MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Lincs. v. Cambs. at Spalding.

BY SPECTATOR.

Lincolnshire and Cambridgeshire met on the "Black Swan" ground for their return match, in connection with the Minor Counties' Championship, on Monday and Tuesday. Both counties had good representative sides out, and much interest attached to the meeting. The weather on both days was simply ideal for the match, and great progress was made with the game on the first day, at the close of play at 5.30 on Monday evening each side having played their first innings, and nine wickets being down in Lincolnshire's second venture.

TOM HAYWARD'S BROTHER.

The home county had a good eleven, the team differing in two instances from that published. C. L. Prior was not able to turn out, his place being taken by A. Bavin, a Lincoln Linnam player. S. H. Barlow, one of our local men, owing to accident was prevented from playing, and his place was very fittingly taken by G. H. Salaman, the Spalding vice-captain. Cambs. had made great efforts to bring their strongest side, and had L. J. Reid not broken down in health just prior to the match, the visitors would have had their ideal eleven. As it was, they were a very strong batting side, and entered upon the contest with the confident expectation of being able to get something of their own back at the expense of their Lincs. rivals. L. J. Reid's place was filled by Frank Hayward, the great Surrey batsman's brother.

Thompson beat Tebbutt in the spin of the coin, a palpable advantage to Lincs, one would have thought, to be able to bat first on a hard, run-getting wicket. On the day's work, however, this bit of luck availed them nothing. The start was not inspiring, both Thompson and Rose being out to unprofitable strokes with 3 each to their credit. With Broughton gone, also caught, there were 3 out for 16, and the situation looked peculiar for the batting side. I thought Broughton seemed to question the legality of the catch, a sharp, low one to Ling, deep in the slips, for he hesitated on the pitch, but the umpiral finger went up unmistakably, and there was no doubt he was out. Now Day and Neville played brightly and local hopes brightened.

EXTRAORDINARY INCIDENT.

There was the first bowling change at 44. Mr. Bernard Pigg going on for the wily Coulson, but the old Spalding pro. brought up 50 by hitting the tall amateur to leg for four. Fifty runs in 45 minutes. Another bowling change—Ling for G. A. Rose. Neville was playing beautiful cricket and seemed quite at home, when disaster came. It was an unusual incident, and one of those rare events which will crop up in cricket. Neville, playing at a half from Ling, lost grip of his bat. The bat fell from his hands and broke into the wicket, the ball striking the wicket-keeper in the face.

Day had played a rather stylish innings for 23, when, as is his way, he offered a c. and b., which Ling, of all men, was not likely to refuse. Gibson batted very prettily, and the young Sleafordian was good value for his 24. Ling who, by-the-way, when here last year was an amateur, but now plays as a pro., was very smart in the field, and he brought off his third catch when he snapped up Gibson. 22 runs were scored in one hour. Worman was cheered on coming out to bat, and when he smote Coulson for six, right into the "jungle," there was a roar of approval. The scoring for Lincs. was singularly even, and while Worman subscribed 17, Bavin and young Bowman raised the total from 107 to 152 for the 9th wicket. The former made 19 before G. A. Rose, the burly West Cambs. farmer, bowled him with a fast one, and Bowman carried his bat for 21. Lincolnshire were batting just under 2 hours for 155 runs.

BAD BATTING.

Cambs. started after lunch, and the opening was very bad, K. G. Reid being run out without scoring. With only 10 up, Day clean bowled Wilson, the Wisbech amateur, and 14 later Riley bowled Collier, and 3 were out for 24. This was little better than Lincs. Was it the wicket, or was it a case of bad batting. Ling soon showed that the wicket was to his liking, and he played with confidence. He got best support from his captain, the other members of the team failing badly against Day, Riley, and Gibson. I thought Thompson handled his

men skilfully in the field, and he rang on the changes capitally. Captaincy counts for much. Thompson sets a fine example and he is the essence of smartness. One sees the Lincs. skipper at his best at mid-off.

Ling was batting an hour and 20 minutes for his 77, and it was a fine display. He was good all round the wicket, and got many runs on the on side. What Cambs. would have done without the pro. is a matter for conjecture. While other men seemed on ceremony very largely, Ling was perfectly at home, and no matter how frequently the bowlers changed, he pursued the free, confident game. When Ling went it was a race for the three points between the two sides as to the lead on the first innings. With 9 out, Cambs. stood at 150, or 5 behind. Then it was tragedy for Lincs., and Cambs. secured the coveted points, for when the figure was 155, or 2 behind, there was a boundary bye for 4, and this gave the visitors a lead of 2 runs, as Day bowled Hayward without addition.

