COUNTY CRICKET.

CARMARTHENSHIRE v. MONMOUTH.

After their recent performances against Glamorgan the supporters of the Carmarthenshire team had begun to give up all hope of success this season. On Monday, however, at Llandovery, Carmarthen retrieved a little of their lost reputation. The weather was ideal, and the attendance when Percy Rees and Ike Evans went to the wicket to open the innings for Carmarthen was very scanty. After the luncheon interval, however, it greatly increased. Percy Rees was soon dismissed by a ball from Williams after only contributing four to the score, and Davies was caught by Maltby after making only 15 runs. Trubshaw, who was the top scorer, batted very well and obtained runs freely. But the chief honours of the match go to J. T. Davies, a Llandovery boy. Last year he was captain of the Llandovery College XI, and this was his first county match, going in fourth wicket down he scored a well compiled 49 not out. Williams took seven wickets for 37 runs. Carmarthenshire were fortunate to give Silverlock his quietus before he had done much damage. Diver, who went in on the fall of the first wicket, played a great game. The fielding on the home side was not all that could be desired. Monmouthshire passed Carmarthenshire's total half an hour before the stumps were taken up.

When play was resumed on Tuesday F. G. Phillips still required 34 runs to complete his century. These he soon attained, and was unfortunate in being run out when his score totalled 115. Once Phillips was dismissed the Monmouth team collapsed before the bowling of Trubshaw and Gee, the tail end of the team making a very poor show. Phillips' century was well compiled, and included 21 fours. For Carmarthenshire Trubshaw did well in bowling, his quick deliveries being very effective. He took five wickets for 98 runs.

Carmarthenshire opened their second innings well, 50 being registered before the first wicket went down. Percy Rees and Ike Evans appeared to be settling down to a long partnership when the latter was unfortunate enough to get run out. When Davies went to join Rees the scoring for a long time was exceedingly slow, but when the second wicket fell 76 runs had been scored. Percy Rees was very cleverly stumped by Williams. Lockyer then went in. On Monday he was clean bowled with the first ball, but on Tuesday he made a good stand. C. P. Lewis, who, in the absence of Capt. Hughes-Morgan, is acting as the skipper of Carmarthenshire, put in some very good hits during the short time he was at the wickets. His score amounted to 18, and 16 runs were obtained in four hits. Gee and C. P. Lewis were caught out in splendid style by Diver. Tuesday again Carmarthen made a good last wicket stand. Melhuish, who was last man in, knocked up a good 18, which included one 5 and three 4's. Carmarthenshire's play on Tuesday was on the whole very even. No one distinguished himself greatly in batting. A feature of the innings was the bowling of Stedman. Of his 21 overs, ten were maidens. He took three wickets for 35 runs, and had easily the best average.

When Monmouth went in to bat for the second innings they required only 78 runs to win the match. It was anticipated that they would do this easily. Maltby and Silverlock, who were easily dismissed in the first innings, achieved this with comparative ease. Silverlock batted freely, and was badly missed several times by the home fielders. When Monmouth had passed the Carmarthen score by three runs, the innings was declared without a single wicket having fallen.

Though Carmarthen sustained defeat they were by no means disgraced. They played well, and the only great fault to be found is with their fielding, which at places was extremely weak. When the fact that they were without the assistance of several members of the team, including the captain and Hugh Howell, is taken into consideration, it must be conceded that they acquitted themselves creditably.

Inter County Cricket.

CARMARTHEN V. MONMOUTH.

Some interesting cricket was witnessed in the match which opened at Llandovery on Monday between Carmarthenshire and Monmouthshire. Carmarthenshire made a better stand than was generally expected, the feature of the innings being the fine display of J. T. Davies and Trubshaw, their partnership yielding over 80 runs.

Carmarthenshire sent in Percy Rees and Ike Evans to face W. A. Williams and Raikes. The pitch was in excellent condition. Percy Rees sent Phillips to the boundary, but the next ball displaced his wickets. Will Davies only added 13, but Trubshaw soon established himself, and after seeing Evans and Lockyer sent back, he and J. T. Davies made a very good stand. On resuming after lunch Trubshaw continued to hit very freely, and after treating Raikes, Silverlock, and Williams with scant courtesy, a tricky ball from the former beat him with his score at 52, which included nine 4's. The youthful J. T. Davies, who is this season the captain of Llandovery College, gave the bowlers considerable trouble, and drove beautifully. Gee was the next to succumb to Raikes, and C. P. Lewis, who showed much promise, fell a victim to a wily one from Williams. Melhuish was smartly stumped by Williams, and after E. M. Lewis had been sent back, J. T. Davies was unfortunate to lose his last partner when one short of the half century, the innings closing for 181.

Although Monmouthshire opened rather disastrously by the early dismissal of Silverlock and Maltby, the position was soon retrieved by the batsmen who followed. Half an hour before stumps were taken up Monmouthshire passed Carmarthenshire's score with five wickets down. Diver and F. G. Phillips played splendid cricket. Scores:—
