CHESHIRE v. DURHAM

INTERESTING COUNTY MATCH AT BOLLINGTON.—SUCCESS OF LOCAL PLAYERS.

An important county cricket match, in the Minor Counties Championship, took place on the Bollington Cricket ground on Monday and Tuesday between Cheshire and Durham. For the last two or three years a county match has been played on the Happy Valley ground, and each year's event proves of considerable interest to local cricket enthusiasts. During the present season, Cheshire have been showing considerably improved form, and this match proved particularly interesting to Bollington and Macclesfield cricketers on account of the fact that A. S. Turner, the popular captain of the Bollington eleven, and J. Harrison, the stalwart of the Macclesfield team, were both included in their county eleven. Turner also had the honour of captaining the Cheshire team and as will be seen from the scores, the two local players contributed in no mean degree to the excellent display given by the home county. Both players bowled and batted well, and Harrison gave a magnificent display of bowling by taking five wickets for twenty runs. He also carried out his bat with thirty runs not out. Turner also gave one of his favourite batting displays and compiled a score of sixty-seven runs, chiefly by boundary hits. On the Durham side, Hendren, brother of the well-known Middlesex player, compiled the fine score of 103, and Graham, who by the way, is the Amateur Golf Champion of England, also scored a useful 72.

The game commenced at 12.30, half an hour after the advertised time. Durham won the toss and decided to bat first. Curry and Hendren faced the bowling of Smoker and Buxton. Smoker bowled first over and Curry placed his second delivery to the off for a single. Hendren also snatched a single and the first over ended with two runs. Buxton then bowled a maiden over against Hendren. In the next over Curry neatly cut the ball away to point for two, and a minute later got a good hit almost to the boundary for a double. Hendren scored two singles and then hit two way for doubles. Scoring was very slow for the first twenty minutes, and the fielding of the Cheshire eleven was very good whilst Tipping was playing a remarkably keen game behind the stumps. After half an hour's play, Hendren hit the first boundary and brought the score up to twenty runs. A minute later Curry was bowled by Smoker, and retired with nine runs to his credit. He was succeeded by H. L. Dales. Hendren commenced to live matters up with hard hitting. He placed several times to the boundary and then hit one of Smoker's deliveries clean into the brook for six. He also placed the next ball to the same place, but this time only for four, the ball striking the ground before reaching the river. After three quarters of an hour's play with the score at 53 for one wicket, A. S. Turner went on to bowl in place of Smoker, and Mason instead of Buxton. Turner only bowled one over and was then succeeded by Moorhouse. At 1.45 Dales was neatly bowled by Moorhouse after making eleven runs, and the game was then adjourned for luncheon, with the score at 68 runs, Hendren being 48 not out. There was a large attendance when play was resumed after luncheon. Harrison joined Hendren, but was bowled by Moorhouse after having made six runs with one hit. He was succeeded by Graham who indulged in some brisk batting. He quickly placed 50 runs to his credit of which 32 were recorded by boundary hits. Hendren continued scoring, and was applauded on reaching his century. A minute later however, he was caught at mid-on by Buxton off Turner's bowling, his total being 103. He was succeeded by Turnbull, who however, was bowled by Turner, after he had made only five runs. Graham was then joined by Johnson, but the latter was smartly stumped by Tipping, after having made 13. Coulson joined Graham, when the latter was caught at square leg by

Hunter, off the bowling of Harrison, after he had compiled the excellent score of 72. Bewick followed Graham and Coulson was next bowled by Harrison with one run to his credit. Morris joined Bewick, but after making eight was clean bowled by Harrison. Smith was the last man in, and he made seven runs, and was then caught and bowled by Harrison, and the innings closed at 4.25, the total being 265.

