday, scoring all round the wicket in his best style. 50 was signalled after less than half-an-hour's play. Coleman, relieved Shelford at the far end, while Marsh took the leather from Burton, but the double change did not seem to perturb the batsmen, runs coming at a merry pace. Burton, then displaced Coleman at the far end, and off his second ball Bocquet was caught in the slips. He had made 45 in short time by vigorous, attractive cricket. 93-2-45. Wharmby was batting over of Burton's, completed his 50. With 100 splendidly, and shortly after this, in an up, Shelford was put on at the School end, and in his second over got Apthorp finely caught in the country. 111-3-10. With his next ball Shelford successfully appealed for lbw. against Wharmby. The professional's 51 had been compiled chiefly by his favourites square out and by strong off driving. He was in for over an hour, and gave no chance. 111-4-51. In his next over Shelford claimed another victim, bowling Squire's off stump down, and the prospect because less roseate. 114-5-3. Graham joined Rogers, and both batsmen had to exercise great caution against the dangerous bowling. Graham did not survive his next over, a mishit off Burton landing the ball into the safe hands of long off. 117-6-2. Rogers was not fated to stay long either, returning a ball to Shelford, which the bowler held at the second attempt. 117-7-1. Grierson and Saunders were left in, but were not fated to stop the rot. Saunders cut his first ball riskily for 2, and then Burton bowled him with a beautiful ball. Grierson was easily caught, and the innings closed for 122. Holdstock was prevented from batting by a family bereavement. Shelford again was the most successful of the Herts. bowlers, his average being 5 for 23, or a total for the match of 12 for 100.

Herts. opened their second venture requiring 220 to win, and sent in Golding and Coleman to face Grierson and Wharmby. Golding began aggressively, but when 14 had been scored he was beautifully taken in the slips.

The fortunes of the visitors did not improve after lunch, for only 6 runs had been added when Gibson was bowled by Wharmby, and at 38 Grierson broke through Coleman's defence. With the Herts. batsmen compelled to adopt stonewalling tactics, the cricket was not very exciting, but a miracle—a home victory—was anticipated. The Herts. men were palpably ill at ease with the deliveries of Wharmby and Grierson, and it was seen to be only a question of time. The Rev. F. R. Bonsey played a watchful innings for 21 before a ball from Wharmby proved too much for him. Of the remaining batsmen, only Titchmarsh offered any real resistance, and the innings closed for 95, Bedfordshire claiming a brilliant victory by

124 runs. Grierson and Wharmby got 4 wickets each for 33 and 35, respectively, and Pilgrim, put on in the last few minutes, got 2 wickets in seven balls for no runs. Wharmby is to be congratulated on his prominent share in the triumph, seeing that he made 103 runs and captured 9 wickets at a total cost of 83. With 10 points to their credit,

the Bedfordshire Club have every reason to be satisfied with their start in the competition. Full score and analysis:—

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.
BEDFORDSHIRE v. HERTFORDSHIRE.
BRILLIANT VICTORY FOR BEDS.

The return match between Bedfordshire and Herts. was commenced on the Elstow School ground, Bedford, last Friday morning, in delightful weather. Among the various fixtures which Beds. is called upon to fulfil the game with our neighbours from the south is generally looked upon as one of the most interesting of the series, but after the close contest at Bushey Park a few days ago when Beds. secured the verdict by the narrow margin of nine runs, special interest was felt to be attached to this the return game. A more ideal day could hardly have been desired, and there was a fair gathering of spectators, including a sprinkling of ladies, when the wicket was pitched. History repeated itself in the matter of the toss, the home skipper being successful with the spin of the coin, and securing the distinct advantage of first knock on an almost perfect wicket. An eleventh hour alteration was necessitated in the home team, Rogers coming in place of H. Willett, who was unable to spare the time from business. The Herts. team was as advertised.

