HYTHE CRICKET WEEK.

SUCCESSFUL AND ENJOYABLE FESTIVALS.

One of the principal attractions during the season in the district is the Hythe Cricket Festival, which is being held this week, and once again the ancient Cinque Port is showing some of its larger neighbours how a Cricket Week should be carried out so that cricket and social functions can be combined, and can result in the greatest amount of enjoyment and delight being obtained from them. In the day time nothing better is wished for by the men of Kent than to assemble on the cricket ground, and watch the play, which is always of the brightest possible, and by which the County Eleven has won the favour of all sportsmen in the kingdom. True, no first-class matches are played at Hythe, yet the cricket is quite as sparkling, consequently the greatest enjoyment is derived by the large number of spectators, who, during the Week, visit the pretty ground quite close to the picturesque canal and the beautiful Ladies' Walk, two of the old borough's principal attractions. Then in the evening the visitors are tempted to remain in the town by a round of joyous and merry functions, which make the whole place a scene of gaiety and music. They know how to do such things at Hythe, and this year the committee have surpassed any of their previous efforts.

The ground, notwithstanding the scorching it had previously received from the fierce rays of the sun, was in splendid condition at the opening, and paid a striking tribute to the worth of Groundsman, Munds. The pavilion looked simply lovely with bright flowers growing all round it, and the gaily-decorated tents which were ranged round the ground added also to the attractiveness of the scene. The tents have been the venues of many merry and jovial parties each afternoon, and the various hosts and hostesses have extended liberal hospitality at At Homes. The number of tents was larger than it has been for several years, and all were choicely and tastefully decorated, while plants, ferns and palms lent much to their most striking effect. Among those who had tents were the officers of the School of Musketry, Mrs. W. Deedes (Saltwood Castle), Captain Penny (Castle Road), the Cinque Ports Club, the Sergeants of the School of Musketry, the Palmer Institute, Mr. Lionel Mann (Beaconsfield Terrace), the Mayor and Mayoress (Councillor and Mrs. F. W. Butler), and the Hythe Bowling Club.

The Hythe Borough Military Band and the Hythe Excelsior Military Band have played splendid programmes of music during each afternoon.

THE PLAY.

KENT 2ND XI. v. CORNWALL.

The opening match of the Week was a second-class county fixture between the Kent 2nd XI. and Cornwall, and the home county's representatives accomplished a splendid performance by defeating the visitors before half-past three on the second day, by no less than an innings and 62 runs. At the commencement on Monday, it was plainly evident that the wicket was in favour of the batsmen, and Kent were fortunate to win the toss, so they took the first knock with the bat. They were captained by Mr. Troughton, who went to the wickets first with Mr. R. G. Cowley. They were soon dealing punishment to the bowling, and the batsmen were well on the way to the century before the latter was bowled for 29 runs. Mr. Powell was the next to bat, and he contributed the extremely useful score of 22. When Jennings partnered his captain then the spectators

were treated to some hurricane hitting. The bowling was made to look exceedingly poor, as the score advanced quickly, boundary hits being frequent. Mr. Troughton was the first to depart, and when he was bowled he had 134 runs to his credit, his innings being practically without blemish. Jennings went on scoring at a fast pace, and before he was sent back by a catch, he had put on no less than 173 runs, an innings almost perfect in every way. Other useful contributions were made, and with the score standing at 445 runs for five wickets, the innings was declared closed. Cornwall started somewhat disastrously against the bowling of Powell and Clinch, and scarcely had double figures been reached than H. Tresawna was beaten by a beautiful Dr. Tresawna and W. N. Bickford-Smith, however, showed fairly good form, but when they looked like making a stand, the former was bowled by Hickmott, who had just previously gone on to bowl. J. C. Bickford-Smith joined his brother, who, however, was disposed to hit out too much, with the result that he was bowled by Clinch. R. Rogers only made a short stay, but J. C. Bickford-Smith and T. Romer played out time, the score standing at 109 for four wickets.