Osborne and Mason opened the batting for Cheshire amid applause, against the bowling of Morris and Smith. Mason commenced hitting freely but Osborne was neatly caught by Smith, after making five runs. Moorhouse joined Mason but the latter was bowled by Smith after making a score of 26 runs. Wright followed but only broke his duck, before he was bowled by Morris. Smoker replaced Wright but was dismissed for thirteen runs by Smith. Hunter followed, and after making four was caught by Coulson. C. P. Woods commenced hitting in a business-like manner, but was caught by Dales with only ten runs to his credit. Turner was greeted with applause on joining Moorhouse. The latter compiled the creditable score of 31 runs when his off stump was knocked several yards by a fine delivery from Morris. Buxton joined Turner and the latter displayed some fine form, and greatly delighted the now large crowd with some excellent drives to the boundary. Buxton was neatly bowled by Morris after making eleven. Harrison was greeted with applause on joining Turner. He placed his ball to the boundary for four and Turner then hit three balls in succession to the boundary, and brought his score up to fifty, and was heartily cheered by the crowd. Harrison next put two deliveries to the boundary in succession, and the total of 200 was reached amid great enthusiasm. Turner continued to hit freely and compiled the splendid score of 67 before he was stumped by Johnson. From the bowling of

Hendren, Tipping, the last man in, joined Harrison, and the latter continued to repeatedly place to the boundary. Tipping was caught off his second ball by Johnson, before he had scored, and Harrison carried out his bat with a creditable score of 30 not out. With the dismissal of the Cheshire eleven the first day's play was concluded a few minutes before seven o'clock.

On the second day's play, Cheshire won by two runs but were defeated on the two days game by thirty-four runs. This defeat is certainly no disgrace to the Cheshire eleven who experienced the hardest luck towards the end of the second innings. C. P. Woods, a splendid hard hitting batsman had compiled a useful 62, when he was run out. J. Harrison was also most unlucky to be bowled for one run. Durham again batted first and compiled 210, which included 53 by Turnbull, 40 by Harrison and 46 by Graham. Woods made 62 runs which was Cheshire highest score, and A. S. Turner added 34, whilst Moorhouse and Smoker compiled 32 and 31 respectively. The umpires were Messrs. M. Myers and B. Brown.

When crisp October thins the blood and bids it course the veins with quickening pace, we are drawn, willy-nilly, to talk and think of football's fierce and strenuous strife.

Wherever men do congregate, the ear is assailed with football jargon.

Even in blazing July, on a cricket ground, when the fall of a wicket provides temporary relaxation and opportunity for desultory chat, we hear that Jack So-and-So and Tommy Such-and-Such have "signed on," bearing reputations which almost need a furniture-van to convey them to "The Moss Rose" ground, and whose ulterior career may possibly be epitomised in a brief, brilliant period of First League fame, a fat benefit, and the more or less safe haven of a comfortable "pub." Or it may perchance happen that after a Will o' the Wisp appearance for a season, the glowing reputation finds unhonoured and unsung sepulture in the miasma of Danes' Moss. Acute discussion wages on the cause of Macclesfield's exclusion from "The Combination"; and her enforced loyalty to "The League," up whose toilsome ladder she has swarmed to pre-eminence is freely and candidly argued.

But football topics are laid aside as the next batsman deliberately, oh! so deliberately, approaches the wicket, buttoning his glove with an assumed air of nonchalance, as if life contained no greater trouble, and silent attention is again riveted upon the national summer game.

For, praise be, cricket still holds regal sway, though "Gowfers" may rage furiously together and "Tennisians" imagine vain things. Though they have made undoubted inroads, neither game has ousted cricket from popularity. There are many in like ignorance with the innocent maiden who froze the enthusiastic golfer with: "I don't know much about the game. I don't even know which end of the caddie you play with!"

Indeed, it is good to note an increasing interest in cricket, visible in a purely local sense in the institution and vigorous growth of "knock-out" competitions, and on a wider basis in the Minor Counties' Championship contest, under the aegis of the M.C.C.

In the latter field, our own county of Cheshire is making a gallant struggle, considering its very recent resuscitation and the difficulties attendant thereon, and the match against Durham, played at Bollington this week, under ideal weather conditions, enabled the spectators to witness a Homeric combat, outrivalling in interest many a First-class county match.