Holdstock and Wharmby opened the Beds. innings to the bowling of Coleman and Burton, the former taking first over from the far end. Runs came at a fair pace, Wharmby finding the boundary on several occasions. He was particularly pleasing to watch, making many delightful strokes on both sides of the wicket. The half century was reached in just over the half hour, immediately after which Shelford took the ball from Coleman at the far end. He received no better treatment than his colleague, Wharmby being particularly severe on all loose deliveries, claiming 50 out of the first 60 scored. Holdstock had so far been content to play a steady and careful game. With the score at 66 the separation was effected, Wharmby failing to get hold of a slow one from Shelford and was smartly caught at the wicket. R. N. Bocquet was the newcomer, but neither batsman played Shelford with any confidence. Runs came very slowly, seventy going up as the result of an hour's play. At 76 W. H. March relieved Burton at the school end. In his second over he had the Luton professional well beaten and spread-eagled the wickets—84—2—30. Further disaster was in store for Beds., as with the score at 90 Bocquet returned the ball to Shelford. On the home skipper proceeding to the wicket he was given a hearty reception by the spectators. The hundred was hoisted at the end of eighty minutes' play, three runs later Squire got in front of a straight one from Shelford and was out for obstruction. With the advent of Aphorpe things improved somewhat, Orr hitting out lustily. Aphorpe was never comfortable, however, and with the score at 115 he was easily caught at the wicket by Lemoine. The newcomer, Rogers, was content to play entirely on the defensive, leaving Orr to do the scoring. Several sharp singles were run, but in the case of Shelford both batsmen played him with great caution. The interval arrived with the score at 121.

On the resumption Orr and Rogers carried the score along at a nice rate, the former making some nice shots to the boundary. Burton relieved March, but the batsmen appeared well set and once again things began to appear more rosy for the homesters.

At 170 Coleman went in at the far end, vice Shelford, and shortly afterwards Orr reached his fifty. Immediately afterwards he was unfortunately run-out in attempting an impossible run. The partnership produced 73 runs. S. V. Graham, who was making his debut for the county, opened carefully. Shelford relieved Coleman at the far end, and with his first ball had Rogers smartly caught in the slips for an invaluable 32, obtained by careful cricket at a time when runs were badly needed. Saunders did not stay long, for after scoring a brace he was out to an easy catch at long-off. Graham, after showing very promising form, was smartly stumped by Lemoine. H. Grierson and Pilgrim quickly sent up the second century, the Cambridge Blue delighting the crowd with several huge boundary drives. Eventually the innings closed for 231, the last wicket having added 34. Shelford came out with the excellent average of seven wickets at a cost of eleven runs apiece.

A. K. Gibson and Golding opened the Herts. innings against the bowling of Wharmby and Grierson, the former taking first over

at the school end. With his third ball Grierson clean bowled the amateur, but was no-balled. In Wharmby's second over Golding returned the ball to the bowler and was promptly dismissed, when only 11 had been scored. With the Rev. F. R. Bonsey in runs came at a steady rate, and at 36 Orr relieved Grierson. In his first over the rev. gentleman twice drove him to the boundary, the second time well outside the ring for a six. Fifty runs were registered in forty minutes. Orr's bowling came in for severe punishment, and at 63 Pilgrim was given the ball at the far end. Despite these changes runs continued to come at a good rate, and at the tea interval the score stood at 81. After the interval Grierson was put on at the school end, and with his third ball bowled Gibson. At the other end Wharmby relieved Pilgrim. The hundred went up at the end of sixty-five minutes, and immediately afterwards Titchmarsh was given out for obstruction. Further disasters were in store for Herts., the Rev. F. R. Bonsey being caught at the wicket off Grierson. He was batting for nearly an hour, and compiled 55 by attractive cricket. E. L. Wright did not stay long, for in his next over Grierson had him easily caught in the slips. March was the newcomer, but after driving Grierson for a couple he was then clean bowled by the old Grammar Boy. With six wickets down for 109 things looked somewhat black for the visitors. Without any addition to the total Household was snapped at the wickets. With the addition of only one Shelford was out to an easy catch, and Lemoine immediately afterwards returned the ball to the bowler and was dismissed. The last two batsmen hit out lustily, and with the score at 130 Orr relieved Grierson at the School end. Time arrived with the score at 131 for nine wickets.