On Tuesday, the visitors had an uphill battle to face, but their apparent hurry to get runs soon landed them into a rather awkward position. Hickmott and Clinch, bowling at a fast pace, had the batsmen frequently in difficulties. None of the visitors did much, and they were all out for 217 runs, a moderate score on an apparently easy wicket. However, Kent's bowlers were in good form, and the visitors seemed unable to time the fast deliveries of Hickmott. Cornwall, being 228 runs behind, had to follow on. Their second innings commenced even more disastrously than their previous effort, and four of their best wickets had fallen for 36 runs. A gallant attempt was made to save the innings' defeat, but before half-past three the last wicket had fallen, with only 166 runs scored. Clinch and Hickmott were again very much on the mark with the ball, and the former took four wickets for 44 runs, while Smith, who was also tried, obtained two wickets for ten. Kent, therefore, gained an exceedingly clever victory. The scores were as follow:—

In this match, which commenced at Hythe on Monday, the home side ran up the huge score of 445 for five wickets, when the innings was declared closed. The feature of the play was a partnership between L. H. Troughton and Jennings, who remained together two hours and 15 minutes, and put on 369 runs. Troughton made 124 and Jennings 123, the professional hitting twenty-nine 4's. At a close Cornwall had responded with 109 for four wickets. On Tuesday Cornwall carried their total to 217, and following on 223 behind, were dismissed again for 168.

**MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.
KENT II. v. CORNWALL.**

Played at Hythe on Monday and Tuesday in glorious weather. The homesters went to the wicket with Troughton and Cowley facing Hawken and Trevarthen, and Cowley scored freely off Hawken, who soon gave way to Whiting. Cowley being bowled with only 39 up, Powell joined Troughton, and hit hard for 22. At 86 a smart catch behind the wicket dismissed Powell. The fielding of Cornwall was smart, and Jennings brought the hundred on the board, and despite bowling at lunch Kent had made 130 for loss of two wickets. Thirty minutes' play after lunch saw the second hundred on the board. Jennings punished the bowling severely. After another hour's play 300 appeared, but at 366 Jennings was well caught by W. Bickford-Smith for a splendid innings of 173. At the same score Troughton was bowled for 134, after batting three hours. At 400 Roberts was dismissed, and at 445 the innings was declared for five wickets. Cornwall commenced their innings with H. Tresawna and W. Bickford-Smith, Hickmott and Powell sharing the attack. Only 19 runs had been scored when Powell bowled Tresawna. Clinch relieved Collins and bowled W. Bickford-Smith with the addition of only seven runs. Hickmott got rid of Rogers and Dr. Tresawna. Romer and J. Bickford-Smith came together, and checked disaster, both making very good strokes and bringing the hundred on the board after 80 minutes. Cornwall started Tuesday's play badly, as both the overnight batsmen, Romer and J. Bickford-Smith, left without any addition to the score. Wickets fell quickly until Vibart and Trevarthen became associated, 50 runs being added. Eventually the innings was completed for 217.

Following on 228 runs in arrears, the visitors had lost four wickets for 75 by lunch. Dr. Tresawna and J. Bickford-Smith batted admirably, and Bickford-Smith was bowled for a pretty 44. The stand between Dr. Tresawna and Bickford-Smith added 80 runs in seventy minutes. Eventually Tresawna was out to a brilliant catch on the boundary. Most of his runs were obtained in front of the wicket, and he hit six 4's. Another collapse followed, Cornwall being all out at 3.20 for 156, which left Kent victorious by an innings and 62 runs.

CORNWALL COUNTY CRICKET TOUR.

(By our special Correspondent.)