Lincolnshire made a fair beginning in the second innings, Thompson and Worman being the first pair. The score was 43 when the captain left. Worman played nicely, and the home county looked like making a good show, but succeeding batsmen shaped badly. The batting was, as a matter of fact, rank bad, and half the side were out for 76 runs. Not that the Lincs. men pottered and poked about, sooner the reverse. Failing to properly play themselves in, they hit out somewhat recklessly and got caught.

UNLUCKY THIRTEEN.

Riley stood well, both Broughton and young Gibson leaving at the unlucky number of thirteen. Riley and Rose brought the total to 109 for 6 wickets, and improved the position somewhat. Ling was again smart in the field, as also was Tebbutt. Nine were out for 125, and it looked as though Lincs. would be all dismissed before time for drawing stumps. Rose and Salaman, however, were the net-outs, the total overnight being 140 for nine wickets. Lincs. were thus 138 on with one wicket to fall, when the game was resumed on Tuesday morning.

When the game started the following morning, Salaman and Rose played capitally. They put on a most useful 21 in very little time, and really seemed like making a prolonged stand, when Rose struck at a bad ball from his namesake—one which he should have left severely alone—and was simply caught. Salaman was applauded by his local admirers for his praiseworthy 17 not out, and the Spalding vice-captain certainly did himself credit.

A NICE PROBLEM.

Cambs. left with 160 to make to win, set about their task shortly after 11.30. It was an interesting situation, and quite a problem as to whether they could make the tune. Disaster set in early. Collier being smartly caught by Day at slip with 3 on the board, Hunt and Reid played manfully and well, and raised the hopes of the visitors. The fielding of Neville was applauded. He very smartly took Hunt right out for a good 27. Thompson frequently changed the bowling.

There were three out for 73, and when Ling was given out lbw there were four out for 79, and Wilson going at the same total there was half the side out for 73, the game favouring Lincs.

B. W. Pigg came in, but was smartly taken by Rose off Riley soon afterwards for 4 runs. Six out for 83. Tebbutt played pluckily, and so long as he stayed there was a chance for the visitors, but he was caught by Riley for a valuable 23. There was an adjournment for lunch at 1.30, when Cambs. had 34 66 set and two wickets to fall. Fifteen minutes' play finished the match, the visitors being 21 behind when the last wicket fell. It was a fine finish, and Lincs. well deserved their victory.

Cambs. v. Lincolnshire.

Cambs. journeyed to Spalding on Monday to play Lincolnshire in the Minor Counties' Championship. The wicket was nothing less than a God send, and all day long the batsmen gained a lead of two runs on the first innings, and then got rid of nine Lincolnshire batsmen for 140 runs. In the batting department "Sammy" Ling was the only player to master the bowling, and his 77 must rank as one of the best innings he has played for the County. Rose was quite off-colour with the ball, and Bernard Pigg was only able to send down a couple of old scorers. Lincolnshire are a good bowling side, but although yesterday's score does not point to it, Cambs. are a very strong batting team, and should be capable of winning. At the last moment E. J. Reid was not well enough to play, his place being taken by Frank Hayward, Lincolnshire were at full strength.

The wicket was covered with plantings, except for a few bare patches, and the heavy dew of the early morning probably did not improve it. Lincolnshire won the toss, but started very badly. Coulson had Rose caught at square-leg in his second over, whilst B. W. Pigg over Rose had Chapman taken in the slips. The following over from that end Ling caught Broughton, and three good wickets were down for 18 runs, and Day and Neville then scored at a good pace, and at 50 Pigg displaced Coulson, whilst Ling went on at the other end, and in his first over caught and bowled Day, who had contributed 25. The next over disposed of Neville, who struck out and lost his bat which fell back on the wicket and lost his bat which fell back on the wicket.

Coulson returned to the attack, Pigg, whilst Rose returned to the other end. In Coulson's second over Riley skied one to mid-on and had to leave. Worman came in and helped himself to six, and sent up his hundred after an hour and ten minutes' play. He was then caught by Tebbutt at cover point, and with Hunt going on, Gibson skied one and had to leave. Worman and Bavin then made a stand, but with Ling going on, Bavin ought to have been taken in the slips. Bavin then played Rose on, and with Salaman being caught by Reid, the innings closed for 155 just before lunch.

