Cambs. v. Herts.
SPLENDID VICTORY FOR CAMBS.
FINE INNINGS BY TEBBUTT.

On a somewhat wet wicket the game between Cambs. and Herts. was commenced at Fenner's on Tuesday morning. Cambs. won the toss, and the brothers Reid went in to face the bowling of Burton and Shelford, and in half an hour 30 went up. Coleman took Burton's place as bowler, and shortly afterwards B. Pawle relieved Shelford at the pavilion end. Having made 21, K. G. Reid was missed behind the stumps of Coleman, and the score reached 50 immediately afterwards. Marsh went on for Coleman, and in the next over by Pawle and with the score at 59, K. G. Reid was bowled. Ling, who followed, soon got settled to useful work, and when 70 had been passed Burton and Shelford again went on at changed ends. In response to an emphatic appeal at 89, Reid was given out caught behind the wicket for a well-played 34. At the same score Ling was similarly out of a ball by Burton. B. W. Pigg and Watts improved the score slowly, a 100 being announced immediately after the batsmen had narrowly escaped being run out. Pigg was caught at 101, four wickets having now fallen.

Watts and Tebbutt put on runs quickly after lunch by means of several good boundary hits. At 131, however, Watts left as the result of a good ball by Coleman, and C. H. Pigg came to help Tebbutt.

Pigg was missed by Wright at 145, at which score Tebbutt was disposed of, Coleman accepting a catch of a ball sent by Shelford. The outgoer had made a decent show and deserved the 62 runs which stood to his credit. Eleven more runs had been put on by Pigg and Boccock, when the former allowed a clever ball by Shelford to break through his defence. At 160 Rose was clean bowled by Shelford after having scored a boundary, and Boccock and C. Pigg settled down to careful batting. In their eagerness to snatch runs the batsmen were nearly "caught napping" on a few occasions, though an overthrow at one stage added four runs. At 181 Boccock sent a catch to Coleman, who accepted, and Coulson, the last man, came on the scene. A risky run produced another lucrative overthrow, but only a few singles had been added when Pigg was caught by Anderson at point, the score being 192. Shelford was the most successful bowler for Herts., securing seven wickets at a cost of 63 runs. Out of 32 overs he sent down seven maidens. Burton obtained one wicket for 48 runs, Coleman one for 34, and Pawle one for 17.

Grellett and Golding started for Herts., Coulson and Rose bowling. The two had carried the score to 33, when Tebbutt took charge of the ball at the pavilion end, and B. W. Pigg went on at the other. Grellett was caught behind the stumps when the total had reached 44, and Titchmarsh partnered Golding. The two became accustomed to the bowling, and sent frequent boundary hits. Whilst fielding a ball Ling injured his leg, and had to leave the field, Wright taking his place. The batsmen continued to score with fair rapidity until the total was 87, when Golding touched a ball, which was covered by Watts. Titchmarsh and Anderson carried the score to 106, when a particularly smart catch at first leg by Boccock dismissed Titchmarsh. All three wickets had fallen to Pigg. G. C. Anderson and A. F. Leighton batted discreetly, and put on runs at a slow pace until the bowling allowed opportunities of hitting, when runs came more quickly. Leighton was sent back to the pavilion at 154, being caught by Coulson at short-leg of L. J. Reid's bowling. B. Pawle had not been associated with Anderson long when the latter was clean bowled by Rose for a well-played 40. Five wickets had now been lost for 165, and Coleman was next in. The latter and Pawle had only carried the score to 178, when Pawle was easily bowled by a "yorker" sent down by Rose. Only a single had been added when Rose also upset Coleman's wicket. Marsh, who came next, lost his partner, Wright, with the score at 184, eight wickets having now fallen. With the score unaltered, Marsh was dismissed without having scored, and the day's play ended with the visitors having to make eight runs, with a wicket in hand, to equal Cambs.' total.

When the game was resumed on Wednesday morning, Burton and Shelford, the last two Herts. men, quickly passed the Cambs. total, but only 194 had been reached when Burton got in front of the wickets, and was given out l.b.w. to Coulson. Rose (four wickets for 40) and B. W. Pigg (three for 37) were the best bowlers for Cambs.