On being told that many cricket lovers in the county would like a more detailed account of the games than can possibly be given in the Western daily papers, I add for their benefit some notes on the three matches. The first encounter, and the stiffest one, was against Kent II. at Hythe, where ever preparation had been made for the cricket week. The ground, about half as big again as that at Truro, was surmounted with prettily decorated tents, where entertainment was general. The Hythe Military Band played from three to six p.m., and after stumps were drawn for the day there was "all the fun of the fair" of which more anon. It was a beautiful wicket, much faster than any we see in Cornwall, but the outfielding was a little rough in some places. The Kent captain, L. H. Troughton, won the toss, and went in with Cowley. Hawken started from the end, and his first over yielded two singles. Trevarthen was the other bowler. Both batsmen took matters easily, and it was well over the half hour before 20 was up. With the score at 38 Whiting took Trevarthen's end and bowled Cowley with the second ball of his second over—39, 1, 22. W. Powell followed in and saw Troughton send up the half-century just inside the hour. Some fine driving by both men produced the next 20 in 9 minutes. This caused a double change, Tresawna for Hawken and Trevarthen for Whiting. Neither could do much with the Cornish captain, who got Powell caught at the wicket for 22—85, 2, 22. Jennings, who has scored well for the first eleven on one of two occasions, and Troughton, added no less than 230 for the third wicket. Besides the bowlers already mentioned Maunsell and W. N. Bickford-Smith had a try, and Hawken swung the new ball at 200, but both men were well set, and played delightful cricket. Jennings timed his strokes so well that he never seemed to be hitting hard, and yet he reached the boundary 31 times. He is a little fellow, certainly not more than 5ft. 8ins., but he's a big cricketer, and so quick on his feet to get position. At length, with the score at 366, the professional was nearly caught by W. N. at slip off Whiting. He had got his 173 runs in 151 minutes. At the same total, 366, Tresawna bowled Troughton, who had been in 61 minutes longer than Jennings, for a sound, 134, 76 of which were from boundaries. His chief scoring stroke was the off drive. I don't think Troughton gave a chance, but Jennings was missed at 162 and 165—difficult ones. Collins, a lusty left hander, and Roberts carried on to 400, when the latter was well taken by the watchful W. N. off Trevarthen for 13. Monckton helped Collins to add 45, when at 4.45 p.m., with the score also 445, Kent declared. In Collins' 48 (n.o.) there were only 5 singles! In spite of their long outing our men never got slack in the field, and certainly gave nothing away. Vibart's safe keeping can be judged by the extras by 3 byes, 2 leg byes.

Cornwall began with E. Tresawna and W. N. Bickford-Smith, who faced Hickmott left hand fast medium and Powell right hand fast. Both batsmen seemed to be at home with the bowling, for four boundaries were hit in the first three overs, but at 19 Tresawna played on to a bumping one from Powell. On Dr. Tresawna coming in Collins, fast right, took the ball from Hickmott. Collins has a peculiar action, and seems to fling himself, as well as the ball, at you. The doctor drove finely, and W. N. shot hard past extra cover, so that at 58 Hickmott tried the town end vice Powell, and Clinch (medium right) the sea end vice Collins. The change was successful, as with three on, Clinch got one past W. N.—61, 2, 29. At 67 Hickmott leg-yorked Tresawna, who had first driven him sweetly for 4—67, 3, 22. With one only added Rogers pulled in one from the same bowler—68, 4, 1. Romer and J. C. Bickford-Smith made a useful stand, bringing on Powell again for Hickmott, and carrying the total to 109 before stumps were drawn—J. C., 23; Romer, 13.

On resuming at 11 a.m. on Tuesday Romer was at once bowled by Clinch, and J. C. getting under a full toss of Powell's, was caught at slip for a 23, in which there was only one single. Vibart and Maunsell, the two big hitters of the team, were now together. The left hander got a six—a huge on drive—and five singles before Collins caught him in the deep off Clinch—159, 7, 11. Vibart commenced with three 4's, and on Trevarthen joining him made a mighty on drive for six off Clinch, whom the Helston men played prettily to leg for four, and then scored cleverly off the fast bowler. At 178 Hickmott relieved Powell, and with the addition of 10 Trevarthen was badly missed by Jennings at extra cover off Clinch. Vibart, who had been scoring steadily, was bowled at 197 in attempting to drive Hickmott. His 48 included a six and six 4's—197, 8, 46. Hawken played out the over. Trevarthen got Collins for four, and Hawken a four off Hickmott. Chiefly by the aid of singles 217 was reached, when Trevarthen returned one to Collins and retired with a very useful 34. Before Whiting had a chance to score Mickmott bowled Hawken at 12.30 p.m.