When the game was resumed on Saturday the home county were in an excellent position, Herts. being 100 behind with only one wicket to fall. With the addition of three Grierson had Burton caught, and the innings terminated with Herts. 97 in arrears. H. Grierson and Wharmby shared the bowling honours, the amateur taking five for 50, and the latter five for 46. The order of batting in the Beds. second innings was re-arranged, H. R. Orr taking Wharmby with him to the wicket. Burton and Shelford were the opening bowlers, the former at the School end. In his second over Burton clean bowled the home skipper when only six runs had been scored. With Bocquet in runs came at a good rate, and at 50 a double change was effected in the bowling, Coleman relieving Shelford, and March vice Burton. Runs continued to come freely, and Burton was again tried, this time at the far end. In his first over Bocquet put up one into the slips, and was promptly dismissed for 45, obtained by free and delightful cricket. Wharmby in the meantime was punishing the bowling somewhat, and soon reached the half-century. He was particularly severe on Burton, and in one over drove him twice in succession to the boundary. Shelford was next put on at the School end, and in his second over had Aphorpe caught near the boundary. With his next ball Wharmby was out for obstruction. He was at the wicket over an hour, and his 51 included three fours. H. Squire and Rogers were not associated together long, for with the addition of only three Shelford dislodged Squire's off stump. The score board read 114—5—3, Shelford's bowling having brought about a great change in the outlook of the match. To add to the debacle, Graham and Rogers were quickly disposed of, the former being out to an easy catch at long off, whilst Rogers gave a hot return to Shelford which the latter accepted after a bit of juggling with the ball in mid-air. Saunders opened badly, and was fortunate in scoring a couple for a lofty drive. In the next over Burton clean bowled Saunders, and with Grierson out to an easy catch the innings closed for 122. Holdstock was absent, being prevented from batting owing to a family bereavement. Shelford came out with the fine average of five wickets for 22, or a total for the match of twelve for 100.

Wanting 220 to win, Herts. opened the second venture with Golding and Coleman against the bowling of Grierson and Wharmby, the former taking first over at the School end. Golding commenced scoring very freely, but with 14 on the board he was out to a beautiful catch in the slips.

After lunch wickets fell quickly. A. K. Gibson was bowled by Wharmby for the addition of six, whilst with the score at 39 Grierson claimed Coleman's wicket. The Rev. F. R. Bonsey did not stay long, Wharmby clean bowling him when only ten had been added. With Titchmarsh and Household at

the wicket a stand was made, Household contenting himself with defensive tactics whilst Titchmarsh was doing the scoring. Wharmby effected the separation, bowling Household when the score board showed 76. Titchmarsh did not long survive the dismissal of his partner, Grierson bowling him after eight had been added. Further disaster was in store for Herts., as Wright only scored a brace when he succumbed to a straight one from Wharmby. The eighth wicket fell in the next over, Grierson finding Burton's off stump. Marsh and Shelford contented themselves with stone walling, and both Wharmby and Grierson bowled maiden overs in succession. Pilgrim relieved Grierson at the School end, and with his second ball bowled Shelford. Lemoine did not survive the following over, and the innings closed for 95, Beds. thus winning by 124 runs. ROUND ABOUT NOTES.

[By "Oozoo."]