I say advisedly outrivalling, for a visit to Old Trafford, Bramhall Lane or Trent Bridge ground, though it may enable one to watch players whose names and performances are recorded in "Wisden," yet lacks the inspiring incentive of patriotism, and fails to arouse the keen desire that your own particular townsman or near neighbour, whom, perchance, you know in social or business life, should do credit to his county and enhance his personal renown.

"Jack, whom we all know and like, and wish well to, takes five wickets for 20 runs; "Stanley," whose prowess and overflowing vigour are a source of pride to his friends, scores 67 in a few electrifying overs, put Jessoping Jessop, rivalling George Hint in merry mood, and completely altering the complexion of the game; and we return home to retail their feats in clubs, in "pubs" and in the family circle, and to discuss the prospect of tomorrow's play.

I should like to know what First-class county match can arouse the same keen local interest as the strenuous fight just ended at Bollington. Nine hundred and ten runs scored in two days' play, the laurels snatched by the narrow margin of 28. A well-deserved victory for the men of Durham, who fought a stern fight throughout, and never once lost their grip of the game, but won on their merits, though Woods gave them an uneasy quarter-of-an-hour in the concluding stage.

Now, why this expenditure of pen-and-ink and midnight oil? What is the lesson to be learned, the moral to be drawn from this county match at Bollington?

Simply this. The play was good. The ground was attractive. The weather was perfect. But "the gate" was disappointing.

I do not know the takings. But I am certain that expenses must materially exceed receipts; and I feel that if we are to continuously or even occasionally enjoy the privilege of such fine cricket at our very doors as has this week been displayed, a much larger measure of public support must be accorded.

Organised effort can accomplish much. May it be forthcoming.

CHESHIRE'S DEFEAT AT BOLLINGTON.

There was plenty of interesting cricket in the Cheshire v. Durham match which concluded at Bollington yesterday, the result being a victory for Durham by 34 runs. On the first innings on Monday the visitors were 36 runs ahead, but yesterday Cheshire replied to Durham's 210 with 212. And again the exhibition of the Cheshire batsmen was more consistent, for six of them recorded double figures, whereas only three Durhamites placed double figures to their credit. A feature of the morning's play was the display of Graham, the amateur golf champion, whose freedom of action was delightful to witness. His total of 46 represented some excellent hitting, for many times was the ball returned from the outfield when a single only had been run. The fielding of the Cheshire men was very smart in the early part of the innings, but afterwards there was a decided falling off. Graham was out to a fine ball sent down by Buxton, whose deliveries were decidedly good; the same bowler also accounted for Turnbull's wicket when his total stood at 53. When they went to the wicket shortly after lunch Cheshire made a most disastrous start, for three wickets were down for 23, but the next wicket produced 40; the fifth and sixth went at 109, and then another good stand was made when Woods and Turner came together; the score rose rapidly, and it certainly looked as if Cheshire, who had been set 246 to win, were going to succeed, but Turner was disposed of by Smith. Woods and Buxton proved to be another good partnership, for although the late Bollington professional only recorded 17, Woods hit out in a manner which aroused the spectators to a high pitch of enthusiasm, but at 207 Buxton played back a ball from Morris, and was caught by the bowler. This proved to be the undoing of Cheshire, for the ninth wicket went at 211, and with but another unfor- tunate way for Cheshire. Woods on drove a ball from Morris well in the direction of the pavilion, ran a single and commenced to cross the pitch again when he bent a hasty retreat, for the ball was well fielded and thrown in, but in the opinion of the umpire the Cheshire man was a second too late in getting back to his crease. Cheshire lost by 34, but their display showed a great improvement on previous matches. Durham have a reputation of being a strong eleven, and for the Cheshire batsmen to knock up 441 against such excellent bowling as that of Morris and Harrison, is distinctly creditable. A great feature of the visitors' play was their smartness in fielding, whilst an outstanding feature of Cheshire's play was the success of Harrison, who, in the two innings, took six wickets for 33 runs; in the first innings he recorded 30 not out, and yesterday made a remarkably good catch at mid-off. Turner's contributions to Cheshire's total were 67 and 34, whilst Woods was top scorer on Tuesday with 62.