Cambs. opened with Reid and Collier. Day took the first over, and in it Reid was run out, the wicket falling with no runs on the board. In Day's second over Collier, who had then made one, was badly missed in the slips, whilst the following over he paid another risky stroke through the slips. He was obviously not at home, and in the same over—(Riley's third)—he was defeated, whilst Wilson only had two to his credit when he was bowled by Day, and three wickets were down for a couple of dozen runs. Ling lifted Day round to the leg boundary twice running, and by driving Riley to the off for four sent up the fifty after 40 minutes' play. Ling took two more 4's from Day. A. Gibson displaced Riley, but Thompson kept Day on, and the wisdom of this was apparent, for he bowled Hunt with the first ball of his next over. Gibson only bowled a couple of overs before Riley returned to the attack. Ling took a single, and broke his series of fours, which had then totalled up to seven. At 83 Broughton displaced Day, and Gibson returned to the other end, and it was as Tebbutt made his first mistake, jumping out to Gibson and being stumped. The hundred went up after an hour and twenty minutes' play. B. W. Pigg having joined Ling. The old Jesus man was then caught at long-off, but with Hayward in Ling reached his 50 out of 105, scored in an hour and ten minutes. Ling had made 57 when he should have been caught by the wicket-keeper, and he then took a couple of 4's and a 2 in one over from Gibson, and the latter was then displaced by Riley, who had Ling caught at the wicket of the last ball of his over. Ling played splendid cricket for an hour and twenty minutes, hitting thirteen 4's. Day went on at the other end. At 150 Worman took the leather from Riley, and his second ball Watta hit straight to point, six runs then being required for at least on the first innings. Rose was stupidly run out before he had scored. Fourbyre gave Cambs. the lead on the first innings, and Coulson should then have been stumped; but Hayward was beaten at the opposite end, and the innings closed for 157.

Thompson and Worman started on Lincolnshire's second knock in a lively manner, thirty-six runs being scored in seven overs. Hunt then displaced Rose, and had Thompson caught at the wicket of his sixth ball, whilst in his next over he bowled Worman, but not before the old Norfolk man had given two easy chances, one to Pigg when 11, and the other to Hayward in the slips. Neville was then missed off Hunt by Watta and Ling from non-executive strokes. At 65 Tebbutt went on for Coulson, and had Broughton caught in the country, whilst he disposed of Neville in the same manner. Hunt was having very bad luck, as Gibson should have been stumped of his when he had only made one, whilst Watta had missed another chance of the same bowler. Rose displaced Tebbutt at 82, and the 100 was signally in eighty minutes. Hunt at length defeated Gibson for a lucky thirteen, and had Riley caught in the slips. Coulson went on, and disposed of Worman and Bavin, and stumps were drawn with nine wickets down for 160.

Re-opening on Tuesday morning Lincolnshire added 21 to their overnight score. Cambs. were thus set 160 runs to get to win, and best part of the day to obtain them, and without after Collier had failed, Reid and Hunt carried the score to 82 for two wickets, they had every chance of doing so, but an "l.b.w." against Ling seemed to quite upset the side, and five wickets went down for 20 runs. The Tebbutt came along and carried play over lunch, and looked like pulling the match out of the fire until he was given out by the umpire, and Cambs. had to acknowledge defeat when only 21 runs were required to have turned the decision in their favour. A quarter of an hour in the morning was sufficient to finish off Lincolnshire's innings, and in that time 21 runs were put on, making 27 for the wicket, then the batsman (Rose) got out to anything but a good ball from G. A. Rose. This left Cambs. with 160 to get to win, and Collier and Hunt started the next 25 minutes. Collier was captured in the slips for a single in Riley's first over. Reid came in, and with the batsmen scoring freely from Day, the bowler was displaced by Worman at 82, who at a run later Broughton relieved Riley. Bavin got a couple of fours from Broughton, but in the following

over from that end Hunt was finely caught in the country by Neville, who had been feeling very finely. The 50 had just previously been sent up after 45 minutes' play. Day returned to the attack vice Worman. Reid had made 22 when he gave a hard chance to the wicket-keeper off Day. Cambs. now wanted a hundred to win, and had eight wickets in hand. Reid, who had been batting for an hour, was caught in the slips with the total at 73. Six runs later Ling was given out leg before, a decision with which he did not agree. The following over Wilson was captured at the wicket, and half of the side were out for 79. Things were now looking very black for Cambs., and Riley disposed of Pigg in his following over. Watta opened with a five (four for an overthrow) and a four, but was then well beaten by Riley. Frank Hayward joined Tebbutt, win sent up the hundred. For a time, with Tebbutt and Hayward associated, Cambs. seemed to have a chance of winning. At lunch two but Hayward was then bowled. At lunch two wickets had yet to fall and 34 runs were required to win. Tebbutt and Rose were getting nicely set after lunch when Tebbutt was run out, and with Coulson caught at mid-on the innings closed for 159. Throughout the innings the fielding of the home side was very fine, and went a long way towards winning the match.