Bedfordshire followed up their recent narrow victory over Herts. at Bushey with a win over the same county, only in much more pronounced a fashion by 124 runs. That splendid ground at Elstow School was the venue and last Friday and Saturday the match days. Mr. Orr did his side good service by winning the toss and it was on a hard, true wicket that those two sturdy and well-versed pros, Wharmby and Holdstock, opened the home county's venture. It did not take Wharmby very many minutes to play himself in, indeed, I have never seen him set about the bowling so early. He slashed balls only a trifle short on the off hard to the boundary and also helped himself to some comfortable shots on the leg side. When at last, after about 40 minutes' play, Wharmby snicked a swinging ball into the wicket-keeper's hands, he had made 52 out of 66 runs registered, a sufficient testimony to his mastery of the bowling. Holdstock, who next had Bocquet as a partner, had meanwhile been showing that imperturbable defence which is his chief characteristic. Sheldford, a left-hander, with a nice easy action, was giving the batsmen cause for some anxiety, and for a time runs came at a slow rate. Holdstock was the next to leave, a good ball from the Herts skipper beating and bowling him for a patient and eminently useful 30. Bocquet had never been comfortable and it was with a half-hearted shot that he returned the ball to Sheldford. Hastings Squires, always an attractive man at the wickets, put together 16 in bright style, but five wickets were down for 100, and things were not exactly favourable to Beds. when Orr and Rogers (E.) became associated. The latter had been called upon at the last moment to take the place which should have been Willett's. He is well known to League cricketers as the Printers' first-wicket bat, and most useful bowler. Attached at present to the Modern School ground staff, where his father, the popular "Dick" holds office, Rogers has had experience of professional cricket in Scotland. His inclusion in the side proved to be a happy idea, as he took part in the most productive stand of the innings.

Keeping his end up whilst his captain hit, the pair were together at lunch time, when the score stood at 121 for five. Resuming, runs came more readily, Orr especially laying in the wood. Cheers signalled the skipper's half century, but immediately afterwards, in attempting a fourth run from a big hit nearly to the on boundary, Orr ran himself out—entirely his own fault. So well did he bat that such an inglorious finish was a big blow to Beds. I really believe that now, despite his undoubted qualification to be included amongst the veterans, Mr. Orr is out and out the best amateur bat at the county's disposal, and he has captained Beds. for 20 years. Seventy-three runs had been added by this stand and the score stood at 185 for six. S. V. Graham, the old Modern boy, was next at the wickets, but he lost Rogers, well caught at first slip, in attempting to drive a curlier from Sheldford. Rogers had put together a sterling 34, keeping the ball for the most part on the carpet and maintaining a sound defence throughout. He must be played again. Graham batted through a couple of overs and saw Saunders caught from a bad shot to deep mid-off, before he was easily stumped, having got a foot out of his ground in an ineffectual attempt to drive Sheldford. He had previously narrowly escaped being stumped. Grierson hit lustily and the last wicket carried the score to 231—more than at one time appeared likely.

To the bowling of Wharmby and Grierson the visitors opened their batting. Golding, when only three, returned a ball hard and high to the Coventry pro., who at the third attempt held the ball. A good start for Beds, this! Then came a long stand between Gibson, who did not, however, seem very comfortable, and the Rev. F. Bonsey, who struck me as being about the safest bat in the game. Wharmby was bowling remarkably well and nearly had Gibson several times, two balls in particular being put up perilously near Mr. Orr at mid-off. Changes in the bowling were rung but no impression was made. Orr proved expensive in his four

overs, Bonsey putting him brilliantly to the leg boundary. Pilgrim had an over or two before tea, but nothing came of it, and the short interval found the pair still in and apparently well set. Eighty-one was on the board and only one wicket down when play was continued. But a drop of tea had put new vigour into Bedford's bowlers and the remarkable collapse of Herts. has to be recorded. Grierson bowled grandly from the School end, and Wharmby dealt out balls with destruction written all over them. Gibson fell to a swerver, third ball after tea, and Bonsey, after being missed by Graham in the long field from a wild slam, was well held by Apthorp. Grierson bowled four successive maidens to Coleman, and every batsman had great difficulty playing him. A stubborn last-wicket stand stopped the rot and play was discontinued for the day with the score at 131 for nine. The innings came to a quick conclusion on Saturday morning, Grierson getting the wicket. Thus Herts. were all out for 134, or 97 runs in arrears. Grierson and Wharmby divided the wickets equally for 50 and 46 respectively. A feature of the Beds. fielding had been the magnificent work of Saunders, at cover point, repeated outbursts of applause rewarding his agility in this position. He saved a good 30 runs I should say.