Being 228 behind, Cornwall had, of course, to follow on. The same pair, H. Tresawna and W. N. Bickford-Smith, started to Hickmott (town end) and Powell. We began badly. Tresawna was taken by short leg off Hickmott at 8, and at 15 W. N. and Rogers were clean bowled by the left hander—three for 15. Dr. Tresawna and Romer were now partners, but though the former scored freely the latter could not get going, and at 36 was stumped in going out to Jennings (slow leg breaks) who had been nput on at the top end—36, 4, 0. J. C. and the doctor improved matters considerably, and more than trebled the score before they were parted. J. C. swept Jennings to the leg boundary three times in five balls, and the doctor was very severe on Powell, who had succeeded Hickmott. Lunch was taken with 77 up.

On continuing Hickmott and Clinch were the bowlers. J. C. twice got prettily to the leg boundary. A two to the on gave Tresawna his 50 amid general applause, again earned for some clean drives in the same direction. At 116 J. C., who had never seemed in difficulties, was bowled by Clinch for a sound 44. Vibart at once smote Clinch for 5, but the doctor, in trying to do the same was caught by Roberts right on the boundary line. His 67 was a delightful display of free driving. There were only nine singles—127, 6, 67. On Maunsell's arrival the field, remembering his power at Penzance, spread out, but Clinch got him first ball with one that kept low. Trevarthen got a four, and then shared Maunsell's fate. Hawken took a three and a four off Clinch, and then at 145 Vibart was caught at slip off Smith (medium right) who had superseded Hickmott. Whiting quickly rattled up eleven, and seemed eager for more when he saw the Lanhydrock man bowled by Clinch for a steady 14—166, 10, 14, thus leaving Kent victors by an innings and 62 runs at 3.20 p.m.

The Kent men fielded much better in Cornwall's second innings than the first, but at no time did it reach a higher standard than that of the Cornishmen, for whom the captain at cover was, as indeed he always is, brilliant. After tea we all joined in the "Old English Fays," and easily vanquished all comers at the "Newmarket Game" and the "Penalty Kick." Our genial hon. secretary has a valuable and bright collection of china, which we won, and which he will gladly show to collectors and connoisseurs. MINOR COUNTIES COMPETITION.

KENT II. v. CORNWALL.

At Hythe yesterday, in glorious weather, the Kent second eleven entertained Cornwall. Kent won the toss, Troughton and Cowley facing Hawken and Trevarthen. Cowley scored freely off Hawken, who soon gave way to Whiting, and the change was successful, Cowley being bowled with only 30 on the board. Powell joined Troughton, and bit hard for 22, and at the end of the first hour there were 70 runs on the board. At 85 a smart catch behind the wicket dismissed Powell. With Jennings in, Troughton reached his fifty after timely minutes' play. The folding of Cornwall was particularly smart. Jennings brought the hundred on the board with a fine pull to leg, and despite bowling changes the score steadily rose, and at lunch Kent had made 150 for loss of two wickets. Thirty minutes' play after lunch saw the second hundred on the board, the batsmen having completely mastered the bowling, boundary following boundary. Jennings punished the bowling severely. After another hour's play 300 appeared, but at 368 Jennings was well caught by W. Bickford-Smith. His splendid innings of 173 included no less than twenty-five boundary hits, his runs being scored in two hours. At the same score Troughton was bowled for 134, his score including eighteen boundaries. He batted three hours. Collins and Roberts then came together, but at 400 the latter was dismissed. With Morckton in, runs came more freely, and at 445 the innings was declared for five wickets. Cornwall commenced their innings with H. Treasawa and W. Bickford-Smith, Hickmott and Powell sharing the attack. Only 10 runs had been scored when Powell bowled Treasawa. Clinch relieved Collins and bowled W. Bickford-Smith with the addition of only seven runs. Hickmott got rid of Rogers and Dr. Treasawa. Romer and J.