CAMBS. UNLUCKY TO LOSE.
PITCH TOO LONG.

Apart from a couple of bad starts and one or two mistakes, Cambs. were very unlucky to lose their return match with Lincolnshire at Spalding on Tuesday. Adverse decisions by one of the umpires went a very long way towards the defeat of Cambs., who have now scored 18 points out of a possible 40. Cambs. have never beaten Lincs., but they had a splendid chance this week, although they were not able to take advantage of it. The County have played some exciting matches recently, but nothing to compare with the Lincolnshire match, which was always open, but in which, except for gaining a lead of two runs on the first innings, the luck always seemed to go against the visitors. To make matters worse, when the wicket was measured on Tuesday morning it was found to be 3ft. 9in. too long! While this was as bad for one side as the other, Cambs. had undoubtedly the worst of the luck on account of two "run outs," neither of the batsmen so defeated being 3ft. 9in. outside the crease.

On the opening day (Monday) both sides completed an innings, and Lincolnshire lost nine wickets in their second venture, and with one wicket in hand were 133 runs on. From this it will be gathered that there was a very full day's cricket. The wicket was nothing less than a bad one, and all day the ball was beating the bat. The ground was covered with plantains, except for a few bald patches, and the heavy dew of the early morning probably did not improve it. Lincolnshire won the toss, but were disposed of for 155. After a hard struggle Cambs. gained a lead of two runs on the first innings, and then got rid of nine Lincolnshire batsmen for 140 runs. In the batting department "Sammy" Ling was the only player to master the bowling, and his 77 must rank as one of the best innings he has played for the County. Rose was quite off-colour with the ball, and Bernard Pigg was only able to send down a couple of *sevens*. *But Hunt was in excellent form in Lincolnshire's second innings, and but for some bad luck the innings would have closed overnight.* Lincolnshire are a good bowling side, and although Monday's score does not point to it, the odds are a strong strong batting team, and great hopes were entertained of them getting the runs required to win. At the last moment L. J. Reid was not well enough to play, his place being taken by Frank Hayward. Lincolnshire were at full strength.

A quarter of an hour on Tuesday morning was sufficient to finish off Lincolnshire's innings, and in that time 21 runs were put on, making 37 for the wicket. Cambs. were thus set 140 runs to get to win, and last part of the day to obtain them, and when after Collier had failed, Reid and Hunt carried the score to 52 for two wickets, they had every chance of doing so, but an "l.b.w." against Pigg seemed to quite upset the side, and five batsmen went down for 29 runs. Then Tebbutt came along and carried play over lunch, and looked like pulling the match out of the fire until he was given out by the umpire, and Cambs. had to acknowledge defeat when only 21 runs were required to have turned the decision in their favour. Throughout the innings the fielding of the home side was very fine, and went a long way towards winning the match.

Cambs. had decidedly hard lines in the return match with Lincolnshire. To have had their opponents on the first innings, got them out for 161 in the second, and then to be bundled out for 139 when victory looked to be within their grasp, was very galling. It is no use "grousing" about umpires' decisions—certainly Cambs. had nothing to thank them for—but they have a legitimate complaint about the pitch, which, on being measured on Tuesday morning, proved to be 3ft. 9ins. too long. This cut against the Cambs. team very badly, because in their first innings they lost Kenneth Reid and G. A. Rose for a cipher, both being given run out, although neither of them could have been 3ft. 9ins. from the crease. The outstanding feature of the first day's play was the good batting of Ling, who contributed quite one of the best innings he has played for the county. Neville lost his wicket in a curious manner, hitting out at a ball and losing his bat which slipped out of his grasp, and, as ill-luck would have it, fell on to the wicket. In the second innings Ling never had a chance to get going, being given out lbw when he had only made a couple. After this Tebbutt was the only one to make any serious stand against Day and Riley, and when he left the end was not long in coming. The value of good fielding was strongly demonstrated in this innings, no fewer than seven of the Cambs. batsmen being caught and the Lincs. fieldsmen being so keen that runs were very hard to obtain.