A hundred runs in advance to start with Beds. were on velvet, the only fly in the ointment being the news that Holdstock would take no further part in the game owing to a family bereavement. With the Luton pro. away Wharmby had Orr to open the innings with him. The captain was not allowed to stop long this time, a beauty from Burton finding a weak spot in his defence. But Bocquet, who came in next, was in much better trim than in the previous innings, and Ha and Wharmby contributed some fine cricket. Bowling changes had no effect until, after he had batted really well for 45 Bocquet was caught in the slips. Wharmby continued his free hitting until he stopped a ball with his leg in lieu of his bat, and had to go for 41. Wharmby's worth to Beds. would be hard to estimate; he is indeed a tower of strength, and in this match he was at his best. But a bad time was ahead for Beds, and after Apthorp had hit a brisk ten nobody could make anything of some fine bowling, and after at one time appearing in an almost impregnable position, the homesters found themselves fighting desperately hard for runs. Wickets fell rapidly and the innings only realised 122, leaving Herts. 220 to win, by no means an impossible task on an easy wicket and with all the afternoon to do it in. Sheldford was the chief agent in Bedfordshire's downfall, his five for 22 in the second innings following on seven for 77 in the first innings, stamping him as a most dan-

gerous trundler. Herts. started indifferently losing a wicket for 13 runs before lunch. With Grierson and Wharmby putting down some first-rate stuff, and the batsmen determined to save their wickets, play during the afternoon became quite tedious. But the fortunes of the Bedford men were in safe hands and by four o'clock Herts. had been dismissed for a paltry 95. It is questionable, in view of this score, if more enterprising methods would not have better served the losing team's purpose. Only the Rev. F. Bonsey, with a dogged 21, and Titchmarsh with an almost equally watchful 29, could do anything with Wharmby (4 for 35), Grierson (4 for 33), and Pilgrim (2 for 0). Pilgrim had only eight balls but managed to hit the sticks twice and had no runs knocked off him, an encouraging feat.

Thus it was that Bedfordshire gained their second batch of five points, which should put them on top of their section, a position I see no reason why they should not maintain. Another reliable bat may be needed, but I think that with the inclusion of Moorcom and Willett the team should need no further alteration, and should be sufficiently strong in all departments to carry them through successfully. In the match under notice Graham was not a success, but I still think that he is a County cricketer. He missed a catch in the first innings but made amends with a smart slip catch later on, and his fielding in the second innings was favourably commented on. But he should learn to throw in so that the ball reaches the wicket-keeper or bowler

with one hop. The foregoing, in brief, is the story of Bedfordshire's first home match and it may be as well here to point out the one regrettable feature, the small amount of support accorded the fixture. On a pleasant afternoon it is not such a very long way to Elstow School, and in view of the success of the team it was not at all complimentary to see so few supporters. However, perhaps the cricketing fraternity will crowd up in their hundreds to the Grammar School field next week to give the side their support in the game with Norfolk. This should be the match of the year, as Norfolk were the "cock" team in the Minor Counties last year.

Minor Counties Championship.

BEDFORDSHIRE v. HERTFORDSHIRE.