The brothers Reid commenced batting a second time for Cambs., and only two singles had been snatched when L. J. Reid was caught by Grellett when hitting a ball by Burton to leg. Reid had a very short stay, playing a ball by Burton on to the wickets at 10. B. W. Pigg and Reid showed improved form, hitting many boundaries. At 30 Reid was missed behind the stumps, an expensive mistake in view of the good batting which followed. Runs were put on at a quick rate, but at 90 Pigg had the misfortune to hit the wickets whilst making a splendid boundary but to leg. This was an unfortunate incident for Cambs., as the outgoing batsman had a good night at home to the bowlers. Reid reached 50 after an hour and a quarter's play, and a clean bowled by Burton at this score. Four wickets having been lost for 119 runs, Tebbutt and C. H. Pigg became associated. The pair kept together until 136, when Pigg failed to get proper hold of a ball by Shelford, and was caught at point by Anderson. Ling, the next man, who was suffering from the effects of a sprain which he sustained from sending a ball on Tuesday, had L. J. Reid to run for him. He and Tebbutt kept three wickets intact until lunch time, when the score was 159 for five wickets.

Shortly after the resumption Tebbutt completed his half century, a performance which was supplemented by sending Shelford for six. Reid and Ling continued to be a source of trouble to the bowlers, being still together when the second century was passed. They batted brilliantly, each getting in a plethora of good strokes on both sides of the wicket. At 250 Tebbutt reached a hundred runs, after having been at the wickets an hour and 50 minutes. Ling was run out at 251, when, with six wickets down, the home side declared. The reception Ling and Tebbutt received at the pavilion was well deserved.

Herts. were set to get 282 runs in two and three-quarter hours, and Golding and R. C. Grellett went in to bat. Judging from the slow pace at which runs came, there was little chance of the visitors accomplishing the task set them. Only three runs had been put on when Grellett was caught behind the wickets by Watts. With the total the same Titchmarsh was cleverly caught by Rose. The loss of two wickets for three runs looked gloomy for the visitors, and when, with the score at eight, Golding was caught by Watts, matters, from their point of view, became worse. Anderson and A. F. Leighton had not been together long—the score was only 17—when the latter was beaten by a ball from Coulson. Only five more had been added when Pawle was detected by a tricky ball from Rose. Anderson and Coleman looked like improving the outlook for Herts., but they had only carried the score to 48 when Coleman made a disastrous stroke, which resulted in his being caught at square leg by Boccock. E. L. Wright and Anderson put on runs slowly, and it was obvious that the bowling needed careful watching. They were still batting when the board announced 80. The two were separated, however, at 89, when Anderson returned a ball by B. W. Pigg, the latter accepting an easy catch. Marsh was got rid of before having scored, and only 10 more had been put on when K. J. Reid caught Wright. Burton and Shelford, the last two men, had only been together three minutes when Burton was caught by Rose, and Cambs. gained a very handsome victory by 179 runs. Scores:—

THE TEAM FOR AUSTRALIA.

To the Editor of CRICKET.

DEAR SIR,—Much has been written lately concerning the rank-and-file of the M.C.C. Australian team, especially as regards the weakness of the bowling, but I have seen no comment made anywhere upon the non-inclusion of either Dean or W. C. Smith. I have never seen Dean bowl, but I hear that he is able to maintain an accurate length for hours together, and is always difficult to score off, and it seems to me that he would be an excellent choice for the long-drawn-out games upon Australian wickets. Incidentally he has taken more wickets than any other bowler this season.

W. C. Smith has always been under-rated as a bowler. He should have played against the Australians in 1909, and he bowled very well against them in 1905 for his county. The theory that he can bowl only upon wet wickets has been completely exploded this summer, for he has taken the second largest number of wickets at a very reasonable cost. Your readers will remember that Mr. Warner's first team to Australia played their second and fifth Test matches on wickets ruined by rain. There is no reason why at least one of the Test matches this winter should not be thus contested, and on such a wicket Smith (with Woolley at the other end) would have been invaluable.

Furthermore, as the team consists of fifteen men, Smith need not have been played when the wicket did not suit his bowling.

One recognises, of course, that the Selection Committee have had a very difficult task before them, and have done their best, and one does not wish to blame them.

Perhaps one of your readers would be able to explain through your columns why these two men have not received invitations.