These clubs met in their return engagement on the Elstow School ground on July 7 and 8. Bedfordshire won the toss and sent in Holdstock and Wharmby to face the bowling of Coleman and Burton. The Notts man soon got busy, and starting with two singles from Coleman, next out the fast bowler to the boundary. Both batsmen played with care, but runs came steadily, chiefly from Wharmby's bat, and 20 soon went up. From the last ball of Burton's fourth over Holdstock survived an appeal for "l.b.w." The score rose, Wharmby still doing the major part of the scoring, until at 49 Shelford displaced Coleman. A single by Wharmby sent up the 50, of which Holdstock had only contributed 10. Neither batsman appeared to like the Sternerge man's bowling, the runs being chiefly got off Burton. Wharmby, by a nice cut to the boundary from that bowler, reached his 50, 60 being hoisted simultaneously. Seven runs came from Burton's ninth over. Wharmby, after adding 2 to his score, was smartly taken by Lemoine from the second ball of Shelford's third over. The partnership had yielded 66, Wharmby's contribution being the result of good and confident cricket; he gave no chance. With Boquet in Holdstock now did most of the scoring, Burton being more punished than Shelford. At 76 Marsh came on for the former, and at 84 clean bowled Holdstock with the fourth ball of the second over. The Luton crack had registered 30 by sound, if somewhat slow, cricket. Six runs later Boquet, who had not appeared at all comfortable, returned a ball to Shelford, whose two wickets had cost 16 runs. Orr joined Squire and, with a 3, sent up three figures, but three runs later lost his partner, l.b.w. to Shelford. Apthorp's stay with his captain was of brief duration, too, for at 113 he was caught at the wicket by Lemoine, Shelford again being the successful bowler. With five men out for this total, the position of the home side was hardly promising, but on Rogers, who is the County School professional, joining Orr, a valuable stand was made. At first uncomfortable, the newcomer quickly settled down. Orr was appealed against for "l.b.w.," but this he survived, and at lunch the score stood at 121 for 5 wickets. After lunch Burton took up the bowling at Marsh's end. Orr was in his usual aggressive mood, and getting the measure of Shelford's slowness began to score freely from them. He quickly reached 40, mainly by boundary hits; and with Rogers also batting well, the scoring became lively. The pair, in fact, put a different complexion on the game. At 170 Coleman bowled vice Shelford, and 10 runs later Marsh took the ball from Burton. With a single, the Beds. skipper obtained his 50 amid applause. The partnership, however, soon afterwards ended, Orr being run out in trying for 4 from a hit of his own. His 53 was a well-played innings and contained a number of very pretty strokes. The wicket had yielded 72. At 187 Shelford went on for Coleman and from his first ball Rogers was well taken in the slips by Golding low down with one hand. Rogers's *debut* in county cricket was decidedly promising. At 194 Saunders was out, Burton accepting a catch from one of Marsh's tosses. The ninth wicket fell two runs later, Lemoine stumping Graham and giving Shelford his sixth wicket. A "l.b.w." appeal against Pilgrim was answered in his favour, and he stayed while Grierson, by vigorous batting, sent up the second hundred. Grierson hit two successive balls from Marsh to the boundary, and the total quickly rose to 231 before Pilgrim gave Shelford an easy return catch.

At 4 o'clock Gibson and Golding opened the Hertfordshire innings. Wharmby and Grierson bowling. The Cambridge blue, with his second ball, got through Gibson's defence, but fortunately for Herts. it was a no-ball. Disaster, however, quickly befel the visitors, for Golding, in attempting to drive Wharmby, was well caught by the bowler. Bonsey joined Gibson and play was slow for a time. The score was taken to 36 and then Orr displaced Grierson. Bonsey, however, showed his appreciation at the change, and after nicely turning Orr to leg for a boundary, hit the last ball of the over for six—the only stroke of that value made during the match. The score mounted quickly to 50.

the runs coming chiefly from Orr's bowling. At 63 Pilgrim was put on in place of Orr, but both batsmen now faced the bowling quite confidently. At 5 o'clock, when the players adjourned for tea, the total was 81 with only one man out, Bonsey's share being 42 and Gibson's 31. The outlook was quite promising for Herts., but the usual disasters followed the tea-drinking. Only one run had been put on after tea when Gibson was bowled by Grierson. Titchmarsh signalled his appearance by turning the "Varsity" bowler to leg for 4. Bonsey completed his 50 with a 2-hit, and with a 4 just afterwards made the total 100. He was, however, missed by Graham in the long-field. At 107 Titchmarsh was l. b. w. to Wharmby, and Household, the in-coming batsman, did not long enjoy Bonsey's company, for Apthorp smartly secured the Forest School chaplain behind the stumps. His 55 was the highest

score of the whole match, and except for one chance towards its close was free from blemish; he never seemed to have any difficulty with the bowling, and his free display made the failure of other batsmen inexplicable. Wickets afterwards fell in quick succession, and no stand was made until Coleman joined Burton for the last wicket. The Kimpton man out Wharmby for 4 off successive balls and also made a boundary hit from Grierson. Orr went on in place of Grierson, but the two were still together when stumps were drawn, with the total 131 for 9 wickets.

On Saturday Coleman (12) and Burton (5) resumed batting. The former made 3 from Grierson and then lost Burton, caught off the fifth ball of the over, the innings closing with Hertfordshire 97 in arrears. Orr and Wharmby started the second innings of the home side at 11.20, the latter facing Shelford, whose first over was a maiden. Burton bowled from the other end and with only six scored he shattered Orr's wicket. Wharmby and Boquet at once settled down to punish the bowling. Shelford, meeting with no success, at 36 gave way to Coleman. At 58, Marsh relieved Burton, but the change did not affect the batsmen, and by noon 70 runs had been registered in about 40 minutes. At 87 another change was tried, Burton, who had previously bowled from the School end, going on at the opposite end in place of Coleman. This had the desired effect, for with his third ball he had Boquet caught by Titchmarsh in the slips. The out-going batsman played well for his 45, and the partnership had resulted in 87 being put on. On Apthorp joining Wharmby the Notts man soon completed his second half-century of the match. Shelford resumed at the School end, displacing Marsh, and at 11 he had Apthorp caught by Gibson on the boundary. At the same figure Wharmby's brilliant effort was closed by his getting his leg in front of a straight one from Shelford, who thus took two wickets with successive balls. This was the beginning of a collapse which soon brought the Bedfordshire innings to an end. With 3 added, Shelford bowled down Squire's off stump (his third wicket without a run scored from him), and at 117 Wright, at cover-point, caught Graham from Burton's bowling. With the total unaltered Rogers returned a ball to Shelford, making the latter's record since going on a second time four wickets for 2 runs. Saunders only made 2 before Burton got through his defence, and with the score still at 122 Marsh caught out Grierson, making Shelford's record for the innings 5 for 22.

Hertfordshire left with 220 to get to win, in fifteen minutes' play before lunch lost Golding's wicket for 16 runs. Coleman went to the wickets with him, the bowlers being Wharmby and Grierson. Golding cut both bowlers for 4, and then in trying to put the ball through the slips was caught in fine style by Graham, who took the ball low down. After luncheon Gibson succeeded Golding, but with only 20 on the board was bowled by Wharmby. Bonsey followed and he and Coleman raised the total to 38. Then the professional, who had been very quiet, was beaten by Grierson. With 10 added, a worse disaster befel the batting side, Bonsey, its greatest hope, being clean bowled by Wharmby. Household and Titchmarsh came together and offered some resistance. The old Royston player luffed brightly and two or three times turned the ball to leg cleverly. He was given a life, Rogers letting the ball drop through his hands. Separation came at 76. Household appearing to play on to Wharmby, Wright filled the vacancy, only to see Titchmarsh bowled by the left-hander at 81, his 29 being the highest score of the innings and his best for some time. On Marsh's arrival Wright escaped "bagging a brace" with a cut for 2, but that was the extent of his career, for, lunging out at Wharmby, he had his middle stump disturbed. Burton only added 1 to the score and was then bowled by Grierson. Then, with the issue safe, Pilgrim at 95, was given a trial at Grierson's end. With his second ball he disposed of Shelford, and one over later brought the game to an end by bowling Lemoine, the amateur international goalkeeper, both wickets being taken without a single run being scored.

Thus Bedfordshire gained an easy victory by 124 runs.
